MC Exes Do Well In Area Bowl Games

Three graduates from Motley County shined in the high school bowl games played recently, representing Motley County High School well before thousands of fans.

Shawn Bearden and John Douglas Russell played in the 34th Annual Greenbelt Bowl and helped their East team to an 18-14 victory over the West team.

Tim Shannon played in the All-Star game in Fort Worth on July 27th. He played on nearly all of the kicking teams, and was captain of the kickoff return team.

Shannon was given the ball on offense only three times and gained nine yards. He scored one touchdown and came up six inches short of another.

Bearden, who virtually took control of the Greenbelt Bowl game, ran a five-yard quarter back keeper around left end with 1:06 left in the game giving the East squad a victory before 2,500 fans.

A Bearden to Brian Taylor hookup was good for 61 yards on the East's first possession, but Bearden fumbled to kill his team's only chance for a score in the first half.

But Bearden found Taylor, from Hereford, twice in the fourth quarter - once for a 40-yard touchdown pass and then a 22-yarder on a fourth down and 20 situation that set up Bearden's winning score.

Bearden, a 5'9" 175-pound quarterback from Matador was given the Outstanding Offensive Back award for his efforts.

For Bearden, it was a goat to hero night. After fumbling away the East's first drive, he threw a pass over the middle on the East's second possession that West outside linebacker James Morton, Eastland, intercepted and returned for a 40-yard touchdown.

Morton missed the extra point attempt, leaving the score 6-0, West, early in the first quarter.

The game stayed 6-0 throughout the first half, with the West running back Earl Wiley, Crosbyton, supplying most of the action, carrying 15 times for 56 yards.

The West threatened in the second quarter, moving to the East 15, but the East defense held Wiley for no gain two straight times and Morton missed the field goal.

Morton recovered Rod Goodwin's, Stinnet,

fumbled punt at midfield in the third quarter to set up the West's second score. West quarterback Marc Klinkerman, Iowa Park, completed a couple of passes and mixed in carries by Wiley and David Weatherston, Clarendon, for two first downs. Wiley culminated the drive with a fancy 12-yard scoring sweep with 6:40 left in the third quarter.

Klinkerman hit Ronnie Strange, Amarillo, on the two-point conversion to put West ahead, 14-0.

East coach Gary Howard tried Kip Cummins, Hollis, Okla., at quarterback for a drive but after he came up short, Bearden was back in -- this time to stay.

Bearden engineered an eight-play, 61-yard scoring march capped by Kerry McGill's, Marietta, Okla., two-yard TD plunge.

The key play in the drive was a 15-yard strike to Chris Farrell, Amarillo, who went high to grab the pass in a crowd. Bearden gained 15 yards rushing in the drive.

The East went for the two-point conversion, but West lineman Trent Shelby, Hollis, Okla., and Mark Breeding, Mangum, Okla., sacked Bearden, leaving the score 14-6 with :21 seconds remaining in the third quarter.

The East defense, sensing its team's offensive rally, shut down the West unit time after time in the second half. And Bearden made a big play on the defensive side, intercepting a Klinkerman pass at the East 40 and returning it 22 yards to the West 38.

From there he hit Taylor on the 40-yarder after a nifty fake that Bearden slipped behind his hip before throwing to Raylor streaking up the right sideline.

The West held Bearden again on the two-point conversion, leaving the score 14-12, West, with 7:04 remaining.

The game got a little wish-washy here. First Klinkerman was ruled for a fumble on a sack, giving the ball to the East on the West's 28, but Paul Adams, Amarillo, got it back for the West, breaking the Bearden-Taylor connection with a clean pick-off.

But big John Burns, Vernon, knocked down a Klinkerman toss from his tackle position and came up with the third consecutive turnover,

giving the East possession at the West 18.

Bearden and his determined East mates didn't make it four straight. Bearden hit Taylor on the 22-yarder that set up the winning score.

The West had 14 first downs on 112 yards rushing, and 11-23 passing for 108 yards. The East picked up 14 first downs on 52 rushing yards, and eight of 19 for 168 yards in the air.

The West was intercepted twice, lost one fumble and was penalized eight times for 80 yards. The East lost three fumbles, was intercepted twice and was penalized six times for 52 yards.

The West punted four times for 142 yards, 35.5 average, while the East punted four times for 121 yards, 30.2 yards a punt.

Scott Lewis, West center from Littlefield, was presented the Outstanding Offensive Lineman Award from First State Bank; Toby Craft, West defensive back from Post, was named the Outstanding Defensive Back, awarded by Bron Auto Supply; Glenn Branch, East guard-tackle from Electra, won the Outstanding Defensive Lineman Award, given by Kiwanis. Bearden's offensive back trophy was awarded by the Childress Index.

Morton was given the Hoot Voyles Award for performance on and off the field during the week. He was given the trophy by Scott Tankersley, last year's Voyles recipient, who was in town from Amarillo all week for Greenbelt activities.

In the Greenbelt Queen contest, Penny Blanset, of Henrietta, Okla., was named queen, Aimee Wyatt, from Childress was first runner-up, Stacia Turvey, of Marietta, Okla., was second runner-up, and Spunky Goree, of Amarillo, won Miss Congeniality.

Driving Caution Urged As Kids Return To School

The summer vacation will soon be over and thousands of youngsters will be starting back to school, many of those for the first time. Last year in Texas the pedestrian fatalities accounted for 732 traffic deaths according to Major Vernon Cawthon, Regional Commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

He said, "Motorists need to slow down as

they drive through school zones and in and around school areas."

He added, "Those big yellow buses will also be back on our streets and highways, and Texas law requires the driver of a vehicle meeting or overtaking a school bus displaying red flashing warning lights that is in the process of loading or unloading passengers to stop until the school bus starts moving, the

red lights are no longer flashing, or the bus driver directs motorist to proceed."

Cawthon said, "It is most important that drivers observe speed limits in school zones and the school bus loading laws for the protection of our children, because no one wants to be responsible for the death or injury of a young child."

Social Security News

A person who pays a household employee at least \$50 in cash during a 3-month quarter is considered an employer for Social Security purposes. The employer is required to deduct Social Security taxes and report the wages paid, including cash payments made to cover the cost of bus fare, meals or a room.

So that necessary reports may be made accurately and on time, employers should keep a record of the name, address, and Social Security number of each household worker, as well as the amount of wages paid. For 1983 both employer and employee are required to pay Social Security taxes of 6.70 percent on cash wages up to \$35,700. Reporting forms and instructions on how to complete them can be obtained from the Internal Revenue Service Center.

There are a number of important exceptions to Social Security coverage for household employees. For example, payment for household work performed by a husband or wife or by a child under

21 is not covered under Social Security. However, wages paid to a parent for similar work may be covered under certain circumstances.

Employees of a hotel or rooming house are not subject to the requirement that a household worker earn at least \$50 during a calendar quarter; all wages paid these employees must be reported.

Household workers employed on a farm that is operated for profit comprise another special group. Wages paid these employees must be reported if they amount to \$150 or more for the year. Wages must also be reported if the household employee works at least 20 days during the year on a time basis -- by the hour, day, week or month--even if total annual wages amount to less than \$150.

QUESTION: Is a baby sitter considered a household employee covered by Social Security?

ANSWER: For Social Security purposes, a baby sitter is considered a household employee, and wages must be reported if they amount to \$50 or more in cash

during a 3-month calendar quarter.

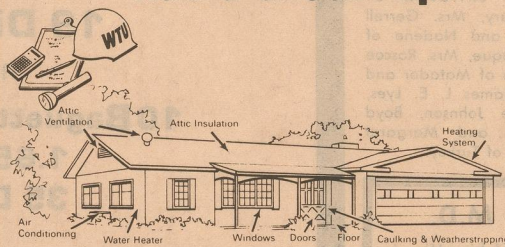

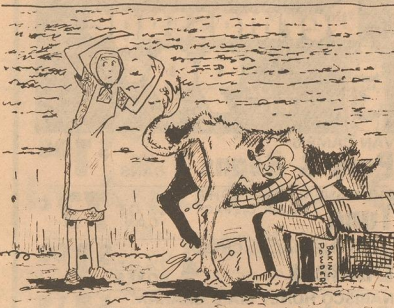

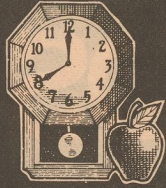
