This and That

It takes a lot of work to produce a news paper once a week, and it would require more space than this column to explain every step and purpose involved.

However, on the assumption that a partial explanation will be of some interest to those who don't know about the inner workings of a newspaper, here is a blow-by-blow account of how a news story get in print:

First, the information is put into understandable and (we hope) interesting form. Some people bring in neatly typed items which require little or no editing and need only a heading.

Other information is written by pen or pencil and often it is difficult to make out the spelling of names or other words. When this is the case, the paper checks to find out the proper spelling, etc.

Most articles, of course, are written by the two Pilot writers who get the information over the phone, by personal interviews or covering meetings.

The writers give all articles to one of the publishers who carefully checks them before giving them to the linotype operator. A linotype machine is sort of a huge typewriter which converts slugs of lead into type. The operator "sets" the article the reporter has written and it comes out in lead type usually one column wide and whatever length the story runs. If more than one-column width is desired, the machine can be set to produce it.

After articles have been set in type, ink is applied by means of a roller. Next, proofs are run off by applying narrow sheets of paper to the inked type.

In the next step, the proofs are carefully checked for accuracy in spelling, punctuation, etc. After this is done, the type is placed in forms representing what eventually will be page 1, 2, 3 and so on. When the layout man is satisfied with the appearance of all the pages (news and advertising) and he has made everything fit, the forms are placed on the press which automatically applies the proper amount of ink to produce the finished pages.

As the pages come off the press, they are folded to make up complete newspapers.

This is a "once over light" description of how a paper is produced but perhaps it is apparent from this account that much detailed work goes into it.

That's why we appreciate receiving articles on Monday or Tuesday, or by Wednesday noon at the latest, to give us time to put out a good paper every week.

PIRATES TAKE SECOND IN TOURNAMENT

The Aransas County High School Pirates finished in second place in the 10th annual "Toast of the Coast" basketball tournament on Dec. 29 and 30.

Kenedy finished in first place by beating the Pirates in the final play offs by a score of 58-41.

The Pirates earned their second place title by winning two and losing one in a three-game session.

WHOOPIING CRANE TO BE RETURNED

Rosie the whooping crane is returning to the San Antonio Zoo from New Orleans, it was announced Tuesday, and a male friend is coming with her.

Property of the U.S. Department of Interior Bureau of Sport Fisheries, Rosie was taken to the Audubon Park Zoo in New Orleans in 1964.

It was hoped she would mate with a male whooper there, but the two failed to produce offspring.

It was recently decided to return the female to San Antonio where she had stayed for nine years after being injured in West Texas in 1956.

Another male whooper is being shipped with Rosie, and it is hoped that San Antonio conditions may bring about a mating.

In the spring of 1956 Rosie began the migration northward from Aransas Wildlife Refuge. Near Lampassas, she hit a high wire and fell.

She was later captured and brought to San Antonio. San Antonio Zoo Director Fred Stark said whooping cranes which are almost extinct, live to be half a century old.

Tips Are Now Included With Wages

Persons who get a substantial part of their income in the form of tips may now expect to receive higher social security monthly benefits when they retire, according to H. M. Cleveland, social security district manager in Corpus Christi.

Now under the social security law cash tips received by employees can count toward social security benefits if the tips amount to at least \$20 a month from one employer.

Before, only the regular wages of these employees were credited to their social security record. Now, since Jan. 1, 1966, all of their job income, both tips and wages, can be credited to their social security records.

"To account for the tips he receives," Cleveland explained, "an employee must give a written report to his employer within 10 days after the end of each month. This report should show the amount of the tips he received during the previous month."

Since social security benefits are based on the worker's earnings under social security, higher reported earnings mean higher benefits to the wage earner and his family, upon retirement or disability; or to his survivors, if the worker dies.

Further information about the requirement that tips must now be reported can be secured from any office of the Internal Revenue Service or the Social Security Administration.

Laguna Construction Awarded Contract For Roadside Parks

Nov. Bond Sales Total \$4,213

During the month of November, United States Bond sales in Aransas county amounted to \$4,213, according to a report received from Fred Bracht, chairman of the county Savings Bonds Committee. Through November the county has purchased \$37,723 in Savings Bonds and this is 63 per cent of the 1966 goal of \$60,000.

During the first 11 months of 1966, Savings Bond sales in Texas amounted to \$139,381,146 which is 94 per cent of the state's goal of \$147.5 million. This is an increase of 5.2 per cent over the same period last year.

"Nationally, the sale of Series E and H Savings Bonds during November amounted to \$368 million. These sales were the highest for any November in 11 years; nine per cent higher than a year ago. The January-November sales were \$4,488 million, seven per cent over sales for the first 11 months a year ago and a 10-year record for any January-November sales since 1956," Chairman Bracht stated.

Courthouse To Be Debt Free Early In 1967

The Aransas County Courthouse, which was built in 1956 at a cost of \$393,393, will be free of debt in the near future, according to County Judge John D. Wendell.

The announcement was made at a Commissioners Court meeting after the commissioners voted to pay off \$92,000 in courthouse and jail bonds on Dec. 30, 1966, leaving only \$3,000 to be paid this month.

—Approved bonds for the following county officials who were sworn into office Jan. 3: Judge Wendell, County Treasurer Etoil (Duck) Harrist Eller, Commissioners Sparks and Wofford and County Clerk W. E. Beasley.

—Appointed Charlie Barfield to succeed Ray Boone in taking care of the waterworks system at the old Radar Station site. Boone is moving from a home at the site.

—Authorized Sheriff Joe Earl Hunt to make a concerted effort to apprehend people who have been dumping garbage and trash at Rattlesnake Point and other places instead of using the Fulton or Rockport dumping grounds.

—Granted a request by Fire Marshal Elva Mullinax to provide the funds necessary to paint the inside and outside of the Volunteer Fire Department station.

Mullinax termed as erroneous a recent published report that he had asked the county for gasoline expenses in driving to fires. He said his request was for gas expenses in driving to places to investigate fire hazards and sites where brush fires were to be set. The county denied this request.

I have decided, resolved if you will, that during 1967, I am going to try to be more physically fit, more alert mentally, and more closely associated with the wonders of nature. These things seem to go hand-in-hand, and I believe they can all be accomplished at one time. Long brisk walks in the woods or along a deserted beach should go a long way toward achieving my goal.

The need for the walking I needn't elaborate on. Doctors say walking is one of the finest of exercises, and I spend most of my time behind a desk or at the wheel of my car. While at my desk, I find myself wishing I had a more efficient intercom so I wouldn't have to walk the four or five steps to the door to ask my secretary to come in and take dictation. When I am going as far as a block, I jump in the car and exercise my right foot on the accelerator and guide the car (I have power steering to help with that though).

I sit in front of a TV and watch 22 superbly conditioned men play football and think of myself as I was when I could play every minute of a game, then dance half the night, while I fuss and grumble because I have to walk all the way across the room to get a cup of coffee. I think I could probably stand a little exercise.

I hope that on these long walks by myself I will be able to observe wildlife and get closer to nature. My job, of course, requires that I stay in close touch with the things our field people are doing in game and fish research and management, but this is not enough.

A person needs to be there. Nothing is more rewarding, nor fascinating, than watching wild things at work and at play. Watching a sandpiper picking his way down the beach on twinkling feet or a squirrel chattering and fussing as he searches for a nut that meets his rather exacting specifications can furnish more diversion than all man's efforts at entertainment.

This, of course, is why there is an ever increasing army of bird watchers in this country. I believe, too, that the joy most people get out of hunting and fishing is not really the final kill or land the fish—it's just being there and watching Mother Nature unfold her panorama of life.

The thinking aspect of my "resolution" is one of its most important facets. I don't mean thinking about figures as I try to compile an income tax return or thinking about words to use in compiling a magazine article. I mean just thinking about things. The mind, like the muscles, can only grow with exercise.

An old man is reported to have said that thinking is like sin. Those who don't do much of it are afraid of it, but those who do it a lot learn to like it.

Maybe if I do a lot of thinking, I will be able to write something of importance instead of trifling trivia like this.
