Atomic Demonstration Thursday on EHS Stage

Atomic energy and its applications will be demonstrated, Thursday, Dec. 17 at Eastland High School.

Eastland students will become acquainted with basic principles of nuclear energy, its sources and role in agriculture, industry, medicine and research through a program titled "This Atomic World."

Harold L. Watson will make the presentation, a part of the Atomic Energy Commission's extensive traveling educational series.

Using student terms, Watson will explain the structure of atoms, nuclear reactor operation and concepts including radiation, fission and fusion.

He will use special equipment to demonstrate sources of radiation, how nuclear energy is harnessed to generate electricity and use of radioisotopes in disease diagnosis and treatment as well as learning more about life processes.

A chalkboard talk to Eastland High science classes will furnish additional details on atomic structure, radioactivity, radiation biology and nuclear science careers.

Mistletoe is fine when cast in its traditional Christmas-time role, but brewing a tea of mistletoe berries is not—repeat, is not—part of that role. The State Health Department has information of a death following the drinking of mistletoe berry tea. It came ten hours after the victim drank the brew.

Who does such a thoughtless thing? More people than you would expect. There are more than the usual hazards of life and health around the American home during the Christmas season, all capable of putting a damper on festivities. Some kill, some seriously sicken the unwary.

Holly, for example, is widely used as a Christmas decoration. Its berries are reportedly toxic when eaten, producing violent nausea and central nervous system depression.

Christmas tree light bubbling fluid, made of methylene chloride, is lethal in certain dosages. Cases have occurred where very young children have swallowed or inhaled the fluid.

Sale of certain toys has now been banned by the federal Food and Drugs Administration, as dangerous to the public health. Included in the list is a toy even that reaches temperatures of 600 degrees Fahrenheit, toys with highly flammable linings, heavy darts with long shanks, chemical sets, and toys with breakable glass parts.

Don't be too concerned if the kids eat a few icicles off the tree. In their metallic form they're practically insoluble and therefore poorly absorbed into the body.

Tree balls are made of glass and plastic, and in addition to causing cuts could clog the windpipe of a child. Other toy decorations are equally dangerous. The gas propellant in artificial snow is toxic if inhaled, but leaves no residue when dried.

Unknown to many persons, some forms of trees can cause discomfort from allergies. A chief offender is cedar which can be the cause of watery eyes, stopped-up heads and breathing difficulties. And of course, there is always the fire hazard with any tree. Be sure your Christmas tree is kept well watered, and electric lights and candles are carefully placed and checked frequently.

The Christmas season is a prime time for one of the four million yearly home accidents to happen. People are in a festive mood and they forget the dangers just waiting to claim them.

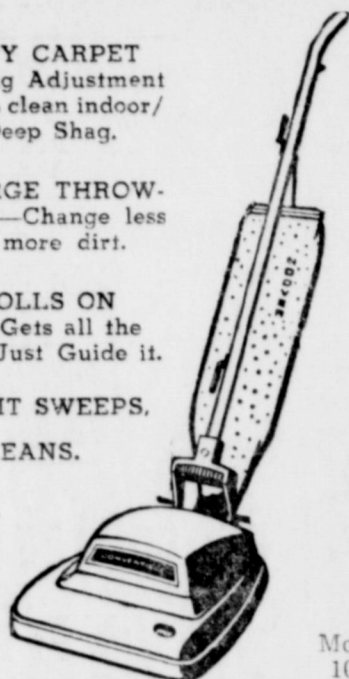
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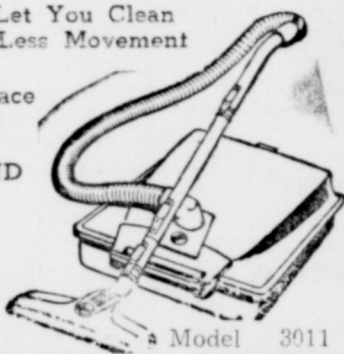
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Rep. Burke Musgrove Joins Gorman's Trace Element Firm

Jack Brown of Gorman, chairman of the board and principal stockholder of Trace Elements Inc. and Agriculture Inc., a Gorman firm, has announced that outgoing state Rep. Burke Musgrove of Breckenridge has been plac-

ed on the board of directors of the two organizations.

Brown said Musgrove and his newly organized group of businessmen will receive stock positions and will be active in continuing the rapid growth of the two companies.

Organized by Brown four years ago, Trace Elements has increased sales by 500 per cent each year and now has assets totaling \$691,000, according to Brown.

The company began primarily as a farm service and supply center for South Eastland, Erath and Comanche Counties, but has been expanded to market fertilizers, chemicals and irrigation equipment.

Musgrove, whose legislative term ends in January after being defeated in the Democratic primary last May by Joe Hanna, said Trace Elements has contributed greatly to bringing modern farming techniques to the peanut farming areas.

Since the primary election, Musgrove has been representing a group of Dallas real estate investors and has spent considerable time on projects in Dallas and California. He has just returned from a three-week business trip to Mexico.

"Although I intend to keep my permanent residence in Breckenridge," Musgrove said, "I have no plans to experience any more costly and time-consuming political campaigns."

Musgrove said that he and five others have organized a new company to be known as Musgrove-Johnson Inc. The company, he said, has been engaged to participate in several real estate and business ventures in Texas, California and Mexico.

The other principal partner in the company, Curt M. Johnson III of Dallas, is a Vietnam veteran who did graduate work at the University of Dallas upon his return from Vietnam.

Johnson will head up the office in California, Musgrove said, and "I will divide my time between Dallas and Mexico."

Musgrove also said he plans to write a series of newspaper articles concerning the workings of the Legislature and Texas government in general. Now that he will not be involved in it personally, he said, he wants to point out not only the shortcomings but the good points of government in the state.

"I feel the people should know about the inside workings of the legislature and their governments and the legislative process. There is much the people do not know about what goes on and I feel they should know," Musgrove said.
