LOOK TO VACATION

WASHINGTON, June 5 (AP)—The attention of Congress was directed today toward vacation plans, concluding maneuvers in the farm relief conference negotiations, and the prospects of a disagreement between the Senate and House over the census-reapportionment bill.

All other differences between the Senate and House farm bills having been adjusted by a conference committee, only the former chamber's export provision remained for further consideration today.

Confident that the debt-reduction plan will be eliminated, with support drawn from the ranks of its advocates who are unwilling to delay final action on the general farm legislation, administration supporters are already preparing the way to enable the proposed federal farm board to function by providing it with the \$500,000,000 appropriation authorized in the pending bill.

Republican and democratic leaders of the Senate finance committee, meanwhile, have increased the chances for an all-summer recess of Congress by agreeing on a plan calling for a Senate agreement to take final action on the tariff bill by November 15. The program calls for a vote on the bill late in October, allowing at least 15 days for negotiations between the Senate and House to adjust differences which develop in the legislation.

Watson Keeps Busy
With this in view to assure fulfillment of President Hoover's desire for enactment of the legislation before the regular session of Congress begins in December, Senator Watson of Indiana, republican leader, was able today to proceed with his plans to marshal a two-thirds majority to fix the voting dates and permit an all-summer recess while the finance committee works on the bill.

Moving under his five-minute rule limiting debate, the House meanwhile, has changed the bill providing for the 1930 census and reapportionment of its membership in so many controversial sections that the effort to adjust the differences with the Senate, which already has passed the measure, may require considerable negotiation.

Amendments Voted
Amendments voted into the measure include one to exclude aliens from the population count on which the apportionment of House seats is based, a proposal voted down in the Senate after a lengthy controversy. Another would prevent the counting of persons over 21 who are not permitted to vote. Under the procedure, they and other changes in the bill were subject to another vote, and opponents counted on gaining strength on that ballot.

The Allen elimination proposal, passed in both the Senate and House as unconstitutional, was advocated by members striving to reduce to a minimum the prospective reduction in representation from rural states and was calculated to hold down the number of representatives to be added to the allotments of the states having large urban and industrial centers. The disfranchisement amendment was regarded as aimed at southern states where its advocates have contended, negroes are not permitted to vote although their inclusion in the population count affects the number of representatives those states have in Congress.

CHANGE MADE BY SANTA FE

NEW TIME CARD TO BE EFFECTIVE JUNE 9, COMPANY SAYS

A new time card for the Santa Fe lines in and out of Lubbock will become effective June 9, according to an announcement made yesterday by T. B. Callahan, general passenger agent of the lines.

The new card will not affect the branch lines which will continue to operate daily, except Sunday.

Departures Unchanged
No changes will be made in departure of trains 90, 91 and 92. They will continue to leave at 10 p. m., 12:35 p. m. and 12:20 p. m., respectively.

Northbound, however, No. 94, will arrive at 7:15 a. m., departing for Amarillo at 7:25 a. m. and No. 96 will arrive at 4:25 p. m. as at present. Train No. 92 will arrive at 4:35 p. m. and depart for Clovis at 4:45 p. m.

"Change in the schedule of train No. 94, which handles the Dallas-Lubbock sleepers, improves the service considerably," said Mr. Callahan, "as these cars now leave Dallas at 2:30 p. m. instead of 8:15 p. m., and arrive at Lubbock at 7:15 a. m., or 45 minutes earlier than under the old service."

TWO DEAD IN N. J. SLAYING

CRAZED PRIEST KILLS GIRL, THEN TURNS GUN ON SELF

HARRISON, N. J., June 5.—The Rev. Paul Medivitis, former pastor of the church of Our Lady of Sorrows here was found shot to death and a young woman seriously injured in bullet wounds last night in the home of Mrs. Rose Silkaitis whom the two were visiting.

Police reported that the former pastor was found clutching a revolver and with a bullet wound in his head. Helen Olyta, 25, of Kearny, lay a few feet away with two bullet wounds through her head.

Priest Is Demented
Mrs. Silkaitis told authorities that Medivitis had become demented about six months ago and left his pastorate to recover his health. He returned today and called at the Silkaitis home while Miss Olyta was present.

Police said they believed Medivitis had gone temporarily insane and shot the young woman and himself in a moment of frenzy.

SHIP OWNERS FACE CHARGE

ENGLISH PROBE HEARS VESTRI'S OWNERS BLAMED

(By Associated Press)
LONDON, June 5.—Grave charges, against the owners and crew of the liner Vestris were contained in testimony before the British Board of Trade inquiry today into her sinking.

Alfred Woods, general manager of the Lamport and Holt line, owners of the ship, admitted personally that after an incident in 1926, when it was alleged that the Vestris sailed overloaded, he had taken no steps to supervise loading of the company's liners.

"In other words," said the Attorney General, "Lamport and Holt left their vessels abroad free to break the law covering British ships."

"Yes," Woods replied. "Every person on board might have been saved had things not been left until the last moment."

H. C. W. Johnstone, a Trinidad oil producer declared.

He said there was complete lack of organization in the rescue work. Women and children were loaded aboard the life boats on the port side without men to handle the oars or officers to take charge. Johnstone said he saw two of these boats go down with the ship.

LOS ANGELES POLICE START PROBE OF 'TRIANGLE MURDER'

PRETTY WIFE OF RICH MAN FOUND SLAIN

RADIO MAN ARRESTED AFTER BEATEN BODY IS DISCOVERED

(By Associated Press.)
LOS ANGELES, June 5.—Police today were confronted with what they termed a mysterious "triangle murder," the victim being a young woman, whose body was found hanging in the closet of an apartment house.

Mrs. Virginia Patten, 28, come wife of a wealthy Portland, Ore., broker was beaten to death. Her body was found hanging from a hook in a clothes closet by Mrs. M. W. Wilson, owner of the apartment.

Radio Man Jailed
William Tallman, radio operator and alleged friend of the slain woman, was under arrest aboard the Steamship Admiral Benson en route today from Los Angeles to San Francisco.

Tallman told newspapermen he knew nothing about the murder as he had been on the ship during its run to San Diego yesterday at the time Mrs. Patten was believed to have been slain.

Mrs. Wilson went to change the linen in the apartment and discovered Mrs. Patten's body. The skull was crushed and the body was bruised. Two halves of a brick were found.

Husband Gives Clue
Frank E. Patten, victim's husband, cast suspicion on Tallman after being informed of his wife's death.

Patten flew from Portland to Los Angeles at the request of his attorney, Clarence Booth, who reported last Saturday that Mrs. Patten was missing from her suite on an exclusive apartment hotel. Attendees told of seeing Tallman and Mrs. Patten together.

While searching for his wife, her body was discovered and Patten collapsed when he learned of her death.

Had Made Probe
Patten told police he and his attorney had made a private investigation and had found his wife and Tallman had been "keeping company."

When shown a picture of Tallman, Mrs. Wilson said he was the man who had rented an apartment at her house under the name of "Johnson."

DRILLING TO START AGAIN

BOLES RANCH WILDCAT TO BE SUNK TO 5,000 FEET

Drilling operations in the Boles Number 1 oil and gas tests, 8 miles southeast of the city, will be resumed within a short time, it was announced last night. Operations have been at a standstill during the past sixty days while a string of tools were being fished out of the hole.

The test is now at a depth of 4,170 feet and plans have been made to drill to a depth of 5,000 feet or more, operators said last night.

Tests Encouraging
Samples of the present formation encountered by the test revealed 90 per cent maroon, as tested in the laboratory of a major oil company, a formation which presents encouraging data for future operations, oil scouts announced.

The continued operations of the test are due largely to the efforts of Mike Sharp, formerly of Tulsa, who has spent two years in Lubbock on the project. Facing the hazardous and expensive task of retrieving two strings of tools, two joints of collapse pipe, and other rig paraphernalia, which went into the hole as results of trouble which might occur at any well, Mr. Sharp worked relentlessly for two months in clearing the test for further drilling.

FLIER IS PUNISHED
SAN ANTONIO, June 5 (AP).—A flying cadet, Albert W. Shepherd, flight leader of a pursuit detachment of the advanced flying school at Kelly Field, was found guilty by a court martial today on two charges of diving low and flying over Austin on May 8, and punished by being confined to Kelly Field for four months and being ineligible for graduation for a similar period. Cadet Shepherd would have received his commission in the Air corps June 22.

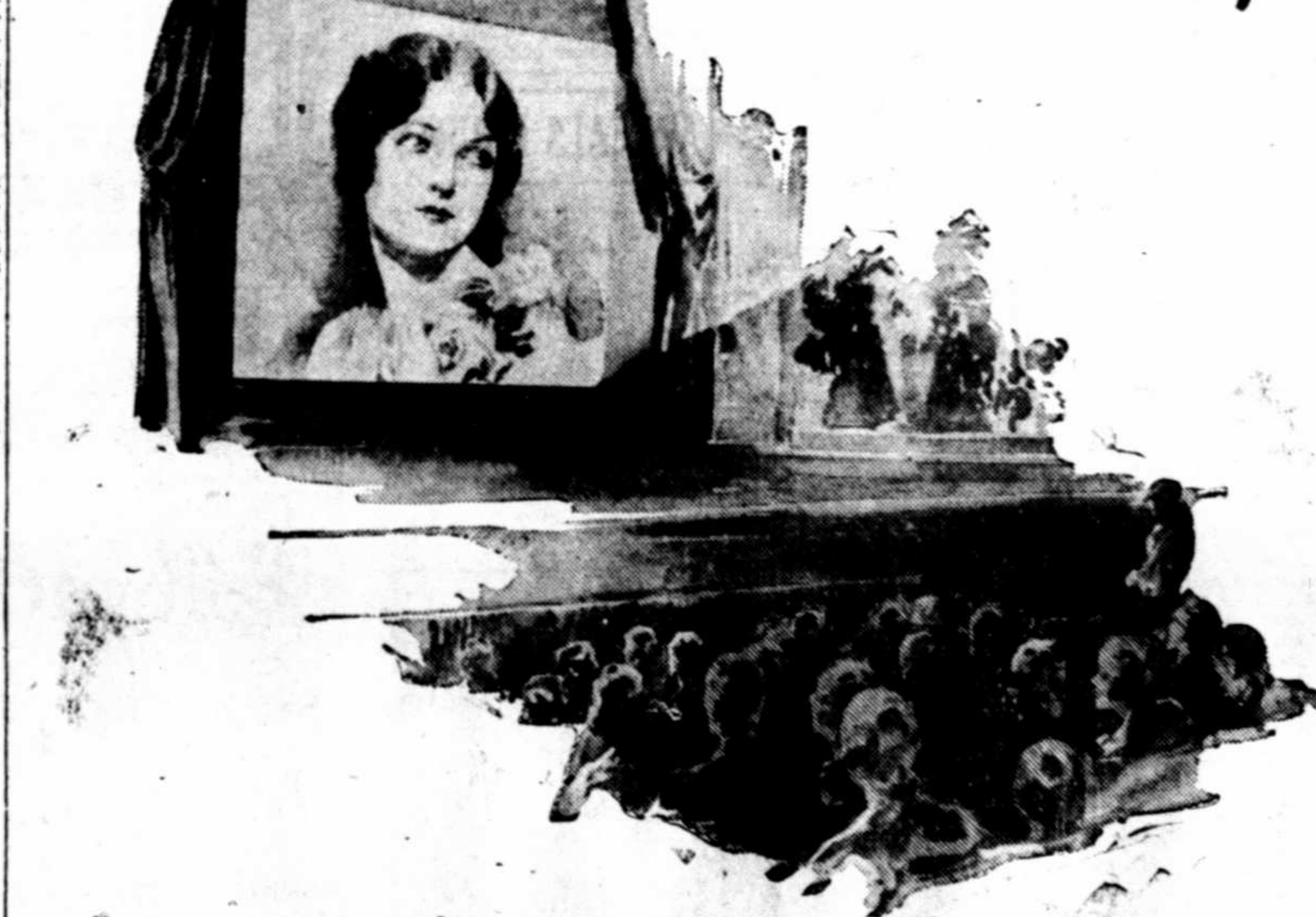

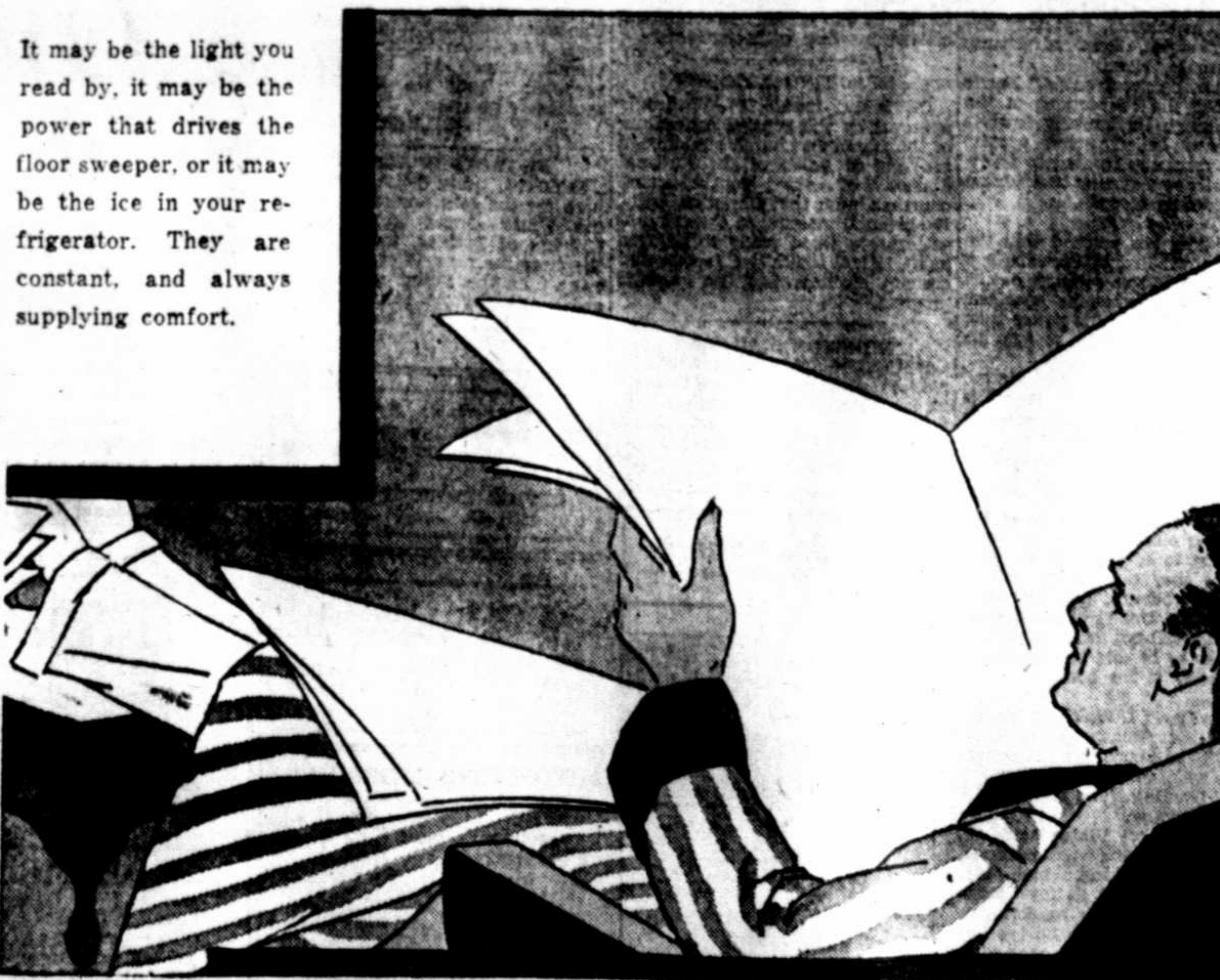

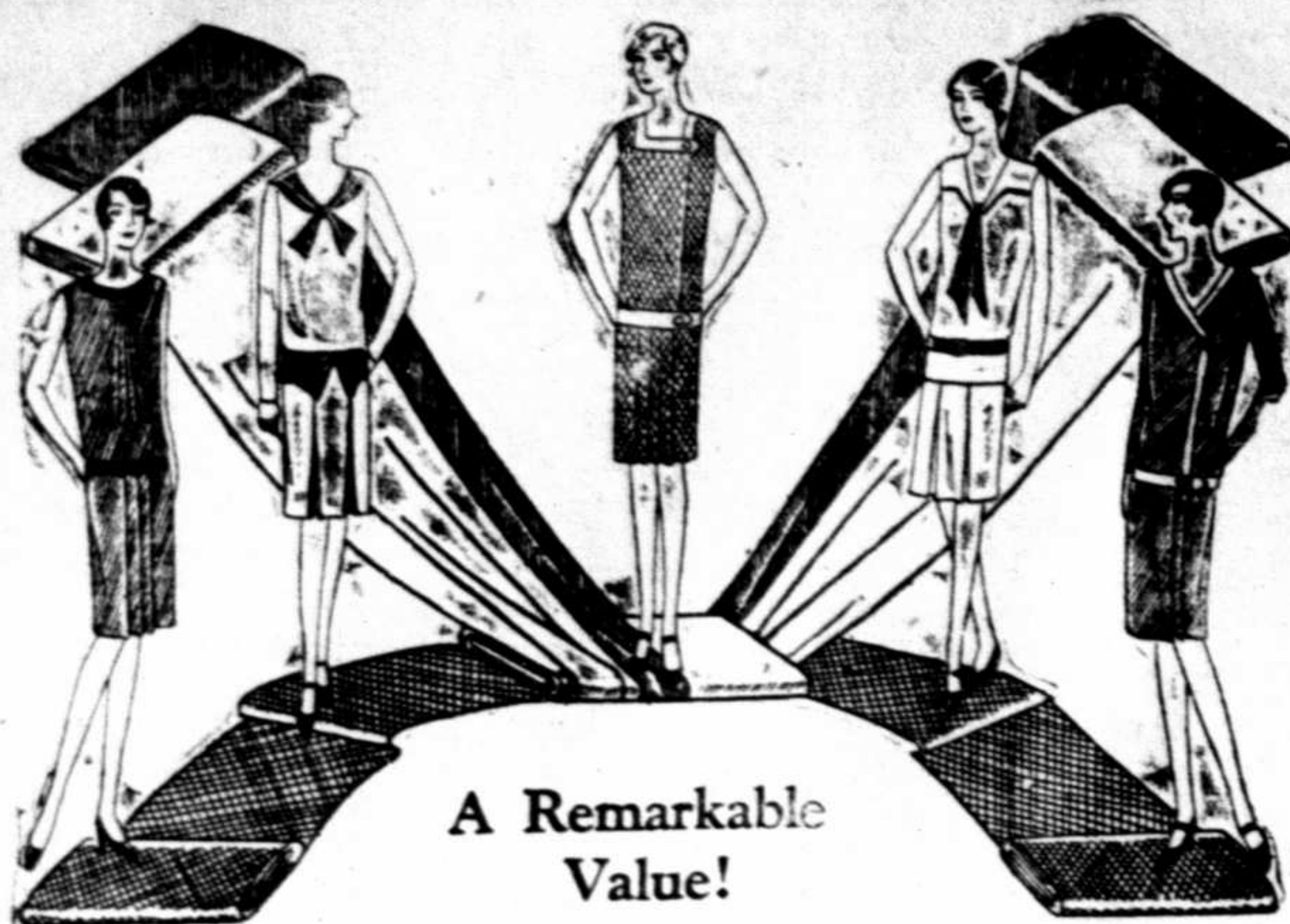

ferences was held by conference committee members to be acceptable to President Hoover.

There were no material differences except for the debenture plan in the Senate and House bills, but the measure framed by the conference group followed more nearly the House measure.

The committee decided the measure should be known as "The Agricultural Marketing Act."

Dual Functions Included

The perfected bill would give the stabilization corporations a dual function such as was proposed in the Senate measure, and would permit the corporations to acquire and store surplus and also to act as a super-marketing agency for cooperative marketing associations.

The bill would provide \$1,500,000 for administration purposes in addition to an authorization for \$500,000,000 to carry out the functions of the proposed farm board.

NEW ROLE TO BE TAKEN BY SENATE BLOC

TARIFF WILL BE MADE VEHICLE TO CURB STOCK MARKET

WASHINGTON, June 5. —The tariff bill apparently is to be made the vehicle for the efforts long threatened in the Senate to curb the use of credit in stock market speculation.

That conclusion was drawn today from the outburst against "the orgy of speculation" in the Senate yesterday prior to passage of the administration bill to authorize issuance of a new form of treasury short term securities which will bear no interest but will be sold at a discount.

The bill already has been passed by the house but will require further consideration because of an amendment adopted by the senate eliminating a provision exempting holders from the capital gains tax.

Courzens Back Moore

That amendment was proposed by Senator Courzens, republican, Michigan, who assailed the federal reserve board because the discount rate had not been raised, a measure which he contended would have checked the use of credit in speculation. Taking what was regarded as a fling at Secretary Mellon, he declared government officials who have asked that income surtax rates be lowered to liberate money for industry should now move the taking of money out of the "gambling pool" for the same purpose.

His ideas about the rediscout rate were opposed by Senator Glass, democrat, Virginia, one of the framers of the federal reserve act and a former secretary of the treasury, who congratulated the board on its resistance to the "pounding" of the New York Reserve bank for a raise in the rediscout rate. Such a raise, he held, would have been a penalty rather than a help to business.

Tax Is Suggested

The Virginia senator announced his intention to propose a five per cent tax on transactions in stocks held less than 60 days as an amendment to the tariff bill when it comes before the chamber. He also declared he would favor repeal of the federal reserve act provisions allowing 15-day loans on United bonds.

President Hoover and former President Coolidge both came in for criticism. Senator Glass charged the president had "literally jumped into the stock pit" recently with a statement that there was nothing to be apprehended from this riot of six billions of dollars of credit in stock gambling. Senator King, democrat, Utah, who has proposed a senate investigation, said Calvin Coolidge while president had "expressed approval, certainly not disapproval, of the large amount then used, nearly four billion dollars for stock gambling purposes."

"Calm consideration" was urged by Senator Edge, republican, New Jersey, who argued that the credit problem was "one of the most delicate with which we have to deal." Senator Watson of Indiana, republican, leader, observed there was "quite a difference of opinion as to what the board should do," and cited the large number of individuals and corporations who have sought to profit by the high interest rates by putting money into the call loan market.
