The Lesson of Saturday Night.

At the public speaking on Saturday night last the Republicans listened with patience and remarkable forbearance to the tirade of John Hancock, and although he outraged the feelings of hundreds of his listeners by his abuse and falsehoods, he was heard through without disturbance. When Mr. Degener rose to reply it was with difficulty he could secure a hearing, and many persons anxious to hear him were disappointed because of the bad behavior of those about them. When the two candidates were through, loud calls were made for Mr. Newcomb, and that gentleman took the stand greeted by the cheers of the hundreds who had stood patiently through the controversy between the rival candidates. Gen. Knox, one of Hancock's hot-blooded came upon the stand and addressed Mr. Degener, who was in the act of leaving, and reminded him that the understanding was that no one but the candidates should speak, and that the stand belonged to the democracy. Mr. Degener, under the impression that this was the case, requested Mr. Newcomb not to speak. Mr. Newcomb replied that he had been called upon by the people, and as the stand was abandoned by the appointed speakers and their backers, he desired to say a few words. Gen. Knox then left the stand and started a disturbance by putting up a set of boys and a few noisy and some drunken Democrats to shouting, hooting, swearing and calling for Mr. Upson. Mr. Newcomb tried to get a hearing, he said he would willingly hear Mr. Upson or any other speaker. Other gentlemen came on the stand, but the disturbance raised by Hancock's friends created a feeling of riotous opposition. A large majority of the crowd were determined to hear Mr. Newcomb, while the Hancockites were afraid to hear him and kept up a hideous howl.

Knox went further, he ordered the band to play and then marched them off playing, but this failed to have the effect of dispersing the people, free speech and fair play was demanded. Mr. Newcomb finally left the stand, not being able to be heard without interruption. There were many subjects for arrest by the police, of drunken men, who disgraced the occasion by riotous conduct, and yet no arrests were made. The lesson of Saturday night is, that Hancock's friends have inaugurated the plan of hooting republican speakers down; republicans can retaliate, if there is not power enough to put down disturbers.

What Hancock said about the Germans in 1866.

It was expected that when Judge Hancock addressed the people of San Antonio, he would give some explanation of the insulting language which he used in reference to our German population, in his memorable speech on the 21st day of June, 1866, which he made in the city of San Antonio on the occasion of a conservative meeting that was held on the Plaza. Gen. Knox and Julius Berends were opposing candidates for the position of Senator, and Judge Hancock came over at the instance of the local democracy, to make a speech in behalf of the democratic candidate.

The San Antonio Express was then published weekly, and contains nothing on this subject more than a local notice of the meeting. The political importance of the Germans was essentially different from what it is at present. There being no registration laws at that time, the peculiar abilities of the local democratic demagogues made it an easy matter to carry any election by an indefinite number of Mexicans, as the supply of available material between here and the Rio Grande was unlimited. General Knox was elected, as was subsequently the Lyons administration, by this system, and as the German element could be outcounted on all occasions, and a future republican victory of the republican party was regarded almost impossible; it was a part of the stock in trade of the trained rebel blackguards, that are so useful on such occasions, to create capital by spitting their democratic contempt on the "Dutch," just as they will do again should they ever be able to dispose of the republican registration system.

The words of the ex-confederate cotton thief on this occasion were printed and reproduced in the Freie Presse. From that time until Hancock became a democratic candidate, and the usefulness of obtaining the German vote became apparent, "the friend of the Germans," paid no attention to the accusation that was brought against him. One of his friends however (Mr. Simpson we believe) being a resident of this place, seeing the blunder that Hancock had made, published a card denying in general terms, that Hancock had said anything derogatory to the Germans, took, however, the precaution of not attempting to touch the remark, that Hancock had made; afterwards, as the necessity of deceiving the Germans on this point became greater, a few more confederate acquaintances came to the assistance of the judge and they too denied the charge in general terms; but they all agree in only telling, what Hancock did not say, and afraid to quote or explain the obnoxious sentence.

In Friedrichsburg a few weeks ago Hancock in a public speech admitted, he had used language derogatory to the Germans, but said, it was in irony. In his speech on Saturday night however, he denies the whole charge. For the benefit of "the poor man candidate" believing as we do, that he does not know what he did say, owing to his being drunk at the time, we will tell, what he did say, as it is printed in black and white, having been taken down, as it fell from his lips. As a part too of the political record of this practical miscegenationist, whose colored daughters have been educated in the north at the expense of the candidate, who assessed his property at one third of its value, we translate the article, with the remark, that the translation from the "Freie Presse" is the only one published, as to what Hancock said on the occasion. The Herald did not publish it, as a matter of course. The account in the "Freie Presse" is the best evidence on this point, that can be had.

Translation from the "Freie Presse" of June 23, 1866:
"On Thursday evening there was a mass meeting of the Conservative Union party; the greater part of the crowd was made up, however, of radicals and colored men; the number of the faithful was limited, but they made up for it in the use of their lungs. The affair was got up for the purpose of giving Hancock, who had been ordered ever from Austin, an opportunity to initiate his love and master Andy Johnson. Hancock attacked Congress in the vilest Billingsgate style, interspersed with occasional hymns of praise of Andy Johnson.

We beg our readers, to remember, that Hancock was the mouthpiece of the party, that is soliciting the votes of the Germans of Texas in behalf of Throckmorton, Knox & Co. We therefore held it important to quote one passage of the speech of this leader of the conservative party, that in sympathy with the feelings of the party, in order that the German voters may remember it, when they come to cast their votes.

Judge Hancock declared in substance; it not word for word, that "the Germans might be entitled to some consideration as white people; that he did not consider them quite as degraded, as the negroes." When he said this, even a young German puppy, that was present, applauded in a manner, that would have done credit to a Comanche."

The balance of the article scathes the present democratic candidate in a manner, that must be read in the original, to be appreciated.

Our City Administration.

The present city administration has been in office nearly four years; that is Mayor Thielepape has held his office without interruption during that time; the Board of Aldermen has been changed several times, in consequence of the resignation of its members, from one cause or another. Sometimes it was the retention of a city marshal, at others a squabble over the conduct of a policeman; or a difference of opinion over an ordinance. Throughout all this time there has been an active party clamoring for the removal of the city administration for political reasons; but only in one instance did any of our citizens sign a petition for the removal of Mayor Thielepape, that was during General Mason's command. This speaks well for Mayor Thielepape. No doubt he has

made some mistakes; what man would not during a four years rule, but there has been no demand for his removal other than now and then a rising political sentiment, complaining of his inactivity as a Republican, while the party was wholly held responsible for his continuance in office. The Governor in exercising the appointing power has touched on city very lightly; he has only filled vacancies, and even in these instances the appointment of gentlemen known for their worth and integrity, and not for being pronounced Republicans, has shown how free from partisanship the Governor has acted. The party lash, so far as San Antonio is concerned, has grown mouldy on the shelf, but Republicans who do not back in the number of place, will soon wake up to the reality that they will be driven from their comfortable quarters by a party lash in the hands of their political enemies, unless they go to work in earnest for their party. Four years service makes old soldiers, and old soldiers are famous for being grumblers.

The present city administration can well boast of its record, during the four years, when inaugurated the city had no credit, its scrip down to 25 cents on the dollar, a debt, growing bigger every day, its highways neglected and its public structures falling to decay, and besides this the pistol, and the gambling table were tolerated institutions. A few months radical rule, for such was the complexion of the administration put in by Gen. Reynolds, changed all this, the city credit came to par in a few days; the city debt was paid; the city highways were mended and made straight; the city became famous for its law and order, for its sobriety, its free schools. But it is time the people were taking the responsibility of the city administration on themselves. An early city election is to be desired for many good reasons. The State administration is now held responsible for its appointees, and the only considerations that control its action are efficiency in the execution of the laws and political soundness, local squabbles and personal difference over men will not influence the Governor's action, otherwise there would be no end to the trouble.

Editor San Antonio Express:
At the approaching election of a member to Congress from the fourth District, the voters of West Texas, should, above all other considerations, even laying aside politics, bear in mind, who of the candidates, the republican or the democratic nominees, will be the one to work for the interest of West Texas with the most probable success. The standard bearer of the republican party, the Hon. E. Degener, is a thorough western man, and during his first congressional term, has labored with untiring energy for the best interest of his entire district.

His success in obtaining from Congress appropriations of money to improve our gulf harbors; in preserving our "transit route" to Mexico, which was in great danger of being entirely abolished, notwithstanding its discontinuance would have resulted in the almost entire loss of our mercantile relations with that country; and finally in establishing a most important precedent for future claims against the U. S. Government for depredations committed by Indians, are too fresh in our people's mind, to need a repetition, while his failure to give our bleeding frontier adequate protection against Indian outrages, cannot be attributed to any lack of exertion on his part, but rather to the then favorably considered quaker—or, peace policy, to which Congress as well as the administration desired to give a full trial. This peace policy since has proven a failure, and is slowly but surely being entirely abandoned, and should Mr. Degener be re-elected, there is not the slightest doubt but that his repeated and earnest appeals to Congress for protection to our exposed frontiersmen, women and children will be crowned with success, and thus one of our greatest grievances removed forever.

The Hon. Ed. Degener, by his warm and hearty espousal of our best interests, and brave struggle for the alleviation of our devastated frontier, has not only a claim upon our gratitude, but has even earned the respect of congress, and it may not be saying too much, that no other man from our District, no matter how able and well disposed, whom we send for the first time to Congress, will be capable to represent us as well as Mr. Degener, who, for the same reason, on his second term, would be even more successful than on his first.

That no man, not intimately identified with West Texas, will endeavor to alleviate our sufferings and work for the advancement of our interests, has been clearly demonstrated by Morgan Hamilton, who although our representative in the Senate not even raised his voice against the attempted death blow at our mercantile relations with Mexico and even was inimical to the proposal of the Hon. Degener for the protection of our frontier.

Does any man, possessed of common sense suppose for a moment, that Mr. Hancock, the democratic candidate, would be as successful in furthering our just demand for protection, as the Hon. Degener? We say most emphatically, NO! Mr. Hancock, as a democrat, would in Congress side with the helpless minority and any petition advanced by him, would be looked upon with suspicion and distrust, and therefore probable to be defeated however beneficial its passage might be to our section of Country, while on the other hand, the Hon. Degener in harmony with the administration and the republican majority in Congress, would be sustained by some in any reasonable measure, brought forth by him for

our benefit; he, therefore must assuredly be the man whom the voters of West Texas will elect, if they have their own interests at heart, instead of giving their preference to his opponent, who, belonging to the Austin ring, cannot be expected to be favorably disposed to West Texas, his assurances to the contrary not withstanding.

Who are Hancock's backers? Ex-confederate Judge Devine; ex-brigadier Gen. Knox; ex-confederate receiver N. O. Green; in fact, all those who Hancock brands as "that unappeasable secession class who are more disposed to war than when it was vigorously waged."

A QUESTION OF LAW.—The Mayor and
City Council have planted themselves upon
a question of law in a recent appoint-
ment of Capt. Kempton. The political
soundness and efficiency of the appoint-
ment is not questioned. Sec. 7. of the city
charter reads: "Until the election for city
officers under this act, the Governor of the
State shall have the power of appointing
and removal of all officers of the said city
made elective by this act." The officers
made elective by the charter are the Mayor
and city Council, and in Sec. 24, the city
Marshal and other city officers are made elec-
tive by the city Council. But the city
Council spoke of in Sec. 24, are those elec-
ted by the people, and the power to elect
is not conferred upon a set of officers
holding commission from the Governor.
The Governor has sworn to execute the
laws, in selecting his agents for this pur-
pose of who will best carry out his orders,
and the only thing he should and can be
held responsible for is the execution of the
law.

The Party Friday Evening.

As announced in a previous issue, the
"Young Men's Social Club" gave an enter-
tainment at the Muscogee Hall on Friday
evening. Notwithstanding the intense
heat, the affair was well attended, by the
youth and young Misses of the city.

There were a number of young ladies
whose dress and personal appearance
was very attractive and deserving of spe-
cial mention;—but from the fact of its
being a gathering of the younger element
of San Antonio Society, who have plenty
of time before them yet—we refrain from
indulging in any personal allusions or
comments further than to say that the
affair was a most creditable one to those
who had the management of it and passed
off in the most agreeable and harmonious
manner. The committee, consisting of
members: John Manning, Alfred Hewitt,
Louis Girard and Branch Williamson
exerted themselves to the utmost to secure
the enjoyment of their guests.

THE TWO SPEECHES.—Hancock's friends
seem to be well satisfied with his speech
on Saturday night and claim that he got
the better of his opponent Mr. Degener.
Hancock addressed the people as he would
a petit jury,—he dealt in the strongest lan-
guage; he called all the Republican office
holders liars, thieves and robbers; he ap-
pealed to the deepest passions of his hear-
ers, his whole speech was a denunciation of
Governor Davis; he proposed nothing in
place of the institution he would tear
down; he sailed clear of every issue of his
own party. His whole effort from begin-
ning to end, was intended to revive the lan-
guishing fires of the Confederacy and to
put himself in strict sympathy with "that
unapproachable secession class, who are now
more disposed to war, than when it was
vigorously waged."

Mr. Degener addressed his hearers, not
as a petit jury, but as an assemblage of
reasoning loyal people; he called no hard
names,—he did not even assail the demo-
cracy for its sins and shortcomings in the
past or its evil designs in the future; he
avoided even the tempting openings left
by his opponent, to hold him up to the con-
tempt of his hearers; he spoke as he would
to the House of Representatives, where
such oratory as used by John Hancock
would subject him to ridicule and con-
tempt. Mr. Degener's remarkable modera-
tion and his good temper may not have met
the expectations of the crowd, who like to
see a blackguard like Hancock well pun-
ished by a gentleman, even if it takes a few
well aimed blows delivered from the
shoulder.

But take the two speeches, Hancock's
full of bragadoocio, falsehood and bullying,
Degener's calm, logical and gentlemanly.
And we have a fair contrast of the two
men. Hancock would disgrace us in Con-
gress, as Conner has succeeded in doing;
Degener would be a credit to us, as he
would represent the sentiment of loyalty
and decency.

It was suggested at the meeting the
other night, in consequence of the distur-
bance, that a Republican meeting would be

held on Monday night in order to hear
from Col. Twiss, who had come from Aus-
tin to attend the meeting, and other speak-
ers. But Hancock having folded his tent
and stolen away, it has been concluded to
postpone the Grand Republican rally a few
weeks and give Mr. Hancock's "unapproach-
able secession class," who are so disposed
to war, time to reflect and get cool.

The other night at the speaking, Judge
Devine echoed the words of Hancock by
asserting that the radical government was
the greatest robbery ever committed upon
the people. How about your Confederate
government and your own Confederate
court in which you robbed the union men
by confiscating three millions of dollars of
their property. N. O. Green can give us
some interesting figures, he was Devine's
receiver.

Hancock held a mutual admiration
meeting in his room at the hotel. Devine
was chairman, N. O. Green secretary and
Gen. Knox orator. They felt very jubilant
over the result of the evening, and Han-
cock, with a smile that was childlike and
bland, rose to explain and suggested that
if he could get Degener to canvass with
him and his Hancock's friends control
the meetings, he felt that he could "get
away with him." This little plan, so very
feasible, seems to be abandoned and Han-
cock, like a Arab, has folded his tent and
stolen away.

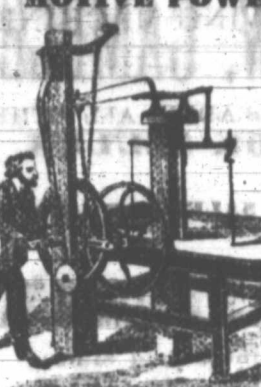
