THRIFT—in spending
“National Thrift Week” which begins Jan. 17 is doubtless a useful institution. But just what bearing the question “How often do you bathe every week?” has to do with thrift, I fail to understand. It would seem, at first glance, that real thrift would include economy of soap!

The promoters of “National Thrift Week” are asking a lot of queer questions of 500 “prominent citizens” among that about bathing, the evident purpose being to show that other things besides saving money have to do with success in the world. It is my observation that the really thrifty persons are those who make sure that they get value for their money and do not spend more than their incomes. But to many folk think that thrift is a synonym for miserliness. There are times when it is thrifty to spend, and I think this is one of them.

I would rather have my capital in securities and commodities—which it is, as far as it exists—than in money at this time. For if there is anything in the New Deal it will mean higher values for commodities and lower value for money.

LIQUOR—same old racket

One of my New York friends complained the other day that the “legal” whiskey now being sold is of no better quality than that which he used to buy from his bootlegger. I asked him why he should be surprised at that. There never was a time when more than a small fraction of the liquor-drinkers knew the difference between good liquor and bad, anyway; and so little pure whiskey has been available the past few years that very few today know what it is like.

Why should the legitimate liquor dealers make an effort to sell something that wouldn't be appreciated, when they can get by with the same old bootleg stuff? I never heard of anybody engaged in the liquor traffic who had any conscience about such things. It never has been an honest business, and never will be. Pretty soon, I think, we shall see another popular wave of revolution against the sale of liquor. And it will come, not from church sources but from business men who find the morale and the skill of employees impaired by drink. I think the public, which was so eager to repeal the 18th Amendment, will find that it is up against the same old abuses as before.

GAMBLING—then and now

There is considerable talk going around that some sort of a Government lottery may be set up, not only to give people a chance to gamble but to provide revenues for the nation. I hear many people denounce such a scheme on the ground of morality. I hear others, among them men of high standing and character, say they see no great objection to it. It all depends upon the point of view.

When I was a boy marauders used to denounce playing marbles “for keeps” as one of the most vicious of sins. I find it difficult to regard either that, or playing cards for reasonable stakes, or taking a chance in a raffle at a church fair, as evidence of immoral character. I think the great wave of protest which made lotteries illegal in this country, more than forty years ago, was due to the belief that they were not conducted honestly.

Regardless, however, of the rights and wrongs of the matter, I am of the opinion that, before very long, we shall see some sort of lotteries, either by the government or under government supervision, established in this country.

Right-of-Way Has Been Secured For Rhineland Roadway

Right-of-way for the new Munday-Rhineland road has been secured and work is now under way setting fences back and making way for workmen to start grading. The grading has already been completed from the river up to Rhineland on this side of the river and the work is almost completed from the river to the Benjamin-Seymour highway north of the river.

The procuring of the right-of-way removes the last obstacle in the way of the \$17,000 CWA project south of the river, and will provide labor for a large number of men during the next few weeks.

Credit Association Formed Haskell by Farmer-Stockmen

With the main office to be located in Haskell, the Haskell Production Credit Association was organized here Saturday January 6, with farmers from Jones, Stonewall, Knox and Haskell counties present. The association is capitalized at \$100,000, and is a branch of the Intermediate Credit Bank, in Houston.

The money, which is to be loaned to farmers and stockmen in the four counties, is to be furnished by the government. Chattels and personal property will be the factors upon which the money will be loaned at 6 percent interest.

Under the guidance of E. P. Menke, who is connected with the bank in Houston, the business of the meeting was rapidly transacted. R. C. Montgomery, Haskell, was appointed temporary chairman, and the following permanent directors named from the various counties: Jones, J. F. McCullough, Stamford, and W. C. Church, Merkel; Stonewall, E. M. Wright, Aspermont, and Jack Idol, Benjamin, and W. E. McNeill, Munday; Haskell, J. W. Adcock, Haskell; and W. H. McCandless, Hale, and R. C. Montgomery, Haskell.

It is expected that the permanent organization will be completed inside of two weeks, at which time a permanent secretary and inspector for each county will be named. The Haskell branch is one of fifty-four in the state.—The Haskell Free Press.

Capitol News Letter

The Minnesota Moratorium Law—It's Significance

Washington—The Supreme Court this week rendered a decision upholding the moratorium law of Minnesota. There has been much speculation regarding the attitude of the courts on the complete Roosevelt emergency program as to whether it will stand the test of the Courts. Section 10, Article 1 of the Constitution says: “No state shall... pass any... law impairing the obligation of contracts.” In the Minnesota case there was clear impairment of Contract. A party borrowed money under a definite lawful contract. The State Legislature passed a moratorium law impairing such a contract. Is this decision the Supreme Court says: “While emergency does not create power, emergency may furnish the occasion for the exercise of power.” Thus we see private rights, even though defined in the Constitution, may be sacrificed in an emergency for the general welfare of the whole people. The Supreme Court was divided 5 to 4, thus showing the importance of knowing how each proposed member stands on property and human rights, before being appointed to this Court. Those favoring human rights in this instance were: Chief Justice Hughes, and Justices Brandeis, Stone, Cardozo and Roberts. Those continuing to support property rights were Justices Van Devanter, McReynolds, Butler and Sutherland.

The Republican Party

Mr. Sam Blythe in an interesting article in the Saturday Evening Post last week said that the Republican party was about played out and needed a plumber, which reminds me of a story I read of a plumber who upon being called, came to the door and knocked. “I have come to fix the old tub in the kitchen,” said the plumber. The young son yelled out to his mother: “Mama, here's the Doctor to see the cook.” No doubt the Republican party is a long way from being played out but it must remember that it will serve best by constructive rather than destructive criticism.

Devaluation of Gold Content of Dollar—St. Lawrence Waterway Treaty

The President has announced that he will use the power given him by Congress to devalue the gold content of the dollar, thereby doubling the value of the gold now controlled by the Government. The President also insists that the St. Lawrence Waterway Treaty shall be approved by the Senate.

Air Mail Subsidies

Investigation by a special committee under direction of Senator Black is now bringing to light how former Postmaster Brown granted many air mail contracts to specially favored lines who were the highest bidders, costing the Government many thousands of dollars. Col. Lindbergh received \$250,000 in stock from the T.A.T., plus a \$10,000 annual salary. Herbert Hoover, Jr.'s Western Air Express was favored by receiving a big juicy contract. Mr. Mellon's newly organized company was given special contracts as high bidder. Why should there be any subsidy or graft in the letting of any Government contract? All subsidies should be done away with and contracts let to the lowest bidder, for air mail, ocean mail and all other Government contracts for every Department.

District of Columbia Liquor Bill

The hard liquor bill for the District passed the House Tuesday. The bill requires persons to sit down and drink rather than stand up and drink, as of old, otherwise the saloon is back without regulation, supervision or control. The bill permits sale on premises by restaurants, hotels and clubs. Tax on distillers making more than 500 gallons annually is \$1,000 per year. Other license fees in proportion. Beer tax per barrel \$1.00.

Independent Offices Appropriation Bill

Wednesday, Thursday and Friday were taken up in debating the Independent Offices bill. A comparison of the appropriation for 1932 as compared to the same departments for 1935, shows a saving of \$486,341,317.

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MAKING THE BANKS SAFE

Every bank account of \$2,500 or less in the United States, except, of course, those in banks which have not been reopened because of unsoundness, is now insured against loss to the depositor. How this will work out for the banks is that it will make bankers careless with other people's money, since they have the nation-wide insurance fund to fall back on in case they make mistakes. Our idea is that it, among other things, will make banks a great deal more careful than many of them were up to a year ago. When ten thousand out of thirty thousand banks fail or temporarily have to close down because they have been involved, directly or indirectly, in careless or risky use of their deposits, there isn't much to brag about in the matter of careful banking in the past.

We believe that the banks of the nation, generally speaking, are in a sounder position than they have been for many years. We know that there is no risk to any small depositor now in placing his money in any bank which the Government allows to stay open. We think there is still a great deal to be done before the banking system of the United States can function in all respects as efficiently as it ought to. There are still too many small banks, insufficiently capitalized to meet the demands of their communities. We do not believe there are many deliberate crooks in control of banks any longer, but we are not sure that every set of bank officials is as competent and filled with the sense of responsibility as they ought to be.

What has shaken public confidence in banks and bankers is not only the thousands of failures of small banks, but the shocking disclosures in the Senate Committee investigation, of the way in which the heads of some of the big banks enriched themselves at the expense of the public. We realize that a sound banking system is essential to the conduct of business, and we do not think that bankers generally are in a poor position to protest against being regulated and restricted.

WHOM IT MAY CONCERN:-

We, the womanhood of Rhineland, Texas, herewith register the most emphatic protest against the House Bill 5978 and the Senate Bill 1842, which contemplates making the United States mail the purveyor of the moral fifth of birth control. In our protest we stand on the historic position of the Catholic Church, declaring birth control in the accepted meaning of the term in these bills immoral, and any aid granted in the practice thereof accessory to immorality. All the weighty reasons she adduces from the natural law and the divine positive law we wish to marshal against the passing of these bills. But we wish to make this protest even more emphatic from a constitutional standpoint. From this standpoint we declare that Congress is out of bounds to table these bills, because they have sworn to uphold the Constitution. If Congress should pass these bills then the President of the United States is oathbound to veto them because he is sworn to defend and protect the Constitution. If these bills should pass over the Presidential veto then the Supreme Court is oathbound to declare them unconstitutional, because they are self-evident violations of the natural rights of man, guaranteed by the Constitution of the United States.

It is evident that the primary purpose of the sex act according to natural law is the procreation of the species.

It is evident that to pervert a secondary purpose to the status of primary purpose with the direct frustration of the legal primary purpose is a violation of the law, and here the law on nature.

It is evident that one individual cannot enforce this demand on another individual except he possess the authority.

It is evident that everyone has the right not to be forced to give aid to the violations of the law of nature.

It is evident that the dissemination of knowledge how to get by in this immoral practice with least damage to the violator of the law of nature is giving aid to the violation.

It is evident that the purpose of these bills is to facilitate the dissemination of this knowledge through the instrumentality of the mails of the United States.

It is evident that our postal department is not a self-supporting institution, but has hundreds of millions deficit each year. It is evident that the purpose of these bills is to put the burden of facilitating the violation of the laws of nature on

shoulders of the taxpayers, which is against the natural right that no one can be forced to give aid to the violation of the laws of nature. It is evident that the Declaration of Independence holds the natural rights of man inalienable.

It is evident that this document was a most solemn engagement, agreement, contract and treaty between the original thirteen colonies and so to say the foundation on which the United States have been built.

It is evident from the context of that document that it is non-amendable.

It is evident, since it is an engagement and all engagements without limitations made before the adoption of the Constitution are taken into the Constitution in Section I of Article VI of the Constitution, that these natural rights are inalienable constitutional rights. Hence it is evident that these bills if passed are diametrically opposed to the Constitution of the United States and hence unconstitutional.

Our protest against said bills is founded on these uncontrovertible facts and we authorize our president and secretary to attest this our resolution in our name.

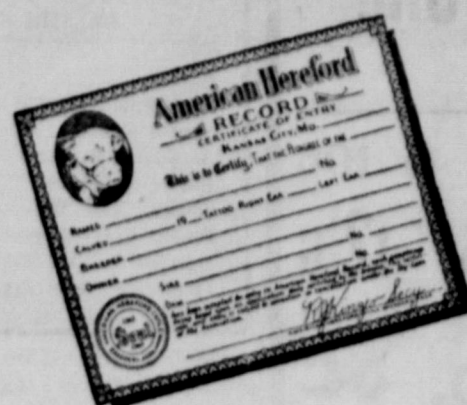

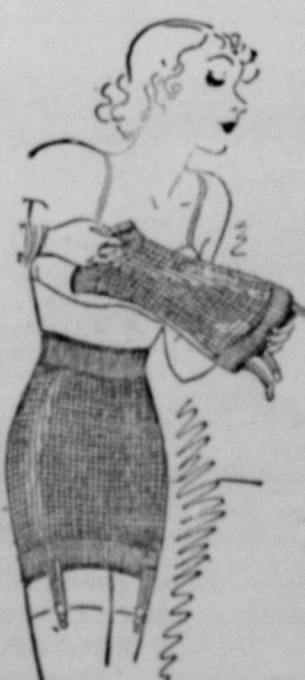
