Mrs. Clark At Pol. Action Clinic

Austin — Mrs. Joe Clark, Rotan teacher, will enroll in a "cram course" in politics this weekend, Feb. 24-25) in Austin, when Texas Classroom Teachers Association hosts its first state-wide Political Action Clinic.

Mrs. Clark is a State Board member of TCTA, representing twelve (12) local classroom teachers organizations. At least five other Rotan teachers are expected to attend the clinic.

Featuring Ben Barnes, Speaker of the Texas House of Representatives, and Senator W. N. (Bill) Patman, President Pro Tem of the Texas Senate, as keynote speakers, the clinic will draw almost 1,000 teachers from more than 200 communities in Texas.

"Teachers are still political neophytes," said Miss Betty Buford of Plainview, state president of the 41,000 member organization. "We're faced with the prospect of marshalling our forces to secure the most ambitious, progressive package of legislation that education has come up with in years. We can't do this without some practical knowledge of how to be effective in politics," she said.

Political speakers, including Barnes and Patman; personal meetings with legislators; "political pow-wows" to get group ideas; a panel discussion and a legislative film will contribute practical political hints.

"Teamwork of effective Political Action in Education" is the topic of the five member panel discussion slated for Saturday afternoon.

Delegates will study the citizenship responsibilities of the teacher, how to organize for political action what steps to take in campaigning, how to secure the voters' support, and how to communicate.

TCTA's Political Action Clinic will be held in the Terrace Motor Hotel and the Stephen F. Austin Hotel in Austin. Chairman of the clinic is Mrs. Kathryn Townsend, a Victoria teacher who is state Legislative Chairman for TCTA and a member of the legislative committee of Texas State Teachers Association.

Registration for the clinic begins at 5 p.m. Friday, with the first general session start-

White Heads ACC Fund Drive

ABILENE — Arvin R. White, 601 Beauregard, has been named city chairman for the Community Gifts campaign of Abilene Christian College's \$25.7 million Design for Development.

White, owner of White's Auto Store, will direct the activities of team captains and volunteer workers in Rotan as the Community Gifts campaign gets underway here.

The Design for Development, initiated in 1965, is a 10-year program to raise \$25.7 million for academic, physical and endowment expansion. The Phase I three-year target of the campaign is \$10.4 million, and currently more than \$8 million has been raised.

The Community Gifts campaign will be conducted among the alumni, parents and friends of ACC in more than 260 Texas cities. The effort will reach about 30 thousand persons, seeking three-year gifts or pledges up to \$3,000 during the first half of 1967.

White received his bachelor of arts degree from Abilene Christian in 1940.

White is a member of the Rotan Church of Christ.

Mrs. White, the former Jo Bill Duckworth, also graduated from ACC in 1939. They have one daughter, Candy Lee.

Federal Grant Under Title I

Rep. Omar Burleson announced Tuesday that Texas will receive \$274,779 in Federal grants for special education programs for educationally disadvantaged children in Fisher County.

The grant awards were approved by the Department of Health, Education and Welfare under Title I of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act. Approval of local programs under the act rests with the state.

Burleson said 544 Fisher County children in low income families aged 5 to 17 would come under the plan.

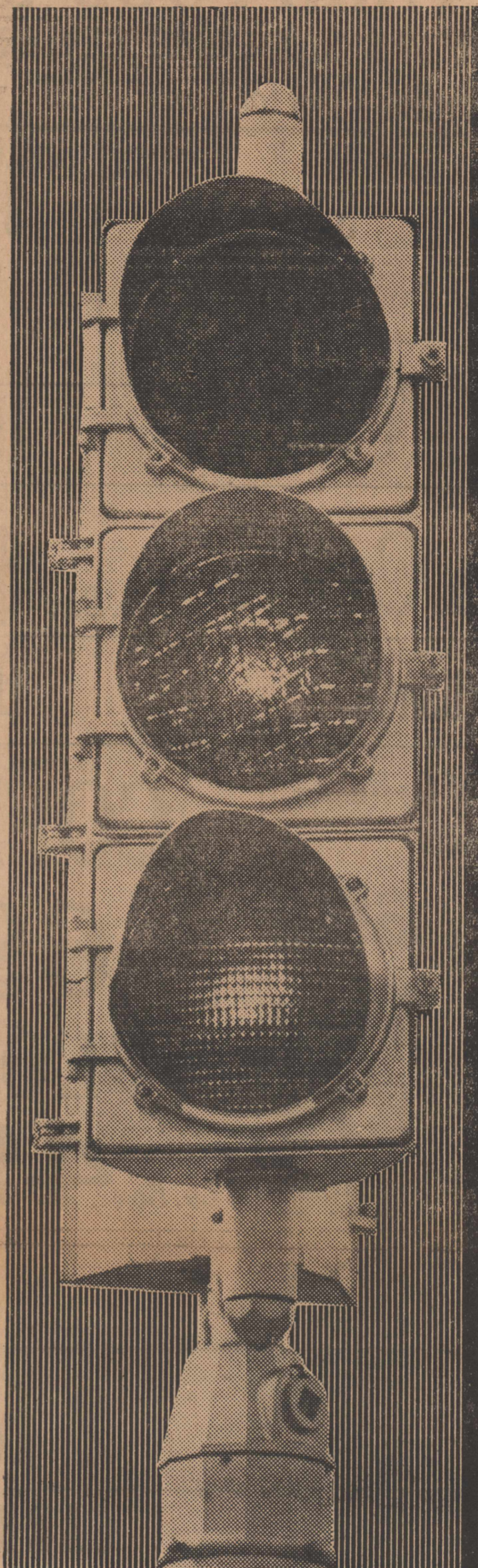

Science Department Plans for New School

Mr. Keith Noe, chemistry and physics teacher, met February 13 with the architect, Mr. Jack Luther, to plan the science department in the new high school.

The plan is for four rooms, a lecture room, storage room, prep room, and laboratory.

The lecture room has a planned capacity of 24 students. The teacher's demonstration desk will have a sink, and water and gas outlets. Chalk boards will be on two walls.

The laboratory will have another demonstration counter with student counters just above waist-high. Mr. Noe says that he has seen this type counter in use, mostly in colleges, and it has proved "most effective."

Each student will be assigned a drawer and locker with locks at his counter. Hot and cold water will be installed. The drainage trough will run down the center of the counters with a lead sink at the end.

The storage cabinets in the laboratory will line two walls. Most will be wooden with sliding doors. On the upper part of one wall pockets for notebooks and workbooks will be installed. The upper part of the other wall will have glass panel cabinets for display use.

The prep and storage rooms will be small and connect the laboratory and lecture rooms. The prep room is used to prepare chemicals for use in experiments. Chemistry supplies will be kept in the storage room.

Brenda Head, Mary McDonald, and Kay Kennedy.

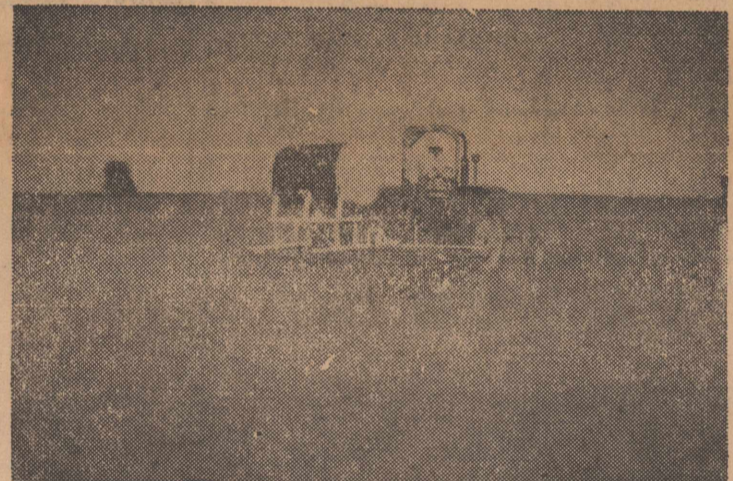
