## School Bond Approved Voters Favor Issue In Tuesday's Election

By January 1975, Colorado City will have a new high school.

By late 1975, the sixth, seventh and eighth grades will be housed in the present high school in Colorado City.

By September 1975, Kelley Elementary will be air conditioned and have a new physical education facility and Hutchinson Elementary will be air conditioned and will have a new cafeteria.

By the end of May 1975, Wallace Elementary will be closed and efforts will be made to sell the building.

The above changes in the school system was approved by property owners and non-property owners in the school district in an election Tuesday. The changes will cost \$1.75 million which will result in about a 22¢ tax increase.

The bond issue passed by a vote of 524 for, 428 against in ballots cast by property owners. Non-property owners voted 47 to 19 for the bond issue. The non-property owners vote does not count but is necessary to help insure the value of the bonds because of cases now in the courts.

There was a total of 1018 votes cast in the election. The bond issue had been endorsed by the Noon Lions Club, the

Chamber of Commerce, the Colorado City Industrial Team, Inc., the Business & Professional Women's Club and the Colorado City Record.

Schools Superintendent Lloyd McKee and the school board said they appreciate the work done by the many persons in support of the bond issue.

School administrators and the school board had been working for years on plans to improve facilities at the school. They had sought the advice of a number of educators before they came up with the plan that was voted on Tuesday.

The entire plan will be put out for bids in one package in order to attract as many bids as possible.

However, the first thing in the plan that will be done is the construction of the new high school. Some renovation work on other buildings might be done this next summer. Before the complete renovation of the existing high school can be accomplished, the new high school will have to be finished and the existing high school empty so that classes will not be disturbed.

Architect Tommie Huckabee is expected to get with teachers in the near future to determine the exact needs of each subject area so that exact specifications can be put out when bids are taken.

The teachers are expected to have a major voice in making plans for the new high school facility.

The new high school will also have extensive vocational and education facilities and school and officials are expected to

## Hospital Budget Approved By Board

The Mitchell County Hospital District Board of Directors Tuesday night approved a budget of \$1,824,740 of which about \$344,000 is to help pay for addition of a new patient wing and a new lobby wing onto the hospital.

Here is the break down of the budget that goes into effect Oct. 1, the beginning of the new fiscal year for the hospital district:

- \$214,000, general fund.
  - \$72,000, interest and bond retirement fund.
  - \$344,000 hospital depreciation fund which will be used to build the two new wings.
  - \$899,585 for operation of the hospital.
  - \$295,155 for operation of the lodge.
- Here is where the money will come from:
- \$246,000, property taxes.
  - \$3,000 interest income.
  - \$770,664 from hospital operations.
  - \$214,076 from Lodge operation.
  - \$125,000 donations for new hospital wing.
  - \$210,000 transfers from other funds.
  - \$256,000 beginning cash balances (unencumbered).

George Witten told the hospital board that it might be necessary to raise rates charged for various services at the hospital sometime during the next year.

Written into the budget is wage increase that would be required by an anticipated new minimum wage law. President Nixon recently vetoed a new minimum wage law but another such law is expected to be passed within the near future.

The exact amount that room rates and charges for other services will be increased will be determined by the nature of the minimum wage law that is passed, if one is passed.

If one is not passed or if one is not in effect during this fiscal year which begins Oct. 1 and goes through Sept. 30, 1974,

ask the state to designate the vocational facilities as an area vocational school. If this designation is received, it will result in substantial funding from the state.

School officials expect to save about \$50,000 a year by the closing of Wallace school. The only

other building in the school system, the existing junior high school, will be made into an office complex to house the superintendent, the tax office, offices of roving teachers and later, when it is required by the state, the existing junior high will serve as a school for 4-year-olds.

There will probably be some pay raises given to hospital district employees.

Witten also pointed out to the hospital district directors that according to a recent survey by Blue Cross, Root Hospital is far below the national, state and area averages for room charges and rates charged for all medical services.

However, the extent of these pay raises has not yet been discussed because of the possibility of the new minimum wage law.

## Wolves To Face Speedy Hamlin

The Colorado City Wolves will see a lot of speed Friday night when they travel to Hamlin to take on the Pied Pipers.

Kick-off is set for 8 p.m. Friday in Hamlin. Last year, the Wolves defeated the Pied Pipers but then Hamlin went on to win their district.

Later last year, Hamlin had the state champion track team in AA, with four boys who can run the 100 in less than 10 seconds.

They don't execute as well as Coahoma, Ballinger or Monahans and they can be contained for three quarters and then bust the game wide open, strictly on speed, Colorado High Athletic Director Weldon Brevard noted.

The Pied Pipers are undefeated this season, having won over Rotan and Clyde.

This will be final non-district game of the year for the Wolves and Brevard and his staff have been working diligently to get the young and inexperienced Wolves ready for the tough District 3-AAA schedule.

Each week, the Wolves have shown considerable improvement, especially on defense as the young players that includes a number of freshmen and sophomores, gain experience and confidence.

This past week, Brevard scouted the junior varsity team in an effort to get more depth for the varsity.

Being moved up to the varsity from the JV team will be Kyle Moore, quarterback; Mark Reynolds, offensive tackle; Steve Marcum, offensive center; Danny Martinez, offensive tight end and Jim Jordan, defensive and offensive center. Jordan played on the varsity last week.

The remainder of those on the junior varsity will play in games scheduled for the "B" team to get experience in preparation for next year.

Brevard said that Bill Griffin, who made his first appearance of the year last week after coming back from an injury, is ready to go full speed but Arnold Parker and Vicente Garcia, both injured in the game against Coahoma, will not suit up.

Brevard said he hopes to play 21 or 22 young men, with a separate offensive and defensive units in order to give play-

ers rest which should result in a better and more effective effort.

The Mitchell County Hospital District board of directors Tuesday night was asked to take over providing ambulance service for Mitchell County in cooperation with the city and county.

Doyle Kiker and Darrell Rains of Kiker-Rains-Seale Funeral Home, appeared before the hospital board and asked that the county, city and hospital take over ambulance service for the county.

Rains told the hospital district directors that Kiker-Rains-Seale would like to be out of the ambulance business by Nov. 1. However, he said Kiker-Rains-Seale will not leave the county without ambulance service and pledged to work with the local governmental bodies to help establish a local ambulance service.

Kiker-Rains-Seale is one of the few funeral homes in the state that continues to operate an ambulance service, a service that Rains said is extremely costly.

He noted that about 160 ambulance calls are made a year, of which less than half are paid for.

Rains noted that the state department of health in the near future is expected to put strict guidelines into effect that would make it impossible for Kiker-Rains-Seale to bear the expense.

Included in those requirements will be extensive training of ambulance drivers, new vehicles such as vans now seen on television shows and these vans will have to be equipped with elaborate medical equipment that will be very expensive, Rains said.

Rains, Kiker, Mayor C. C. (Mike) Burt, Hospital Board President Murrell Blasingame and County Judge Bill Carter have been working on this problem for a number of months. Rains noted that he has tra-
