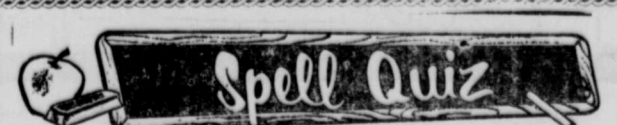

Funeral services for Mrs. Beadie Johnson were held at 10:30 a. m. September 12, at the First Methodist Church, of which she had been a member for more than 50 years.

The pastor, the Rev. Frank Story and a former pastor, Rev. John W. Price of Abilene officiated.

Mrs. Johnson affectionally known as "mama John", died in the Johnson Hospital at 3 a. m. Monday following a long illness.

She was born July 26, 1886 in Denton County, Texas and moved with her parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Baker to Loraine in 1902 from Wautaga, Tarrant County. They bought land North of Loraine and Mrs. Baker and daughter, Beadie helped to solicit funds to build the first church in that community, The Union Chapel Church.

She married Frank Johnson in 1905 and they bought land North of Loraine and lived there three years before building a home in Loraine. (the present Joe Bennett place) and lived there until they moved to Abilene in 1925 to educate their three sons, all of whom are medical doctors.

While in Abilene the 16 years, Mr. and Mrs. Johnson opened their home and helped many boys to attend McMurry College who otherwise would have been unable to attend.

Mr. and Mrs. Johnson moved back to Loraine in 1941 and built the home on Colorado Street where she still lived. Mr. Johnson died in 1943.

Survivors include the three sons, Dr. Homer Johnson, Midland, Dr. Bruce Johnson, Loraine and, Dr. Dale Johnson, Abilene. One sister, Mrs. Grace Jackson, Abilene and by 9 grandchildren.

FIELD DAY SET AT LUBBOCK EXPERIMENT STATION

All Mitchell County residents, farm, ranch and city folks alike have been issued a special invitation to attend dedication ceremonies and the annual field day at the new home of the Lubbock Experiment Station on September 19, County Agent Jack Burkhalter announced.

Guided tours of experimental plots and laboratory facilities will begin at 1:00 p. m. Highlights of the field tour will include latest research results on Cotton, Grain, Sorghum, Irrigation, Fertilizers, Insect Control, and Vegetable and Oil Crops. Formal dedication ceremonies will follow the evening meal.

The new headquarters for the 62-year-old experiment station is located about 7 miles north of Lubbock and East of the Plainview highway. Charles E. Fisher is station superintendent.

Additional details regarding the program will be released shortly, Burkhalter said.

Position Of The Texas Highway Commission On The Current Farm To Market Road Program

The Texas Highway Commission, in its meeting on Tuesday, August, 1961, expressed a belief and hope that the Texas Legislature would see fit to reinstate the 1962 Farm to Market (Colson-Briscoe Bill) appropriation, together with the urgently needed flexibility in the use of Farm to Market Road funds to cope with the increasing problem of maintenance as recommended by Governor Price Daniel.

The Commission expressed the hope that this action would be taken at the forthcoming special session of the Legislature, and stated that it is vital that this appropriation be reinstated and that adequate maintenance be authorized in the second half of this biennium if the Texas Highway Department is to continue the Farm to Market Road Program at the current pace.

The Commission was of the opinion that both the Legislature and the Governor are correct in their desire to continue the Farm to Market Road Program. The Legislature has expressed its interest in the continuation of this program by appropriating the Colson-Briscoe funds for this purpose, and the Governor has expressed a vital concern in the over all program by vetoing the 1962-63 second year appropriation on the grounds that there should be more flexibility in the use of the funds in order to provide proper maintenance of the Farm to Market Road System.

The Commission is of the opinion that legislation will be introduced at the next special session which will be acceptable to the Governor and the Legislature, along with the Farm Bureau Federation, the County Judges and Commissioners Association, the Texas Good Roads Association, and other interested groups, and toward this end the Commission accepts this challenge and pledges its efforts to support such legislation.

The Commission plans to study and discuss all possible solutions with officials and groups such as heretofore mentioned. The commission pointed out that maintenance of the vast Farm to Market Road System had been paid for out of trunk highway funds since 1949, and that this was advisable during this period due to the necessity for construction of many new miles of Farm to Market Roads. However, the Commission pointed out that the problem now is the adequate maintenance, improvement, and reconstruction of the 34,000 miles of Farm to Market Roads that have already been built, and that the Department has now reached

the point where a portion of the total Farm to Market Road earmarked funds must be spent for maintenance.

The Commission reaffirmed its faith in the Governor and the Legislature and in the people of Texas to support and maintain a well-balanced highway system in Texas.

Fatal Falls In The Home

Falls are the main cause of accidental deaths in the home.

Fatal home falls in a recent typical year totaled 13,400, according to Mr. R. J. Porter, Lone Star Gas Company Manager. Lone Star and The Mitchell County News are co-sponsors of the 1961 Home Safety Program in Loraine. "The 13,400 fatal home falls," Mr. Porter said, "Only motor vehicle accidents outrank falls as an accidental killer, and approximately 64 1/2 per cent of all falls occur in the home."

The greatest number of fatal falls occur in the bedroom. Falls on the stairs and in the yard and kitchen follow in that order. Fatal falls in fewer numbers occur in the living room, bathroom, dining room, hall, basement, garage and on the porch.

Approximately 86 per cent of the victims of fatal falls are more than 65 years old. Eight per cent are in the 45-64 age group. The remaining 6 per cent are spread through the 0-44 age group.

A majority of fatal falls occur while victims are walking on a level surface. However, they also occur while the victims are standing still, ascending or descending stairs, working, sitting, playing, eating, drinking, climbing, and reclining. Some occur while the victims are sleeping!

"Particular attention," Mr. Porter said, "must be given to the problem of protecting the older people. Lighting, particularly on stairs, must be adequate. Do not leave loose objects in the middle of the floor. This particularly endangers an older person. His sight may not be able to detect the objects. If he trips, he is less likely than a young person to recover his balance."

"Keep an orderly home. Arrange furniture so that it does not prevent free passage around the room. Do not let beds, vanity benches and other furnishings in the bedroom jut into the middle of the room. Keep doors closed. Close dresser drawers when not in use. Do not leave shoes in the middle of the floor."

"When a person gets out of bed in the middle of the night and tries to make his way to the bathroom or kitchen in the dark, he is more than likely to fall over any improperly placed object. This danger can be eliminated by

keeping the house in order and reach of the bed and at the entrance to all of the principal rooms." Mr. Porter concluded. Home Safety Kits free to any by having a light located within, trance to all of the principal The News has a supply of who call to them.

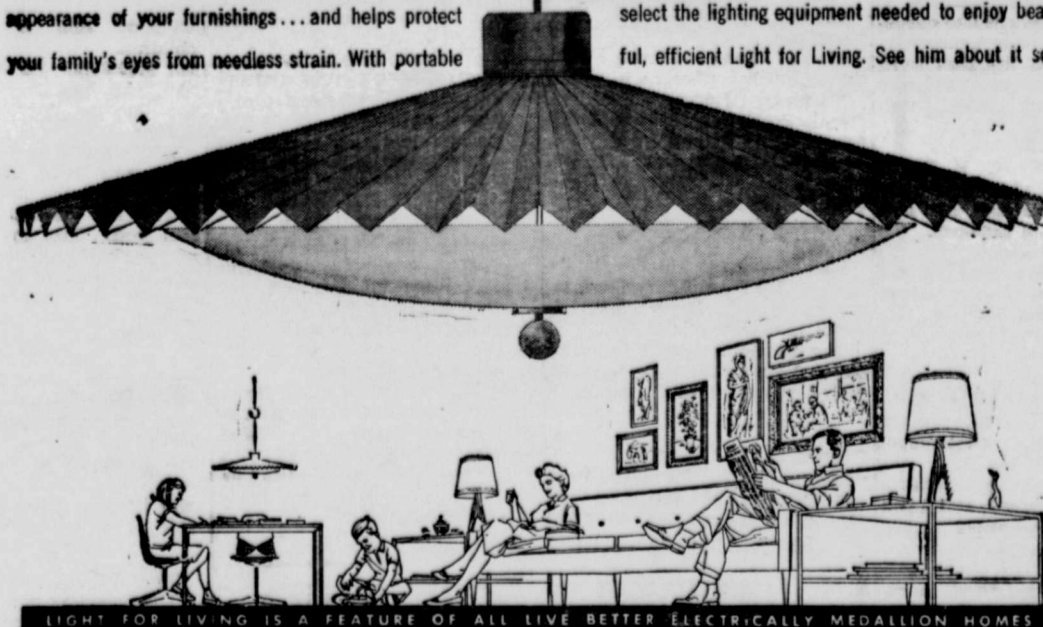

National P.T.A. Finds Varied Ways To Meet Range of Children's Needs

Major goals are the same in some 47,000 P.T.A.'s of the National Congress of Parents and Teachers, even though ways of approaching them are as diverse as the various communities.

In Alaska, where children leave for school in the dark and return home in the dark, every child carries a flashlight. To attend P.T.A. meetings the president of the Alaska Congress of Parents and Teachers frequently travels hundreds of miles per day in country where temperatures may stay around 25 below zero for weeks at a stretch. She can reach many communities only by small plane.

In Hawaii, the autumn ripening of the coffee crop makes fall the season for "summer" vacation from school. The state's mid-ocean locale makes the Hawaii Congress president an accessible consultant to parents and educators who fly in from Southeast Asia to learn more about the P.T.A.

American schools in Europe take advantage of their location to offer foreign language studies in elementary grades and to hold joint classes with native children. P.T.A.'s in the European Congress of American Parents and Teachers are concerned, too, with problems of establishing residence for children of U.S. servicemen and government employees applying for admission to outside colleges.

Here in these far-flung areas as well as in all the areas where 47,000 P.T.A.'s serve, each local unit of the National Congress of Parents and Teachers adapts its own program to fit the needs of its youngsters.

"This is the way of the P.T.A.," says Mrs. Clifford N. Jenkins, of Roslyn Heights, L.I., N.Y., who now heads the 12-million-membership organization as National Congress president.

"We have one essential objective as an organization," she

notes. "It is the welfare of children. But our individual approaches to promoting their well-being may vary as widely as do the children themselves."

This fall the National Congress is scheduling a new membership effort to enroll more people—parents, teachers, other interested persons—in P.T.A. activities.

"They will find local programs challenging and vital," Mrs. Jenkins promises, "because P.T.A. activities center around the needs of each community and the children who are its future."

In Alaska, for example, the Congress of Parents and Teachers, concerned about education for children of homesteaders, is currently urging a study of road maintenance in outlying areas, so that children in isolated spots may be assured of possible routes to school.

Getting to school is a real problem, even in well-settled areas, according to Mrs. Robert C. Cole, who heads the Alaska Congress. Her home in Spenard is only eight miles from Anchorage, but morning and evening she sends the family dog along to protect her two children from wild moose that roam the woods in the quarter-mile area between home and bus stop.

P.T.A.'s in the nation's newest state are seeking to preserve Hawaiian culture in terms of dances, language, and music. Mrs. Teruo Yoshida, of Honolulu, president of the Hawaii Congress, sees this interest as an important segment of Hawaiian P.T.A. activity. Another aspect of the state's P.T.A. program—its emphasis on adult education—is of special interest to the groups from Thailand, Pakistan, India, Cambodia, and Indochina who have been entertained there during recent months.

Parent-teacher cooperation is something new in most of the

nations where the European Congress of American Parents and Teachers functions; but its president, J. Gordon Smock, finds that educators abroad are anxious to cooperate in joint programs to help American youngsters learn more about the culture and people of the countries in which they are living.

Meeting problems of a more conventional nature is "typically P.T.A.," as well, Mrs. Jenkins points out. For example, "The parking problems of some 500 students who drive to school daily at Elkhart (Ind.) High School recently gave rise to a P.T.A. survey of available parking space in the neighborhood. These students now have maps showing free and metered space, all within easy walking distance."

—Lack of a library in one of the elementary schools in Food, N. J., was corrected through P.T.A. effort. Nearly 1,000 books were collected, indexed, and installed in shelves built by a P.T.A. father. Library service is dispensed by some of the P.T.A. mothers.

—An unprotected walk on a highway bridge, a twice-daily hazard in Boise, Idaho, for some 75 White School pupils, got the P.T.A.'s attention. Now a protective railing, erected by the state highway department, makes the well-traveled route a safe one.

"In any of these situations," says Mrs. Jenkins, "the P.T.A. first sees and then serves a local need. Service to communities and to children everywhere will continue to grow as more and more persons join the P.T.A. local, state, and national partnership."

Earl Golding, the prolific outdoors writer from Waco, makes some interesting observations. The News-Tribune columnist, who also writes for the Austin Statesman, notes that there seems to be a "pattern" of lake fishing, employed by anglers fishing the different lakes in Texas.

Once you stop to think about it, fishing styles do follow a trend and these tendencies vary in different sections of the state. Lake Travis fishermen, for example, employ methods quite unlike those used on Falcon. Fishing on Lake Belton differs from that on either Travis or Falcon.

Earl's research reveals that fishermen from the same town often fish alike. They sort of have their own trademark. It's very likely a case of "following the leader"—or copying the ideas of the most successful anglers. Exhibit "A" could well be the fast growing popularity of jig and eel fishing on Lake Buchanan, for example.

When a certain type of lure, or a certain type of gear, or a certain method of taking fish from their habitat "clicks" with an angler, he's likely to stick

with it religiously. Only person who can change that pattern is a more successful fisherman.

That's when styles change. That's when even the better fishermen adopt a new method. And if it does prove more productive—man, most everybody switches to it—Whatever it may be.

Golding's studies of the various fishermen, their habits, likes and dislikes, and their method of fishing, enables him to tell where an angler habitually fishes.

If you meet a tall fellow sitting atop his gasoline powered outboard motor and working his troll motor with his foot—he's a Lake Austin fisherman. This motor-riding procedure is an Austin trademark. See a fellow with a cushion on his big outboard, riding it like a saddle, and you can figure he stands a mighty good chance of being from the capitol city.

On Belton, if you see a spin fisherman, you can almost be sure he's from Temple, as Temple is about the only town around the lake with an abundance of spinners. Most of the other boys are strictly casters.

And, if you see a guy with his troll motor on the front of his boat, and him sitting in one

of those little low-hanging swivel chairs, out over the bow and just inches off the water, you know he's from Waco.

Nearly all the plug fishermen from Waco consider the chairs standard equipment.

All this just goes to show you that fishermen are different. They differ in both their ways and their means of fishing.

"If you're a good fisherman, you won't laugh at any of them," says Golding—referring also to the flat-bottomed boats the Wacoans use; and the bigger, broader, higher craft used by the Austin boys—because a good fisherman knows that he can learn something by observing others.

Ray Creel, one of Waco's top fishermen, who moved to Zapata a few years ago, learned some new tricks when it came to fishing Falcon Lake.

He discovered that when the weather was cold and the wind was high the fish went to the bottom and gathered around the weather was cold and the wind was high the fish went to the bottom and gathered around the thorny huisache (wee-satch) shrubbery.

To get to the fish you had to glide alongside one of the trees, wrap a towel around the huisache bush's thorns, then pull up. Next you dropped a plastic worm down into the water, right alongside the tree—to the very bottom—then jiggled the worm.

If no success at the spot you'd try another tree. So, from these various versions it's quite evident that the way to success in fishing the numerous lakes in Texas—as Scribe Golding points out—is to follow this rule: "When in Rome, fish as the Romans do."

High School Students To Get Free Income Tax Material

Free income tax material for Texas high school students has been offered high schools for the ninth straight year by Ellis Campbell, Jr., District Director for the Dallas Internal Revenue Service District. Mr. Campbell invites teachers to order the 1961-62 income tax training materials in a letter to the 1385 high school principals in the Dallas District. A letter from the Revenue will invite junior and senior college officials to order this same free income tax training material for college students.

The free income tax training course has been given to millions of high school and college students by teachers throughout the country. During the 1960-61 school year 2163 teachers trained 75,148 students in 761 different schools in the Dallas District.

Dr. J. W. Edgar, Commissioner of Education for Texas, has again recommended this valuable training material to Texas teachers. The Texas Society of Certified Public Accountants is contacting school principals to encourage school principals and college officials to provide the income tax training for every high school and college student.

Texas A & M Extension Service has also extended the educational program to adult farmers thru their plans for county agents to hold income tax training schools for farm parents using the special farm school training material.

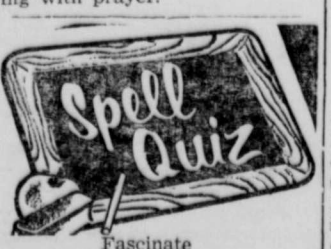
PARENTS—TEACHERS MEET

Prepared by American Association for Animal Health Many farm ponds and slow-moving streams this summer may be harboring a \$100 million threat to cattle and swine... and a potent hazard to human health, too.

The threat is the disease known as leptospirosis—"lepto" for short. It is now costing cattle raisers an estimated \$12,000,000 a year in losses. Swine producers are experiencing heavy losses also.

Why are ponds and slow moving streams such key factors in spreading this disease? The answer is that "spreader" animals which have leptospirosis organisms in their systems "shed".



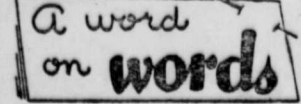
these organisms through their urine. The organisms live on in the streams and ponds, and can thereby infect both livestock and human beings.

This is why authorities urge farmers to bar off such water sources to prevent their contamination by carrier animals. Farmers should also note that leptospirosis can be spread by body contact, too.

One of the big problems about leptospirosis is that it may look like several other diseases. So, livestock owners should become aware of some of its symptoms so that at the first warning signs a veterinarian can check and advise. In cattle, "lepto" occurs in both the "mild" and the "severe" form. The mild form causes cows to lose their calves and to show loss of appetite, difficult breathing, reduced milk flow, or milk may be thickened. Sometimes urine is tinged dark brown. The severe form also causes loss of calves, scouring and jaundice... and in calves it causes stunting and chronic ill health.

Fortunately, leptospirosis can be prevented both in susceptible cattle and hogs by vaccination. The proper time for vaccination should be left up to the veterinarian, after he has examined the animals. Vaccination is a wise precaution in any area where this disease has been a problem.

Other preventive steps include protecting feed and watering facilities, keeping livestock out of damp, low pastures, and having replacement stock blood-tested.
