Should this bill pass it would save many thousands of dollars a year to the ranchmen of the destruction of livestock by predatory animals.

HELPED TO DRILL FIRST OIL WELL

"Sam" Smith Only Survivor of Titusville Adventure.

Titusville, Pa.—There's nothing startling about his name—it's plain "Sam" Smith—but quite the contrary is his distinction. He is the one man still living who had a part in drilling the world's first oil well.

Back in 1859 Edwin L. Drake, an office clerk, sought a man to test his theory that petroleum could be obtained in large quantities by drilling into the earth, and William A. Smith, father of "Sam," of Tarentum, Pa., a driller of salt wells, was selected to try the experiment.

"Sam" was a lad of sixteen years at the time. He was on the scene, near here, when the first oil bubbled forth.

Describing the historic achievement, Smith said the spot for locating the original well was selected because at that point a pool of surface petroleum had collected for years. The Indians had scooped oil from the puddle to mix paint for facial and bodily decorations. Later the white man had dipped it to lubricate the machinery in nearby sawmills.

"In sinking the first oil well, the machinery was operated by a steam engine, hauled overland by horses from a distant railway station," Smith said. "After the drill had been going a week and had reached a depth of 80 feet, father found oil foaming up in the pipe and immediately stopped the drill. The tools were removed and a common pitcher pump, such as used on any family well, took the place of the drill. The output at first was 14 barrels daily. At first the product brought \$1 a gallon."

Drake, a visionary man with little conception of the value of money, died in poverty without ever having realized on his great contribution. He is buried here, where a huge memorial, the contribution of the late Henry H. Rogers of the Standard Oil company, marks the grave of the discoverer of oil and that of his wife.

Doctor Braves Ice in Sled to Aid Woman

New York.—Driving his sled across Great South bay at 2:30 o'clock in the morning to reach a patient has made lifting friends for Dr. John W. Bennett of Patchogue.

The wife of Albert Jones, second in command of the Lelpport station coast guard, was taken dangerously ill at eight. First aid methods brought no relief. A telephone call to Quogue, 35 miles down the shore, was relayed to Patchogue. Doctor Bennett was notified.

The guardsmen suggested they would come for him in a boat if he would make the trip across seven miles of rough water. Ascertaining Mrs. Jones' condition, Doctor Bennett decided too much time would be lost this way.

Summoning a nurse, the physician got into his sled and started out. Across the water they could see flares, sent up at intervals by the coast guard. The seven-mile run was made in less than 14 minutes.

Examining the patient, Doctor Bennett ordered she be taken to a hospital for an operation. The sick woman was bundled into blankets and taken to Patchogue. Her condition is still serious.

Traffic Hurries Even Solons in Capital

Washington.—The deliberate life in modern Washington is confined almost alone to the senate chamber. Outside of the capitol building the city "steps on the gas."

When the members of the nation's deliberative body emerge onto the streets they must look sharply to escape the crush of traffic which seems to have over-taxed even the once wide and comfortable avenues.

To hurry things along 30 miles an hour now is prescribed as the speed limit on some avenues where dignified statesmen once railed at the recklessness of bicycle "scorchers" who frightened the spick-and-span teams drawing aristocratic equipages.

It is no novelty to see the coat tails of a cabinet official flying in the wind as he attempts to make a perilous street crossing, and secret service men who guard President Coolidge must be alert when he takes his customary strolls.

Measures Snow on Far Hill With Telescope

Visalia, Calif.—Measuring the depth of snow on a mountain 11 miles away with a telescope and thereby saving a two-day hike, has been arranged by Col. John R. White, superintendent of Sequoia national park.

Valley farmers kept asking how the snow was piling up in the mountains because it is their next year's water and irrigation supply in the making. Colonel White got tired of making a two-day trip to Alta peak to measure the snow. This summer he placed a series of cross-arms at known distances from the ground on the peak.

Now he trains a 6-inch telescope from the Alder creek headquarters on the cross-arms and reads the depth of snow on Alta peak.

Athletic Interests Lead to Increase in Morality and Moral Standards

IMMORALITY is not found among the athletic boys and girls but among the bespectacled bookworms. The boy and girl who take active interest in athletics and participate in the games have too much to think of, too much demand on their energy, to have time and surplus energy to devote to immorality.

The finest thing which is said of athletics is that it tends to increase morality and moral standards among our young people, gives them a better and cleaner outlook on life and a better appreciation of the advantage and desirability of having clean, wholesome minds as well as clean, wholesome bodies.

There will be no effort to force girls back into costumes which have become passe because of their clumsiness. There is a great deal more harm in suggestiveness than in frankness. No encouragement to immodesty will be tolerated, but immodesty must be judged by the consensus, conditions at the time, the appropriateness of the costume and demeanor of the wearer.

We are going ahead with the development of interest in clean wholesome sports among our boys and girls because we are convinced that not only are such things good to help build clean, strong bodies but are of material help in building clean, strong minds, and whether a knee shows or not is regarded as of little consequence by our boys and girls.

Standardized Studies Not the Best Form of Education for American Youth

By DR. C. W. BURR, University of Pennsylvania.

The schooling of all boys more than ten years old should be entirely in the hands of men. One fundamental error in our public schools is the effeminization of our educational system. This is true not only in things intellectual but in character formation.

All education above the elementary school should be given only to those worth while. About the twelfth or thirteenth year a split occurs toward "hand-mindedness or book-mindedness." And the "hand-minded" boy should be put to work as soon as he shows his trend, instead of being kept in school.

The primary purpose of education is to prepare the child for the battle of life, to make him a worthy citizen; scholarship is secondary. The two aims are moral training, to form character and intellectual training—training in straight thinking.

Is the American public school system the best possible for this purpose? I doubt it. It offers to all children the same mental food prepared in the same way, and assumes, what every clear-thinking man knows to be untrue, the mental equality of men.

It also assumes that character depends on environment, that every child comes into the world a piece of wax, as far as the moral sense and mind are concerned, and can be molded as those who have the care and teaching of him desire.

This is also untrue. Conduct and behavior, which are the test of character, depend fundamentally upon heredity and congenial influences. Environment may modify for good or evil, but cannot alter inherent qualities; can destroy, but cannot create.

Unfortunate Social Conditions Traced to Ignorance of the Bible

By BISHOP MANNING (Episcopal), New York.

Neglect of the Bible has a great deal to do with unfortunate social conditions today. Ignorance of the Bible is an incalculable loss from the standpoint of education and culture, but morally and spiritually the loss is still more serious. How much of the present lawlessness, how much of the present lowering of social and moral standards, how much of the present increase of crime in our land can be traced to and accounted for by neglect of the Bible and by absence of religious teaching from our schools?

Research of modern scholars has not hurt the validity of the Bible. I say without hesitation that no fact or truth which Biblical scholarship has established conflicts with, or tends to weaken, full belief in the deity of our Lord Jesus Christ, in the fact of his birth to the Blessed Virgin Mary, in the reality of His resurrection from the grave or His ascension into heaven.

Train of Evils in Constant Changefulness of Modern Times

By REV. HARRY EMERSON FOSDICK, New York City.

Few problems are more serious than the effect which the shifting changefulness of modern life is having upon us here in New York. All the winds that blow on earth blow through this town, and in a city where so many shifting winds blow the temptation to be weather-vanes is very strong. We give this attitude a fine name—open-mindedness. Now, if by open-mindedness we mean a gracious, tolerant, teachable spirit, never dogmatic, always ready to learn, that is a great virtue; but it is a corresponding pity that open-mindedness should degenerate, as it so often does, into so futile a vice.

I am not pleading that anyone accept my positive convictions about life's abiding truth, its deep faiths, hopes and loves, but surely, no one can be so blind as not to find here, if he looks for them, some convictions of his own to which his mind assents and for which he knows he ought to live.

Reasons Why "Back to Farm" Movement Is Largely an Economic Fallacy

By WILLIAM LLOYD DAVIS, Municipal University of Akron.

"Back to the farm" is a pretty sentiment but an economic fallacy so far as modern life is concerned. The back-to-the-farm movement would be all right if it meant more abundant life, such as a wealthy man might find in a suburban home, but it no longer means that for we have too many farmers now. One or two farm hands now do the work done by 15 not many years ago. That is because 93 per cent of the wheat, 90 per cent of the butter and 95 per cent of the hay are produced by machines.

To find the proper comforts for himself, his wife and children, the schools and other advantages, a man must go where he can earn money with which to purchase them. That means he must go where the machines are, to the industrial centers of the nation.

SON SERVED IN WAR, DAD GOT PENSION

Strange Case Comes to Light in Nebraska.

Auburn, Neb.—The story of a man who not only served in place of his father after the latter had volunteered while drunk to be a soldier in the Civil war but also was deprived of his rightful pension after the war by his father, has come to light here in the case of James Perry Whitlow.

Whitlow, who is past eighty and in dire need, declares that in 1863 Peter Whitlow, his father, while drunk at Nemaha City, near here, enlisted in the Union army. After returning home and sobering up he realized that a man with nine children, all under eighteen, had no right to go to war and leave his family to the charity of neighbors. But if he failed to fulfill his enlistment he would be considered a deserter and would suffer a deserter's punishment.

His son, Perry, who was then seventeen, solved the problem. He would go in his father's stead. So Perry reported for duty and became a soldier in the Second Nebraska cavalry under the name of his father, Peter Whitlow. The commanding officer was none the wiser and the subterfuge was not discovered.

Between 1863 and 1865 Perry saw service on the western frontier, fighting Indians. After the war he returned to Auburn and took up the life of a farmer on a homestead which his father had obtained.

His discharge papers, made out in his father's name, were delivered in due time to his father. Later application for a pension was made in his father's name and was granted. Perry, having done the service, wanted the pension, but the father insisted on having it. So for 21 years the father received and cashed the pension checks.

Ill feeling, engendered by the pension matter, caused Perry to leave home. His father forbade him ever to return. And when the paternal will was probated in 1905, after the death of the father, there was no bequest to the estranged son.

Perry Whitlow then tried to have the wrong righted by the government, but his efforts were futile.

As the years wore on Whitlow became unable to work. Today he is in poverty. Upon the urging of his friends, he has told his story to Congressman John L. Moorehead of this district. The congressman says that he will try to get through congress at this session a bill granting to Perry Whitlow the pension which he has been denied these many years.

Domestic Insects Urged to War Upon Parasites

Philadelphia.—Possible domestication of insects which prey upon harmful bugs and parasites was suggested by Dr. L. O. Howard, chief of the bureau of entomology, Department of Agriculture. Doctor Howard was one of the speakers before the entomological section of the American Association for the Advancement of Science.

"It may be too much to expect," he said, "that we shall ever be able to handle these creatures as quasi-domestic animals and to use them at will, but we must develop all possibilities."

Doctor Howard urged that every important parasite on injurious insects and every predatory insect that feeds on injurious insects should be brought here from all parts of the world to aid the farmer, whose worries, he said, would be much greater if he did not have these winged and crawling helpers.

Executions for Fraud Increase in Soviet Russia

Moscow.—Executions for embezzlement, fraud and speculation in the conduct of government owned banks and commercial enterprises seem to be increasingly frequent, according to reports in the soviet newspapers. The severe penalty of death, reserved under the law for crimes judged dangerous to the security of the state, have been reported from small towns and communities. None have been reported recently in the larger cities such as Moscow, Leningrad or Odessa.

Dogs Run Alaska's "Pupmobile" Railway

Nome, Alaska.—Sheer novelty of transportation is the claim to fame of the Pupmobile railway between Nome and Shelton, for the trains are minus both locomotives and engineers.

The motive power is furnished by husky dogs and the railroad crew is composed of the passengers. Operation of trains consists solely in wielding a whip, except in cases where two trains meet between sidings. In that contingency the one with the lighter load is lifted from the track while the other passes. Then the "engine" is hitched on again and the journey continues.

The railroad has 87 miles of narrow-gauge track. It was built in the early days of Alaska mining to connect the Kougarak mining district with the coast, and was bought by the territory three years ago. It is operated by the Alaska road commission for public use.

Early Newspapers Met Opposition of Church

The first newspaper was produced when written accounts of the imperial armies of Rome were sent to the generals in command in all parts of the provinces.

In 1596 the first official news sheets were published in Venice. They were written by hand and exhibited in public places. People paid the small coin of a gazetta to read them. Hence the name. The church opposed the enterprise, and Pope Gregory even prosecuted the editors.

The oldest form of newspaper in England was in the beginning of the reign of James II—the so-called News-Letters, written by hand, and sent by post to subscribers in the country. In 1709 the first daily paper, the Daily Courant, was issued.

The oldest of the London daily papers, the Morning Chronicle, appeared in 1769. The Morning Post is the oldest of existing morning papers. Founded in 1772, it was followed about 1788 by the first daily evening paper, the Star.

The Times first appeared in 1788 as a continuation of the Daily Universal Register. Its originator and owner, Mr. John Walter, succeeded in 1814 in printing the Times by steam.

ANCIENT TOMB NEAR ALGIERS AWES ARABS

Antedates Christianity by at Least Two Centuries.

Paris.—A mysterious tomb, regarded with awe by the lowly Arabs of the region, stands on the crest of a lofty hill, about fifty miles from Algiers. It is known as Le Tombeau de la Chretienne, the tomb of the Christian woman, although French scholars regard it, without proof, as a Punic structure antedating the Christian era by at least two centuries.

So little is actually known of this mausoleum that small wonder is occasioned by the fantastic legend handed down about it in truly Oriental style throughout the countryside. The Arabs themselves call it Khour Er-Rourma, which means European or Christian tomb, the use of the plural suggesting that they regarded it as a multiple tomb. Even their legend throws little light on the origin of the strange edifice.

The mystery that hangs about it is deepened by current Arab legends, which imply the fixed belief that much undiscovered treasure lies buried inside.

At the top of the hill which rises a thousand feet above the Mediterranean, this extraordinary relic of antiquity rears itself an additional 100 feet. The structure is a circular mass of dressed stone, at least 200 feet in diameter.

Sculptured Columns.

Sixty engaged columns, sculptured in relief and resembling the Ionic in style, decorate the lower circumference of the tambour, a drum-shaped edifice, originally surmounted by a lofty cone of rock. At the four cardinal points of the compass huge false portals are sculptured. A design on each of them, resembling a great cross, is responsible for the present French name of the ruin.

In an effort to discover the treasure two small tunnels were long ago dug through the center. On one side near the summit is a considerable depression made by Baba Mohammed Ben Othman, pasha of Algeria, in 1770, when he used cannon to demolish the tomb. The French government has now put a stop to the work of treasure hunters and other vandals, and some years ago restored one of the principal facades.

Entrance is possible through a low and very narrow passage which earlier excavations revealed in the substructure beneath one of the false portals, that facing the east. This entrance leads to a fairly spacious vaulted chamber whose solid stone masonry walls had apparently never borne decorations. But the right-hand wall has small relief sculptures of a lion and a lioness.

Directly underneath these bas-reliefs another short, constricted passage, which has to be traversed on hands and knees, leads to seven ascending steps and then into a spacious and beautifully vaulted gallery built of large blocks of neatly dressed stone. This gallery, spiral in form, is more than 400 feet long. At the end a third passage leads first into a small chamber and then into a larger one. This was supposed, until recently, to be the exact center of the monument. But it is now known that it is somewhat off center, whether through accident or design has not been determined.

Place for Cinerary Urns.

The purpose of the chambers is also in doubt. Nothing has been found in them or in the spiral gallery. It may be supposed that the first was a vestibule to the second, in which three niches are sunk in the bare walls. It is a further guess that the niches were intended to hold cinerary urns. It is possible that these supposed mortuary chambers are blinds, like the four portals, and that the real vaults are deep in the foundations, approached by vertical shafts with horizontal passages at the bottom.

This manner of entombing the dead, filling up and disguising the shafts, after each interment, corresponds with the Phoenician and Punic practices of antiquity. If this supposition be true, the tomb still guards its secret, and the local Arabic tradition of the multiple tomb is not without meaning.

The builder, whoever he may have been, chose well the site of his last resting place. To the north, a thousand feet below, stretches the waters of the Mediterranean; to the south, long green slopes reach into the fruitful valley of the Mitidja. Along the southern horizon the cedar bearing Atlas mountains rear their purple wall, from which clear streams descend to make the valley prosperous.

Find Tree Stump in Process of Petrification

Bethany, Mo.—Workmen with a railroad construction crew from St. Joseph, working on the Burlington railroad right of way near this city, unearthed a red oak stump in the process of petrification. The stump, which measured about two and one-half feet through, is believed to have been buried in the fill for almost fifty years, or ever since the railroad was built. Its removal required four days. It showed no signs of decay and was so tough it could not be split with an ax.

Women as Inventors

THE other day an Illinois woman was granted a patent by the United States patent office for a "secret envelope," i. e. one which cannot be opened without detection of the fact that it has been tampered with. Immediately there were columns of newspaper publicity about the "woman inventor," as though woman in that role is unique.

To the average person she is, perhaps, for we commonly think of the inventive genius of woman in terms of the stock joke about her inability to do an innumerable number of things with a hairpin when necessity demands it. As a matter of fact, women inventors are becoming more numerous every year, as the records of the United States patent office will show. The women's bureau of the United States Department of Labor recently made an analysis of those records to determine woman's part in this age of invention and revealed what will be an astonishing fact to many persons—that at least 500 government patents a year are now granted to women inventors, and that more patents were granted to them in a recent ten-year period than were issued during the whole century ending in 1895.

Although the number of patents taken out by men is some 70 times as many as the number taken out by the other sex, the percentage increase for women from decade to decade has exceeded that of the men by as much as 300 per cent in some years. Another striking fact is that war seems to be a strong incentive to woman's producing new things. Before the Civil war about half a dozen patents a year were granted to women. During the war and in the years that followed the number of patents to women increased steadily, rising at times to more than 100 annually. The decade of 1857 to 1867 saw an increase of 677 per cent in the number of articles patented by women, as compared to 290 per cent increase for the men in the same period.

Although it is yet too early to predict what effect in this regard the World war will have, it is true that the number of patents taken out by women from 1918 to 1921 was 34 per cent higher than from 1912 to 1915.

From National Forests

A tremendous variety of products ranging from shoe pegs and sassafras oil to saw logs, railroad ties, and naval stores, is made from timber supplied by the national forests of the East and South, says the forest service of the United States Department of Agriculture. Chestnut in the Appalachians furnishes telephone poles and extract wood. Beech, birch, and maple supply bobbins for the busy looms of

Even at that, the pre-World war period was one of great activity for women inventors, for in that time more than 5,000 patents were granted to women in ten selected years from 1905 to 1921, a number which far exceeds the total number granted them during the span of 105 years which ended in 1895.

As might be expected the majority of women's inventions are those which have to do with their household duties. But they are far from being limited to that and they cover a wide range of activity in 50 industries, coal mining, through agricultural machinery, hospital equipment, manufacturing equipment, chemicals, artificial fuels, wood turning, even to submarine explosives! Before you exclaim over that last, however, consider a list of inventions by women which proves that the mothers of men, who are proverbially opposed to the war which robs them of their husbands and sons, are still doing their part to perpetuate its horrors. This list includes automatic pistols, bomb-launching apparatus, a cane gun, an incendiary ball, railway torpedoes, sights for guns, submarine mines and a top for powder cans.

Woman, the citizen, is responsible for inventions of voting booths, voting machines and a pocket ballot. Woman, the scientist, has given us new dyes and new dye bases, chemical treatment of oils for commercial purposes, artificial fuels, gas apparatus, air compressors, hoisting apparatus, reversible turbines, various steam and street railway necessities ranging from road bed and rails through rolling stock equipment to traffic signals and block systems.

Some of the reasons given by the women for their inventions are among the most interesting facts connected with their work. A large number of these reasons, of course, come under the proverbial head of "necessity, the mother of invention." One invention, made for this reason, turned its benefits in a direction curiously different from the original intention. A woman golf teacher, who had been much annoyed by the perverse habit of golf balls of becoming lodged in inaccessible places or dropping into streams, invented an adjustable rake to recover the errant balls. The wider usefulness of the rake was soon apparent, and gardeners now have a golf teacher to thank for making their work lighter.

A Texas woman who took out a pat-

ent for an improvement on a cultivator tongue, which lightened the burden of the "menfolks," said that "having been raised on a farm and seeing that there was needed improvement on cultivator tongues, I made up my mind to improve upon the old-style ones." A Minnesota woman invented a portable smoke house because as she explained it "As a farmer's wife, my duty was to cure meats for summer use and smoked meat is very much favored in my family. I tried to smoke mine without expense, and after I had completed this device I used it successfully for two years before I obtained a patent upon it."

It is in lightening her home duties that the American housewife finds her best reason for turning to invention. In this realm her new devices include alarms for cooking utensils, juice extractors, kettle protectors, stove-cleaning devices, waffle irons, ash cans, laundry equipment, broom racks, stovepipe cleaners, napkin holders, bed-airing devices, hair chairs, bathroom fixtures, an automatic rocking chair fan, awnings, clothes containers and ant traps. Domestic difficulties sometimes result in invention, as witness the case of the woman who invented a pie-pan cover because of the "overflowing of juicy pies, the best of the pie is wasted, leaving the poorest part in the crust."

And these are only a few of the many new devices for which the world can thank the women. None of them is "revolutionary," perhaps, but for those whom they benefit by making life easier, that is immaterial. What if, so far, more men have been responsible for all of the most important inventions, including those, such as the typewriter and the sewing machine, which have meant so much to women? (Incidentally, it might be added that Elias Howe's invention of the sewing machine was not greeted with unanimous enthusiasm by the women of the time. Was it "feminine inconsistency" which prompted some of them to opposition when the first sewing machines came upon the market because they "would take away the livelihood of the poor sewing women"? This increase in woman's inventive activity, as shown by the records of the patent office, may be indicative of the increasing importance of women in every phase of life, and we may yet see some new device of world-wide and all-time significance conceived in a woman's mind and molded by a woman's hand.

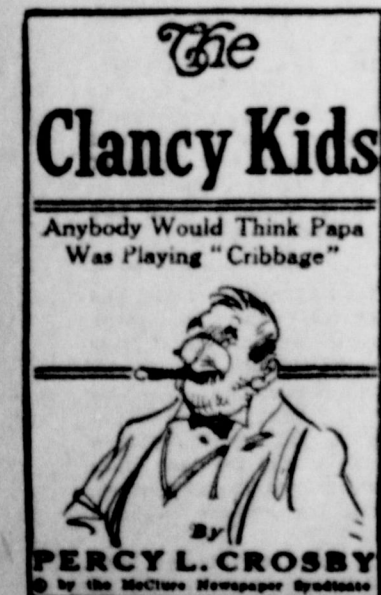

CARLSBAD CAVE IS FULL OF THRILLS

Has Been Explored to the 1,000-Foot Level.

El Paso, Texas.—How deep is the vast Carlsbad cave? It has been explored to a depth of 1,000 feet below the surface entrance and at that level are several dark passages which lead to still lower depths. It is one of the marvels of the world, according to Carl Livingston of Carlsbad, N. M., well-known archeologist, who has devoted much time to exploring the cavern.

In a talk before the Archeological society of El Paso, Mr. Livingston said that some conception of the tremendous size of the cavern is borne out by the fact that in the portion already explored the entire population of New Mexico and west Texas could be accommodated. In what is called the "big room," three miles from the entrance and on the 750-foot level, the population of El Paso and Juarez could be seated, Mr. Livingston said.

"In the jump-off place in this room," said Mr. Livingston, "an 18-story building could be placed and the roof would not touch the ceiling of the room."

Go Down 1,000 Feet.

"There is no telling how deep the cavern is. Explorers have gone to the 1,000-foot level and found there places and entrances which lead to greater depths."

"The Carlsbad cavern is the largest in the world. It is indescribable. You have to see it many times before you can appreciate its great immensity and beauty."

The area of the cavern is unknown. It extends south into Texas, and it is proposed to excavate an entrance to it in this state. The present entrance is near Carlsbad.

He described "Devil's Den," an abyss 150 feet deep. Visitors were not allowed on the balcony of this precipice, he said, because of the danger in falling off.

"Visitors," he said, "are conducted only to the safe places."

After the "Devil's Den," next in interest is the "King's Palace," in which is a block of stone weighing many tons.

Rocks Seldom Fall.

"There is seldom any falling of rocks," Mr. Livingston stated. "One falls, perhaps, every century. Time means nothing to a cavern."

"Well within the 'King's Palace' is a circular room 50 times larger than the largest auditorium."

"The 'Queen's Room' adjoins the palace, and above this is a vast chamber which has not yet been explored."

"The 'Papoose Room' next to the 'Queen's Room,'" said Mr. Livingston, "is so delicate that visitors are no longer allowed in this. It is impossible to go through the room without knocking off some of the formations."

"The big room is three blocks wide and three-quarters of a mile long. The trail through it is over a mile and a half in length. There are hundreds of alcoves in this room and each one is different from the other."

Puts Door in Cow's Stomach for Study

State College, Pa.—Dairy research workers of the agricultural experiment station of Pennsylvania State college have performed a harmless and simple operation on Penelope Homestead Jessie, a pure-bred two-year-old Holstein heifer, to study what goes on inside her stomach.

Jessie suffered no inconvenience from the operation which put a door in her stomach for special vitamin researches to be carried on. In other words, Jessie will continue to be a contented cow.

Experiments conducted by Dr. S. I. Bechdel of the station have shown that a cow fed a ration deficient in vitamin B will produce milk containing this dietary substance, absence of which in the human diet causes beriberi, a nutritional disease resulting in paralysis.

"What is the source of the vitamin?" the scientists queried. "Can it be that a cow has the power to manufacture vitamin B?" So the college asked Dr. R. S. Amadon to make an opening in Jessie's stomach. After the application of local anesthetics the rumen was sewed to the skin of the opening so the two will grow together. When this has occurred, in about a week, a convenient little door will be provided. This will permit the scientist to reach in and get part of Jessie's dinner.

Offers to Build Flyers' Chapel Near Arlington

Washington.—Permission to erect on Fort Myer military reservation, just opposite the main gate of Arlington national cemetery, a memorial church for use of the Fort Myer garrison and to be dedicated to Americans who fought with the Lafayette escadrille in France, has been asked of the War department by Frederick H. Prince, Boston banker and president of the Union Stock Yards and Junction railways of Chicago.

Mr. Prince lost a son in the World war. He was killed in action while a member of the famous French-American escadrille.

The memorial itself is to cost \$500,000 and Mr. Prince plans to put an additional \$100,000 into the landscape gardening work about the chapel. Ralph Adams Cram of Boston has been selected as architect.

The DAIRY

STUDY MADE ON COSTS OF MILK

Additional facts on what it costs farmers to produce milk in the large milk-producing centers of Illinois have been obtained by the college of agriculture, University of Illinois in Washington, Clinton and Madison counties where 13 farmers, most of whom were producing fluid milk for St. Louis last year, made 10 cents above all expenses on every 100 pounds of milk produced.

These farmers kept 145 cows which cost them an average of \$142 a cow and produced \$150 worth of products during the year, according to Karl T. Wright of the college farm organization and management department, who summarized the records which the farmers kept in cooperation with the institution. These 145 cows produced 974,789 pounds of milk during the year, or an average of 6,723 pounds each, at an average net cost of \$1.85 a hundred. Most of these farmers have been keeping a daily record of each cow's production and have disposed of low producers, so it is evident that the average farmer in this territory produced milk at a loss.

The feed cost ranged from 91 cents to \$1.97 a hundred pounds of milk produced, while the man labor cost varied from 30 cents to 80 cents when figured at 25 cents an hour. In other words, the feed cost for the year for each cow varied from \$67 to \$109 and man labor cost from \$22 to \$47, which shows that there is much room for improvement. While the feed cost a cow was \$67 in the one case and \$109 in the other, it amounted to 59 cents a hundred for milk produced in the first case and 48 cents in the last. This shows that cheap production comes not so much from low cost a cow as it does from high efficiency of the cow. A farmer can secure low feed and labor cost on each 100 pounds of milk produced only after he has carefully selected efficient high-producing cows, which he cares for as efficiently as possible.

On these 145 cows, feed made up more than 61 per cent of the costs, and man labor nearly 24 per cent. Charges for use of building and equipment, interest on investment in cows, insurance, veterinary and miscellaneous, made up the 15 per cent.

One of these farmers spent 91 hours taking care of each cow, while another spent 270 hours, and furthermore the production of milk was 500 pounds less in the last case. There seems to be very little connection between time spent and the production per cow. It required 156 hours as an average for all the farmers to care for each cow throughout the year.

Since feed and labor made up 85 per cent of all costs, it behooves the farmer to watch these two items closely, as any reduction he can make in them will greatly increase his profit. Wright pointed out. The efficient, high-producing cow is the most important single factor in getting profits.

Prevent Pneumonia

Like lots of other ailments of calves, pneumonia is much easier to prevent than to cure. It is most likely to occur in cold, damp weather. However, it is not so much the result of cold weather as of damp stalls, dirty wet surroundings and poor ventilation. To prevent this trouble be sure first that the calf has warm, dry quarters with plenty of clean, dry bedding. Clean out the pens and stanchions regularly and above everything else keep them dry. The calves should have plenty of room to exercise.

Full Feed for Cows

When a good dairy cow is fed a full ration of balanced feeds she will use about half of the feed to maintain her body and the other half for producing milk, but when this same cow is fed a three-fourths ration she needs the same amount to maintain her body and can use only one-third of her feed for producing milk. When fed a half ration she needs all her feed to maintain her body. This fact shows the importance of full feeding good cows.

Dairy Notes

One beauty of poultry is that it coordinates so nicely with dairying.

Cool the milk to 50 degrees F. and hold at this temperature as nearly as you can.

It is a mistaken idea to think that legume hay—no matter how good—makes silage unnecessary in the cow's ration. The two are essential.

Apples or apple pomace may be fed to dairy cows as a substitute for corn silage.

Skim milk or buttermilk which comes from creameries that fail to pasteurize thoroughly, is a constant source of danger in spreading the disease to live stock.

In many dairy barns individual drinking fountains are being placed at the stall heads, so that stabled dairy cows can drink as much and as often as they please.
