If you've tried to make a local call recently by using the shortcut of dialing a nine and then the last four digits you've probably been frustrated to hear the message, "due to the implementation of the 911..." and if you responded as I did, you hung up before the message was completed and dialed the full 495 prefix.

Changing dialing habits is the least of the problems facing the folks working on getting 911 ready to respond to emergencies.

The single most important factor right now is input from citizens, specifically the need to complete the 911 Record Inventory Form, which will be used to provide computerized data for the system.

Get those well-meaning folks to pledge one measly dollar per hour for each hour that your adopted smoker goes tobacco free.

Keep tabs on your adopted smoker throughout the day, help them, encourage them, remind them that every hour they go without smoking is one more hour and another important dollar to help the American Cancer Society find a cure for cancer.

That should be plenty of incentive, especially considering that your adopted smoker has a better than 50 percent chance of being a cancer victim someday.

If you want to be counted as one of the non smokers willing to help a friend and adopt a smoker, call Great American Smokeout chairman Chris Wyatt at 495-2825 or after 5 p.m. 495-4195.

If you are a smoker and want to be adopted for the campaign, call Chris, he'll match you up with a non-smoking volunteer.

If you want to pledge toward an adopted smoker, call Chris, he'll keep tabs for you.

The Garza Chapter of the American Cancer Society will present certificates to all those who participate in the campaign, a certificate of completion for those smokers who finish the 24 hours without smoking and an award to the adopted smoker and the non-smoking volunteer who raised the most in pledges during the campaign.

Post Public Library member of West Texas Library System

The Post Public Library was recently accredited as a member of the Texas Library System for fiscal year 1991, according to William D. Gooch, Director and Librarian of the Texas State Library.

"We are pleased to award a certificate of system membership in recognition of the efforts this community has made in providing public library services," said Gooch. "It is a symbol of having achieved a level of excellence."

The Post Public Library is a member of West Texas Library System and serves citizens in Post and Garza County. Post Public Library had to meet strict criteria, according to Jeanette Bell, such as hours of access, professional staffing requirements, number of library materials, and local per capita support to become an accredited member. Public libraries must apply and qualify for system membership annually.

Post Public Library received \$2,308 in funds from West Texas Library System for the fiscal year - October 1, 1991 through

September 1992. This is used for collection development in purchasing books and reference material. West Texas Library System also provides continuing education for the librarians, who must acquire a required number of hours for continued certification. This is accomplished through work shops. There are currently 28 libraries in West Texas Library System.

Authorized by the Library Systems Act of 1969, the Texas Library System was developed to improve library service in the state through cooperative efforts. Comprised of ten regions, the statewide system provides an opportunity for local libraries to make the best possible use of both their own resources and those available elsewhere in the system. These cooperative efforts are made possible through state and federal funds appropriated to the Library Development Program of the Texas State Library. This year the Texas State Library will distribute about \$8 million to the ten library systems.

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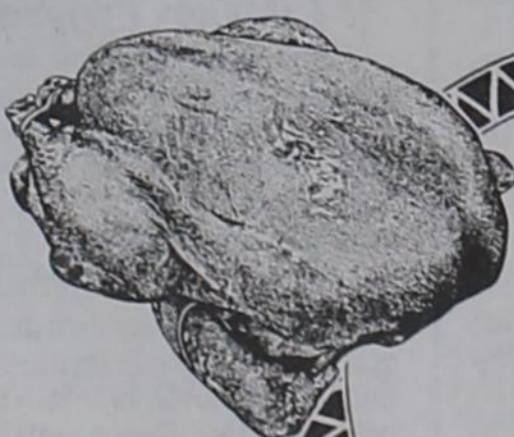

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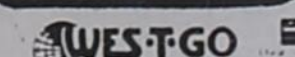


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Thurman Francis' celebrate 50th anniversary Oct. 19

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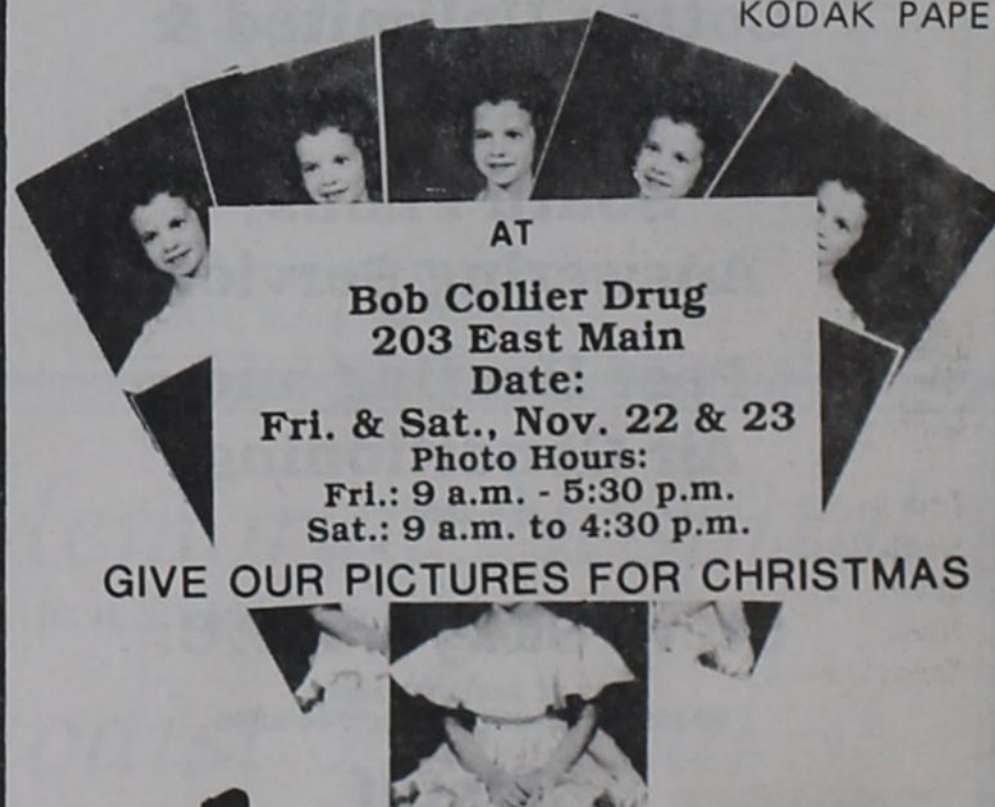
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Tellabration '91! to feature Louise Dietrich November 22

Safe turkey handling tips for holiday meals

The turkey, the traditional holiday bird, is a tasty, healthy choice for holiday meals. Don't let the risk of foodborne illness from improperly handled turkey spoil the holiday fun.

Turkey is a highly perishable food and requires special handling in thawing, preparation, cooking and storage. Follow these tips on handling turkey safely:

* If shopping in advance is necessary, frozen turkey is the best bet. Look for one that is solidly frozen. Keep it frozen at zero degree or below until ready for thawing. Allow two to three days, depending on the size of the turkey, for thawing in the refrigerator.

* Fresh turkey is highly perishable and should be bought no more than a day or two before cooking. If shopping must be done in advance, a frozen turkey is a better choice.

* Thawing a frozen turkey in the refrigerator is the preferred method for safety reasons, but you can also thaw it in cold water. The important thing is to keep the turkey cold while thawing to prevent bacterial growth. To thaw in the refrigerator, put the turkey in the original wrap on a tray or in a pan to catch dripping juices. An eight to 12 pound turkey will take one to two days to thaw; a 16 to 20

pound turkey will take three to four days. For faster thawing, put the turkey package in a water-tight plastic bag and submerge in cold water. Change the water every 30 minutes to keep it cold. Depending on size, this can take from four to 12 hours. Do not thaw turkey on the counter. Bacteria can multiply rapidly at room temperature, and outer portions of the turkey may thaw and reach room temperatures before the inside is thawed. Small turkeys can be thawed in the microwave according to the manufacturer's manual instructions, but the turkey should be cooked immediately after thawing.

* Wash the turkey with cold water inside and out before cooking, removing neck and giblets from the cavity. To prevent spread of bacteria, wash hands, utensils and the sink after contact with the turkey.

* Turkeys stuffed with dressing present special problems because bacteria can easily multiply in the stuffing and cause food poisoning. Cooking stuffing separately is the safest method. But if a stuffed bird is the choice, take special precautions. Never stuff the bird ahead of time; stuff just prior to putting in the oven. Never stuff a bird that will be cooked in the microwave. It may not cook thoroughly.

* Cook turkeys to an internal temperature of 180 degrees to 185 degrees. A meat thermometer can be used to check for doneness. If a turkey is stuffed, check the stuffing for doneness. It should reach

at least 165 degrees. When done, remove all stuffing from the bird immediately and put in a separate container. Harmful bacteria is more likely to grow in the stuffing if it sits in the bird after cooking.

* Never partially cook a turkey one day and then complete cooking later. Interrupted cooking increases the possibility of bacterial growth.

* Take care of cooked turkey and stuffing leftovers promptly and properly to prevent the risk of foodborne illness. These foods should not be left at room temperatures for more than two hours because the bacteria that cause illness multiply rapidly at these temperatures. Never store these foods in a warm oven or on the kitchen counter for the next meal. This will encourage bacterial growth. Divide large quantities of the leftover turkey and stuffing into smaller portions. Store in the refrigerator in several smaller, shallow containers. Leftover cooked poultry will keep in the refrigerator for three to four days. Stuffing and gravy should be used within a day or two. Bring leftover gravy to a rolling boil before serving. Freeze food for longer storage.

* And if plans change -- you bought a turkey and then didn't use it -- remember that frozen turkey can be stored in a freezer at a temperature of zero for up to one year without much loss of quality.

'Lopes finish season with solid victory at Ralls

The Post Antelopes, after struggling through a tough season, closed out action last Friday with a solid across the board victory, slamming the door on 1991 with a 35-20 win at Ralls.

Senior tailback Brandon Bird turned in his best single game performance with a total of 281 yards on 27 carries and four touchdowns.

Senior wingback Michael Self clipped off another 160 yards in his best effort in a game on 14 carries.

The 'Lopes collected 447 yards offense in the contest on 50 plays and 20 first downs.

"I told the team that our 3-7 season wasn't that good, but they sure made me feel a lot better about ourselves and the future with that win Friday night and the way they gave it everything they had," coach Dewayne Osborne said.

The 'Lopes opened up the game with an 11 play, 66 yard drive, featuring Self and Bird and a fourth down penalty against Ralls at the Jackrabbits' 43 yard line to keep the drive alive.

Self rambled to the 30 and then to the 16 and on first down Bird blasted behind great blocking on his left side to the one and on second down Bird got the call to the end zone with 7:53 left in the first quarter. Shane Horton's extra point kick gave the 'Lopes a 7-0 lead.

The defense, led by Horton, Josh Bush and Jaime Ayala forced a fourth down punt and the offense started its second touchdown drive from the Post 47 yard line.

Bird and Self, along with Ricky Jefferson, got the ball to the nine yard line and on first down Bird took the pitchout around the left side to the end zone. Horton's extra point put 14 on the board for the 'Lopes with 4:04 left in the first quarter.

Early in the second quarter, after an exchange of punts, the Jackrabbits made a game of it by driving the ball after a fumble recovery to the end zone in six plays. Bryan Adams went the final one yard and the point after pass attempt from Juan Vasquez to Adams was incomplete with 11:59 left in the first half.

Neither team could score as the half ended. The 'Lopes got to the one yard line before running out of steam and downs.

Defensive standouts in the second quarter for the 'Lopes included Ayala, Barrett Day, Tommy Ammons, Pete Torres, Horton, Michael McClellan, Self, Bird, Anthony Cruse. The key was a third down pass attempt from the Ralls 34 when Day sacked quarterback Vasquez for a loss to the 30, forcing a punt with 18 seconds left in the half.

Jim Riley Simpson's pass from his own 19 yard line was intercepted and Ralls tried one more play with six seconds left. Bird stopped Vasquez at the Post eight yard line to save the touchdown and the 'Lopes led 14-6 at halftime.

Second Half Action

It looked forever like the third quarter let down that the Antelopes have suffered all year, as the Jackrabbits came out in the second half and marched smartly down the field to the end zone in nine plays, then converted the two points to tie the game at 14-14 with 8:29 left in the quarter.

The 'Lopes took the kickoff and penetrated to the Ralls four yard line before turning the ball over on a failed fourth down attempt. The defense held, led by solid tackling by Hiram Gutierrez, Ammons, Day, Cruse and Bush. The key play was the third down attempt by Tony Contreras, who was stopped for a loss at the Ralls 25 yard line, forcing a punt.

Taking the ball at the 50 yard line, Simpson handed the ball on first down to Bird, who ripped through the Ralls defenders and raced 50 yards to the end zone. Horton's kick made it 21-14 with five seconds left in the third quarter.

The Jackrabbits weren't finished in their comeback try as they drove 61 yards on nine

plays for the touchdown. Trying for the two point conversion, the Jackrabbits were first called for a delay of game. Then Vasquez failed to penetrate the end zone, but the play was nullified on a facemask penalty against Post. The Jackrabbits tried one more time with Sylvester Garcia taking the pitchout and was swamped by 'Lope defenders. Post led 21-20 with 8:05 left in the game.

The 'Lopes took the out of bounds kickoff at their own 25 and on first down Bird clicked off another 65 yards to the Ralls 10 yard line. From there he hit the right side, broke through would-be tacklers and went into the end zone. Horton put the finishing touches on the two play touchdown drive and the 'Lopes led 27-20 with 7:36 remaining.

Any ideas of a Jackrabbit comeback were smashed by the Post defense, led by Junior Nava, Cruse, Day and a third down quarterback sack credited to Adrian Castillo at the Ralls 14 yard line.

J.V. caps 6-3 season with 28-0 win at Shallowater

"We had a good season," coach Bart McMeans says about this year's junior varsity football team, which trounced Shallowater 28-0 there last Thursday in the final game of the season.

"We played a junior varsity schedule with a team made up mostly of freshmen," McMeans adds, "and we look forward to working with these young people again next year."

At Shallowater the coach says "we played as well as we have all year. Our offense and defense really took control of the game. We got to play a lot of people and everyone of them played well."

Lance Clay scored the second touchdown on an 18 yard, one play drive. The touchdown was set up by a fumble recovery by Matt Gomez. The two point attempt failed.

The third touchdown came at the end of a five play, 41 yard drive with Lance Clay going the final 22 yards and he also scored the two point conversion.

Lawson returned the second half kickoff 86 yards for the final touchdown. The two point conversion attempt failed.

The young 'Lopes collected 177 yards rushing and limited Shallowater to a total of 44 yards offense.

The punt set up a 'Lope first down at the Post 39 yard line.

It took Bird just a few seconds to put the final points on the board as he cut through the defensive line and ran untouched the 61 yards to pay dirt. Horton booted the ball through the uprights with 5:33 left in the contest as the 'Lopes went on top 35-20.

Nava, Castillo, Ayala and Damon Curtis clipped the 'Rabbits, forcing a punt and when the offense turned the ball back late in the game, Bird sacked Vasquez, then Bird, Sid Estep and Randy Britton stopped Victor Perez and on third down with time running out, Vasquez was sacked by Nava with an assist from Cruse to start the 'Lope celebration.
