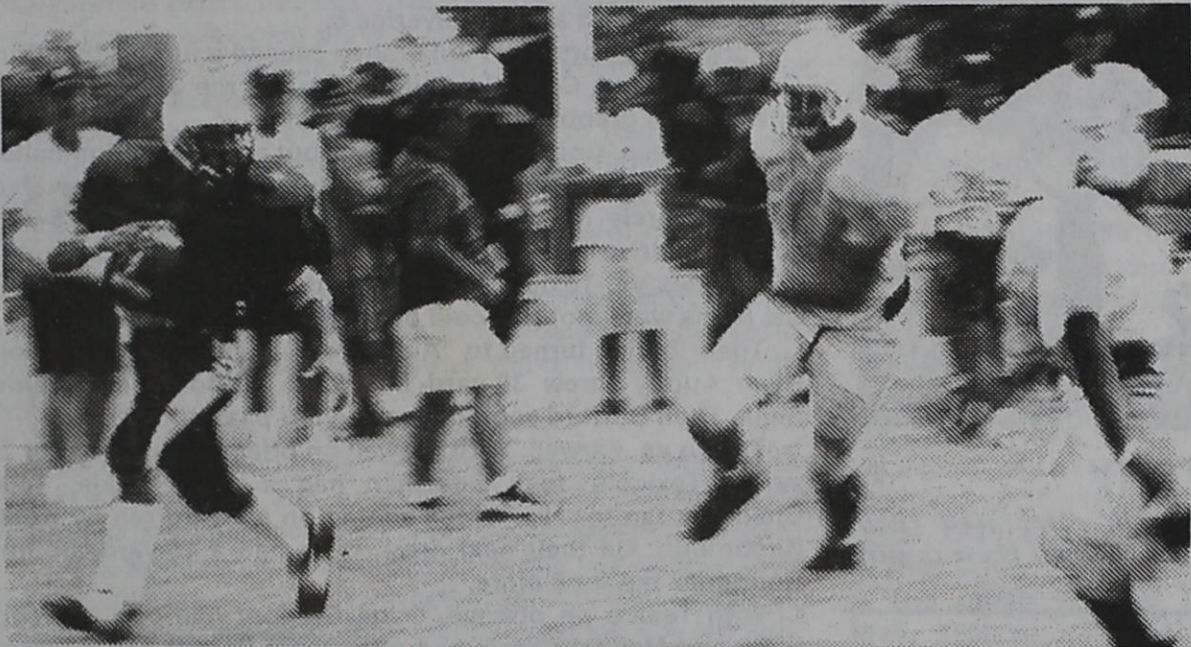

## Chief McGaa resigns

Farwell Police Chief Roy McGaa announced his resignation, effective Sept. 3.

McGaa became Farwell's first police chief in May of 1993.

He will head back to his native Iowa.

In his resignation announcement, McGaa expressed "how much I have enjoyed being Farwell's peace officer."

"As I have said before in my newspaper articles, Farwell is absolutely the nicest town I have ever worked in. One should have to go a long way to meet friendlier people."

"I particularly wish to thank the Farwell school system for the cooperation and support they have given me over the years."

"Our most important asset in this country is our children, and thanks to the open-mindedness of superintendents, principals and teachers, I was accepted as a working partner rather than the enemy."

"My Lord has told me it is time to move on and this I must do. But wherever I go or whatever I do, Farwell will always be a pleasant memory."

## Is Texico a speed trap?

The Texico City Council held a lengthy discussion on Tuesday with resident Tommie Snodgrass over the city's perceived reputation as a speed trap.

Mrs. Snodgrass, co-owner of Rip's Western Wear, said they are receiving customer complaints "that our fines are excessive; we're having too many."

She said one Bovina woman said she was ticketed for going 53 miles per hour in a 50 mph zone.

Her husband, Roy, told the council that customers are going elsewhere and that Texico's ticket-giving policy "sure is not helping business."

"We are being known as a speed trap," added Mrs. Snodgrass.

But the council and Marshal Kelley Brophy responded with statistics to show that the tickets being given speeders are not excessive.

Mayor Marie Christian checked the monthly list of

traffic citations given, and noted that tickets were only given those motorists who had exceeded the speed limit by at least 11 miles per hour.

"Not a ticket was written that the driver wasn't going at least 11 miles over the speed limit," added councilman Oran Jay Autrey.

The list also showed that 66 percent of those cited were given fines, while 33 percent received warnings.

But councilman Rick Queener said that Texico was getting the reputation as a speed trap because that is what folks perceive.

"If we get the reputation as a speed trap, it means a loss of business and sales tax money to Texico," said Mrs. Snodgrass.

"How do we change the perception that we are a speed trap?" asked Queener.

Marshal Brophy noted that since the city has gone to four police officers, traffic tickets are up but the accident and violent crime rates are down.

"Our records show that the (number of accidents) has dropped a lot," said Brophy.

Brophy said a recent survey showed 30,000 vehicles going through Texico in a 24-hour span.

Brophy talked about a speeder going 78 mph in the city's 35 mph zone when he first got here. He stressed the need for safety here.

Brophy said his statistics in the last 30-day report show that the Texico police are writing an average of 2 1/2 tickets a day per officer.

He pointed out that Clovis has been having a rash of burglaries while Texico has not, stressing that having more police on the streets is helping prevent crime.

Councilmen Autrey and Queener complimented the police on doing an excellent job.

Queener said that before the city went to four police officers, overtime was costing over \$20,000. By hiring the 4th officer, not only was overtime considerably lowered but also the city is now covered almost 24 hours a day with a police officer.

Asked later about what areas the police patrol, Brophy said, besides the city, they go to Curry Road C, to the Texico Welcome Center (the tourism center), the cemetery and landfill areas.

In other business, the council:

-- Heard Mrs. Snodgrass talk about a safety problem at the corner of Katherine and Anderson. She was told the city is looking at perhaps placing a 4-way stop at that intersection.

-- Mrs. Snodgrass, referring to an earlier city council meeting she had attended, asked whether the city had gotten any professional estimates on the cost of repairing the city pool, which has been closed.

The city has not. Mrs. Christian said the pool had been opened the last 15 years on variances. Street Supt. Matt Meeks said there is a broken suction line under the concrete and they don't know where it is. Also, the high cost for a new municipal pool was brought out.

-- Heard Queener question where the city limits were. The city has "city limit" signs but they are stored. They talked about placing them at the city limits along with signs that say "speed limit strictly enforced" once they find out where the city boundaries are.

It was noted that Clovis is seeking to expand eastward.

-- Heard Queener say he would seek surveys from Avenue F landowners as part of the work needed to be done before those properties can be annexed into the city.

-- Heard Mrs. Christian report she had approved spending \$2,300 for more ash to be hauled here, so that all alleys could get the improvements.

-- Allowed Brophy to buy new uniforms and patches for the city police officers. Brophy said the current uniforms looked too much like neighboring police jurisdictions and he wanted a new image for Texico. The new uniforms will be silver, with black pants.

-- Heard that the used lawn mower the city recently bought was delivered without blades. "But it runs well," joked city clerk Teresa Harth.

"Take it back," said Mrs. Christian, after being told that the lawn mower that the city had agreed to buy had blades with it.

-- Plans to tighten regulations for the use of the Texico Community Center after a recent problem there. Mrs. Harth said after one usage, the building was "trashed," and the deposit check given bounced. She suggested that the policy be changed so that deposits are paid in cash or with a cashier's check.

If the check doesn't clear soon, it will be turned over to the city attorney.

Also, Brophy said a citation was given for alcohol on the premises.

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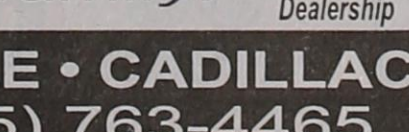

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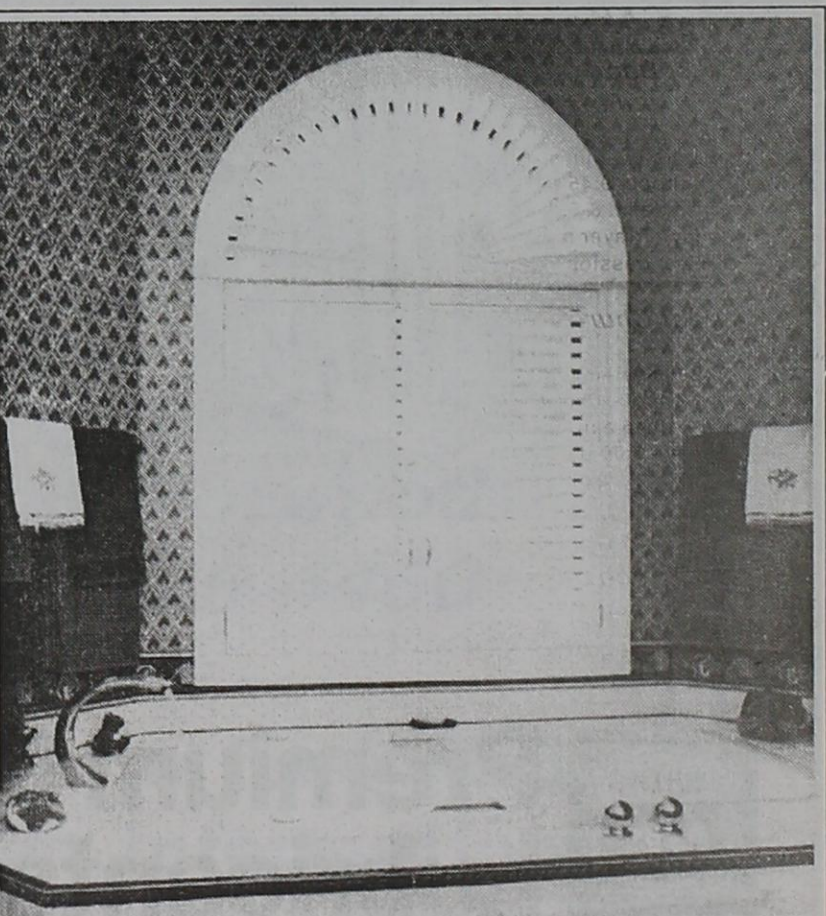

Last Friday, I joined the Parmer/Bailey County Crops Tour for their tour of the new Parmer County Cotton Growers Co-op Gin just east of Farwell. I had seen the outside of it a few times, but until then I had never actually set foot inside.

The place is huge! There are only a few times when I feel small. When I'm next to my 6' 7" friend, when I'm flying, and now when I'm in that gin.

Our guide for the tour was gin manager Ron Riley. The tour was aimed for farmers and those who know about gins. Since I didn't fall into either category, I just followed along and listened in.

When you first walk in there, you see what looks like a long conveyor that takes the modules to the module feeder. The module feeder breaks up the cotton module so the cotton can be transported by pipes to other areas of the gin.

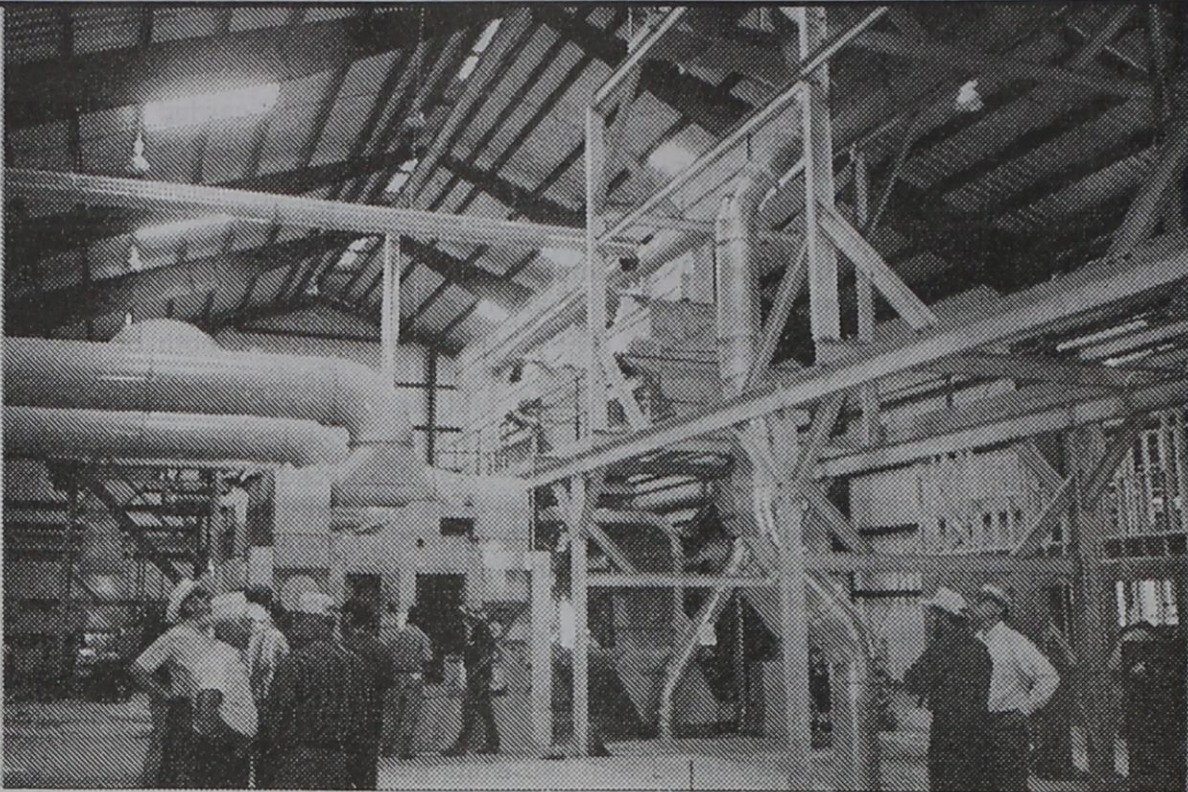
When the module feeder breaks up the module, it also dries the cotton. The module feeder has a special sensor that can tell how wet the cotton is and can adjust the burner accordingly so the cotton doesn't get too dry.

From the module feeder, the cotton is fed via pipes to a whole bunch of other machines that cleans the cotton and separates the seed from it. This is where I got lost on the tour. I just stood there and nodded my head at everything Riley said. I call this the "smile and nod" method. It makes people think that you actually know what they're talking about.

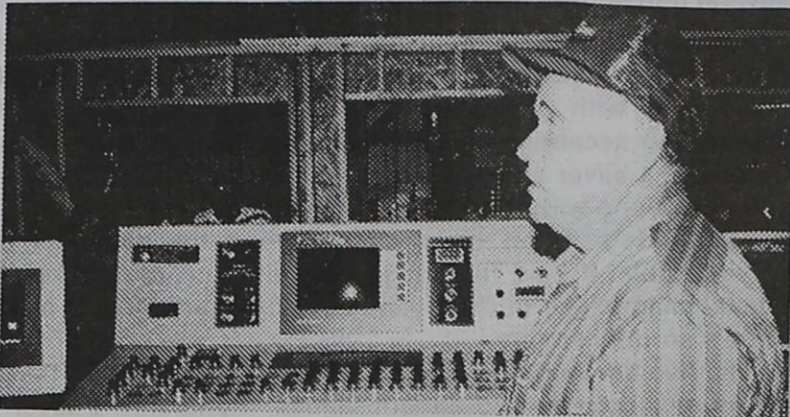
Other than the machines, Riley showed us the control room. In this room, there is a main board that controls every machine in the gin. It also monitors the pipes to make sure there aren't any clogs and makes sure the cotton isn't getting too dry.

Overall, the tour was very interesting and very noisy since they were still putting the final touches on the gin. When it is all done, there will be an insulated observation deck where you can look at the gin and be able to hear yourself think.

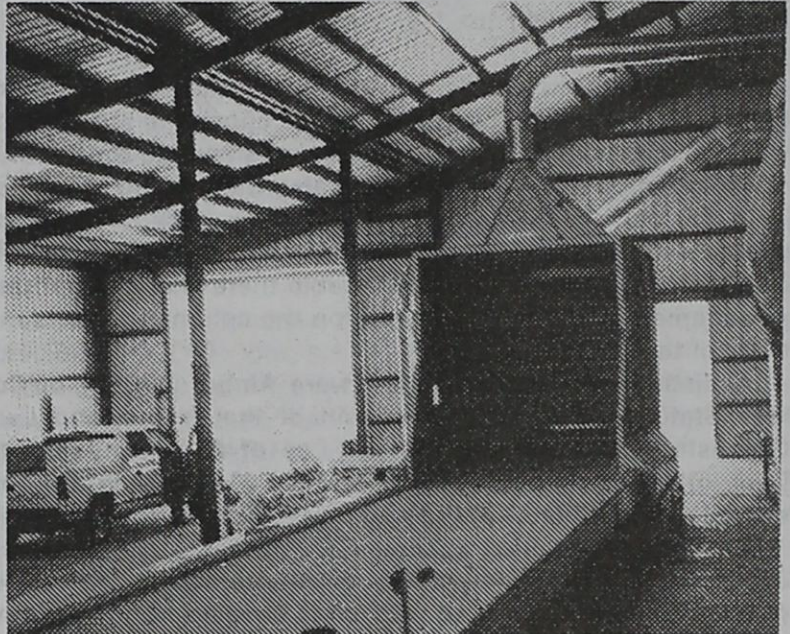
# New co-op gin toured



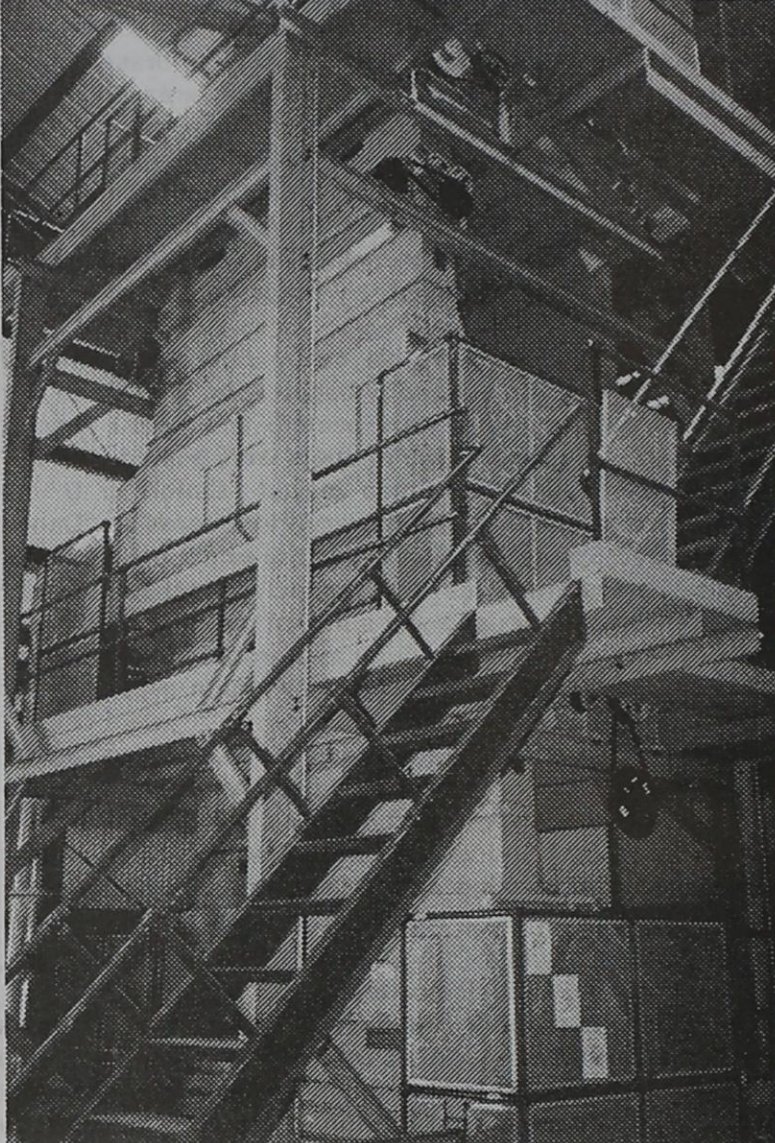
Inside the new gin

Under this proposal, taxes on the average homestead would decrease by \$3.99 or 3.01 percent compared with last year's taxes. Comparing tax rates without adjusting for changes in property value, the tax rate would decrease by \$0.0025 per \$100 of taxable value or 0.61 percent compared to last year's tax rate. These tax rate figures are not adjusted for changes in the taxable value of property.

From Farwell Police Chief Roy McGaa:

The only way a community can be relatively safe is for law enforcement to be aggressive. Drug dealers and users must be pursued, gangbangers must be made to be so uncomfortable that they want to avoid Farwell at all costs. Never forget for one moment that drugs are the reason for almost all of your crime. Remember that a man from your community was killed to finance drugs. Help your peace officers in any way you can, they need it and you will be helping yourselves at the same time.

You no longer have a rest home for tired cops in the sheriff's office. Sheriff Yerger has transformed that office into one of the most professional operations I have ever seen. All of the deputies are dedicated to the job of law enforcement. I ask you to remember that when the sheriff's office only did what it had to do, four deputies were enough. Working aggressively to protect the citizens of the county means that four area not nearly enough. Law enforcement manpower is not a matter of a few cents in taxes; it is your total safety package.

One final thought for our young people. Your money, or lack of it, your clothes, your standing in the community, your popularity or lack of it, have nothing to do with who you are. What is inside of you and how you treat other people is all that counts. You and you alone will decide if you are a decent person. You are a role model for those younger than you. Trust in God, always try and do the right thing, and be a good role model, one that we can all be proud of.
