Ed DuBose To Be Assisted By Mrs. Francis Esmond In Seventh War Bond Drive

Announcement has been made that Ed DuBose will head the Seventh War Loan Drive, and that Mrs. Francis Esmond will serve as co-chairman for the event. The campaign is slated to open May 14 and will continue through June 31.

Special emphasis will be laid on the E bond quota for the drive, and Dawson County's assessment amounts to \$445,000.

Chairman DuBose reports that they will concentrate on the drive during its early stages, and try to go over the top by the end of the first month of the campaign.

He reports that plans for the drive activities have not yet been completed but states that announcement will be made in the near future concerning them.

Regional headquarters for the drive plans to furnish this city an Infantry Show for the event, which is composed of a combat unit made up of 35 men. All men are veterans of this war, and they will show and demonstrate the use of all the newest types of weapons and show how pillboxes are taken, as well as many other interesting things.

Plans are to have the show in this city on June 1, and it will be held at the football stadium, or some other out-of-door place.

Texas E bond quota for the drive is set at \$168 million, which is higher than the quota in the Sixth war Loan Drive. The over-all quota in Texas amounts to \$430 million.

Arrangements are nearing completion for the Dawson County Livestock Show, which is to be held April 4-6 inclusive at the fair grounds in this city.

Prospects are for a good entry list, with a fine exhibition in the offering. Prizes are being offered to 4-H Club entries, and ribbons and banners are to be given in the open show.

Forming the executive committee of the show are W. J. Beckham, T. A. Barfield and Joe M. Peterson.

Show activity will begin with the grooming of animals for exhibition. This is to take place from 9 a. m. to 12 on Wednesday, April 4. At 2 p. m., that afternoon an exhibition and judging of horses will be held in the ball park on the fair grounds, which will end the show for that day.

On Thursday, April 5, several events are scheduled, with the show opening at 9:30 a. m., that day with the judging of 4-H Club beef calves. This is to be followed at 11 a. m., by the judging of 4-H Club dairy heifers. In the afternoon at 1 p. m., the judging of swine will take place, succeeded by the judging of dairy cattle at 2 p. m., and by the judging of beef cattle at 4 p. m.

Open house is slated for 9 a. m., Friday morning. At 1 p. m., that afternoon, a sale of dairy heifers and drawing for Jersey bulls will be conducted. The show will culminated at 2 p. m., with the sale of 4-H Club calves.

Judges for the affair will be Harvie D. Pool and Leon C. Ranson, and Col. Houston Glasson will serve as auctioneer.

According to officials entries to the show will close in all departments at 12 noon April 4. The show will include the 4-H Clubs and FFA divisions with fat calves, dairy heifers, and hogs forming that division. Jersey and Shorthorn division, beef animal division, swine division, and horse division make up the sections of the open show.

Two Lamesa Men Serve At Base On Island Of Guam

XXI BOMBER COMMAND HEADQUARTERS, Guam — Two men from Lamesa are among the hundreds of enlisted men at a huge Superfortress Base in the Marianas whose diligent efforts have made it possible for the giant B-29 bombers of their command to strike regularly at the heart of Japan's war industry.

The Lamesa men are Master Sgt. Paul D. Grissom, whose father, Eddie W. Grissom lives on Star Route 2 and who entered the armed service in Jan. 1944; and Sgt. John P. Edgmon, whose wife, Annie, and mother, Mrs. Jewel Hughes, live in Lamesa. Sgt. Edgmon attended Lamesa High School, and was employed at the Rohr Aircraft Corporation in Chula Vista, California, before entering the armed service in January, 1943.

"The work of these men and their fellow soldiers is directly responsible for the success of the B-29s in bombing Japan's war industries," General O'Donnell said in congratulating them. "These men realize their responsibilities in the pre-mission

tasks of insuring the maximum chance for safe return of the air crews."

An additional tribute has been paid to members of the unit for their toll in constructing their B-29 bases. They arrived last August and September and, since aviation engineers were busy with the high priority task of airstrip building, they constructed homes for themselves and for the aerial combat crews who arrived later.

Maintaining Rural Health Is Highly Essential In War

The A. and M. College Extension Service is giving its experience and wide educational facilities freely to the maintenance of rural good health. Difficulties in functioning public health services, which have been heightened by wartime limitations, make concentrated effort in this field more necessary than ever, says Mrs. Eloise Trigg Johnson, Extension specialist in family life

education.

To give direction and emphasis to the Extension Service's cooperation in rural health work, Mrs. Johnson heads up a four-point general educational program. Its objectives are to encourage (1) a critical study and evaluation of all available health service facilities in the community, county and state; (2) periodic examinations for the determination of the health status of each family member; (3) the use of positive preventive measures in control of contagious and infectious diseases; (4) planning for the solution of family life problems as a positive factor and the maintenance of good mental health.

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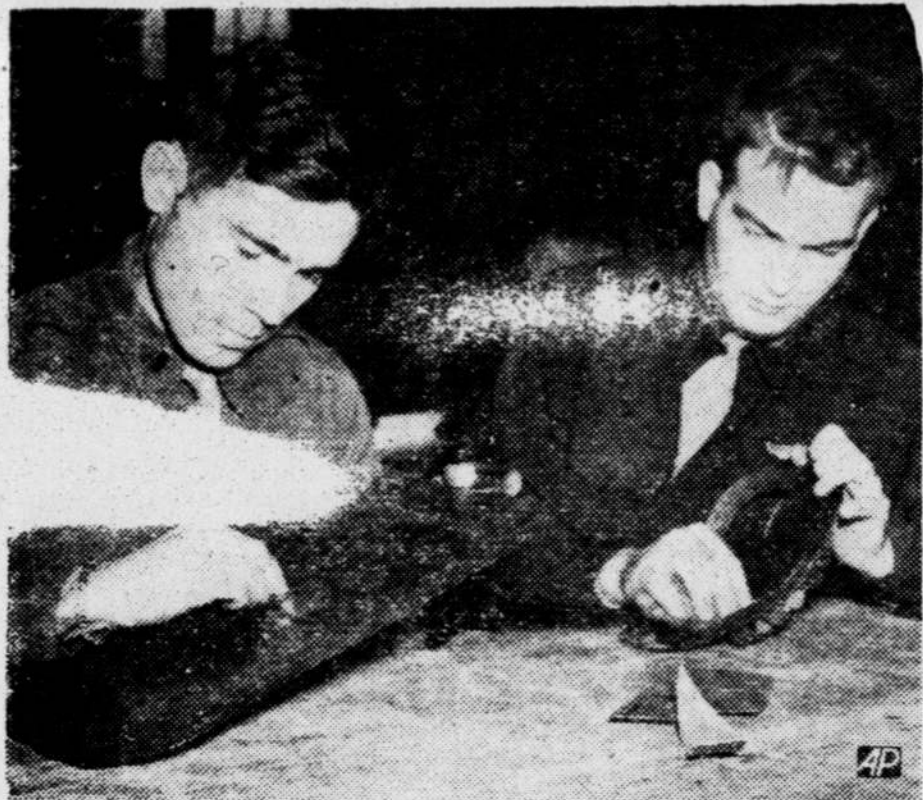

Knott, Ex-American Leaguer, Gets Battlefield Commission

FORT WORTH, Texas — Jack Knott's Texas friends figure the Germans tried to shove him around in a hurry.

Sgt. Knott, former Texas and American League pitcher, recently was jumped to a lieutenant in the middle of the bulge battle in Belgium.

Writes Flem R. Hall, sports edi-

tor of the Fort Worth Star-Telegram.

"Jack, who came off a West Texas farm in 1926 to become a rookie with Dallas, never did like to be hurried or pushed around. Although he's big and strong as a young horse, Knott never caused any trouble. He was just a good-natured, slow-moving fellow—until someone got to shoving. Then he could be terrific. They say he bounced a few wise guys off the walls of the clubhouse, until they found out about Jack."

Hall, who saw service as a war correspondent, commented on Knott's promotion:

"Details of exactly what happened haven't been revealed but any soldier who gets a battlefield commission has to do any number of extraordinary things when the chips are down and the pressure is up."

"Sgt. Knott was the first professional baseball player to win a commission in combat in this war," Hall added. "It is one of the greatest tributes that can be paid a soldier by his commander."

Knott, who was born in Dallas in 1907, pitched 332 games in his 10 years in the American League, starting with the St. Louis Browns. He was traded to the Chicago White Sox and ended with Philadelphia Athletics.

Legumes Aid Moisture In Penetration

Several Dimmit County farmers who have been living on their farms over 20 years never knew until recently how far moisture penetrated their soil after a rain. Their county agricultural agent, H. A. Weatherby, Jr., at the time, showed them, and with some results which speak well for legume cover crops.

Most of the soil in Dimmit County

has a heavy clay sub-soil which is almost impervious to moisture, and the tests were made after a much needed five-day rain which totaled 13 inches. A soil auger was used to check the penetration, which varied from eight inches in a pasture to 40 in an orchard.

In a field which had been terraced and listed on the contour, dry dirt was found at 18 inches, and in another field recently terraced and plowed with a disk plow dry dirt was found at 13 inches. A later test, made where water stood behind a terrace, showed a penetration of 16 inches.

Better penetration, 22 inches was found where eggplants were being

grown in an irrigated field. In a pasture, one test on a ridge showed dry dirt at eight inches, while in flat land below the ridge water penetrated 12. Under a tree in the same pasture where soil had been built up from washing and from falling leaves, penetration was 26 inches. An orchard with the same type soil, however, showed dry dirt at forty inches. For four years, legumes had been plowed under in that orchard, enabling the soil to store up moisture.

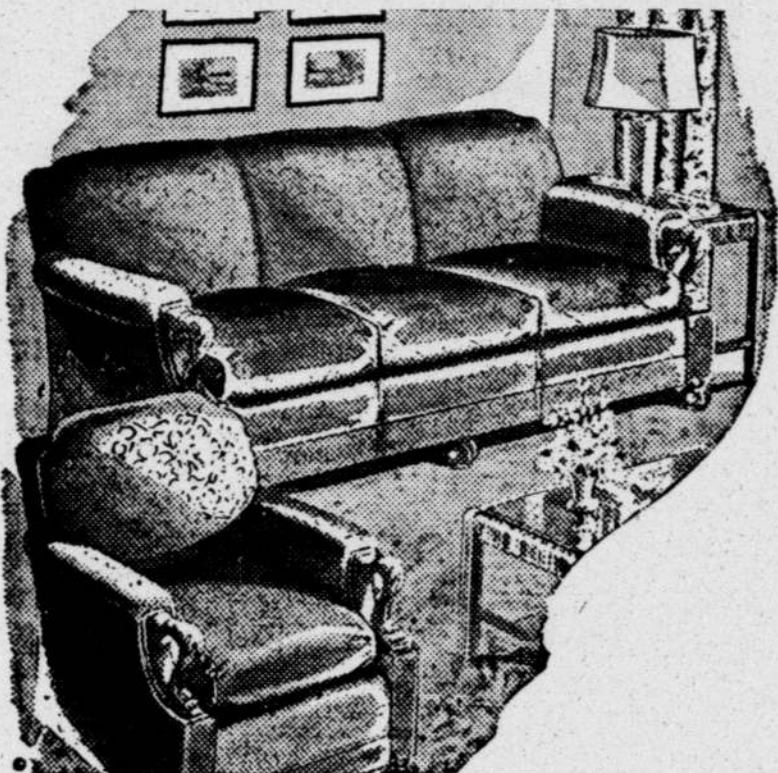

DES MOINES, Iowa — Salvaged material about the farm and American ingenuity are helping move food crops to market in spite of manpower shortages, a survey of homemade gadgets used by Iowa farmers indicates.

A few pieces of lumber and some old machine parts made a bale loader for hay. The bales are moved up a ramp to a platform from which they can be loaded easily on a truck which furnishes power.

Field chopped silage is pushed off a rack into a power blower-conveyor at just the right speed by a chain windless attached to a false front end-gate.

When one manure spreaders wheels wore out, its owner welded auto axles and hubs into place and the spreader now runs on ball bearings and truck tires.

A discarded boxcar became a cow cafeteria when bins were installed inside, feeding troughs at the end and an automatic watering system provided.

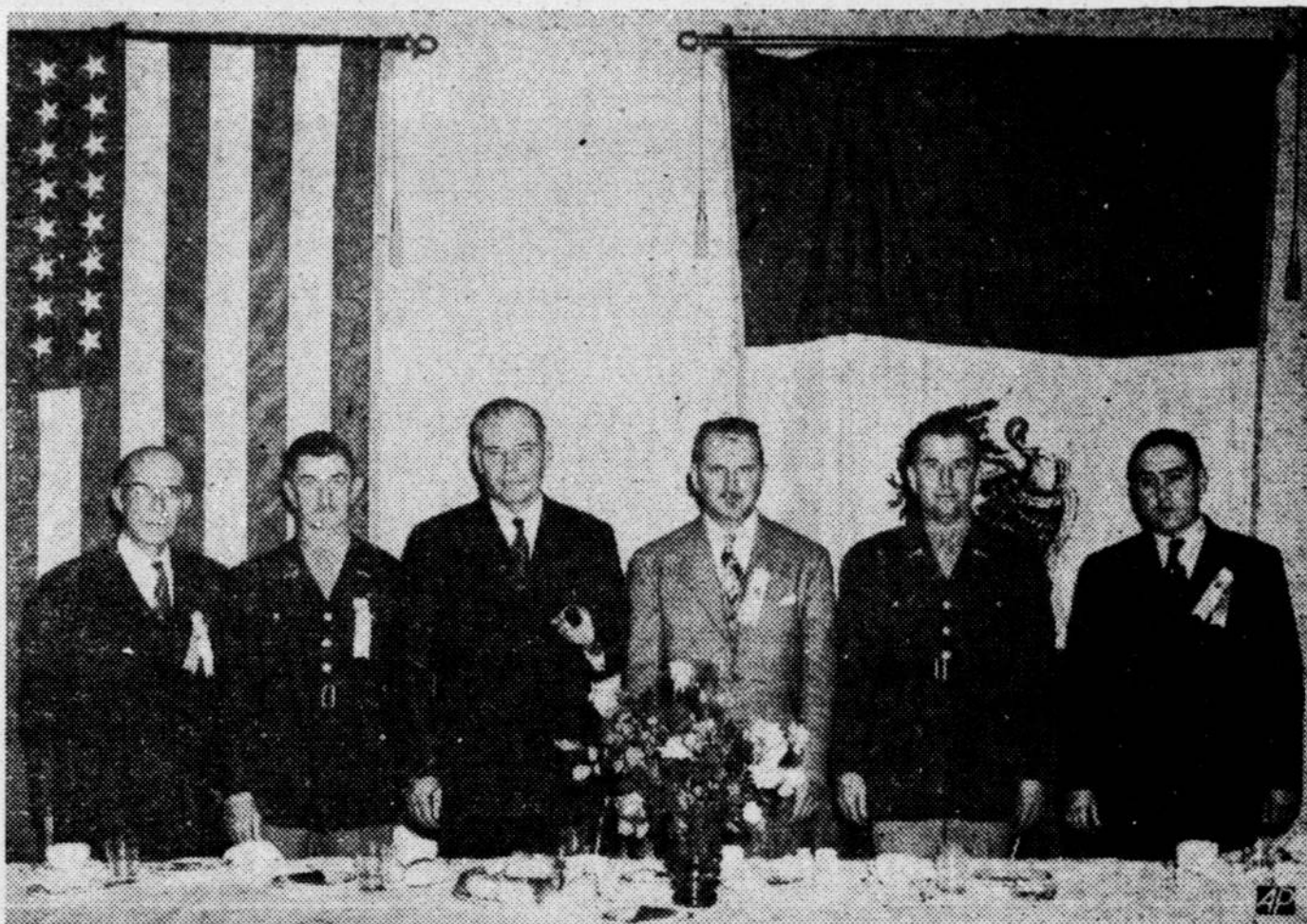

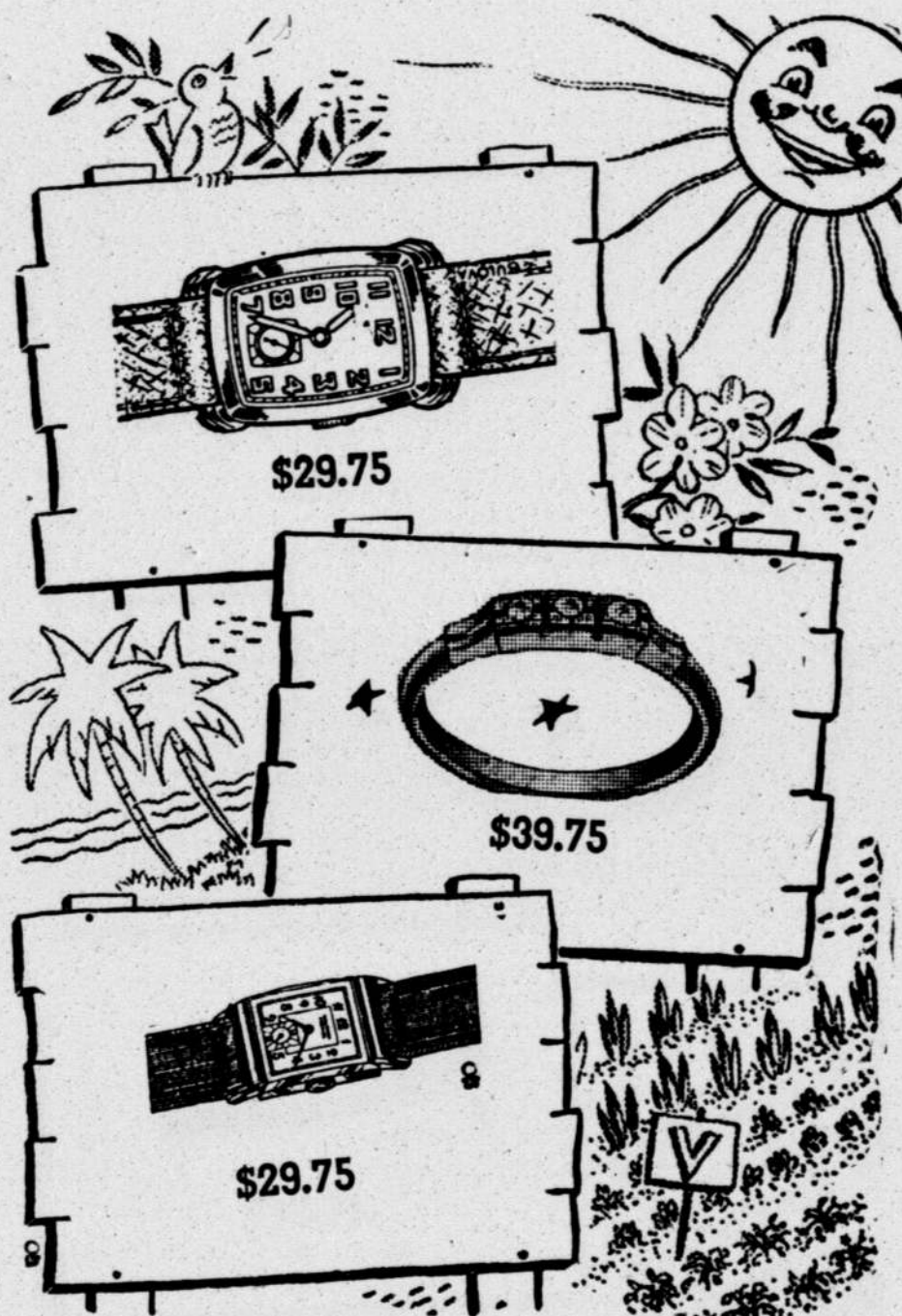
