Census Bureau Completing Final Count By Mailmen

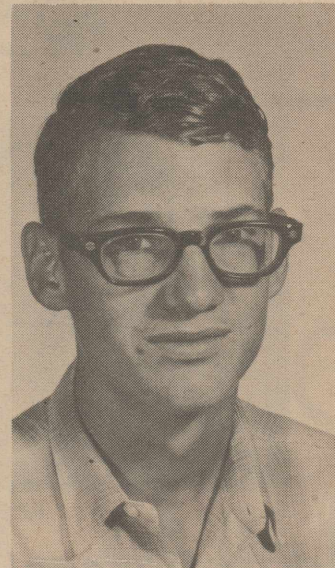
One of the final steps in the 1970 census in rural and small city areas of the southern states--a check by mailmen--is now under way, according to the U. S. Department of Commerce's Bureau of the Census.

The '70 census was taken by two methods: by mail-out and mail-back of questionnaires in most major metropolitan areas and by census takers in the rest of the United States. The latter procedure entailed the mailing out of questionnaires and subsequent visits by census takers who would pick up filled-in forms or, lacking this, interview families while following a house-to-house route.

Canvassing in the metropolitan areas required checking of addresses by postal employees before the mailout. A similar step is now being taken by mailmen following the visits by census takers.

This is the procedure: When census district offices completed their preliminary counts, they turned over to the post office a set of white cards listing every address canvassed. The mailmen, in turn, check these addresses against the households on their routes. If the mailman discovers what he considers a "missed" address, he fills out a blue card noting this fact. The blue cards are referred to the Census Bureau, which will check them against the census records.

found from experience that many households for which such cards are filled out have already been enumerated. This can happen for a number of reasons. For instance, some people get mail at two or more addresses, or there may be differences in the way a rural address is described.

The Census Bureau will check the blue cards turned in by mailmen and then take appropriate steps to provide a complete census count.

Farmers Reminded To Save Computation Statements

Producers who earn payments in the voluntary feed grain, wheat and cotton programs will receive payment computation statements along with their payment drafts, Jim Elder, Chairman of the Castro Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) Committee has announced.

He said it is most important for producers to retain these computation statements along with their other farm records. The computation statements provide these important details:

1. Program for which payment is made. (Feed grain, wheat, or cotton)
2. Both gross and net payment, for entire farm and for individual producer.
3. Planted acreage and diverted acreage (if any).
4. Projected yield, used for payment computations.

Hart Youth Drowns

Twenty-four days were crowded into 45 minutes Monday night as the Rev. Therman Upshaw of Stamford spoke to the family night meeting of the First Baptist Church Brotherhood meeting.

Rev. Upshaw, brother of Preston Upshaw, showed slides and spoke of his August trip to India and the Holy Land.

In India, he participated in the 10-day religious crusade where over 4,000 persons responded. His headquarters were in Hubli, India and he preached in the Church of South India. There were 5,000 members of the church with 2,000 in attendance for the morning worship service.

India was described as a very religious country and the people will sit for hours and listen to the preachers. At one service, Rev. Upshaw preached 35 minutes and the interpreter spoke for 35 minutes and one of the India preachers remarked that he would have to do better than that for his sermon was too short. India is a begging country, one-third the size of the United States with 535 million people. They will do anything for money. He showed slides of a trained bear and a man charming a snake, among other various money-making ideas.

The group of 32 persons were very limited on pictures as they were watched closely and not allowed to take pictures of certain areas. One of the

group had his camera taken away because he took a picture that the natives did not approve. In three states, the preachers were not permitted to give a public invitation along with their service due to the Communism and Hinduism.

India is a starving nation and, of course, very crowded. In a house, the size of the parsonage at Pampa where Rev. Upshaw had served as pastor, there were seven families residing. The families of India average nine people which made at least 63 persons in that house.

There are fabulous memorials and right outside, people are starving. He stated that everywhere you look, there is a memorial to someone. It might be called the "Land of the Dead," Rep. Upshaw said.

Nearly everyone wears white because of the heat. There are no cars therefore the mode of transportation is by bicycle. The people have a diet of rice and fish. Women are just a little above animals in India and as the men mix cement, women carry it on their heads to its designated place.

A man can have all the wives he can buy in India and one king built a huge memorial in honor of his favorite wife. The story is told that after the memorial was completed, the king had the architect killed because it did not want it ever to be duplicated.

As the group left India, Rev. Upshaw stated that he had never been so proud of America. Next

Today, the surest means of a book becoming a best seller is for the author to highlight and denounce bitterly the faults of this country. The same can be said of television and the movies, which prefer in these modern days to depict the seamier side of life in America.

But there's hope. As I have moved across this state, I have sensed that our people are growing weary of gloom. It's becoming easier to strike up a conversation on what's right about America.

I always suggest that there are a lot more level heads in this country than we are sometimes led to believe. There are a lot more decent, law-abiding citizens than there are criminals and cheats and sharks. There are a lot more young people in the "now" generation who want to improve America than the handful of radicals who want to burn it to ashes and start all over.

I can understand why the "majority" has broken its "silence." There's a growing impatience with agitation and controversy. But I feel we should continue to approach our nation's problems with a cool head and an open mind. I've listened to the voices of dissent. I think I know what they're asking of their government.

One thing they want is confidence. They want the assurance that their public officials have the courage to meet the issues of the 1970s with imagination and integrity, and not with some form of "old politics" that thrashes around with problems but never quite locates the workable solutions.

It was my desire to answer this urgent need that prompted me in January to seek the office of United States Senator.

Accent On Health

It is not an easy thing to face up to an illness, accident or birth defect, but it is an even more difficult thing to do when one of these conditions leaves you permanently or partially disabled—particularly for the young. Thousands of Texas children would face bleak futures without hope of ever achieving full physical sufficiency if it were not for a program operated by the Texas State Department of Health.

Any child under twenty-one years of age whose physical functions are impaired by a bone, joint or muscle defect or

deformity is eligible for assistance by the Division of Crippled Children's Services. The law only requires that a physician practicing under the laws of the State of Texas must have examined the child and recommended treatment, and the county judge of the county of the child's residence must certify that the parents cannot finance the needed care and treatment.

Crippling conditions from

all causes occur in about six of every 1,000 live births. The statistical evidence is that about one of the six will have a congenitally defective heart. One child in every 1,000 can be expected to have cystic fibrosis.

Texas has available some six million dollars in funds for the Crippled Children's Program. The State Health Department handled some 14,619 cases last year. The number of cases treated is increasing at the rate of five percent a year.

The program will pay the costs associated with medical and surgical care, hospitalization, special nursing, and transportation to and from treatment centers for the crippled child

and his parents. The program will also furnish eligible patients with wheel chairs, braces, artificial limbs, crutches, special medication and related services, including assistance to the family in plans for management and care of the child.

Early diagnosis and treatment are vitally important—especially with such diseases as cystic fibrosis, if untreated, one-half of the children with the disease may die before reaching twelve years of age.

Assistance under the State program is obtained by applying with the Division of Crippled Children's Services, Texas State Department of Health,

1100 West 49th Street, Austin, or by placing an application through an established city or county health unit. Cases may also be referred by private physicians or other state and local agencies.

For every dollar donated by Americans in 1969, CARE delivered \$8.53 in food, self-help and medical aid to less fortunate peoples. Public contributions to CARE, New York 10016, are multiplied by U.S. donations of farm abundance and operating support from local governments.



Step In The Dark

Frank, visiting at a suburban home, went to look for the bathroom. He opened a door, encountered total darkness, took one bold step forward, and toppled down the stairway to the basement.

Could Frank hold the home owner legally liable for his accident? A court said he could not, because he had no one to blame but himself.

"Darkness," said the court, "constitutes a warning to proceed either with extreme caution or not at all."

A step in the dark is, all too often, a step in the wrong direction. Literally thousands of accident victims, seeking to recover



damages, have found their rights impaired by their own failure to heed the warning that darkness gives.

True, there may be extenuating circumstances. In one case, a shopper was held not negligent for having ventured into a dark storeroom, after a clerk had assured her it was all right to go there.

In another case a member of a lodge, coming to the locker room, found it in darkness. He stepped inside to reach for the light switch. But as he did so, he stumbled over a bench that someone had left in the aisle.

Again, a court found the man not negligent, since he had done the natural thing under the circumstances. The court pointed out that he had no reason to expect an obstacle where, in his past experience, there had always been an open space.

However, even if you are justified in stepping into a dark place, you should still use reasonable ingenuity to cut your risk to a minimum. For example, it may be negligent in the eyes of the law for you to fail to use matches if you happen to have them in your pocket.

One man who fell down an elevator shaft in a dark warehouse was held negligent because he had forgotten to use the cigarette lighter he was carrying. The court commented:

"The parental precept, 'Look where you are going,' is a sound statement of conduct which has become crystallized into a rule of law."

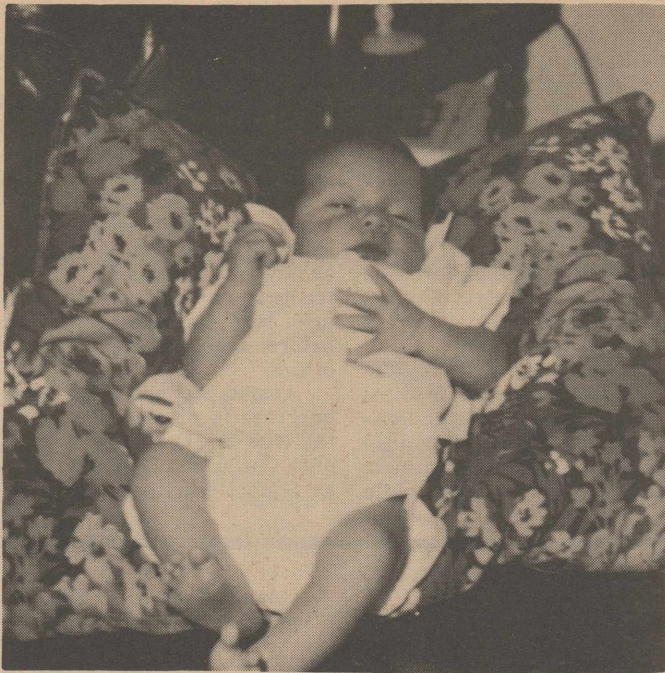

Bob Price Writes

Congressman Bob Price announced today that effective Oct. 1, the Texas Panhandle Community Action Corporation of Amarillo will receive \$165,000 to provide emergency food and medical services to an estimated 11,428 low income individuals.

The Texas Panhandle Community Action Corporation operates in Potter, Randall, Dallam, Sherman, Hansford, Ochiltree, Lipscomb, Hartley, Moore, Hutchinson, Roberts, Hemphill, Oldham, Carson, Gray, Wheeler, Deaf Smith, Collingsworth, Parmer, Swisher, Childress, Donley, Armstrong, Castro, Briscoe, and Hall counties.

Neighborhood centers will be designated in each county where low income individuals can receive medical examinations and vouchers with which to purchase food.

A similar emergency food and medical service grant has been made to the Central Plains Community Action Agency in Plainview. The \$15,000 grant is for a 22 month program serving 500 persons through one

neighborhood center in Hale County.

"I believe we all agree that no American should go to bed hungry or be without medical services when needed. The purpose of these grants is to make food and medicine available to those who would otherwise have to do without," Price said.

Approximately 700 low income women in eight counties served by the Hockley County Community Action Commission will be eligible for family planning information. The 18th district counties of Bailey and Lamb are included in the Commission area.

These cakes are delicious to wrap in Saran Wrap and store in the freezer. It seems to develop the moistness in the cakes.

DIXIE DOGS

1 egg, beaten
2/3 c. milk
1 c. flour
2 tsp. baking powder
1 tsp. mustard

Mix well. Dip weiners in batter and fry in deep, hot fat.

HOT CAKES

2 c. flour
3 tsp. baking powder
1/2 tsp. salt
1/2 c. sugar

1 egg
7 T. powdered milk
1/2 c. liquid shortening
1 1/2 c. water

Mix ahead and store in refrigerator. Makes 1 quart batter. Slightly grease grill or skillet prior to adding batter to pan.

HOMEMADE BREAD

1/4 c. lukewarm water to dissolve 2 pkgs. yeast
1 3/4 c. lukewarm milk
1/2 c. sugar
2 tsp. salt
2 eggs
1 stick oleo, melted
7 c. flour

Mix as listed. Let dough double in size. Punch down and turn over. Let rise again. Shape into loaves and let rise. Cook at 375 degrees for 25 to 30 minutes. If it thumbs follow, it is done.

QUICK DOUGHNUTS

3 T. shortening, melted
2/3 c. sugar
1 egg
2/3 c. milk
1 tsp. lemon flavoring
1/2 tsp. salt
4 tsp. baking powder

Enough flour to make a stiff dough. Mix ingredients as listed. Roll out on dough board; cut with doughnut cutter and fry in hot grease. Dip in a glaze of powdered sugar icing while hot and string on a stick to cool.

POPPY CAKE

1 white cake mix
1 pkg. vanilla Jello pudding
1/2 c. Crisco oil
1/2 c. pineapple juice
1/2 c. water
5 eggs
1 tsp. almond extract
1/8 c. poppy seed

Beat 5 minutes in mixer. Pour into 2 buttered loaf pans that have been sprinkled with cinnamon and sugar. Let set 15 minutes and then bake in 350 degree oven for 45 minutes.

COCONUT CAKE

Cream 2 sticks oleo and 2 cups sugar. Add 6 eggs, beating well after each egg. Add 2 cups flour and 1 can Angel Flake Coconut. Beat well. Bake 1 hour at 350 degrees in loaf or bunt pan. Just before cake is done, mix 1/2 cup water and 1 cup sugar and boil 1 minute. Pour over hot cake and let set 15 minutes before removing from pan.

3 tablespoons margarine	

Mix together sugar, corn starch, salt and spices in heavy saucepan. Stir in corn syrup, margarine and mashed yams. Bring to boil over medium heat, stirring occasionally. Boil 3 minutes, until slightly thickened. Remove from heat and stir gradually into slightly beaten eggs. Pour into unbaked pastry shell. If desired, sprinkle with chopped pecans. Bake in a hot oven (400 degree F.) 15 minutes, reduce heat to moderate (350 degree F.) and bake 40 to 45 minutes longer or until filling is firm.

HOW BIG IS YOUR GOD?

In 1956 many of us read with interest a new book which had just come from the press.

J. B. Phillips had written on the subject "Your God Is Too Small." His point was that our idea about God are often a childish one and that the limited ideas we once had are not adequate for growing experience and understanding. We put limitations of our own making upon our Heavenly Father; therefore hindering His work in and through our lives.

Many times on Monday morning I find that everything seems to go wrong until I take the time to consider that I am trying to carry the full load of the day on my own shoulders. God is limited when we cut him out of our days planning. We have a Sunday God but some how we will not let him be our God Monday through Saturday.

Some people think of God as a kind of "big daddy" or as a large policeman. Some simply refer to him as "the man upstairs." Many think of God as a kind of Santa Claus who helps us do and get what we want. If we are not careful we lose our capacity for reverence of God.

God is not confined to a place—like a certain building. He is everywhere. He is not confined to a certain time—like eleven o'clock on Sunday morning.

God is at work all the time, every day, every hour of the day. Nor is he limited to Christmas nor to Holy Week or Good Friday or Easter.

Your God is too small if he doesn't fit into all areas of your life.

How big is your God?

Is he as big as your denomination? As big as your country? As big as your form of worship?

How big is God in your home?

You and I need a living faith for all of life—work, play, home, school, body, mind, heart, soul, — for all of life.

He will be to you nearer than breathing and closer than hands and feet if you will but open the door of your heart and let him have complete control of your life.

Who Is Guilty of Moral Bankruptcy?



Dr. Eugene Carson Blake, general secretary of the World Council of Churches, has been quoted as saying, "The United States is as hypocritical and self-righteous as the USSR and is proving itself morally bankrupt in the world scene."

If Dr. Blake believes that he is helping the cause of the church by charging that "the United States is as hypocritical... as the USSR" it is hard to understand why.

In the first place, no intelligent person who has any knowledge of world history will believe it. Russia's record—in Hungary and Czechoslovakia, to mention only two instances—is too well known.

Concerning the accusation that the United States is "proving itself morally bankrupt in the world scene," the reference seems to be to the war in South Vietnam.

Which Course Is Right?

The question is: Is it a sign of moral bankruptcy to help a small nation protect its people from being slaughtered — or would it be a sign of moral bankruptcy to refuse such help or withdraw from the conflict when it turns out to be more difficult than was first expected?

Many would agree that we should never have become bogged down in this war which has cost the lives of over 40,000 Americans. There is disagreement as to how we should have avoided this situation and as to what we should do now.

But for a church leader to call our actions there "morally bankrupt" is both unwise and unwarranted.

The charge of moral bankruptcy might properly be leveled at the Communists in that conflict.

The North Vietnamese government has consistently refused to allow any impartial inspection of its treatment of the Americans who have been captured and are being held as prisoners of war.

The American Red Cross has launched a campaign to try to get the North Vietnamese to improve their treatment of these prisoners.

In an advertisement sponsored by the Red Cross there is this statement:

"Right now hundreds of Americans are being held captive in North Vietnam.

"A few prisoners have made it back. They talk about bamboo cages. Vicious beatings. Malnutrition. Humiliation.

"But the North Vietnamese will tell us nothing. . . . For the families at home, there is no word on who's alive. Who's dead. Or even who's being held."

Write a Letter

The Red Cross suggests that we write to the president of North Vietnam, asking that he "release the names of prisoners, allow them to write to their families, and let the Red Cross inspect the prisons to insure proper medical treatment and living conditions."

If the church should talk about moral bankruptcy, let's talk about it where it really exists—and let the stress be laid on the inhumane treatment of prisoners of war by the North Vietnamese.

If you have not written to the president of North Vietnam, as suggested by the Red Cross, why not do it today? Your letter may help to secure better treatment for our men who are now being mistreated by their Communist captors.

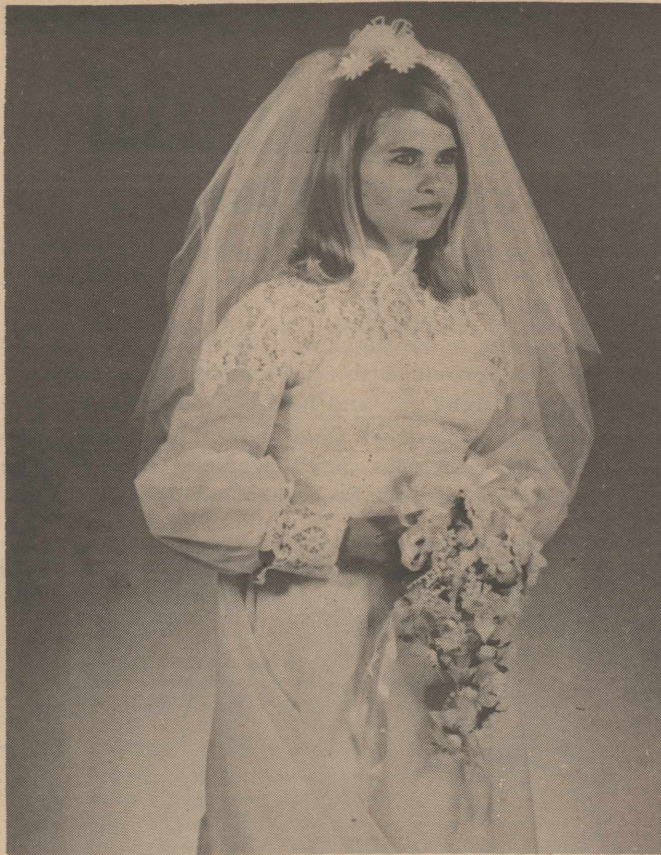

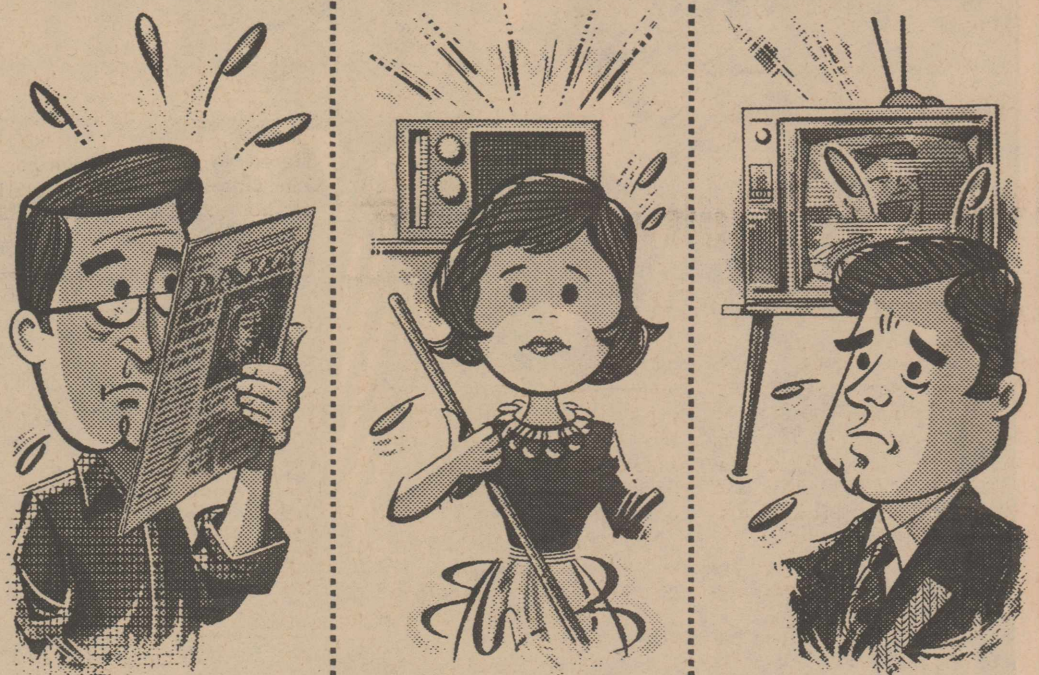

We've heard so much about the effects of insecurity on the life of a child! It seems urgent to find a picture of *security* . . . that elusive ideal that parents want to provide but can never be sure they have.

Notice the importance of the light in our picture. It doesn't really come from that fatherly hand. Someone else has provided the light which links father and son. The father merely stood in that light . . . and held his son's hand!

Sunday — Father's Day — in hundreds of thousands of churches, earnest fathers will stand in the Light. With their sons they'll worship God . . . experience again the spiritual understanding of life. See the brightness of that true *security* reflected in youthful eyes.
