Building Permits
In Texas Decrease
During November

AUSTIN, Texas, Jan. 5—Building permits issued in Texas during November in 36 Texas cities representing all sections of the State totaled \$3,896,149, a decrease of 18.1 per cent from October but an increase of nearly 1 per cent over November, 1936, according to the Bureau of Business Research of the University of Texas.

Cities in which the value of the permits exceeded that of either of the comparable months were: Big Spring, Brownwood, Corsicana, Dallas, Galveston, Harlingen, Paris, and Wichita Falls.

Texas department of safety headquarters at Austin has sent out orders for patrolmen to start "cracking down" on motor vehicles who fail to comply with the chauffeur's license law and the drive to stop drivers without the permit is on in full force, examiner Hammett Vance said today.

FOUR DEEP
TESTS PLANNED

Burkburnett is to get a deep oil test and interest has increased with the setting of a derrick and drilling operations actually under way.

According to information received this morning they are down 1150 feet and are going to drill to 6000 feet unless oil or gas is encountered in paying quantities at a lesser depth.

This location is one of four to be made in the Burk Burnett area. Leading in the intense lease play in this section which brought the price of acreage from practically nothing during November to \$5 and \$10 per acre was the location of the test by King-Frabor-Hodges four miles south of Burk Burnett on the O. Farish survey.

The location was made in mid-December, 990 feet east and 990 feet south of the northwest corner of the O. Farish survey, near the old King-Hampton and Lewis test and on the edge of the shallow production in the Burk Burnett field.

Tulsa Test

The 2800-acre block was assembled by Roy King and H. L. Lewis for a 6000-foot test. The lumber was hauled last week for the start of the drilling which will be done by the Mid-Union Drilling Company. The principals of the Frabor-Hodges interests of Tulsa and Frank Brenson, D. J. O'Rourke and Hugh Hodges.

With the definite announcement of this test lease play started in the district with several large blocks assembled for drilling contracts. The result has been that a test is assured on each side of the city in the near future.

Five miles west and one mile north of the city a block of 1,000 acres has been assembled by J. N. Snoddy. Snoddy stated this week that the contract for the drilling was in the bank in Burk Burnett and called for at least a 4,000-foot test located on either the Snoddy land or the land of J. C. Muller. Starting date on the contract is Feb. 1st.

Another block has been assembled directly north of Burk Burnett with 1,500 acres centered on the Mat Riley farm. Terms of the contract have not been announced but this district is generally considered the "hottest spot" in the field.

Southeast Block

A 2,000-acre block is being assembled southeast of the townsite in the area of the Burk Burnett municipal water plant. This block was assembled for the Kadane interests which have had much success in the K. M. A. field recently.

More interesting has been the large number of small leases bought for speculation. Acreages varying from a few blocks to full sections have been purchased as the interest developed.

Vague plans have been announced for a test within the townsite near Main street. Under the direction of a committee from the Burk Burnett Chamber of commerce a block has been assembled in the southwest corner of the townsite reaching up to Main street west of the city. The test is expected to be located only a few blocks from the heart of the city but no definite announcement of plans have been made.

as their productive demonstration for the year. Six girls, one in each club was given 50 baby chicks by the hatcheries in Wichita Falls, Electra and Burkburnett. Of these 300 baby chicks, 236 were raised. Each girl kept a record of the eggs produced by the family flock of chickens. There were 34 of the 79 girls to send in this report to the agent. There were 2,443 hens in these flocks an average of 71 per flock. They produced 97,800 eggs or 8150 dozen. The girls were furnished a regular farm for keeping these records.

Each demonstrator canned 6 containers of poultry products and the cooperators were to serve poultry products 6 times. There were 22 cooperators to do this. The demonstrators were to show a pen of their chickens at the county fair. All did this and two first, two second and one third place was won.

The report on food preservation was better this year than in 1936. A demonstration was given to each of the 15 clubs on "keeping up to date in Food Preservation". The following report was given in by 162 cooperators.

Number quarts of vegetables canned, 8,831 valued at 20c

Number quarts fruit, 7,700 valued at 20c

Number quarts jelly and preserves, 4,263 valued at 20c

Number quarts pickles, 3,432 valued at 30c

Number quarts meat, 1,739 valued at 40c

How Long Does It Take To Build An Automobile

Dodge Sales Chief Tries to Find Out Too—Finds it Requires 35,000 Parts

Frequently one sees reports that so many automobiles are built per hour or that every few minutes a new car is made.

Such statements are merely easy generalities. They are misleading and they are untrue. The fact is it takes quite a long time to build an automobile and it will surprise most people to learn that not even men who have spent their lives making automobiles know with any degree of accuracy just how long it does take to build a car.

As one usually does when looking into fields beyond one's own immediate orbit of activity, I learned some very interesting things during my attempts to find out, with some degree of accuracy, just how long it really takes to build a car. My question asking was among executives with many years of experience in the supervision of car manufacture, and when they surprised me by frankly admitting they did not know and would venture a conjecture as to how long it takes to build an automobile, I tried another tack.

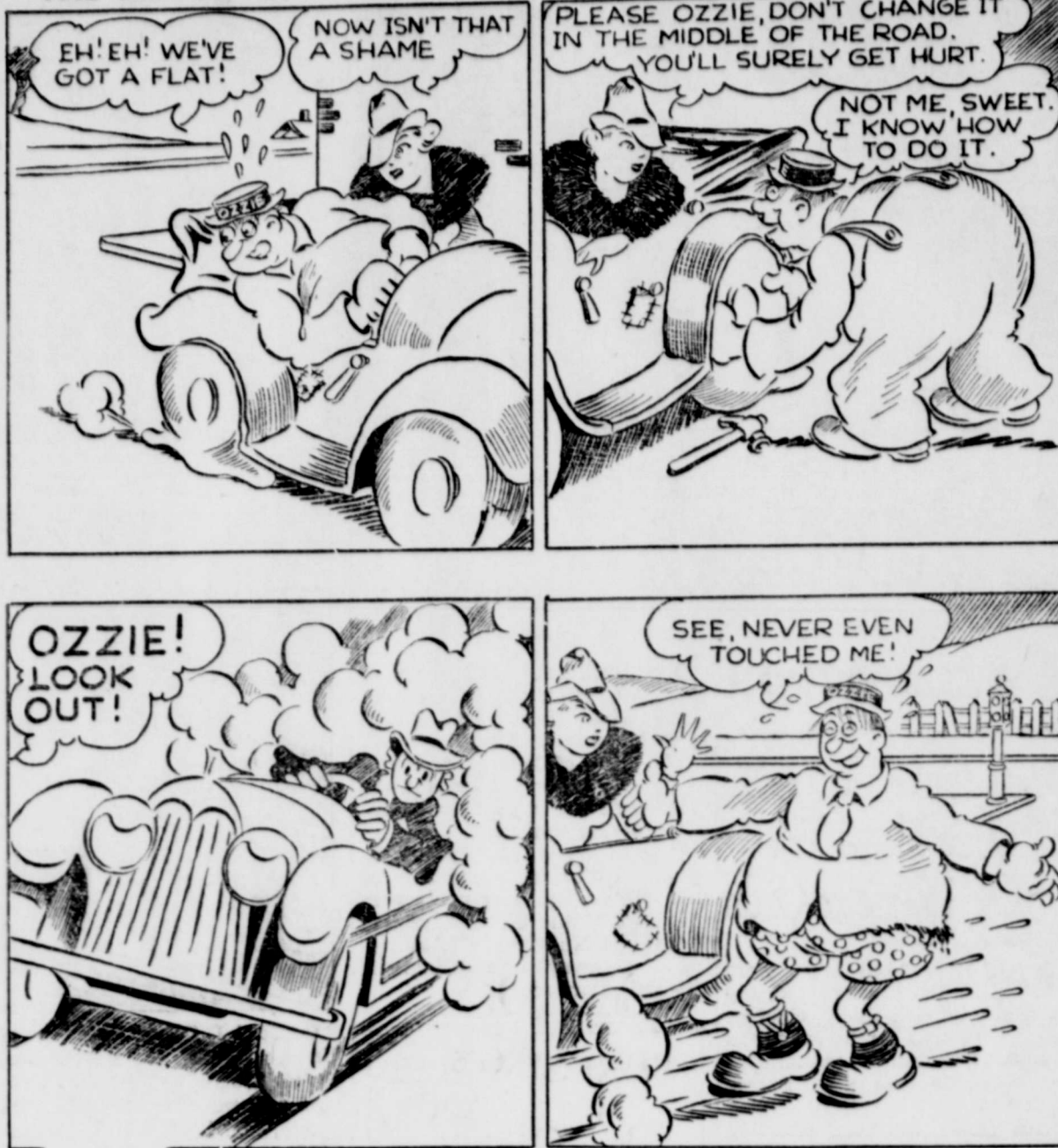
"Well, then, tell me how many pieces there are in a car—maybe we could break it down that way and arrive at something like the right answer by figuring out approximately how long it takes to make each of these individual pieces that comprise a finished automobile."

With what I thought was a rather pitying look—born, no doubt, of their superior knowledge of the subject—these men said, "Yes, that could be done, but it would take a staff of accountants and a lot of time and money to do the job, and, even then, you would end up with merely an approximation for where are you going to begin your calculations? With the digging of coal and the mining of ores, the growing of cotton and the tapping of rubber trees—all of which operations are the actual beginnings of some of the hundreds or even thousands of raw materials which play a part in the building of an automobile—or rather, the making of parts that ultimately are assembled into a finished car?"

That seemed to me to be a little too far to begin calculations—for practical purposes—but my manufacturing friends pointed out the obvious fact that a starting point had to be fixed and that such elementary beginnings as they had mentioned were the real and actual points of origination of the multifarious materials that are grown or mined or synthesized by the chemist which play their part in the ultimate job of automobile manufacture.

Her grown-up boys and girls are still playing the game and they are now teaching it to their own children.

At once he raised his voice in a howl that could be heard all over the house. The six Albright children waited patiently for his crying to subside and then they began to enumerate the things that could be done on a stormy day. The visitor, a spoiled, only child, would listen to none of them, so they cheerfully set to work to make taffy in the big kitchen, leaving him, disagreeable and unhappy, in the living room. Presently the smell of good sirup reached the boy and he decided that it would be interesting to investigate what was going on in the kitchen. 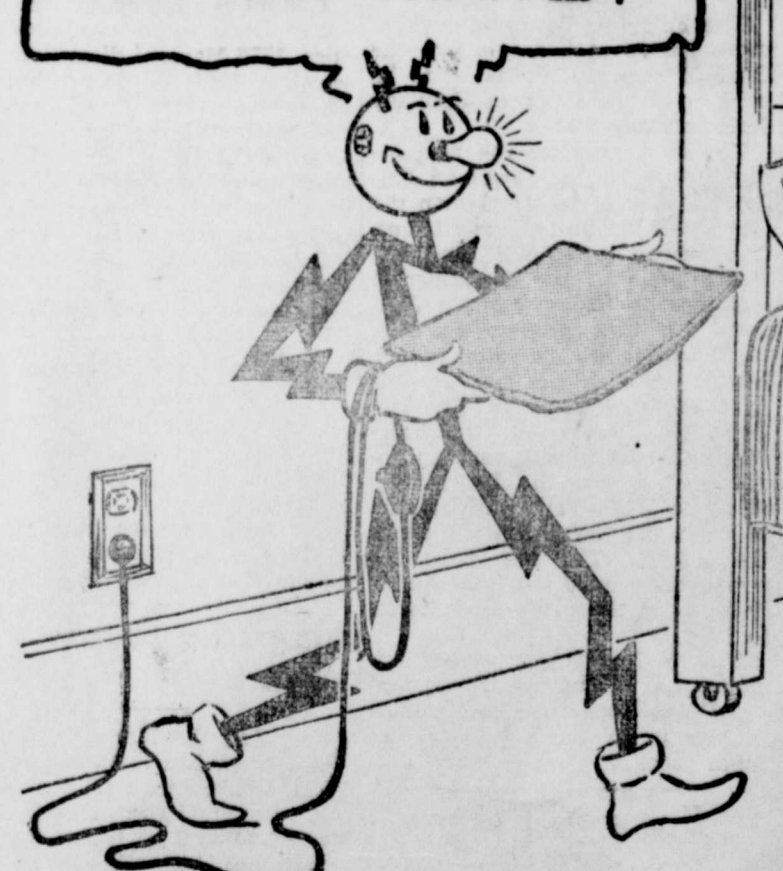

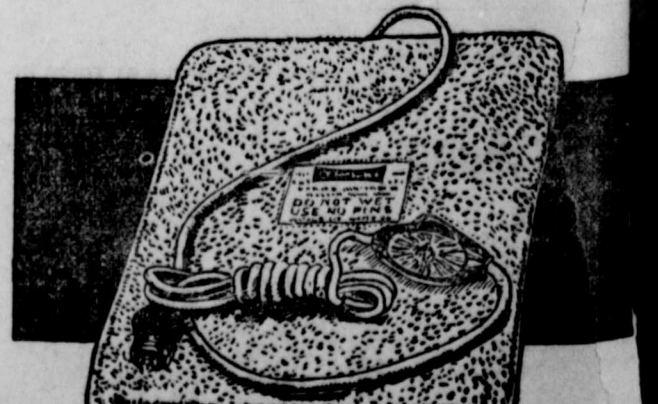

RECIPES

Dry Philadelphia Stuffing

2 quarts of stale bread finely
crumbled
2 level tablespoons of salt
1 heaping teaspoon of pepper
2 teaspoons of powdered sum-
mer savory
2 teaspoons of minced parsley
1 teaspoon of powdered sage
1 cup of butter

Rub the butter in with the
bread crumbs and then add the
seasonings. Make this the day
before so that the seasoning will
have a chance to flavor. If you
wish an onion shopped fine can
also be added.

This dressing is neither soggy
or heavy and when roasted in a
fowl it becomes sufficiently
moist.

Cover the dressing with a
damp cloth if it is prepared the
night before.

Cheese Biscuits

2 cups of flour
3 teaspoons of baking pow-
der
1 teaspoon of salt
3-4 cup of grated American
cheese
3 tablespoons of shortening
2-3 cup of milk

Sift the flour once before
measuring. Add the baking pow-
der and salt and then sift the
three together. Add the cheese
and then cut in the shortening
until it resembles fine meal. Next
add the milk, then mix the dough
until it follows the spoon around
the bowl, then turn out on a
floured board. Knead lightly for
a minute then roll it out one-half
inch thick and cut with a small
biscuit cutter.

Place the biscuits on an un-
greased baking sheet and bake in
a hot oven for fifteen minutes.

Mashed Sweet Potatoes

Boil or bake the sweet potatoes
with their jackets on.
Scoop the potato out of the

jacket and mash it, then add one
cup of orange juice, salt and
pepper to taste, and butter. Chop
up some English walnuts and add to
the potatoes. Place the mashed
potato in a casserole or else they
can be stuffed back into the po-
tato jackets. Put in a hot oven
and bake for one-half hour be-
fore serving.

If you wish, marshmallows can
be cut in two and placed on top
of the potatoes. Then place in
oven to brown.

Texas 39th State In Proportion Of Industry Workers

(SPECIAL TO THE STAR)

DALLAS, Jan. 4.—Texas, the
nation's fifth ranking state in
population, stands only 39th in
percentage of workers gainfully
employed in manufacturing and
mechanical industries, and, al-
though it is the leading state in
value of mineral production, is
only 15th in ratio of persons en-
gaged in mineral producing in-
dustries.

These are two of the more sig-
nificant items illustrating Texas
'occupational characteristics' con-
tained in a recent Dun and
Bradstreet survey of "resources
and debts of the 48 states," says
a report of the All-South Devel-
opment Council. While the sur-
vey deals primarily with debt-
paying abilities of the states, the
analysis of economic character-
istics directly affecting these
abilities naturally reveals com-
parisons useful in charting indus-
trial expansion possibilities, the
report pointed out.

Instead of identifying the vari-
ous states economically by their
totals of production in the three
principal productive divisions—
agriculture, minerals, and man-
ufacturing—the survey identifies
them by the proportions of work-
ing population engaged in each.
This method minimizes much of
the dominance which Texas, by
virtue of its great size, has
seemed to have in various agri-
cultural tables. It is outranked
by 13 other states in percentage
of population engaged in agricul-
ture.

In a tabulated analysis of pro-
portionate "gainfully employ-
ment" for all the states and the
country as a whole, Texas' per-
centage of workers in manufac-
turing, 15.6, shows a greater de-
ficiency from the U. S. normal
of 29.3, than any other division.

Remember Pedestrians

Only half of the 36,800 people
by automobile accidents in the
States last year were pedes-
trians according to figures released by
Travelers Insurance Company.

In most cases, the pedestrians asked
seldom that automobiles come
the sidewalk and chase pedes-
trians. Sometimes they do, but not
rule, a pedestrian wants it and
put where he can get it.

He'll pit his frail, watery flesh and
bones against a ton or two of
crushing steel and glass and flaming

He'll put his life in the hands of
a car coming at him at 25 to
30 miles an hour—drivers, many of
them, if he knew them personally, he
trust with ten cents worth
of meat.

He'll walk along a country road
back to traffic (instead of
where he should) and leave it to

the assorted morons, nit-wits, kids
drunks and a certain percentage of
careful, intelligent drivers to see that
they don't bump him into kingdom
come.

He won't be a sissy, so instead of
waiting for traffic lights in city streets
he'll dart out into a mess of swift

block. (4,640 killed this way last

parked cars without peeking (1,320)

but most pedestrians who get killed
or maimed by motor cars ask for it
and—GET IT!

I'd say that it ought to be easy to
eliminate 10,000 pedestrian deaths a
year—if the pedes-
trians were interested.

Congressmen W. D. McFarlane Returns For Busy Session

Just Laws

Mr. Robert Jackson, assistant Attorney General's, radio broadcasts on last Sunday and Thursday nights was apparently the opening gun answering the campaign of propaganda of big business, which seems to be determined to completely sabotage the New Deal program and repeal all laws conflicting with their special privileged rights. The subsidized press continues to show its teeth, and some critics ask for specific proof, which of course in detail they would be the first to howl, as shown by the reactions to Mr. Jackson's speech which gives sufficient proof to satisfy those who know these facts to be true.

Economic Trends

Brookings Institute figures, given by Dr. Moulton in his last book, "Income and Economic progress", points out that during the peak year of 1929, of the fifteen billion dollars saved that thirteen billion dollars accrued to ten percent of the population; that sixty thousand families at the top saved as much as twenty-five million families at the bottom.

Certainly Dr. Moulton, writing for Brookings Institute, is known to be very conservative. Mr. Stuart Chase, another recognized economist, analyzing the Brookings report points out that during the same peak year, 1929, that the five hundred odd families with incomes over a million dollars each, spent as a group only eighty-seven million dollars, leaving more than one billion dollars of their combined incomes for saving and investment.

All record evidence from all sources reveals that during the past five years the pump priming operations of this Administration to force money back into trade channels and to place buying power back into the hands of the people has seen the efforts of the Federal Government largely nullified by the same hoggish group who takes the lion share of the profits due to their monopolistic set up and their powerful hold on the country, and they offer nothing in return but criticism and abuse. There is a limit to the patience of the people as to how long they will stand this kind of treatment.

Undistributed Profits and Capital Gains Tax Repeal

Instead of being satisfied and offering to cooperate with the undistributed profits tax law, which no one can fairly point out has done more than to require Big Business to distribute their enormous surpluses and profits to their stock holders rather than retain them, which permits their officers and directors to pay themselves large salaries and bonuses. These officers and directors of big business are mad and they do not want to be forced to give up their large accumulated surpluses

upon which they have paid the Federal Government no tax. They want to keep these large surpluses for their own private benefit. Naturally we can't blame them for that, but as representatives of the people it would be very unfair for Congress to let these captains of industry get by with any such program. Outside of giving the smaller corporations a little more liberal exemptions, the undistributed profits tax is fair and sound and should be continued. This law is of much more benefit to the stock holders of the corporations than it is in raising additional revenue for the Government.

The Capital Gains Tax repeal squawk, comes largely from the group of Wall Street gamblers and whose who bought their stocks on the depression low of 1932 and now want to sell these stocks and pay just as little tax as possible on their gambling transactions. If the subsidized press and the plutocratic racketeers would tell the people the truth, they would be forced to admit these facts are true.

Mr. Jackson and Mr. Ickes, in their radio broadcasts have forcefully called to the attention of the people the seriousness of the

situation. What are we going to do about it? Are we going to let these 500 or less families move the Capitol back to Wall Street or are we, as representatives of the great masses of the people, going to stand and fight with the president for equal rights and opportunities for all and fulfill our Democratic Platform pledge to the people?

If the different well known monopolies should now offer to enter into a consent decree with the Department of Justice that they would dissolve their corporations, as a matter of fact, would this get the desired results? Looking back through the years, did dissolving the Standard Oil Company dissolve that monopoly? Did dissolving the communications monopoly dissolve that monopoly? Did the shuffling of stock among the stock holders change the monopolistic tie up and management of any monopoly through the ages? The answer is NO. It seems that we must try new methods to cope with this situation. European Countries have successfully met the same problems by setting up cooperatives who have been able to combat with their big business by furnishing better goods for less money through government help. Certainly we have not exhausted our remedy through taxation. Mr. Stuart Chase says regarding the sterile savings of the five hundred group:

"If the government wants to soak the rich to the full extent of their unproductive savings, nothing but good can come of it, provided the taxes so collected are transformed into active purchasing power. No worker, no farmer, no productive business man can do aught but benefit by the transfer."

The Calendar

The President will open the session January 3rd by personally delivering his message to the joint session of the Congress. It is believed that the President is thoroughly dissatisfied with the results accomplished at the recent special session and is determined to show a more militant attitude in legislative matters during the coming session. It is well that he should for on the results of this session will largely depend the future policy and success of Democratic Government in America. We are at the cross roads. The time is here when we must either, legislatively speaking, turn right or left. Will the Congress legislate for all the people or will it fold up, back track and cringe to the whip of the privileged group?

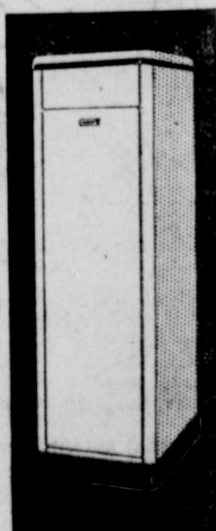

Summary of Home Demo Clubs Work In Wichita County

LETA H. BENNETT, DEMONSTRATION AGENT

There are 15 active Home Dem- onstration Clubs in Wichita Coun- ty that work under the direction of Leta H. Bennett, County Home Demonstration agent. They are Barwise, Bowie, Beaver Creek, Pleasant Valley, Valley View, Westmoreland and Wichita Gar- dens, Hillcrest, Friberg, Sunshine Hill, South Electra, City View Enterprise, Ray Community and Hardin. There are 262 active members in the clubs.

There is a county council which is made up of the president from each club and one elected for each club. This group meets monthly and is the body that plans the county wide activities. During the year of 1937 the council has sponsored a county choral club of twenty two members which has met monthly; the send- ing of three delegates to the meet- ing of the Texas Home Demo- stration Association; a clothing and food exhibit at the Wichita County Fair; a County wide Christmas party at the Y. W. C. A. which 150 women attended; a two day camp for the women, a contest for the club secretaries' books; furnished the pins award- ed to outstanding 4-H club girls; a good neighbor campaign and has given gifts to the departing dis- trict agent, council secretary and the treasurer and the present council chairman.

The two major demonstrations conducted with the Home Demo- stration Clubs during the year were kitchen improvement and wardrobe. The kitchen improve- ment was a new demonstration, but the wardrobe work was the fourth and last year. Two women in each club were selected as demonstrators; one to work es- pecially on kitchen and one on wardrobe. The other women are cooperators. There are certain requirements made of all the women, but the work of the demon- strator is to serve as an example to the cooperators.

In the wardrobe work one of the goals or requirements was to keep a family clothing account. There were 79 women who did this and reported they spent \$5,716.97 or an average of \$81.67 per family. There were 7 of the 15 demonstrators to keep in- dividual accounts. They spent \$303.61 or an average of \$43.80. The other 8 kept their accounts with the family and they spent \$626.00 or an average of \$78.25 per family.

Many interesting things were reported by the women who kept these accounts. Mrs. S. A. Vernon, demonstrator of the Hillcrest club, said, "The leaks in her cloth- ing account was found to be hose and shoes". Mrs. W. C. Lile, de- monstrator of the Wichita Gar- dens, said, "Not only do I have a record of what the clothing for my family for a year cost, but I found out the durability of some articles and the poor quality of others for in this account you have the date the articles were bought and the date it was discarded".

The clothing storage space was another phase of the wardrobe work. Two demonstrators built new closets and 12 improved theirs. There were 24 new ones built and 26 improved by the co- operators. Mrs. E. W. Pohlman, wardrobe demonstrator of the En- terprise club built a portable closet 7 ft. high, 4 ft. wide and 26 inches deep for \$12.05. The mat- erial is panel board. Two doors make the front of this closet. There is a wide shelf at the top of the closet for hats or quilts. The lower part is divided into two sections; one for the adult clothing, and the other one has three shelves for folded garments. Just below these shelves is a rod for the little girl's clothing. A separate storage space under the stairway was made into a closet for the son's clothing.

Children's clothing was also another phase of the wardrobe work. There were 1,112 children's garments made by 170 women.

The 4-H club girls also worked on clothing during 1937. There were 9 demonstrators who kept their clothing accounts. They spent \$119.75 or 19.96 per girl. There were 23 cooperators to re- port their accounts and made a total of \$357.22 spent.

There were 36 girls who made and exhibited a dress and slip this year. There were 10 other dresses made and 52 under gar- ments that were not exhibited. Each of the 79 club girls on the roll equipped a sewing box. They

studied posture and good looks for girls to improve themselves along with their wardrobe work.

There were 3 new closets built and 3 improved by the demon- strators and two new ones and 7 improved by the cooperators. Juanita and Mary Flippin of Enterprise 4-H club have a nice new closet. Juanita was the ward- robe demonstrator, and the closet she planned and built is large enough for both the girls to have one side each for it is 6 ft. wide. Even Juanita's mother shares the closet by using the top part for the storage of bedding. This is partitioned off and has a door opening into it.

There were 105 and one half days spent by the County Home Demonstration Agent developing the wardrobe work with the women and girls. There were 99 method demonstrations given and 87 different homes visited.

The kitchen improvement was new work. There were 14 of the 15 demonstrators to complete what they planned to do this year and 132 of the cooperators to com- plete their kitchens. One of the first things worked on was to improve the walls, floors or woodwork of the kitchen. All of the 15 demonstrators did this and 209 cooperators. Some of the walls were papered with oil cloth from the base board up 36 or 52 inches. This makes a very durable finish and one easily cleaned. To make the kitchen seem larger, some of the walls an ceiling were papered alike.

Many kitchens needed light and air added to them. There were 4 new windows added by the 14 demonstrators, and 6 changed while the cooperators changed or added 132. All of these were prop- erly screened so they could be easily cleaned.

The most important improve- ment was getting water piped in and out of the kitchens. A survey was made and of 262 women 145 had sinks with water piped in and out. There were 33 new sinks added this year and water piped in and out to all of these. There were 6 women who had sinks that year added water piped in.

A study of the arrangement of the kitchens were made and many changes were made so as to save time and energy.

The 14 demonstrators spent \$635.15 improving their kitchens. The majority of this was spent for 4 new gas stoves and 7 built in cabinets.

All of the kitchens were open for inspection at the Achiev- ement days held in November. There were 799 people to visit them.

The Home Demonstration agent gave 45 method demonstrations developing this demonstration. She made 88 home visits and spent 66 days on this demon- stration.

Some interesting things have been said and done by the women and their families as

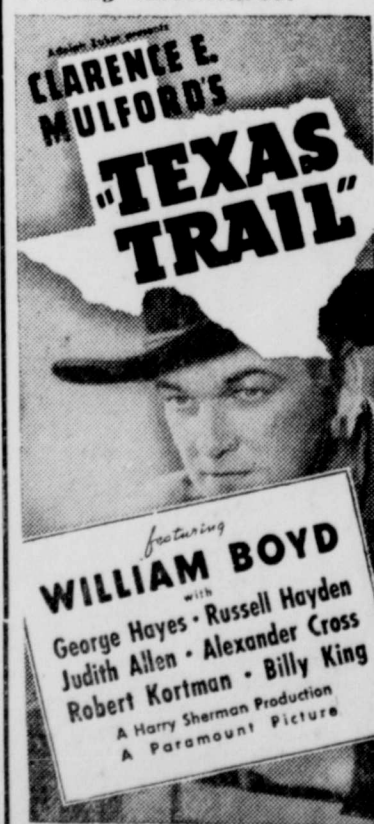

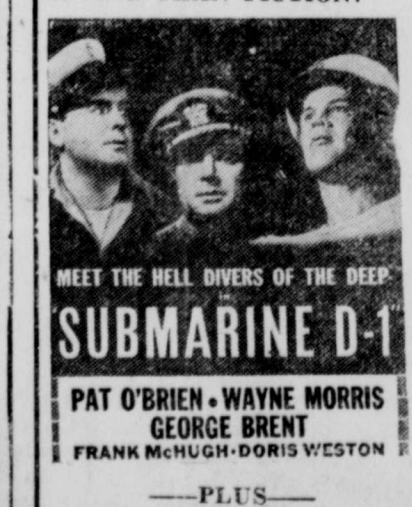
