## Interest Is Growing In May 7th Election

Interest was picking up this week in the May 7 Democratic Primary Election as local, area, and state candidates have been stepping up their campaigns before getting into the final week.

Up until Wednesday noon, 32 absentee ballots had been cast at the office of County Clerk C. W. Roberts, and 22 other ballots have been sent out which have not been returned as yet. Absentee ballots must be cast by three days before the election, or on May 3.

Local candidates report they have just about completed their door-to-door campaigns, but two or three told The News this week that in many cases they have been unable to find anyone at home in many instances.

Some observers are predicting a heavy vote in Lynn county this year, if the weather is favorable, in spite of the changed election law which advances the first primary date to early May.

In Lynn county there are two contests for county-wide offices. Sheriff "Booger" Redwine is being opposed for re-election by Cleve Barrington of O'Donnell and Jack Miller of Tahoka. Tax Assessor and Collector J. E. (Red) Brown is opposed for re-election by George McCracken.

In Commissioners' Precinct 1, the northeast quarter of the county, incumbent Curtis Morgan is opposed by Buford Jones, Martin Wiensche Jr. and Lloyd Mears.

In Commissioners' Precinct 3, the southwest quarter of the county, Mrs. Beatrice McLaurin is opposed by Ted Rogers and Andy Jordan.

For State Representative from the 99th District, which is composed of Lynn, Dawson, Gaines and Andrews counties, Wesley Roberts of Lamesa is opposed for re-election by Bill Sanderson of Seagraves.

Citizens are urged to exercise their rights Saturday of next week by going to the polls and voting their choice.

## Grain Elevator Burns Saturday

The 25-car capacity grain elevator of Goodpasture Grain and Milling Co. which burned here Saturday morning will be replaced with a battery of all-steel grain bins, Tom Hale Jr., local manager states.

In fact, the iron-clad frame elevator was in the process of being dismantled when destroyed by fire which is believed to have started from a spark from an acetylene torch.

Top of the structure had been removed, and when the fire started at about 8:30 a. m. Saturday a high southwest wind caused a suction which carried the fire to the top of the elevator building quickly. In fact, the fire developed so rapidly that the Tahoka Fire Department was helpless in stopping the flames, and the building was completely consumed. The loss was covered by insurance.

Workmen had started tearing down the building preparatory to erection of the new steel grain tanks.

## Britt Robinson, 11, Is Named On All-America Trapshooting Team

Britt Robinson, 11, the "mighty mite" from Tahoka, has been named captain of the 1960 Sports Afield-All America Sub-Junior trapshooting team, released today by Jimmy Robinson, trapshooting editor of the magazine.

Britt is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Jack A. Robinson and is a sixth grade student in the Tahoka schools.

Other Texans named on the team were James Liston Roberts, Houston, Junior first team; Bill Lacey, Fort Worth, Junior second team; and Mike Bennett, Deer Park, Sub-Junior team.

Britt Robinson enjoyed a great year on the firing line. He won the coveted National Sub-Junior trapshooting championship at the Grand National in Vandalia, Ohio, last August when he shattered 191 of 200, a four target spread over this field. He also broke 92 of 100 from 20 yards and 49 of 50 in the shoot-off to take second place in the Grand American handicap sub-junior contest.

Britt paced Texas sub-junior high average gunners last year with 9378 on 1400 targets.

Editor Robinson sent Britt a shooting jacket patch bearing this inscription: "1960 Captain, Sub-Junior, All American Trapshooting Team." He says an All-America Badge will be sent him later.

## Wilson Road Work Due To Start Soon

Work is due to start in the next few days on reconstruction of FM 400 from its junction with US 87 two miles north of Tahoka to Wilson and Station and a short stretch of FM 211 running east and west through Wilson. The News is informed.

Cost of the work will be \$256,474.50 and will be done by J. O. Boverell Construction Co. of Lubbock, the low bidder on bids received, according to J. W. Bowerell, District Engineer of the Texas Highway Department. The contract was for 15,500 cubic yards of earth.

The highway will be completely rebuilt and widened, with reconstruction of grading structures, base, and surfacing from two miles north of Tahoka to Station.

## Financing For Paving Project, Contract Is Let On Housing

City of Tahoka expects to let a contract on May 23 for the new street paving program which will be made possible by the recent bond election in which citizens authorized issuance of \$50,000 in bonds for the city's part in the project.

Arrangements were completed this past week, according to City Secretary J. M. Uzzle, for a fiscal agent, Texas Municipal Bond Company whereby the project will be financed for property owners.

Property owners who sign for paving of their streets will make a down payment within ten days after the completion of the paving and may pay the balance in three annual installments, the first being due one year later. Or, preferably, the property owner may pay cash for his paving and save the interest.

## Danny Brewer Cotton Winner

Danny Brewer, 10-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Brewer of O'Donnell, set a record high yield in winning the dryland contest in District 2's 1959 cotton production program for 4-H Club members.

Winners were announced in Lubbock Saturday at an awards luncheon at the Plains Cooperative Oil Mill for the 20-county district.

Danny posted the highest dryland yield ever recorded in the contest when he harvested 3,974 pounds of lint off a five-acre plot. He harvested 795 pounds of lint per acre of Lankart 57.

Mike Paddock, 12, of Brownfield won the irrigated division.

Cash awards totaling \$1,000 were presented the top six winners in each division by the Plains Cooperative Oil Mill, co-sponsor of the contest with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. In addition, the two first-place winners received plaques.

Also present at the luncheon were Marcheta Wood, her mother, Mrs. M. Wood and La Nita, all of O'Donnell. Marcheta was first place winner in the irrigated division in Lynn County.

## T-Bar Increases Club House Goal

The drive to raise funds for a substantial addition to the club house of T-Bar Country Club is going along fine, reports Mrs. A. C. (Myrna) Verner, chairman of the finance committee of the club.

Two weeks ago, at a membership meeting the club voted to build a \$5,000 club house addition using an old barracks building as the base. However, prospective substantial donors to the project objected to this type of building. As a result, the board of directors met and considered the problem and agreed to go along on a \$10,000 building if sufficient funds were in sight.

Since last week, Mrs. Verner and her committee have raised a total of \$5,150 for the project. The goal is 10,000.

If most of the money can be raised in cash and pledges, the Club now proposes to add 1,000 to 1,500 square feet of all new construction, incorporating the present club house into the plans.

So far, T-Bar has operated on a cash basis since it was started with the donation of the 125 acres of land by Mrs. C. O. (Mollie) Edwards of Fort Worth. The club has about 125 members, about 80 of whom are active members.

## Were You Counted In 1960 Census?

With the 1960 Census of Population and Housing virtually completed locally, District Supervisor Earl E. Kerr today announced the beginning of a "Were You Counted?" campaign to insure that no resident of the area has been overlooked.

Persons who believe they have been missed by the census takers are urged to notice the census district office by means of "Were You Counted?" forms. Area newspapers are printing these forms in their current editions as a public service. Prompt mailing of the "Were You Counted?" forms will speed up the compilation of preliminary population figures for the area.

Preliminary figures presenting the total population of incorporated places of 10,000 or more population, and for counties, will be issued as soon as the district supervisor is convinced that a complete count has been made. Final, detailed population figures will be issued in Washington later this year after the returns have been tabulated on the Census Bureau's electronic computers.

The importance of a complete count was stressed by the district supervisor. He pointed out that the population figures compiled in the current census must stand as official until the next Federal Census.

"Federal aid funds are allotted to States and State funds, in turn, are allotted to counties and municipalities on a per capita basis. So a short count means a short allotment. Thus, it is imperative that we have a complete count. The help of every resident of this area is needed to reach this goal," he said.

Work is due to start this week end or early next week on the new \$128,700 14-unit low rent housing project of the Housing Authority of Tahoka. The project is being financed by the Public Housing Authority of the Federal Government.

Contract for the project was signed Friday of last week with Smith & Wardrop, Inc., of Lubbock, low bidder on the project. Wyatt C. Headrick of Fort Worth is the architect.

Six units of duplexes in three buildings for whites, three 3-bedroom units and three 2-bedroom units, will be built a block north of the City Park.

Four units for Mexicans, two each of 3-and 2-bedrooms, will be built southeast of the square near the Catholic Church.

Four units for Negroes, two each of 3-and 2-bedrooms will be erected in Northeast Tahoka just west of the Dunbar School.

The buildings will be "real nice," states J. M. Uzzle, executive director of the Housing Authority of Tahoka. They will be of brick veneer and complete in every detail, including lawns planted and landscaped.

Families who can qualify may make application to Uzzle for renting the units.

**QUESTIONS, PLEASE**

QUESTION: "Are Christians to worship upon the Sabbath?"

ANSWER: The terms "Saturday" and "Sunday are both of human origin—mere calendar words—and do not affect the Bible issue. Let us notice the Bible and the seventh-day Sabbath. The covenant which included the Sabbath commandment was made with Israel only (Ex. 20:2; Deut. 5:2-3). This was never binding upon Gentiles. Israel was commanded to keep the Sabbath because they had been delivered from the serfdom of Egypt (Deut. 5:15). In giving them the Sabbath, God used the same day upon which He had rested, or ceased the work of creation. (Gen. 2:3; Ex. 20:8-11; 31:17; Deut. 5:15). The Sabbath was not given, or made known until the giving of the law at Mt. Sinai. (Ezek. 20:10-12; Neh. 9:13-14). The Sabbath was a sign between God and the children of Israel, not all nations (Ex. 31:12-17; Ezek. 20:12, 30). The Old Covenant, which was made with Israel only, included the Ten Commandments (Mal. 4:4; 1 Kings 8:9, 21; Deut. 4:13; 9:11). This law was to be done away with and superseded by the New Law (Jer. 31:31-34; Heb. 8:6-13; 10:9). The Old Law was nailed to the cross (Col. 2:14-16); hence, it is not binding upon us today even upon the Jews. Hosea declared that the Sabbath, with all other Jewish observances, would cease when

the Gentiles should become the people of God (Hosea 2:11, 23). Christians are expressly said to be delivered from the law containing the Ten Commandments (Rom. 3:19; 6:14; 7:4, 6, 7). Those who would be justified by the law given at Sinai are severed from Christ and fallen from grace ((Gal. 4:24-31; 5:1, 4).

Notice the Bible and the "first-day of the week." Jesus arose from the dead on the first day of the week (Mk. 16:1-9; Lk. 23:1, 13, 21, 46). On the first day of the week He was declared to be the Son of God. (Rom. 1:3-4). Between His resurrection and ascension, Jesus met with His disciples on the first day of the week. (Jon. 20:1, 19, 26). Pentecost came on the first day of the week (Lev. 23:15). Hence, all the events of Acts 2:1-47, took place on the first day of the week. The Holy Spirit came upon the apostles on the first day of the week (Acts 2:1-4, 38). The first gospel sermon proclaiming Jesus as the Christ was preached on the first day of the week (Acts 2:22-36). The church assembled on the first day of the week to break bread and to worship God (Acts 20:7, 2:42; 1 Cor. 16:2; 1 Cor. 11:23, 33). For these reasons we are not to worship God upon the Sabbath, but upon the first day of the week. No mention is made in the scriptures of a "Christian observance," would cease when

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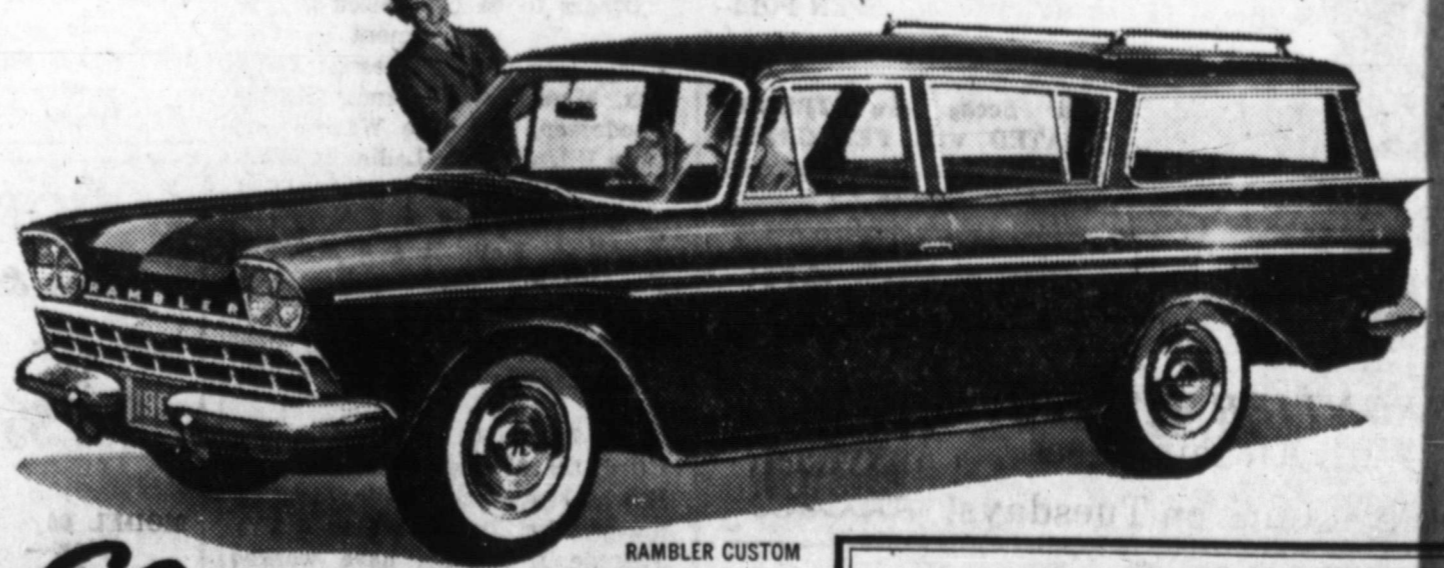

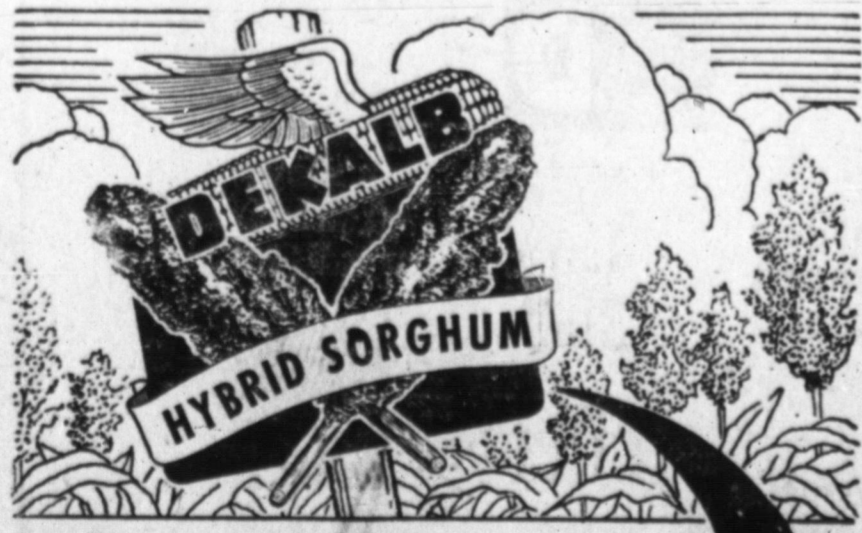

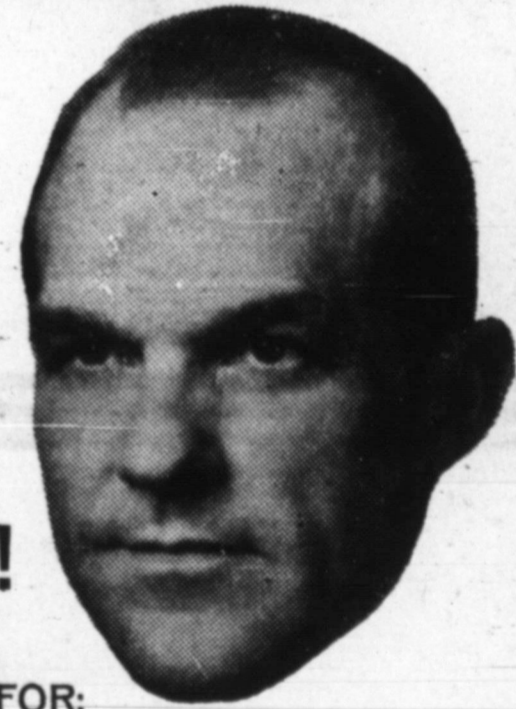

### Wesley Roberts Asks Reelection

### Everyday Religion

By I. B. Thompson



I have before me a volume of sermons printed in 1925 entitled "The American Pulpit," and further described as "A volume of sermons by twenty-five of the foremost living American preachers, chosen by a poll of all Protestant preachers in the United States, nearly twenty-five thousand of whom cast their votes." Each of the twenty-five preachers thus chosen was asked to contribute a sermon "which springs from your own heart of hearts, and expresses what you consider to be, either in fact or in aspiration, the characteristic of your ministry." Dr. George W. Truett's sermon in this book is entitled "An Adequate Gospel."

Such sentences as the following characterized his conception of that gospel. "Do you not also agree that much of our preaching is too newspaperish? That it is too much given to little scraps of discussion about the transient and superficial? That it does not stretch out into the eternities? That it fails to have the one of the preaching of God's Book? We are not primarily to be social agitators of reforms. We have much preaching of ethics and social service in these times. This is well only as it is the corollary and application of the gospel of the crucified and risen Christ. Doctrine without duty is a tree without fruits. But it is also true that tree without doctrine is a tree without roots. With joyful and courageous faith in Him, let us go to our world task, saying with Wesley, 'The world is our parish,' and remembering also to say, 'And best of all, God is with us.'"

This is the secret of his great success, the fountainhead of his great power.

A magazine writer once described Dr. Truett's magnetic pulpit personality thus: "Once the man's oratorical passions are aroused he attacks like a whirlwind. He comes on like a cavalry charge. You hear the beat of drums, the clatter of sabers, the huzzas of advancing hosts. The ground rocks and reels with the thunder and thud of ten thousand hoofs, and suddenly there in the midst of you is that figure with the burning cheek, the gleaming teeth, and the blazing eye, swinging high the sword of his flashing spirit and hacking his way to your heart. Pulpit and choir, transept and arch, audience and organ, the

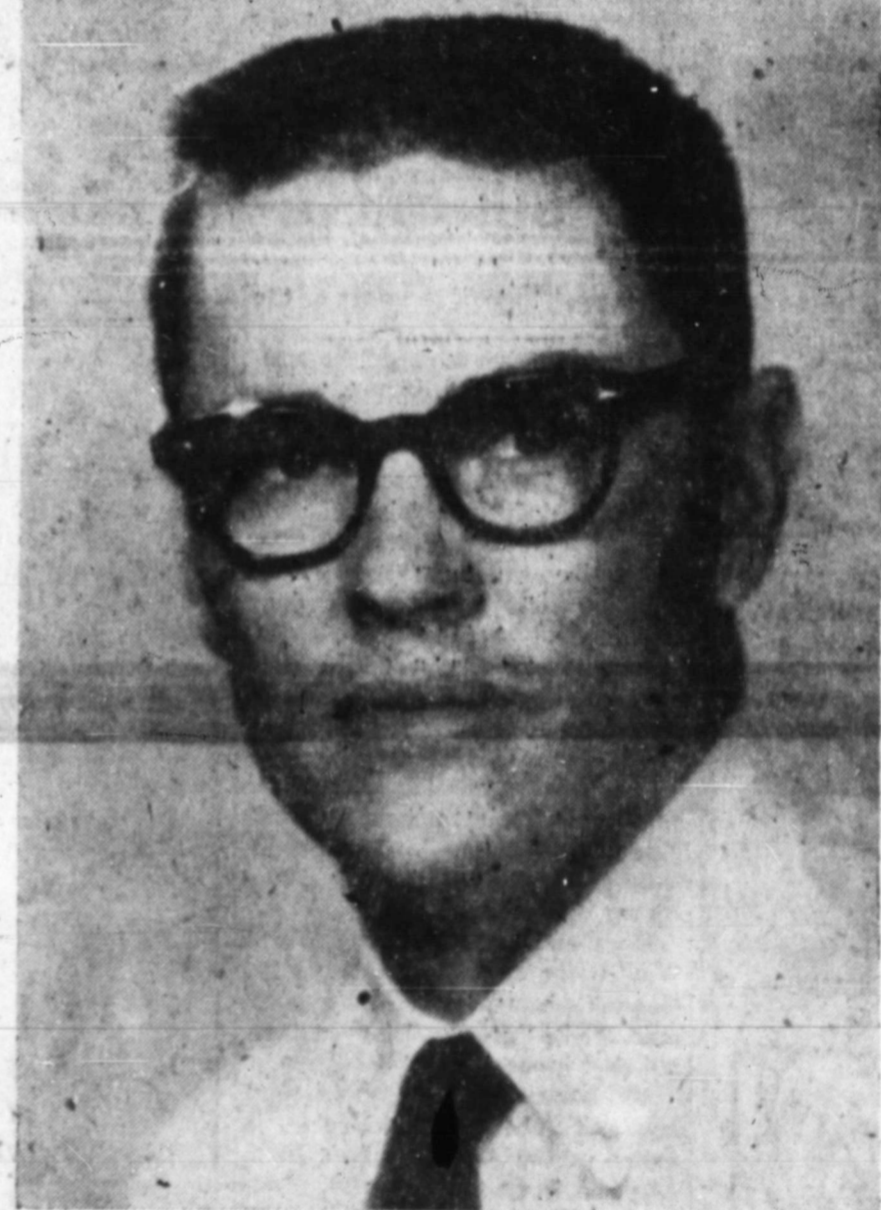

### Jim Bowmer Is Court Candidate

"Common sense—not nonsense, should be the guide in interpreting our criminal laws in Texas Courts." This is the platform of Jim D. Bowmer, candidate for Judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals.

Bowmer, 40 year old Bell County Attorney, and former criminal law teacher at Baylor Law School, is campaigning for a seat on the Court of Criminal Appeals, the highest Texas court in criminal cases.

"Too many criminal convictions have been reversed in recent years on nonsensical trivialities," Bowmer declares.

It has been 35 years since we have had a substantial revision in our procedure, and when elected, I pledge to the people of Texas my best efforts to see that needed changes are recommended to the legislature. The State Bar of Texas is aware of the serious need for revision and has appointed a committee, of which I am a member, to make the necessary recommendations," Bowmer states.

As an example of an opinion that fails to reflect common sense, Bowmer points out that in one case, "the conviction of a man for kicking an old lady to death was reversed because the indictment did not state that he kicked her 'with his feet'." Such an opinion does not represent common sense or good law either," according to Bowmer.

Bowmer points out that while his opponent on the court did not write that opinion, "it represents a philosophy of reversal on trivial grounds to which my opponent has been faithful in many other cases."

"When a member of the court holds, as my opponent on the court held in a recent dissenting opinion, that a pickup truck is not a 'vehicle' within the meaning of the law and therefore that driving a pickup while under the influence of drugs is not a violation of the law prohibiting driving a 'vehicle' while under the influence of drugs, it is high time for a change on the court and for a common sense interpretation of our criminal laws. The court should not be governed by trivialities which have nothing to do with substantial justice and a fair trial, whether they work to the advantage of the state or the defense.

"The Court should be in the position of an impartial umpire, whose duty is simply to see that both sides get a fair shake in court.

"As a former prosecutor and defense attorney, I think I could take an absolutely impartial view of the law and the facts.

"I certainly would never deny a defendant any legal rights. But neither would I consider trivialities which could have nothing to do with the fairness of the trial."

Mr. Bowmer says that he feels he has been preparing himself for this court ever since his 1942 graduation from Baylor Law School—by study, by teaching, by prosecuting, by defending.

He spent 4 years during World War II in the Judge Advocate General's office, two of them overseas. He has practiced law in Temple ever since.

Mr. Bowmer has taught criminal law and procedure at Baylor, is active in the American Law Institute and is on the State Bar Committee which is studying revision of the Code of Criminal Procedure. He is active in professional,

### Little Hopes For More Acreage

During the past three weeks, Lynn county farmers have made 513 applications, totaling over 40,000 acres, for reapportionment of cotton acreage which could be released from other cotton producing areas.

Reports from other counties in his 18-county district indicate that more requests were processed through the ASC office here than were processed through the other 17 counties combined. Local interest was heightened about two weeks ago when it was learned that 2,100 acres were re-apportioned to Dawson county and 1,900 were re-apportioned to Gaines, much to the surprise of ASC officials in those counties.

Congressman Geo. Mahon has informed the local ASC office that 1,200,000 acres were released for re-apportionment, 440,000 in Texas. The number of acres came as a complete surprise to both State and National ASC officials, he says, and adequate plans were not made for what happened.

In view of the fact that Texas has been divided into zones for administrative purposes, with Lynn county being placed in the northernmost zone, it is felt that this county has little or no chance to participate in the released acreage. Department of Agriculture officials have pledged that action will be taken to prevent such inequities in the future.

R. W. Fenton Jr., whose farm is located two miles east of Tahoka has completed rebuilding his farm pond to increase water holding capacity.

Terraces have been completed on Dr. Thomas' farm located eight miles east of Tahoka.

Now is the time to get mung beans for interplanting with grain sorghum. Mung beans are small enough to go through the same plates as your grain sorghum, making extra planter boxes unnecessary.

These beans have the same nitrogen fixing features as any of the legumes, and should be mixed with the grain sorghums, so that from 2 to 4 pounds are planted per acre.

Ranchers planning spring deferment of rangeland should begin deferring immediately, and continue through June. Deferred grazing implies delaying grazing until after the most important forage plants have set seed and those plants that reproduce vegetatively have produced numerous rhizomes. The longer grazing can be delayed, the better opportunity there is for new plants to become established and for old plants to regain vigor.

# Printer's Ink-lings

By F. P. H.

An unusually dry and windy April has farmers getting nervous. There is excellent sub-soil moisture, but winds have dried out the topsoil. Normal rainfall for April is 1.33 inches. But, there's still lots of time for planting.

Cussing the farmer and agriculture has become popular in a lot

of cities, in labor circles, and among many of the politicians. These opponents of agriculture are frequently pointing out the tremendous cost of the Government's agriculture program. They forget that what is produced from the soil is still the basis of a national economy. They forget that farming not only applies to the man tilling the soil but to the millions of others in the farming areas depending directly on agriculture. Take away farming and livestock production and there would be no Tahoka, and we doubt if 3,000 people could subsist even in Lubbock.

We have before us some figures on the estimated U. S. Budget for 1960, a whopping total of \$78.4 billion. Of this total, \$3.5 billion will be spent on farm price supports and related programs. Another \$1.6 billion will be spent on land and water resources, rural electrification and telephone loans, farm ownership and operation loans, research, etc. This is a drop in the bucket when you consider that the nation could not exist without agriculture. Let farm prices drop below a certain point, and we are going to see another depression.

But, in 1960, our nation expects to spend \$45.6 billion for national

security. It will spend another \$2 billion on international affairs and finance, \$3 billion on commerce and housing, \$1.7 billion on general government expenses, Veterans services and benefits will cost program, \$5.2 billion.

In addition to all this, we will pay \$9.4 billion in interest alone on the national debt. One dollar in every five you pay in income taxes will go for interest on the public debt. This does not include many hidden taxes you pay.

Therefore, don't cuss the farmer for the growing expense of government. He is responsible for just a cupful in the bucket.

Bill McNeely says we were a little off in the story last week about his onion crop. He has 39 acres of onions instead of 15, as we reported. That's an awful lot of onions. Can anybody figure the number, planted two abreast three inches apart in 40 inch rows? Incidentally, Bill had some cotton that started coming up last week.

Other farmers planting vegetables this year are Lewis Allsup, Winston Wharton, J. A. Pebsworth, and A. N. Norman, who admit their projects are more or less risky experiments. Some one suggests that the Chamber of Commerce add the promotion of vegetable growing to its list of projects in order to help farmers here develop profitable cash crops.

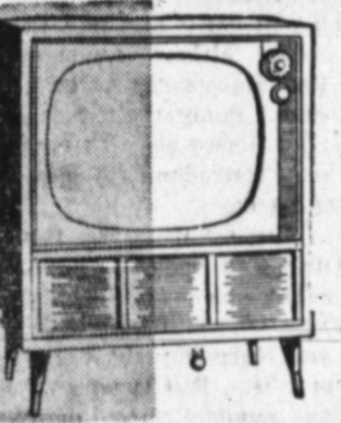

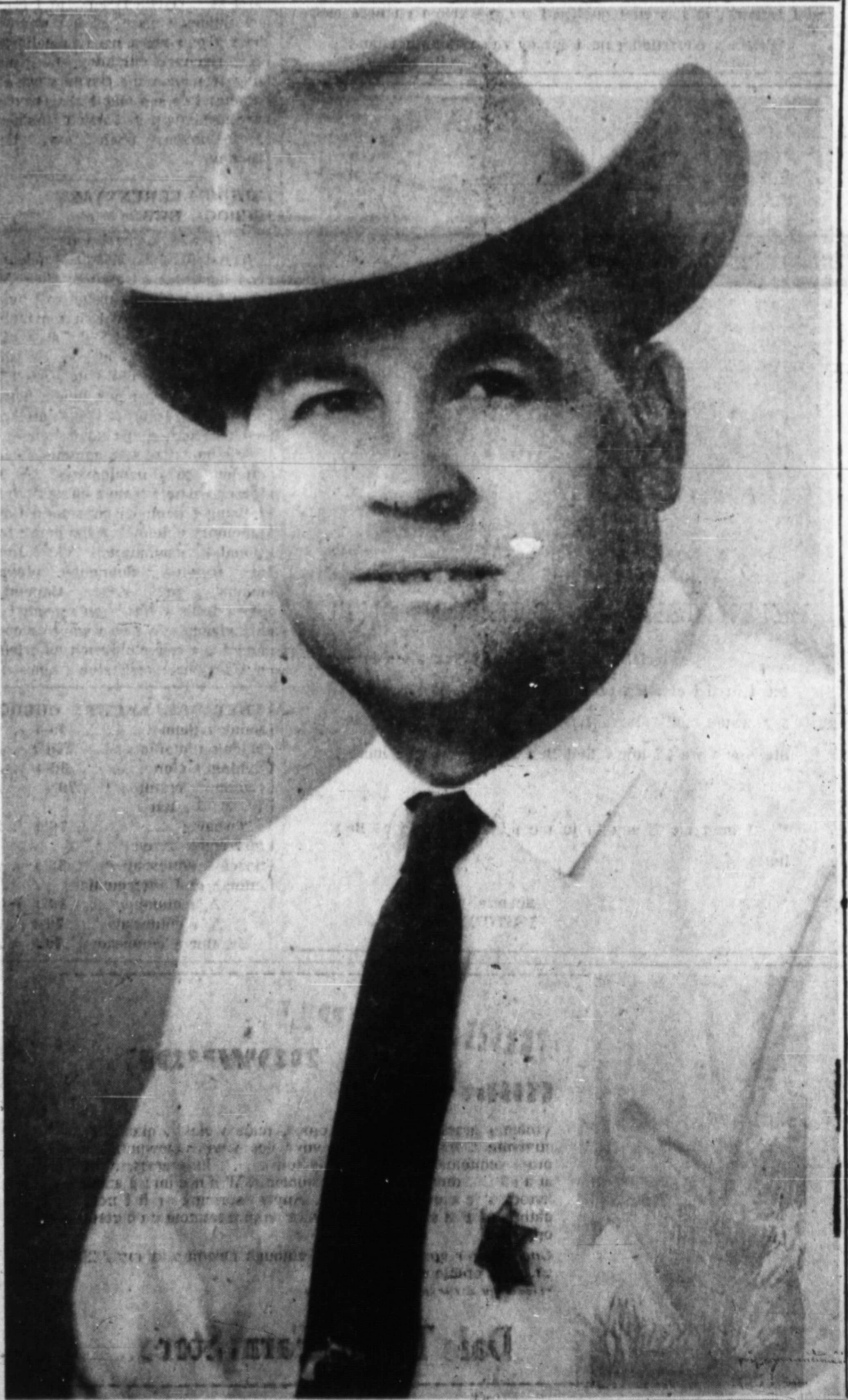
