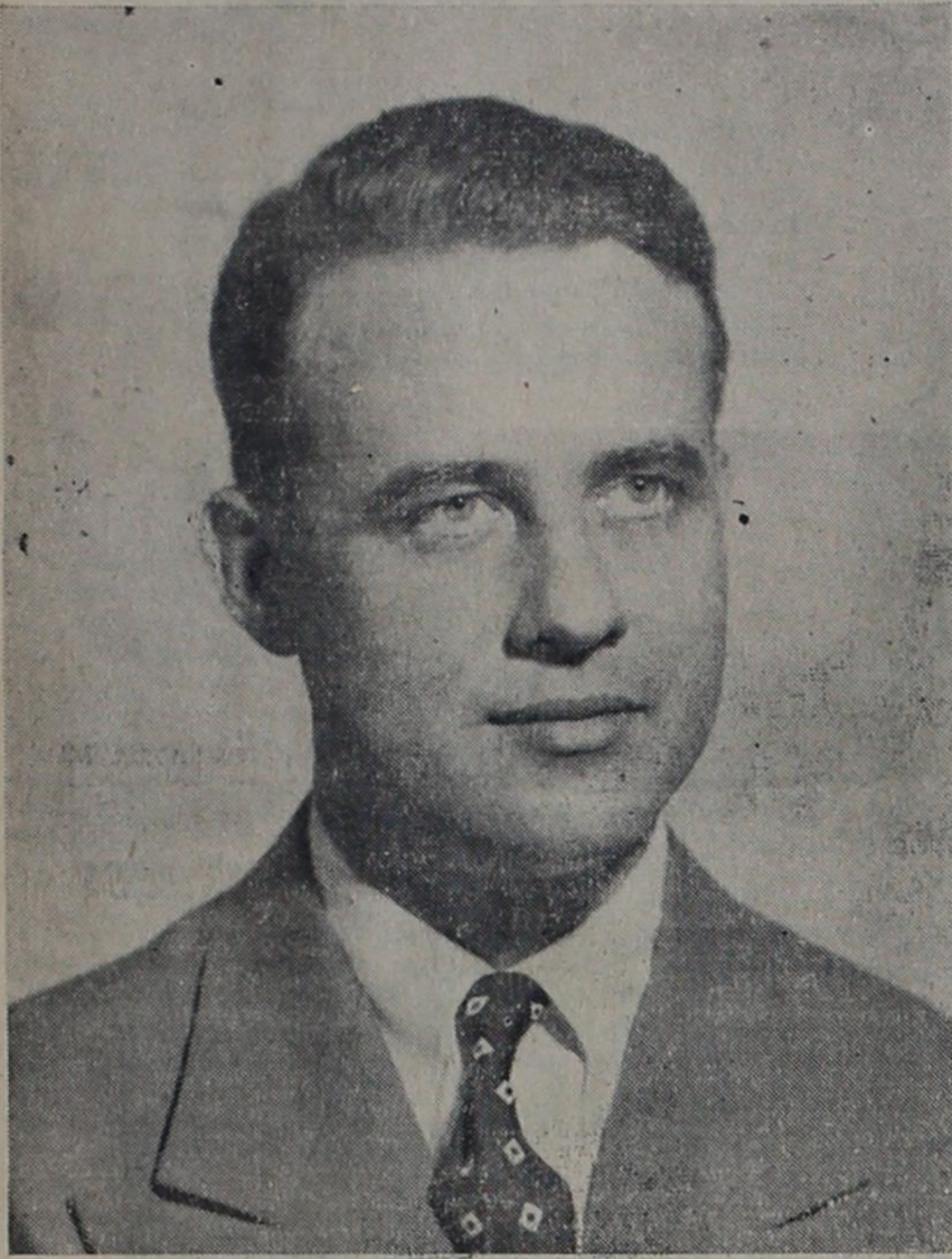

## Packages Asked For "American" Christmas

Capt. L. W. Graham, of the W.H. Graham of The Tribune, has sent "Hop" a letter asking donations of Christmas packages for orphans and children in the 279th Station Hospital area, located near Berlin, Germany. Capt. Graham is serving at the 279th Hospital with the American occupation forces.

Of particular need, the letter says, are food and clothing. "No matter how little you send, rest assured it is most needed and will do untold good," he writes. The ages of the boys and girls vary from 2 to 16 years. Items such as new or old warm clothing; stockings, mittens, sweaters, caps, and particularly shoes; material with thread, remnants and yarn; nourishing food as dehydrated soups, tinned goods, sugar, cocoa and flour (in strong containers) and macaroni; games, small toys, American story books, crayons and pencils are but a few of the practical as well as welcome gifts.

Soap is desperately needed—and what would Christmas be like for the kids without candy?

All boxes should be securely packaged and addressed to: Commanding Officer, 279th Station Hospital, APO 742-A, Care PM, New York, N. Y. Packages must be sent no later than November 1st, 2nd Class in order to insure a safe arrival before the holidays.

## Parmer Takes First At Lubbock Fair

### Farwell Steers Wins Season's Opener

## Albuquerque Firm Is Given Road Contract

Floyd Davis of Albuquerque, N. M., was awarded the contract for constructing Parmer County's first farm-to-market roads when the State Highway Commission opened the bids in Austin on Wednesday of last week.

Three road jobs in Parmer and Bailey county were included in the contract and all of them went to the same successful bidder. Approximately 24 miles of farm-to-market roads are called for in the contract, which includes grade and drainage structures, flexible base and double asphalt treatment. The three strips of road will be: from Muleshoe 5 miles north; from Friona to 4 miles south of Hub; and from the underpass 2 miles southeast of Farwell to the Oklahoma Lane school house.

Contractor Davis bid in the highway construction work at \$16,797.

No information has been received here as to when work on these farm-to-market roads would get underway, but officials here expressed the belief that it would be started in the near future. County Judge A. D. Smith said that Parmer County had removed the last legal obstruction by letting a contract for the setting back of high tension electrical lines along the entire routes to be paved.

This will be the first series of this type roads ever built in the county.

### Setting Grade Stakes For 4-Lane Highway

A surveying crew has been busy the past week between Texico and Clovis setting the grade stakes for the new four-lane highway soon to be under construction between the two cities.

Work is scheduled to get underway shortly on New Mexico's only strip of four-lane highway, with the contractor being given more than 400 working days to complete the job.

The new super-highway will follow the present route between the two cities, which parallels the Santa Fe railroad on the north side. Additional land for widening the right-of-way was all obtained north of the present route, with approximately 75 feet being provided along the entire distance between Texico and Clovis.

The new job means that Main Street in Texico will be paved from curb to curb, terminating at the Santa Fe railway crossing between Texico and Farwell.

Duane Curtis' Duroc boar was judged grand champion of all entries. Gerald Curtis won fire place with his Duroc sow; Leon Lnodon sow and litter, also gilt. In the Berkshire division, Bob Gerles took first with a gilt and Hermon Gerles also rated tops with his boar.

Parmer County stepped out at the Panhandle-South Plains Fair at Lubbock this week by taking first place with the county's agricultural booth, despite the continued dry weather which has plagued agricultural activity in the county since early spring.

The Parmer County booth, arranged by County Agent Ollie Liner was awarded the top position over fourteen other counties of the Panhandle-Plains area competing in the showing. In addition to the blue ribbon, a cash award of \$100 goes to this county for the first-place booth.

This is not the first time this county has received recognition at the Lubbock exhibition. Last year, under the direction of County Agent Lee McElroy, Parmer County was barely edged into second place by Floyd County.

Agent Liner has been spending the past several days rounding up products for the exhibit, and it has been through his untiring efforts that this top honor is brought to the county.

### Christian, Wells Win At Amarillo Show

Donald Christian, Oklahoma Lane 4-H Club boy, won first place in the Amarillo District Sears Show with his registered Chester White boar, and Max Wells, Friona clubber, who won first place with his gilt in the Parmer County Show, placed third in district competition.

Christian was awarded a first prize of \$55 and Wells received \$5, both prizes being in the form of purchase orders.

The Oklahoma Lane club boy will have a chance to win still more with his boar, next spring, when his demonstration will be judged in competition with 18 counties. The demonstration will be judged on the basis of pasturage and management, the condition of the boar, and the number of sows bred.

Ollie Liner, Parmer county agent, said that the boys were showing a great interest in Club work by their cooperation in caring for their animals, allotted them last spring by the Sears Foundation. He also said that each of the boys who own the gilts are striving to make a good showing on the heaviest litter of eight weeks, in the spring contest.

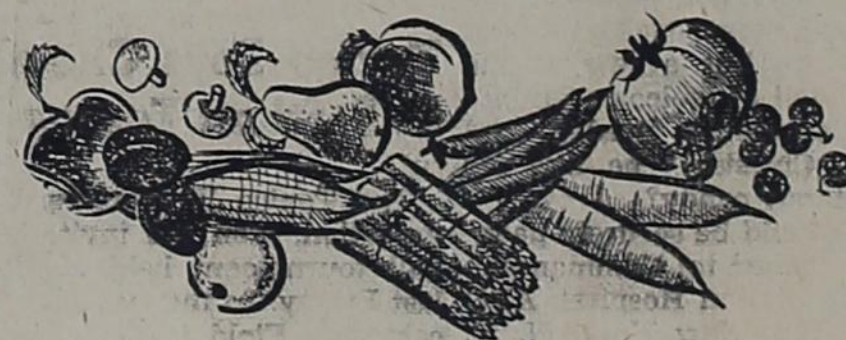

## New Frocks for Girls Should Be Simple

**COLLEGE STATION—**Little girls of pre-school age need dresses that are not only attractive but comfortable, durable and simple enough to help them in dressing themselves, says the clothing specialist, Mary Routh, for the Extension Service.

Two new dresses for little girls two to six years of age have been designed by clothing specialists of the USDA and paper patterns for making them are now being produced commercially.

One is a lowered print dress with shoulder ruffles instead of sleeves, and a skirt gathered on a well-fitted yoke. This dress has just one button, which makes it especially suited to the two- or three-year-old, just learning to dress herself.

The other dress is more tailored in style and is made up of gay striped cotton, with the only trim in the facing around the square neck and full length front opening. The open cap sleeves come above the elbow or comfort.

Both dresses hang straight from well-fitted shoulders, unbelted and loose for comfort and freedom of movement. The specialists point out that belts and sashes at the waistline are not a good choice at this age. Belts get lost and sashes come untied, and young children don't have definite waistlines. Both dresses open in front and the openings are long enough so that the dress goes on easily; ample necklines so they don't come up under the chin and cause discomfort and difficulty in dressing; and wide hems to let down for growth, since during preschool years growth is almost entirely in height.

## Texas Jersey Bull Is Superior Sire

**COLLEGE STATION—**Draconis Royal Gem, a registered bull owned by Herman F. Heep of Buda, has been announced as a superior sire under the qualifications of the American Jersey Cattle Club.

In a report received by Extension dairymen, the cattle club officials announced that the Heep sire now has 10 daughters tested for production that averaged 8,893 pounds of milk and 470 pounds of butterfat per cow, qualifying the bull as a superior sire. "This distinctive honor," the report said, "indicates the sire's proven ability to transmit both high production and acceptable type to his daughters."

Draconis Royal Gem has also been announced as a Silver Medal Bull having three daughters with production records averaging 550, 623 and 675 pounds of butterfat during one lactation period. The tests were authenticated by the

American Jersey Cattle Club and by Texas A. & M. College.

Heep's bull has earned the highest possible type-rating awarded by the cattle club, that of excellent.

## Poor Milling Wheat Costing Farmers

**COLLEGE STATION—**A lot of Panhandle wheat farmers are finding that it costs money to sacrifice quality for quantity.

Potter County Agent A. P. Bralley reports to Extension Service headquarters at A. & M. that terminal market mill buyers are penalizing incoming loads of wheat from Potter and other Panhandle counties. Reason: poor milling quality.

Twenty-one percent of the total acreage in the Panhandle wheat belt was planted last year to two wheat varieties that have poor milling reputations, says the county agent. The overall figure of poor quality varieties is so high, he reports, that millers throughout the country are either refusing to purchase the grain or are discounting it in some manner.

Farmers plant low milling varieties because they get "good yields", says Bralley. Westar, Comanche and Wichita varieties, all good millers, have produced as good if not better yields in Potter county than the poor millers, and many farmers have turned to those three varieties for planting this year.

## Questions And Answers For Discharged Vets

**Q—**What are some of the advantages offered to the veteran by the GI Bill if he buys a home under it, guaranteed loan provisions?

**A—**With a VA guaranty, the veteran has a better chance of inducing the lender to make a loan. The lender may even consider making the loan where no down payment is to be made on the home. Another advantage is the 4 per cent rate of interest which is low.

**Q—**Is it true that if I secure a guaranteed loan, VA will pay part of the loan without cost to me?

**A—**Yes, Veterans Administration pays to the lender an amount equal to 4 percent of the guaranteed portion of the loan. For example, if the guaranteed portion of your loan is \$4,000, the lender will receive \$160 from VA to credit to your debt and you will not have to repay this amount to anyone.

**Q—**Can the veteran get a guaranteed loan for any type of business?

**A—**Yes, the veteran can get a guaranteed loan on any type of legitimate business on which the lender is willing to lend money.

**Q—**Can I get a guaranteed loan to buy furniture for my home and a pleasure car?

**A—**No.

## MORE CATTLE ON FEED

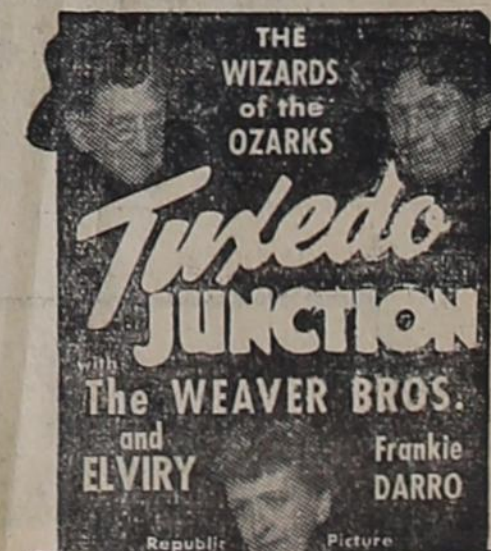

## Choosing And Using A Washing Machine

COLLEGE STATION—Buying a washing machine is a major problem with homemakers these days with so many makes and models from which to choose, says Mrs. Bernice Claytor, home management specialist for the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service. The problem is to find the one washer that will suit the needs of the family.

For instance, buying an automatic washer would save time and trouble, and a good many other pieces of equipment, but unless a good supply of both hot and cold water, with plenty of pressure, is available, the automatic washer would not be satisfactory enough to justify the expense. So the question to consider is whether the investment is worth while, depending on how big a part of the work washing is, and how much the saving of time and labor would mean.

If an automatic or "standard" type washer is chosen, the next choice is between a machine with a wringer, and one with a spinner, and depends largely on what the homemaker wants. Wringers and spinners can do equally good jobs. A spinner takes care of a whole tubful of clothes at once; with a wringer the clothes are fed in piece by piece. Many motors come with sealed-in lubricant and need no re-oiling. One desirable feature on a motor is a protective device that cuts off the electric current if the machine is overloaded.

Capacity is a consideration, too, and may be measured by the number of pounds of clothes that can be washed at one time. In standard size machines, designed for ordinary family washings, this ranges from 6 to 10 pounds.

Check the washing mechanism, whether to get the agitator, cylinder, or vacuum cup type. The results you get will depend just as much, Mrs. Claytor says, on the way you use your washer as on the washing mechanism.

Other features to check are the control levers to see if they are conveniently placed, casters that roll easily, water line easy to see, and a means of grounding the washer frame to avoid electric shock.

Then, whether to get the nump or gravity drain, a tub cover, attached or removable, adjustable or stationary legs, a cord reel or cord holder, will be a matter of choice.

The specialist recommends knowing the washing machine, checking the voltage and current, and following manufacturer's directions for the care of it.

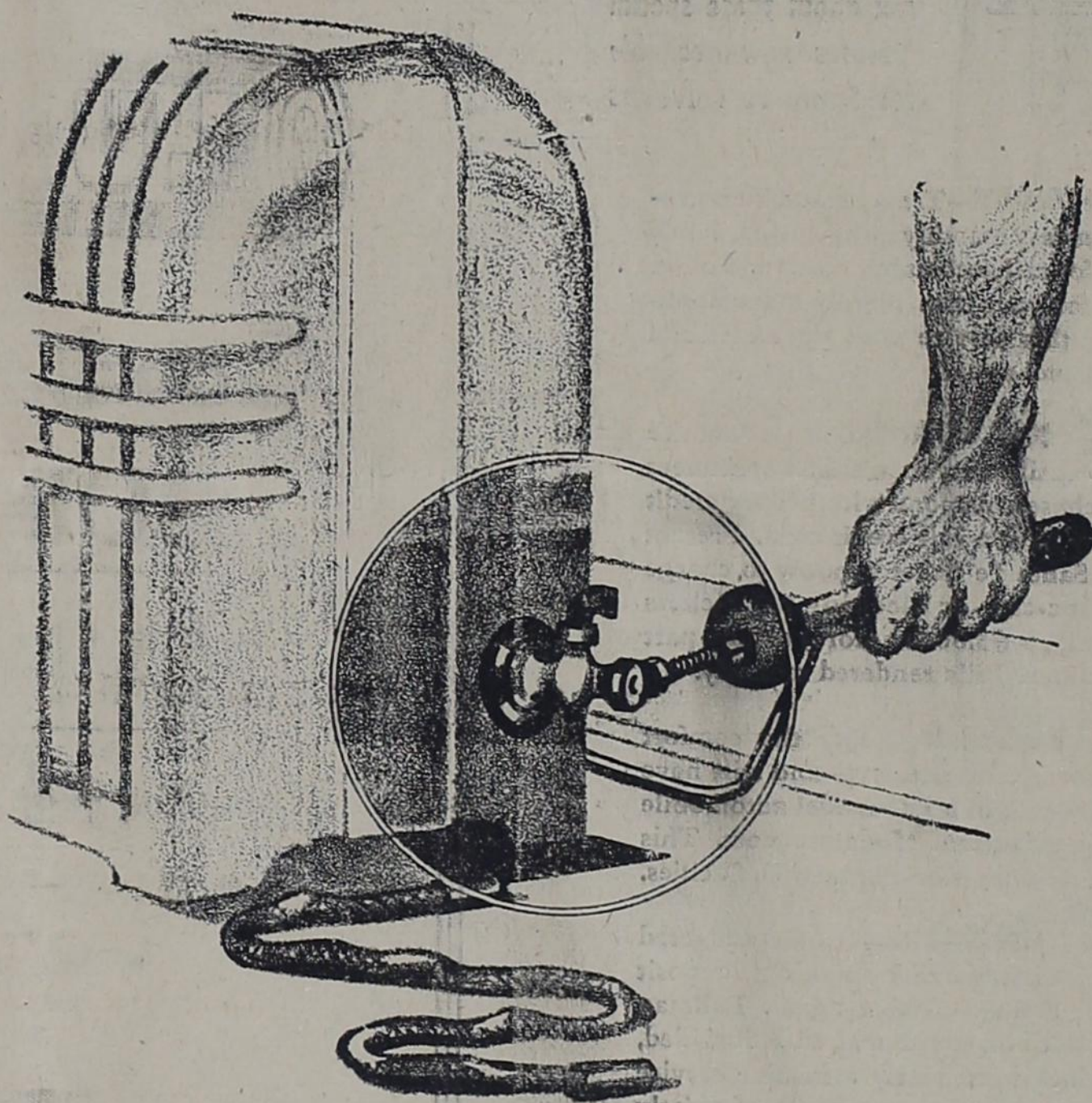

### Parmer Farmers Talk Good Seed Wheat

COLLEGE STATION—The big talk among Parmer county farmers now is about good wheat seed for planting.

County Agent Ollie F. Liner reports to Extension Service headquarters at Texas A. & M. College that farmers in the county are making a big effort this year to plant wheat varieties that will raise the percentage of quality grain in that area.

There will definitely be a wheat crop of higher quality in the county next year, says Liner. Farmers have attended educational meetings or the best adapted varieties, and grain elevators are pitching in to help by making available to wheat growers the better varieties of certified grain.

Varieties being recommended by the county agent are Westar, Comanche, Tenmarq and Wichita. Practically all the poor-milling wheat will be eliminated in Parmer County next year, says Liner.

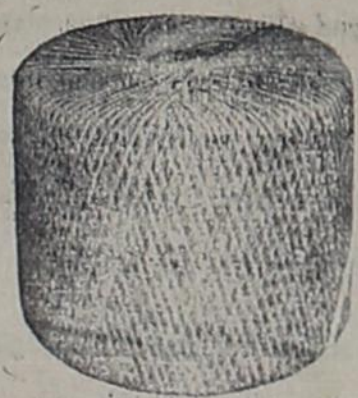
