WASHINGTON (AP)—The House Appropriations Committee laid the groundwork today for a public-vs.-private power fight in a \$577,324,408 Interior Department money bill for the year beginning July 1.

Reclamation Project Funds Are Slashed

WASHINGTON (AP)—The House Appropriations Committee today approved President Truman's record-breaking reclamation program but said it should cost less than expected.

It cut the President's requests for funds to construct reclamation projects by 15 percent. The committee said, however, that the amounts recommended were insufficient, the reclamation bureau may come back at a later date for more money.

As a basis for its action, the committee said that construction costs have been declining since last October.

President Truman had asked for a total of \$350,450,455 to carry on reclamation construction during the year beginning July 1. The committee recommended only \$296,550,857 when it reported the Interior Department money bill today.

The bulk of construction money requested by President Truman would go to six major projects. Here is how they are affected by the committee's recommendations, proposed funds listed first, recommendations second:

- Davis Dam, Arizona-Nevada—\$38,739,000; \$32,928,150; Central Valley, Calif.—\$83 million; Col. L. L. Lamm, \$33,550,000; Colorado—\$18,750,000; Hungry Horse, Mont.—\$24 million dollars; 20,400,000; Columbia Basin, Wash.—\$69,500,000; \$59,075,000; Missouri River Basin—\$37,150,000; \$33,822,500.

Funds recommended for other projects included: Rio Grande, N. M.—\$17,000.

Plan to Delay Money Bills Challenged

AUSTIN (AP)—The Senate Finance Committee's plan to delay action on all but the major must-approve bills was sharply challenged in the House today.

It passed the million dollar Lamar College bill to third reading after refusing by a vote of 91 to 38 to postpone action on it for two weeks.

Backers on the bill were unable to muster enough votes to suspend the rules and push it through to final passage today.

The Senate Finance Committee wants this session to act on the necessary bill to finance an established state services before going into such appropriations as the Lamar College bill and others in the same category. It announced last week it would not even consider them in committee until the major bills are disposed of.

The Senate Finance Committee also wants this Legislature to make all appropriations for one year only, instead of the usual two years, then come back into special session next January. At that time it would make appropriations for the second year of the next two fiscal periods, and also consider the need for a new tax bill.

The delay was urged on grounds that requests for funds are so big that the state will go in the red if a new tax is not levied.

FHA Plan for Mortgage Makes Financing Easy

Financing the purchase or construction of a home is the first step in home ownership, and financing plans available today made home financing easier and less burdensome than ever before, according to the Construction Research Bureau, New York clearing house for building information.

There are three main sources of mortgage money: Savings banks; insurance companies; and commercial banks, private individuals and institutions like colleges and churches write home mortgages to lesser degrees.

The three main types of lenders are competing for home loans and have developed plans to fit the needs of almost every borrower. It is best to shop for mortgage money by visiting the mortgage officers of several lending institutions.

The FHA plan for home ownership is more widely used than any other. Last year the FHA insured loans on 400,510 dwelling units. The Federal Housing Administration lends no money but insures the lender against loss.

Free Heat From Sun Keeps Solar House Hot in Winter

The solar house is emerging as a new architectural type since it has been proven practicable in Boston, Toronto and other Northern localities. As interest and research in the solar house advance, more of these sun-harnessing homes can be expected, it is said by the Construction Research Bureau, New York clearing house for building information. The solar house is attractive with its forthright modern design, incorporating large picture windows and open room-planning.

Originating in regions with mild winters, solar houses are now being erected everywhere as architects learn how to trap heat from the sun and save fuel. One such house in Massachusetts has no heating plant, derives all of its winter warmth from the sun, which is stored in a sodium compound.

In its simplest form, a solar house is one with the largest possible area of glass exposed to the south. This is called "solar orientation." While the solar house can be of any architectural design, best results come with low or flat roofs and wide overhanging eaves for protection from summer sun and winter storms. A solar house is not a glass house; it is one in which glass areas are placed scientifically in relation to the sun.

Solar heating is possible because the sun is low in the sky in winter and hence its rays can penetrate far into the house. Infra-red rays of the sun pass through the glass on a short wave-length, strike and warm objects within the room, and are re-radiated on a longer wave-length which will not pass out through the glass. Solar heat is available even if the sun is not shining, it having been found that on a hazy day the radiation amounts to from 80 to 85 percent on a dull day from 5 to 80 percent.

Once the sun's warmth is inside the house, it must be trapped to prevent its quick escape. Full-thick batts or blankets of mineral wool in walls and roof will retain the greatest amount of heat, say Construction Research Bureau engineers after studying a solar house near Boston so insulated. In another excellent solar house at Northfield, Ill., where temperatures range from 20 below zero to 100 above, every principal room is exposed to the south with an almost continuous wall of glass. Heat is retained in winter and excluded in summer by mineral wool insulation in the flat roof and exterior walls of cavity brick. Insulation is essential in a solar house and it has been found that full-thick mineral wool saves 71 percent of the heat which normally escapes through uninsulated roof and walls. In summer, the insulation prevents excessive amounts of heat from passing through the flat or low roof into the living quarters.

The fact that a solar house must have its glass areas exposed to the south does not mean that all solar houses must be built on the north side of the street. If the building plat is on the south side, the living room with its wide windows can be placed at the rear. If on east or west side of the street, solar heating is utilized by planning the windows for the south side of the house. No benefit is obtained through sun shining on east or west windows because the winter sun rises late in the southeast and

sets early in the southwest. A wide roof overhang above the solar windows, required to shut out rays of the summer sun, does not interfere with winter sunlight because the sun is lower in the sky; control of spring and fall sunlight is not important, the weather then being more temperate.

A large building plot 75 to 100 feet wide is essential for the most effective application of solar heating principles. Some communities are taking this into account in current community planning because of the growing popularity of the solar house. Basic principles can be used, however, on any plot. On a 50-foot width, the living-dining-room and at least one bedroom of a one-story house can face south. A solar house need not be limited to one story; effective use of the sun is possible with a two-story plan on a narrow plot.

If the solar windows face the street, privacy can be secured by hedge plantings at the sidewalk line, or by the use of clerestory windows.

Construction of a solar house costs about the same as a conventional home. Chief difference is the scientific planning and a design placing as much of the living area as possible on the south, with halls, stairs, bath, service areas, kitchen and garage on the north.

Rehabilitation of old houses can, in a great many instances, provide years of added service for dwellings which are now deteriorating. Thousands of such homes become unusable each year as a result of long periods of neglect.

Through modernization and repair, the experts explain, the life of those houses can be prolonged considerably. Rejuvenation of old dwellings can be a sound investment for the future too, authorities assert. They say that many modernized homes will prove more attractive to buyers and renters than houses built during the postwar shortage.

This belief is based on the fact that older homes usually are conveniently situated near schools, churches, shopping centers and transportation facilities. With the modern building materials now available it is possible to spruce up a run-down house at moderate cost, provided it is structurally sound.

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Plan Spring Cleaning in Easy Stages

Spring cleaning needn't be a tiresome or time-consuming chore, according to home economists, who have proved that the key to easier household cleaning lies in the proper selection of equipment and in a systematic work schedule.

The best way to begin, they say, is to assemble all cleaning aids in one spot, ready for immediate use. These should include soft cloths, brushes, brooms, galvanized steel pails, mops, dustpans, sponges, chamois skins, waxes, polishes, bleaches and old newspapers.

Their second recommendation is to use modern equipment. They favor the practice of scrubbing floors by hand, for example, when such cleaning can be done so easily with a long handled mop and a galvanized steel mop wringer pail.

Modern vacuum cleaners and their attachments are recommended for the same reason. Vacuum cleaners are especially convenient for dusting venetian blinds, books and other hard-to-get-at places. Most modern equipment saves time as well as labor.

After all necessary articles are assembled, homemakers are advised to plan work routines. To allow time for other duties and to avoid over-fatigue, it is suggested that housecleaning be done during the morning hours only. A practical cleaning schedule might include cleaning the following furnishings and places on successive days: walls and woodwork, windows, closets, furniture, rugs and floors.

After a cleaning schedule has been prepared, certain chores on it may be assigned to teen-age children and to fathers. When they see for themselves a list of all the work that has to be done, they will be glad to help during their spare time.

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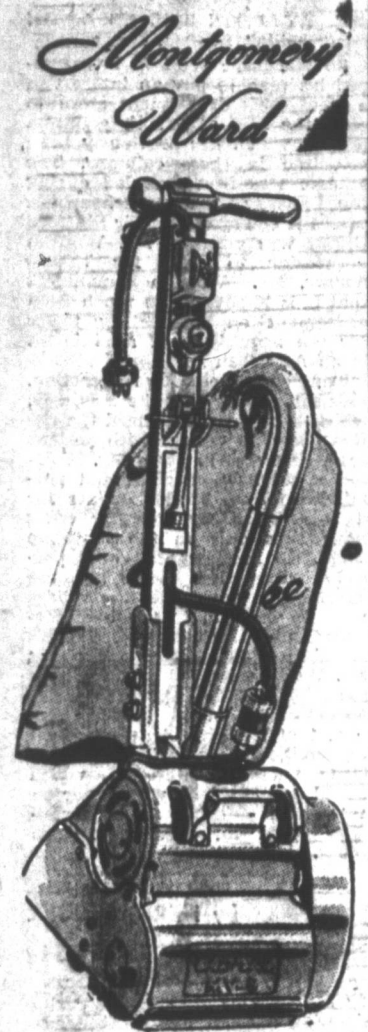

SARASOTA, Fla. — When you consider what happened to the Boston Red Sox pitching staff last year, you can marvel the more at the job Joe McCarthy and the rest of the squad did. It was an amazing performance, proving again the managerial ability of Marce Joe and the strength of the Red Sox outside of the pitching.

In 1948 the Red Sox won the pennant and came within a

young mound talent to go with Joe Debus, Jack Kramer, Ellis Kinder, Denny Galehouse, Mel Parnell, Earl Johnson, Ferriss, Hughson and Harris.

He is taking a good long look at Maurice McDermott, John McCall, Frank Quinn, Mike Palm, John Hofmann and Will Nixon. All have shown promise. If two or three come through, it will ease a terrific problem for Joe.

The Red Sox have a brilliant infield with Goodman, Doerr, Stephens and Pesky. And if Walter Dropo, the 220-pound 6-6 rookie, continues to hit, Goodman may be moved to right field to make room for Dropo at first.

The Sox need a rightfielder to hook up with Williams and DiMaggio. Stan Spence, a flop last year, may fill the bill. Other rookies — George Wilson, Tom Wright or Tom O'Brien — may win a regular berth.

Birdie Tebbetts and Matt Batts give the Sox adequate protection behind the plate.

BETTER BOWLING
By BILLY SIXTY
NATURAL FORCES: You can develop a well-controlled hook with natural wrist action. First, check your grip. Using wrist action for the right-to-left spin, the thumb should be pointed approximately at the LEFT HIP, so the fingers are on the forward-right-side of the ball.

Do not grip the ball tightly when taking the stance. Only after the ball has been pushed away from the body and the right hand takes over as the ball drops into the downward arc of the backswing does the grip become firm.

The weight of the ball must be in the left hand during the stance. The thumb and fingers (or finger) are fitted into the holes with completely relaxed feeling as the ball is held in the PALM of the left hand.

An AUTOMATIC wrist turn to the right during the backswing results when holding the ball in such position. Keep in mind that the turn comes naturally with the swing, and that, with the natural forces creating wrist turn, the extent of the turn will find the hand near the position shown in the illustration. The thumb is then pointed slightly forward on the LEFT side of the ball, with the hand well behind.

The swing must be unhurried if the wrist turn is to be completed so that the hand can return to the position it was in originally after the ball has been released. The wrists must turn with the swing with no effort to turn it forcibly.
