### LORAIN, LOST TO SWEETWATER SATURDAY

The Loraine baseball team lost its fifth game of the season last Saturday to Sweetwater 5 to 3. Harvey Muns got off to a bad start pitching for Loraine, or else the Sweetwater boys got a good start with the bat, and allowed seven hits in the first two innings, which, coupled with some errors, gave Sweetwater their five runs. They never crossed the plate after the second inning.

The Loraine boys were battling at Hambright, one-handed pitcher, and could not connect for many safeties. They did manage to bunch a hit or two about the eighth inning, which, coupled with an error, produced three runs.

The Loraine team has played about twenty-five games this season and have only lost five of them which is a mighty good record.

The first Government estimate on this year's cotton crop was announced Monday of this week. The production was placed at 11,306,000 bales on a crop condition of 65.5 per cent of normal as of August 1 on 37,290,000 acres in cultivation July 1.

Ginnings to August 1 were put at 70,978 running bales. Yield was estimated by the Bureau at 149.6 pounds per acre.

As a result of the estimate coming in much shorter than was expected cotton jumped \$5 a bale in price on the strength of it.

The price has fluctuated a little since Monday, but it is hoped that the price will continue to climb through the fall.

## Current Comment From Washington

The 1931-32 session of Congress is at an end. Shortly prior to its close, it passed the relief bill, modified in such a way as to merit the approval of the President. Although the closing hours of Congress were crowded with useful work, time was found for considerable old fashioned campaign oratory, which will sound well to the folks at home, or be received with condemnation, depending upon the political complexion of the individual constituent.

The Senate voted a plan of farm relief, which, although perhaps not exactly of the form desired by everyone, is calculated, nevertheless, to afford temporary relief. Railroad officers cannot, however, be said to have been greatly relieved by Congress, in that a bill was introduced providing that no railroad official shall receive a salary of more than fifty thousand dollars per year, but, at that, the big railroad men may be able to get along somehow. The Senate continued to dally with the beer question, and the Surgeon General of the United States was requested to get the opinion of physicians throughout the country, as to how much alcohol was necessary in order to make a beverage intoxicating. The Senate approved a plan for a system of home loan banks, and about one and a quarter million dollars were made available to start operations.

wages are the lowest since 1902 the report of the Federal Reserve Board being that sales in large stores of the department type are the smallest since 1919. The White House announces that a treaty has been agreed upon with Canada, regarding the St. Lawrence waterway, and that the document will be ready for signature before long. Opposition both in Canada and America may delay the actual signing for some time. The Department of Labor reports that the amount being distributed in cities for the relief of the needy has been decreased somewhat. The cost of post office money orders has gone up, effective July 20.

Houston Harte Publisher of the San Angelo Standard and Times, will lead the daily newspaper men while Jess Mitchell of Muleshoe will head the weekly contingent in appearances on the program.

Special attention is being paid the Question box session of Saturday morning which will be lead by Vice-President Ralph Shuffler of the Odessa News-Times. Individuals are being urged to write to Mr. Shuffler of the Odessa News-Times before the convention and submit questions and suggestions for discussion here. D. A. ## Voters To Pass On Nine Amendments to Constitution

Austin, Aug. 6.—Texas voters will have nine proposed changes in the state's constitution to pass upon general election day, November 8.

The amendments the people are asked to authorize this time are:

(1) To allow the legislature to release delinquent taxes which have been due for ten years.

(2) To exempt from state taxation \$3,000 of the assessed taxable value of all resident homesteads.

(3) To authorize the legislature to make an appropriation for the proposed Texas Centennial celebration in 1936.

(4) To lessen the vote required to vote bonds for seawalls, breakwaters, and sanitation in counties bordering on the Gulf of Mexico.

Now two thirds of all the property owners must vote for such improvements. If the constitution is changed as proposed only two thirds of those who participate in the election must vote for bonds.

(5) To require that those voting in elections to fix an indebtedness on a political subdivision must have rendered property for taxation.

(6) To combine the offices of tax assessor and tax collector.

(7) To save court costs in sale of property for delinquent taxes and to provide more liberal opportunity for redemption. Now double the sale price must be paid to redeem the property. If the proposed constitutional change is made recovery can be made inside a year for 25 per cent and a dollar recording fee and for fifty per cent and a dollar recording fee the second year.

(8) To return the constitutional provisions as they formerly were regarding the use of the permanent fund of the University of Texas. A recent amendment permitted the regents to pledge the income to raise a building fund.

(9) To extend voting and office holding privileges to men in military service as reserves.

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## THE COMMERCIAL USE OF TEXAS HIGHWAYS IS A PRIVILEGE, NOT A RIGHT

● The highways of Texas are the property of its citizens. They constitute a system of nearly 200,000 miles of road of which 20,000 miles are designated as State highways and the remainder are county roads. All types of road are represented in this system, less than 5% have so-called "permanent" surface.

The total cost of these highways is unknown but it amounts to many hundred million dollars. From 1917 to 1930, inclusive, counties and road districts of the State issued \$243,592,834 in bonds for the construction and improvement of roads and bridges. In the two-year period ending August 31, 1930, the State Highway Commission expended \$89,032,825, of which \$22,488,426 was for maintenance of the State highways.

In view of these tremendous costs the preservation of our highways from rapid wear and destruction is a matter of very vital interest to their owners, viz., the public. It is especially important that they be made to outlast the life of the bonds, which run from 20 to 30 years.

The use of the public highways for commercial purposes is not a right but a privilege which may be withheld or granted subject to such restrictions, regulations and charges as the Legislature may see fit to impose. Such regulations are intended to promote safety, preserve the highways and safeguard the interests of the public.

Texas Railroads, which pay the entire cost of construction and maintenance of their own roadbeds and, in addition, make substantial contributions to the cost of Texas highways, are thoroughly regulated with respect to their services, rates, methods and practices. There is no good reason why commercial users of the highways, built and maintained at the expense of the public, should not likewise be regulated to such extent as the public interest requires and pay such charges as will represent proper compensation for the privileges granted them.

● The statutes governing highway transportation as enacted by the Forty-second Legislature represent the wishes of the citizens of this State and express their desire to give equal rights to all and special privileges to none. These statutes should be given a fair trial and their value ascertained. Unless this is done, a chaotic condition in transportation as a whole will surely ensue.

#### ON TEXAS FARMS

A community garden of seven acres in addition to individual gardens in South Houston Community in Harris county has been furnishing vegetables for a community canning plant where hundreds of containers have been put up this season by home demonstration methods.

The seed house at the gin in Ricardo Community in Kleberg county has been converted by Mr. and Mrs. Weir into a canning kitchen where families of the community who have no canning equipment come to can.

Responding to 42 calls for help in putting up a food supply for the year, Mrs. W. M. Harless, Brown county 4-H pantry demonstrator, reached 29 families in June as her part in the "help others" expansion program of the home demonstration clubs of the county.

Minard Kelsner, Deaf Smith county farmer conducting a hog raising demonstration with the county agent, has found that self feeders and a self-waterer made out of a barrel do away with 75 per cent of the work in caring for the herd. He has produced pork this year for a feed cost of 1.71 cents per pound of pork.

These are the days dairy herd demonstrators are weeding out the poor producers. Herd records have shown J. W. Moss in Jackson county that his poorest producer charged 16 cents per pound for feed for one pound of butterfat, while

his best producer charged only 8.4 cents.

"Superior to cold storage" says Charlie Roberts of his unique system of storing pecan buds in 16 inches of soil beneath the floor of his barn near Kountze. The grafts were cut when dormant last December, the ends dipped in paraffin, and buried. Every graft placed in 50 trees is living.

Providence Home Demonstration Club in Smith county won first place in a sanitary pit toilet construction contest by building 37 fly-proof toilets in five spring months. A total of 75 sanitary toilets were built in that time throughout the county.

A canning plant established in the basement of the court house in Seymour by the county commissioners and a local civic organization has been operating on a toll basis under supervision of home demonstration club women. City and county furnish the cans and take one-third of the products to be used next winter for charity.

The berry patch is a bright spot in the farm picture this season. Reports of demonstrations show that berries made good money on a small scale for many people. An instance is W. I. Pemberton of Poetry Community, Kaufman county, who is said by the county agent to have gathered 1078 gallons from three acres for a net return of \$54 per acre.

The May report on 35,300 hens in demonstrations flocks in Texas shows that worms are stealing on the average 4 1-2 eggs per hen per month. Wormy flocks show an average income above feed cost of 6.56 cents per hen per month while flocks without worms show a profit of 9.13 cents per hen per month. In other words worms cut production 25 per cent and profits 28 per cent. On a 200 hen flock this amounts to \$5.14 for the month.

EDUCATOR DIES AT HOME OF SISTER

(From Midlothian Paper)  
Miss May Smith, 63, died last Friday morning at 3 o'clock at the home of her sister, Mrs. Phil Jones, following a stroke of paralysis, which she suffered ten days before her death.

Miss Smith was born in Navarro County in 1869 to Mr. and Mrs. James Smith. Shortly after the family moved to Waxahachie and were pioneer residents of that city. She graduated from high school in Fort Worth at the age of fifteen. She later attended Marvin College in Waxahachie and Trinity University, where she graduated.

It was in the school room that the strength and beauty of her character was most evident. Her highest aim was to influence her pupils to noble, Christian living and to show

them that without this, education was lacking. The results of her teaching and the influence of her life on the minds and hearts of thousands of pupils who came under her influence during her forty years as a missionary to the young of our state can not be estimated.

Miss Smith never ceased to be a student. All of her active life she continued seeking after knowledge. Two summers were spent in the University of California and one in Columbia University in New York. She helped her neices and nephews through high school and college and has aided worthy young men and women to realize their life's ambition. Her's was a life well spent, serving her fellowman.

Early in life Miss Smith joined the Presbyterian Church and through all the years of her life she continued to grow in grace and to abound in liberality and Christian activity, and perhaps her greatest attainment was her unflinching faith.

Funeral services were held at the home Saturday morning at 10 o'clock, conducted by Rev. B. G. Taylor, pastor of the Presbyterian Church, and Dean Childs of Trinity University. A large assembly of friends and relatives from far and near were present as an expression of the love and respect accorded her.

The body was carried to Waxahachie where interment was made.

She is survived by one sister Mrs. Phil Jones, with whom she made her home, and three brothers, Ed F. Smith of Ingram, James H. Smith of Talpa and A. Bert Smith of Loraine. She also leaves thirteen nephews and five nieces and a host of close friends.

The pallbearers were six of her nephews: Roy and Curtis Smith of Ingram, Boyd and Robert Smith of Mexia and Dallas, Clyde and Phil Smith of Loraine.
