Ranger Man Killed by T. & P. Freight Train

DILLINGER AND BARROW ROB BANKS TODAY

PANA, Ill., April 19.—Four handouts today held up and robbed the First National bank and escaped with an estimated \$30,000 in cash.

One of the four, according to Ernest Butterfield, a jeweler, whose store is next to the bank, strongly resembled John Dillinger, notorious escaped desperado.

Linking of Dillinger with the hold up was the only voluntary assertion of Butterfield, who saw the men before the robbery and noticed one resembled the outlaw.

EDWARDSVILLE, Kan., April 19.—Two men and two women today held up the bank here and escaped with \$1,487.

Officers described the gang as heavily armed. The gang was driving a Ford V-8 sedan and was last reported going in the direction of Olathe. There was a report that the gang was headed by Clyde Barrow, notorious Texas bandit.

They kidnaped the vice president and a laborer working in the bank. The two men were released south of here.

RURAL WORK CENTERS ARE BEING URGED

AUSTIN, April 19.—An ambitious program to create rural work centers at which blacksmiths, mattress makers, rug weavers and other artisans may be trained and put to work, was proposed here today by the rural rehabilitation division of Texas relief.

The division proposes to rehabilitate persons now living on farms and in rural communities, as well as depression victims stranded in the backwash of cities.

No colonization of such families is planned. They will be relocated on the soil by infiltration. The relocated ex-farmers would be required to repair the homes to which they move in return for the privilege of living there and for use of a few acres for gardening.

Until self-sustaining they would be paid their regular relief wages.

Four Good Bouts To Be Secured On Elks Fight Card

Dewey Phippen, promoter of the Elks fights in Ranger, in a long-distance telephone conversation from Fort Worth, announced that two good wrestling and two good boxing bouts had been secured for the Monday card, with an exhibition match between two midgets.

Headlining the card will be Curley Stringer and Battling Nelson, who will meet in one of the main bouts and the Red Devil and Roy Graham, who will be pitted against each other in another main event.

The other two program features will be announced later in the week, Phippen said.

Texas' Part In Oil Industry To Be Shown at Tulsa

TULSA, Okla. (Special).—The part Texas plays in the 12 billion dollar oil industry will be recognized at the "World's Fair of the Petroleum Industry" here May 12 to 19 when the eighth International Petroleum Exposition and Congress is held.

One of the eight days will be designated as Houston, Port Worth, San Antonio, Amarillo, Kilgore, Tyler, Midland day in honor of the chief oil center of the state, according to W. B. Way, general manager of the exposition.

Visitors from Texas will be especially honored on that day.

Exhibits will be valued at more than ten million dollars and attendance, if the record of the last show held in 1930 is reached, will include delegations from 21 foreign nations and 38 states, of the union.

One of the most interesting features of the show, besides the exhibit of new equipment, actual drilling of wells, scientific and technical apparatus, will be the extinguishing of an oil and gas well fire by M. M. Kinley, foremost oil fire fighter in the world.

OIL WORKERS HEAD WARNS OF BIG STRIKE

WASHINGTON, April 19.—Oil workers warned President Roosevelt today that if wages are not equitably set in that industry "we will witness national economic warfare, perhaps never before equalled."

The warning was in form of a letter from Harvey Fremming, president of the International Oil Workers Union and carried a threat of a strike of 100,000 workers.

Fremming, who first made the strike threat last week, protested wage schedules and said labor had no representative within the enforcement or administrative units under the petroleum code.

"We must advise you," Fremming wrote, "that if these conditions are not adjusted, differentials affecting the wages of the workers in the industry are not equitably set, that we will witness in this nation, economic warfare, perhaps never before equalled."

"Strike votes are being taken practically every night. This is a direct manifestation of the attitude of these workers toward the code and the method used and delay in establishing wage scales with the wholly ineffective effort toward enforcement of labor provisions."

Petroleum Code to Be Discussed at Ft. Worth Meeting

FORT WORTH, April 19.—All phases of the national petroleum code will be discussed by members of the Texas production committee at the spring meeting of the Southwest District, American Petroleum Institute Division of Production here April 20 and 21.

The program for the two-day convention has been prepared and announced by a committee headed by W. T. Doherty, Houston. More than 300 oil men are expected for the meeting.

General functions and purposes of the oil code will be discussed by L. E. Barrows of the Texas Company. Chairman Jack Pew of the Sun Oil company will present the allocations committee report.

F. C. Sealey will report for the new pools committee; F. B. Flynn, the stripper wells definition committee; J. H. Russell, drilling practice committee, and R. L. Wheelock, enforcement committee.

WAS WALKING TO TOWN WHEN HE WAS STRUCK

Victim, Who Was Caught Between Car and Engine Died Almost Instantly.

E. E. Douglas, 45, Ranger carpenter, was instantly killed in t Texas and Pacific railway yards Ranger shortly after noon Thursday when he was caught between an engine and a car of a loc freight train as he was crossing the tracks.

The accident occurred when Douglas and his wife started across the tracks on their way to town. He stepped between a freight car and the engine as it was badly mangled in the accident.

Mrs. Douglas ran around the car to his aid and a Killington Cox ambulance was rushed to the scene, but the man was dead when he arrived at the hospital.

Mr. Douglas was well known in Ranger and had been doing son work at the fire station. His home was in the Lackland addition, east of town. He is survived by a widow, one son, John, and two married daughters, one living in Brownwood and the other at T. ler.

His two daughters were notified immediately of the accident and both are expected to arrive in Ranger in time for the funeral, arrangements for which had not been completed pending arrival of the two.

Hutchins Ordered To Have Hamilton Kin Before Court

AUSTIN, April 19.—Adjutant General Henry Hutchins declined to comment on his course of action today after being served with a habeas corpus writ requiring him to produce two relatives of Raymond Hamilton in 98th district court here Saturday.

He conferred with the governor after the writ was served. He refused to say whether he would comply. The attorney general's department will be requested to advise him.

Floyd Hamilton and Steve Davis, brother and step-father of Raymond Hamilton, escaped convict, are reportedly in the custody of Ranger Captain D. E. Hamer. Ranger headquarters denied any knowledge of Hamer's whereabouts.

RECOVERY IS THWARTED BY LAND SHARKS

WASHINGTON, April 19.—Progress of the recovery program has been retarded seriously by real estate speculators and "land sharks" who watch federal emergency agencies in the hope of huge profits, the United Press learned today.

Land boom tactics, it was said, are being used by profiteers, who wish to cut in on the \$150,000,000 set aside for projects to obtain a better standard of living for thousands of unfortunates.

Officials of the subsistence department division of the interior department asserted that cooperation of the department of justice had been sought to apprehend promoters who are inducing people with meager resources to resettle the lands with little value.

Revival Location Has Been Changed

J. ROBY PENN NEW PRESIDENT T.P. COAL & OIL

THURBER, Texas, April 19.—J. Roby Penn was elected president of the Texas Pacific Coal & Oil company by the new board of directors elected at the annual meeting of stockholders at Thurber. Penn was president of the company a number of years ago, retiring to engage in the oil business on a personal basis.

He has been engaged in the oil business almost all of his life, the greater part of it with the Ohio Oil company, going from that company to the Texas Pacific shortly after discovery of oil on its holdings in the Ranger boom.

Edgar J. Marston, who has been president in the interim, has been on leave for over a year. In a letter to stockholders he said that the state of his health would not even permit his being re-elected a director, and expressed a wish that he not be elected on the board.

The stockholders by resolution expressed thanks for his past service with the company.

Edgar L. Marston was re-elected chairman; John Hancock, executive vice president and general counsel; R. Seibel, secretary-treasurer; E. R. Lederer, vice president in charge of refining; O. E. Mitchell, vice president in charge of sales; R. J. Fleckenstein, vice president in charge of production; Sam M. Greenidge, tax commissioner.

The home domicile was changed from Thurber to Port Worth where the general offices have been located for a number of years, and future annual meetings will be held in Fort Worth.

The board was reduced to 12, with E. J. Marston, O. E. Mitchell and Clint Kimbro retiring. Present directors are: W. K. Gordon, Hancock, R. E. Harding, Lederer, E. L. Marston, J. C. Maxwell, C. H. Osmond, Penn, E. G. Rall, Seibel, S. J. Stuart and Lang Wharton.

In answer to questions by the stockholders, which members of the management answered freely, it was said that bank loans were being steadily paid off out of earnings, and that such a program would be continued this year. This has been made possible through sharp curtailment of expenses. A loss of \$39,000 for the first quarter after all charges was reported. It was explained that during that period one of the worst sales wars which it has encountered raged in the company's marketing territory, but that this appeared about settled.

The program of paying off bank loans out of earnings, it was contended, was not being carried on at the expense of sensible development activities of the company, and the recommended budget for the next year contains provision for a slightly larger amount of production development. With the reduction in expense already effected, it was said that the company was in a strong position to profit by any improvement in the oil business.

New Drug Is Aid In Malaria War

GENEVA.—Totaquina the new drug to combat malaria is proving its worth.

Discovered by League experts wishing to lower prices of powerful quinine rings, limiting quinine supplies far below world requirements, totaquina is becoming popular.

Hospitals and dispensaries in Algeria, Morocco, Malaya, China, France, Italy, Rumania and Spain are using totaquina instead of quinine, according to the League Health Section's new survey.

Chronic Shortage

The chronic shortage of quinine the world consumption of which is 572 tons less than required annually, is considered in the survey as one of the main difficulties of ridding mankind of widespread malaria.

While the world does not consume more than 600 tons of quinine annually, at least 1,172 tons are required each year by the 68 malarious countries covered by the League's investigations.

To find a cheap substitute for quinine League experts experimented until they discovered totaquina, which is a total alkaloid of cinchona. It has been approved by the League's Malaria Commission representing all the various schools of malariology.

The world's governments should pool their knowledge of malaria even more than previously, the survey states. Some strains of malaria are virulent in one country and mild in another, thus making it essential to study malaria on international lines, it is said.

The League which has studied in relation to malaria specifies requirements and conditions whereby a house may be a defense from an infection and not an exposure to malaria.

Man Held For An Attempt to Rob a Louisiana Bank

SHREVEPORT, La., April 19.—A 45-year-old man was arrested and held for questioning here today after Sheriff T. R. Hughes received information the bank of Gilliam, La., was to be robbed.

The man was arrested after Hughes hid himself in the bank vault and ordered deputies to act as guards across the street. Other deputies trailed a car outside of town as one described as the bandit car.

The deputies trailed the car and passed the bank three times before it halted north of town. The driver, then, the deputies said, changed into a pair of overalls, donned a cap, returned and parked near the bank.

Deputies said the man walked toward the bank, then returned to his car and sped away. He was stopped two miles outside of town.

Man Is Killed As Car and Truck Are In Collision

FORT WORTH, April 19.—Charles F. Yeager, 56, sign company salesman here, was killed in an automobile-truck collision four miles south of Burleson today after he apparently had gone to sleep at the wheel.

C. E. and K. L. Simons, Waco, riding the truck, said Yeager's car was swaying from one side of the road to the other as if the driver were dozing. The Waco men, headed here with a truck load of hops, said they took the wrong side of the road when the car swayed to the left. The collision overturned Yeager's car and pinned him beneath it.

The justice of the peace at Burleson exonerated the Waco men at an inquest.

Cannon Pictured As Preferring Jail to Divulging Names

WASHINGTON, April 19.—Bishop James Cannon, Jr., was pictured in district supreme court today as a man who preferred to go to jail rather than divulge the names of persons who received money in the 1928 campaign against Alfred E. Smith.

Cannon and his secretary, Miss Ada Burroughs, are on trial charged with violating the corrupt practices act in connection with funds collected by the Anti-Smith Democrats in Virginia. Cannon was scheduled to testify later today.

Frank Dunford, Richmond, Va., accountant who disbursed funds collected by Cannon, testified he frequently gave money to Anti-Smith workers on Cannon's orders without receiving a receipt.

He said at one meeting Cannon had a copy of the corrupt practices law.

Under cross examination Dunford quoted Cannon as having told him at that meeting:

"I do not intend to furnish the names of any of the people to whom money has been given in the Virginia campaign. I'll go to jail first."

Preliminary Work On Cut-Off Begun

Preliminary work on the bridge structures on the Ranger cutoff on Highway 1 was begun this morning by Morgan Construction company, it was announced. This preliminary work started before the receipt of the actual work order, which is expected by Saturday, in order that everything might be ready by the time the work order is received from the highway engineer at Austin.

Only a few men will be used in the first few days and for the first 45 to 60 days the force used by the company will be comparatively small, with the greatest proportion of the labor used during the last 40 to 50 working days.

The contract calls for 110 working days for completion of the contract.

Hamilton Sought Near Port Arthur

PORT ARTHUR, Texas, April 19.—Raymond Hamilton, partner of Clyde Barrow, was sought throughout this section today.

A suitcase found near here late yesterday containing a picture of Hamilton's sister and a woman's pocketbook led officers to believe the outlaw had traveled this way.

Extra ammunition was issued to city and county officers of Port Arthur and Jefferson county. Six submachine guns were brought out.

The suitcase was found on the Port Arthur side of a ferry across the Neches river. Officers believed it bounced from the car as it left the ferry.

Editor Praises the Press of the Nation

WASHINGTON, April 19.—President Paul Bellamy of the American Society of Newspaper Editors today paid tribute to those who fought to reiterate in the newspaper code the constitutional guarantees of the freedom of the press.

Bellamy, editor of the Cleveland Plain Dealer, in an address opening the society's annual convention, declared in the final analysis, the use made by newspapers of their freedom would determine whether the heritage would be retained.

"If we truly serve the people," he said, "if we fight for the poor and repressed, if we resist the demagog and exploiter, if we keep the faith, the freedom of the press, we will rest forever on the solid rock of public esteem."

To Attend Funeral Of Uncle and Brother

Mrs. John North of Ranger, accompanied by her mother, Mrs. R. J. Taylor, left today for Shawnee, Okla., to attend the funeral services for Mrs. North's uncle, E. N. Bryant, who died early this morning.

They left immediately upon receipt of word that the decedent had been found dead in bed this morning, presumably from heart failure.

Senator Urging A Silver Measure

WASHINGTON, April 19.—Senator William H. King, democrat, Utah, led a delegation to the white house today to win President Roosevelt to the silver cause, but best informed congressional opinion was confident he would be able to kill all mandatory silver legislation at this session.

Administration leaders have informed interested congressmen that Mr. Roosevelt probably would not veto permissive silver legislation.

That means congress is free to vote new powers to Mr. Roosevelt. He would accept them, but without a specific order to use them. Congress and the white house were in a dispute a year ago on the same question when Senator Elmer Thomas, democrat, Oklahoma, offered an amendment to the agricultural relief bill.

Mr. Roosevelt wants to postpone further silver rehabilitation, pending outcome of the London conference designed to halt debasement and raise silver prices.

3.2 Beer May Be Sold In Desdmona But Not Alameda

During the April session of the county commissioners' court, returns were canvassed of the beer election held in voting precincts, Desdemona, No. 8, and Alameda, No. 16, returns of which showed that 3.2 beer may be sold in Desdemona but not in Alameda.

Complete tabulations showed the following figures: In Desdemona 88 votes were cast, 47 for beer and 36 against; in the Alameda voting, 16 votes were cast, six for beer and 10 against.

Jack Dempsey to Run a Newspaper

BENTON HARBOR, Mich., April 19.—Jack Dempsey, fight promoter and former heavyweight champion, has purchased half interest in a Texas newspaper and is going to do a "little writing."

Dempsey, visiting Floyd Fitzsimmons here, said the newspaper, the Gladewater News, is a weekly at present, but that it will be made a daily soon.

"I am going to take an active part in its management and later on I will do a little writing," he said. "I don't know much about pounding a typewriter, but maybe I'll catch on."

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**SENATORS VOTE DOWN WARTIME
INCOME TAX**

Party lines were shattered when the senate of the United States by a margin of 11 votes retained in a revenue bill the more moderate income and curtax schedule proposed by its finance committee "instead of a proposal that would have restored wartime levies to help pay for economic recovery." Sen. Robert M. LaFollette of Wisconsin, who is facing re-election this year, led the high tax advocates. His substitute called for an increase in the normal income tax from 4 to 6 per cent and surtaxes ranging from 6 to 71 per cent. There were 47 votes to keep in the bill the committee rate that had been tentatively approved. A hint carried by the Washington wires: "This settled the chief controversy over the bill and leaders expected its passage before the weekend recess." The senate committee rates provide a flat normal tax of 4 per cent on all net incomes, instead of the present 4 per cent on the first \$4,000 and 8 per cent on all over that. They also fixed the surtaxes at 5 per cent on that portion of the income between \$4,000 and \$8,000 and graduate them upward thru 29 brackets to 59 per cent on all over \$1,000,000. A reminder that the rates approved by the house are a flat normal tax of 4 per cent and surtaxes ranging from 4 to 59 per cent. Differences in the surtax schedules will have to be thrashed out in conference.

Republican progressive senators followed the flag of LaFollette. This was the showdown: 24 democrats, 11 republicans and one farmer-laborite voted for the LaFollette substitute; 29 democrats and 18 republicans voted to toss the substitute "into the bowels of the waste paper container." The Texas senators on roll call on the LaFollette proposal voted "aye." Eleven republican progressive including Vandenberg of Michigan went down in defeat with LaFollette. In other words the grand total for LaFollette was 36, against LaFollette 47. Senators facing re-election this year are "on the spot." Holdovers are not on or near "the spot." In politics as elsewhere "self preservation is the first law of nature" as well as the first law of a practical politician. Let it go at that.

**Papers Backed
Roosevelt Veto**

NEW YORK—No event in 1933 aroused such universal editorial discussion throughout the United States as the recent congressional veto on the soldiers' bonus.

A detailed survey of the nation's newspapers showed that 90 per cent discussed the event editorially. In the majority of papers the editorials have been unusually long and detailed.

The survey revealed that the attitude of the papers largely has been independent of party lines. The president has been supported by a large number of republican papers, and condemned by many democratic papers. Although widely different opinions have been expressed, the discussion has been unusually temperate.

A classification of the editorials shows that 70 per cent of the editorials supported the president outright in vetoing the bonus bill. Of the remaining papers, 15 per cent defended congress for overruling the president. In other words, the press of the country supported the president five to

one. The remaining 15 per cent was neutral. The survey was made by the Romeike Press Clippings bureau.

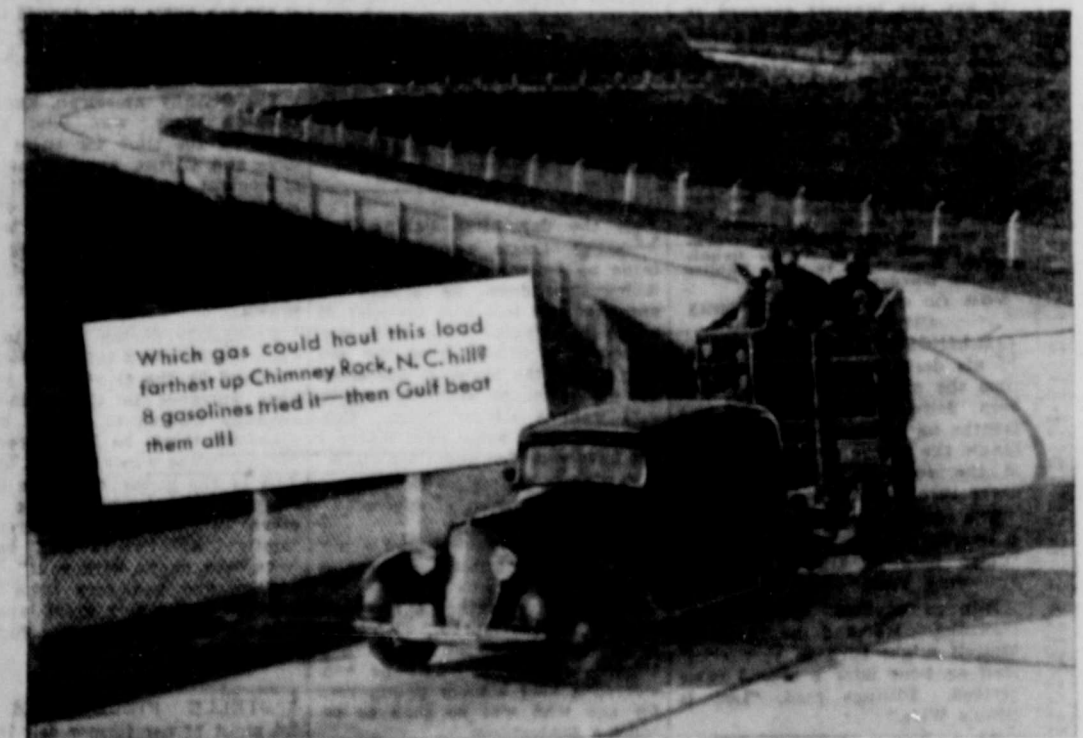

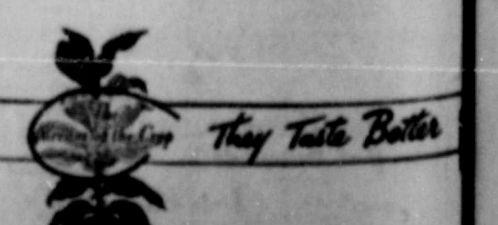
