POLIO FUND RAISING DRIVE IS STARTED IN EASTLAND COUNTY

The annual March of Dimes was underway in Cisco today and leaders hoped to wipe out a 1951 deficit of some \$2,000 and fill the treasury for 1952, according to Mrs. Fleming Waters, chairman for the drive in the west half of Eastland County.

Mrs. Bethel Gallagher, whose daughter, Cindy, was a victim of polio during the summer of 1951, was the first volunteer worker to help with the drive in Cisco, Mrs. Waters said. The first cash contribution came from Mr. and Mrs. Hal Sledge of Cisco.

Eastland County's 1951 deficit exceeded \$2,000 as funds were needed to provide treatment for seven cases of polio. One death from polio resulted in the county last year — at Ranger. The next most serious case was that of Tia Juana Alford of Cisco, daughter of Mrs. Juanita Little.

The national foundation had a deficit of more than \$5,000,000 last year. Mrs. Waters pointed out that virtually all polio funds are for treatment since most of the workers are volunteers. She added that many doctors are contributing their time throughout the nation in treating polio cases.

"Polio could strike Cisco and

Eastland County just as it did recently in Odessa and Galveston," Mrs. Waters said. "And we must have a strong treasury in readiness."

Small containers were distributed throughout the city early this week. Plans for the month include a dance to be held on January 31 at the Cisco Country Club, the proceeds to go to the polio fund. The drive is underway in city schools.

Final Rites For Callahan Pioneer Scheduled Today

Funeral services for W. A. Ramsey, 83, pioneer Callahan County rancher and farmer, were to be held at 2 p. m. Wednesday at the Putnam Baptist Church. Mr. Ramsey, the father of Mrs. Fae Wood and the stepfather of Mrs. W. M. Isenhower of Cisco, died Monday night in the Baird hospital after a serious illness of three weeks. He had been in ill health for the past 10 months.

He had lived in Putnam since 1890 and was a member of the Putnam Baptist Church. The funeral services were to be conducted by the Rev. Harry Grantz of Putnam and the Rev. H. L. Burnam of Stamford.

Burial was to follow in the Seranton cemetery with Wylie Funeral Home of Baird in charge of the arrangements. Survivors include his wife; three daughters, Mrs. Jim Yarbrough of Putnam, Mrs. Wood of Cisco and Mrs. Clara Lunsford of Odessa; two sons, Milton Ramsey of Andrews and Burette Ramsey of Putnam; three stepchildren, Mrs. Isenhower of Cisco, Mrs. Mark Burnam of Putnam and Walter Francisco of Putnam and one brother, Calvin Ramsey of Sudan.

Members of the WSCS will be hostesses for the dinner, which will precede the program.

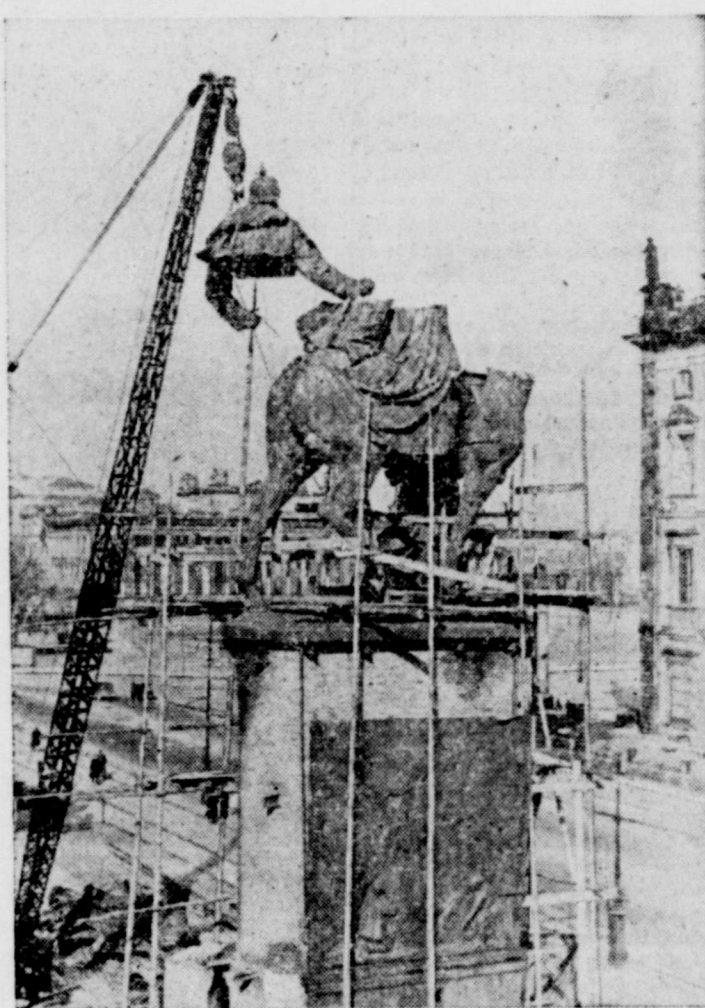
Band Banquet Held Saturday Evening

Creating A European Army

It is common knowledge that the task of creating a European army has gone ahead more slowly than was hoped and, in many quarters, expected. There have been delays, setbacks, frustrations. Some have been the result of material and training problems. Others have been due to basic differences between the allies—and in a number of cases, suspicion and discord. Others still seem to have stemmed from a short of lethargy—a reluctance to go all out in building defenses against communism.

This last is by far the most imrepresentative of every Western power, small and large. But it is true that progress has been and remains slow. The situation is further complicated by the position of England. When the Labor government was in power, Minister Bevan argued that Britain must cut back, rather than increase, her armament program. Now Mr. Churchill says much the same thing, though his reasons are different. This has led to many questions. Norman Thomas posed some of the big ones, in an open letter to President Truman, when he asked: "Has Mr. Churchill become convinced that Europe can be defended with a far smaller military establishment than we had assumed? ... If so, what reason does Mr. Churchill see for America's being more worried than the European people? Why should we send ground forces to Europe of so stalwart an opponent of Stalin as the British prime minister is content to accept Nye Bevan's estimate of what Britain can and should do?"

These are not questions which are easily answered, but no one can doubt their importance. Then, there is one more phase of the problem which must be given far more attention than has been the case so far. Sumner H. Slichter put it this way in an Atlantic article: "Rearmament must be regarded as only a secondary part of the program to defeat Communism. Men will not refrain from embracing Communism or from sympathy with it simply because they are protected from attack by Russia. Communism appeals to men who see little or no hope for better living standards. Hence, a rearmament program that weakens men's hopes for better living standards is self-defeating. It plays into the hands of the Communists."

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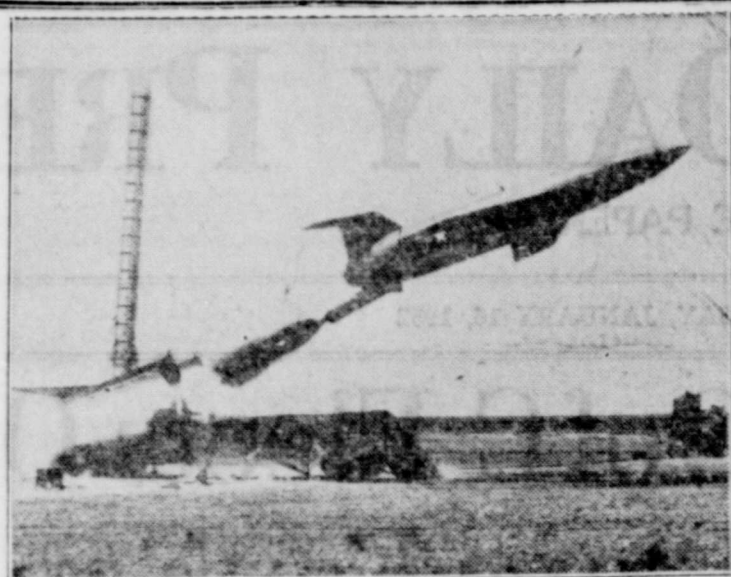
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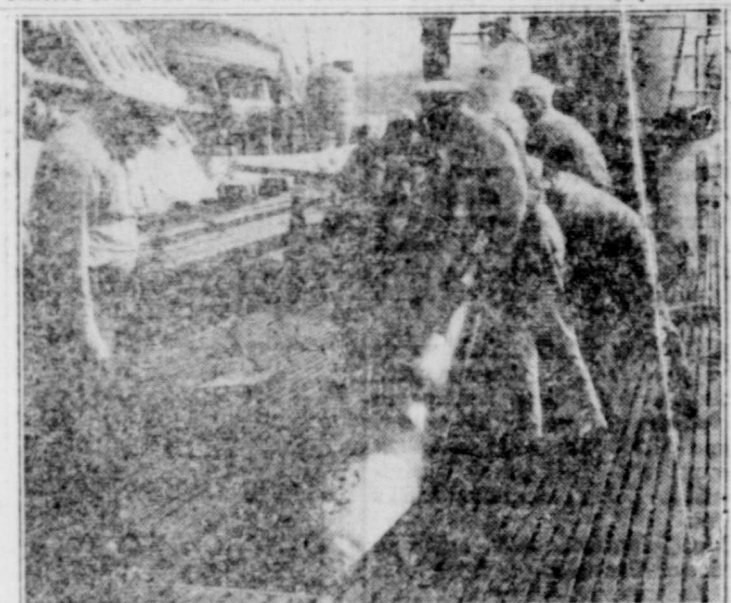

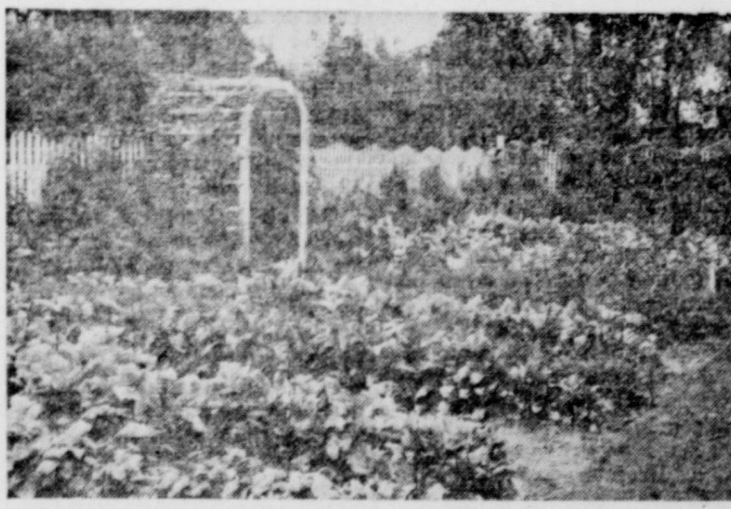
ARMY NURSE CORPS RECRUITS 2,000 ADDITIONAL NURSES

Ideal Liberty Garden of 1,000 sq. ft. Faces South



Area 20 x 50 Feet With Fence on East, West and North Gives High Yield.

The ideal Liberty garden plot ought to be level, free from the shade of trees, shrubs and buildings, with soil in which there are no roots of trees or shrubs. It should be near the kitchen door, where vegetables can be gathered easily, just before they are to be cooked.

To produce sufficient fresh vegetables for a family of four during four to five months depending on your climate, a minimum of 1,000 square feet is required. This will not allow for sweet corn, potatoes, cabbages, peas for canning, or any considerable quantity of vine crops except those grown on a fence or trellis. Another two thousand square feet would be required to supply the family with the others.

The ideal shape for a 1,000 square foot plot is oblong, say 20 by 50 or 25 by 40 ft., with the shorter distance running north and south. North and south rows, give more even distribution of the sun and it is easier to divide up space among your different crops, when you deal with 20 or 25 foot rows, rather than fractions of long ones.

Your plot must have sunshine. Six hours full sun is usually assumed to be a minimum. But many of the crops you will want to grow need full sun all day long, and will suffer from any limitation of it. Trees too nearby, which cast little shade in mid-summer, when the sun is high, may seriously affect yields in the fall.

Never surround a small vegetable plot with shrubs, but a picket fence five feet high bordering the east, north and west sides will add 450 square feet of valuable air space on which tomatoes, pole beans, cucumbers, melons, or similar vine crops can be grown to perfection. Such a fence has no roots, casts no harmful shade, and allows the air to circulate freely around the plants that cling to it. The south boundary should be open to the full sun, with no climbers or pickets to cast mid-day shadows. Use a wire fence here only if required for protection.

While it is convenient if the garden described can be approached from the south, with a little ingenuity it can be adjusted to any approach, still allowing it to face the sun. The important point is to avoid a layout which results in any row being shaded for more than a brief interval of the day, by its companion crops, the garden enclosure, or outside objects. Sunshine is far more important than soil.

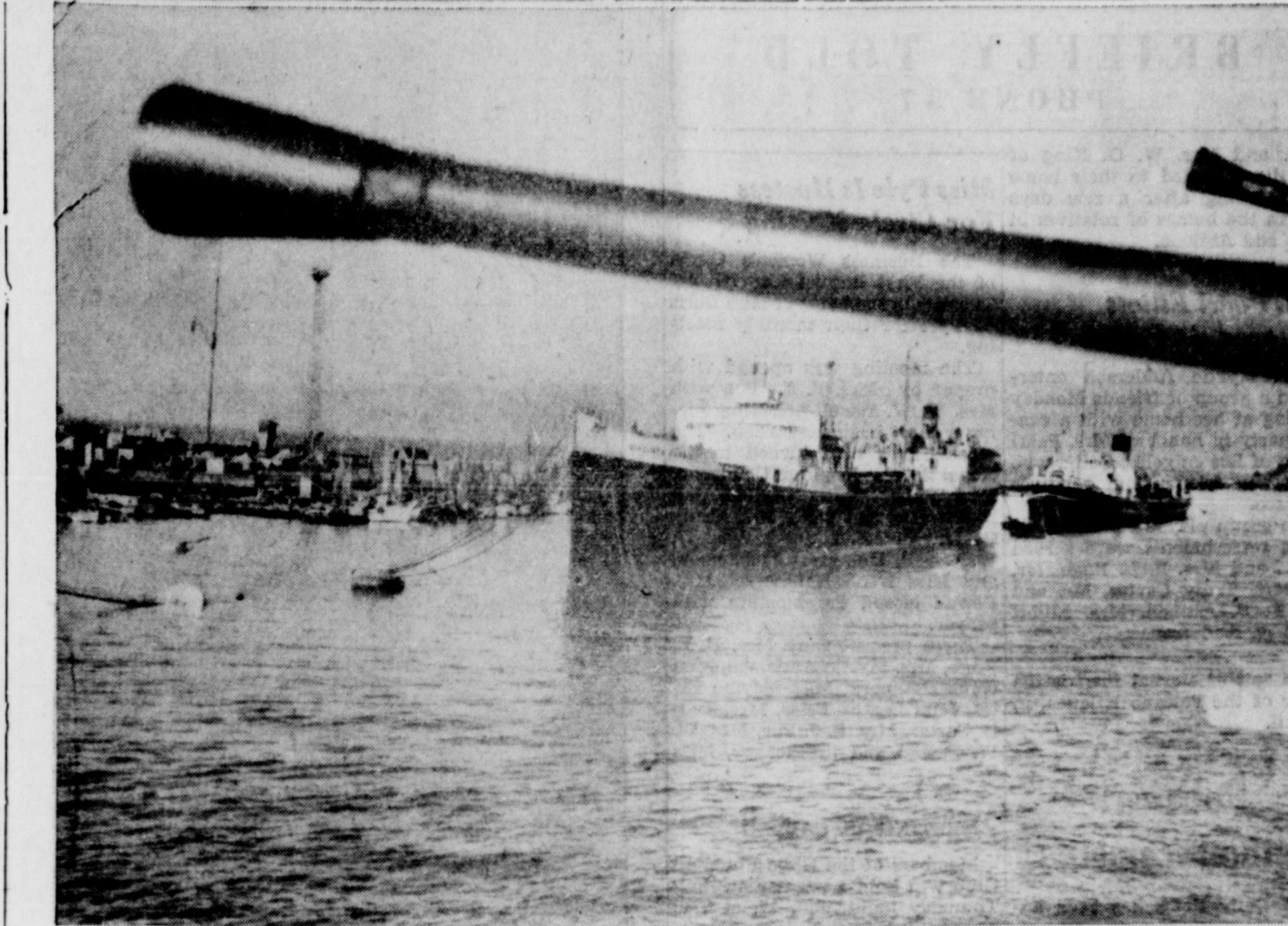

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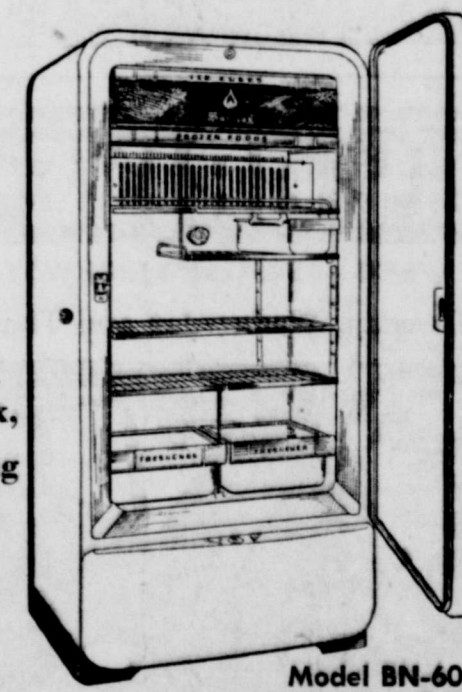

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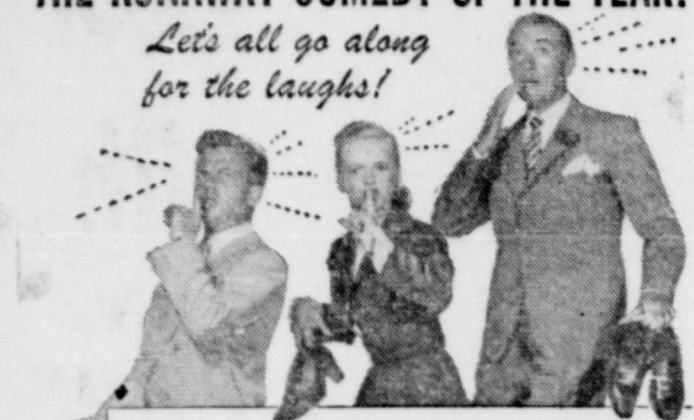

HEALTH TALKS

BOIL is an infection of the skin and underlying tissues, usually erupting through a hair pocket (follicle). It is most often caused by a staphylococcus germ, swells to a head of pus with a hard cheese-like core under the pus. Warm salt packs will often bring it to a peak, causing it to drain through the skin. Boils, known medically as furuncles, should not be squeezed, since that sends the infected matter back down into the deeper tissues of the body. A series of boils, breaking out in crops, is known as furunculosis and requires medical attention because it may be a sign of a great many different things awry in the body. A boil with more than one core is known as a carbuncle. **BONE** is the solid substance of the body that forms the frame, the skeleton of the body. It may be considered as one of the three solids of the body: bone, tissue (flesh) and sinews (including hair); maybe that was what Kipling had in mind when he wrote about the rag, the bone and the hank of the hair.



MARINE BANDMASTER—A graying career Leatherneck from Ramona, California, is busy bringing music to his younger comrades in arms in Korea. Six days after stepping into his new job of bandmaster of the First Marine Division Band, Commissioned Warrant Officer Jack P. Rauhof had a 16-number musical on the boards. The show hit the road on the tin-hat circuit and gave 22 performances in 11 days. It is called "Stars Without Bars."

CWO Rauhof gives credit for the show's enormous success to the cast of enlisted Marines. They've formed a 14-piece orchestra, a five-piece Western combo, ten "Hawaiian" musicians, a 24-man chorus and a barbershop quartet.

CWO Rauhof arrived in Korea August 5 from Parris Island, S. C., where he was band officer for the Marine recruit depot. He himself took "boot" training there 25 years ago, as a lad of 18. A drum-major during World War II, he was captured by the Japanese at Corregidor and spent 18 months as a prisoner of war.

Back in the United States, he was promoted to his present rank in February, 1947 and became bandmaster at the Marine Corps base at San Diego, California. His wife, Mrs. Helen K. Rauhof, lives in Ramona. A brother, Norman B. Rauhof, lives in Pulaski, Virginia.

There are more than 90 names for the big bones of the body, each one located medically by its precise name, which usually includes some information as to its form, function and location. Bones are hard on the outside, getting softer as you get to the spongy insides, where there is a porous, pithy material known as marrow. It is in this marrow that red blood cells are manufactured.

Medical words beginning with oste- or osteo refer to bones, such as osteitis (inflammation of bone) and osteomyelitis (inflammation of the marrow of bone). Some medical words beginning with os- refer to bones, such as ossify, but other os-words may refer to mouth, such as osculation, or smell, such as osmics, the science of smells.
