

Typhoid Vaccination Protects Individual

Austin—Parents of boy scouts, girl scouts, and other young people going to camps of any kind, are urged by Dr. John W. Brown, State Health Officer, to have the family physician vaccinate each individual against typhoid fever. Some of the danger points for spread of typhoid is said, are creek swimming holes and flowing springs. Even though the water at these places may appear clear and sparkling, there is danger that it is contaminated.

"Typhoid fever is an unnecessary disease," Dr. Brown said. "Every case is due either to community negligence or to the carelessness or ignorance of some individual. External vigilance in maintaining sanitary surroundings and a pure water supply is necessary."

"Three shots of typhoid vaccine—a week apart—will put your child in the 'protected' class. As it takes several weeks for the protective treatment to establish itself in the body, have it done now."

"Typhoid fever is an intestinal complaint caused by the typhoid bacillus. The digestive tract of a patient is consequently infected by typhoid germs. Anything that may be contaminated by the body discharges is apt to be infectious and dangerous."

"The prevention of typhoid fever is peculiarly a matter of community responsibility. In cities large and small these providing for (1) proper disposal of human excreta through sewage disposal plants and toilets of sanitary type; (2) safe public and well water supplies; (3) extermination of flies; (4) healthy food handlers; (5) supervision of disease carriers and (6) public milk supplies of high quality with the added safeguard of careful pasteurization."

"Prevention of single cases or of epidemics of typhoid fever is dependent upon cooperation of individuals with public health officers in endeavoring to stamp out typhoid entirely."

TERRACES AND CONTOUR FARMING SAVE RAINFALL

J. T. Reese, Superintendent of the E. C. W. Camp, Soil Conservation Service, Littlefield, Texas, reports considerable difference in moisture penetration on terraced and contoured land of farm cooperators of the Soil Conservation Service as compared to fields farmed in straight rows following recent rains.

Mr. D. O. Williams, Abernathy, Texas, on a terraced clay loam soil, had moisture to a depth of 90 inches following a 3 1/2 inch rain in 30 minutes on April 26, and 4 1/2 inches of rain falling slowly from May 23 to 30. Similar land farmed in straight rows had moisture to a depth of 38 1/2 inches.

L. A. Harrell, also of Abernathy, had the same rains on a clay loam field which had been listed on the contour. He had moisture to a depth of 95 1/2 inches as compared to 38 1/2 inches of moisture penetration on a similar adjoining field unterraced and farmed in straight rows.

On a terraced and contour-listed sandy loam field on K. W. Wells, Littlefield, Texas, there was an average depth of moisture of 45 inches as compared to an average of 36 inches of moisture found on an adjoining unterraced field farmed in straight rows.

In all tests the greatest difference in moisture penetration was found following heavy, rapidly falling rains.

40,000 Expected To Receive Aid July 1

Orville Carpenter, old age assistance director, said last week that pensions ranging from about \$9 to \$30 will be paid to approximately 40,000 persons in Texas beginning with July 1st. The average payment will be about \$20, he estimates.

This will effect scores of older persons in our own community, we are told. Pension officials report nearly 500 applicants in the county many of whom will qualify. This additional money will be no small item in business, as putting that many individuals on a self sustaining basis will materially effect the financial welfare of not only themselves but also their families as well.

All payments are to be made on a basis of need, the director stated. The maximum will be \$30, \$15 from the state and \$15 from the federal government.

Carpenter said there was no doubt that payment will start on July 1st, as both state and federal money will be in the treasury of the state of Texas before that date. Texas was recently granted \$1,181,250 by the Social Security board.

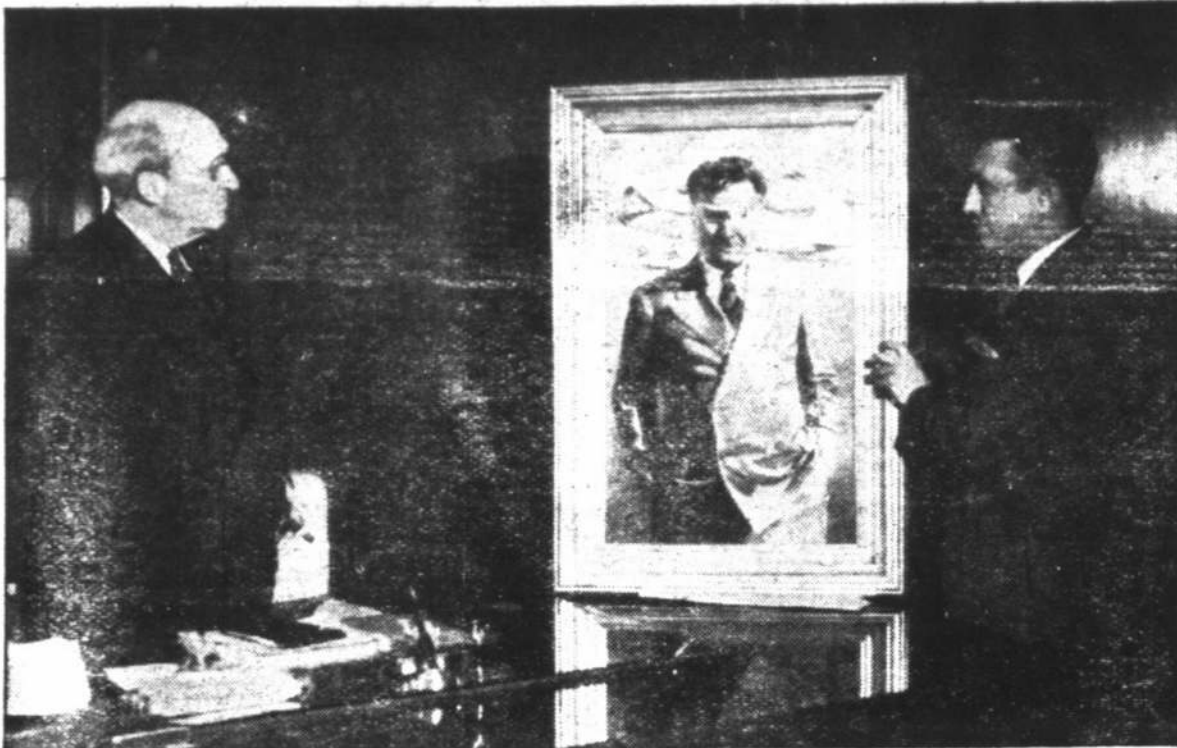

PRACTICAL COOKERY

Denton—Leaf vegetables such as spinach and Swiss chard are valuable for their minerals and vitamins. For this reason they should be used regularly as a food staple.

In the preparation of these vegetables it is absurd to cook the leaves until the stems are tender. The leaf is the most valuable as well as the most palatable part. Therefore remove the stem from all except the very tender center leaves and cook only until the leaves are somewhat tender but not soft. Much of the mineral and vitamin content is lost by cooking in water for a long time. They should be cooked over a low fire and should be turned with a fork occasionally. For greens which are in good condition four to ten minutes of cooking is sufficient.

Leaf vegetables may be served buttered, in croquettes, souffles, in casserole dishes or moulded.

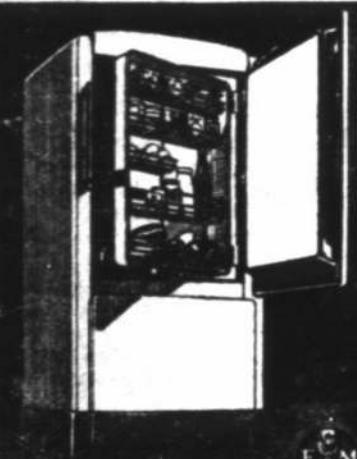

FARM NOTES

By Joe C. Williams, County Agent

IMPORTANT

Any producer who has plowed under a green manure crop to qualify for a soil building payment must immediately fill out Form T.A.C.-3, Statement of Completed Soil Building Practices. This form will be taken as evidence of compliance and must be certified to by two neighboring producers and have the approval of a community committeeman. The forms are on hand in the office of the county agent.

New Ruling on Soil Depleting Crops
Three supplementary recommendations of the Texas State Committee on Soil Conservation program have been approved by the Secretary of Agriculture as was announced by A. L. Smith, executive secretary of the State Committee, and Jack Shelton, vice-director and state agent of the Extension Service.

The first recommendation approved is that the term Soil-conserving crops has been ruled to mean any crop on crop land upon which an approved soil-building practice is carried out in 1936, and from which no soil-depleting crop is harvested in 1936.

The second recommendation that was approved for the State of Texas states that sorghum or millet when seeded on crop land between January 1, 1936 and July 31, 1936, if all the crop is left on the land or plowed under, will be regarded as a soil-conserving crop.

The third recommendation approved is in regard to a soil-building practice which states that any sorghum, sudan grass or millet will receive a soil building practice payment at the rate of \$1.00 per acre when seeded on crop land between January 1, 1936 and July

31, 1936, and all the crop left on the land or plowed under, providing that all the requirements for grant are complied with.

The soil depleting crops that effect this county and West Texas in general are: Corn, sweet corn, pop corn, Cotton, truck and vegetable crops, including water melons. Peanuts when harvested, grain sorghums, sweet sorghums and millets. Small grains when harvested for grain or hay, which includes wheat, oats, barley, rye, and grain mixtures. Soybeans if harvested for crushing.

In other words the term sorghums means any sorghums, even Milo, hegari, cane, feterita. But in order to qualify for the payments including the lease money as well as the dollar the producer must not harvest any of the crops that are on the so called lease land.

In plain words that means that we in the agent's office see it to mean that in case a producer harvests any of the crops listed as soil depleting crops he will forfeit the entire payment due him, the lease money as well as the \$1.00 per acre, in fact, all monies that are to come to him. In case crops are harvested off the leased land. This does not apply to the acreage other than that acreage leased to the Secretary of Agriculture.

Large Percent of the Farmers Have Signed Work Sheets

Over ninety two percent of the farmers of the county have signed Work Sheets, under the new program. However some have stated that they had no intention of complying with the regulations preferring to go on and plant as they please but have stated they want to establish a base due to the fact that they might desire to come into the program in the future. Some have stated, that in case of hail

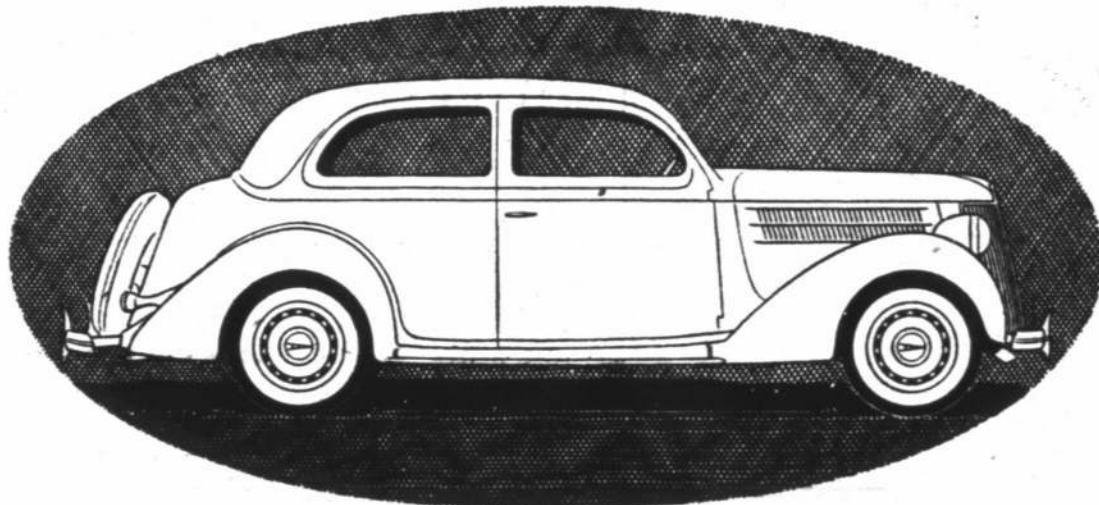

as has already happened in Midland County, they would automatically become eligible for the payment as they in Midland County were completely hauled out in part of the county last week.

As one of the farmers expressed himself this week, "I want to play safe and have the protection against hail, as I could be hauled out completely and then would be eligible to get the money as it would be too late to plant cotton if it should hail within the next few days." The insurance feature is a good one for those who look at the program from that standpoint.

However should you want to enter the program another year it is best that you fill out a work sheet in order that you will be eligible for the program of 1937 should you so desire. As we have stated before the work sheet does not obligate the producer in any way for this year, as he will be paid off for what is found and approved by the committee who checks the particular farm.

Boys 4-H Clubs

There are meetings being held at the different schools in which clubs have been organized for the purpose of selecting the boy that is the most physically fit or the healthiest boy in the county that is enrolled in the club work.

Most of the boys who are using pigs for demonstrations have secured the pigs and are now keeping records on the animals. There are at present six calves on feed and those boys that are planning on feeding calves will get their calves and put on feed not later than August 1. Some good calves have been selected for the feeding demonstrations. The boys of course, are keeping records on their cost of feeding and labor used in taking care of the animals as well as the crops that are now being worked out by the boys.

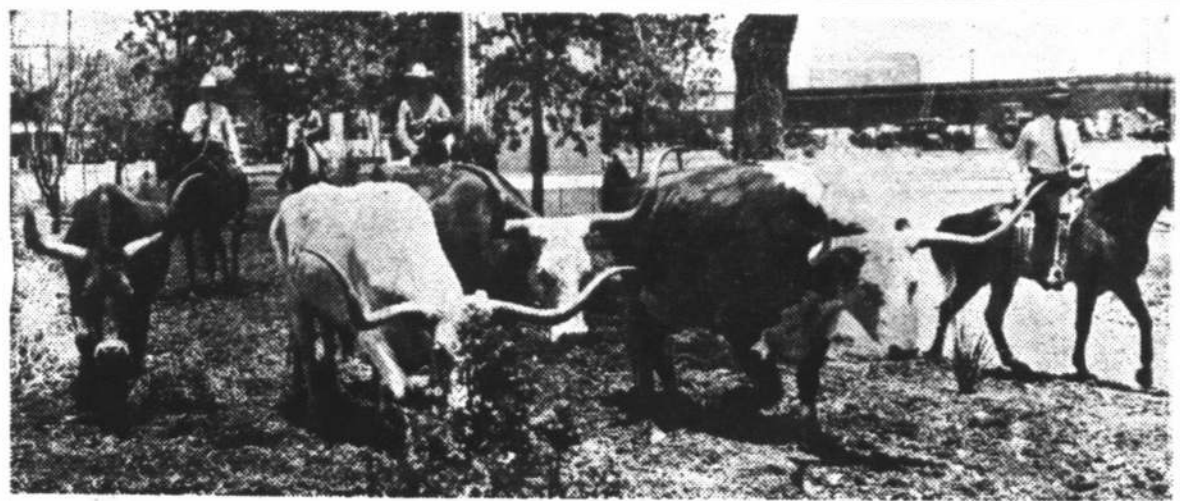

Uniform Supports For Mail Boxes To Be Placed On Hiway

The Lamesa postoffice has on display in front of the office, a sample mail box support which is being built by the state highway department co-operating with the local postal authorities, to be used on highways No. 15 through Dawson County.

The supports are built with a concrete footing so that it can not be easily blown or pushed over, yet may be moved to permit grading of shoulders of the roadway. They will be much more convenient to the highway workers to replace the present heterogeneous assortment of mail box supports consisting of old milk cans, oil barrels, wagon and buggy wheels and what-nots that have been eye-sores to the traveling public.

The supports are made and put up by the state highway department at no expense to the mail patrons. It is part of the state wide plan to beautify Texas highways.

It is to be hoped that it will not be too long before the county road department can do the same on the lateral roads, which are used for mail delivery. It is not only a matter of looks, but the uniform height and distance from the road are practical advantages.

School Transfers Must Be Applied For During July

Miss Pauline Bulsterbaum, county superintendent, would like to call attention to the fact that patrons desiring to transfer their children from one district to another may do so during the month of July. Application for transfer may be made at the county superintendent's office not earlier than July 1, and not later than July 31.

Only children within the scholastic ages, 6 to 17 inclusive may be transferred. Children above the scholastic age who reside in districts where their grades are not offered may be transferred by the county board, and application for such transfer is not necessary.

Patrons are also reminded that if they transfer children whose grades are taught at home, they will be obliged to pay tuition after the expiration of time allowed for scholastic money if the school is accredited. Tuition charges for such children have been made obligatory on such schools by the State Department of Education.

There is no cost attached to the transfer of children and patrons are asked not to wait until the deadline date to make transfers. No transfers may be made after July 31.

Klondike School Gets Additional Credits

According to an official report from the Division of Supervision, of the State Department of Education, received by Mr. W. C. McKenzie, Superintendent of Klondike School, that school has been granted credits in the following subjects: Commercial Geography, 1-2 unit; commercial arithmetic, 1-2 unit; ancient history, 1 unit; American history, 1 unit; English, 1 unit (additional); plane geometry, 1 unit; biology, 1 unit; general science, 1 unit.

Subjects in which credits were earned last year were Algebra and II, modern history I, English I and II, and Civics 1-2 credit.

This gives Klondike a total of twelve and one-half credits. Only two and one-half additional credits are needed to make Klondike a fully-accredited four year high school, and Mr. McKenzie states that these and other credits will be earned this year so that pupils graduating from Klondike High School will be accepted into any college or university in the State of Texas without examination.

The Klondike faculty and board are to be congratulated upon their achievement during the past two years.

Local NRS Office Can Supply Needed Help In Any Line

The National Re-employment Service office in Lamesa is especially anxious at this time to have the attention of the land owners and farmers of the section. Listed on its files of unemployed men are several hundred men and boys whose registration shows them experienced in all kinds of farm work. From this list the needs of practically every farmer for workers during the seasonal work periods could be supplied. A call on the office by letter or in person, giving the number of men needed, character of the work, time wanted and duration of the job could be given attention by the employment office and save the employer time during his rush work period.

This applies, not only to Dawson County, but to any of the adjoining counties now served by the National Re-employment Service. Further, these unemployed workers are all local people and employment given them would be of direct benefit to the community in general.

Applications in this county show persons capable of almost any kind of work that might be needed locally. There are listed clerks, salespeople, stenographers, bookkeepers, machinists, ginners, office workers, domestic help and many others whose work history shows them to be experienced and willing workers.

\$40,000 Received In Payment Of Veterans' Bonds

With only 8 registered packages of bonds to veterans undelivered in the local postoffice out of approximately 200 received so far it looks like the Bonus Bonds will be in circulation in Dawson County before long.

The local postoffice has already certified 161 veterans' bonds and mailed them to Dallas for payment. The total amount of these were about \$77,000 and more than \$40,000 have already been returned in checks to the veterans. Monday morning the postmen were bringing cheer to many in the form of these checks, and already the channels of trade have felt the release of this money in Lamesa.

Quite an amount of this money will be used to pay accounts to doctors, dentists, garages, grocers, dry goods stores. Many will use it to purchase needed equipment for the homes and businesses of the veterans. But there does not seem to be many of the veterans but who intend to make this money do the most good, for they realize this is the end of the payments.

The speed and dispatch with which these bonds were delivered is a remarkable tribute to the efficiency of the postal department, both local and national.

Born to this union were five boys and one girl, Nelson, Raymond, Elmer, Glenn, Claude and Minnie. Claude died in February 1918.

She leaves five grandchildren, Helen, Betty, Dale, Nolen, Charles; and a sister, Mrs. W. D. Edmondson of Lamesa; three brothers, J. L. McNew of Lamesa, J. T. and J. E. McNew of Big Spring. All were present at the funeral.

The deceased came to Texas at the age of fifteen years, to Dawson county in 1906. She was converted at twelve years and joined the Missionary Baptist church after her marriage, and lived and died a devout Christian and a consistent member of that faith.

State Supervisors Report Favorably On Lamesa High School

The Supervision Bulletin to be published in August by the State Department of Education will list the Lamesa High School for the following additional accredited courses granted at the conclusion of the 1935-36 term: Secretarial Training, one additional unit; Typewriting, one half additional unit; Band Music, one credit for second year, and Orchestra Music one additional unit for second year. General Science for one unit in Diversified Occupations. Six and one-half units are therefore added to the courses previously accredited which bring the total to thirty-seven and one-half units. All subjects now offered are accepted for college entrance without examinations and the school takes its place along with the larger high schools of the State in the number and diversity of its offerings.

The news was conveyed to W. K. Crawley, chairman of the Board of Trustees in an official report from J. W. O'Banion, Chief of the Division of Supervision of the State Department of Education. Mr. G. D. Holbrook was the representative making the recommendations and inspections. The report especially named the Music, Occupations and Contemporary Social and Business Ethics departments and stated that "The course of study is well planned to the end that it may better serve the immediate needs of children for year to year." It continues "The city of Lamesa has a school system of which any town of its size should be justly proud. It cannot afford to slacken in the least in the present progress and care of such a system."

He states "The buildings are in a very good state of repair and are well kept. It is evident, however, that the present trend of growth in the community will cause more classroom space to be needed in the near future. This condition is now true in the grade building."

Lamesa Country Club Directors Hear Good Report

A meeting of the Board of Directors of the Lamesa Country Club was held on Monday afternoon, June 22nd. The Country Club has completed the laying out and improvement of a polo field and golf course and also has dug a well and erected a windmill and tank, which insures a plentiful supply of water, not only for use in the club house, but for the irrigation of the trees and shrubbery that will be planted.

Work has been going on for some time in the making of plans for the landscaping and as soon as these plans have been completed, which will probably be very soon, tennis courts, shuffle boards and other games will be provided.

Payments by members has been unusually good, several having voluntarily paid their entire stock subscription in advance instead of by monthly payments. Request has been made of the Federal Land Bank for release of the lien held by it and as soon as it is sent here properly executed, payment will be made as the money is on hand for payment.

College Station—In announcing the main speakers of the daily General Assembly periods of the Centennial Year Farmers' Short Course, Director H. H. Williamson of the Texas Extension Service said, "In selecting speakers, consideration was given to farm activities, including organization; crop production and utilization; national agricultural policies; business and industry and information about Texas."

Carl B. Fritzsche, manager-director of the Farm Chemurgic Council from Dearborn, Michigan, will speak the first day, July 20, Monday, on "Factory Crops on the Farm."

On Tuesday, between 11 and 12 o'clock, Edward O'Neal, president of the American Farm Bureau Federation from Chicago, Illinois, will speak on "Moulding National Policies for Agriculture." O'Neal has been a national figure in farm organization for over 10 years.

On Wednesday, Dr. Minnie L. Moffett from Dallas, will speak on "Success in Business and Industry—a Co-operative Venture." Dr. Moffett has been active in business and women's professional organizations for a number of years.

Thursday, Mrs. Helen Higgins Davis, former Women's State Home Demonstration Agent of the Texas Extension Service, now living in Arlington, Texas, will talk on the topic "Know Texas."

Also on Thursday at the General Assembly period, G. B. Dealey, president of the Dallas News, will announce the State winners of the Centennial

To Build 36,000 Miles Of Terraces In Three Years To Hold Lands

More than 36,000 miles of farm terracing, or enough to make 14 terraces from New York City to Los Angeles, are scheduled for construction by the Soil Conservation Service of the Department of Agriculture during the next three years under agreements with farmers. H. H. Bennett, chief of the service, has announced.

Most of the terracing will be confined in the southeast and will help to protect approximately 500,000 acres from erosion.

To date, the Service has built more than 16,000 miles of terraces, as part of an erosion control program, on farms of more than 200,000 acres. Approximately half of this work was done during the past year. Approximately 950 miles of terraces have been completed in the wind eroded region, according to H. H. Fennell, Regional Conservator.

Bennett emphasized that terraces should be carefully built and that they are not adapted to all parts of the country.

"Terraces are valuable in the control of erosion, especially on moderate slopes of deep, porous soil," he said, "but generally it is essential that they be supplemented by ample vegetation and proper cropping and tillage practices if they are to be effective in long-time erosion control."

"Terracing is only one part of erosion control. More extensive use of adaptable trees and grasses, correct methods of cultivation, increased planting of soil-binding crops and proper crop rotations are among the equally important control measures."

"Experience has shown that terraces are not practicable in all parts of the country because of peculiar soil and climatic conditions in certain sections," Bennett said. "For example, in some parts of Washington state, heavy snows often are followed by sudden thaws. If these thawing periods do not melt all

of the snow, terrace channels are left with alternating sections of snow and water. The snow forms a series of blockades, preventing slow, safe runoff to the protected terrace outlets. With no other route of escape, water breaks over the top of the terrace and flows down the slope, endangering terraces below and often gullying the land."

Similarly, Bennett pointed out that trees and grasses are more practicable than terraces for the control of erosion on steep slopes. Unless runoff is retarded by soil stabilizing trees and grasses, it can gain considerable velocity and, during heavy rains, even those terraces supported by vegetation may be ineffectual in halting the flow of water.

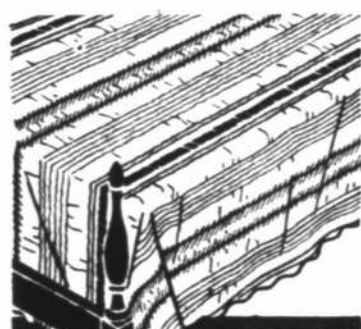

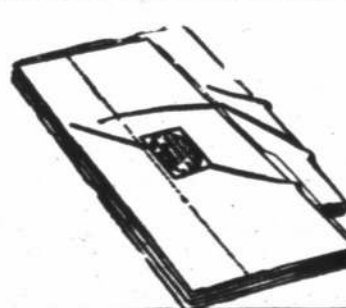

ON TEXAS FARMS

Under the non-interpretative title of "program planning project," men and women in the rural communities of Texas have been meeting during the last six months and analyzing land use customs on Texas farms and ranches.

The object of this work, which was inaugurated by the Extension Service, is to start a flow of live information from the farm to the Department of Agriculture, and the method was for small groups of neighbors to meet and, using prepared schedules, map their own and the whole community's land use.

Two hundred and four counties having been engaged in this work, 70 of these counties made out schedule seven which had to do with gardens, orchards, and sweet potatoes, all for home use.

Figures compiled for the State from these 70 counties are very revealing; 31,649 acres more of orchards are needed in these 70 counties to supply fruit for the home tables; 20,716 more acres of garden are needed in these 70 counties to supply vegetables for home use; and 6,128 acres more of sweet potatoes are needed by the families in these 70 counties.

In releasing these figures which he has assembled from the county reports, George E. Adams, assistant state agent who has had charge of this project comments "These are not the findings of county agricultural and home demonstration agents, but of the men and women who themselves live on Texas farms and ranches. Having come to the conclusion that they need this additional acreage in food for home consumption, it is logical to expect that 1936 will see a considerable increase in home gardens and orchards."

Be Careful July 4 To Avoid Tragedy

Austin, Texas.—Special.—On July 4, 1936, Texans will celebrate along with the State's Centennial year, the one hundred and sixtieth anniversary of National Independence.
Thousands of visitors will be in Texas on this National holiday, and it is up to loyal Texans to do everything possible to see that this day brings pleasure and not tragedy to our visitors on our shores, says a warning from the state department of health.
"While there certainly is no desire to minimize the joys of this national holiday," said Dr. John W. Brown state health officer, "it is only common sense to respect hazards of life and limb, and to govern one's actions accordingly."

"Not so many years ago the newspapers on each July 5 would publish columns detailing the tragedies that were invariably associated with the handling of dangerous fireworks by careless persons. For a number of years now, however, the press has been placing particular emphasis on the need for a 'Safe and Sane Fourth of July,' with the result that accidents of this kind have decreased.
"All injuries, however slight, may carry the lock-jaw or tetanus menace with them, very wound should be cleaned thoroughly and all foreign matter removed. A physician should be consulted immediately, and tetanus anti-toxin administered if necessary.
"Unfortunately, while the hazard of handling fireworks has consistently diminished, that of the automobile has just as consistently been increasing. Every one will agree that to be careless in the operation of a motor vehicle on this day when the roads carry peak loads, is to invite possible injury and even death.
"Your future happiness and health and that of your family may depend on your recognizing and carrying out the ordinary rules of precaution. Obey these rules and live to enjoy many other Fourth of July."
