VETERAN EDITOR DIES AT MEMPHIS

"NEWS FIRST, FEATURES NEXT"
SLOGAN OF MOONEY; APO-
PLEXY KILLS HIM

MEMPHIS, Tenn., Nov. 22. (AP)—Charles Patrick Joseph Mooney, editor of the Memphis Commercial Appeal, one of the most widely known of southern newspapermen, was stricken with apoplexy in his office today and died a few minutes later at his desk.

Mr. Mooney, who was 61 years old, had suffered from a severe cold and came to work today against the wishes of his wife, but none of those who talked to him a few minutes before he was stricken dreamed that his vigorous life was so near the end. He had worked harder than ever in the last few days preparing for the publication beginning December 1 of the Memphis Evening Appeal, which is to be put in the field by the Commercial Publishing company, of which he was president and which he believed that this strain had told on him.

News First
In matters of journalism and religion, too, he was an exponent of fundamentalism. In announcing last week the new afternoon paper, he expressed his stand by saying that despite the trend toward "features," it would be first of all a newspaper. "News first, and then if there is room for features and pictures," he said.

GUARD FALL JURYMEN

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 22. (AP)—A strict guard over the jury empaneled today for the trial of the first of the criminal cases growing out of the Seabee celebrated oil investigation was ordered by Justice Edmund Hughes in the District of Columbia supreme court.

NEW YORK, Nov. 22. (AP)—Harry Houdini, magician who died on October 31, had three compactly by which he planned to try to get messages over from the spirit world, his wife said today.

The magician, who during 35 years of activity did much to expose fraudulent practices of fake mediums, composed a quotation of ten words, of which his wife alone shared the knowledge he took to his grave. Lubbock and West Texas will pay homage today to the man who was largely responsible not only for the establishment here of Texas Technological college, but who had been the instrument of many advantages to the school since its inception, and was one of the mainstays of its hopes for the future. The body of R. M. Chitwood, business manager of the college, and prominent in political and educational work of the state for many years, who died Sunday in Dallas while asleep in his state today at 518 Ave. B, the home of Henry T. Kimbrey, his friend, and regent of the college which he served so well, and at 2 o'clock this afternoon funeral services will be held at the First Baptist church, conducted by the Rev. Woodie Paving. Burial will be in Sweetwater. Mr. Chitwood's former home, tomorrow.

West Texas Mourns

All West Texas is in mourning for Mr. Chitwood. One of the most prominent men in political and educational circles of Texas, his death came as a shock and words of condolence came from all parts of the state to the family last night. Porter A. Whaley, former manager of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce and present manager of the San Antonio organization sent the following words to the Lubbock last night: "The death of R. M. Chitwood is a severe blow to all West Texas. He was of invaluable service to the little band of pioneers who first bore the burden of securing Texas Technological college. His death is an irreparable loss to all Texas, especially West Texas."

AUSTIN, Texas, Nov. 22. (AP)—Governor Miriam A. Ferguson issued clemency to 51 persons Monday. She granted 40 full pardons, two restorations of citizenship, six furlongs and three paroles. Twenty-one of the pardons were announced in the morning and 30 in the afternoon; the latter to be given as Thanksgiving clemency.

1347 MORE ACRES SIGNED UP BY
PURE AND ATLANTIC
COMPANIES

Thirteen hundred and forty-seven acres more of Lubbock county land were added to the list held under oil lease contracts yesterday with the filing of leases by the Pure and Atlantic Oil companies. Two more major companies now have shown their interest in the oil development of this section. The total of leases for over \$9,000 acres in this county. Eight hundred and seven acres of the land were leased by the Pure Oil company while the remainder were contracted by Clyde Vinson for the Atlantic people. Vinson has been assigning all of his leases in the past to the Humble Oil company.

10-Year Leases

A period of ten years was allowed in each lease for the exploitation of oil and gas and a period of twelve months was allowed until the commencement of a well, the contract being cancelled unless rental is paid at the date for a year.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 22. (AP)—Immediate steps must be taken to replenish the medicinal liquor stock secured by Mellon, experts today. He also advocated that it be manufactured in this country under the plan outlined by assistant secretary Andrews dry chief.

Taking issue with the view of Wayne R. Wheeler, general counsel of the anti-saloon league, that there was no necessity for worry over the medicinal supply for several years, Mr. Mellon emphasized that it would require five years to age properly a new supply. He estimated there was no more than a five-year supply on hand.

EX-GOVERNOR IS GIVEN CREDIT FOR WIFE'S CLEMENCY

ONLY 8 OF 1,600 NOTATIONS
SIGNED BY MIRIAM
FERGUSON

OFFERED RETAINERS

PROBES FAIL TO FIND
THAT FERGUSON AC-
CEPTED ANY FEES

AUSTIN, Nov. 22. (AP)—After five minutes consideration, James E. Ferguson, husband of Governor Miriam A. Ferguson, told him that Pat Clowers would be granted a conditional pardon, and wrote a notation to that effect on the back of the application. Earl Callaway, Amarillo oil man, Monday testified to the house investigating committee.

Clowers was under a two-year sentence from Camp county for automobile theft, and was in poor health, Callaway said. He stated that a few days before he talked to Ferguson, the board of pardons had turned down Clowers' application.

"I want to say that I regard Clowers' conditional pardon as an act of mercy," said Mr. Ferguson, when he took favorable action on the application, knew I was bitterly opposed to him politically," Callaway said.

Tried To Hire Jim
Carl Finney, assistant secretary of the committee, testified that in the papers filed with the secretary of state relating to a full pardon granted G. C. Hanna, he found letters addressed to James E. Ferguson and offering retainers to serve as his attorney in getting a pardon. These letters were read into the record.

There was no indication of any sort that Ferguson agreed to serve.

The first letter, dated January 18, 1926, offered Ferguson \$500; and the second letter, dated February 23, 1926, offered \$1,000. He said no reply had been received from the first. Each letter represented the author to be 45 years old, and in poor health. The pardon was granted in October, 1926.

The notation
The report of the Clowers pardon was shown to Callaway and he identified a notation as the one Ferguson had written. This notation read, "granted 2-23-26, upon recommendation of various officials who tried the case and other good people who know the facts"—Ferguson.

Finney identified the signature "Ferguson" on the Clowers record as the same signature "which appears on approximately 55 per cent of the 1,600 pardon records examined by me." Finney said that only eight of the 1,600 bare notations signed by Governor or Miriam Ferguson.

Finney said that approximately sixty per cent of the pardon records showed no indication that the board of pardons had passed on the clemency applications.

A letter from Representative Rube Loflin of Henrietta, Ferguson's home in the 23rd legislature, recited it would be "good politics" to grant a certain prisoner clemency, and the clemency was granted, Finney said.

LEOPOLD WON'T TELL

Slayer of Franks Says It Is Against Prison Ethics to Describe Killing of Guard by Escaping Men

JOLIET, Ill., Nov. 22. (AP)—In a suave and scholarly manner which two years of imprisonment have not erased, Nathan Leopold, co-slayer of Bobbie Franks and a life prisoner at the state penitentiary, barricaded himself behind a code of prison ethics today and refused to testify about the slaying of deputy warden Peter Klein last May and the subsequent escape of seven convicts.

"It is not the regular thing to do, I have learned to talk about prison affairs," Leopold said.

Spanish Rice

One tablespoon butter, 1 tablespoon bacon fat, 1 large Spanish onion, 2 cups canned tomatoes, $\frac{1}{2}$ cup uncooked rice, $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon salt, 1-5 teaspoon pepper.

Melt butter and bacon fat in frying pan. Add onion/cut in thin slices and cook over a low fire for ten minutes.

By the end of this time the rice will have absorbed much of the tomato juice on top and the combination will require mixing. If the frying pan is kept closely covered and the tomatoes are of average juiciness, no water should be added, for the dish should not be too moist.

INCREASED COTTON CONSUMPTION IS ADVOCATED BY GOVERNOR 'MA' AS BEST WAY TO OVERCOME LOW PRICE STAPLE

(By Associated Press)
AUSTIN, Texas, Nov. 22.—Increased cotton consumption was advocated by Governor Miriam A. Ferguson in a statement issued Saturday as an aid to the solution of the cotton price difficulty in Texas. She advocated "the purchase and use of cotton goods that can be readily and extensively used in the every-day needs of the family," and suggested that if every family in Texas would buy a cotton mattress weighing 35 pounds that 100,000 bales of cotton would be consumed.

Governor Ferguson said that she did not think the holding of cotton to go to do much good, and called upon every housewife in the United States to help the people of the south out of their present trouble by the purchase of one cotton mattress. She said that she had already bought one.

Much has been said and will continue to be said about the price of cotton," the governor said. "The people now are confronted with a very serious economic condition as a result of the unexpected drop in the price of cotton. There is no way to increase the size of the present crop. While I think the crop is overestimated as far as the final situation will show, yet the surplus will be overwhelming.

"The question at this time is how to get rid of surplus cotton. Under sales of cotton, of course, will help much. The farm bureau organizations are to be commended for the work they are doing in this direction. In my opinion, however, the greatest work that can be done now to relieve the situation is to stimulate the minds of the people to the necessity of increased cotton consumption.

"While our friends of the women's clubs have voted down the idea of discarding silk for cotton, I am not condemning them, and I would not be demagogue enough to say that the should discard silk for those who are able to be well dressed, and if we did that the people who manufacture silk in some other country might find themselves unable to buy as much of our cotton as they have in the past, and we might not gain anything from that action after all. So while we will continue to wear silk, suppose our ladies of the Federation of Women's Clubs take up the movement of encouraging and urging the people to use cotton goods that can be readily and extensively used in the every-day needs of the family."

goods that can be readily and extensively used in the every-day needs of the family.

Much has been said about the use of cotton goods and all have their views about the special use of this or that cotton commodity. All these suggestions, however, in their place, but what I am going to urge the people to do is for everybody that can to buy a cotton mattress, a thing of comfort for a great part of a lifetime, and an absolute necessity to every household.

Buy Cotton Mattresses
"If our lady friends must have silk, let them have it, but let me suggest that if when they start to buy a \$100 silk dress just make the investment for the price of \$125, and then make the \$25 difference, and buy the family a cotton mattress that will last two times as long and serve two or three times as many people."

"If every family in Texas would buy a cotton mattress, weighing 35 pounds, it would consume 100,000 bales of cotton, and many families could help the situation at this time by buying enough cotton mattresses to do them for 15 years. This would stimulate factory production immeasurably and would show to the people the great value of home consumption."

Wants South-West's Trade
"If our people in Texas will take up this movement and urge it, the people of other states will come to our rescue and if all the states in the union would do likewise our cotton surplus would be eliminated."

THE DILATORY AGE

Each age in the life of a child has its problems. Most mothers know the age of which I write and its symptoms—the one which I shall call the dilatory age. An otherwise obedient, tractable, normal child develops suddenly into a dawdler, a slow-poke of high degree. Dishes that heretofore were done up in a record time are not finished when the next meal is being prepared, or the food will be brought in only half full of coal or cobs—and that only after repeated reminders. If dusting is in order, only the upper portions, the most easily reached parts of the furniture, will get even the desultory wipe. If it is watering the chickens, only a few of the fountains will be filled while the majority will be found quite dry. If it is hanging up clothes, shirts will be found hob-nobbing with handkerchiefs, towels with socks, table-cloths with underclothes, with utter disregard for color or order—all this in spite of intensive training in the right method. If it is setting the table, very likely there will be a woeful lack of silver and no salt or pepper shakers in evidence. Bewildered, the mother will no doubt try all the stock remedies in the category—scolding, nagging, threatening and punishment of all kinds—only to find out to her further bewilderment that these have been utterly ineffective. As a last resort, I tried quite patience, gentle firmness and unflinching sympathy, and though you may think it strange, this method worked perfectly. If the dishes were dawdled over, I would only remark pleasantly, "My, my, we have been so long with out dishes that we shall have to miss visiting Lela this afternoon." If the wood had not been brought in, it only elicited the calm statement, "I did not bother to put up the sandwiches and doughnuts for the fishing trip lunch; you did not get my wood in so I suppose you were not particular about going." To the daughter whose turn it was to do the upstairs work and who failed to get it done but was found deep in the children's page of a weekly, "I came up with the intention of working on your new dress but we must get these beds made now. You will have to wear your dimity on Sunday. Maybe you can press it and make it look a little less shabby." It began to dawn on the children in a few weeks that "dilatories" brought its own reward—or lack of it. They soon saw that no one seemed to be in the least worried or harassed whether they did or failed to do their tasks but so few good things came their way if they did not, that before they realized it they were again nearing the path of rectitude from which they had so inadvertently strayed. We all take especial pains with the exceptional or abnormal child while we often leave the normal child who is going through an "exceptional" period to flounder unaided. If we will put ourselves in the children's places, trying to see things from their standpoint, we shall find that from their point of view their actions are justifiable. We shall learn that they are in a little world entirely apart from us. Continuing to wash the same plate or standing poised with one stick of wood for minutes at a time is inevitable when they are living through some triumphs to come—on the Chautauqua platform, as the head of a big business, a University President, a baseball star or an intrepid wild animal hunter. Children must be gently led to feel that they are valued members of the family and the community and that the greatest happiness comes from serving others. My advice is to start this course of treatment only after enough patience has been stored up from the Heavenly Father to help us carry it through. Once begun, one should never give up whether it takes a week or six months to effect a cure. However, it will not accomplish satisfactorily by force.

A VITAL CRISIS

The American public should not sleep on a matter of vital importance to the safety of the nation. A crisis has been reached in the maintenance and development of the United States Navy, which should be considered by every patriotic citizen. To look back a few years from 1926 with regret and anger at the neglect of our government to maintain a proper naval force will do us no good if, unfortunately, an international involvement should cause such retrospection. Trained men only can properly manage warships in time of war. The only way to train them by keeping ships in commission during times of peace. Already the American

Navy has a number of ships in reserve and to take others out of commission means having a smaller proportion of skilled men on each ship in the event of full mobilization of all naval strength. New warships begun by the leading naval countries since the Washington Treaty show how far behind our navy is getting in the number of cruisers and other vessels whose construction are not prohibited by the Treaty. Cruisers, forbidden to exceed 10,000 tons, have been started by these nations as follows: Britain 12, Japan 12, and the United States 2. While America has a superiority in destroyers, due to the large number built to fight the submarine menace during the war, since the Washington treaty Japan has begun and completed 31 of this type. Our navy should be maintained as strong as Great Britain's and in the ratio of 5 to 3 to Japan's, which is the proportion fixed at Washington. At the present time we are below the standard compared with Great Britain or Japan. Our world commerce is increasing tremendously; surely it is no time to save a little at the expense of our naval strength.

THANKSGIVING

By Presidential proclamation the 25th day of this month has been set apart for the annual observance of Thanksgiving. This worthy custom, inaugurated by the Pilgrim Fathers, offers an opportunity for sober reflection to those who are truly cognizant of the continued beneficence of the Creator and are mindful of the many blessings that this nation enjoys. The bleak and stormy coast of New England, surely a forbidding approach to the mysterious new world, a coast lined with giant wind-swept oaks and dense undergrowth which seemed alive with copper-colored men of hostile mien, presented a desolate outlook at best, and yet it is reported that those stout hearts who braved the fury of a rudely chartered ocean and whose future was extremely uncertain by reason of the wintry blasts, scarcity of supplies, hidden enemies and a score of unpleasant circumstances, devoutly dropped to their knees and humbly thanked God for His infinite protection and loving care. These courageous pioneers conquered the new world at great cost and made it possible for the citizen of this country to live in security, to enjoy the many advantages that surround him, to realize with confidence that his family and possessions are offered every protection, himself co-operating in making the laws of this country looking to the continual upward trend and general improvement of conditions that materially benefit him and his fellows. Thanksgiving Day offers an annual opportunity of expressing grateful acknowledgement to the Most High for the many favors received at His hands, but not a day should pass without appreciating the many blessings that directly result from the heroic sacrifice of that small band of Pilgrims who made a perilous landing on the giant boulder of New England's stern coast. These good people conquered their innumerable foes, not with the steel and powder of a marauding and rapacious Cortez, but rather with the fear of God implanted in their hearts, and with the Holy Bible as their never failing guide.

ONE MAN ENDS DRIVE

The trustee of the McAuley Water Street Mission, in New York, had everything arranged for a drive to obtain \$100,000 for the erection of a home. Also, they hoped to acquire a few thousand interested freinds through the medium of the publicity and small donations. When the meeting was called to order for the purpose of launching the "long and arduous" effort the chairman and those present were astonished by a little, white-haired coal merchant, John Markle, by name, who, arising from his seat, promptly subscribed \$100,000. Here was a pretty kettle of fish—all hands ready for a drive and the thing over before the initial luncheon had been enjoyed. Representations were made to Mr. Markle but he declined to give a cent less than \$100,000. He didn't care what the money was used for, so long as it went for a good purpose. Finally, in order not to stop the drive, the coal merchant agreed to give \$60,000 to the building fund and \$40,000 to a permanent endowment. The drive then got under way to raise the remaining \$40,000 on the building.

TYRANNY

Liberty is practically dead in Italy—Mussolini frankly proclaims steps to silence any remaining spark of self-determination for the Italians. Il Duce, truly a remarkable character, holds personally seven of the thirteen cabinet positions, giving him control of the army, navy, foreign policy, and domestic police. He is also chief of the Fascist militia. He and all members obey him. A new edict makes it possible to banish men who have taken no active part against the Fascist regime but who are opposed to it and hence potential critics.

MURDERS CHILD WHILE DRUNK

A drunken man, in Missouri, invaded the home of a married woman, in the absence of her husband, and while attempting to attack the wife, cut the throat of a three-year-old girl. He was captured and placed in jail. The next morning, in jail, he was told of what he had done. Thereupon he attempted to cut his throat and seriously wounded himself. This man is an excellent exhibition to explain why the great body of American citizens have voted to take whiskey away from all men. He had sense enough to realize the enormity of his crime, was good enough to feel terrible remorse over his brutal murder, conscience-stricken enough to try to take his own life, but he did not have sense not to drink liquor.

turkey hens, now residing on farms
in Dawson county. This disease, the
country could be ravaged by the farm-
ers, some immediate action is taken
practically every turkey in the county
will be sold during the next thirty
days."

"The agricultural department of the
Lamesa Chamber of Commerce held a
meeting last Thursday evening to
discuss the turkey hens and their fate."

"It was brought out at this meet-
ing that if the turkey hens in this
county could be retained by the farm-
ers that a large crop of turkeys could
be produced in this county next year."

"It was stated at this meeting that if
all the turkey hens in the county could
be saved that the production of tur-
keys would be increased over forty
thousand dollars next year."

"In connection with the turkey
question, plans are being made for the
organization of a poultry association
for this county with the purpose of
stimulating production of poultry."

"We are not altogether familiar with
the turkey population in the South
Plains, but we are confident that there
is not as many turkeys as might be
for the number of farms and the
amount of feed stuff that is in this
county."

"We believe that a good
hatch of turkeys on the farms will
prove a good investment. They can
be kept up on the waste feed about
the farm, and in the spring and sum-
mer they consume many hundreds of
grasshoppers, bugs, and other crop
destroying pests, which is a great help
to the farmer. About this time of
year there is a demand for them and
on through Christmas, and if the local
markets cannot consume them, there
is a demand for them to be shipped to
the eastern market."

Helium, Gas Airships Use, Is Found Boon
to Divers

Deep sea divers and other under-
water workers will be able to go
deeper and stay longer with safety
through the use of helium to replace
the nitrogen of the air pumped to them.

Bends, or caisson disease, which has
claimed the lives of many such work-
ers, who are paralyzed by the bub-
bles of nitrogen forming in their
bodies, can be prevented to a great ex-
tent through this innovation.

The discovery of the use of helium,
that rare inflammable gas so essen-
tial in the safe operation of dirigibles
of the air, is attributed to three offi-
cials of the U. S. bureau of mines at
the Pittsburgh experiment station.

They are Dr. B. R. Sawyer, chief sur-
geon of the bureau; W. P. Vant, as-
sistant chemist, and Joel Hildebrand,
professor of chemistry of the Univer-
sity of California.

Use Guinea Pigs in Tests
The event that established the
practicability of helium as a safer
substitute for the nitrogen of the air
was the salvaging of the U. S. sub-
marine S-51, after it was sunk off
Newport, R. I., by the steamer City
of Rome.

Divers under the leadership of
Chief Gunner U. L. Tibault were the
subjects of the experiments that led
to the actual diving operations at the
S-51.

Before them, however, guinea pigs,
these dumb little martyrs for science,
were subjected to extensive tests in
special compression chambers simulat-
ing conditions as deep as 400 feet un-
der water.

How It Works
It was discovered that when helium
replaced nitrogen and a little less oxy-
gen than usual was fed to the di-
viers, in place of the regular air un-

der compression, the guinea pigs could
withstand much higher pressures.
Then, Tibault and his crew took the
tests and were able to undergo higher
pressures, and get out of them more
easily and quickly, under helium feed-
ing.

The process of deep-sea diving is
slow and treacherous. Divers cannot
work deeper than 200 feet, and at that
depth their limit is from 30 to 20
minutes, because of the high pressure
under which their bodies are put, and
the increased absorption of nitrogen
in their blood.

As they are brought up this pressure
under which their bodies have been
placed has to be reduced in gradual
stages. The reason is that a sudden
decompression causes bubbles of the
nitrogen absorbed in the blood to ap-
pear. These bubbles are the cause
of caisson disease, or bends, and if
they happen to appear in the brain or
spinal cord may cause paralysis and
death.

Substitution of helium, it was found
at the bureau of mines, lessened the
danger of bubbles in the blood. The
helium molecule is much smaller than
the nitrogen molecule. For this reason
it will diffuse more rapidly, escape
more easily and produce smaller bub-
bles.

Kept for Emergency
The basic cost of helium, however,
prevents the actual feeding of this
gas in place of the nitrogen of the
air to the divers while they are under
water. Instead, the regular nitrogen-
containing air is fed the divers, but
there is always a full tank of the
synthetic atmosphere of helium and
oxygen, attached to the breathing
apparatus, for emergencies. If the
diver develops bends on his return to
the surface, this helium breather is
applied, removing the symptoms al-
most immediately.

FOUR HELD AS BURGLARS; NAMES KEPT SECRET AS OFFICERS SEEK FIFTH MEMBER OF ALLEGED GANG

Four young men, two of whom are said by officers to live in Lubbock, are held in the city and county jails here and another is being sought over this part of the state facing charges of burglary, as a result of a raid conducted by officers early Sunday morning on a small house in the west part of the city.

Officers have refused to divulge the names of the youths pending arrest of the fifth member of an alleged band that, according to officers, is responsible for the orgy of burglary that has held sway here for several weeks. The arrest of the fifth man is expected momentarily.

The raid that brought the quartet before the bar of justice for an accounting, was made on a tip from a special officer who had been commissioned for the case and resulted in finding lost varying from trinkets and valuable pens to photographs, the value of which officers will approximate \$2,000. Much of the loot was recovered and interested citizens at the time of the raid, or from the police station throughout the day seeking to identify some of their belongings.

The raid followed placing of a cleverly executed trap by the special officer, who deposited on the wall, at the place said by him to have been frequented by members of the band, in this way, the youths were traced to their own "store room," where most of the loot was found.

Police officers have asked that these who have been arrested might be in such a collection, call at the station and identify them. Many were claimed by owners Monday, including approximately \$100 worth of goods that were taken from an auto parked on the streets here two or three weeks ago.

Ship Men Claimed Violating the Law

WASHINGTON, Nov. 22 (AP)—The ship owners association of the Pacific coast and the Pacific American Steamship association are declared by the supreme court today to be in violation of the anti-trust laws by their plan for the employment of seamen through employment bureaus established by them.

The court did not pass directly on the question of guilt, however, but remanded the case to the district court for trial on its merits.

Walmsley Denies Charges of Fraud

KANSAS CITY, Nov. 22 (AP)—H. B. Walmsley, republican and former member of the state legislature who is charged with fraud in connection with the election of Senator-elect Harry H. Hawes of St. Louis, Missouri, today denied he had direct knowledge of any money or money's worth which had been spent in the election.

Walmsley was the first witness before Senator James A. Reed, democrat, Missouri, chairman of the senate campaign investigating committee.

He was subpoenaed by Senator Reed after a letter he had written to Senator George Norris, republican, Nebraska, was made public last Saturday.

In this letter Walmsley said that it was "common knowledge" that the Kansas City Street Railway company had spent between \$250,000 and \$750,000 in the election in Jackson county, November 2, in consideration for which it was to obtain a 12 year extension on its franchise.

Fish Now Used as Alibi by Stevens

SOMERVILLE, N. J., Nov. 22 (AP)—A six pound "blue" caught by Arthur Applegate of La Vallée on the night of September 14, 1932, continued to win posthumous fame as the Halibut trial proceeded here today. This big blue fish became large in the affidavits of Henry Stevens, charged with the murder of Mrs. Eleanor R. Mills.

Henry Stevens testified in his own defense that he weighed a six pounder caught by Arthur Applegate on the night the singer was slain with Rev. Edward W. Hall, brother in law of Stevens. Neighbors from La Vallée came again today to testify that Stevens was on the beach the night of September 14, 1932, three days after the killing is alleged to have taken place at about 10:20 o'clock, fifty miles from the New Jersey coast town.

LOCKNEY BANQUET IN CELEBRATION OF FT. WORTH AND DENVER VICTORY WILL BE THAT CITY'S GREATEST EVENT

Ray B. McCormick, veteran Texas newspaperman and a member of the Avalanche-Journal staff, will be at the Lockney banquet to represent your home town newspaper. His complete reports of the meeting will appear in the Avalanche of Friday morning and the Journal of Friday afternoon. On next Sunday a general feature story of the Lockney and Floyd's section will be carried in the Sunday Avalanche-Journal.

(Special to The Avalanche)

LOCKNEY, Tex., Nov. 22.—Lockney, the first town to invite the Fort Worth and Denver officials to give their town consideration, when made known the fact that a contemplated building a line across the Plains country, will be the first to celebrate the granting of the permit, issued Friday morning by the Interstate Commerce Commission, giving the Fort Worth and Denver South Plains Railway Co. permission to build the line of railroad from Estelino, through Turkey, Quitaque, and Lockney to Petersburg to Lubbock.

The occasion of the celebration will be in shape of a big banquet to be held in Lockney on the night of Thanksgiving, November 26th, when covers will be laid for more than five hundred people. The holding of this banquet will serve for the purpose: First, in celebration of the granting of the permit to the Denver Road; second, it will be the annual banquet of the Lockney Community Chamber of Commerce.

Banquet Held Each Year

Each year the Chamber of Commerce of Lockney holds an annual banquet, and it is said by those who have attended our former banquets, that they are the largest and best banquets held in West Texas.

At a meeting of the Chamber of Commerce Friday night, it was unanimously voted that we celebrate the granting of the permit to build the Fort Worth and Denver South Plains line with a banquet that would reflect all our efforts heretofore, and an arrangement committee, composed of J. B. Downs, Artie Baker, H. B. Adams, J. W. Monroe and Carl Ayres, was chosen to arrange for a banquet that was second to none in the state of Texas.

Rail Men to be There

The official body of the Fort Worth and Denver Railway, also the officials of the Burlington system at Chicago, Governor-elect Dan Moody, Senator Earle B. Mayfield, Hon. Marvin Jones, Panhandle-Plains representative in the lower house of congress, and many other outstanding men of the country and the representative of the daily press, will be included in the list of invited guests for this occasion.

Lockney is situated so that it will be the first town upon the Plains on the new Denver road, therefore, it becomes the natural gateway to the Plains; the town is located in the very heart of the best diversified farming section of Texas, and in the famous Shallowwater belt of the Plains. During the present year our wheat crop for Floyd county was 4,200 bushels. The wheat crop, which was harvested in July and August, is now being followed by the best and best crop of cotton and feed stuffs that has ever been grown in Texas. Today there are more acres of cotton in the Lockney country than in any other section of the state. Today our cotton crop is being gathered mostly with slides, the big sled, drawn by horses, that has a V-shaped slot at the front, gathering one row at a time in this way one slide can gather five bales of cotton per hour. There is much cotton in the Lockney country that the twelve gins in the county will be kept busy 24 hours each day from now until late spring. The sorghum grain crop over this county, which is always a big crop, has produced a wonderful crop this year. Enough feed has been raised here this year to supply a half dozen counties with all the feed they can use and still have stacks of feed left on every farm in the county. The Plains country has the deepest and most fertile soil in the state and has an inexhaustible supply of shallow water that can be used for irrigation purposes. Wells can be drilled to a depth of from 40 to 75 feet in the Lockney country, that will produce from 1,000 to 2,000 gallons of water per minute for irrigation purposes, the supply only being limited by the size of the pump installed. However, the rainfall here over a period of twenty years averages 26 inches annually, and is distributed throughout the year so that land will produce both spring and fall crops in an abundance. Lockney is located in the section where wheat and cotton, sorghum, and in the natural home of such crops as sorghum and alfalfa. All kinds of truck crops and fruit are raised in abundance, and the country is fast developing into a dairying section. Poultry of all kinds are raised here and the county leads all other West Texas counties in the amount of chickens, eggs and turkeys placed on the market each year. At this time it is turkey marketing season, and six carloads of turkeys were shipped from the county in one day this week. More than fifty cars of turkeys will go out from Floyd county during the holiday season.

Big Thing for Floyd

The coming of the Denver and G. A. and P. railroads to Floyd county will mean more to the county than anything that has happened since the organization of the county. This county has been handicapped heretofore on account of having no transportation facilities to the east, and on account of the roads of the county being very bad in wet weather on account of the deep soil of the country. There is a sure on foot at this time to have the Los Highway from the old home state line to the New Mexico state line in Texas. This road enters the state in Wilbarger county, near Vernon, passes through Wilbarger, Ford, Cottle, Motley, Floyd, Hale

Lamb, Bailey and Pomeroy counties, and a bond election will be called for all nine of the counties to vote bonds for the paving of this to be voted on in every one of these counties on December 26th. It is proposed to pave this transcontinental military highway with concrete and brick paving across the entire section that lies in the state of Texas.

School District Increased

Lockney has just increased her school district from a small 26 section district, to a district with 208 sections of land in it. The people of the new Lockney district purpose to run trucks all over the district to bring the children of high school age into Lockney to an affiliated high school, maintaining schools in each community that will teach up to the seventh grade. This puts the Lockney district in shape to handle one of the best school systems that can be had in the state of Texas, and gives every child living in the district a chance to get the best high school education that can be offered, and gives them two years college work.

County To Develop

With the coming of the Denver and G. A. and P. lines into Floyd county the town of Lockney and the country surrounding the town will develop very rapidly, and a visit to Floyd county makes a booster out of practically everybody. Floyd county today leads its nearest competitor in West Texas by more than \$1,500,000 annually in crop production, yet there is only 60 per cent of the tillable land in the county under cultivation. The railroads will mean that within the next five years that practically all tillable land will be under cultivation. More than 85 per cent of the land in the county is tillable.

At this time Lockney is on the verge of starting one of the biggest building programs ever in the history of the town. Sites are now being sought in the town by all rail men, flour mill men and many other such institutions. A compress site was purchased by a compress company in this city more than a year ago; also the Matteson Creamery Co. has purchased lots on which to build a creamery building and open up a station here. Plans have been drawn for more than twenty-five brick business buildings to be erected in the town, and all these structures will be well under way by the opening of the spring building season. Many residences are now under construction and many others will be under construction just as soon as plans can be drawn and workmen arranged for to do the construction work.

Connections Are Improved

The connection of this section of the state with the Fort Worth, Wichita Falls and Dallas markets by the building of the Denver line will open up to us a market that we have sought ever since the organization of the counties traversed and the settling up of the country. Having been denied transportation facilities, with the exception of a short branch line to the west, ever since the days the first white men set foot on Floyd county soil, we feel that the coming of the railroads will mean the greatest step toward developing this county that has ever been made. Lockney was the first town in this section to take steps to secure such a line of railroad. Early in the year 1925, a small band of seven men, namely: A. B. Brown, banker, Artie Baker, merchant, H. B. Adams, newspaperman, Geo. T. McIlwether, farmer and zip man, A. B. McIlwether, real estate man, Z. T. Wiley, grocer, and Bud Boyles, cattleman, conceived an idea that the time was ripe for some railroad building to take place in West Texas and especially across this section of the Plains country, and made a date with the Lubbock Chamber of Commerce for a meeting. At this meeting they were cordially received, but given to understand that the horizon was clear as far as Lubbock was concerned,

that Lubbock would be glad to join them in any railroad building matters that might arise, but at that time there was nothing in sight. On the return journey home from Lubbock, this delegation was not willing to give up in despair, and decided that one of our men, namely, Mr. A. B. Brown, would go to Fort Worth and see if he could get in touch with some one and find out if there was any railroad building being contemplated for the Plains section by any of the railroads of that city. He went to the office of Capt. Van Zandt in Fort Worth, and after a conference he was instructed to go the office of Mr. Frank E. Clarity and talk the matter over with him. This Mr. Brown did, and was assured that the Denver officials would look over town and country over on their next trip to the Plains. A few days later, Brown, Adams, A. R. McIlwether, Wiley and Boyles went to the surveying camps of the Denver road, that were located near the old Rock Kitchen, near Quitaque, where they met Messrs. Frank E. Clarity, vice president and general manager of the Denver, Gen. John A. Huston, Mr. Cloudy, Mr. Stralner, Mr. Stealey, Mr. Covington and Mr. Brown, all officials of the Denver, and again extended them an invitation to look over our country and open over while out in this section. The Denver officials consented to the Lockney committee calling a meeting at Lubbock for the next day and said that they would join us at Lubbock and come back to Lockney over the route we desired to show them. This was done and the entire official family of the Denver was sold on the Lockney country, and given one of the largest receptions at Lockney that any set of men ever received. The next move on Lockney part was to sell the Lockney country to the Burlington officials, and Mr. Brown of Lockney, with the assistance of the Denver officials, went to the office of Hale Holden in Chicago, where the Lockney country was sold to Mr. Holden and the directors of the Burlington system, and the original route of the railroad to be constructed was revised and changed so that it would be built across the Lockney country and pass through the town. The efforts of the Lockney committee was rewarded, and in the saying of Mr. Frank E. Clarity, "Anything that is worth having is worth going after."

CANYON CATTLE MAN WINS PRIZES

C. C. KEISER GETS 4TH AND 6TH PLACES IN KANSAS CITY SHOW

CANYON, Nov. 22.—C. C. Keiser, local fine stock raiser, has just won fourth and sixth places in the American Royal stock show at Kansas City, with 144 exhibitors in the competition. These places were won in the carlot class, against such competition as the Kansas State Experiment Station and prominent breeders from the entire United States.

AUSTIN, Nov. 22.—The suit of state of Texas against the Hoffman Construction company, was passed to day in 53rd district court of Travis county until Tuesday morning by Judge George Callahan.
Judge R. L.
