

Hospital honors LVNs; gives pay raises

Five members of the Root Memorial Hospital staff were honored by the Mitchell County Hospital Board of directors Tuesday night.

Three LVNs were presented corsages and pins for 40 years of service to the hospital, and hospital administrator Ray Mason and assistant administrator Richard Murphy were given raises.

Board chairman Bobby Lemons presented pins and board member Jane McCarley presented corsages on behalf of the board and hospital to LVNs Friday Moore, Inez Howell and Dorothy Forbes who have a combined 120 years of service to Root Memorial Hospital.

In making the presentation, Lemons said that "Friday Moore and Inez Howell came to work for Root Memorial Hospital in 1943. Both have given in

excess of 40 years of nursing service to this county and community."

Continuing, Lemons said "Dorothy Forbes came to work for Root Memorial Hospital in the later part of 1944 or early 1945. There was a short break in service in 1959, but Dorothy also has given 40 years of nursing service to this county and community."

"These nurses are still giving their service to this county and

community and are shining examples and credits to the field of nursing," said Lemons. "Their loyalty and hard work have set the standards of care given to the citizens of Mitchell County."

Also on hand for the presentation was director of nurses Jo Ann Merket.

Mason and Murphy received their raises following an executive session at the end of the meeting.

Bob Reily was the only board

member to cast a negative vote after Herbert Mearse made the motion to raise Mason's salary from \$35,800 to \$38,000 a year and Murphy's from \$32,000 to \$34,000 a year. The motion was seconded by Mrs. McCarley.

Lemons told Mason and Murphy that "we're very pleased with the work both of you have done. This is just a token of our appreciation for what you have done up to now."

When Mason and Murphy

were named to their respective positions last fall, neither was given a salary increase from their previous jobs. Mason had been assistant administrator and Murphy comptroller.

In other business Tuesday, Murphy who is still acting as comptroller as well as assistant administrator, gave the financial reports for the hospital and Root Valley Fair Lodge.

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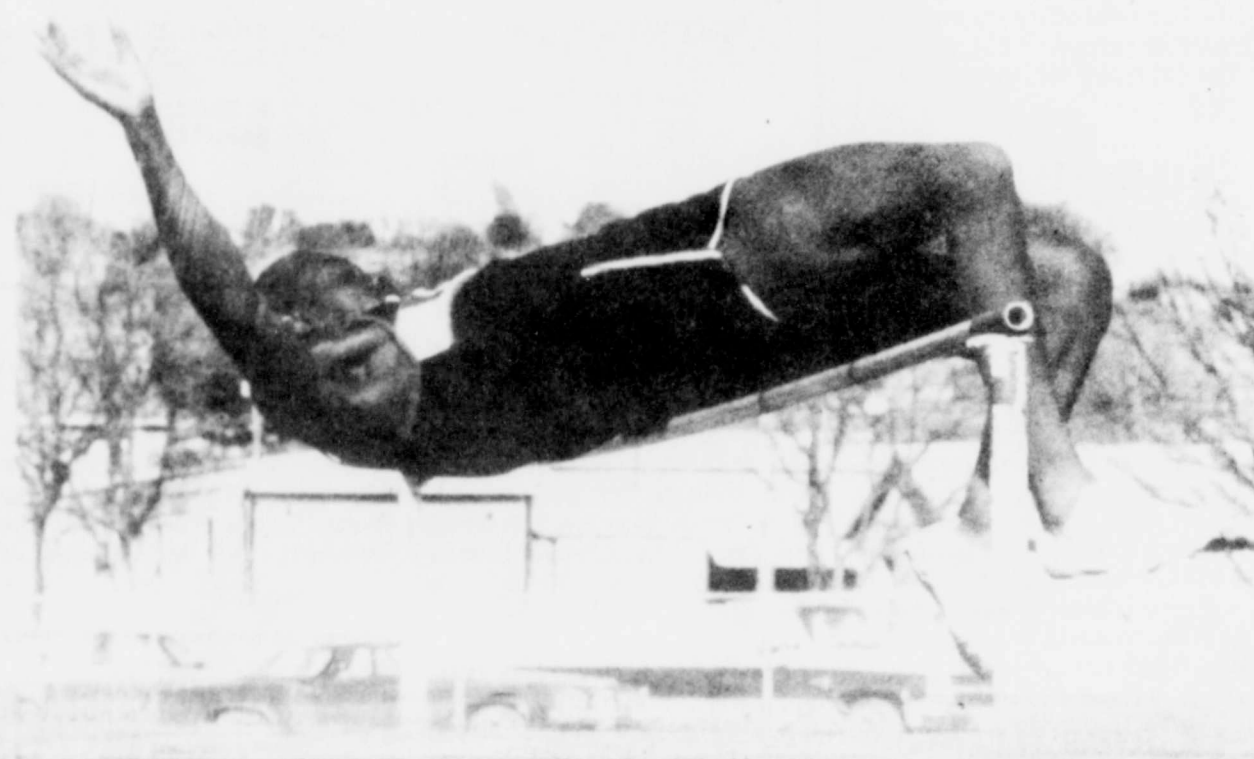

Armed robber comes up empty-handed

An armed robber came up empty-handed from the Three Point Grocery at 1066 Westpoint Monday night when an attendant at the store fired a shot at the suspect, causing him to leave the money as he fled the scene.

The incident occurred at 8:40 p.m. when a black male, believed to be 20-25 years old, 5'10" to 6-foot tall, entered the store wearing a ski mask and black gloves and clothing.

The suspect carried an automatic pistol and ordered the female employee to empty the cash register and give him the money. The employee gave the

suspect a handful of money who dropped the money as he backed away from the county.

According to Police Chief Bobby Sparks, the employee then grabbed a gun laying next to the cash register and fired one shot at the suspect and then hid behind the counter for a few seconds. As the employee looked up, she saw the suspect running south on Westpoint.

Sparks said all the money was recovered and the police department along with the Mitchell County Sheriff's Department is continuing to search for the

Telephone system purchased

The Mitchell County Commissioners Court Tuesday, during a called meeting, agreed to purchase an electronic telephone system for the courthouse, the courthouse annex and the jail at a cost of \$23,575.25.

AT&T was the low bidder and commissioners agreed to award the bid to the company after comparing its bid with other bidders. The other bidders included Advanced Telephone Systems of Big Spring, \$29,811; and C&E Telephone Co. of Midland, \$28,622.35.

Commissioner Paul Hunter, who had headed up the committee to look into a new telephone system, said a comparison of the bids showed that AT&T met all the specifications and the bid price includes a printer which will give a detailed report of the

long distance calls made so that the calls can be charged to the appropriate office.

The commissioners had agreed to study the possibility of buying a phone system rather than to continue to pay the monthly lease charges from Southwestern Bell and AT&T.

Hunter estimated that about \$575 can be saved each month in lease charges.

In other business, the commissioners approved a bid from Hash and Terry of Ballinger in the amount of \$2,035 for a water tank for the Colorado City Volunteer Fire Department's rural fire truck to replace a tank which is leaking and beyond repair. The tank will have two baffles and two coats of paint. Bulldog Tank of Clyde submitted a lower bid of \$2,000 but included only one baffle and one coat of paint. The other bidder

was Overland of Abilene with \$2,290.

Commissioners tabled the appointment of a constable for precinct one after they were undecided whether to appoint someone to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of Billy Ray Williamson or wait until the 1986 general elections to let voters elect someone to the \$1 a month office.

County Judge Bill Carter said he had received applications from Jerry Hammond, Patrick Roy Barker and S. L. Vallery. The duties of a constable include serving civil papers and warrants issued in the justice court. Constables do not have to be certified.

In other business, the commissioners formally approved the contract naming City National Bank as the county depository.

Williamson named city fire marshal

The Colorado City Council Tuesday night voted to appoint Billy Ray Williamson, 28, fire truck driver and part time policeman, as fire marshal to replace L. O. Schaffer, who resigned recently.

Williamson had been elected a Mitchell County constable in the November election and pay had been set at \$1 per month. Williams said that he resigned as constable three weeks ago.

City Manager Brenda Tarter said that Williamson was qualified for the job.

The council gave final approval to the sharing of \$33,400 in revenue sharing funds. It approved \$5,000 for the Wallace Senior and Educational Center; \$8,400 for the Kindercare Center; and \$20,000 for city departments with the police department to receive \$10,000 for a new police car and the water department \$10,000 for a tapping machine.

The council also:

--gave Mrs. Tarter permission to advertise for bids for a water well drilling machine to attempt a well in Ruddick Park; and

--heard a report from Buzz Rich, director of city services, that a 25-year-old water well in the city's water well field was being tested and that the well had pumped 150 gallons a minute. The well will be in service this summer in an attempt to alleviate northside water problems.

CISD board approves contract renewals

The Colorado Independent School District board of trustees Monday night approved contract renewals for supervisors, directors and principals.

The trustees met Monday in order to finish their agenda from last Tuesday night.

Action on the contracts and pay raises were taken after several hours of executive session.

Receiving two-year contract renewals are athletic director Tom Ramsey, business manager Geneva Findley, high school principal Jerry Reynolds, middle school principal James McLean, Hutchinson principal Dell Riley, Kelley principal Bobby Lemons and administrative supervisor Dr. Walter Bingham.

Dr. Bingham also received a change in job title to assistant superintendent.

One-year contracts were approved for transportation super-

visor Coy Adams, music-band director Billy Shipp, community education director Barbara Gray, lunchroom supervisor Christine Cooley and Plan A supervisor Erna Lou Burt. Maintenance supervisor Charlie Edwards is not under contract.

Mrs. Gray, Mrs. Cooley, Edwards and Adams will be receiving a 3 1/2 percent pay increase for next year.

The others will be receiving a \$114 a month raise as mandated by state law. The principals will be receiving an additional \$36 a month and Mrs. Findley and Dr. Bingham will each receive an additional \$56 a month.

During the executive session, board members also evaluated teachers and other personnel, but no action was taken.

Prior to the executive session, the board discussed building a new press box at Wolf Stadium. There is \$25,000 budgeted for a new facility, but bids received last year came in over \$60,000

and the board at that time rejected all bids.

Monday night, the board asked Supt. Charlie Uselton to contact metal building contractors to see if the plans and specifications might be modified so that a lower-cost metal structure can be built for the amount the district has budgeted.

The original plans called for a two-story structure made out of cinder block tile with air conditioning and heating. Board members Monday night suggested that the air conditioning and heating be deleted at this time and added later as the budget permits.

Ramsey said that about seven rows of bleachers still need to be covered with aluminum and that the track will soon have to be resurfaced.

The board plans to open bids for the press box at its May meeting so that work can be completed during the summer if a suitable bid is submitted.

The board also adopted the 1985-86 school calendar as presented by Uselton last Tuesday night. Last week, Dr. Billy Bridgford had questioned the spring break which had been proposed for March 24-28, saying that he would like to see the spring break scheduled for the last week in February to coincide with the Houston Livestock Show.

Uselton said that Loraine has scheduled its spring break next year for the last week in February, but that the Christmas break will be shorter in order to end the six weeks on Feb. 21.

Uselton further explained that one teacher had said she thinks the later spring break will be better for the students since many students tend to lose interest in school following the break. He noted she also said the achievement exam scores would also be better if the spring break is scheduled after the tests are given.

Bridgford agreed that scheduling the break in February would create too many problems, and the board unanimously approved the calendar as submitted.

Board members also were presented a report on the six weeks period ending Feb. 15 which shows a 94.17 percent of attendance for the period. The total attendance percentage for the year is 95.90 compared to 94.80 to last year.

A fourth six weeks failure-percentage report shows that 35.5 percent of the high school students are failing one or more subjects and that 42 percent of the middle school students are failing one or more subjects.

Uselton and high school principal Reynolds explained that although the percentage of failures may seem high, schools in Dallas are registering a 55 percent failure rate.

For the five months ending Feb. 28, Murphy stated that inpatient service revenues remain under budget by \$273,905, or 29.1 percent. February revenues were \$57,409 under budget, or 29.1 percent. February revenues were \$57,409 under budget, or 31 percent. He said the Medicare percentage of revenues continues to be the majority of revenues at 68 percent of the total.

He said total operating revenues are \$224,483 under the projection of \$1,003,120, or 22 percent under overall.

"Hospital admissions are 332 patients below the projections of 682, which is a 49 percent reduction," said Murphy. He noted that the average length of stay is six days as compared to last year's five and one-half days. They attributed the increase to the increase of Medicare pa-

tients.

Murphy further stated that hospital operating expenses remain under budget by \$138,036, with labor 7 percent under, supplies 29.6 percent under and other expenses 4.2 percent under for an overall 10.5 percent under.

"February expenses reflect the recording of employees' health and life insurance expense for the five-month period," said Murphy. "This expense had been overlooked due to the change in and training on new accounting personnel. This will correct the year to date picture but overstates the expense for February."

He said operating expense per patient per day continues to exceed budget based on the patient load. The average cost is \$552.35 per patient per day.

Murphy said an additional \$275,000 in tax money has been

transferred to the general fund and that the tax money along with the anticipated revenue should carry the hospital until June.

Mason reported on the recent Medicare survey made at the hospital which resulted in only two deficiencies.

"I think the crew did a super job," said Mason. "The Medicare survey team was extremely complimentary."

"The staff as a whole should be commended for the job that has been done," said Mason.

Mason also reported on a trip he and Murphy took to Austin in which members of the Texas Hospital Association met with lawmakers concerning proposed legislation which would affect hospitals. He urged the board members to write to the legislators urging the lawmakers to consider the impact of the legislation if passed.

Ramsey said that 21.33 percent of high school athletes are failing one or more courses with freshmen leading at 33.33 percent. The survey showed 22.86 percent of the sophomore athletes are failing one or more courses with juniors at 11.11 percent and seniors at 3 percent.

Useton said that one reason the freshman class is showing a higher percentage of failure rate

is that most freshmen are taking five required subjects. "The freshmen have a tough load," said Useton. Of the total freshman class, 53 percent are failing one or more subjects. That compares to sophomores, 34 percent; juniors, 25 percent and seniors, 19 percent.

-approved the financial report as submitted by business manager Mrs. Findley;

-set the date for the service award banquet for Tuesday, April 30 at 7 p.m. in the middle school cafeteria;

-accepted the resignation of middle school coach, history and physical education teacher Mark Paul Levin effective May 25; and;

-and was given a report from the business office showing that interest earned on hi-fi accounts for February totaled \$14,994.25.

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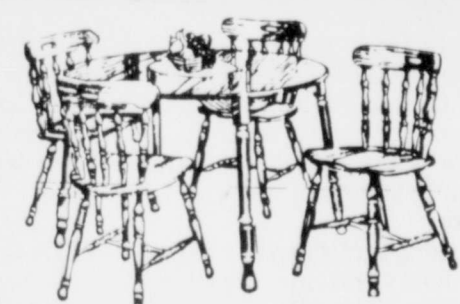
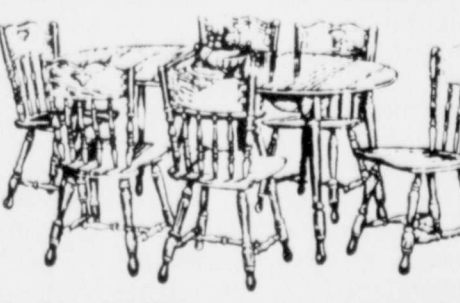

Valuable documents should be inventoried

Important money matters—insurance, savings, investments, real estate—create lots of paperwork. Once you sign those papers you may forget about them. And then when you need them the most they are nowhere to be found.

It's just a good household management to periodically take inventory of your valuable papers. It will help you locate the papers when they are needed, direct someone else to them in case of emergency and evaluate your financial affairs on a routine basis.

Prepare an inventory of valuable documents. Review it at least once a year and update it whenever important changes occur. You might also want to prepare an inventory for an older relative, since you could be the person who needs to locate his or her important papers.

An inventory could include the following categories:

—A family record listing names, birthdates, and where the birth is recorded for each family member.

—Name, address and telephone numbers of persons who should be notified in case of emergency.

—Name, address and telephone number of person to whom you have given power of attorney.

—Name, addresses and telephone numbers of your family advisors. These may include an accountant, banker, broker, financial planner, insurance agent, doctor, clergy and attorney.

—Location of your valuable papers including wills and instructions, personal papers, property papers and real estate papers.

—A list of all financial accounts, including the name and address of the firm, the identification or account number and in

whose name the account is carried. This may include accounts with banks, savings and loan associations and credit unions.

—A list of real estate and business interests you own, including mortgages. Basic information for each property would include the kind of property, location, ownership situation, date acquired and purchase price.

—A list of stocks, bonds, securities, mutual funds, property insurance, life insurance and annuities; accident, disability and hospital insurance; and other personal property you own, such as household furnishings and automobiles.

—Information concerning social security, retirement, pension and profit sharing plans. Dates of employment and employers are frequently needed for filing applications and settling estates.

—List of money owed, and

owed to you, size of debt and terms of payment.

Making an inventory of valuable papers is a major task. Once you set up a system, however, updating as changes occur is done quite easily. Detailed papers to get you started on a financial inventory are available at the Extension office.

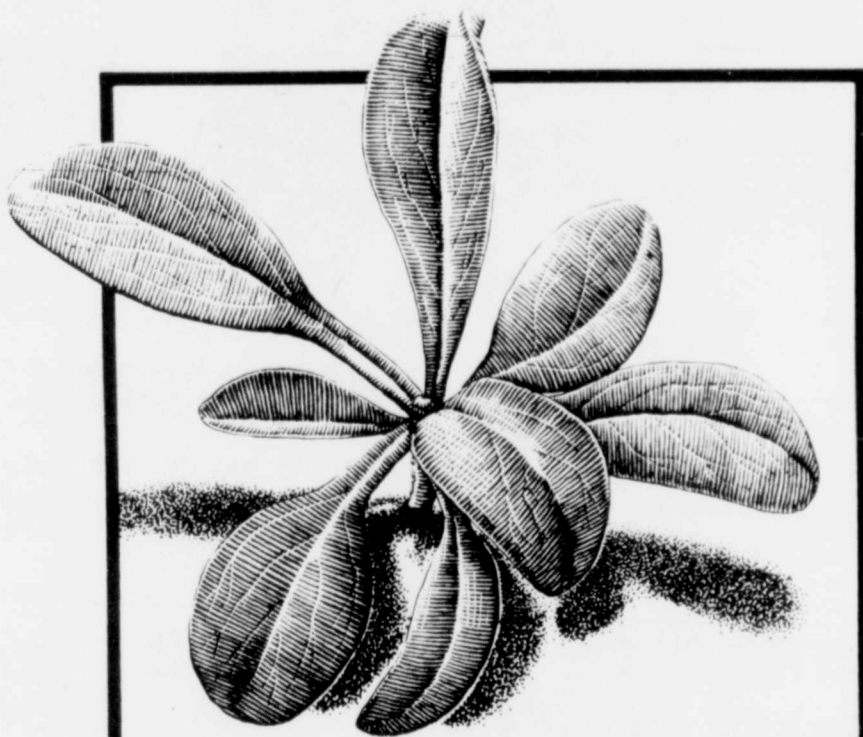

Wolves erase 4 records; Broncos steal meet by two

Last Friday the Colorado City Wolves traveled to a Sonora track meet and returned home without a team championship—the first such time in four 1985 meets.

The host Broncos edged Colorado High School's thin clads 140 to 138 but the Wolves, however, made up for it by recording some impressive results.

The Wolves erased four records and recorded several personal bests for the season—now about halfway complete.

In the 400 meter relay, the Wolves broke both the CHS school record and the Sonora meet record.

Don Randle, Kevin Norman, Perry Conner and Joey Ritchey won in a time of 43.51 to erase the CHS record of 43.7 set at last year's regional meet by Conner, Ritchey, Norman and Larry Hamilton. Ozona held the meet record with a 43.74 set in 1982.

Another CHS record to fall was the open 400 mark.

Don Randle, one of Colorado High School's most versatile athletes, set a new standard of 51.17 in winning the event. Randle himself set the previous record of 51.41 at an Eldorado meet two weeks ago.

The Wolves are particularly

strong in the 400 meter dash. Conner and Mike Ligon were right behind Randle in second and fourth place with respective times of 51.31 and 51.85—both personal bests, along with Randle's.

Randle also won the high jump competition with a leap of 6'2" while Armando Rivera jumped to a fourth place 5'8". Randle owns a personal and school best of 6'5" set at last year's regional meet.

Yet another record to fall was the Sonora meet's 100 meter dash mark of 11.03, held by the Broncos Scott Bailiff, since 1983.

Ritchey erased it by winning in 10.99—also one tenth off the CHS school record. Norman, the school record holder, finished second in 11.09. Both times were season bests and Ritchey's personal best.

Ritchey also won the 200 in 22.84—just .11 off his school record.

Another first place came in the day's last event when Norman, Randle, Conner and Ligon won the 1600 meter relay in 3:29.03.

The Wolves have enjoyed success in the afore mentioned events but got some new point production in other events.

Doug Chitsey finished second

in the 110 meter high hurdles and third in the 300 meter intermediate hurdles with respective times of 16.19 and 42.12.

Ismael Silva gave Sonora's Jose Escalante a run for his money in the 3200 meter run and finished second in 10:41.31. Silva also placed sixth in the 1600 meter run with a 5:04.64. Escalante, last year's state runner-up, again leads all of West Texas in both distance races.

In the discus, Johnny Rivera took second with a throw of 138'7". Chitsey threw 128'3½" for fifth place.

Pete Rosas also contributed to the Wolves point total by placing sixth in the 800 meter run with a 2:13.20.

Colorado City's marks are among West Texas' bests. The Wolves will find out just where they stand among area teams when they compete in the huge San Angelo Relays tomorrow and Saturday.

Sonora team totals: Sonora 140, Colorado City 138, Reagan County 105, Eldorado 60, Ozona 52 and Coahoma 23.

Defending AAAA state champ Sweetwater won the meet with 144 points to 86 for the runner-up Wolves, who recorded improvement throughout the team.

Sheri Morris, who had been running in the 17 second range, improved her time by racing to a fourth place finish in the 100 meter hurdles with a 16.85.

Free tasted a rare defeat in the 200 meter dash, but improved her time to 27.10 to take fourth place.

In the 1600 run, Sally Mendoza and Margie Beltran finished a hair apart by taking fourth and fifth with respective times of 6:08.24 and 6:08.35.

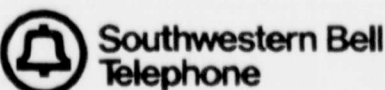

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Bentsen still pushing for Texas location for GM

General Motors plans to spend \$5 billion over the next five years creating, from the manufacturing plant on up, a new line of state-of-the-art automobiles.

I want to see that these Saturn automobiles are built in Texas, so I wrote a letter, signed by all

members of the Texas Congressional Delegation, urging GM officials to seriously consider locating their plant in our state.

Texas has many advantages to offer GM, and in return, our state's economy would have much to gain. The Saturn plant would employ 6,000 people and inject \$500 million annually into

the economy around it.

Saturn officials have indicated they will first select a state, then choose a city. The company is looking for a site with a good business climate; good training opportunities proximity to markets and suppliers; and ample availability of skilled labor, energy and transportation.

Ninety-seven Texas cities are competing for the plant, a good indication of the enthusiastic support the Saturn company would find in our state.

Texans are by nature innovative and willing to take on difficult challenges, such as GM's goal of using the latest technology to build a car so efficiently that it will allow no cost advantage to Japan.

Our state has stayed on the cutting edge of technology, leading the way in creative computerization, space exploration and business innovation. The University of Texas System has one of the largest endowments in the world, for example, and has embarked on an ambitious plan to further the state-of-the-art in robotics manufacturing, advanced

computers and business management.

With our 11 engineering schools, Texas produces 4,700 bachelors of science, 900 masters level and 150 doctoral engineers each year, offering a wealth of engineering talent. And, over the past several years, skilled workers have relocated to Texas, increasing the pool of skilled workers available to Saturn.

The business climate in Texas is one of the best in the nation, and with no corporate, personal income or unitary taxes, we will remain one of the lowest tax states.

Our central location, close to major hubs for rail, air, sea and land transportation, would enhance shipping of cars and parts.

At last word, Texas is a serious contender among many states vying for the plant. A decision on its location is expected in early spring.

The letter to GM and Saturn officials included an invitation to meet with the Texas Delegation to learn in greater detail the significant advantages and opportunities our state offers. I will work hard, along with the rest of the Delegation and other state officials, to convince GM and Saturn officials to select our state.

Texas offers the new Saturn venture, I believe, its greatest opportunity for success.

The Saturn venture, in turn, offers Texas one of its greatest economic opportunities of recent years.

Hargrove attends managerial conference held in McAllen

Ross Hargrove, representing Producers Co-op Gin of Colorado City, was among the more than 300 agricultural cooperative managers, directors and wives from across Texas who attended the 34th annual Cooperative Manager-Director Conference in McAllen March 15.

The conference theme "Let's Come Alive In '85" emphasized the importance and the purposes of the conference - (1) to broaden skills in managerial decision-making for cooperative managers and directors; and (2) to

keep abreast of the changes and the challenges that are facing agricultural cooperatives. Speakers at the conference included Dr. William E. Black of Texas A&M University, College Station; Dan Baker of Bulverde; Mrs. June Gooding of Farmland Industries, Inc., Kansas City, Mo.; and Vernon Lewis of Amarillo, the council president. Additional speakers and workshop chairmen were local cooperative Extension Service, Farm Credit Banks of Texas personnel, and a number of local

cooperative officials.

Since the beginning of these conferences in 1952, cooperative leaders have met to prepare themselves for greater service

to their local producer-members. The program consisted of speakers, workshops, and various general and small group sessions. The conference is sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Cooperative Council, Farm Credit Banks of Texas, and Texas Agricultural Cooperative Council.

Stenholm introduces farm bills to representatives

WASHINGTON, D.C.—Two agriculture-related bills have been introduced in the U.S. House of Representatives by Congressman Charles W. Stenholm (D-Texas).

Congressman Stenholm, a member of the Agriculture Committee, has introduced a "Bases and Yields" bill and "Clear Title" legislation. The Subcommittee on Conservation, Credit and Rural Development scheduled a hearing to discuss Stenholm's Clear Title legislation for Tuesday, March 26, in Washington, D.C.

Under the first proposal, Bas-

es and Yields, it would simplify and standardize the way acreage bases and yields are assigned to producers. Eight members of Congress have already signed as co-sponsors of the proposed legislation, which bases yields on actual records, and gives farmers more flexibility than they now have in deciding how much of a given crop they will plant.

The second piece introduced by the Stamford Congressman is House Resolution 1591, or Clear Title. This bill would remove farm products' exceptions from

Uniform Commercial Codes and extend clear title to agricultural commodities. Presently, if the seller of that commodity fails to repay the lender, the buyer can be held responsible by the banker, effectively forcing the buyer to pay twice for the same goods. This bill would establish a process through which the liability would be equitably distributed between the three parties, between the three parties.

"I believe these two basic reforms are long overdue," Congressman Stenholm said. "They will serve to rectify injustices inherent in both systems."
