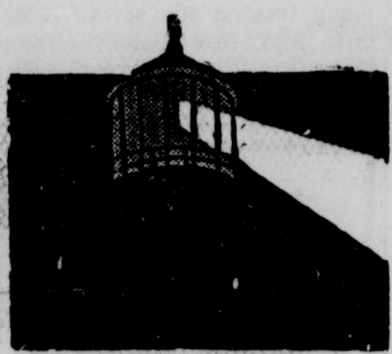




On The BEAM

There are books for all age groups, and many young people have been checking out books regularly since the closing of schools. Books for adults or young people are good fiction, such as written by Grace Livingston Hill and Emile Loring.

"The Chance of a Lifetime," by Miss Hill, is the story of two young people finding their happiness where they had not expected. The chance of a lifetime, thought Alan wistfully, as he gazed at Professor Hodge's letter offering him a place in the archaeological expedition to Egypt. But with his father seriously ill and the business on his young shoulders, he couldn't take it.

And Sherry's family thought that her chance had come with the invitation to visit her rich uncle in New York, for they did not suspect the rudeness and sophistication which she would meet there.

But Sherry proved her worth and her courage to her uncle, and both she and Alan found their chances where they had not expected them.

Emilie Loring is author of "How Can The Heart Forget." When Myles Langdon returned to his home town in New England after a year in South America, he brings confusion and mystery with him. His useless left arm is a memento of an experience with revolutionaries in the tropical jungles. With this behind him, Myles hopes he can settle down to a peaceful life and a safe job in his uncle's bank.

Like all of Emilie Loring's stories, this is a rich mixture

of beauty and romance, intrigue and danger, set off by the author's love of life and its blessings, which tells of the attractive, vivacious golden-haired girl he is engaged to but does not love, and her older sister, beautiful, steadfast Ann, and the robberies of his office in the bank, the kidnapping of Ann, and -- read this book to find out the full story told in the author's absorbing manner.

What Will Improvements Cost?

According to estimates made by an engineer hired by the City, the small water mains can be replaced by 6-inch mains, a 100,000 gallon water storage tank added, and a few extension of water may be made where needed, for \$85,000.

How Will The Bonds Be Paid?

As we pointed out in a previous advertisement the bonds will be paid with revenue from the sale of water and there will be no raise in property tax for this purpose. The City Auditor believes that a 25 cent increase in the water rate will be sufficient to pay the bonds. That figure has not been adopted by the City Council and no figure will be set until the Council is reasonably sure that it will be sufficient. When the larger mains are down, the Council believes that the use of water will increase a great deal in the area where the mains are small now. The Council also feels that the improvements will lower insurance premiums enough to offset much of the raise in water rate.

Who Will Buy The Bonds?

The Farm Home Administration has assured the Council that it will buy the bonds at 5% interest and give us 40 years to pay them. The bonds will have to be offered to buyers in the open market but the Council feels that no bonds will be sold in the open market because the interest rate (the lowest offered by any bonding company to the City was 7% to 7½%) is so much higher. The Farm Home Administration cannot buy bonds or loan a city money unless other buyers have turned them down on the proposition offered. Of course the City will offer 40 year revenue bonds at 5% interest on the open market but feels sure there will be no buyers other than FHA.

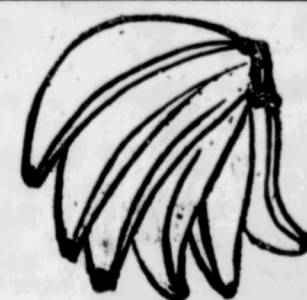
