BLANKS ARRIVE FOR SEED LOAN

APPLICATIONS BEING RECEIVED AT FIRST NATIONAL BANK FOR CROP PRODUCTION LOANS

Application blanks together with regulations for the crop production loans to be made farmers by the Regional Crop Production Loan Office of the R. F. C. have been received by the Ochiltree county committee. Applications for loans may be made at the First National Bank.

Local bankers predict that very few loans will be made to farmers in this vicinity unless present requirements of the R. F. C. are modified. The ruling that will make impossible for our farmers to get loans on all lands farmed and that other crops than that for which a loan is made be farmed, and that no land is already under lien, then waiver to this lien must be obtained in favor of the R. F. C.

These loans are made to farmers who cannot secure credit elsewhere and are otherwise eligible. To obtain a loan, the applicant must agree to the money for the purchase of supplies necessary for crop production for 1933 on the land described in the application.

The maximum amount permitted any one borrower in 1933 is \$300. To qualify for a loan, borrowers must agree to reduce their acreage of cash crops 30 per cent below their 1932 acreage. As in 1932, a first lien on the 1933 crop is required. Loans are to be repaid on or before October 31, 1933.

The regulations require each borrower to agree to plant a garden for the use and to plant sufficient acreage of feeds crops to provide necessary livestock feed. A new regulation this year provides that borrower may use a part of his land for the purpose of summer fallowing.

Before making application for a loan a borrower must have the following information in hand:

1. A correct legal description of land controlled together with acreage to be planted in each crop, and acreage of each crop grown last year.

2. Statement of all indebtedness (check with mortgage records).

3. A list of all livestock and machinery owned (not to be mortgaged).

4. Amount of loan to be used for: (a) seed, (b) feed, (c) fuel, (d) repairs and miscellaneous supplies.

5. Statement of feed, seed and manure on hand.

6. Farmers who borrowed money from the Secretary of Agriculture last year and for any reason were unable to pay a part or all of the loan, may, if considered worthy, borrow again giving a new mortgage to secure both the old and the new loan. These loans are not in any sense charity advances. They are made in a strictly businesslike manner to help those farmers who cannot secure credit to continue operations and are willing to reduce their acreage of cash crops. Borrowers this year will be required to pay filing fees on mortgages and carry fees on applications.

WELFARE ASSN. MAKES REPORT

REPORTS AT MONTHLY MEETING SHOW MANY FAMILIES HELPED; FUNDS ARE GETTING LOW

The regular monthly meeting of the Perryton United Welfare association was held at the association's quarters on Main street Monday afternoon with Mrs. Jas. E. Barbour, chairman, presiding. One of the outstanding reports of the meeting was that of B. B. Kent, finance chairman and treasurer. Mr. Kent's report showed that the balance of cash on hand was very small, in fact the welfare funds are practically exhausted. The directors present voted to request the Chamber of Commerce to take charge of and complete the solicitation of funds for this purpose. A partial canvass of the city was made last fall but it was very incomplete, in fact few firms but merchants were solicited and many of these were missed. Practically no professional men, city or county employees, school teachers or persons deriving their living from public funds have been asked for contributions. The same is true of salaried employees. A study of the list of contributors to the charity program in Perryton this year shows that in most instances, the ones that have given are business houses, many of which are operating with a necessary overhead expense which makes anything but a loss impossible. It is the intention to give all an opportunity to give. The association expects an increase in appeals for help owing to the fact that the work on the highways is over and Federal Relief funds are practically exhausted.

Mrs. F. L. Garrett, Red Cross Chairman for Ochiltree county, made a report on the number of families helped. The Red Cross works hand in hand with the United Welfare, in fact they are just the same as one. The Red Cross have given assistance to 63 families for a total of 629 articles of wearing apparel. Garments cut from materials totaled 239, 76 of these being finished when delivered, and 159 were made by the party helped. Ready-to-wear garments such as sweaters, etc., numbers 384.

In addition to those helped with Red Cross materials, Mrs. Barbour reported that 70 families had been given assistance for the Welfare association's funds and materials. Aid form the association included groceries, fuel, medicine, clothing, cash, etc.

After this week, the opening of the headquarters on Wednesdays will be discontinued. It will be open on Saturday afternoon of each week as usual. Directors present were Mrs. Jas. E. COUNTY SALARY TO 1932 LEVEL

ACTION OF COMMISSIONERS IN FEBRUARY RESCINDED IN SALARY HIKE TO 1932 SCALE

The commissioners court in special session Thursday, rescinded their action taken in February lowering salaries of county officials and placed all salaries back on the January 1, 1932 scale. This action meant a salary increase to nearly every official, the only ones not affected being the commissioners salary which remained at \$50.00 per month.

Following is a list of the ex-official salaries to be paid to county officials following Thursday's action: county attorney, \$500; sheriff, \$1,000 plus tax collection fees; Del Taliaferro, deputy, \$1,500; county agent, \$1,000; county judge, \$1,320; county clerk, \$1,600; county treasurer, 1 1/2 per cent on all money received and paid out.

Small Amount Moisture

Rainfall Received During 1933 Less Than Quarter Inch; 10 Here This Week

Less than a quarter of an inch of moisture has been received during 1933, now two and a half months old, according to Jack Allen who keeps the official government rainfall records here. The total precipitation Tuesday from rain and snow amounted to .10 of an inch, which is the only moisture for the month.

The February total was .08 of an inch, falling on February 26. The January fall of .03 accounts for the 1933 total of .21 of an inch.

Less than three inches have been received during the last six and one-half months it was revealed. The fall during September was .92; October .39; November .25; and December 1.21. Adding this amount to the 21 received this year, it brings the total to 2.98 inches since September 1.

NEWS BY THE MINISTERIAL ALLIANCE

THE DANGERS OF MODERATE DRINKING

By Richard C. Cabot, M. D., for many years Chief of Staff of the Massachusetts General Hospital and Professor of Medicine in Harvard University

Forty years ago I was almost ignorant about alcohol as most wets appear to be today. I supposed it could stimulate the circulation and the brain, and so help to pull a man through pneumonia or typhoid. It took years of watching its effects in those and other germ diseases to teach me, as experience has now taught almost all intelligent physicians, that alcohol does harm and not good in infectious diseases. Forty years ago almost all the physicians at the Massachusetts General Hospital believed that alcohol stimulated the heart and the powers of resistance in fevers. Now I don't know one who believes that. The medical use of alcohol as a stimulant has been given up in the better hospitals, because today we know that it is not a stimulant, but a narcotic.

We used to think that moderate drinking—"temperance", as the wets call it—did no harm. Now we know that it is responsible for an enormous loss of life through automobile accidents on our streets. One cocktail is enough to impair dexterity and quickness of hand and foot, to spoil the man's judgment about speeds and distances, on which safe driving depends. Most of the "drunken drivers" arrested every week on our streets are not "drunk" in the ordinary sense. They can walk and talk well enough; they have imbibed only a moderate amount of liquor. They are temperate drinkers; but they are the most dangerous of all drinkers in this fast-moving age. The man who is really drunk—the excessive drinker—rarely tries to drive a motor car. It is the moderate drinkers who do most harm. They killed in 1931 more people in the United States than typhoid fever, diphtheria, and influenza put together.

The effects of alcohol in killing people when much of it is taken within a short time are usually laid to "bad liquor". This is very rarely proved. Almost all deaths from drinking are due to too much "good liquor".

Prohibition has not stopped "moderate drinking" on the part of many persons. Hence, we have still to fight the enormous evils of "temperance" and "moderation". The evidence of excessive drinking shown in cirrhosis of the liver and in alcoholic insanity following repeated attacks of delirium tremens are also with us, but have decreased since prohibition, even when enforced as little as the wets permit us to enforce it.

The wets complain of bootlegging, of riches and power in the hands of criminals, of the bribing of officials, and the corruption of those who ought to enforce the law. But who corrupts them? Who gives the criminals power to corrupt them? Of course, it is the wets. They shoot holes in prohibition, and then complain that it isn't bullet-proof. They pay bootleggers to bribe policemen, and then they complain that there is much corruption in the business.

Surely this is a new trick in the public discussion of a serious matter. I never knew people themselves to cause an evil with their own hands, their own money, their own throats, and then go on the stump and complain of it. I never knew a man to pull up a railroad track, burn the ties and twist the rails, and then complain because his train "wouldn't run smoothly over the track". I never knew a man to pour water on all fires in his house, and then complain "that they had all gone out". I never knew a citizen to bribe a policeman to stay off his beat, and then complain that the policeman was not on it.

That's the wet side of this case, and the only argument that they've got—that things are just as bad as they have made them. Poor wets! Their logic is almost as bad as their habits!

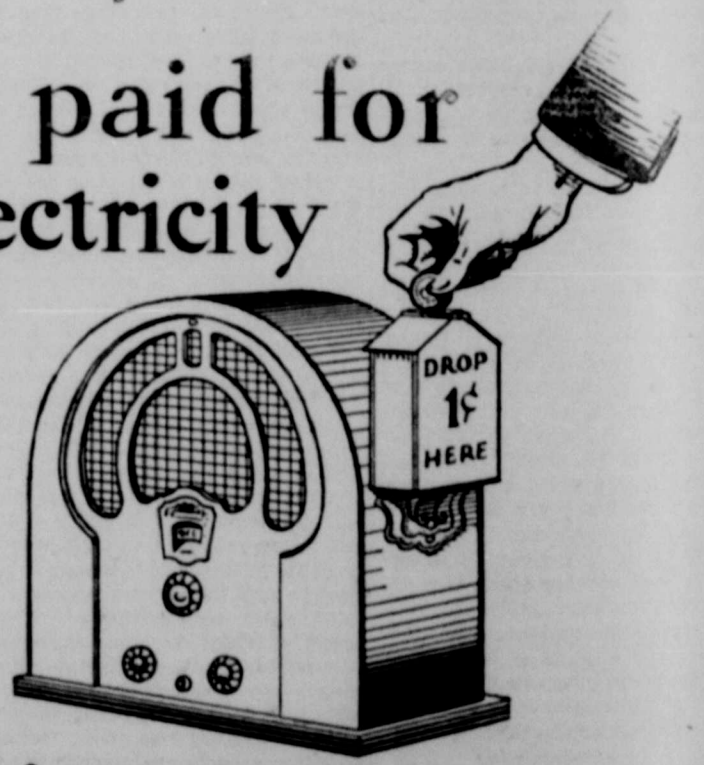

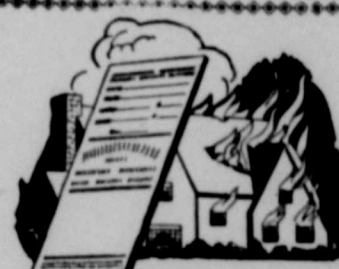

REPRESENTATIVE ROGERS WRITES FROM CAPITOL

March 13, 1933

Dear Home Folks:

Again I take this way of sending acknowledgements to all who have so kindly written me and to those who have not received personal replies I ask to consider my position. One has to be constantly on the alert lest something get by unnoticed and I have one or two measures in which I am particularly interested and the only way I know is to keep plugging away.

I have received a great number of post cards and letters in regard to the new state. So far everyone who has written in reference to a new state has favored it with one exception. So my friends in Canadian, you enjoy this unique distinction up to now.

Speaking personally, it is becoming more and more apparent to me that our section of the state will ever be at a disadvantage here in the legislature because of the lack of understanding by the great majority of the legislators as to our conditions and needs.

I do not agree with old Tack as to the old timers views of the new state question. An extract from a letter by Mr. J. G. Rhodes of Tulsa says: "I am not in your district, but have been living on the plains for 33 years and will say I am among the many who favor a new state called West Texas or any name just so we get the new state".

I call your attention to the fact that the people in the Oklahoma strip are looking forward to the time when this state will be formed with the view of attaching that area to the new state.

Just to give you an idea as to what I have to do here, will say that just now there has been laid on my desk in a batch, 11 telegrams and I might say that the fact that these telegrams were identical as to wording they were not so effective as if they had been spontaneous. Will say that I appreciate them however, and need all of the help that I can get and though I do not always agree with all of the views of the letters that people write me, I sincerely appreciate hearing from you, and trust that all who do not agree with me, will take my record as a whole and accord me credit in being honest in my intentions even though my ideas may not correspond in every particular to yours.

I have no intention of becoming a "war correspondent" but will leave that for the press and insist that you support your local papers for the news of Austin.

A REAL PRESIDENT NOW

Now that we have a fullblooded Hollander for a president why not call a four year moratorium or holiday on looking down on those wooden shoe people from way down there below the level of the ocean?

Roosevelt's people left Holland over three hundred years ago and came to New York while mine had left that country a hundred years before and moved to Germany. My people being Mennonites, did not believe in war, and the Holland government demanding military service, they sent a committee to the German Kaiser and made arrangements to live there exempt from military service for two hundred years. They settled in the Hanover province on the river Wixel. When that two hundred years had expired and the German government demanded military service they sent a committee to the Russian ruler and made arrangements to live there exempt from military service for two hundred years. When that time was up my folks carried me from the Russian recruiting officers in the tall blue-stem grass of Kansas.

I indit war as a necessary evil for the time being. It is antique; a carry over from heathenism and savagery and does not blend with our twentieth century boasted civilization and christianity. We preach harmony, peace and love but practice hatred, destruction and murder.

I lost a son-in-law in service during the World war and a son saw service in France where his health was impaired, from which he never fully recovered. I think we glorify war too much by arraying the officers in glittering uniforms; pay them big salaries; decorate them with medals for bravery and pension them for life. In that way it seems to me we nurse the war spirit as those officers constitute walking advertisements; attractions and advocates of militarism. Is it not like paying a premium to keep militarism bolstered up instead of discouraging it in every possible way?
