Growing Season Ends For Large Section Of State

Field work was held at a virtual standstill for the second consecutive week by damp cloudy weather along with additional showers and chilling drizzles. At the end of the period freezing temperatures ended the summer growing season over the western, northwestern and extreme northern counties. Then on November 10, killing frost extended deep into south central and southeastern counties.

In the plains counties this first killing frost was a week or 10 days later than average but in south central and southeastern counties was two or three weeks earlier than average. Wheat, oats, barley and winter legumes were making good to excellent development in all areas. Considerable additional acreage of these crops will be planted as soon as farmers can get back into the fields.

Cotton harvest was delayed further as many fields were too wet to enter. Quality of much open cotton remaining in fields has been lowered but rains during the week were gentle and were not accompanied by high winds. Only a small part of the high plains crop has been harvested. Harvest of grain sorghums in the northwest is about complete but wet fields and high moisture content interfered with the completion of this job.

Condition of sorghums in south Texas is good. In east Texas, sweetpotato and peanut harvest tapered off materially. Rains interfered with harvest of peanuts in the northern commercial areas and caused light damage to nuts and peanutvine hay. Pecan harvest has become active in all areas but was delayed during the week.

Conditions continued favorable for commercial vegetables until Sunday night (8th) when a cool front with temperatures generally in the 40's spread over the lower valley and Laredo sections. Slightly lower temperatures were recorded through the winter garden and Eagle Pass but only at Eagle Pass was frost reported. Small grain pastures improved rapidly over the entire State and the very favorable moisture assured continued development until checked by cold weather. Many stocker calves, yearlings and cows were being moved into the northwest to winter on wheat pastures. Freezing temperatures over the weekend stopped growth of warm season grass and forage. Rescue grass, clovers and winter weeds were making very good early growth in eastern, central and southern counties. Ewes and lambs were doing well on the plateau oat pastures.

Two soldiers of the Cisco area recently began 16 weeks of basic training in the Antiaircraft Artillery Replacement Training Center at Fort Bliss.

They are Pvt. Clifford A. Smith, son of Hulon Smith, Rt. 1; and Pvt. James D. Smith, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. Wesley Smith, Route 1.

All will spend the first eight weeks training on fundamental Army subjects like Infantry drill and machine gun and bazooka marksmanship. This first phase of training is climaxed by a one-week maneuver in the field.

Their second eight weeks will see them firing light and medium antiaircraft artillery weapons at low-flying and high altitude aerial targets on the million and a half acre Fort Bliss ranges.

They will graduate at a formal parade and retreat ceremony and will then be eligible for assignment in a permanent antiaircraft Artillery unit.

Wranglers End Grid Schedule With 6-0 Defeat By Navarro

The Wranglers of Cisco Junior College completed their 1953 football schedule here Thursday night when they lost a hard-fought game to the Navarro Junior College of Corsicana by a score of 6-0 at Chesley Field.

It was the annual homecoming for the Cisco school and one of the season's best crowds turned out for the contest. The parents of Wrangler players were special guests at the game.

The lone score of the game came in the middle of the second period, and there was no other serious threats as the two teams staged a defensive battle. The forward walls of both teams turned in splendid performances, allowing no long runs and few for more than half a dozen yards.

The Wranglers received the opening kickoff and put the ball in play on their 21-yard line. E. E. Reid got through for eight yards and Hut Hutson drove to the 35 for a first down. Hutson and Bob Westmoreland then went to their 49. A penalty set the Wranglers back 15 yards, and Bob Lynch's pass was intercepted by Bobby Grantland on the Navarro 46-yard line.

Grantland's pass was promptly intercepted by Wendell Battle on the Navarro 36. Reid got away for 16 yards. Four line bucks then gained only 8 yards, and the ball went over on the 7-yard line. The visitors punted out to their 42. Three plays netted the Wranglers nothing, and Bud Miller punted over the goal.

A quick kick sent the ball to the Cisco 25 as the period ended. Three plays failed and Miller punted to midfield. Navarro used short line plays to move to the Cisco 24. A moment later, Westmoreland fell on Navarro

The first tally for the junior Loboes came with 20 seconds to play in the first half. Former Alcoholic Is Speaker For Rotary Meeting

Joe Stalcup, Brownwood automobile dealer, who told Rotarians that he was an alcoholic, explained the work of Alcoholics Anonymous at the weekly meeting of the club at the Hotel Victor Thursday.

Mr. Stalcup first told of his experiences as an alcoholic for five years, then told of the benefits he and others had received from Alcoholics Anonymous.

He first impressed Rotarians with the fact that he and others who suffered with alcoholism were victims of a disease that medical science was unable to combat.

In telling of his experiences during the five years that he suffered from the disease, Mr. Stalcup said that he had spent some \$200,000 while under the influence of alcoholic beverages; that he had disgraced his family and at one time deserted them; that he had gone as far as to contemplate suicide and the next step for him would have been 'skid row.' He said that an alcoholic would commit any sin, and that they were unable to control their actions.

He told of fighting A. A. for five years before a friend finally persuaded him to attend his first meeting, and said that it had now been almost two years since he had been drunk. He said that he was now a respected citizen of his community and was active in church work, giving credit to the organization for his return to society.

Mr. Stalcup told of Alcoholics Anonymous — what it is, what it is not, and its purpose. He stressed humbleness and a dedication of self to teaching others as the main aids in receiving benefit from A. A. He said that group therapy, prayer and being around others who suffered from the disease were the principal aids received from the organization.

He told of leaving the first meeting and going home to tell of it to his family. He asked their help and prayers, and described himself now as the world's happiest man.

He described the program as spiritual but not religious and said that he was now dedicated to helping others, and to educate people to what alcoholism is.

He read twelve suggested steps for an alcoholic to follow in his fight against the disease, and said that there was no cure. Members of A. A., he said, just live from day to day.

Mr. Stalcup was on the Rotary program at the invitation of Rotarian R. L. Fonsler, chairman for the meeting.

WASHINGTON — How big is government in this country? So big, according to the Chamber of Commerce of the United States, that if you add up all the divisions of state, local and federal governments you probably could find a top executive for every citizen in a city the size of Phoenix, Arizona, (population, 331,770).

By actual count there are 116,743 major units of government in the United States today. This figure includes the federal government, the governments of the 48 states, 3,049 counties, 16,778 municipalities, 17,202 townships, 67,346 school districts, and 12,319 special districts.

But if these figures were broken down into all the principal subdivisions of government, the total would be many times 116,743. Within the federal gov-

743 total. Virginia, for example, has 18 major departments and more than 550 commissions, agencies, services and lesser units, while New York City has 111 units.

By no means the least effect of big government is its cost. In the year ending June 30, 1932, the total cost of federal, state and local government was \$101.5 billion, or \$646 for every man, woman and child in the United States — more than enough for the down payment on a new car.

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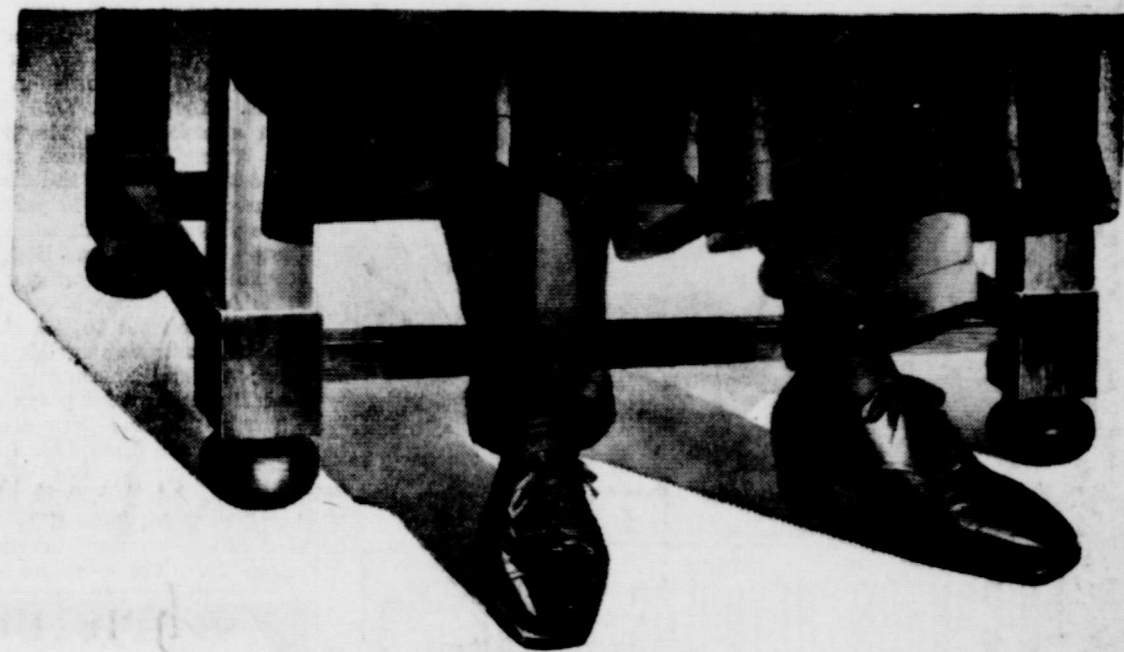

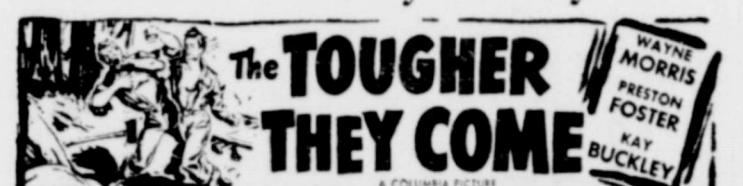
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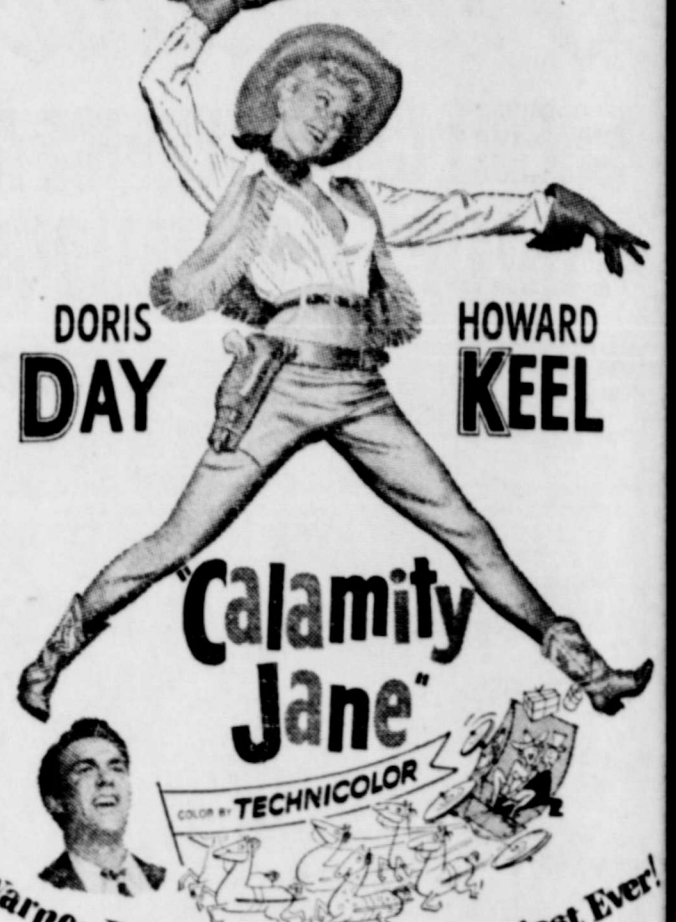
