COLORS ENLIVEN SPRING HATS; FLOWERS USED IN TRIMMING

IT MUST be admitted that the charming exotic straws shown this season are making felts look to their laurels. However, even in face of the keen competition of the straw chapeau the felt hat is holding its own. Women are loath to abandon felts, especially when the new models are more fascinating than ever from the standpoint of color and contour.

A happy solution to the problem as to whether it shall be felt or straw for spring is to decide upon both, by

choosing one of the nobby straw-and-felt types which are the outstanding theme among milliners at present.

This interworking of felt with straw is offering to the designer an endless opportunity to express "ideas." Many of the straws are elaborated with felt inserts and appliques or vice versa. This treatment is intricately carried out for the first hat in the picture. In this instance black felt is cleverly patterned with scissors, the cutout work applied on a softly draped straw. With the addition of a simple ornament, this model becomes a most beguiling exponent of the straw-with-felt types which lead in spring millinery displays.

An entirely different handling of felt with straw is that given to the cloche effect just below. Here the crown is straw, natural colored bakou, with felt forming the face-framing trim, brought to an effective bow trim at one side.

A smart interpretation of the straw-and-felt theme is presented in the model centered to the right. Not only are

corsage at the back of the low-cut décolletage. The most recent call of the mode is for flowers used in a trimming way, rather than merely accessory.

The tendency to trim with flowers is making definite appeal to stylists who see in floral treatments a new approach to lovely effects.

In the picture, flowers are featured as an integral part of dress decoration. The model to the left shows a distinctly new idea—a "flower garter dress." Two rose-colored flowers form the trimming on this black satin dinner dress. The third flower is attached to a band of satin in such a way that it shows when the wearer moves.

A striking ensemble is shown to the right. It consists of a soft rose chiffon dress with a separate coat of the same fabric. Large chiffon chrysanthemums in a deeper rose shade outline the neckline on one side of the dress. On the other side, the chrysanthemums are used on the coat, thus forming an entire garland of flowers

the insets of straw adroitly introduced but the tricolor pipings are a smart detail. The long effect at the back achieved in this hat also follows a featured trend.

The remaining two hats, one at the top and the other in the circle below answer the question why felts continue to repeat their triumphs season in and season out. To describe them as being in any one color would limit them for just such types are available in most of the newest colorings, which include such alluring hues as char treuse, Pandora green, citron, weave the important capucine shades, sun burn colors, navy and especially independent blue, also various yellows, for flow tones are smartly emphasized

about the tips. Matching flowers adorn the bodice.

Novel flower treatments on chiffon frocks of gay flower print add interest to less formal modes. The idea is to repeat the flowers patterned on the chiffon. If large roses are the fabric motif then roses of similar shape and color are worn as corsage. If the flowers themselves are not duplicated then at least the coloring in the prints are reproduced in the boutonniere.

DONLEY FARMERS ASK FOR COUNTY AGENT

A news dispatch from Clarendon, dated March 29, says:

A petition was presented to the Commissioners Court of Donley County here this week for a County Agent. The petitions were circulated over the county and bore the signatures of about 300 farmers and business men. The county has been unable to get an agent for some time due to there being no state and federal funds available to match the county appropriation. It is now thought that there will be some money available at an early date and the Court asked for the petition as an expression from the people in favor of an agent.

Donley county lost its agent a few years ago and has been unable to get one since. With some money for this service to become available soon, it is thought that the county has the best chance of securing an agent it has had for a long time.

Many farmers have expressed the desire for an agent to help them in their terracing, poultry and dairying work.

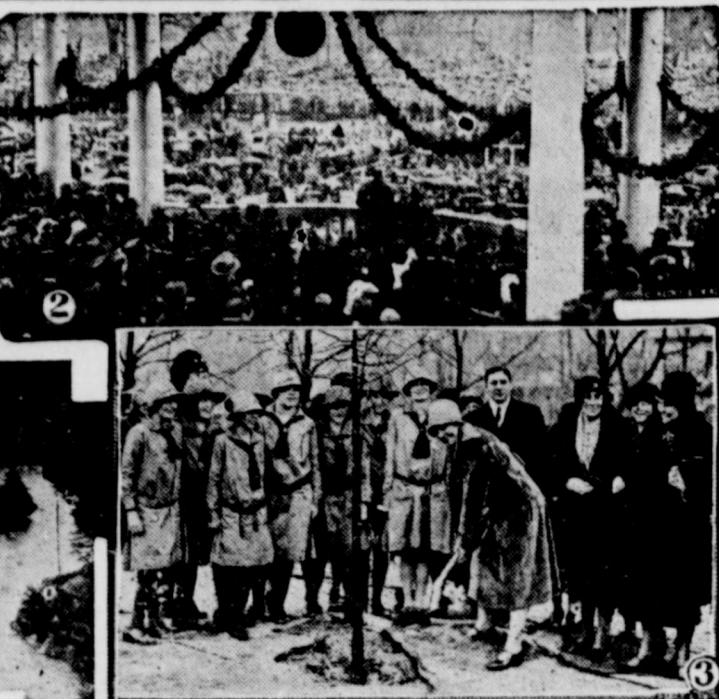

NEWS REVIEW OF CURRENT EVENTS

Hoover's Cabinet Accepted by the Senate—Serious Rebellion in Mexico.

By EDWARD W. PICKARD

PRESIDENT HOOVER'S first official act of consequence was to submit to the senate the names of eight men whom he had selected for his cabinet. Radical senators were all set to make a fight against confirmation of Andrew Mellon for secretary of the treasury, but, as was explained in these columns some time ago, it was not necessary for Mr. Hoover to send in Mr. Mellon's name, since he is a holdover, so the radicals were circumvented. Making no invidious distinction, the President also omitted from the list Secretary of Labor James J. Davis, the other member of the Coolidge cabinet who was retained.

The senate without hesitation confirmed the eight names submitted. They are:

Henry Lewis Stimson of New York, secretary of state.

James William Good of Illinois, secretary of war.

William Dewitt Mitchell of Minnesota, attorney general.

Walter Folger Brown of Ohio, postmaster general.

Charles Francis Adams of Massachusetts, secretary of the navy.

Ray Lyman Wilbur of California, secretary of the interior.

Arthur M. Hyde of Missouri, secretary of agriculture.

Robert Patterson Lamont of Illinois, secretary of commerce.

After a sharp debate the senate adopted a resolution offered by McKellar of Tennessee ordering the judiciary committee to investigate Secretary Mellon's right to continue in the cabinet without reappointment and to determine if he has violated an old law that prohibits treasury officials from engaging in any business. It was not believed in Washington that this action would bring about results adverse to Mr. Mellon. The secretary of the treasury, it was reported, intended to hold the office for not more than two years.

Since Mr. Stimson is on his way home from the Philippines, where he has been governor general, Secretary of State Kellogg consented to remain in office until his successor arrives in Washington and qualifies. In general the President's cabinet selections met with warm approval.

On Thursday President Hoover issued the call for the extraordinary session of congress, to open April 15. He said in the proclamation that the purpose is "to effect further agricultural relief and legislation for limited changes of the tariff."

During his first days in the White House Mr. Hoover received throngs of congratulating callers from all parts of the country, and also he settled down to the business of conducting the affairs of the nation. He told the newspaper correspondents he desired to continue the periodical press conferences and to develop them in directions that would assist both the press and the President. He conferred with Senator Smoot and Representative Tilson concerning the calling of the extraordinary session of congress for farm relief and tariff revision, and with Attorney General Mitchell concerning the appointment of the commission to investigate the administration of justice and especially the enforcement of prohibition. His emphatic words concerning law enforcement in his inaugural address were especially pleasing to all the church and dry organizations, and they presented him with their felicitations hand illumined on parchment and bound in tooled leather gold embossed. Mr. Hoover desires to place the entire prohibition enforcement machinery under the attorney general. This may require legislation, and the dry leaders in congress are not all in favor of this course.

Both of them were sincerely glad to resume their unpretentious home life, and Mrs. Coolidge especially seemed gay and happy. To the reporters Mr. Coolidge said, interviewing himself, that he is not going to practice law in Northampton or anywhere else at present; that the several contracts he has made for magazine articles are all he contemplates now in that line; that he will not write a book and will not make any speeches. He will not travel in foreign countries this summer, believing there are plenty of interesting places in the United States to be seen.

Gen. Charles G. Dawes, late Vice President, hastened back to Chicago and at once resumed work in the bank with which he was long connected. He was made chairman of the board. He declined to talk politics but vehemently denied that he intended to run for senator to succeed Charles S. Deneen. On March 28 General Dawes leaves for Santo Domingo as head of a commission of his own choosing to advise the Dominican government on financial problems.

REBELLION broke out in several states in Mexico and speedily reached alarming proportions. A number of governors and military chieftains joined in the movement, directed at the government of President Portes Gil and aimed particularly at what they called "Calles domination." They immediately ordered opened all the churches that had been closed by the Catholic authorities in protest against the religious laws which Calles, while President, put into effect. At first the rebels under General Aguirre gained possession of Vera Cruz and other important cities. Gen. Gonzalo Escobar was sent by the government to Monterey to combat the revolutionaries, but on arrival there he joined the rebels and was made military chief of the movement. President Portes Gil appointed Calles secretary of war, and under vigorous direction the federal troops regained possession of Monterey, Orizaba, and other strategic points. Aguirre in Vera Cruz state was deserted by most of his men, and Escobar was said to be surrounded by three strong armies. The government issued a bulletin predicting the early collapse of the entire rebellion, and dispatches from Ambassador Morrow indicated the same belief.

It was stated at the White House in Washington that the new administration would continue to enforce the embargo on arms shipments to Mexican rebels that was maintained by President Coolidge, but that licensed arms shipments would be permitted to go forward to Mexico City if requested by the Mexican government. The State department said every effort was being made to prevent the smuggling of arms across the border.

THAT fuss over an alleged secret Franco-Belgian military treaty came to an end when the man who sold the document to a Utrecht newspaper was arrested and confessed that it was a forgery. He was set free by a Belgian judge and declared he was really an agent provocateur of the Belgian government. The Dutch journalists passed a motion of censure on the Utrecht editor who published the forged paper.

TREATMENT of racial minorities in Europe was the topic the council of the League of Nations took up when it met in Geneva last week, but there was no prospect of action, for the council felt the problem was too big to be settled now and should be studied by a subcommittee. Sir Austen Chamberlain, British secretary for foreign affairs, said: "The rights of the minorities cannot be separated from their obligations, and they have to show that they have behaved loyally to the country of which they are part and given true allegiance to the country to which they are subject."

INSTEAD of whitewashing Gen. Umberto Nobile for the disaster of the dirigible Italia in the Arctic regions, the Italian court of inquiry censured him severely. The report of the court is divided into three sections. The first deals with the causes of the accident, the second with the behavior of the survivors, and the third with the relief efforts. After stating that the loss of the dirigible was due to error in handling made at the moment of its descent, the court found that the captain, Nobile, was at fault.

ation of the charges of cannibalism in connection with the disappearance of Dr. Finn Malmgreen, the Swedish scientist, and the third man with Capt. Alberto Mariane and Filippi Zappi on the Arctic ice.

Regarding General Nobile's action in allowing himself to be rescued first, the report says: "It cannot find plausible justification and it can only be explained, not justified, by conditions of physical or moral depression in which he was found which did not permit him to estimate the just value of his action, even though it was determined by the pressing invitation of Lundborg." Lieut. Einar-Paul Lundborg was the Swedish airman who took off Nobile.

CONDITIONS in Shantung province were so serious that the Nationalist government of China was reported fearful of defeat at the hands of General Chang's rebels and therefore trying hard to arrange a compromise by which further hostilities might be avoided. Meanwhile large numbers of government troops were being mobilized. The commander at Chefoo reiterated the charge that the Japanese were financing Chang.

JOHN D. ROCKEFELLER, JR., was the victor in the dramatic "war of the proxies" which reached its climax Thursday in Whiting, Ind. The final battle ground was the annual meeting of stockholders of the Standard Oil Company of Indiana and the man who went down to defeat was Col. Robert W. Stewart, chairman of the board of directors. With about twice as many shares as Stewart could control, the Rockefeller forces ousted the colonel from the board, replacing him with Dr. W. M. Burton, inventor of the famous cracking process; and Stewart's close friend, L. L. Stephens, general counsel and director, also was put out. Stewart had proxies from 31,336 stockholders, the "little fellows"; but the Rockefeller proxies, though only half that number, were from the rich men and corporations and easily controlled the situation. Stewart had the satisfaction of presenting a report that showed the company had just closed the most prosperous year in its history and he was unopposedly applauded by his supporters.

THOMAS TAGGERT, for many years the leader of the Democrats of Indiana, passed away at his home in Indianapolis at the age of seventy-three years after a long illness. Starting business life in a lunch room in Xenia, he became a very wealthy man, and a power in his party both in the state and in the nation. He was given the credit for making Woodrow Wilson President, and Thomas R. Marshall, twice Vice President, said his success in politics was due to Taggart. Moses Edwin Clapp, former United States senator from Minnesota, died in Washington where he had practiced law since leaving the senate in 1917. Among other recent deaths were those of Haley Fiske, president of the Metropolitan Life Insurance company, in New York; and of David D. Buick of Detroit, a pioneer in the automobile industry.

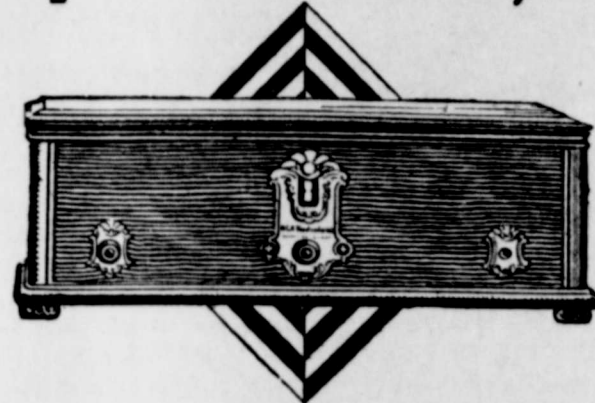
JUST before he left office, Attorney General Sargent granted freedom on parole to Thomas W. Miller, former alien property custodian, who was serving a term of eighteen months in Atlanta penitentiary for conspiring to defraud the government in the handling of German property during the World war. Miller was convicted in 1927 and began serving his sentence last April.

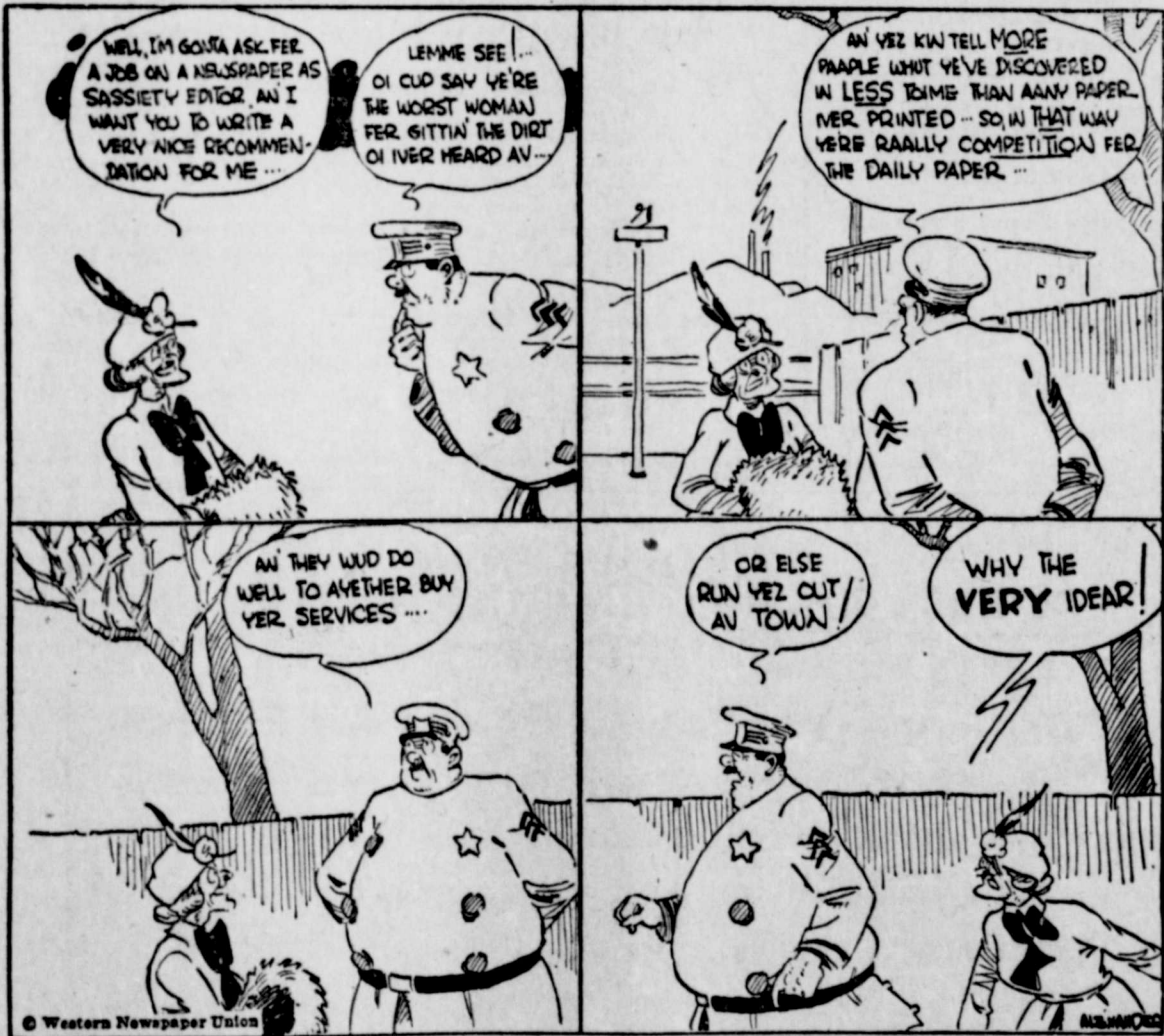

The rarity of accidents to the United States mail planes illustrates, perhaps best of all, the high factor of safety that can be attained in air navigation.—New York American.

ORDINANCE NO. 27

Hedley, Texas, March 5, 1929
**BE IT ORDAINED BY THE
COUNCIL OF THE TOWN OF
HEDLEY, TEXAS:**

That the following rules and
regulations for traffic on the
streets or parts of streets in the
town of Hedley, Texas, are here-
by adopted and established:

1. The driver of all motor ve-
hicles desiring to park his vehicle
on Main Street in the town of
Hedley, between the East line of
the present State Highway No.
5 in the town of Hedley, Texas,
and the West line of Main Street,
shall park such vehicle within
the limit lines as painted or
marked on the curb with such
vehicle parked against the curb
adjoining the sidewalk and at an
angle of approximately forty five
degrees; and it shall be unlawful
for any driver of any such motor
vehicle to park said vehicle on
said portion of Main street ex-
cept as herein provided. Also no
double parking is allowed.

2. That vehicles proceeding in
an easterly or westerly course
upon Main Street shall, when
about to enter, cross or turn into
State Highway No. 5, the driver
of such vehicle shall bring the
same to a complete stop within
not less than two feet of such
point as may be designated by
the "STOP TRAFFIC SIGN;" the
driver shall then be free to en-
ter said Highway No. 5, if not
at the time obstructed by other
vehicles or pedestrians, using
due caution not to come into
collision with other vehicles or
pedestrians.

3. A vehicle in turning from
an easterly course to a westerly
course or from a westerly course
to an easterly course on that part
of Main Street described in Sec-
tion 1 hereof shall pass beyond
the traffic signs erected or placed
thereon by the Council of the
town of Hedley before making
such turn.

4. All vehicles shall keep to
the right of all traffic signs lo-
cated upon the streets of Hedley.

5. Any person, driver, oper-
ator or person in control of any
vehicle who shall violate any of
the provisions hereof shall be
deemed guilty of a misdemeanor
and upon conviction shall be fined
in any sum not more than
\$100.00.

Passed and approved by the
Council of the Town of Hedley,
Texas, this 5th day of March,
A. D. 1929.

MONEY FOR ROAD BUILDING NEEDS

Greater Part of Income Derived From Motor Vehicle Tax and Gasoline.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

While the greater portion of the annual state road income is derived from motor vehicle fees and gasoline taxation, receipts from sales of state highway road and bridge bonds and from notes for 1923 and 1927 ranked third, and federal-aid appropriations fourth as sources of revenue. In 1923, 1924 and 1925, motor vehicles fees headed the list, state bond revenues were second, federal-aid funds ranked third, transferred funds from counties ranked fourth, and gasoline taxation fifth.

From Sale of Bonds.

The latest available figures of 1927 show that 12 per cent of the total state road income \$739,765,258, or \$90,979,230 was derived from the sale of highway road and bridge bonds and from notes; 35 per cent or \$259,854,786 was derived from motor vehicle fees, and slightly less than 23 per cent or \$169,818,473 was derived from gasoline taxation. Federal-aid amounting to \$80,459,071 formed 10 per cent of the total.

Of the total county and township road income for 1927 of \$840,613,923, about 21½ per cent, or \$181,090,933 was derived from the sale of bonds, which is more than double the sum received by these subdivisions from motor vehicle fees and gas taxation, amounting respectively to \$40,239,856 and \$48,800,508. Bond revenues ranked second in the counties' total income, exceeded only by the \$405,219,774 local road tax levy. Bond revenues have ranked second in the counties' annual income for several years.

According to latest available figures, 31 states have an outstanding state road and bridge bond indebtedness of \$890,090,000. The county and township bonded indebtedness for roads in 45 states is \$386,338,600.

In the recent election, Iowa, by voting an issue of \$100,000,000, brought the total number of states with issues of state bonds outstanding to 32. In the fall elections, Missouri, West Virginia and Louisiana also voted additional credits of \$155,000,000 to those already authorized for road and bridge improvement. All of the recent bond issues were made possible by amendment of state constitutions.

Pays Interest on Bonds.

Interest on state road bonds, as well as retirement of principal, in 25 states is paid wholly or in part from either the motor vehicle fees or from gasoline taxation, and in some states from both. The interest and principal on the Iowa state bonds will be paid by motor vehicle fees and gasoline taxation.

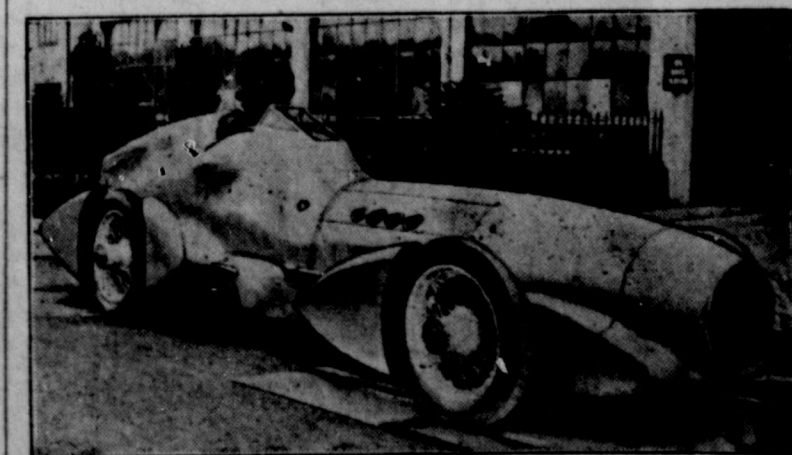
For 1927 the states having bond issues reported a sale of \$76,825,000 of state road and bridge bonds bearing an interest rate of from 3 to 5 per cent, and a sale of \$194,301,000 of county bonds with an interest rate of from 4½ to 6 per cent. The average interest rate on all state road and bridge bonds sold in the past 33 years is 4.35 per cent.

State road bonds were issued as early as 1894 by Massachusetts. In 1900, Rhode Island and New York adopted the plan. In 1908, Maryland joined the ranks; in 1909, California and New Hampshire floated issues; in 1911, Utah and Idaho; in 1912, New Mexico; in 1913, Maine; in 1917, Delaware and Oregon; in 1918, Louisiana; in 1919, Illinois, Michigan, Nevada, Pennsylvania, South Dakota and Wyoming; in 1920, Colorado, Missouri, New Jersey and West Virginia.

Parking on Down Grade Requires Real Caution

Parking with safety on a downgrade involves much more than turning the wheels in toward the curb. It never is a waste of time to take the additional precautions of pulling on the parking brake and leaving the car in gear. In being content with placing the wheels so the car cannot slip, the driver frequently makes the mistake of putting merely the side of the tire against the curb. Of its own weight the car frequently works itself free. Downgrade parking is responsible for much serious damage to the car that one does not hear or read about. It pays to take no chances.

Large Cost of Building Federal-Aid Highways

The cost of building the federal-aid highway system of the United States has been approximately 50 cents per year for every man, woman and child in the country. The amount is based on the government's expenditures of \$613,908,977 for completed highways since the program was started in 1918. There have been a total of 73,119 miles of federal-aid roads completed, as of September 30, 1928, and 10,915 miles are under construction, with 2,139 miles approved for construction.
