Rivercrest Girls Beat Fannindel

The Rivercrest girls swept two games from Fannindel here Friday night, winning the varsity tilt, 39-26, and taking the "B" game, 38-26.

The defensive units stole the show in the varsity game, each holding the other's offense below its average.

Lana Sloan hit 20 points for the Rebelettes and Betty Mills had 14 for the Falconettes.

Joan Welsiak was high for the Rivercrest "B" team with 12 points.

The victory for the Rivercrest varsity was its third in a row.

Urge Folks Use Correct Address

Postmaster Westbrook today urged citizens of Talco to be sure to use the correct address on the letters and packages going to servicemen overseas to avoid serious delays in delivery.

The Postmaster reported that millions of letters and packages going overseas have been delayed because they were insufficiently addressed. He said that one of the biggest problems has been the failure of persons to include the very important 5 digit APO or FPO number in the military address. Mail not containing this number is incorrectly addressed.

He said that last year more than 9 million pieces of mail were delayed in delivery. Of this number, 3 1/2 million pieces failed to include the complete 5 digit APO or FPO number in the address. This improperly addressed mail had to be sent to a military locator directory where time-consuming searches were made to determine the proper address.

"As the Christmas mail volume going overseas is expected to increase up to 30 per cent or over 4 million pounds above last year, every precaution should be taken by friends and relatives of servicemen to address their letters and packages properly to assure rapid delivery to its destination," the Postmaster said.

There are four essential elements to an overseas military address. They are:

1. The serviceman's identity — grade, full name, and service number.
2. His military unit — complete.
3. Gateway post office — New York, San Francisco or Seattle.
4. APO or FPO — a 5 digit number.

When any of these elements is missing, the letter or package will be delayed in delivery.

Talco Baptist Church Burns

Fire of undetermined origin destroyed the First Baptist Church and all its furnishings about 10 p. m. Sunday, about half an hour after evening service there. The building about 10 years old, was reported covered by insurance.

The Talco fire department was joined by Mt. Pleasant and Bogata units, which, while unable to save the church, prevented the parsonage from burning. Furniture removed from the latter was damaged by water.

Titus Co. Bond Election Set

A bond election will be held on Dec. 16 in Titus County to determine whether or not the taxpayers of the county want bonds issued in the amount of \$950,000 and a tax levied for the payment of the bonds.

The bonds are for the purpose of road construction and maintenance in Titus County and will be used over a five to ten year period.

Judge Cecil Franklin said in a meeting Tuesday of the Commissioners Court, that according to a study made by the East Texas Gulf Highway Association, when the Indian Nations Turnpike is completed and ends in Paris it will empty around 8,000 cars daily to travel south to the Houston area and "we want to get our share of them through Mt. Pleasant."

The bonds, if approved, would be used for the construction of a proposed highway across the county from US Highway 271 to the Morris County line; widening and straightening of State Highway 49 from the city limits to Morris County line; a proposed east loop around Mt. Pleasant and the improvement of Loop 419 from three miles north of Mt. Pleasant to Johnson creek south of Talco. Money is needed to buy right of way for the proposed construction and any funds not used for highways would be used to construct new Farm to Market roads in the county.

The bonds if approved would be issued as needed and interest would not start until bonds are issued. The bonds would carry an interest rate not to exceed 5 1/2 per cent per year. Cost to the taxpayer would be approximately 38¢ per \$100, not to exceed 40¢ per \$100. This would mean that on a tax evaluation of \$10,000 the raise would be \$40. per year.

Austin. — State crackdown on loan abuses in the home improvement field is steadily widening.

Consumer Credit Commissioner Frank Miskell issued show cause orders against 16 home improvement firms and 16 individuals, alleging they are lending money at illegal rates.

Orders applied to firms in Houston, Dallas, San Antonio, Kingsland and Fort Worth.

"These cease and desist orders were but the initial step which will be followed by other legal actions as part of our comprehensive program to protect Texas consumers from abuse in the field of home improvement contracts," Miskell said.

Companies and personnel were directed immediately to stop any activity in violation of Texas' Regulatory Loan Act or new Consumer Credit Code.

Practices complained of include cash advances on home improvement loans (primarily for debt consolidation) as an inducement for contracts at interest rates over 10 per cent. Some interest rates, an aide to Miskell said, range from 18 to 24 per cent.

A Houston finance company has filed suit in district court here, challenging Miskell's authority under the Regulatory Loan Act to regulate its purchases of discounted notes executed by homeowners to improve their homes.

OIL ALLOWABLE UNCHANGED — Railroad Commission set December oil allowable factor at 40.8 per cent of potential, same as November.

Maximum production of 3,375,866 barrels of oil is possible under factor.

Three cuts were made in allowances since August when the factor was increased to 54 per cent during the Mideast crisis.

CONSTITUTION AMENDED — Texas' 91-year-old Constitution, as a result of November 11 elections, has six more amendments.

Voters approved all six proposed new amendments.

Also, as a result of the general election, Texas has a new Republican senator, 35-year-old Dallas lawyer Ike Harris. Republicans are in run-off races with Democrats next month in all six districts which have House vacancies. Two of the districts are in Houston, one in Austin, one in the Rio Grande Valley, one in Wharton and Matagorda Counties and the other in Bailey, Cochran, Hockley, Terry and Yoakum Counties of West Texas. GOP candidates led November voting in all but the Valley districts.

ATTORNEY GEN. RULES — Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin held that the Department of Public Welfare must furnish monthly reports containing names of those seeking aid to blind to the Department of Public Safety so their drivers licenses can be promptly revoked under a new law.

Funeral service for Jimmy Wayne Patterson, 22, who died as result of a gunshot wound early Thursday morning, was held Saturday at 2 p. m. in the Baptist Church at Detroit. Burial was made in the cemetery there.

Bearers were Pete McClain, James Spools, Jim Sulsar, Richard Tidwell, Lawrence Whitley and James Freelen. Officiating were the Rev. Vern Ridgeway and the Rev. M. U. Hart.

He was born Sept. 24, 1945 at Detroit, son of Andy B. and Katherine (Thomas) Patterson of Detroit, former residents of Hoov-ertown area. He was married to the former Miss Gayla Day.

Surviving besides his parents and wife are two sons, Anthony Wayne and Paul Eugene Patterson; and three sisters, Mrs. Eula McEntire, Barbara Patterson and Bertha Jo Patterson, all of Detroit.

Patterson was dead on arrival at St. Joseph's Hospital via ambulance early Thursday, having suffered an apparently accidental gunshot wound while in his car, north of Detroit.

According to Constable Major Owens of Detroit, Patterson was found wounded in his car six miles north of Detroit.

law. Opinion said 1941 law prohibiting disclosure of welfare applicants no longer applies in this particular case but does apply in other situations.

Department of Public Safety, Martin concluded in another opinion, has authority granted by the Legislature this year to purchase land for subdistrict headquarters in El Paso which already has a suitable building to house operations located on it. Legislature appropriated funds to buy property and construct sub-district headquarters.

MORE MIGRANT AID SOUGHT — State Board of Education has boosted a federal aid request for seven migrant worker programs to more than \$3,900,000.

Earlier request for migrant children programs was increased to \$2,700,000 to expand assistance to 42 participating districts, launch new projects at Dimmitt, Georgetown, El Paso and Lamesa and help Hurricane Beulah victims with clothes and school supplies.

New funds would go to McAllen migrant demonstration school, pre-school work in 20 districts; salaries and travel for migrant teachers; and summer institutes at Pan American College, Edinburg, and Texas A&I University, Kingsville, for teachers, teacher aides and administrators working with migrant children. Increases were sought for the special migrant compensatory education program in Rio Grande City and Laredo for children over 14 and the board's inservice and consultative program to revise the migrant school curriculum guide.

WATER RIGHTS FORMS AVAILABLE — Texas Water Rights Commission is distributing forms required by the new Water Rights Adjudication Act.

Those using public service water for any purpose other than domestic or livestock uses without a permit must file a sworn statement with the commission for recognition of their claim by September 1, 1969. Under adjudication act, all claim of water rights must be recorded with the Commission and must be limited to actual use. Those who have expanded water application facilities but not fully used them must file an additional statement before July 1, 1971.

SIX CITIES APPROVE SALES TAX — Voters in seven local elections on November 14 expressed their opinion on a one-per-cent city sales tax. The result: six cities approved it, and one city turned it down.

Approval came from Alpine, Georgetown, Granger, Hughes Springs, Marfa and San Marcos. Tax was turned down in Lufkin.

That brings to 34 the number of cities which have approved the tax. Only three have rejected it. At least 100 more are expected to vote on the question before the end of the year.

Area Gins Turn Out 2370 Bales

Cotton harvest was resumed the latter part of last week, being delayed by rains earlier in the week. Overcast skies and foggy drizzling rain kept farmers out of fields part of Monday.

Area gins have handled 2370 bales up until Tuesday morning. Deport's gins have handled 2083 bales for the season. They are Blackland Prairie Gin processing 1345 bales, Deport Co-Operative 480, and Home Gin 258 bales.

Cunningham Gin ginned 128 and Fulbright Gin 159 bales this year.

Seed price was quoted at \$56 per ton.
