## Largest Crowd of 1932 Visits Lamesa Trades Day

The Lamesa and Dawson County Trades Day which was held on Saturday, July 2nd, brought the largest crowd to town that has been seen here since the "good old days." Elaborate plans are being made for the next Trades Day, which will be held on August 1st, First Monday.

As has been the custom, liberal prizes and contests will be conducted during this day and it is expected that an even larger crowd will attend, as the Trades Day interest is growing, and crowds are larger each time.

365 terrapins were registered at the Courier office last Saturday, which, as one of our merchants put it, is "something." The Courier purchased these terrapins at 50 cents per head, and paid for them with a year's subscription of the paper.

Large crowds witnessed the terrapin races conducted hourly throughout the day. THE TWENTY DOLLARS IN GOLD went to Mrs. Nellie Cox, whose terrapin was successful in surviving all the races.

## RULES GOVERNING BASEBALL TOURNEY

The following are the rules governing the teams and players in the Dawson county fifth annual baseball tournament.

1. Each team can carry fifteen players.

2. Any player is eligible for any team of his choice, who has played in any previous Dawson county tournament.

3. Any team may enter three players with out previous tournament experience, with restrictions that only one such player be a pitcher.

4. All players must be listed on their respective teams by July 30th.

5. Each team is requested to deposit \$10.00 with the committee by July 30th.

6. Each manager is requested to have his team on the field in time for each game.

7. Teams draw for opponents for first game, then after the winners play winners, losers play losers, for two rounds Losers shall play back in order first. After second round losers play back in order for any team waiting opponents. Winners play back in order.

8. Winners of first money shall draw 65 percent, and second place draws 35 percent of prize money. Any Dawson county player is eligible for the team of his choice.

The first game of the tournament will be played on August 7. It is indicated there will be around twelve teams in the tournament. All players so far are showing great interest, and are very anxious to put on one of the best tournaments ever held in this county.

### IMPORTANT NOTICE TO TAXPAYERS

Arts 689a-II to 689a-XVIII Acts of the 42nd Legislature 1931, provided that the Commissioners' court, City Government, and Independent and Common School Districts, shall each year have a hearing after having given public notice of such hearing, in order that any taxpayer who desires to do so may appear and participate in such hearing, which is for the purpose of fixing the budget for the years' expenditures. The law further provide that such changes may be made in the budget as in their judgment and the INTEREST OF THE TAXPAYERS DEMAND. Such public hearing must be had before the levy of taxes for that year and in the case of the Commissioners' Court not earlier than August 15th.

This law was enacted solely for the benefit of the tax payer and if relief is desired it is necessary to see that it is carried out.

This hearing relates solely to the budget and rate of taxation and must not be confused with assessed valuations, because if the valuations are placed too high before this meeting, the lowering of the rate would not afford sufficient relief, and would afford none whatever as to the State tax as it has its own rate fixing body.

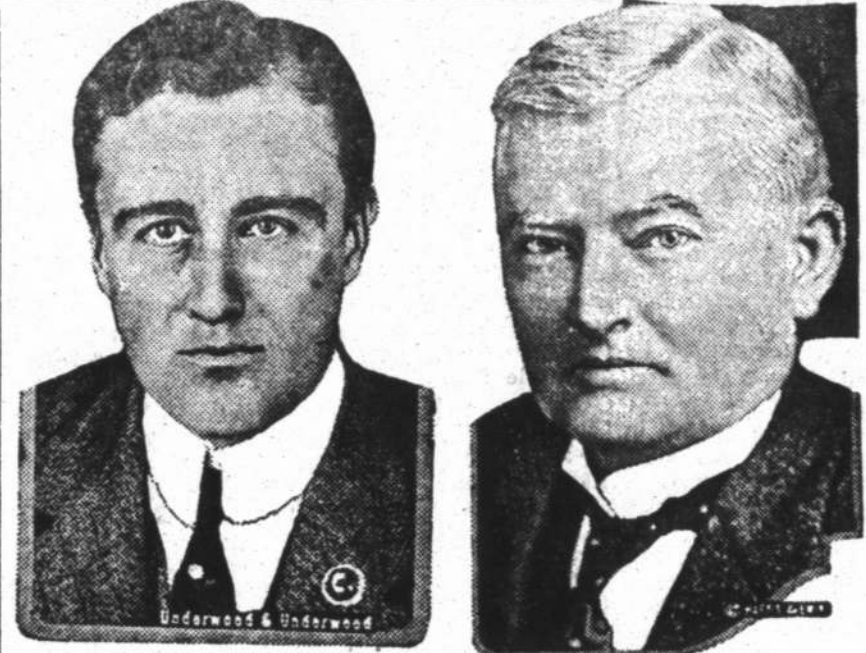
I have been requested by a number of taxpayers to call a meeting of all taxpayers who are interested in tax relief, for the purpose of committees being selected to meet with these various tax fixing bodies, therefore, I as Chairman of our Tax Relief Association, do hereby request that every taxpayer who is interested in tax relief to meet in the District Court Room of the County of Dawson, Saturday July 9th at 3 o'clock p. m. for the purpose of naming committees to meet with the County Commissioners, the City Commissioners and the various Independent and Common School Districts for the purpose above stated.

This meeting will be of utmost importance to every tax payer in the county and it is hoped that everyone who desires tax relief, and is willing to do his part to get it, will be present and participate in this meeting. It would not be wise on our part to fall to avail ourselves of the rights granted us and if we do, let's not complain at taxpaying time, that taxes are too high.

## LAMESA'S FIRST ANNUAL RODEO RECALLS PIONEER DAYS OF LONG AGO

The "Old Fashioned" rodeo which was staged at the ball park here, July 4th drew one of the largest crowds ever assembled in Lamesa to participate in an Independence Day Celebration.

Conservative estimates place the attendance between 1200 and 1500 persons who filled the grandstand and bleachers at the ball park to witness the bronc riding, steer riding, calf roping, goat roping and other contests which comprised a full afternoon's entertainment.

"Cow-hands" from Dawson, Gaines, Borden, Howard, Martin and other West Texas counties took part in the contests, and while no records set at National Rodeos were broken many fine exhibitions were seen in all phases of the Fourth program.

Approximately 50 persons placed their hats in the ring to wager their skill against that of the horses, steers calves and goats.

The contest winners and prizes were: Calf Roping: Charlie Lyons of Slaughter Ranch first, \$15.00; Jess Slaughter, Big Spring, second, \$8.00; C. B. Curry, Slaughter Ranch third, \$5.00.

Goat Roping: Bill Teague and C. D. Pounds tied for first place and divided the first and second place money, totaling \$22.00; J. H. Collett won \$4.00 as third prize.

Following the rodeo, members of the local Polo Club, chose sides and put on a free Polo game, which provided entertainment for the visitors, and gave their first thrills in the sport.

Enthusiasm and interest manifested in the Rodeo and Polo games was far above the committee's expectations, and was so well received that the people backing this celebration promptly decided to make it an annual affair with their slogan, "Big and Better Rodeos each year."

## Lamesa's Annual Clean Up Campaign Now Underway

### ANNOUNCEMENT OF INTEREST TO TAXPAYERS

Two announcements of interest to tax payers in Texas have been made by Chas. N. Shaver, state superintendent of public instruction and candidate for his first elective term to that office. These concern the July payment of the per capita apportionment and the exemption of teachers' salary warrants from the federal two cent tax.

Mr. Shaver announced that another payment of the school apportionment will be made about July 5. A dollar of the apportionment was sent out June 15, making \$12 a child for the year.

Teachers' salary warrants and checks drawn by school officials to meet the obligations of the school are not subject to the federal two-cent check tax Mr. Shaver has been notified by the United States Internal Revenue Office.

"Figured as a saving of 18c each year for each teacher, this rubbing will save the State \$10,000 on salary warrants," Mr. Shaver stated.
