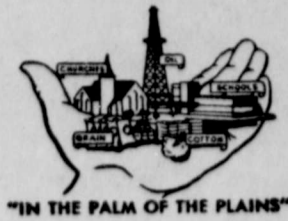

TUCO GOES ON "COLD STANDBY"; EIGHT MEN WILL OPERATE THE PLANT AND 18 WILL GO TO OTHER PLANTS

Southwestern Public Service Company's Tucco Station will be placed on a "cold standby" basis immediately, it has been announced by the electric company's operating department in Amarillo.

The action was taken, the announcement said, because an economic evaluation revealed a saving of \$200,000 annually was possible if the plant was taken off full-time operation.

A new generating unit, with nine times the capability of the Tucco equipment that has been used recently, is scheduled to go into operation at the company's Nichols Station, northeast of Amarillo, next month.

"The new, larger, more efficient units, such as the 210,000 kilowatt machine soon to go into operation in Amarillo, produce power with less gas, less water and the same amount of manpower. The economic growth of our area dictates that we must, at this time, use every possible economy in our operations and confine our generation to the most efficient units," Roy Thomas, superintendent of production, said.

Thomas pointed out that all of the employees at Tucco would be offered jobs at other locations, with their moving expenses paid. 18 men will be affected by the proposed transfers with 8 men staying at Tucco as the crew for the "cold standby" status.

In an explanation of "cold standby", Thomas said that for the next two or three years, Tucco would probably be in operation as a "peaking unit" during the high use summer months and would be available for emergency use at other times of the year.

There are three generating units at Tucco with a combined capability of 42,000 kilowatts. In recent years, only one of these machines, with a capability of 25,000 kilowatts, has been used.

One of the advantages, insofar as water is concerned, is that the larger equipment at the Amarillo installation utilizes sewage effluent for cooling water. This conserves one of the area's vital resources, fresh water, which had to be used for cooling purposes at the Tucco installation.

Tucco is the fourth of the electric company's small plants to be shut down in recent years and, in each case, economic considerations dictated the action.

"Shutdown decisions don't come easy. Tucco played a major role in the electrification of this region and, in its day, was a big power plant. But technical progress and growth have moved to much larger, more efficient machines, and if we are to do our best to hold the line against other increasing costs, we must take advantage of every economy," Thomas said.

All company houses at Tucco will be vacated. All men who move to other plants will begin their new jobs July 1.

Tucco began operations here in the early 1930s.

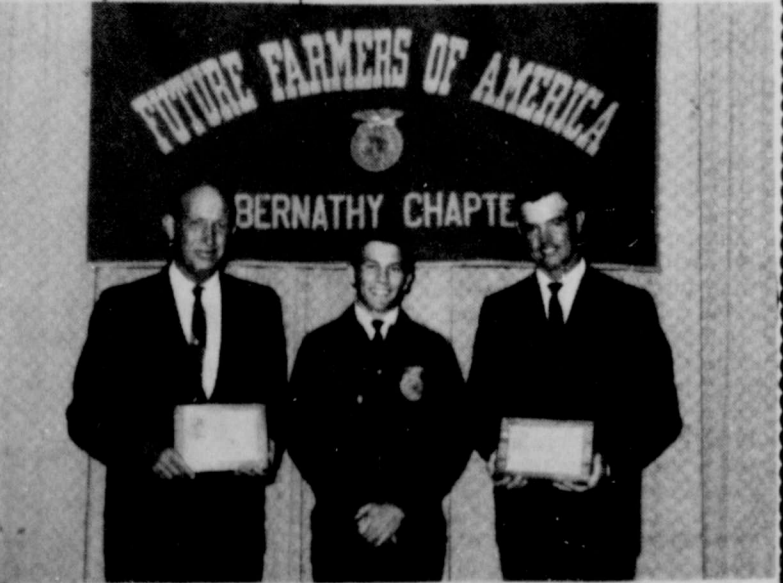
