GOVERNMENT BUYS TEXAS LAND

SAN ANTONIO, July 20.—Purchase by the government of approximately 1,000 acres of land in Kelly Field No. 2, and Brooks Field, is officially reported. The cost was \$198,000. Negotiations are reported under way for government purchase of an additional 1,200 acres in the two fields.

Captain Eric Eades, of the Judge Advocates Department, Washington, who handled the transaction just completed, said he was without official information as to what military usage would be made of the two fields other than that they probably would serve as air stations.

RAILROAD MEN GET GOOD RAISE

HEARING PLAN FOR REMOVING STATE MILITIA

AUSTIN, July 20.—Plans for removal of state troops from Galveston will be discussed at a conference to be held at Galveston tomorrow between the citizens, Governor Hobby, and the Attorney General.

Gov. Hobby and the Attorney General will leave tonight for Galveston to confer with Brigadier General Wolters before going into the conference with the citizens.

ANTHRAX FOUND IN 4 COUNTIES

FORT WORTH, July 20.—Edwards, Kennedy, Uvalde, and Valverde counties have all been placed under quarantine because of an outbreak of anthrax among cattle in those counties. State veterinarians are working under hurried orders to take charge of the situation and prevent further spread of the disease.

MOVIE MACHINE IN EVERY SCHOOL

WASHINGTON, July 20.—A "movie" machine in every public school to aid in the education of the children of the country is the aim of the Visual Education Association, which has opened headquarters here.

Charles F. Hunt, secretary of the association, says Congress will be asked to appropriate a fund to co-operate with the states in carrying out the program, the expense being borne equally by the Federal and state governments.

While estimating the ultimate cost at \$19,500,000, Mr. Hunt anticipated that this sum would be needed by installments and he announced that the association would ask for an immediate appropriation of \$5,000,000 available for expenditure during the next three years.

The association is incorporated in the state of Indiana, its organizers including Charles A. Great-house, former Indiana state superintendent of public instruction; Dr. J. N. Hurty, Indiana commissioner of health; and B. R. Inman, manager of the Indiana Chamber of Commerce.

GIESECKE FAMILY LEAVE FOR NEW HOME

H. Giesecke and family left in their autos Monday morning for San Antonio, where they go to make their home. This move takes away one of the pioneer families of Ballinger. Mr. Giesecke came here about thirty years ago, and purchased a ranch East of Ballinger, where he lived for a short time, later moving to Ballinger and building a home and a few years ago he built one of the finest homes in Ballinger. While the family has gone to San Antonio to make their home, Mr. Giesecke retains large property holdings in this county and his business interests will keep him here for a good part of the time. Their many friends here regret to see them go, but the best wishes of these friends go with the family for success and happiness in their new home.

BRYAN AND SUNDAY GROOMED FOR PROHIBITION PARTY TEAM

LINCOLN, Neb., July 20.—Early arrivals of delegates to the Prohibition Party's national convention, which opens here tomorrow, today discussed chiefly the attitude of W. J. Bryan to the party and whether the convention should offer the leadership of the organization to Bryan or not.

The frequent mention of Billy Sunday as Bryan's runnings mate brought a statement from the

noted evangelist that he would accept, if nominated for the vice-presidency.

"Bryan's recent statement in The Commoner that a man must accept the honor if offered, is looked upon by us as tantamount to a declaration that he will accept the nomination," said W. G. Calderwood, vice chairman of the national committee for the party.

TEXAS COTTON COMING UP SHORT

DALLAS, July 20.—Three factors—the lateness of the season, destruction by boll weevils and the pink boll worm—have had the effect of making the present cotton crop in Texas the poorest of the last decade, according to E. F. Shropshire, secretary of the state division of the American Cotton Association.

"While since June 1 there has been a marked improvement in crop conditions the present indications are that the season's supply will not be in excess of 11,000,000 bales," Mr. Shropshire said here today. "Natural conditions, which include the weather, boll weevil and pink boll worm are largely responsible, but an acute labor shortage has played an important part in the cotton production."

"It is unquestioned that the world's stock of spinnable cotton on hand and in the manufacturers' and merchants' stocks of goods on hand are far below the average for a period of years. Both American and foreign mills, with rare exceptions, are running full time and from information available now the outputs are contracted for many months in advance. This at profits which will yield dividends in keeping with those paid by manufacturers for the last two or three years, and which are the highest in the history of the cotton manufacturing industry."

"This will be the highest priced cotton crop ever produced in the history of the South. It will be entirely too valuable a product to expose to the weather as in the past with a loss of millions of dollars. Warehouses with facilities for sufficient protection should be provided."

He asserted that men, or a combination of men, might be able by a "chalk-mark" method, to bring the price of cotton below the cost of production, but maintained that the South was rapidly organizing to combat this manner of speculation at the cost of the producer.

SHAMROCK LEADS AS RACE FAILS

Sandy Hook, July 20.—With ten miles of the thirty mile triangular course covered the challenger Shamrock rounded out the first mark ahead of the American defender Resolute in today's International cup race. The Resolute was 600 yards astern, and it is predicted that unless the wind freshens the yachts will not be able to finish in the required time of six hours.

At nine o'clock the challenger Shamrock sailed over the starting line ahead of the Resolute. The Shamrock sailed gave trouble and the Resolute passed her and gained a half mile lead. At one o'clock the Shamrock passed the Resolute and at 1:25, Eastern time, the Shamrock was leading by a quarter of a mile.

CHICAGO, July 20.—The United States Railway Labor Board made public today its decision in the demand made by nearly two million organized railway workers.

The board awarded the railroad workers an increase totaling six hundred million dollars, which is approximately twenty-one per cent of the present wages being paid to the railway men.

The award is retroactive to May first of this year, and amounts to approximately sixty per cent of the billion dollar increase asked for by the railroad unions. The presidents of the leading brotherhoods and representatives of rail-

road managers were present when the award was announced.

"The board assumes as a basis for this decision the continuance in full force and effect the rules and working conditions and agreements in force under the authority of the United States Railroad Administration," said the announcement. The intent of the board is that the increase granted be added to the present wages, unless otherwise stated, and that the increase be made to date from May first of this year, and that all railroad workers so effected receive back pay on a basis of the increase so granted.

Whether the award will prevent the threatened general railroad strike remains to be seen. The union leaders left immediately to present the report of the labor board to one thousand general chairmen of the brotherhoods who had gathered to pass on the award, and refused to make any comment before the meeting. The terms of the decision were known to them yesterday and they stated then that they believed that the men would stay in line until a referendum vote could be taken, which will require nearly one month.

CHICAGO, July 20.—The new railroad union which called a series of strikes after breaking away from the recognized unions, will submit the wage board's decision to a referendum vote, John Grunau, president of the Chicago Yardmen's union, said today.

The board failed to mention unrecognized union's demands for restoration of seniority rights which they lost during the strike.

The board did not mention the insurgents' union, although eighteen other unions were specifically named to participate in the increase granted by the board.

CHICAGO, July 20.—An eighteen per cent increase in freight rates will be necessary to meet the twenty-one per cent wage increase award granted railroad employees, E. T. Whitler, representing the railroads, said in a hearing before the board today.

Whitler said, after a conference with the Western Managers' Association, the railroads will accept the award and apply it immediately, but increased revenue will be necessary to meet the demands of the unions.

WINTERS "SKUNKED" EIGHT TO NOTHING

What the fans thought was to be the hardest game of the season for the Bear Cats turned out the easiest and the locals won their tenth game and first shut-out this year, from Winters Monday afternoon. This was no reflection on the part of Winters sluggers as the saying is "You can't hit 'em when you can't see 'em," and big Bunker was heaving the pill thru yesterday until it looked like a pea.

Several times this year the local fans have seen big Bunker at work-out, but never have they viewed him in condition and with the cool afternoon and a light drizzle falling, something put pep in the big man and he pitched ball like the fans have not seen for many days. 18 Winters men retired by the strike-out route, ten players dropping the paddle in a row, and only three scratch hits were marked against his record. Ballinger made only one error, and this together with Bunker's pitching kept the game out of danger all the way thru. Ballinger got 9 hits off the Winters hurlers. R. Cope and W. Cope, succeeding, both pitched good ball for Winters and deserved far better support than they received. The Winters club made nine errors behind them and this with nine hits cost them an 8 to 0 shut-out.

Daniels, playing short stop for the Bear Cats, played a wonderful game and was an easy second to Bunker, his playing mate. He fielded an even thousand, and in the eighth frame drove a long fly over middle garden and rounded the bases for a home run. This was the first home run on the local field this year, and the fans showed their appreciation by starting the hat.

The Ballinger team is making a remarkable record this year and for the last few weeks is playing the best ball of the season. WHOLESALE CAR THIEVES FOUND

Practically every paper issued gives an account of the theft of motor cars, and the Temple Telegram reports the discovery of a wholesale thieving combination formed for the purpose of stealing and disposing of autos, and the arrest of some of the gang.

The account follows: An application for a Ford license at the court house in Belton recently led to the uncovering of one of the most extensive thieving combinations found in Texas in recent years.

Investigation on the part of Sheriff Hugh Smith and his deputies developed the fact that the applicant for a license did not possess the car in question, that in fact the car did not even exist with number indicated on the application.

Further unraveling of the case brought out the fact that the man applying for a license and a new state number for a Ford was the tool of a gang of auto thieves. The plan of procedure was to get the state number and license for a Ford with a fictitious engine number a little ahead of the numbers on the latest Fords from the factory. A new Ford car would then be located and driven to a convenient place and the engine number changed to the number on the license, the new state number hung on front and back, and then the Ford car sold to an innocent purchaser. The license procured in Bell county practically guaranteed the ownership of the car and the Ford was easy to sell. Inquiry developed the fact that one member of the gang was induced to join after he had been given a practical demonstration of the "safety" of the plan.

Most of the cars had been stolen in Waco and thru the co-operation of the Waco officials, Sheriff Bob Buchanan and Deputy Sheriff Barton, the men in the gang were identified and at least one of them taken into custody. Eleven Ford cars have been stolen, according to the testimony of the man first arrested. Recovery of eight of them seems certain and it is thought that others will be located.

One Waco man whose car had been stolen thought he had found his car in another man's possession and called the officers to investigate. After seeing the number on the car he was convinced that he had made a mistake and that it was not his car. The confession of the first man arrested seems to show that it was actually his car and that the number was so cleverly changed that the owner did not recognize his own property.

Stolen cars were sold in Dallas, Waxahachie, Cameron, Corsicana, Palestine, Marlin and Houston. While all the members of the gang have not as yet been arrested the officers are of the opinion that they will have them within a few days.

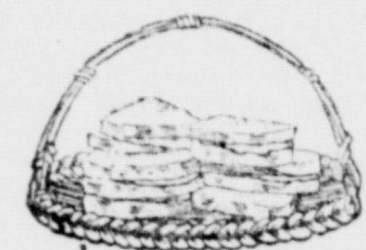

county, it is said, led the sheriff's department here to suspect that the cars being stolen at Waco and other points were being taken under the plan outlined above, and the sheriff began to keep a close lookout for those making applications for registry, but who did not have their cars along. In due time a man whose operations apparently fitted into the suspected scheme appeared in Belton and after some questioning he was placed under arrest by Deputy Sheriff Vannoy. Later a confession of the whole plan was obtained, it is said, and the prisoner was delivered to Waco.

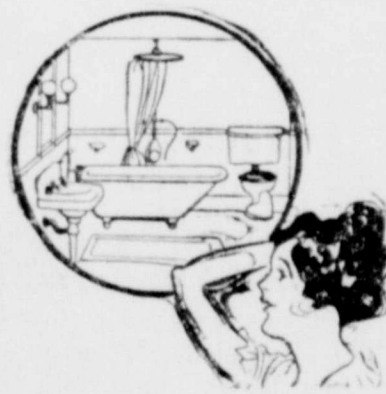
