Quitaque's Fighting Pantherettes, as game and spunky a crew as ever graced the hardwoods, had to battle a first-round case of cold shooting and a pretty good opponent to win a 54-53 battle over Southland last Friday night in the regional tourney at Canyon. The Pantherettes then went on to take a 64-42 win over Briscoe in the semifinals Saturday morning, then won their first regional championship Saturday night by beating a very fine Vega team 48-46.

The Fighting Pantherettes had to come from way back in Friday night's game to survive for Southland was beating them with free throws. At one point midway of the second period of play the Quitaque girls were 16 points behind. Frankly, things were far from bright for the referees were tooting their little tooters seemingly with every breath and Southland was dropping their free tosses in and the Pantherettes were missing too many. About midway of the second quarter the score was 30 to 15 in favor of Southland, and it was here that the Pantherettes class began to tell. The Quitaque guards, who have been outstanding all year, shut out the Eaglettes for the remainder of the period and the forwards pulled to within 7 points, 23-30 at the buzzer. After the second half started the Pantherettes scored 6 more points to trail by only 2 points before Southland scored again. However, the Eaglettes were not through for they pulled away again and led 34-41 at the end of the third period. Quitaque

finally tied the score at 44-44 with 3:52 left in the game. The count was tied once again at 50-50 and the final minutes of the contest was spine-tingling. Jill Johnson and Sherry Stark both were lost with too many fouls before the game was over but Jo Beth Merrell and Shirley Dowd performed in great style to help win it.

According to this reporter's unofficial figures, a total of 47 fouls were called on the two teams, 27 against the Pantherettes and 21 against Southland. The Eaglettes canned 23 of 36 charity tosses while the Pantherettes made only 12 free shots and missed 12.

Friday morning the Pantherettes were more relaxed and buried a good Briscoe team 64-42. The game was close the first ten minutes of the game, with the count knotted 9-9 at the end of the first quarter. The score was tied three more times in the opening minutes of the second period, but after the second quarter was a couple of minutes old the Pantherettes went ahead 16-15 and from that point pulled steadily away and Coach Johnson used all of his squad in the closing minutes.

Saturday night's championship game between Quitaque and Vega was just what a championship game should be—a close, hard fought game with neither team ever holding a clear advantage. The Pantherettes led by five points early in the first quarter and Vega had a four point lead early in the third period and the Pantherettes again had a five point advantage late in the fourth. Most

of the time, however, no more than two or three points separated the two teams.

Four of the Quitaque girls were selected on the all-region team. Patricia Brunson and Carol Myers were selected as forwards and Jill Johnson and Lynette Taylor were selected as guards. Quitaque's win, however, was a real team effort and everyone of them can claim her own part of the wins. In addition to the six starters, Jo Beth Merrell at a forward position and Shirley Dowd at a guard post, contributed a vital part in the three wins.

As this is written, the Fighting Pantherettes are on their way to Austin by chartered bus where they will try to add the big prize to the trophy case. A lot of fans here in Quitaque, including this reporter, feel like that just might do it, for in addition to having a very fine team, those girls don't know the meaning of the word "quit"—until the final buzzer sounds and they have racked up another victory. The Fighting Pantherettes left here at 9:30 Wednesday morning. They are scheduled for a workout in Gregory Gym at Austin shortly after noon Thursday. They will meet Forsan at 8:50 Thursday night. If they win their first game they will meet Royal of Brookshire at 10:20 a. m. Friday. Championship finals in Class B will be at 2:30 Saturday afternoon.

Class B teams who will be at Austin are Quitaque, Forsan, Brock, High Island, Royal of Brookshire, and Celina.

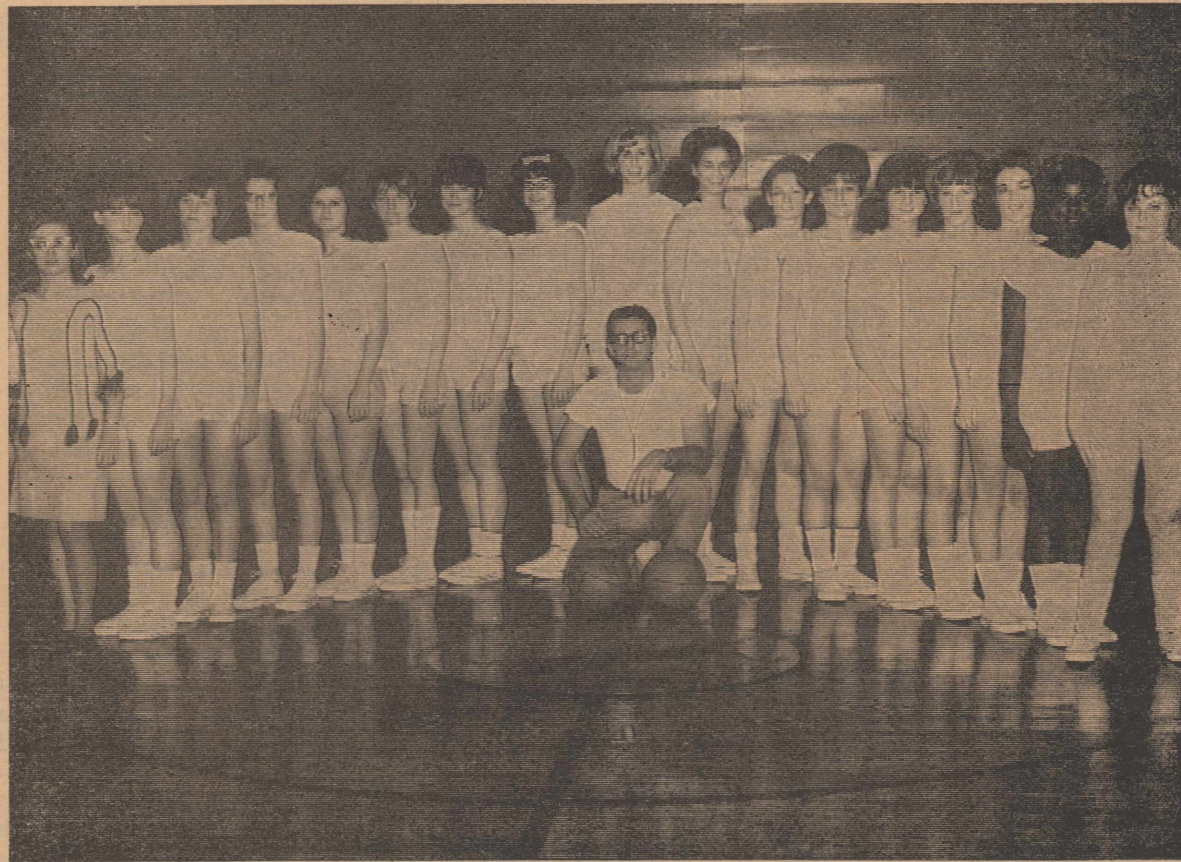

## CROP PRODUCTION GUIDELINES WERE MAILED LAST WEEK

Crop production guidelines related specifically to the conditions here in Briscoe County and covering cotton, grain sorghum, soybeans and wheat are being mailed to every local farmer this week.

This is the first time such guidelines have ever been prepared on a county basis, according to County Agent Leon Grosdidier.

He believes that farmers who will take time to study the recommendations will find helpful tips for producing optimum yields and lowering production costs.

A combined total of 300 guidelines are being mailed to local farmers. Printing costs are being covered by the commissioners court.

"These guidelines are the best combinations of thoroughness and brevity that those of us in the Texas Agricultural Extension Service could prepare," the agent said.

In the Briscoe County guidelines, particular emphasis is

placed on water conservation with each crop. The guides tell when to water the crops to get maximum yields from each irrigation whether the crop is to be irrigated once, twice or more.

Suggestions are given for deciding the timing of the most important irrigation or irrigations that occur in any one year, Grosdidier said.

The cotton guidelines also stress some of the keys to producing a crop with better fiber qualities.

They explain irrigation timing and other cultural practices that can enhance the inherent quality potential of a cotton variety.

The soybean guidelines may be particularly helpful to Briscoe County farmers, the agent said. Many local farmers are interested in the crop but they lack production experience with it.

The guides are not elaborate publications, Grosdidier said, and a few farmers may overlook them when they come in the mail.

"I believe it will pay to read the guides and file them for future reference," the agent said. They can also serve as a reminder or checklist for instructing hired hands."

All of the farmers who have had a chance to see the local guidelines have commented on their usefulness, he said.

The localized guidelines are part of a state-wide Extension Service project to get the best known production information in the hands of farmers.

"It's an effort to combine all of the modern practices recommended for this county into one source so that a farmer does not have to search through a number of publications to get the material," the agent said. Extensive preparation has gone into the guidelines to insure they would be highly accurate and useful.
