Caution Lights To Be Installed On 8th

City officials announced Thursday that permission had been received from the State Highway Department for the installation of additional signal lights on U. S. Highway 80 within the city limits.

Work will begin on the installation as soon as the equipment can be secured, Mayor Rosenthal announced.

Plans call for the installation of amber flasher type caution lights at several places and the changing of the stop light at West 8th and Avenue D to a three-way signal with the installing of an amber caution light.

New lights will be placed at the east entry into town, at Ave. A, on the overpass, at Ave. E, Ave. I, Ave. L, and Front St.

The new caution lights were planned in order to slow down traffic on the highway, affording additional safety for cross street traffic and school children.

Mayor Rosenthal stated that the application had been made to the highway department several weeks ago and that the request was granted after survey of the situation was made.

Roundup Club Plans First Annual Christmas Ball For December 15th

The planning committee of the Cisco Roundup Club met Thursday night in the Lamb Motor Company offices to complete arrangements for the first annual Christmas Ball which will be held at the Lake Cisco Amusement Company pavilion Thursday night, December 15. The dance will start at 8 p. m.

The committee pointed out that the Ball was not restricted to members of the club but that everyone in the area was invited.

A. J. Sanders was appointed to head a committee to arrange for the orchestra and the callers and invitations were being sent to leading callers from a wide area.

Invitations have been sent to square dance teams in various west Texas towns, including the world's championship team from Coleman. The teams have been asked to stage exhibition dances for the crowd.

The pavilion will be appropriately decorated, carrying out the western pioneer theme and dancers were asked to come in western attire with the men and boys wearing blue jeans and the women and girls wearing gingham dance frocks.

AUSTIN, Dec. 2—Texas manufacture of dairy products in Oct. amounting to 57,136,000 pounds, milk equivalent, decreased 9 per cent from Sept. but climbed 30 per cent from Oct. 1948, the U. of Texas Bureau of Business Research reported.

September - to - October ice cream production rose 53 per cent, but production of creamery butter and American cheese fell 46 and 16 per cent, respectively.

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Chiseling Is Rampant In Unemployment Insurance Benefits, Magazine Reports

Criminal cheating by thousands of claimants of jobless benefits, and "shocking lax" administration of the unemployment insurance laws are today making a mockery of a program that started as fine a social experiment, charges Charles Stevenson in The Reader's Digest for December.

The basic idea of jobless pay, conceived more than a decade ago, was to provide temporary aid for persons who became unemployed through no fault of their own, while they searched

for new jobs. Today, in many states, pressure groups have so influenced the interpretation of unemployment insurance laws that the original plan has degenerated into a government grab bag for thousands of fraudulent claimants.

Many recipients of insurance checks have been found to be currently employed. Many more are steadily refusing available jobs because the work offered is deemed "unsuitable" or because it pays less than prevailing union wage scales.

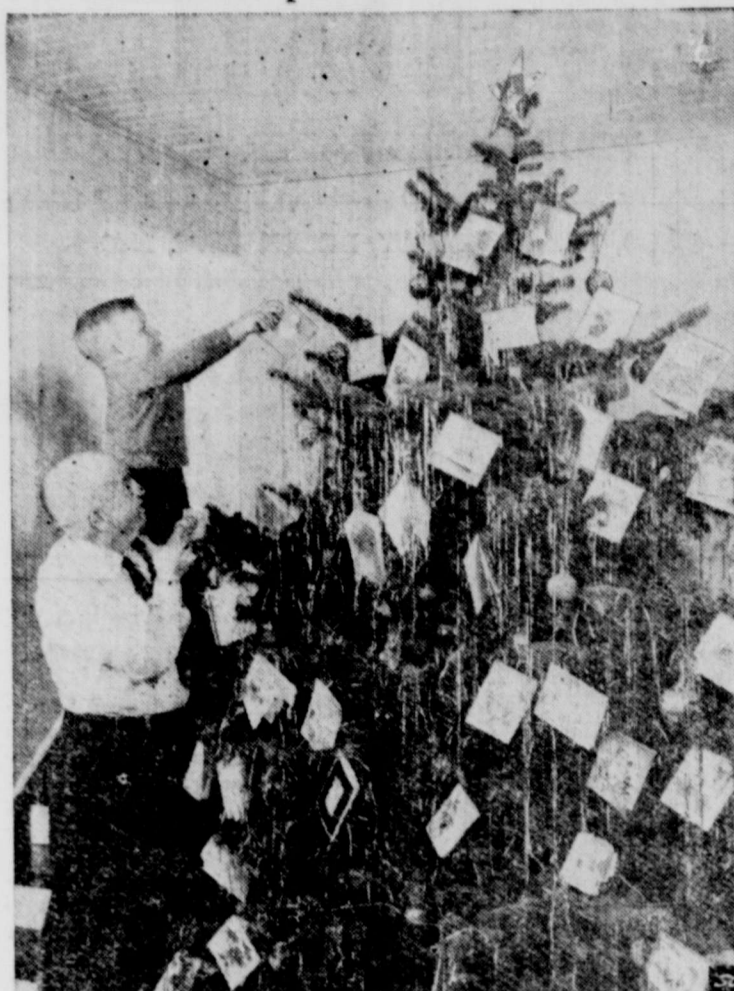

The meeting was held in the courthouse in Baird. The Butane Boys, a string band, furnished entertainment before the business meeting started. Cold drinks and do-nuts were also enjoyed by all those present.
