



His defense: He thought he was a vampire

BROCKTON, Mass. (AP) — A man who believed he was a vampire admitted he shot his grandmother to death with gold-tipped bullets and said he tried to drink her blood, his mother testified in his murder trial.

James P. Riva, 24, of Boston said a voice told him he would die if he didn't kill his 74-year-old grandmother, according to testimony for the prosecution given Monday by his mother, Janet Jones.

Riva is charged with murder and arson in the killing of Carmen Lopez in her Marshfield home April 10, 1980.

Mrs. Lopez was shot, stabbed and beaten, and state pathologist Ambrose Keeley said she died either of stab wounds or a head injury.

Assistant district attorney Henry Cashman said Friday in his opening statement that he would prove Riva shot Mrs. Lopez, stabbed her "and in an effort to conceal his crime, he lit her body on fire, as well as the house, and left the area."

Defense lawyer John Spinale told the Brockton Superior Court on Friday he was seeking a verdict of innocent by reason of insanity. He said Riva had been institutionalized frequently since

1975 and told the court he planned to call psychiatrists to testify.

Mrs. Jones, of Middlebury, Vt., said she visited her son in prison in June 1980, two months after the slaying, and he told her "the vampires" told him to drink his grandmother's blood. But he couldn't, "because she was old and all dried up," Mrs. Jones said.

Shortly after Mrs. Lopez was killed, regional medical examiner Dr. John Angley of Pembroke said an autopsy revealed a 1½-inch cut in the victim's heart and a round wound.

Riva said he painted the bullet tips gold because "if they weren't gold, they wouldn't find their mark," Mrs. Jones testified.

"The vampires had told him that in Florida," she added, referring to her son's 1978 visit to Florida.

She said he told her he expected to shoot the woman once with a gold-tipped bullet and kill her. But he had to shoot her three more times, she told the court.

After the killing, Riva went to the North River to kill himself, but didn't because he feared his body would be mutilated, his

mother said.

Mrs. Jones testified his idea was to "kill everybody who hated him and come back and be handsome, have a car and girlfriends and his life would be fine."

Under cross-examination by Spinale, Mrs. Jones testified that when her son was 4 he rigged up a hammer on a string over his bedroom door in what she said was an effort to strike his father, whom he accused of stealing from a piggy bank. Mrs. Jones and Riva's father are divorced.

At 5, she said, Riva started drawing "scenes of violence in phenomenal detail, goblins, bats and witches."

"By 13-14, he was drawing vampires who always took one form, a woman with blood dripping out of puncture wounds in the neck."

She said he roamed at night, refusing to wash or care for himself and returning home to cook parts of animals. She said he once had cooked and eaten a whole bird.

School psychologists treated him until 1974 when the family sought outside professional help at the Brockton Multiservice Center, Mrs. Jones said.

Senate Republicans study deficit-cutting tax increase

WASHINGTON (AP) — As Senate Republicans study between \$50 billion and \$70 billion in tax increases, White House budget director David A. Stockman says the administration is not "making a fetish" out of a balanced budget by 1984.

Sources say the \$50 billion to \$70 billion figure is included in a memorandum drawn up for Senate Majority Leader Howard H. Baker Jr. and House Republican leader Robert H. Michel and based on private meetings last week among GOP congressional leaders.

The tax increases are part of a strategy GOP leaders hope will lead to paring budget deficits by \$115 billion over the next three years.

Baker and Michel are expected to meet with Reagan later this week to discuss the strategy.

But the sources emphasized that House Republicans are not committed to a tax increase of any given size.

Instead, the House Republican leadership promised only to seek higher taxes and more cuts in benefit programs if the

budget deficits for the next three years appear to be higher than the estimates contained in the budget outline passed by Congress earlier this year.

According to one source, the Senate Budget Committee has drawn up a list of 24 possible tax increases which the Treasury Department estimates would raise \$84.4 billion in revenues in 1983 and 1984.

President Reagan has asked for \$22 billion in higher taxes over the next three years as part of his plan to balance the budget by 1984. Of that, \$3 billion would come in the current fiscal year.

In recent days, however, administration officials have conceded that much higher tax increases may be necessary to meet Reagan's goal.

One source said tentative GOP plans to trim \$115 billion from the deficit over the next three years included about \$40 billion in cuts in benefit programs such as government pensions and food stamps, and about \$15 billion in cuts in domestic and defense programs.

Reagan still after AWACS sale

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan is zeroing in on a handful of opponents to his AWACS sale to Saudi Arabia with hints that it would draw the Arab kingdom into Middle East peace efforts. On the eve of the Senate showdown, however, the odds are heavily against his saving the deal.

Reagan, who planned to see up to a dozen senators in a final lobbying blitz today and Wednesday, picked up only one vote and lost one Monday, but failed to convert any opponents.

This morning, however, Republican Sen. Robert Dole of Kansas, who has not said how he will vote, indicated he will go with the president.

"I want to vote with the president...I think it's a test of leadership," Dole said in an interview on ABC's "Good Morning America."

"I still haven't made up my mind, but I think I'm going to vote for the sale," he said. Dole noted that the planes would not be delivered for four years, giving the president "plenty of time to

pull the plug if something goes awry in the Mideast."

He also said the arms sale "has gotten to the level of presidential leadership...I think it means a great deal with the death of (Egyptian President Anwar) Sadat, with the trouble in Iran, the trouble in Lebanon, for the world to know we support our president's foreign policy."

Following Dole's remarks, the current Associated Press tally shows 53 senators against the sale, plus two others leaning against, 39 favoring the deal or leaning that way, and six uncommitted. A majority of those voting is needed to block the deal.

The \$8.5 billion arms package, the biggest in U.S. history, includes five Airborne Warning and Control System radar planes plus 1,177 Sidewinder missiles and fueling to extend the range and firepower of 62 Saudi F-15 jets. The sale already has been rejected by the House and will be vetoed if a majority of the Senate votes it down Wednesday.

Decision expected in discrimination suit

A federal judge is expected to hand down a decision this week in a 10-year-old desegregation suit filed against the Ector County School District.

Testimony in the federal court trial in Midland ended Monday, with attorneys for both sides presenting their final arguments.

The suit, filed in 1970 by the Justice Department and a citizen's group, contends the Odessa school system has discriminated against black and Hispanic students by maintaining segregated schools in violation of the 14th Amendment.

Attorneys for the school district deny the allegations and say the system operates on the "neighborhood school" concept.

Visiting U.S. District Judge Fred Shannon of San Antonio was expected to consider the evidence today and may hand down a decision by Wednesday.

The major issue in the trial has been whether Odessa's segregated schools are the result of discriminatory acts by the school district, said Joseph Rich, a Justice Department attorney.

A school board member testified Monday that parents want equal education while maintaining neighborhood schools.

Shirley Huffaker testified that during public meetings concerning proposed desegregation plans parents opposed having all-minority schools, but disapproved of busing, as well.

A black school administrator testified he did not intend to discriminate against minority students when he recommended busing boundaries.

However, Edward Downing said every time south Odessa bus routes were altered, black and hispanic children were sent to southside schools near their homes.

Assistant prosecutor to become county attorney

J. Scott Henderson, a 34-year-old ex-cop, has been appointed the Midland County attorney to succeed Robert Rendall, who resigned the \$30,000-a-year post to enter the private practice of law.

Henderson, who has been an assistant prosecutor to Rendall since the first of the year, takes over the job Monday.

"I'm very proud of the confidence indicated by the vote of the (Midland County Commissioners') Court," Henderson said Monday after the

five-member court unanimously voted Henderson in and rejected three other bidders for the job.

"I think I can prove they (commissioners) didn't make a mistake," he said of his selection to fill out the remaining three years of Rendall's term.

Henderson's appointment comes two weeks after 27-year-old Rendall announced he was bowing out of public office less than an year after he was elected to a four-year term on the Republican ticket. Just prior to the November 1980 general election, Rendall had been appointed county attorney to succeed his boss, County Attorney Les Acker, who had resigned to become a title-abstract lawyer.

Rendall, then Acker's assistant, had vigorously sought the Republican nomination to the office in the May primary, when he defeated contender Richard Moore. Moore, former assistant prosecutor to District Attorney Vern Martin, now is district attorney for Hale County (Plainview).

Both Acker and Rendall left public office for more attractive opportunities before their terms expired. Acker, though, was only a few months away from serving out his term and had not sought re-election.

Henderson, who became an assistant to Rendall last Jan. 1, will be the eighth county attorney in more than 20 years. His predecessors have included Leonard Howell, Harrell Moore, Clint Starr, Willie DuBose, Jimmie D. Oglesby, Acker and Rendall.

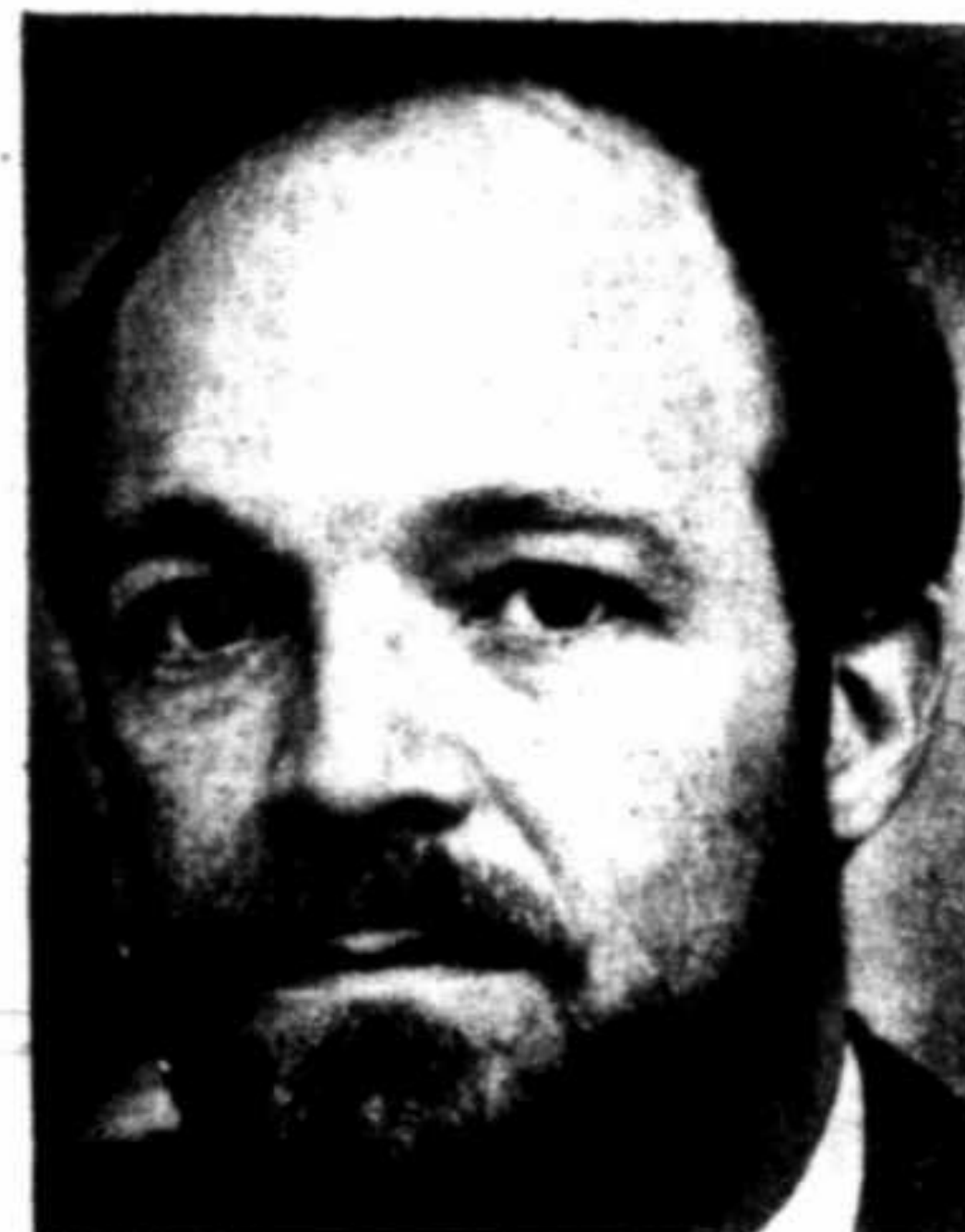
Henderson was in law enforcement for 2½ years at Kerrville, where he was a deputy sheriff, and at Waco, where he was a policeman. In 1979, he earned a law degree from Baylor University and practiced law in Dallas for a year before he relocated to Midland.

Henderson, though only in the county's attorney office for 10 months, will be the ranking lawyer in the office after this week when Rendall packs up and moves out.

Rendall's chief assistant, Woody Leverett, 28, has tendered his resignation and is entering the more lucrative private sector of law. Leverett has been a county prosecutor for two years and, as did Rendall earlier, was given praise and laurels from the Commissioners' Court for public service.

"He's been an outstanding attorney," Henderson said.

Eighteen-year-old Midlander dies

A Lee High School student injured in a traffic accident early Saturday morning died today in the intensive care unit at Midland Memorial Hospital.

A hospital spokesman said Robert Eugene Alley, 18, of 3808 W. Kansas Ave., died at 2:15 a.m. of massive head injuries suffered in the wreck, which occurred at 2:30 a.m. Saturday.

Police said Alley's southbound 1979 Ford went out of control on Loop 250 and struck a guard rail near the U.S. 80 overpass just west of Midland. He was a senior at Lee High. Funeral arrangements are incomplete.

British experts blow up packages

LONDON (AP) — Scotland Yard explosives experts blew up two suspicious packages on London's Oxford Street early today, and Prince Charles and Princess Diana arrived in Wales amid tight security for their first official visit since their wedding three months ago.

Police said the two packages turned out to be harmless. They were found in a department store and a nearby record store and blown up with special controlled charges by Scotland Yard.

An Irish Republican Army bomb Monday killed a police explosives expert in London, the third bombing victim in the city in 17 days. In Pontypridd, Wales, experts defused a fire-

bomb in an army recruiting office near the route the royal newlyweds will take Thursday.

The bomb disposal man was Kenneth Howarth, 49, who died as he tried to defuse a five-pound bomb found in the ladies' room of a Wimpy hamburger stand on Oxford Street, one of London's busiest shopping thoroughfares.

Shoppers held back by police barriers screamed and ran as the bomb shattered the glass front of the evacuated restaurant and blew a 12-foot hole in the sidewalk.

The IRA in a telephone call took responsibility and claimed two other bombs were in stores nearby. Sniffer dogs found one, and police defused it

safely, but a third bomb was not found.

The IRA bombing in London began on Oct. 10, a week after the collapse of the seven-month hunger strike by Irish nationalists in the Maze Prison outside Belfast. Police say the bombings are to avenge the 10 guerrillas who starved themselves to death in the futile attempt to win political-prisoner status for imprisoned Irish nationalists.

"We understand they have decided to cause as much devastation as possible," said a British security source in Northern Ireland, where the IRA has been fighting a guerrilla war against British rule for 12 years.

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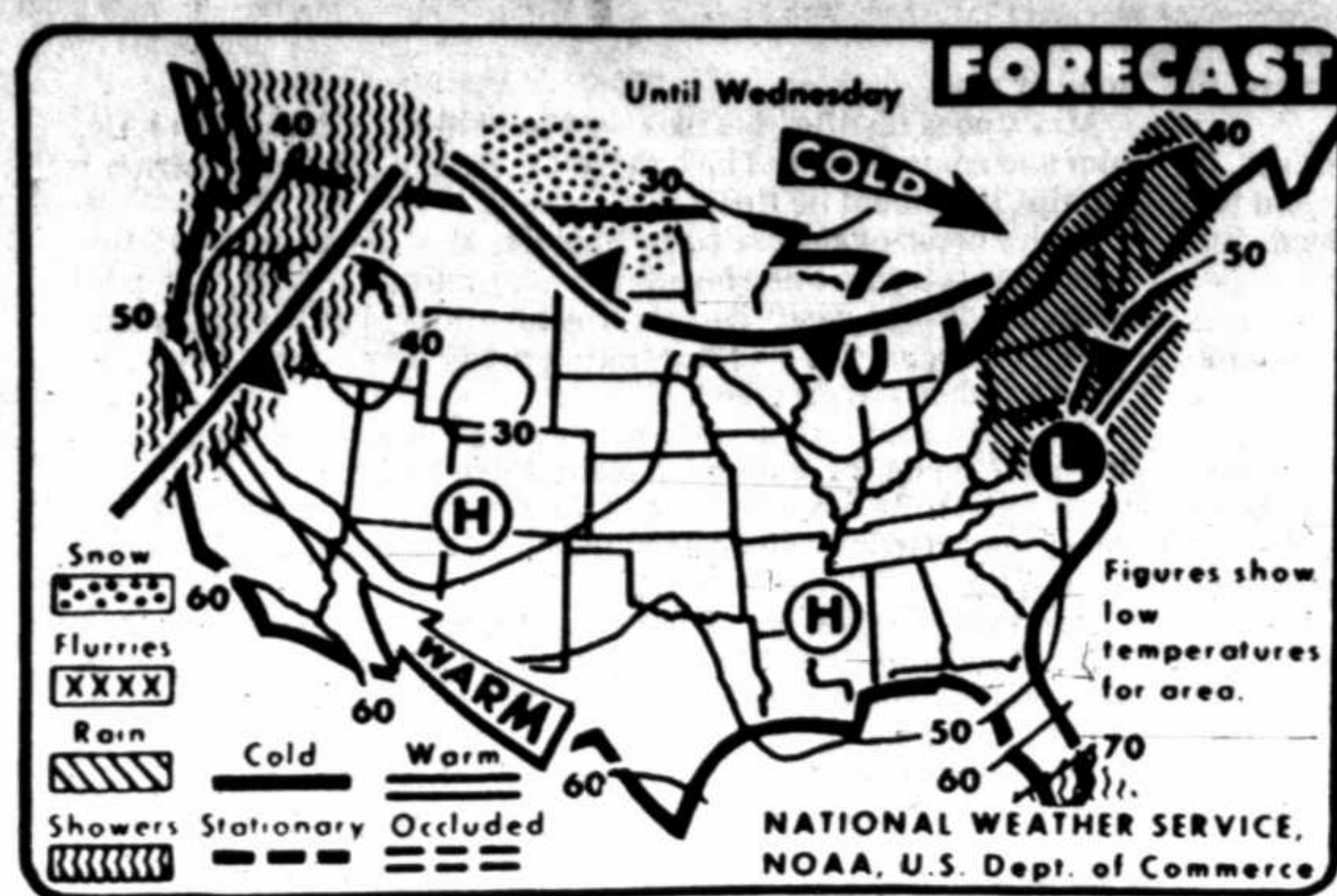

Vickie takes stand, tells of abuse

LIBERTY, Texas (AP) — The wife of former Texas House Speaker Price Daniel Jr. says her slain husband was a sexually bizarre tyrant whom she loved, feared and probably killed.

She portrayed him as a hard-drinking, dope-smoking, self-centered, occasionally loving enigma who once forced her to have an abortion.

But, testified Vickie Daniel, she did not intend to shoot the scion of a rich and powerful Texas family nor does she remember firing the fatal shot.

The former Dairy Queen waitress took the witness stand Monday and tearfully told of the events surrounding the Jan. 19 shooting.

"DID YOU PULL the trigger and shoot him, Vickie?" asked defense attorney Jack Zimmermann.

"No," she sobbed, then added: "I don't remember."

Mrs. Daniel returned today for what loomed as a decidedly more hostile cross-examination by Liberty County district attorney Carroll Wilborn.

The state contends the blonde defendant "knowingly and intentionally" shot Daniel, 39, her second husband, during a fierce dispute over their pending divorce.

Not so, said Mrs. Daniel, 34, her face alternately ashen and crimson as she recounted the marital pressures and pitfalls of life in the fast political

track.

SHE SAID DANIEL abused her verbally, physically and sexually and it got worse after he was an upset loser in a 1978 race for Texas Attorney General.

She said her husband, the son of former Texas Gov. Price Daniel Sr., returned home the night of Jan. 19 with divorce financial papers he wanted signed.

She refused.

Angered by the refusal, and a spilled drink, Vickie recalled, Price Jr. "slapped me, grabbed me and pushed me down."

Kimberly Moore, then 12, her daughter by an earlier marriage, shoved him off, Mrs. Daniel testified.

She said she ordered Daniel to leave their ranch-style home and when he later demanded to know where his marijuana stash was, she replied: "... I flushed it down the commode."

SHE SAID HE descended the steps from an attic stairwell and "kicked me in the head." She said he told her, "I'll kill you."

She said he beat her and she retreated to a back door, which was locked.

"I reached into the closet and got the gun," she said.

She said she could not see her hus-

band at the time but returned to the stairwell and saw him again in the attic.

"Get out of here!" she recalled telling him. "Please leave."

SHE SAID DANIEL saw the gun, a .22-caliber rifle, and "He said he was going to stick it up my ass."

"Did you tell him you were going to use the gun?" asked Zimmermann.

"I think I did ... he kind of smiled."

She said she fired a warning shot. "He started coming down real fast. He said he was going to kill me," she sobbed.

She said she backed away, closed her eyes and expected him to hit her.

"He was mad ... his face was all wrinkled," she said.

WHILE SHE COULD not remember firing the fatal shot, she said, she did recall "a funny sound like when you shoot a bullet through the water."

"You don't remember pulling the trigger?" Zimmermann asked.

"No."

"Are you sure you pulled the trigger?"

"No."

When she opened her eyes, she said, she saw Daniel walking through the kitchen.

"Did you know, Vickie Daniel, if you had shot Price Daniel at that time?" Zimmermann asked.

"No."

Later, as she saw him lying in a pool of blood, she remembered becoming almost hysterical and physically ill.

"I told him to get up," she said.

Unaware he was dead, she testified, she struggled with emergency medical aides who arrived at the house in response to her telephone call to an operator.

Why did she fight the aides? "Because I wanted to get up ... and help Price," she said.

HOWEVER, SHE SAID Daniel's attitude toward her changed following the birth of the couple's son, Franklin, and their sex life then became "abnormal."

"He never treated me again like he treated me before we got married," she said.

Mrs. Daniel once asked if she could return to school but her husband told her "I'd always be stupid," she testified.

After losing a 1978 political race, she said, Daniel "just totally changed. Nothing pleased him. He drank more ... he turned away from some of his good friends. He became more physically abusive."

"He blamed me for losing the election."

Solidarity defies authorities, plans national strike

WARSAW, Poland (AP) — The Central Committee of Poland's Communist Party and defense ministers of the Soviet-led Warsaw Pact will meet separately soon, officials said today, as the Solidarity labor federation continued defying authorities and making plans for a nationwide strike.

Polish party officials said the Central Committee will meet Wednesday, just hours after Solidarity holds its planned one-hour national protest. They said Gen. Wojciech Jaruzelski, who is party leader, defense minister and prime minister, may propose changes in his cabinet and the Politburo.

Meanwhile, the official PAP news agency quoted the Hungarian news agency MTI as saying the defense ministers of the Warsaw Pact will meet soon in Budapest, Hungary. But MTI did not give a date and the tone of the report suggested the meeting was routine.

Leaders of the Communist, Democratic and Peasant parties issued a joint statement Monday, saying the warning strike to protest food shortages and alleged police harassment posed a threat to Poland's "political, economic and defense" foundations.

"This must be met with counteraction corresponding to the degree of the threat," the Communists, and their

allies said.

But it tempered the threat by saying that Poland's problems "could only be solved through a rational dialogue and the strengthening of the democratic socialist state."

Solidarity, launched during a wave of nationwide strikes in the summer of 1980, issued a statement agreeing to cancel the strike if the Communists agreed to its demand for a joint Solidarity-government council to manage the near-bankrupt economy. The statement also demanded the government end harassment of unionists.

But Solidarity union officials in Gdansk said today the strike will go ahead as planned, adding, "Something absolutely strange, unexpected and terrible would have to happen to

make us change our decision."

In one of the harshest commentaries, PAP referred to "strike terrorism," in an article today headlined, "Entire Nation at Stake."

"Strike terrorism is what Poland has come to be confronted with, a phenomenon alien to our tradition and political culture," the PAP commentary said. In a reference to planners of the strike, it said "no rational argument, recognized from Washington to Moscow, counts for anything."

Solidarity leader Lech Walesa met with about 5,000 unionists today in Zyrardow, where he offered his support for the 15-day strike by 12,000 women protesting food shortages.

"The strength of the union lies in unity of action, but this strike was

unavoidable," he said.

Wildcat strikes and demonstrations, mostly protesting food shortages, were reported in two-thirds of Poland's 49 provinces. The Warsaw newspaper Zycie Warszawy commented: "The situation in the country is beginning to slip out of control."

Thousands of soldiers were deployed across the country to try to improve government services. Gen. Tadeusz Hupalowski, the minister of administration and environment, said they would also "maintain law and order and counteract local conflicts."

Long-serving legislator dies

PARIS, Texas (AP) — A.M. Aikin Jr., Texas' longest serving legislator, was eulogized as a friend, a gentleman and a leader by lawmakers who flocked to his Northeast Texas hometown to pay their last respects.

Aikin died Saturday at age 75. Funeral services were held Monday at the First United Methodist Church, where friends and family gathered to remember the soft-spoken former legislator.

A memorial service for Aikin was scheduled for 10:30 a.m. Thursday in the Senate chamber.

"So many times I heard him stand on the Senate floor and say, 'I want you to meet one of the best friends I ever had,'" said U.S. Rep. Jack Hightower, who joined former state Sen. A.R. "Babe" Schwartz in eulogizing Aikin.

"He said it and he meant it," Hightower said, adding that many people, in turn, could call Aikin "the best friend I ever had."

Texas Agricultural Commissioner Reagan Brown remembered the former dean emeritus of the Texas Senate as "one of the kindest gentlemen I have ever known."

Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby said Aikin, who served 46 years as a state legislator, was the "father of Texas education."

Aikin's best-known accomplishment was the package of Gilmer-Aikin Laws in 1949 that established the Minimum Foundation school program providing state-financed teacher minimum salaries and guaranteed levels for other expenditures.

"He was a quiet and effective leader ... one of my favorite folks," said State Comptroller Bob Armstrong.

"Sen. Aikin was a fine gentleman and one that I depended on," added Sen. Peyton McKnight.

Aikin, who served as a state representative before becoming a senator in 1937, is survived by his wife, Welma, and a son, A.M. Aikin III.

Besides education and teacher pay, Aikin's legislative interests included financing for the M.D. Anderson cancer hospital in Houston. He sponsored the center's first state appropriation, \$300,000, in 1941.

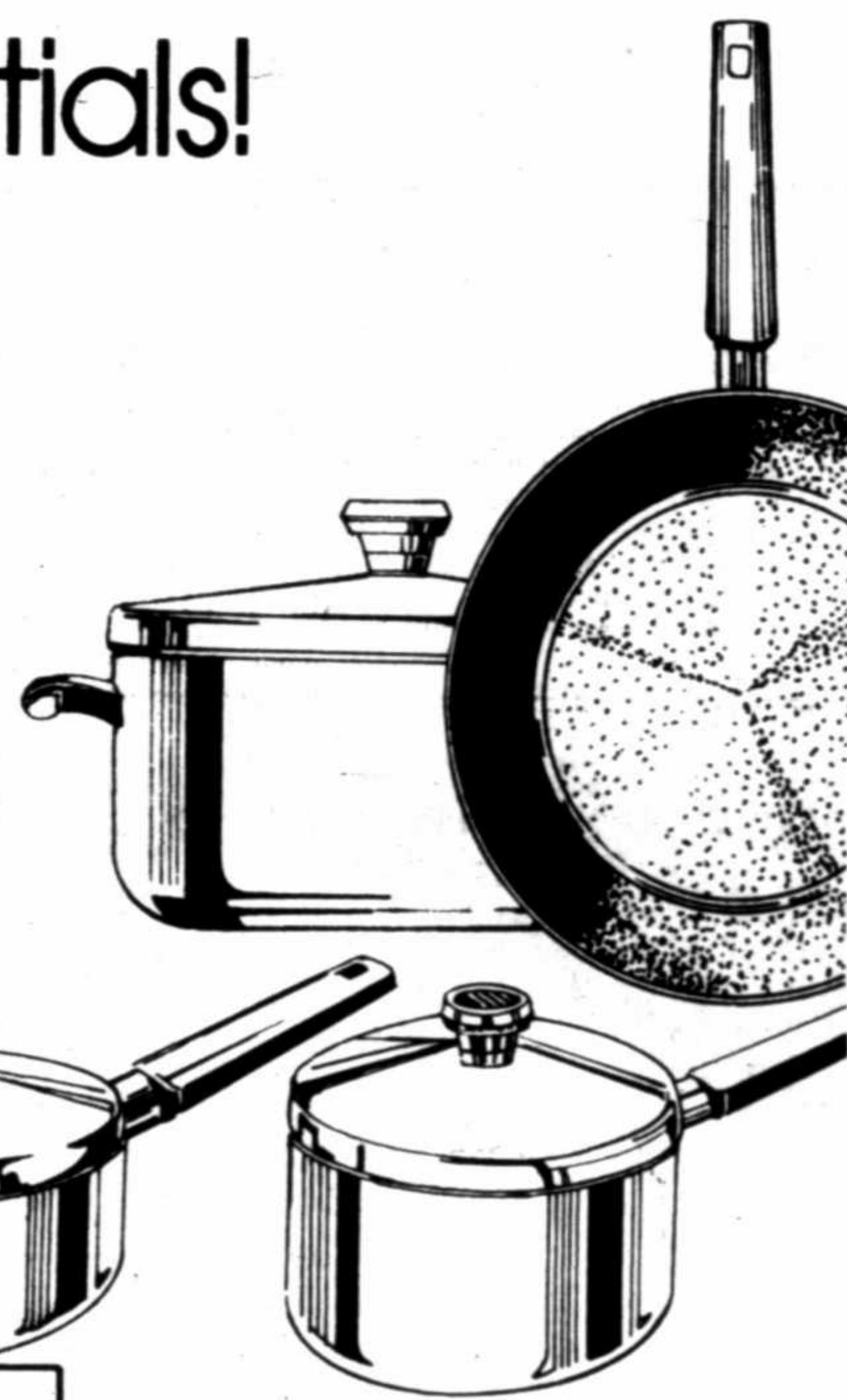

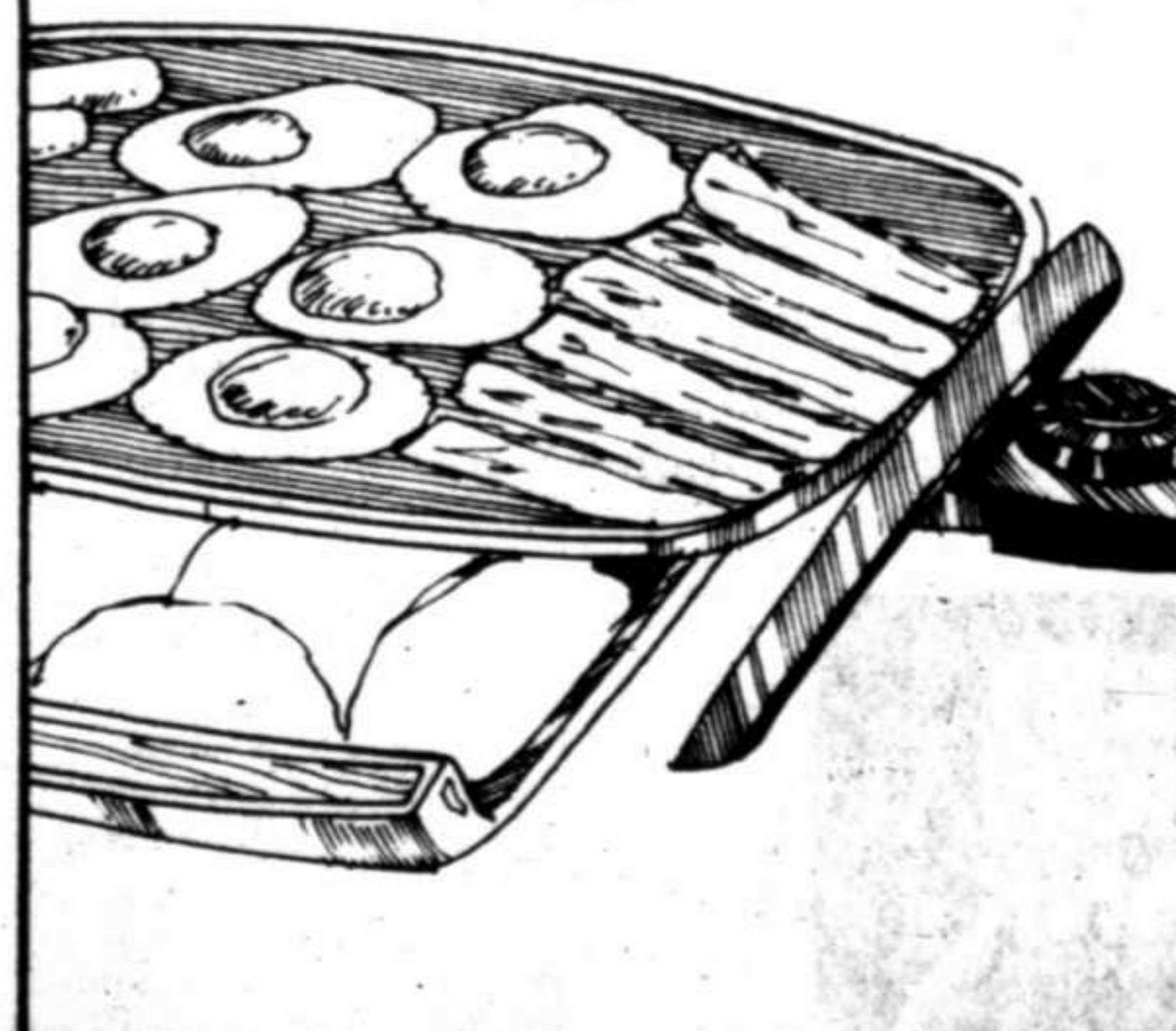

Records placed off-limits because of oil boom

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — The recent Texas oil boom has forced the Railroad Commission to revise a generous but risky policy of allowing the industry and others to check out original documents from commission files for business.

The demand for the valuable documents — some possibly leading to oil and gas fortunes — has become so great that on Nov. 1 the commission will start to phase in a program to prohibit the removal of original records.

"People are coming in here by the tons," said Railroad Commissioner Mack Wallace.

Applications for permits to drill, known as W-Is, are most in demand and will be the first original documents placed off-limits.

Instead of allowing people to check out drilling permits and return them the same day, the commission will offer a subscription service to copies

of W-Is that would cost as much as \$12,624 a year.

"New permits are an indication of where people are willing to gamble their money," said David Garlick, assistant director of planning and administration. "It's the first indication there may be oil somewhere near."

"Land men are interested (in drilling permits) in terms of acquiring leases, industry people are interested in terms of where they are falling behind in their competitive posture, and landowners are interested in it to see where the rig's going in."

As many as 50,000 drilling permits could be filed this year — that's up dramatically," Garlick said.

"In places like Abilene, for example, you can almost drill an oil well with a water well rig," he said.

For years only three consulting firms removed papers for copying, Garlick said in an interview, but "with the recent boom just the demand for our information from the public has skyrocketed to the point now that we have over 60 people on our list to check out original documents."

Consultants claim private individuals who come in to check on their "mom and pop" wells have clogged the process, often knowing nothing more about the location of a well than "it's right over there behind a barn."

"What do you want?" the commission staff might ask.

"I want everything," often is the reply.

Garlick says, "The Austin Chalk formation is close by, and quite a few from the Giddings area come in and want to see their well on a map, or want to see their lease or want to see their production figures and, of course, they are as entitled to it as anybody else."

Garlick said some consultants have been so frantic to get file folders that they have pulled them out of the hands of commission employees. He recalled one folder being returned so late that it was merely shoved under the door after the records office had closed.

As he stated in a Sept. 25 letter, "old

mechanisms for distributing this information have been stressed to the point of collapse," and these methods in some cases "inadvertently grant a competitive advantage to one firm over another."

He also mentioned what gives the commission nightmares — the possibility of losing records out of the office in fires, car accidents or by theft.

Asked if the old method had resulted in the loss of documents, Garlick said, "I've never come across a concrete situation..." He added, however, consultants had told of checking out a record and finding something missing when they rechecked it.

"Nobody has run off with anything," insists Wallace. "There's no flim-flam or whim-wham."

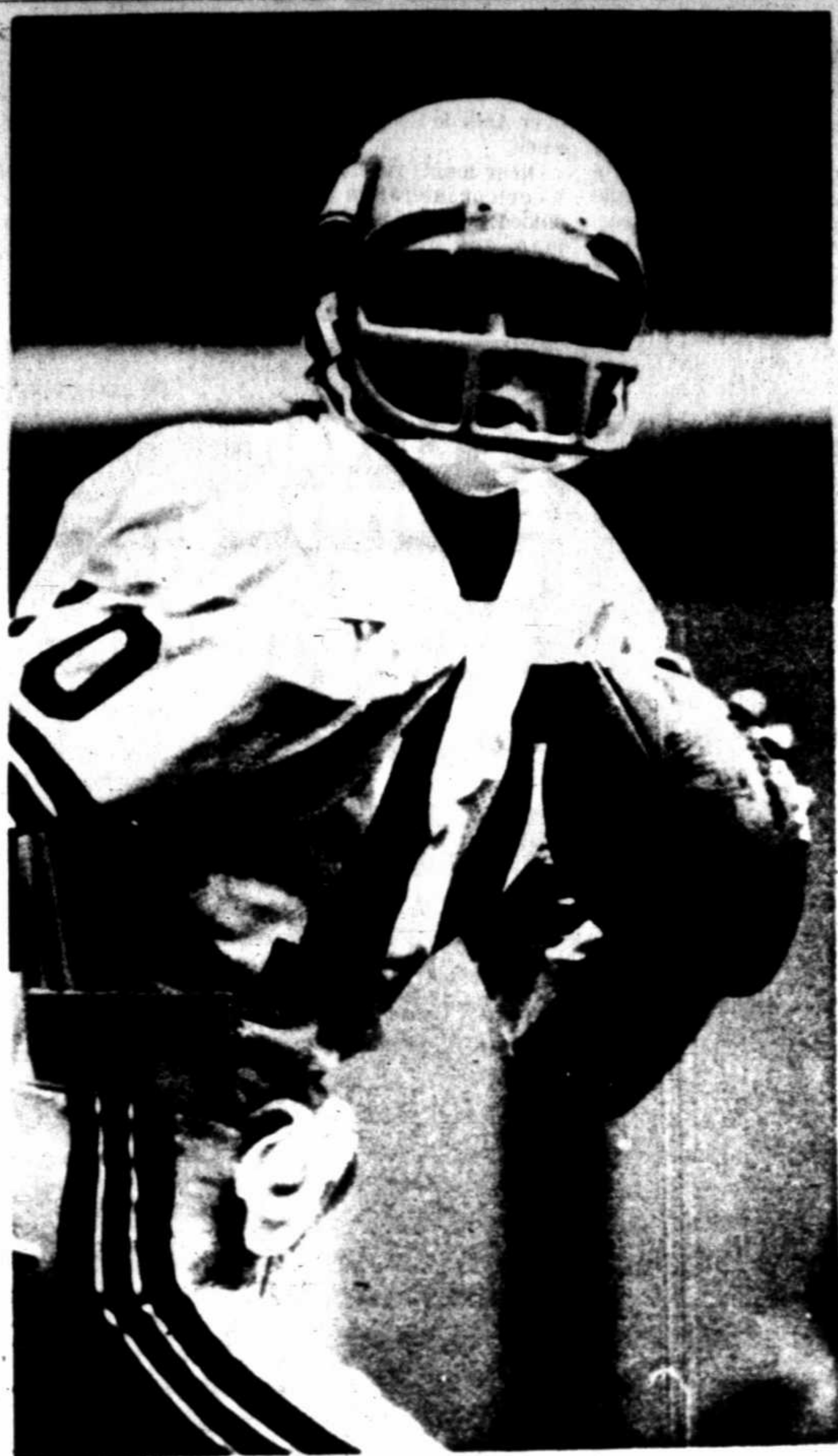
Meeting with consultants, Garlick stated, "If you say you must have an original document, I'm afraid in the future the answer will have to be no."

"It's a reasonable solution based on the means we have to correct the problem," said Wallace.

Jim Zorn has lost his golden glitter

Only a few years ago, Jim Zorn was the Golden Boy of the National Football League. He was typecast as a young, left-handed Fran Tarkenton. He was everything but a cover boy.

Today, halfway through his sixth season, it was just another quarterback, trying very hard to keep the Seattle Seahawks afloat.

While the Eric Hipple, Joe Montana and David Woodley are hailed as the new rising stars, Zorn's star has all but vanished beyond the horizon. He is ranked 16th among the NFL's passers. He has thrown more interceptions (8) than touchdowns (7). And he is on a team which needs a miracle just to break even this year.

The deeply religious 28-year-old Zorn seems to view his job as just a small part of his life. Amateur boxing, speed skating, mountain climbing, playing the viola with the Seattle Symphony and disc-jockeying on a local radio station all have made up a part of the mosaic.

So has forthrightness. Better quarterbacks than he have scrambled out back doors of locker rooms, hidden in training rooms or otherwise turned their backs on the people paid to write about them — and thus on the people who pay to see them play.

But that's not Zorn. "I couldn't see me clammup now anymore than I could see myself saying, 'this is it, guys. I've arrived. C'mon and talk to me, baby!' when things were going good," he says. "I don't live and die by whether we've won or lost. I hate to disappoint you, but I'm still me, the same guy I was when we were winning."

That was in 1978 when the Seahawks, in just their third year of existence, finished 9-7 and failed by just one overtime loss to Denver to win a division title. Seattle also was 9-7 in 1979 before crashing to 4-12 last year.

"He's been around about five years now, hasn't he?" former San Francisco quarterback John Brodie said not too long ago. "Well, if Jim doesn't start coming through in a big way, the fans will turn on him. They always do. It's part

of paying your dues. The quarterback is the one the fans see, so you get the credit when it's going good and the blame when it isn't — and sometimes

you don't deserve either. It comes with the job. You laugh a little and you squirm a lot."

But Zorn is not squirming.

Former player faces fraud charges

BALTIMORE (AP) — A one-time National Football League player is accused of fraud for claiming league pension benefits for "total disability" while working as a sheriff's deputy, serving in the military, and playing semi-pro football.

As the trial opened Monday in federal court, Donald F. Wade, 32, sat stiffly in the uniform of an Army PFC to answer an 11-count indictment charging that he has been receiving as much as \$2,100 a month in alleged-ly undue benefits.

IT WAS in a New England Patriots' uniform in 1971, Wade's lawyer told the jury, that his client broke his neck while "not showing a lot of expertise on a tackling dummy" during pre-season practice.

However, a government prosecutor said Wade understood when he received a retroactive disability pension in 1973 that he was eligible for benefits only "as long as he was unable to work."

Assistant U.S. Attorney Steven Allen said Wade had held several jobs and once, in April 1980, boxed in a "Tough Man" competition in West Virginia.

THE FORMER Miami of Ohio running back repeatedly underwent examinations by doctors, sometimes appearing in "arm braces" and complaining of "not being able to walk more than six or seven steps," Allen told the jury of five men and seven women.

The prosecutor added that if Wade had told the trustees of the Bert Bell NFL Player Retirement Plan of his jobs "he would have been cut off" from benefits.

Paul Spence, Wade's lawyer, conceded that his client had "attempted to work," noting that he had served in the Marine Corps for only a few days. The indictment noted that Wade played in only one game with the semi-professional Frederick Falcons football team in western Maryland.

Spence said Wade would testify concerning "his misunderstandings" about the disability plan.

Cagers leave NSU program

NORFOLK, Va. (AP) — Two more players have quit the Norfolk State basketball team, bringing to four the number of defectors from embattled Coach Lucas Mitchell's squad since practice began.

Billy Walker and Kenny Haynes joined center Louis Thomas, last season's captain, and junior forward Tim Allen in leaving the team.

WADE WAS drafted by the Baltimore Colts in 1970 but was cut from training camp. He signed with the Patriots in the following year, received a "compression fracture" of the neck in July 1971 and remained on the Patriots' "injured reserve" list throughout the season.

He received an NFL pension for "total and permanent disability" from the month after his injury through this summer, when he was indicted, according to the administrator of the Baltimore-based fund, Myrna Logsdon.

Originally, he received \$95 per month, but that was raised to \$1,100

monthly in July 1974 and raised again in February 1979 to \$2,100, Mrs. Logsdon testified.

ALLEN SAID Wade served briefly on active duty in the Marines in 1974, served in the Army in 1977 — and when he left "it had nothing to do with" medical problems.

For two months in 1979, Wade worked as a sheriff's deputy in Frederick County, Md., Allen said. In 1981, Wade rejoined the Army and has been stationed at Fort Knox, Ky.

If convicted, Wade could receive up to five years in prison and a \$1,000 fine on each of 11 mail fraud counts, Allen said.
