## Clayton's water fund bill 'in the bucket?'

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — The House gave Speaker Bill Clayton what he wanted Wednesday and approved his proposal to dedicate half of future state treasury surpluses to water projects.

Representatives voted 113-19 to send the measure to the Senate, where Clayton predicts Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby "will lend his support" despite Hobby's lack of enthusiasm. "I think the lieutenant governor is for the concept but is just not keen on dedicated funds," Clayton told reporters.

In an afternoon marked by the absence of debate, the House also sent the Senate, 129-5, a constitutional amendment repealing the virtually non-existent state property tax.

Representatives passed to the Senate, 112-19, Clayton's bill nailing down details of how the water fund would operate.

The constitutional amendments setting up the water fund and repealing the 10 cents per \$100 state property tax would take effect only if approved by the voters this November. Senators might attempt to change the water fund election to November 1982.

Clayton, who became rich farming irrigated land northwest of Lubbock, assured the House the intent of his proposal was not to finance pipelines and canals to export East Texas water to West Texas.

Population growth will require East Texas to hang on to all its water through 2030, he predicted.

Besides funneling half the surplus — which has exceeded \$100 million each biennium since 1971 — into water, the Clayton proposal also would:

— Authorize the state to guarantee up to \$500 million in water bonds issued by water districts, river authorities, cities and other political subdivisions.

— Raise from 6 percent to 12 percent the interest the state may pay on bonds, thus creating a market for \$118 million in state water development bonds that have been authorized by the Legislature but never issued.

The implementing bill creates five funds to be administered by the Texas Water Development Board to help local governments build water projects, finance research and planning and buy storage space in reservoirs to assure they are built to the ideal size.

Contingent on passage of the constitutional amendment, the bill appropriates \$40 million to get the water development assistance fund started.

The property tax repeal amendment is designed to head off the possible result of a suit filed by Midwestern University regents.

In 1979, the Legislature effectively repealed the tax by assessing it against 0.0001 percent of property values. But

the Midwestern suit alleges that since the tax is imposed by the Texas Constitution, legislators had no right to cancel it without a vote of the people.

Clayton and other top state officials think Midwestern would win the suit.

The tax is dedicated to construction at 17 colleges — including Midwestern — that do not benefit from the Permanent University Fund, which belongs to the University of Texas and Texas A&M.

For most taxpayers, the state property tax never amounted to much because it was levied against county evaluations of property, which generally have been quite low. But the new Property Tax code levies all taxes on full market value. The result could be a total tax liability of \$428.9 million for 1981, according to the Legislature Budget Board, if Midwestern wins its suit and the tax is not repealed by the voters.

## Red Cross to inspect prison

BELFAST, Northern Ireland (AP) — An International Red Cross team conferred with British officials at London's Heathrow Airport today before flying to Northern Ireland in a new attempt to solve the prison hunger strike crisis.

No statement was issued after the two-hour talks in the airport VIP lounge at Heathrow, where the three-member Red Cross delegation stopped over en route from Geneva.

Delegation chief Frank Schmidt told reporters before leaving Heathrow: "It is the general policy of the committee not to make any public statement before going on prison visits."

The delegation was to visit the Maze Prison near here later today. Eight Irish nationalist guerrillas are on a hunger strike in the Maze and six other have starved themselves to death since May demanding what Britain says amounts to political prisoner status.

Britain's Northern Ireland secretary, Humphrey Atkins, announced the Red Cross visit Wednesday

night. He stressed the Red Cross was exercising "its rights to take humanitarian initiatives," and not under 1949 Geneva Conventions covering prisoners of war.

Atkins said in a radio interview later that Britain will not give "a blanket guarantee" that London will implement any prison reforms proposed by the Red Cross, but said he will take note of them.

Atkins' statement said the normal Red Cross practice was to "follow up an initial visit with subsequent visits and reports." This indicated it could be a lengthy process.

A source close to the hunger strikers said he was not "overly optimistic" that a compromise could be reached in time to save the lives of two of hunger strikers reported to be in worsening condition.

Sinn Fein, the outlawed Irish Republican Army's legal political front, said in a statement that it feared Britain had sanctioned the Red Cross visit "to create the illusion of movement" on the deadlocked prison crisis "at a critical phase in the hunger strike."

## 'Labor truce' requested; Polish party expels seven

WARSAW, Poland (AP) — Solidarity union leader Lech Walesa called today for a labor truce while a special Communist Party congress works on solutions to Poland's social and economic problems.

In a statement issued at the Baltic headquarters of Poland's independent labor federation, Walesa cited the election of new party leaders later this week and "provocations in relation to Solidarity members" in requesting a temporary halt to union protests.

He did not elaborate on the alleged provocations, and no strikes or protests were known to be in progress.

Negotiations between the government and Baltic dock workers broke off at 2 a.m. but were to resume later today, Solidarity headquarters in the seaport of Gdansk said. The dockers had threatened to call a strike this week, then said the government had "responded" to demands for improvement in working and living conditions.

The nearly 2,000 delegates returned to the congress hall today for meetings on party activity in "political, economic and social problems of the country." The official news agency PAP said the delegates would discuss international problems, party rules, economic policy, the mass media and party unity.

On Wednesday, the congress fixed blame for the nation's woes by expelling former party chief Edward Gierek and six leaders of his administration from the Communist Party.

The Soviet Communist Party newspaper Pravda gave prominent coverage today to a speech by a delegate who accused anti-socialist forces of trying to bring the Polish party "to its knees." Pravda made no mention of Gierek's expulsion, ignored a speech by Deputy Premier Mieczyslaw Rakowski critical of party conservatives, and made only an obscure reference to the decision to elect a new party leader by secret ballot.

Wednesday that the alternative to accommodating the country's grassroots demands for change would be a bloody conflict between the government and its workers.

He said adapting to the workers' demands was "indispensable because the alternative could have been a great conflict, a clash between the authorities and the population, a blood bath, a national drama."

Rakowski blamed party conservatives for making necessary changes more difficult. He said the orthodox Communists "prevented the party from pre-empting events, and called reforms concessions."

The congress, which is expected to end Sunday, is to pick a new slate of party leaders later this week. The delegates broke with the standard practice of Soviet-style communism Wednesday by deciding to make the election by secret ballot.

Party leaders in other East bloc nations are elected unopposed in open, unanimous votes in the party Central Committee, which in turn is elected by acclamation on the floor of the party congress. Polish delegates said the closed vote would make party leaders more accountable.

A Soviet television commentary on Wednesday's session said the Polish delegates had considered "procedural questions" — but did not explain that the procedures had been changed to provide for a secret ballot.

## Rioting again rocks London area

LONDON (AP) — Hundreds of youths hurling gasoline bombs and bricks stormed the south London suburb of Brixton, torching buildings and injuring 10 policemen in rioting that ended two nights of relative calm in Britain's angry streets, Scotland Yard reported.

Two buildings and a number of cars were set afire during the Wednesday night rampage in which more than 100 Scotland Yard officers searched 11 houses for gasoline bombs.

Several arrests were made and a small amount of inflammable liquid was confiscated, police said. Scotland Yard said it was acting on a tip that gasoline bomb factories were operating in the tough district, but none were uncovered.

Angry residents accused police of using excessive force, complaining to reporters that doors were smashed and

furniture destroyed. Police said they would pay for any damage.

Scotland Yard said the Brixton trouble ignited at about 11:30 p.m. — 6:30 p.m. EDT — when a gang of youths attacked officers escorting a fire engine responding to one of the car fires.

The crowd quickly swelled and about 300 youths were involved at the height of the disturbance, authorities said.

Police equipped with riot shields brought the area under control within an hour, a Scotland Yard spokesman said. There were six arrests.

The spokesman said seven of the injured policemen were taken to the hospital, where one officer was reported in serious condition with head and chest injuries.

Police did not use any of the new government-approved riot gear. Home Secretary William Whitelaw had told lawmakers earlier in the day that plastic bullets, tear gas, water cannons and armored vehicles would be available as a "last resort" for controlling street violence.

## Another court ruling criticizes CIA director

WASHINGTON (AP) — Another federal court ruling critical of CIA Director William J. Casey's financial dealings says he and other directors drove a now-defunct farming corporation "deep and deeper into debt" by managing in a "pattern of self-interest."

President Reagan, Vice President George Bush and White House counselor Edwin Meese III had barely finished on Wednesday affirming their support for Casey and discounting a federal court ruling against him in New York May 19, when a year-old federal appellate court ruling in New Orleans surfaced.

Deputy White House press secretary Larry Speakes acknowledged that Reagan had first learned of the New York ruling by reading press reports Tuesday. It was unclear whether top administration officials were aware of the New Orleans decision when they took the line that Casey's business dealings did not af-

fect his CIA job.

Reagan had told reporters: "There is no controversy (over Casey). I have complete trust in him." Bush, asked if Casey should resign, replied, "Oh, no!" and Casey's attorney said the CIA chief "denies any misconduct."

Both rulings involved Casey's role in Multiponics Inc., a failed New Orleans farming venture.

In the New York case, a judge ruled that Casey and other directors had knowingly misled potential investors in Multiponics in 1968.

In the New Orleans case, Casey and the other directors lost a bid to claim part of the failed firm's assets. That ruling was sought by a court-appointed lawyer for the firm's trustee as a penalty for the directors and was upheld July 16, 1980, by a unanimous three-judge panel of the 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in New Orleans.

As a result, Multiponics' remaining \$10 million in assets were divided two

weeks ago among the firm's creditors, leaving no money to repay the directors for personal loans made to the firm, according to the trustee's lawyer, Peter J. Butler of New Orleans.

Casey's attorney in New York, Milton Gold, said the CIA director, a self-made millionaire, lost \$150,000 in the venture. And Gold noted that damage claims against Casey and other directors had been dismissed in the New Orleans case.

Casey's legal troubles over Multiponics surfaced after his protegee Max Hugel, a millionaire businessman brought by Casey to the CIA from the Reagan presidential campaign, resigned abruptly Tuesday morning as head of the agency's clandestine services.

Hugel's resignation came hours after The Washington Post printed allegations by two New York stockbrokers that they had participated in 1974 with Hugel in prohibited man-

euvers to boost the stock of a firm Hugel once owned. Hugel denied any wrongdoing.

In a telephone call to the Post Wednesday, Casey said he had known Hugel "for only 17 months, not 20 years," as Hugel had claimed.

Multiponics filed for reorganization under the Bankruptcy Act three years after its founding. In January 1973, Butler filed a motion arguing that all other creditors should take priority over Casey and the other directors who were seeking repayment of personal loans to the firm, because their management had contributed to the firm's difficulties.

Butler also filed a civil suit against Casey and the other directors seeking \$2.1 million in damages and, again, subordination of their claims.

The suit and motion were combined. In December 1976, a special master reported to the court that the damages were not warranted but that subordination of the claims was.

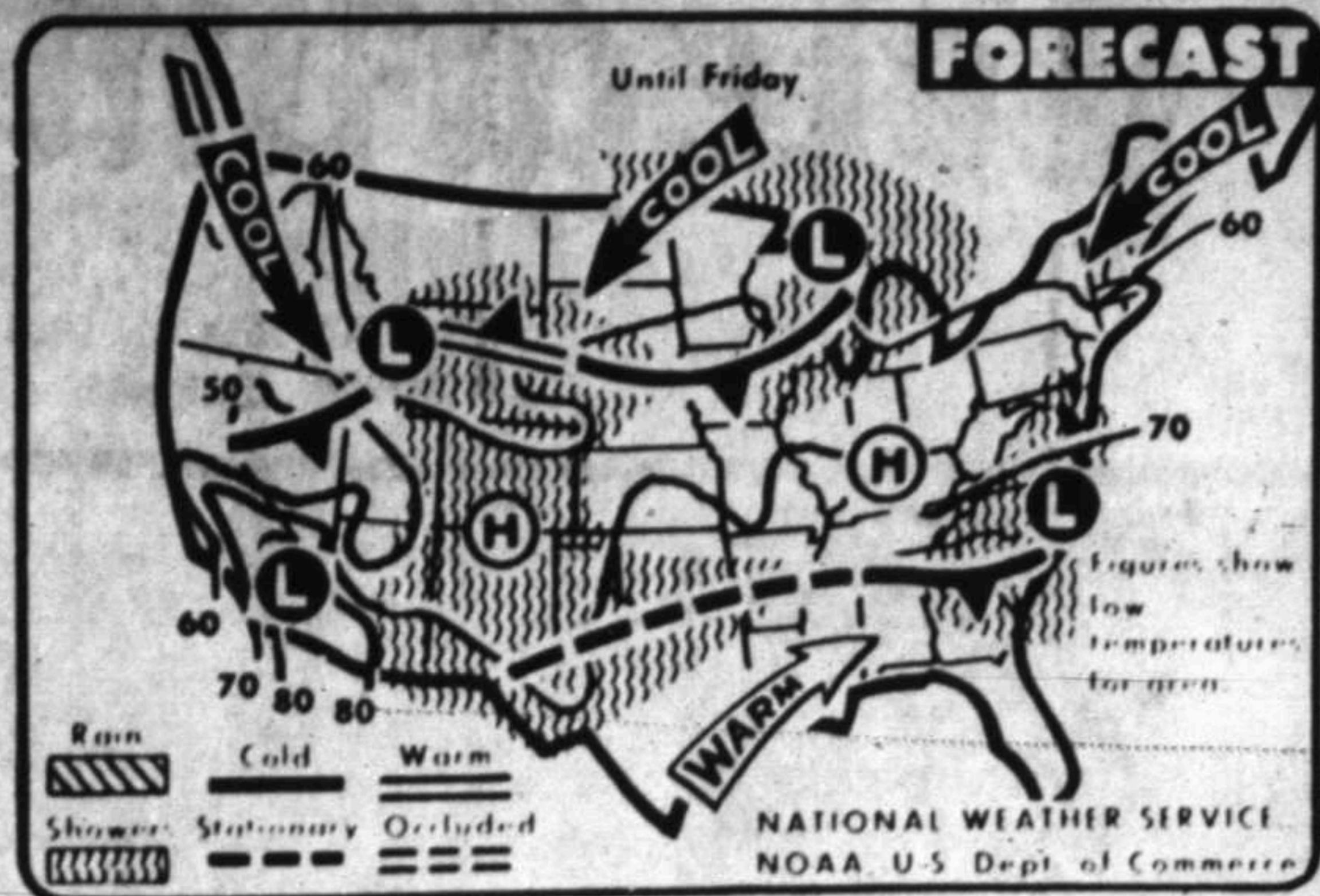

Hot temperatures continue to reign

Hot temperatures reigned throughout the Permian Basin Wednesday, with the high of 101 falling only one degree short of the all-time record for the date set in 1964. The high also topped all southwest temperatures received by the National Weather Service of Midland, as only Oklahoma City and Wichita Falls even reached the century mark. Today's early morning low of 68 was well above the record 63 set in 1975. More warm temperatures are expected Friday, with the high to be in the upper 90s. The low tonight should be in the low 70s with winds south to southeast at 5-10 mph. Early morning thunderstorms rolled across the Texas Panhandle and parts of the Permian Basin today, leaving up to 1.19 inches of rain in their wake.

Bensten blasts CIA security check

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Central Intelligence Agency bungled its security check of Max Hugel, the administration's nominee for chief of clandestine operations, Sen. Lloyd Bensten says. Hugel resigned Tuesday in the wake of charges he engaged in improper stock market activity seven years ago. "It's obvious they made a very hurried security check. I understand they did it in approximately seven days, and that was too hasty for an agency that has a record for being very thorough," Bensten told Texas reporters Wednesday afternoon. "They obviously did a very poor job, and it obviously was a very serious mistake," the Texas Democrat said during his monthly press conference.

BENSTEN, A MEMBER of the Senate Intelligence Committee, said he was not given advance notice of Hugel's resignation, but didn't consider that improper. He learned the news during a meeting of the committee on Tuesday. "It took them a short time, I suppose, to find out how severe the accusation was. I think once they found out, they acted very expeditiously."

Asked if the embarrassment would have any effect on his decisions concerning the CIA, Bensten said, "Every time you see one of these things, it leads you to question more, to probe more."

Bensten touched on several other topics during his press conference, including the decision by House Democratic leaders to leave Rep. Phil Gramm of College Station off the giant House-Senate conference committee concerning the bill Gramm drafted and helped sponsor. "I'm one who works to bring people into the party. I always have been, and I think it's important that we do it. I don't know the rules of the House to that extent, but I'm stating that as a philosophy," said Bensten, who beat Gramm in the Democratic primary during his 1976 reelection bid. "To be the majority party, we ought to work to pull people in," he added.

BENSTEN ALSO COMMENTED on length on his battle to win an exemption for the first 1,000 barrels of daily production for royalty owners and independent oilmen under the Windfall Profits Tax. "It's going to be very tough because the administration obviously opposes it. We're on notice they're going to oppose it on the floor. But we're going to go ahead and pursue it," he said. "If Republicans hang together, then I can't win. But there are a number of them who have supported it in the past, and I hope they'll support it again," the Texas Democrat said. Bensten has 15 co-sponsors, including Republicans Don Nickles of Oklahoma and Mark Andrews of North Dakota. The administration says it opposes the legislation because of its timing. Any exemptions to the Windfall Profits Tax should be delayed until a second tax bill can be offered later in the year, White House officials contend.

Lunar eclipse to be visible over all of North America

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Tonight's sky should be darker than usual for half the world as a rare lunar eclipse snuffs the moon from view. The partial eclipse of the moon will pass through Earth's shadow beginning at 10:25 p.m. (CDT) today. The shadow will take a progressively larger bite from the moon's sunlit face until, at 11:47 a.m., a bit over 55 percent will be darkened. By 1:09 a.m., the moon will drift out of the shadow and the show will be over. Barring clouds, anyone in the United States and "everyone on the dark side of the Earth will be able to see it," said Malcolm Cooper of Los Angeles' Griffith Observatory. However, the eclipse will not be visible to the half of the world that will be in daylight when it occurs. Lunar eclipses "are of no real scientific value anymore, but they're fun to look at," Cooper said. Unlike solar eclipses, which require care to avoid eye damage as the moon blots out the sun, "there's no reason in the world not to watch" a lunar eclipse, he said. "It's perfectly safe." "It will look like a bite has been taken out of the moon," said UCLA astronomer George O. Abell. The area in shadow will seem quite dark compared with the rest of the moon's face, he said. The dark, curving bite probably will appear a reddish, coppery tint as Earth's atmosphere bends some sunlight around into the shadow. The atmosphere allows more red light through than any other color. Humans have been fascinated by eclipses for centuries. "Aristotle reports that the shape of the shadow is curved on the moon and that's one of the earliest proofs ever cited that the Earth is round," Abell said. Other ancient Greeks used eclipses to deduce the size of the moon compared with Earth and the distance between the two bodies. Abell noted that lunar eclipses are actually less common than the rare solar eclipses. But they're visible everywhere it's nighttime, while solar eclipses can be seen only along a narrow track. A solar eclipse is on the way, at least for Siberia and a large chunk of the North Pacific, on July 31. Twenty-eight more lunar eclipses will occur this century, although only about half will be visible in North America.

Reagan Cabinet split over immigration policy

WASHINGTON (AP) — A dispute within the Reagan administration over admitting up to 1 million mostly low-wage foreign workers into the United States each year is stalling action on a new immigration policy. After two unsuccessful meetings on immigration, the Cabinet was scheduled to try again today to resolve the guest worker problem, as well as questions of issuing national work cards and relocating Cuban refugees. Administration sources who requested anonymity said Agriculture Secretary John Block and White House aide Martin Anderson are advocating a massive program to grant from 500,000 to 1 million temporary working permits annually — up from the current 30,000. The Labor Department opposes the expanded program on grounds that guest workers may decide to stay and compete for jobs against low-skilled Americans, the sources said. An administration task force recommended last month that President Reagan ask Congress to approve a pilot program to allow 50,000 guest workers, principally Mexicans, into the country each year. Block and Anderson are saying it is futile to erect strict legal barriers against a desire by American employers to hire willing aliens for menial jobs that U.S. citizens won't take, according to sources. Employers, who complain that current rules are too cumbersome and restrictive, are lobbying hard for more guest workers, the sources said. Anderson said reports that he is pushing for an expanded program are "not very accurate." He declined to discuss his proposals beyond saying, "I'm trying to present a wide range of options to the president. It's a very complicated issue." Part of the Cabinet debate concerns penalties for employers who hire illegal aliens and how to enforce the penalties. The task force recommended asking Congress to enact civil penalties, but this raised the question of how employers could distinguish illegal workers from those entitled to work. To facilitate identity, the task force recommended that all people entitled to work, regardless of citizenship, obtain and show employers a new type of Social Security card which would be difficult or impossible to forge.

Dogs, humans to join in Frisbee toss

Contestants may sign up the day of the contest. Winners here may compete in the 1981 World Frisbee Contest to be held at 10 a.m. Thursday in the Mike Carter Baseball Park at Tyler. Dogs who need to perfect their grip have only until 6:30 p.m. Monday when the city's Catch-n-Fetch World K-9 contest will start. This year's contest is being sponsored by the city, Wham-O and Cycle Dog Food. Ex-army officer pleads innocent at arraignment

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. (AP) — An ex-Army officer accused of selling military secrets to the Soviets pleaded innocent today to four counts of Espionage Act violations. Joseph George Helmich, 44, shackled at the ankles and wrists during his 10-minute arraignment, entered innocent pleas to one conspiracy count and three espionage charges through his court-appointed lawyer, Peter Dearing. Helmich is accused of selling secret codes and coding equipment in 1963 and 1964 while he was an Army warrant officer. The indictment charges that he was taught photography and secret writing by the Soviets and agreed to give them information in the event of "hostilities." U.S. Magistrate Howard T. Snyder set trial for Sept. 14 before U.S. District Susan Black and continued the \$500,000 bond set on Wednesday. While Helmich was being held at an undisclosed location, current and former co-workers gave contrasting pictures of him. Some described Helmich as a "very, very nice gentleman," but others said he collected gruesome pictures of Vietnam and Korean war casualties and seemed to get pleasure out of displaying them.

Helmich, who was arrested Wednesday at his Jacksonville home by the FBI, allegedly received \$131,000 from the Soviets and was made an honorary colonel in the Soviet army, much like someone might receive an honorary degree from a university, according to the indictment and a statement by U.S. Attorney Gary Betz. The indictment alleged that the bulk of the activity occurred between January 1963 and July 1964. But as late as last year, the charges said, Helmich met Soviet officials to claim money held for him as "future payment for past activities and information." He also agreed to provide information to the Soviets "in the event of anticipated hostilities," the charges said. Federal authorities refused to say whether the reference was to U.S.-Soviet hostilities or when the alleged pact was made. "The damage by the delivery of this type of information (codes) could be very, very grave," Betz said at a court hearing. "It could have given them (Soviets) the ability to make their own devices and decode messages at a time when this country was involved in hostilities in Vietnam." At a bond hearing, Helmich said he made about \$190 a week as a tile installer, and couldn't possibly make bond and asked for a court-appointed lawyer. Helmich said he, his wife and child came to Florida about six weeks ago from Niagara Falls, N.Y., "on a shoestring."

Lawrence Lawler, special agent in charge of the Jacksonville FBI office, said a federal grand jury had indicted Helmich Tuesday on three counts of espionage and one count of conspiracy. Each count carries a maximum penalty of life in prison, Lawler said.

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# Kidnap victims now more interested in growing up

CHOWCHILLA, Calif. (AP) — A plaque attached to a granite block outside city hall is the only outward sign that one of the strangest kidnappings in recent history took place near here five years ago today.

Above a list of 27 names, the plaque says, "With heartfelt thanks, the people of Chowchilla commemorate the safe return of 26 school children who were abducted July 15, 1976, and who escaped unharmed 30 hours later." The bus driver also escaped.

Most of the children weren't yet in their teens when their school bus was hijacked and they were locked in a sweltering moving van buried at a rock quarry.

Now, many are in high school, more interested in looking forward to growing up than looking back to the hours they spent as kidnap victims before digging their way to freedom.

The kidnapers are in prison. The driver, Ed Ray, still drives a Dairyland bus and grows cotton.

Thirteen of the children still live in this central California farming community of 5,000 residents. Eleven have moved, one is in college, and one was killed in an accident a month ago.

Those still here say they're treated no differently at home, in school or by the community because of the kidnapping. They say they're too busy with normal teen-age activities, such as sports, to think about the kidnapping very often.

"It doesn't bother me now," said Shelley Robison, 16, a high school junior active in volleyball. "I'm just one of the kids."

Darla Daniels, 15, was reminded that she told reporters after her safe return that she wanted to grow up to be a movie star.

"I did?" she asked. "I want to be a secretary now."

Laura Yazzi, 10, keeps busy with baseball and swimming. Sixth-grader Andy Gonzales is the only youngster among the 26 who still attends rural Dairyland School, where the group had been in a summer session before their abduction.

Madera County Sheriff Ed Bates, who led much of the investigation, has retired but is talking of running for the Legislature.

Several children expressed reluctance to have the kidnapers, three young men from prominent San Francisco Bay area families, released anytime soon from prison. As a precaution, the grandmother of one girl who has moved won't reveal where she now lives.

The kidnapers have said they didn't intend to harm the youngsters.

## Judge changes benches

MIAMI (AP) — A circuit judge nicknamed "Let-Em-Go-Joe" whose soft sentences and belief in the basic goodness of people drew outrage and a lawsuit from a crime-weary community, is moving to a court where almost everyone gets a second chance.

After nearly seven controversial years on the adult criminal bench, Dade County Circuit Judge Napoleon Joseph Durant Jr., 52, will become a juvenile court judge on July 27.

"I'm looking forward to juvenile court," he said after the move was announced this week. "I think I can really do some good there."

"All kids make mistakes," he said in an interview before his decision to transfer. "People scream at some of my sentences. But if one of their kids gets into trouble, they pray his case falls into my division because they know he'll get a fair trial and have a chance of getting probation."

Chief Administrative Judge Gerald Wetherington said the transfer wasn't the result of pressure or criticism from anyone.

"The criminal division is a really stressful division of the court, and sometimes we like to rotate that assignment around," he said.

Durant, who described himself as "compassionate — perhaps to a fault," has certainly felt stress, pressure and criticism as a criminal judge.

Miamians were angered in 1977 when he sentenced two Miami Dolphins football players, Don Reese and Randy Crowder, to probation and one year in the Dade County jail for a cocaine-selling conviction. He also withheld adjudication of guilt, so their records stayed clean.

Both men are now playing with other National Football League teams. Neither has been in trouble since his release. Durant said he feels vindicated in that case.

"I knew I was right — it wasn't even a guess," he said triumphantly. "If a year in jail doesn't teach someone a lesson, they'll never learn."

Last fall, he unleashed more fury when he sentenced a young man who admitted two killings to serve three years in a youthful offender program.

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# Iranian funds remain frozen

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — A federal appeals court has upheld millionaire H. Ross Perot's attempt to block a bank from transferring \$20 million to Iran, but says he can get the money himself only if an international tribunal agrees.

Perot, who claims Iran owes his Electronic Data Systems Corp. \$19 million, has been attempting to collect from \$20 million in Iranian assets on deposit in a U.S. bank.

In its ruling Wednesday, the 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals suspended Perot's \$19 million judgment for the Iranian government's breach of contract and told him that he must take his case to the international tribunal set up after the 52 U.S. hostages were released.

Pending a decision by the tribunal, the 5th Circuit upheld an injunction that bars Marine Midland Bank of New York City from transferring \$20 million in Iranian funds to the Federal Reserve Bank for return to Iran.

Iran's social security system contracted with Electronic Data for a data processing system. But after 18 months, Iran stopped payments in June 1978. EDS broke off the contract in January 1979 and filed suit for \$19 million.

On June 11, 1979, a federal judge in Dallas granted EDS the preliminary injunction that tied up a \$20 million certificate of deposit at Marine Midland pending settlement of the suit, which ended May 9, 1980, in victory for EDS.

Before Iran's appeal could be heard, the United States and Iran agreed on terms for the release of the hostages with a series of accords signed in Algeria on Jan. 19, 1981.

As part of the deal, then-President Carter ordered Iranian assets restored to Iran and swept aside court orders and lawsuits involving those assets. That action was recently upheld by the U.S. Supreme Court.

One of the accords signed in Algeria, the "Claims Declaration," provided for creation of the Iran-United States Claims Tribunal to settle contract claims between U.S. companies and Iran.

EDS argued that it won its judgment before the agreement that freed the hostages, and that its injunction freezing the \$20 million account predated Carter's freezing of all Iranian assets on Nov. 14, 1979.

But the 5th Circuit cited the U.S. Supreme Court's ruling upholding "the

President's power to suspend claims ... because the President's suspension of claims, tacitly approved by Congress, was essential to the resolution of a major international crisis."

"Because the United States does not seek nullification of attachments accomplished prior to the freeze, we preserve the status quo by permitting EDS' attachment of Iran funds ... pending litigation before the Claims Tribunal," the 5th Circuit said.

In February 1979, Perot bankrolled a commando-style prison break in Tehran to free two EDS employees imprisoned for three months on charges of official misconduct in connection with the computer contract.

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## Arco execs say too early to speculate on chief

**DALLAS — Officials of the Atlantic Richfield Corp. say it is too early to speculate when a permanent chief will be named for its oil and gas subsidiary, Arco Gas and Oil Co., following the shotgun slayings of President William Keeler and his wife.**

Robert E. Wycoff, an executive vice president of Atlantic Richfield, was named Keeler's temporary replacement on Monday pending a search for a permanent appointee. Keeler was promoted to president of Arco Oil and Gas in May as part of a company reorganization.

Keeler joined Arco as an engineer at Midland, in June, 1949. He was promoted to field engineer in February, 1951; to district engineer in October, 1954; and regional engineer in April, 1956. Keeler was transferred from Arco's Permian District headquarters in Midland, to Dallas in April, 1961.

The bodies of the 53-year-old executive and his wife, Anita Faye Keeler, were found in a hallway in the family's North Dallas home last weekend by a daughter, Barbara Keeler, 27.

Keeler was dead of shotgun wounds in the head and neck. His 49-year-old wife died later in the day during
