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Voters To Receive Data on \$400,000 City Bond Election

The City Council on Monday night approved an information letter containing facts about the \$400,000 bond election to be held on June 20. The letter is being mailed this week to the approximately 750 qualified voters in the city. A map of the city showing lines for storm sewers also is being sent with the letter.

The letter was approved by Aldermen Mrs. J. W. "Tony" Harden, N. F. Jackson and Joe "Pepe" Zambrano. Alderman Charlie Garrett left the meeting before the vote was taken, after stating that he was opposed to the bond issue and would not vote for the letter or sign it. Water Line Bidding Set

Construction bids on a water supply line, storage and distribution system, to serve Rockport and other areas of Aransas County will be received by the City of Rockport after completion.

The system is to be constructed by the Aransas County Conservation and Reclamation District and will be operated by the City of Rockport.

Contractors will be required to hold bid prices firm for a period of 60 days, Harold Picton, chairman of the C&R district, said. This holding period is required for an evaluation of the bids and for their review by state and federal agencies involved in financing the project.

The main supply line will run from near Ingleside to the district's ground storage facilities west of Rockport. From Ingleside to the Aransas County line, the supply line will be 24 inches in diameter and an 18-inch line from the county line to the ground storage.

Bids are asked on three phases of the construction. These are: The main line and distribution system; 1.5 million gallon ground storage west of Rockport and a 400,000-gallon overhead storage tank at Fulton, and pumping facilities.

The C&R district signed a 26-year contract on Feb. 28, 1968 with the San Patricio Municipal Water District for treated water to supply the Aransas County area.

A water treatment plant with an initial capacity of 3 million gallons a day will be completed by the San Patricio district this month on a site west of Ingleside.

The Aransas County project will be financed by a \$950,700 federal grant through the Department of Housing and Urban Development, a \$1.22 million low-interest loan from the Texas Water Development Board and revenue bonds of the C&R district estimated at \$300,000.—C. C. Callender-Times.

Following are the contents of the letter, with the only thing left out being a detailed comparison of the city's tax distributions as called for in the 1968-69 budget and the 1969-70 budget which are presented to answer the question, How Will the Bonds Be Repaid? This information, of course, will be in the letter which the voters will receive.

"Dear Property Owner and Voter:

For your information, facts relating to the Bond Election, City of Rockport, June 20:

Proposition No. 1, Fire Station—"The issuance of \$15,000 General Obligation Fire Station Building Bonds." The present fire station is inadequate and deteriorated. This site would be sold for an expected \$10,000, thus providing \$25,000 for a new station (\$10,000 plus \$15,000 bond money). The new site would be provided in the connecting of Church and Pearl Streets. The new station was recommended to be at this location by Citizens Advisory Committees working with City Planners.

Proposition No. 2—Storm Sewer and Drainage—"The issuance of \$385,000 General Obligation Storm Sewer and Drainage Bonds." The work proposed under this issue would provide for the major drainage needs of all of the city and provide the necessary, curb, gutter and drainage for the paving to be done.

Details of the work include: Cherry Street storm sewer, estimated cost, \$56,600; Cedar Street storm sewer, \$81,100; Nopal and Laurel Street storm sewer, \$71,840; Concho Street storm sewer, \$91,170; King and Hackberry Street storm sewer, \$15,150; and Ann St. relief via Murray Street storm sewer, \$42,640.

Additional work planned includes:—\$30,000 is for drainage of the Lamar-Hackberry Street area. The drainage canal can be constructed provided the adjoining property owners are willing to pay \$15 per front foot for bulkhead and lot filling in addition to the public funds. Public funds and private funds working together could construct navigable canals to drain the area, raise the adjoining land elevation and make this area more desirable for residential development and a greater asset to the entire area. Should the adjoining property owners not wish to participate the \$30,000 would be used for storm sewer lines running to the bay in the same area.

—Church and Pearl Street connection and fire station site, \$30,000. Necessary land would be purchased to complete the north-south thoroughfare, Church Street and FM 2165 (Pearl Street). This would also provide a central location for the fire station with good access.

—Secondary drainage line, \$77,700; and curbs and gutters, \$47,300. The construction of these drainage lines, curbs and gutters will enable (Continued on Page 8)

Council Plans Storm Sewer For Wharf St.

At the City Council meeting this week plans were discussed to install a new storm sewer under Wharf Street from Magnolia Street to the bay.

The Council authorized City Engineer Gene Urban to draw up construction plans and get bids, with the expectation of going ahead with the project provided necessary easements can be obtained for a new route east of Austin Street.

Regarding street improvements the Council authorized Urban to set forth the needs for extending paving on South Austin two or three blocks south from Hackberry.

The Council also agreed to do some paving on North Magnolia on the east side of the Presbyterian Church. The city will pave from the present pavement to the right-of-way line and will furnish grades for the curb and gutter to be installed by the church. Diagonal parking will be permitted.

The Council also agreed to approve a request by Chief of Police Everett Taylor to purchase a filing cabinet and three badges and to get prices for a supply of patches to be worn on police uniforms.

Also the Council approved a request to install a street light on Fuqua Street between Lamar and James Streets.

Eleven Burglaries Solved Here

Eleven burglaries have been solved by the Aransas County Sheriff's department, stated Sheriff Bob Hewes. He said that a week-long investigation headed by Chief Deputy Sheriff Stautzenberger and Deputy V. R. Duke was responsible for the recovery of nearly \$2,000 worth of stolen merchandise.

Six homes at City by the Sea, between Rockport and Aransas Pass had been entered and another private residence between the two cities had been entered at least five times.

Almost all of the stolen items were recovered. The two youths involved, both 13, were released to their parents pending juvenile court hearings on the charges.

Victoria Choir To Sing Here

On Sunday, June 15th the evening Mass at 6 p.m. will have a guest choir to officiate at Sacred Heart Catholic Church in observance of Father's Day. This choir is the adult mixed choir from St. Mary's Church, Victoria where Monsignor F. O. Beck who lives in Fulton in retirement at present, was pastor for 25 years.

At present the choir is under the direction of Roman Fruth who is director and organist at St. Mary's Church in Victoria. Fruth is a professional choirmaster and organist, who is responsible for maintaining a choir that renders music which is in keeping with the liturgical requirements of the services of the church.

During the years spent in the priesthood (1921-1967) Monsignor Beck served on the Commission of Sacred Music whose duty it was to have all the parishes in the Archdiocese of San Antonio observe the laws and regulations of the church concerning music at divine services. As a member of the Music Commission it was Monsignor Beck's ambition to maintain a high standard of music at his own parish church of which this present choir is evidence.

Pollution Reports Swamp P&W Office

The Regional Headquarters of the Parks and Wildlife was almost swamped with calls from sportsmen and motel owners during the past week. All the calls concerned pollution in one form or another. An oil slick a mile wide had come floating in to shore in the vicinity of Fulton Beach and Key Allegro. Then came the mud and silt pollution in Redfish Bay.

Game Management Officers started an immediate investigation by boat and airplane to locate the source of the oil. Every drilling site in the area was carefully checked and the officers reported that none of these oil rigs were responsible for the pollution. Since the source seemed to be somewhere in the vicinity of the Intracoastal Canal, it was concluded that the oil came from a barge in transit.

The mud and silt in Redfish Bay comes from the dredging operation of an oil company. This company has a permit from the Corps of Engineers, and local Parks and Wildlife personnel have no regulatory authority. They can advise the company that certain procedures would result in less damage to wildlife habitat but they have no way of enforcing their recommendations.

Editorial

On Monday 14-year-old Peggy Taylor drowned in Aransas Bay while wading and swimming off Fulton Beach.

At the scene were members of the Aransas County Emergency Corps, Sheriff Bob Hewes, Chief of Police Everett Taylor and many spectators.

Hewes, members of the Emergency Corps and Taylor all asked a representative of the Rockport Pilot to write an editorial asking the public to please observe two rules with regard to accidents:

1) If you do drive to the scene, don't get in the way of ambulances, police cars and emergency vehicles hurrying to the scene. One member of the Emergency Corps said that "as our vehicle was rushing to the scene, car after car got in our way and refused to pull over to the side and let us pass."

2) At the scene of the accident, don't crowd in close to the victim because you hamper rescue operations. At Monday's tragedy, officers several times had to order curious onlookers to get back to give Emergency Corps members adequate space to use their resuscitator in an attempt to save the little girl's life.

The Pilot joins with the authorities in urging the public to observe these two rules in the interest of fast, efficient police and emergency service at the scene of accidents, fires, etc.

Aransas County Commissioners this week called an election for July 12 seeking authorization from the voters to issue \$500,000 in bonds for Aransas County Navigation District No. 1 to improve navigational facilities.

Specifically, the funds are needed for the purpose of acquiring additional navigation facilities including deepening of the entrance channel and harbor area of the existing harbor and development of additional harbor area at Cove Harbor.

A new approach channel from the Intracoastal Canal to Rockport and Fulton harbors and the deepening of the existing harbor areas, modifications to the north end of Fulton Harbor to provide increased water circulation and improve boat maneuverability; and

Improvements to the existing breakwater to increase storm protection, and stabilization work for the Little Bay entrance channel, and for the payment of other expenses incurred with these projects.

In its request to County Court to call the election, Navigation District Commissioners Matt Scott, Ted Little and Dick Fox stated that establishment of new industries along the shores of navigable waters in the Navigation District have created a need for the acquisition of the additional navigation facilities above mentioned.

Shimpers Should Cull Undersized Shrimp

While the 45-day closed season on shrimping in Texas waters in the Gulf of Mexico is intended to protect undersized shrimp on their migration from the bays, not all shrimp take advantage of this protected season.

This year some shrimp have begun to move into the Gulf prior to June 1 and others will continue to do so after the closed season ends July 15.

"The 45 days of protection are adjusted each year to coincide with major migration," said J. B. Phillips, law enforcement coordinator for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

"Undersized shrimp, however, will be abundant in the catches prior to and after the closed period, and Gulf shrimp fishermen are advised to adhere closely to the size limits," he said.

The Department will again utilize patrol vessels and aircraft to enforce the closure along the Texas coast. Game Management Officers will be checking catches to insure that the minimum size of 65 headless or 39-head-on shrimp to the pound is observed.

RESOLUTION AND ORDER FOR CITY BOND ELECTION

THE STATE OF TEXAS COUNTY OF ARANSAS CITY OF ROCKPORT

ON THIS, the 2nd day of June, 1969, the City Council of the City of Rockport, Texas, convened in special session, the same being open to the public at the regular meeting place thereof in the City Hall with the following members present and in attendance, to wit:

Delmar R. Hiller, mayor; Norvell F. Jackson, Joe "Pepe" Zambrano, Charlie Garrett, Mrs. J. W. Harden, aldermen, and the following absent: None, constituting a quorum; and among other proceedings had were the following:

Mayor Hiller introduced a resolution and order. Alderman Jackson moved its adoption. The motion was seconded by Alderman Harden. The motion, carrying with it the adoption of the resolution and order, prevailed by the following vote:

Ayes: Aldermen Jackson, Zambrano, Garrett and Mrs. Harden.

Noes: None. The Resolution and order is as follows:

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Rockport, Texas, deems it advisable to issue the bonds of said City for the purposes hereinafter mentioned; therefore, BE IT RESOLVED AND ORDERED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ROCKPORT, TEXAS:

SECTION 1: That an election be held on the 20th day of June, 1969, which date is not less than fifteen (15) nor more than thirty (30) days from the date of the adoption of this resolution and order, at which election the following propositions shall be submitted to the resident qualified electors of said City, who own taxable property therein, and who have duly rendered the same for taxation:

PROPOSITION NO. 1 "SHALL the City Council of the City of Rockport, Texas, be authorized to issue Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000) general obligation bonds of said City for the purpose of constructing and equipping a Fire Station Building in and for said City; said bonds to mature serially over a period of years not to exceed Twenty Five (25) years from their date, and to bear interest at a rate not to exceed the maximum prescribed by law at the time of issuance, payable annually or semi-annually; and to provide for the payment of principal of and interest on said bonds by levying a tax sufficient to pay the annual interest and to create a sinking fund sufficient to redeem said bonds as they become due?"

PROPOSITION NO. 2 "SHALL the City Council of the City of Rockport, Texas, be authorized to issue Three Hundred Eight-Five Thousand Dollars (\$385,000) general obligation bonds of said City for the purpose of

constructing, enlarging, extending and installing storm sewers and drainage, curb and gutters and other improvements incidental thereto in and for said City; said bonds to mature serially over a period of years not to exceed Twenty-Five (25) years from their date, and to bear interest at a rate not to exceed the maximum prescribed by law at the time of issuance, payable annually or semi-annually; and to provide for the payment of principal of and interest on said bonds by levying a tax sufficient to pay the annual interest and to create a sinking fund sufficient to redeem said bonds as they become due?"

SECTION 2: That said election shall be held at the City Hall in the City of Rockport, Texas, and the entire City shall constitute one election precinct.

SECTION 3: That the following named persons are hereby appointed officers of the election:

Mrs. Elbert Mundine, presiding judge; Mrs. Alma Ratliff, alternate presiding judge.

If the regularly appointed presiding judge is unable to serve at the election, the alternate presiding judge therefore shall serve as presiding judge. The presiding judge shall appoint at least two (2) clerks (one of whom shall be the alternate presiding judge) and not more than two (2) additional clerks, as he deems necessary for the proper conduct of the election.

ABSENTEE VOTING shall be conducted at the City Secretary's office in the City Hall, in accordance with the provision of Chapter 5, V.A.T.C.S., Election Code.

SECTION 4: That said election shall be held under the provisions of and in accordance with the laws governing the issuance of municipal bonds in cities, as provided in the General Laws of the State of Texas, and only resident qualified electors, who own taxable property in the City, and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be qualified to vote.

SECTION 5: That the ballots for said election shall be prepared in sufficient number and in conformity with Chapter 6, V.A.T.C.S., Election Code, and printed on such ballots shall appear the following propositions:

PROPOSITION NO. 1 "THE ISSUANCE OF \$15,000 GENERAL OBLIGATION FIRE STATION BUILDING BONDS."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 "THE ISSUANCE OF \$385,000 GENERAL OBLIGATION STORM SEWER AND DRAINAGE BONDS."

The word "FOR" and be-

neath it the word "AGAINST" shall be made to appear to the left of each proposition. A square shall be printed on the left of each of the words "FOR" and "AGAINST" and each voter shall place an "X" in the square beside the statement indicating the way he wishes to vote.

SECTION 6: That a copy of this resolution and order, signed by the Mayor of the City and attested by the Deputy City Secretary, at the top of which shall appear the words "NOTICE OF ELECTION FOR THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS," shall serve as proper notice of said election. Said notice shall be posted at three public places in said City, one of which shall be at the City Hall, not less than fourteen (14) full days prior to the date on which said election is to be held, and be published on the same day in each of two successive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation in the City of Rock-

port and published in the City of Rockport, Texas, the first of said publications to be made not less than fourteen (14) full days prior to the date set for said election.

PASSED AND APPROVED, this the 2nd day of June, 1969.

We devote this column today to the following from Mrs. Juanita Wagley president of the Chamber of Commerce: Your local Chamber of Commerce is shopping early for Christmas especially when it means a savings of 25%.

At the regular monthly meeting Tuesday the Board of Directors voted to accept the proposal of Quana P. Maddox, representative for the firm of Vaughn's, Inc., designers and manufacturers of display materials for Christmas decorations for the light standards in downtown Rockport.

Each standard so decorated would include two large Yuletide lanterns, five feet from tip to tip, with 20 feet of plastic garland for spiral pole wrap and a large plastic holly leaf cluster to tie it all together. This is a striking decoration of good quality, with a life of five to eight years.

The lanterns are of heavy durable plastic and can be easily stored and preserved from year to year. The cost of decorating ten of the downtown light standards will be approximately \$1,800 if we place our order in July and obtain the 25% discount. About every other standard could be decorated, to stretch these from one end of the main thoroughfare to the other. This will be an exclusive to Rockport so this same decoration will not be seen elsewhere nearby.

Several individuals expressed to me their desire to participate in this project with the thought that a greater community spirit prevails when we all work together on a project, and particularly a Christmas project. Although these decorations will be installed on the downtown area, everyone in the community as well as our winter visitors will enjoy them.

Last year the downtown merchants voluntarily got together and individually bought and installed palm trees up and down the main thoroughfares, which adds tremendously to the atmosphere in that area. This was an expensive undertaking and the downtown merchants are certainly to be commended for their contribution and accomplishment, which we are all enjoying. Oil News

William Herbert Hunt Trust Sstate will drill the No. 65.3 Bankers Mortgage Co. to 9,050 feet in Aransas County Southwest Copano Bay Field eight miles southwest of Rockport. Drillsite of the field test will be 467 feet from the southwest line and 2,810 feet from the Southeast line of Lot 8 and Section 65 in Sixth Addition to Taft Farm Lands.

Corpus Christi Oil & Gas Co. has finaled two gas wells — a dual and a single — in the Northeast Fulton Beach Field.

The casing completion of No. 1 Weldon Cabaniss Unit was finaled for an absolute open flow of 2,640 million cubic feet daily with gas-condensate ratio of 62,200-1 and liquid gravity of 51.2 degrees. Maximum flowing pressure on adjustable choke was 2,410 pounds and shut-in pressure was 3,011 pounds. This string produces from perforations at 7,579-85 feet.

The tubing string, producing from 7,532-40 feet, yielded 16,100 million cubic feet a day with gas-condensate ratio flowing pressure on adjustable choke of 41,800-1 and liquid gravity of 61.2 degrees. Maximum ble choke was 2,959 pounds and shut-in pressure was 3,067 pounds.

Well No. 1 G. C. Shelly and others, located in Reservation "D" original townsite of Lamar, was gauged for an absolute open flow of 6,200 million cubic feet a day. Gas-condensate ratio was 599,200-1 and liquid gravity was 55.6 degrees. Maximum flowing pressure was 2,522 pounds. Production is from perforations at 7,310-14 feet.

Old 'One Eye' Had To Roam

LA PORTE — This is the year of the transplants, and Game Management Officer Jim Broughton, Anahuac Refuge Manager Russ Clapper, and Clapper's assistant, Freddie Abshire, recently performed a delicate one.

They transplanted One Eye, a 12-foot, 500 pound alligator, from the East Bayou marsh country in Chambers County to the Anahuac Refuge, and One Eye wasn't too inclined to make things easy.

One Eye, as his name implies, has only one eye, but he hasn't given up romantic notions. An alligator with romantic notions starts to wander.

One Eye wandered three miles from his home and ended up in a ditch along Highway 124 where he became a nuisance because curious motorists created a "gator jam." Then, too, he was always in danger from poachers.

So, while a highway patrolman and a deputy sheriff directed traffic, the three wildlife men set about the task of moving One Eye to his new home. About 40 spectators were on hand to watch, help, and give advice.

Roping One Eye was easy, but because of a sort of bilious attitude toward humans, One Eye made the rest of the operation complicated.

"He didn't like being roped," said Broughton. "You can't imagine the strength of a large gator until you see him twisting and turning and almost pulling five men on the other end of the rope out of the back of a pickup."

"We finally got him immobile," he said, "at least the hind part. Then he latched on to the back bumper. He actually raised the rear of the pickup."

It took about 45 minutes for the men to tie and load old One Eye. He is now engaged in slightly more private live life on the Anahuac Wildlife Refuge.

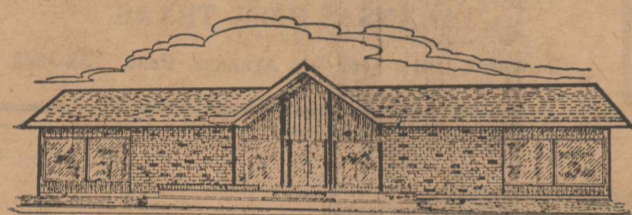
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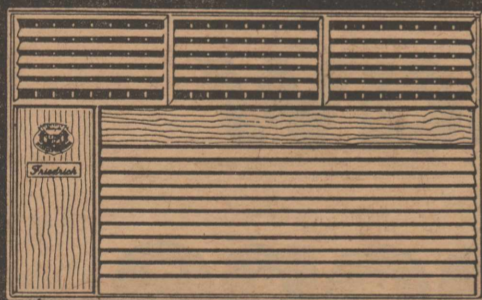

these thoroughfare streets to be paved by the State Highway Department, costing the average lot owner with a 50-foot lot \$137.50. The curb and gutter cost is estimated to be \$2.75 per linear foot. The total cost of the curb and gutter (\$47,300) will be assessed to the adjoining property owners. These property owners may take five years to repay their assessment, repaying an average total of \$9,450 per year. The money received from the curb and gutter assessment will be placed in the Street Maintenance and Drainage Account as it is repaid to the city.

Total construction cost under Proposition No. 2: \$542,500.

—How can we do more work than the amount of the bond issue? The total work under proposition No. 2 will be paid for as follows: The bond issue is \$385,000. The Department of Housing and Urban Development grant offered to the city is \$157,500. Total: \$542,500.

—How will the bonds be repaid? The bonds in Proposition 1 are \$15,000. The bonds in Proposition No. 2 are \$385,000. Total General Obligation Bonds are \$400,000.

Based on repaying \$400,00 at 6 1/2% interest for 17 years, the average yearly requirement for 17 years is \$38,652. The first two-year requirement for principal and interest payments average \$35,675 per year.

—Will there ever be a tax increase if these bonds are approved? No one can guarantee that there will never be a tax increase. The figures above (these are the detailed figures left out of this article but included in the letter) show that the bond requirements can be paid and operating money provided for without any increase. The 30% of tax income (\$35,675 of \$117,439) not including the repayment of the curb and gutter assessments takes care of the bond requirement. As tax values increase year by year from new construction and increased sales, the 30% basis should be sufficient to take care of the \$38,652 which is the 17-average yearly requirement.

—Does the city have any other tax debt? No. The city paid off in full the last tax bonds two years ago.

—Does the city have any revenue bond debt? Yes. The outstanding principal balance as of June 1, 1969 for the four issues total \$566,000.

(Before Garrett walked out of the meeting he asked Hiller what the city's total bond indebtedness will be when these bonds are sold. Hiller said the total outstanding revenue bonds will be \$566,000. The total outstanding general ob-

ligation bonds will be \$400,000, or a total of \$966,000).

—How much total grant is available to the city?

The city has a grant offer from the Department of Housing and Urban Development for \$315,000. The amount of \$157,500 has to be used for sanitary sewer construction and \$157,500 has to be used for storm sewer construction.

—Can the city get part of the \$315,000 grant if the storm sewer proposition is not approved?

No. The Department of Housing and Urban Development considers this one grant. Proposition No. 2 must be approved by the qualified voters, or the citizens of Rockport will lose the \$315,000 grant.

—What will these improvements mean to the citizens of Rockport?

MENTAL HEALTH MATTERS

Mental Health Help for Children

Mental health is desperately needed for our children and adolescents. Look at the figures! Of the 50 million school-age youngsters, perhaps 10 to 12 percent have moderate to severe mental or emotional problems requiring some kind of mental health service.

It is estimated that as many as 500,000 children in this county suffer from the kind of mental illness known as psychoses and borderline psychotic conditions.

Another 1,000,000 are afflicted with personality and character disorders.

Only about 5 percent of the children in the U.S. who need mental health help are getting it. Of those who do get psychiatric treatment, less than one-half receive help of the kind, quality, and duration needed.

These and other figures compiled by the National Institute of Mental Health show the acute and immediate need for a wide range of effective community mental health services for children and adolescents.

In most areas of the country today, adequate facilities, providing the varsity and kind of services needed for children, are lacking.

Help is on the way, however, under a new national mental health program providing Federal support for the construction and staffing of community mental health centers.

Comprehensive services, including mental health help for children and young people, are being made available throughout the country by these new centers.

In New York, "teacher-moms" were trained to work with schizophrenic children. In California, a "drop-in" clinic for adolescents with emotional problems has been started. In Maryland, psychologists accompanied police on their rounds to equip themselves to help police officers understand youth's behavior.

These innovative programs, as well as more conventional diagnostic and treatment services, are among the ways communities are responding to the mental health needs of their youngsters.

Over 350 new community mental health centers have been funded with NIMH funds aiding state and local resources. More than 100 are now in operation. Most of the others expect to begin operations this year.

By 1970, NIMH expects to help build a total of over 500 such centers giving full range of mental health services to both adults and children. Total mental adults care for the community is the ultimate goal.

Although Texas is the largest of the 48 contiguous states, and has more open area, its federal camp grounds are few and far between.

This fact has just been brought to focus again in a National Park Service announcement of 571 campgrounds in 78 areas.

Only two National campground areas are listed in Texas. . . Big Bend National Park, where there are three sites affording places to pitch tents and with modern conveniences at hand; and Padre Island, a new national park are still in its primitive state.

There is room in the Big Bend area for something like 160 individual camps or tents.

Padre Island provides virtually unlimited area. Big problem is to reach the spots. Also there are no conveniences, not even fresh water.

According to all indications, this will be the heaviest year in camping history, with millions of persons taking to the open spaces.

All this camping will not be in tents. Deluxe trailers and truck campers will increase the comforts of the outdoors-seeking family.

Fortunately, the state of Texas owns about 40 camping areas. All have some facilities, including rest room and water connections.

Approximately half that number have shelters. But only a handful have sewer connections.

However, work now is under way—through the help of the Outdoor Recreation program—to provide additional and modern facilities. Not only is this true in the case of state parks but in many parks operated by counties, municipalities and river authorities.

Even with these added facilities there will be a shortage of camp grounds. . . quite insufficient for everyone who might want to use them.

Tents were so thick at many of the parks last summer that the same pegs were used to tie down neighbor's tents.

Bathing and toilet facilities also were overtaxed.

Major facilities, such as those recently installed at Falcon, Garner State Park, Huntsville and others, will be on a reservation basis and short term duration to make room for the influx.

This also is true of U. S. Forest Service areas, where camping is allowed. If you don't believe these places fill hurriedly, just drive to one some weekend.

This year's sanitation will be improved some by individual landowners who will make their own small lakes and other desirable recreational facilities available. Some land owners who previously would never dream of having campers on their property are opening their gates this summer on a fee basis.

Quite a few land owners are finding that their income from recreation sites goes a long

way toward paying taxes or helping to buy a new pickup. Fees ranging upward from 50 cents per day per family are being charged, depending upon what conveniences are available.

Most of the major lakes in Texas, which once disdained travel trailer sites, now are turning to them. Excellent trailer accommodations are available at many of them. Most of these, however, are on a permanent basis.

Perhaps one of the most productive of all these is on South Padre Island, across from Port Isabel. Here Cameron County has provided literally scores of trailer pads. They are available to tourists on a weekly basis, or to long-time residents.

Other places like Rockport, Bay City, and the entire coast line between Galveston and Port Arthur are lined with trailer sites that are privately owned, but available to the trailing public.

With this year's business expected to reach an all time high, many other private landowners will be getting into the act before another season. Those with permanent water and other natural resources can develop a big business out of renting camping space.

DEPARTMENT STARTS OYSTER TRANSPLANT PROGRAM

SEADRIFT — The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department has completed the restocking of oysters in most of San Antonio Bay and a portion of Espirito Bay.

Oysters were virtually eliminated from these bays in September, 1967, due to flooding from Hurricane Beulah.

Terry Leary, marine fisheries coordinator for the Department, says the Department has been trying to restock the area since the hurricane using money allotted as disaster aid from the U.S. Bureau of Commercial Fisheries.

But heavy rains and result-salinity in the past two years have thwarted the Department's efforts.

Leary says a natural seeding has occurred in the lower part of San Antonio Bay, and the result has been a very hardy oyster which appears capable of surviving for some time in almost fresh waters.

"Ordinarily, when an oyster comes in contact with fresh water, it literally 'clams up,'" said Leary. "But we have opened some of these oysters up and found fresh water on the inside of the shell."

Rather than go outside the San Antonio-Espirito Bay system and possibly bring in new oyster diseases, the Department has contracts with local oyster fishermen to dredge up 500 barrels of these oysters at Panther Point and transplant them on reefs in other parts of the bay.

Leary says the work will be completed just in time for the

spawning season, and since each oyster may release as many as a million spat, it should be only a short time before the reefs, now devoid of oysters, will be repopulated.

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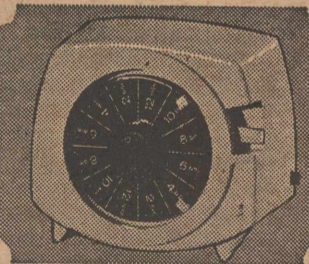

ADVANCE PREPARATION IMPORTANT TO SOCIAL SECURITY APPLICANTS

"When will I get my first check?" That question is high in the mind of each applicant for social security retirement, survivors, or disability insurance payments, according to H. M. Cleveland, manager of the Corpus Christi District of the Social Security Administration.

New claims for cash payments have averaged about 170 a week in this area since the first of the year, he said. However, the time between the filing of an application and the receipt of the first check varies from a few days to a few months.

"An informed claimant can help speed up his social security payment," Cleveland reports. "A worker who is planning his retirement should make his claim two or three months before he retires. "Even one who does not plan to retire soon should always file an application in advance of age 65 to avoid the loss of any Medicare benefits."

"In addition to advance filing, an applicant can save time on the necessary paper work if he can furnish exact information at the time of filing," Cleveland explained. "For example, when age is a requirement for eligibility to payment, the applicant who has already secured proof of his date of birth can expect faster action on his claim. A copy of last year's income tax return, or Form W-2, Statement of Wages and Taxes, will also hasten the final action."

Cleveland summed up his advice with this admonition: "Help us to help you by making advance preparation." Call on the Social Security Administration, 1802 South Staples, Corpus Christi, for further details.

Question and Answer Column

This column of questions and answers on Federal tax matters is provided by the U. S. Internal Revenue Service and is published as a public service to taxpayers. The column answers questions most frequently asked by taxpayers.

Q - I received a reminder notice on my estimated tax instead of a bill. How much should I pay? A - Figure your second installment payment using the estimated tax worksheet you received in February as part of your estimated tax package. Be sure to make your payment using preaddressed Voucher 2. The filled-out voucher should accompany your payment to assure proper crediting to your account.

Q - I lined the property around my home with rose bushes. Can I deduct the cost for tax purposes? A - No, you cannot deduct the cost of the rose bushes. You may, however, add the cost to your property as it is considered a capital expense.

Q - I'm earning money not covered by withholding. Should I file an estimated tax return now or wait until next year? A - If you expect your

1969 tax liability to exceed your withholding by \$40 or more you may have to file an estimated tax declaration. Forms and filing instructions are available from your local IRS office.

Q - Does an extension of time to file excuse a taxpayer of interest charges on late payments? A - No, interest at the rate of six percent a year must be added to taxes that are not paid by the filing deadline. However, no delinquent filing charge is added when the taxpayer has been granted an extension of time to file.

Q - Can Form 1040X be used to correct a mistake on a 1040? A - Yes. Form 1040X, "Amended U. S. Individual Income Tax Return," should be used to correct mistakes made by taxpayers filing either Form 1040 or 1040A.

Q - Do you have to be a doctor or a lawyer to set up your own retirement plan? A - No, other persons in business for themselves can take advantage of the tax provisions allowing them to deduct contributions to a self-employed retirement plan. This includes people who have their own business and also those who have income from part-time self-employment which is in addition to their regular job.

Q - My son is taking a job this summer and plans to put most of the money he earns in the bank to pay his college expenses in the fall. If he earns over \$600 will we lose our dependency exemption for him? A - If your son is under 19 at year end or will be a full-time student during the year, the amount of money he earns will not disqualify him from being claimed as your dependent as long as you furnish more than one-half of his support and the other dependency tests are met. He must file his own return, however, if he earns \$600 or more during the year.

Q - Is a gardener considered household help? If so, will I have to withhold Social Security taxes on wages paid? A - Wages paid to a gardener are subject to Social Security taxes. If you pay him cash wages of \$50 or more during a calendar quarter then you are required to file a Form 42, "Employer's Quarterly Tax Return for Household Employees," and pay Social Security taxes.

Income taxes, however, do not have to be withheld from wages paid gardeners and other household help.

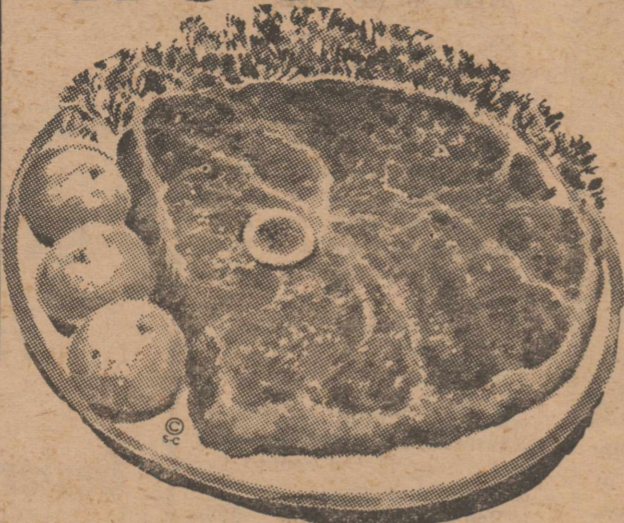
