## At West Texas State

### FFA Judging Team Wins

Hart High School judging teams were among approximately 1,200 Future Farmers of America from 91 area high schools who competed April 7 in agricultural judging contests on the West Texas State University campus.

The land judging team composed of Benny McLain, Glen Snitker, Tracy Rich and Marlin Marble won the Area I and Plainview District contests. Earlier they had won the Running Water Soil Conservations Contest held locally.

McLain was third high individual and high individual in the Running Water event; Snitker was tenth high at WTSU and Marble, third high in the Running Water contest.

The dairy products judging team placed second at West Texas. Chris Hanes was second high individual; Clay Barnes, seventh and Lori Barnes, tied for tenth. Derek Rich is an alternate.

These teams are working hard this week, getting ready for the Texas Tech Contests which are the State elimination contests for Area I and Area II.

Competing also at WT were the livestock and dairy cattle teams. The livestock team placed between tenth and fifteenth with 86 teams competing. Team members are Vic Hart, Kelly Jones and Ricky Rowland.

Don Davis, Pat Ritter and Marty Malone are members of the dairy cattle team.

Both the livestock and dairy

cattle teams will also be participating at Tech, seeking to qualify for the State contests.

The Texas Tech Contests will feature more than 200 FFA

students this weekend. In addition to teams from Area I and II, many teams from III and

IV also compete. It is one of the largest contests in the state.

Election ballots were canvassed at Monday evening's meeting of the Board of Education of Hart Schools. Larry Lee, Elias Martinez and Mike Reed were declared winners and given the oath of office by Superintendent Ted Averitt.

Board members re-organized with Cecil Ray Jones as president; Harold Bob Bennett, vice president; and June Brown secretary.

First grade teachers Peggy Neinast, Alice Martinez and Barbara Hiller and second grade teachers, Shirley Tucker and Ethel Averitt, met with the

board and gave a departmental report.

The board accepted 22 transfers into Hart School District for the 1979-80 school year.

A bid of \$9,150 for the renovation of bleachers at Longhorn Stadium was accepted from Holley's Gym Specialists. The old lumber from the visitors beachers will be removed by Hart CVAE boys. Holley's will replace it with new treated lumber.

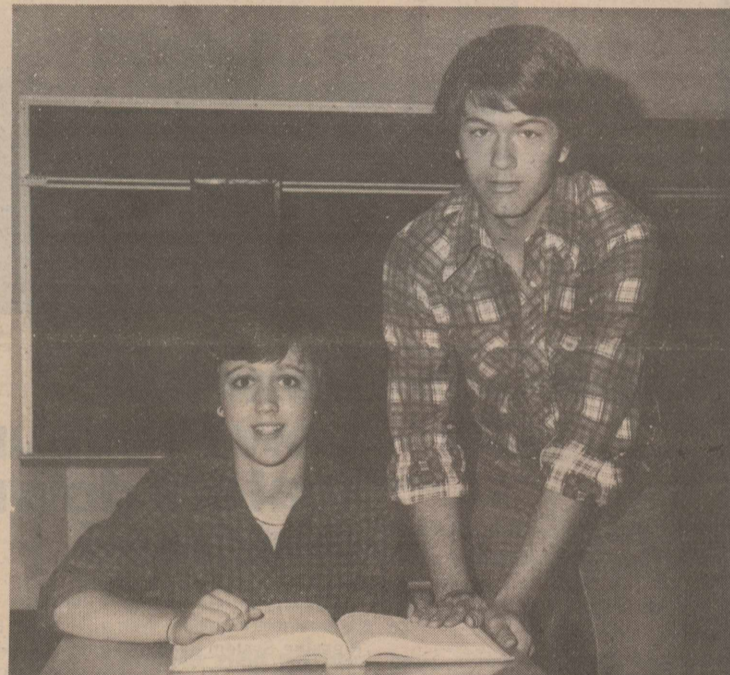
A new walkway ramp will be built in front of the bleachers and three inch seat risers will be constructed in the bleachers. The bid also includes new metal seats to be placed in the home bleachers. Approximately 200 of these seats in the middle section, will have back rests.

Board members voted to sell the seats with back rests as season reserves. The charge of \$20 per seat will include all six varsity home games for the 1979 season. Reservations for these seats may be made in the business office of Hart schools.

### Storm Warnings Told

Tornado season arrived full blast last week when the destructive funnel clouds left millions of dollars in damages and lost lives in Vernon, Wichita Falls, Lawton and other communities.

Local residents are reminded of the storm signals for the city. Four or more blasts of the siren indicates a fire while two

indicate practice for volunteer firemen.

If the community is placed under a tornado alert where conditions make it possible for a tornado to form, residents will be warned to be watchful by three blasts from the siren.

One long wail of the siren indicates a tornado has been spotted and persons should take immediate cover.

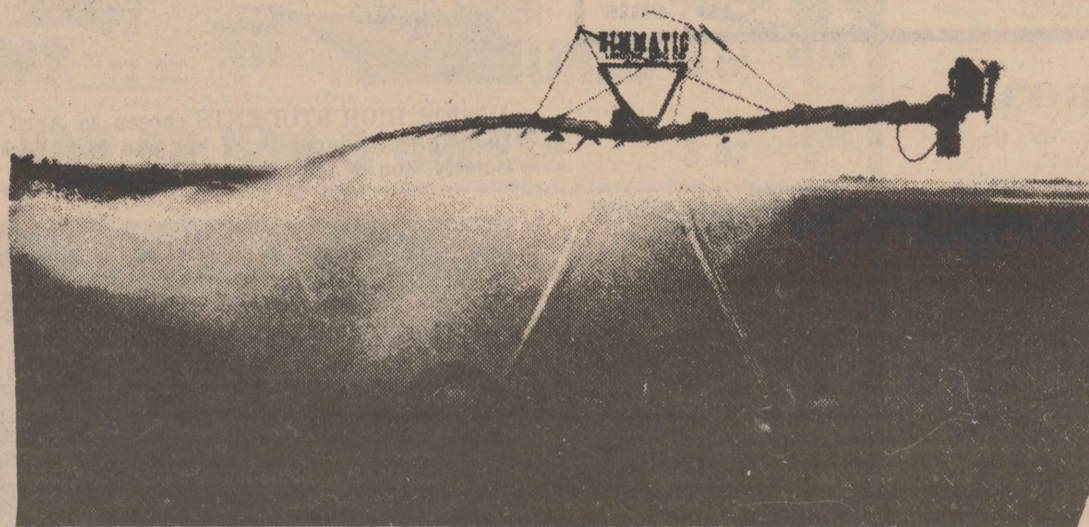

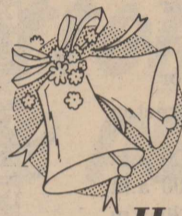

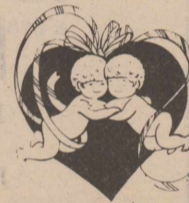

### LEMON SQUARES

Mix:

1 1/2 c flour  
1/2 c brown sugar  
1/2 c butter or margarine  
Mix together and pat down well in buttered 9x13 pan. Bake in very slow oven, 275 degrees, 10 mins.

Filling:

2 eggs  
1 c brown sugar  
1 1/2 c coconut  
1 c nuts, chopped  
2 T flour  
1/2 t baking powder  
1/4 t salt  
1/2 t vanilla

Beat eggs, add remaining ingredients and spread on top of baked mixture. Bake 20 mins. in 350 oven.

Frosting:

1 c confectioner's sugar  
1 T melted butter or margarine  
juice of 1 lemon (or less)

Blend together and spread over warm cookie layer. Cut in 24 2" squares.

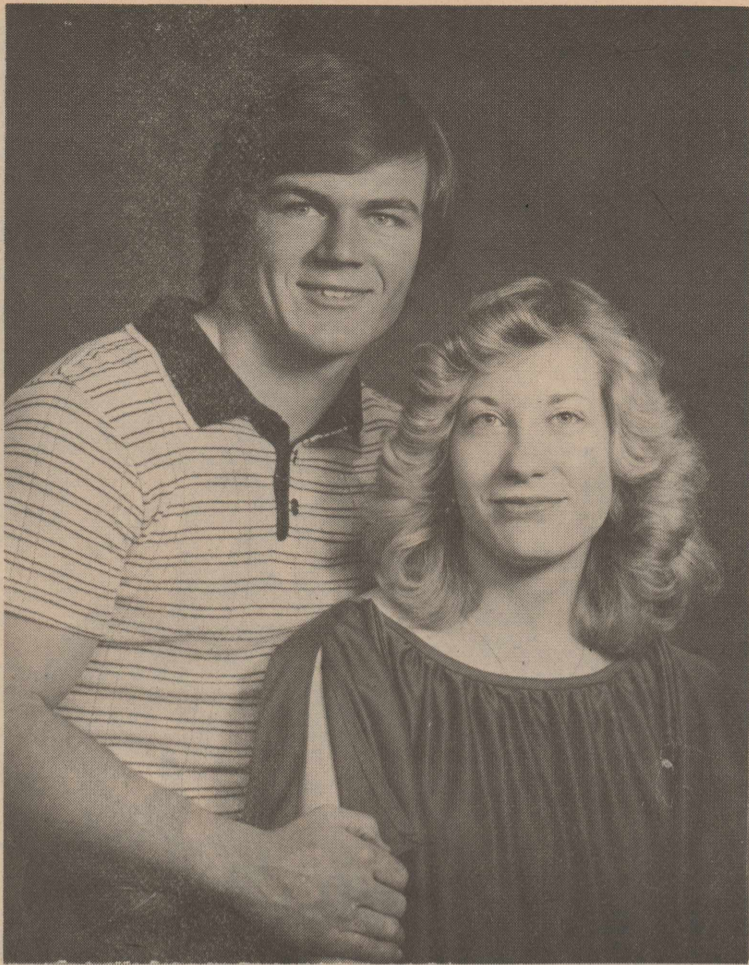

Roll call was "My favorite Bible verse."

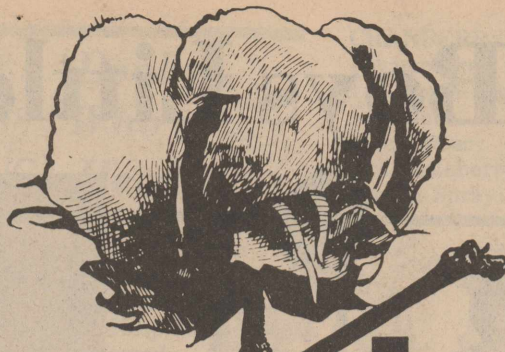

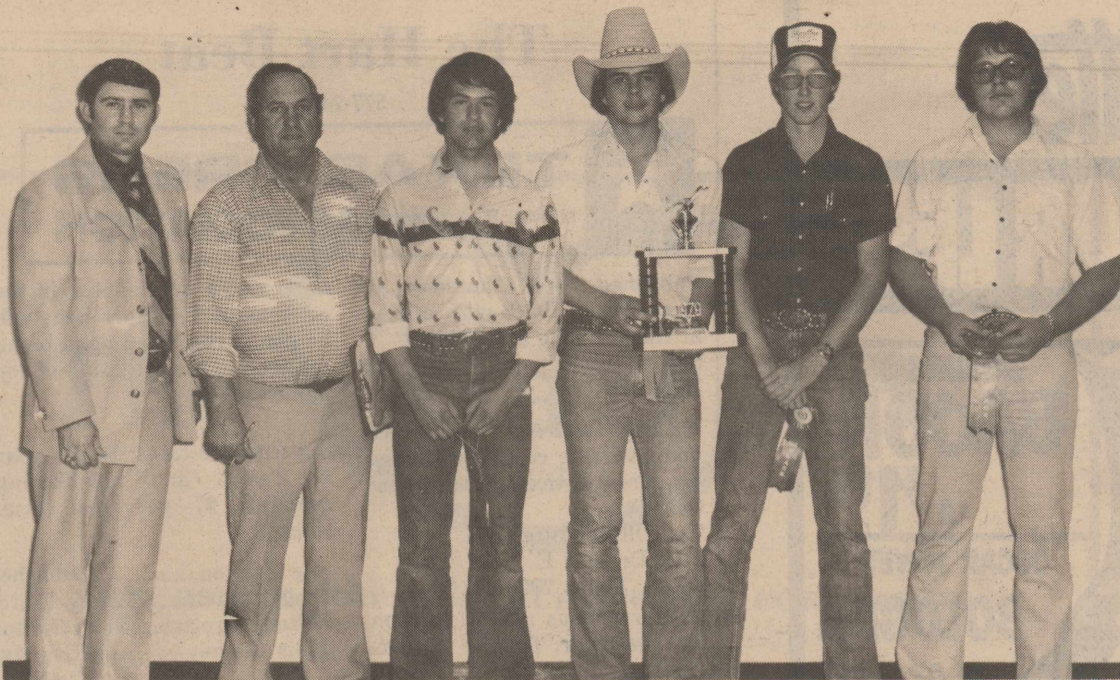
