\$258,053 Budget Set By School Board

PERMANENT SCHOOL FUND HELPS COUNTY STUDENTS

The Kent County Permanent School Fund now has about a third of a million dollars in it, County Judge D. J. Young said this week.

Most of this money is invested one way or another, and the interest it earns is allocated out to the schools attended by the county children. This past year there was more than \$14,000.00 paid to the schools from this fund.

At present there are 409 school children residing in this county and they attend seven different schools, and for each child, his school received the

sum of \$35.03. Here is the way it was apportioned, according to county school records:

Jayton School 277 children, \$9,703.31.
Girard, 89 students 3,117.67.
Peacock, 1 and 35.03.
Spur 16 and 560.48.
Rutan four and 140.12.
Justiceburg 2 for 70.06.

This is all from interest money, they never dig into the permanent fund.

The Kent County School land is located in Dawson and Martin County, and most of the revenue is from oil.

Here below is a little article that Dean Young picked up in his mail which he thinks is a pretty good criterion for all office holders to go by. Read it and see what you think:

DON'T ACT as a committee of one. Remember that your authority lies in your membership on the board, council or court.

DEVOTE sufficient time and energy to your job. If you find that your business, social life or health make it impossible to carry out your obligations, step aside for someone else.

DON'T USE your official position for personal gain or to promote your own interest.

DON'T LET honest differences of opinion degenerate into personality conflicts.

VISIT OTHER communities, particularly those that have the reputation of being well-run. If your community is about to undertake a special project, inspect similar projects in other communities.

KEEP THE public informed. Issue frequent public releases, accept invitations to speak before local groups, hold open meetings, issue an attractive, readable annual report.

NEWS REPORTERS are the custodians of the people's right to know. Their duty is to report the news, favorable or unfavorable. Cooperate with them.

NEVER ACCEPT gifts or favors from individuals or firms doing business with your community.

REPRESENT ALL the people in your community, not just your friends, neighbors or business associates.

EXPRESS your honest convictions although you are in the minority, but support majority decisions.

DON'T BE misled by the local demands of special interest groups. When in doubt, ask yourself: "Is this in the best interests of the whole community?"

REMEMBER that there are at least two sides to every question. Listen politely, but reserve making a decision until you have all the facts.

DON'T TRY to be an expert in all phases of your local government. Seek the advice of local experts.

COOPERATE with your school officials, other public agencies and with all citizen groups working in the best interests of your community.

DON'T Be content to just "hold office." Use your office to provide the kind of dedicated, creative, forceful leadership that your citizens have a right to expect.

The Jayton School Board in a special meeting Tuesday night, adopted a budget of operation that called for the collection and spending of about a quarter of a million dollars for the coming school term, which amounts to, in round figures about a thousand dollars per child.

Also they employed Don Hall of O'Donnell to teach Spanish, or rather offered him the position, Hall, who comes from Boston, Mass. met with the board, and made a qualified application for the job. He is talking to two other schools, and will make a decision the last of the week. The decision to offer him the job came on a 5-1 split vote.

Also a 4th grade teacher was offered a position, a young lady whose husband is in the service.

They voted to pay \$200 or not more than one third of the cost of a pair of livestock scales for the use of Kent County FFA and 4H club boys.

The board voted to have Dr. A. R. Mancille give physical examinations to the school athletes.

The matter of transportation was discussed, and especially as it pertained to the ones in the far lying areas, off of the bus lines.

There was no one present for the hearing on the budget except the editor of the Jayton Chronicle.

SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS

TIME FOR SEEDING COVER CROPS ON FALLOWED LAND

Now is the time to begin plans for seeding cover crops on cotton land or on land that has been fallowed this summer.

A good cover of small grains or winter legumes will decrease the chances of erosion during the winter and spring.

Crops which may be planted now that are suitable for cover crops are rye, vetch and Austrian winter peas. The crops may be planted alone or mixed. Seeding rates for peas are 25

pounds drilled or 15 pounds in rows; rye, 45 pounds per acre drilled; vetch 15 pounds per acre drilled and 8 pounds per acre in rows. In order to provide maximum protection, the cover crop should be seeded anytime from now until Nov. 1.

Cover crops have several advantages besides erosion control. They will catch and hold snow and other winter moisture that falls. They can be used for winter grazing provided enough growth is left to prevent erosion.

Cover crops and their residues, when returned to the soil, will improve tilth and help maintain productivity by the addition of organic matter. The legumes such as winter peas and vetch will also add nitrogen to the soil.

Soil Conservation Service personnel assisting the Duck Creek Soil Conservation District will be glad to give producers desiring to seed cover crops any help possible.

Anyone wishing to take advantage of the benefits of a cover crop who needs any further information concerning their use may get it by contacting SCS personnel, the county agent or the ASCS office.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWELVE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 19 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas to add a new Section 1-A, which shall be known as Section 1-A, which shall read as follows:

Section 1-A. The Legislature may authorize the governing body of any county bordering on the Gulf of Mexico or the tidal waters of the Gulf of Mexico to regulate and restrict the speed, parking and travel of motor vehicles on the beaches available to the public by virtue of public right and the littoral rights of such beachfront.

Nothing in this amendment shall increase the rights of any riparian or littoral landowner with regard to the beaches available to the public by virtue of public right or submerged lands.

The Legislature may not enact laws not inconsistent with this Section which it may deem necessary to enforce and administer the provisions contained herein.

Should the Legislature enact legislation in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such legislation shall not be having the force of law until the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1962, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to delegate limited police powers to any county bordering on the Gulf of Mexico or the tidal waters of the Gulf of Mexico to regulate and restrict the speed, parking and travel of motor vehicles on the beaches available to the public by virtue of public right and the littoral rights of such beachfront."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to delegate limited police powers to any county bordering on the Gulf of Mexico or the tidal waters of the Gulf of Mexico to regulate and restrict the speed, parking and travel of motor vehicles on the beaches available to the public by virtue of public right and the littoral rights of such beachfront."

Sec. 2. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of the state.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TEN ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 12 proposing an amendment to the Constitution so as to provide that state employees may be employed in an advisory capacity or appointed to serve as a consultant or on an advisory committee, or as a member of a Public School Board provided they are not members of the teaching profession, and may receive reimbursement of expenses, with other expenses of this nature, and of the Federal Government, with the approval of the administrative head of the state department or agency of the state, or of the governing board of the institution, which such employee is employed and provided there is no conflict of interest.

Section 1. That Section 33 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

Section 33. The accounting officers of this state shall not receive any pay or salary for any position of honor, trust or profit, under this state or the United States, except as provided in this constitution. Provided, that this restriction as to the drawing or paying of warrants upon the Treasury shall not apply to officers of the National Guard of Texas, the National Guard Reserve of the United States, nor to enlisted men of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Organized Reserve of the United States, nor to retired officers of the United States Army, Navy, Marine Corps, Air Force and Coast Guard, and retired warrant officers of the United States Army, Navy, Marine Corps, Air Force and Coast Guard.

Section 2. Subsection (b) of Section 33 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows:

"(b) Each county and any other political subdivision of this state shall have the right and the Legislature may enact appropriate regulatory laws to provide for and administer a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for its elected and appointive officers and employees; provided same is authorized by a majority vote of the qualified voters voting in such election of the county or other political subdivision. No person shall qualify for benefits unless he shall have served in such capacity for at least twelve (12) years, except for those persons otherwise qualified prior to the effective date of this Amendment. The amount contributed by the

Air Force and Coast Guard. It is further provided, that state employees may serve in an advisory capacity or be appointed to serve as a consultant or on an advisory committee, or as a member of a Public School Board provided they are not members of the teaching profession, and may receive reimbursement of expenses, with other expenses of this nature, and of the Federal Government, with the approval of the administrative head of the state department or agency of the state, or of the governing board of the institution, which such employee is employed and provided there is no conflict of interest."

Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of the state.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary Proclamation for said election and have the same published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of the state.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 26 proposing an amendment to Subsection (b) of Section 61 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas to read as follows:

"(b) Each county and any other political subdivision of this state shall have the right and the Legislature may enact appropriate regulatory laws to provide for and administer a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Program. No person shall qualify for benefits unless he shall have served in such capacity for at least twelve (12) years, except for those persons otherwise qualified prior to the effective date of this Amendment. The amount contributed by the

county to such fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of a such person, and shall not exceed at any time five per centum (5%) of the compensation paid to such person by the county and State."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1962, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing retirement, disability, and death benefits for elected and appointive officers and employees of counties and political subdivisions who have served in such capacity for twelve (12) years or more."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing retirement, disability, and death benefits for elected and appointive officers and employees of counties and political subdivisions who have served in such capacity for twelve (12) years or more."

Sec. 3. Should the Legislature enact legislation in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment, such legislation shall not be having the force of law until the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1962, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing retirement, disability, and death benefits for elected and appointive officers and employees of counties and political subdivisions who have served in such capacity for twelve (12) years or more."
