BANK AT HOUSTON IS CLOSED

(By Associated Press)
HOUSTON, Feb. 24.—The American State Bank at Harrisburg, a suburb of Houston, failed to open for business today. The bank was ordered closed by State Bank Examiner Swain. He stated that the bank would be liquidated at once.

According to S. D. Simpson, president of the bank, the order to close the bank was issued because the examiners considered \$174,000 in loans held by the bank as being uncollectible. The bank was organized in 1917 with a capital stock of \$25,000.

FAVORABLE REPORT FOR WARREN

WASHINGTON, February 24.—A favorable report on the nomination of Charles B. Warren to be attorney general was ordered today by the Senate judiciary committee. The vote was reported unofficially and standing nine to four, four members opposing the confirmation of the nomination.

POSTAL PAY BILL APPROVED

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, February 24.—The postal pay and rate increase bill, insubstantially the same form as that passed by the House, was agreed upon today by the conferees of the Senate and House.

The only important modification in the House measure was that made in the second class rates, the conferees accepting some lower rates in this class than were carried in the Senate bill.

In the form as agreed upon and as the bill will go back to both branches of congress, the bill will increase postal salaries as of January first this year, and the rate increase would become effective on April 15th.

TO RE-OPEN AIR CRAFT HEARING

WASHINGTON, February 24.—By a vote of five to one the House military affairs committee today reversed its decision of last Saturday and decided to re-open its hearings on the air service department of the army next Thursday.

At the membership meeting of the Young Men's Business League Tuesday morning the question of changing the name of the organization to the "Chamber of Commerce" was submitted. After a short discussion the members voted unanimously to change the name and in doing so the constitution was amended, making the commercial body now known as the Ballinger Chamber of Commerce.

PRISON REPORT FILED IN HOUSE

AUSTIN, Feb. 24.—Concurrent resolutions adopting the majority and minority reports of the joint prison investigating committee filed yesterday, were introduced in the House today.

A resolution commending the majority report was signed by Representative Chitwood, chairman of the joint committee, and by Representative Irwin. The minority report resolutions were signed by Representatives King and Stevenson.

KENTUCKY SEN. HURT IN WRECK

WASHINGTON, February 24.—Senator Stanley, of Kentucky, was severely injured in an automobile accident here today. It is not believed that his injuries are critical or will prove fatal.

SWEDISH PREMIER DEAD

STOCKHOLM, Feb. 24.—Hjalmar Branting, former premier of Sweden, died shortly after noon today.

SECOND TRIAL ON LAND FRAUD

KANSAS CITY, Feb. 24.—The second trial of W. E. Stewart, charged with fraudulent sale of land in the Rio Grande valley, began in the federal court here today.

Stewart is charged with fraud in connection with land deals in Hidalgo county, Texas. He was convicted in the first trial but the case was remanded by the federal court of appeals for a new trial.

MINER KILLED; MANY ESCAPE

WHEATLAND, Ind., Feb. 24.—One miner was killed and another severely burned when gas exploded today in the Standard Coal Co. mine here. Following the explosion 125 miners escaped.

HARRISON, N. J., Feb. 24.—Three persons were killed and one is reported missing, and more than a score of people were injured when a New York-Philadelphia express train on the Pennsylvania railroad crashed into the rear of a New York-Washington train at Manhattan Transfer today.

The dead are all employees of the railroad.

Two distinct shocks were felt here, the second being the hardest, and doing the most damage. Chimneys were wrecked and water pipes twisted and broken by the earth tremors.

COMPLETES WORK ON LONG PETITION

A petition, or several copies of a petition, were forwarded to Austin by Charles Furgason last week, asking the legislature to support an amendment to the irrigation law. The petition contained the names of about 900 citizens, according to Mr. Furgason, and only one man to whom it was submitted refused to sign.

The law in question, and one which the petitioners are seeking to have passed, deals with the levying of taxes for the purpose of organizing irrigation districts. It was claimed that those whose land is within the proposed district objected to being taxed unless their land was subject to irrigation.

The proponents of the irrigation movement contend that the tax does not apply only to irrigable land within the proposed district, and declare there is no good purpose to be served by amending the law. It will be recalled that a large territory voted for the proposition when it was submitted here several months ago, and that the matter is now tied up in court on an injunction granted in the local district court.

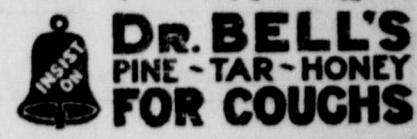

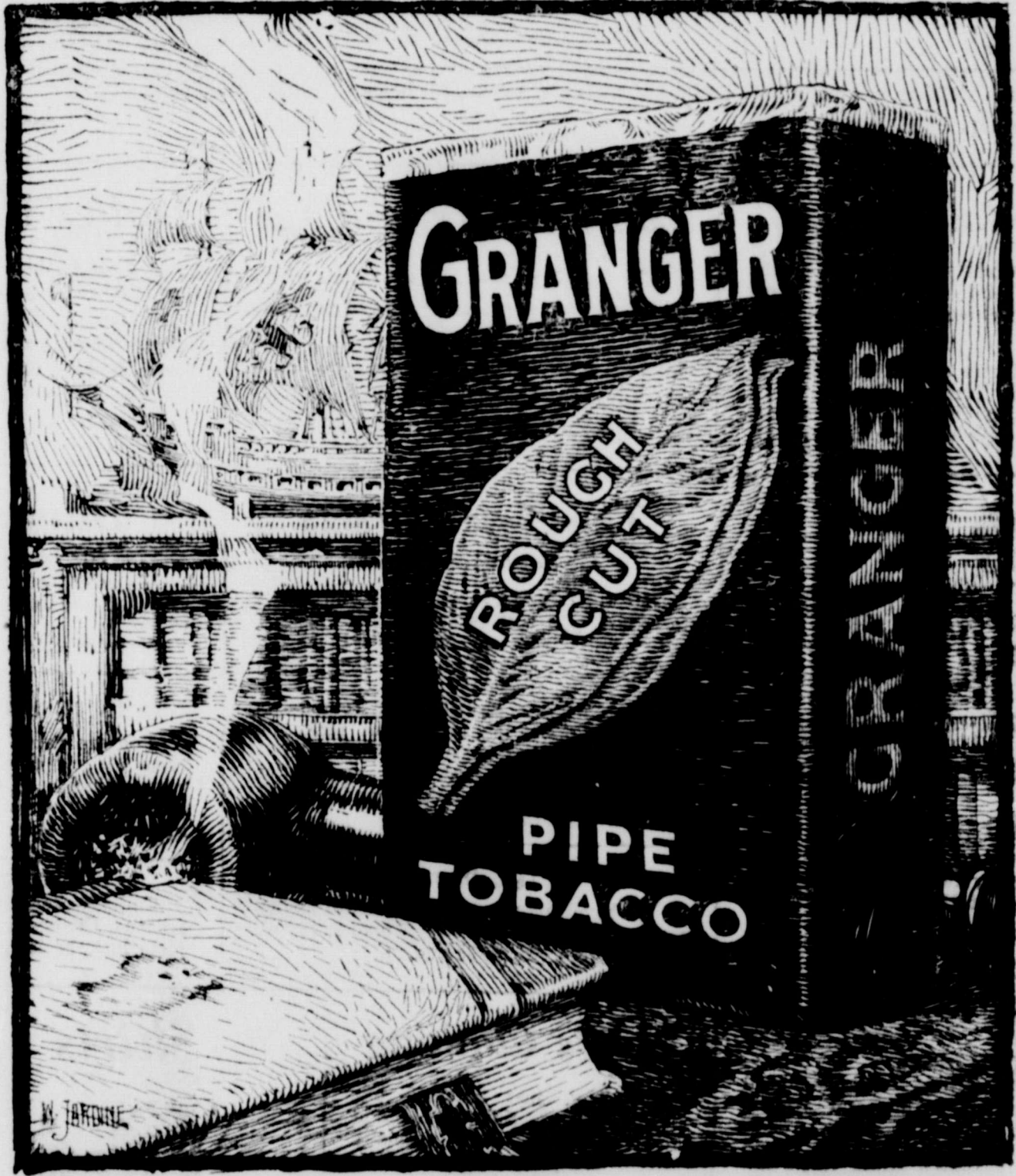
