Five thousand canaries, forty pet parrots, 150 parrots, two boa constrictors were burned alive in an animal store last week. The animals died in their cages, lamenting in strange voices. All of them, except the two boas, were baboons, and this great advantage over man, they did not know that they were going to die.

CITY ELECTION NEXT TUESDAY

THREE ALDERMEN TO ELECT
AND COMMISSION GOVERNMENT QUESTION TO BE DECIDED

Next Tuesday, April 6th is election day in Perryton and the coming event has so far caused very little, if any, excitement. For some reason the people of Perryton have suddenly become very apathetic in regard to the city administration. There are three aldermen to elect and the Commission form of government is coming up and neither one is causing much street talk. Something is wrong. We're going to sleep. Perryton is the best town in the North Panhandle but we don't want to rest on that honor. We want to keep interested and keep on building till it is the best town in North Texas.

There has been very little discussion concerning the proposed question of Commission government. The Commission form of government, to be brief, is just this. If the voters of this city vote for Commission form, they must at the same time vote for two commissioners who with our present Mayor, Mr. F. P. Rogers, will form the governing body of the city. They will be the only elective officers. All other city officers and city employees will be hired (and also fired) at their discretion. They are also the sole and only judge as to how many officers and employees need to be placed on the city payroll. It is a very simple form of city government that is now in effect in many cities (both large and small) in the United States. There are but few cases on record where a city has ever returned to the Aldermanic form of government after adopting the Commission form. There is no question but what the Commission form of government has wonderful opportunities for the saving of many dollars in the expense of administering the city government.

At the same time of voting for or against the Commission plan, the ballot for the election of three aldermen will be voted. It will be necessary to vote for three aldermen to succeed Col. Ed Littleton, J. L. Donley and Jno. N. Stump whose terms expire at this time. If the Commission form fails the three aldermen elected will take their office, but if

it carries, they will not serve.

The polling place for this election is at the Courthouse and the polls will be open from 8:00 a. m. to 7:00 p. m. Col. J. M. North and J. L. Dodson will have charge of same.

BIGGEST SNOW THIS WINTER

WORTH THOUSANDS OF DOLLARS TO FARMERS OF THIS LOCALITY — INSURES WHEAT CROP

The snow which started falling on last Saturday has practically insured a small grain crop for the farmers of the southwest. It was worth millions of dollars to the small grain producers of the southwest. On Saturday night, the government gauge showed two inches of snow. Then after letting up Sunday, it started again early Monday morning and the white flakes did not stop falling until about noon on Tuesday. A conservative estimate of the entire fall would be about twelve inches. The snow was laden with moisture and did not drift very much, the fields being covered on a level with six to eight inches.

With the splendid condition of the wheat crop and the season already in the ground, this snow almost insures a wheat crop. One or two small rains will make most crops. With at least 100,000 acres in wheat in the Perryton trade territory, a yield of from one and one-half to two million bushels is expected to be produced. From present indications a good price will be obtained this year. It looks like a big year for the farmers and business men of Ochiltree and Beaver counties.

SCHOOL STARTS MONDAY NIGHT

SHORT COURSE ON COTTON
RAISING AND MARKETING
FOR FARMERS OF THIS
COMMUNITY

Much interest has been manifested by the farmers of this territory in the announcement that a night school on cotton raising would be held at the Perryton school by R. J. Cook, the vocational agriculture instructor of the school. This course will start on next Monday evening at eight o'clock and everyone interested in cotton in anyway is invited to attend. It will be free to all and the success of the school depends upon the co-operation of all. The school will hold classes one or two nights out of each week, the time and number of nights to be decided by those who enroll.

Meetings were held at Lone Tree, Farnsworth and Union last week by Mr. Cook. He made a short and to-the-point talk on diversified farming at each of these places. The Perryton High school orchestra, under the direction of Mr. Hyde, gave a short concert at each meeting.

Many farmers have signified their intention of entering the cotton contest which is being sponsored by the Perryton Chamber of Commerce. In this contest a cash prize of \$250.00 will be given to the person who produces the most cotton on ten acres of land. The Perryton Chamber of Commerce is not advocating a big acreage of cotton and neither does it advocate a great big acreage of wheat or any other crop but it does believe in diversification and that the raising of some cotton each year will add another crop to our diversified farming program. There is no doubt but that cotton can be successfully produced at a good profit in this locality. Numbers of men have made good money on cotton and what one can do, why all can do if the proper methods are pursued. That is why this school will be held. There are many farmers here who have never raised cotton or even lived in a community where it was raised. Hence they know nothing of how to go about it. Mr. Cook was raised in exclusive cotton country, he has farmed it for many years and he will be able to instruct from both the practical and scientific viewpoint.

TRUSTEE ELECTION TOMORROW

ELECTIONS WILL BE HELD TO
SELECT FOUR NEW MEMBERS FOR INDEPENDENT SCHOOL BOARD

An election to select four trustees for the Perryton Independent School District will be held at various school houses in the district, tomorrow, Saturday, April 3rd. The polls will be open from 8:00 a. m. to 6 p. m. The following judges will have charge of the elections:

Those whose terms expire at this time are President W. B. LaMaster, D. D. Taliaferro, A. C. Witt and B. L. Barnes. Mr. LaMaster who has served so efficiently as President of the board for the past four years absolutely refuses to serve another term. A petition was circulated and many people signed it asking him to let his name be put on the ticket again but Mr. LaMaster had to refuse on account of the great amount of time required. During his tenure in office W. B. has given unstintingly of his time to the interests of the school and the present high state of efficiency in the district is in a large measure due to him and the whole hearted co-operation given him by the other members of the board. D. D. Taliaferro of the Lone Tree community, who is now serving his second term, consented to have his name placed on the ballot, after a mass meeting was held at the Lone Tree school for the purpose of selecting a candidate. Those present voted as one for Mr. Taliaferro. Mr. Taliaferro has made an excellent trustee and has given freely of his time to look after the affairs of the district. The other two retiring members of the board have both made good in every sense of the word. Mr. A. C. Witt is entitled to retirement on full pay (?), for he has been a member of the board for three or four terms.

The following names will appear on the ballot: Miss Nellie M. Perry, D. D. Taliaferro, L. L. Lance and L. R. Conner. In addition to the above four names, there will be four blank lines for the purpose of voting for any person or persons whose name is not on the ballot. If you do not want to vote for any one or all of the names printed on the ballot, you can draw a line through the one or ones that you do not want and then write in the name or names of the persons you wish to vote for. Remember there are four to elect.

Friends have caused the names of all four candidates to be placed on the ticket. Miss Nellie M. Perry served for several years as a member of the board and in our opinion was a very capable officer and should be elected again. Mr. L. L. Lance is one of our successful farmers and stock raisers. He lives on a ranch west of Perryton in the Farnsworth vicinity and also has a residence here in Perryton where his family lives during the school months. He is well qualified for the office and there is no question in our minds but what he is capable of making a good trustee. L. R. Conner, manager of the Equity business at Farnsworth, is well qualified to fill this important position. He is a level headed business man, well liked by all and has children in both the Farnsworth and Perryton schools.

Rev. and Mrs. J. S. Huckabee of the Methodist Church returned last Friday from Glen Rose, Texas where Rev. Huckabee conducted a series of revival meetings for the Methodist Church of that city. The meeting was very successful and a large number were converted and became members of the church. Mrs. Huckabee visited with relatives at Rockdale and Georgetown while gone and Mr. Huckabee also visited with his relatives at Fort Worth and other points in that locality before returning.

BACKING HIS CONVICTIONS

A lawyer in New York City wrote his brother who is head of a New York state county bank, in regard to the use of government printed envelopes by the bank. He said: "I know their convenience and doubtless they are cheaper, but in these days the various classes of industry and business realize the necessity of fighting against the further encroachment of the government and state into business, it is rather inconsistent for any business, to encourage government competition with its own citizens. So far as the envelopes are concerned, the government is in the business tax free; and if it can manufacture, sell and distribute envelopes in competition with private enterprise, which must pay the taxes to maintain the government, there is no good reason why it should not invade other fields of business. Each industrial function taken over in the government adds an increased tax burden on the private citizen and property-owner. I think that when the present supply of government envelopes is exhausted, we should purchase our envelopes from a private printer who pays taxes to maintain our government, even if it makes us lick our own stamps and causes us to pay a little more for the printing. Think it over".—Dalhart Texan.

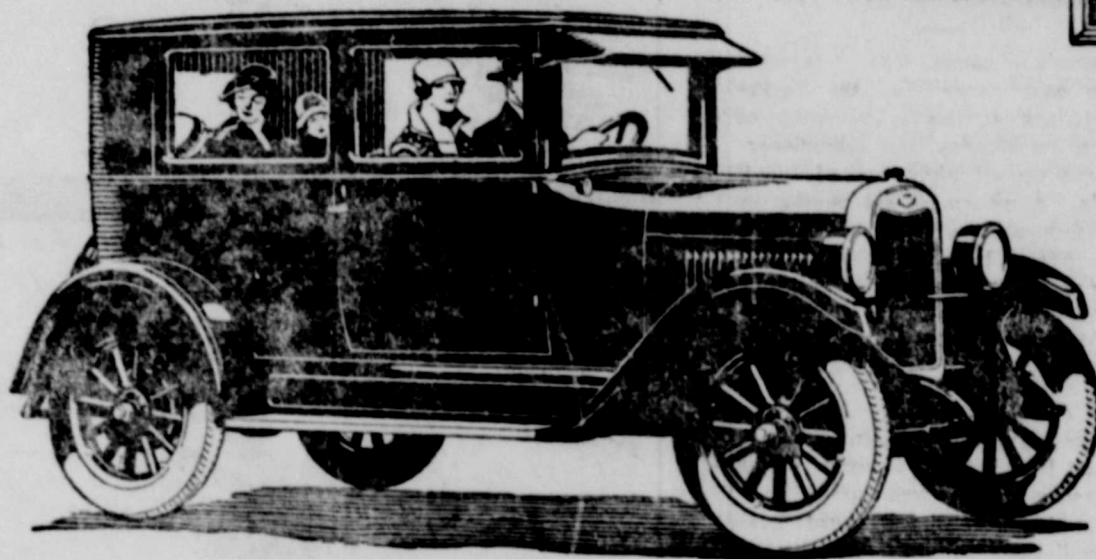

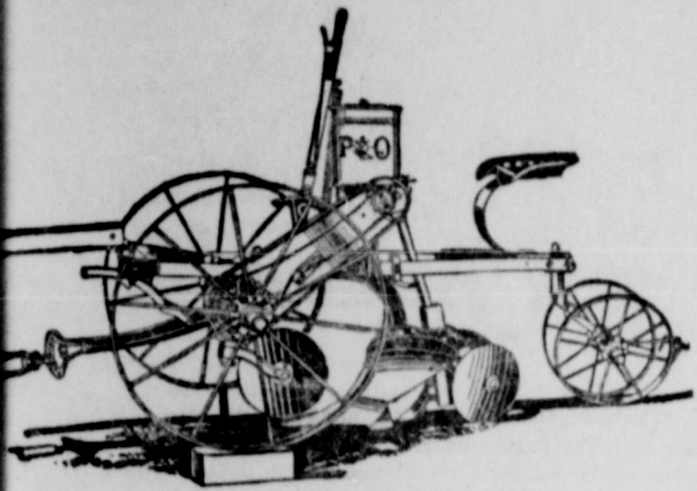

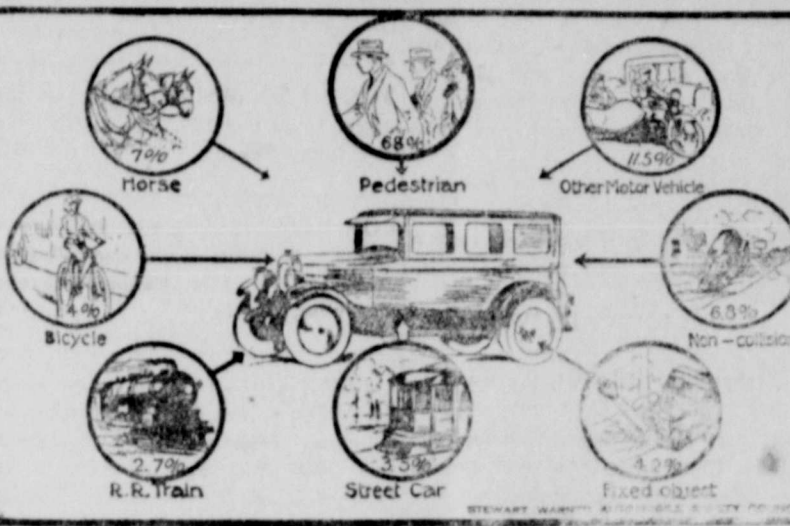

Pedestrian Greatest Victim of Automobile Accidents



THE PEDESTRIAN is the greatest sufferer in automobile fatalities, according to records analyzed by the Stewart-Warner Safety Council for the prevention of automobile accidents. No complete record is available for the United States as a whole, but a report based on 3,927 auto fatalities occurring in the first seven months of 1925, covering a population of thirty-one million is significant. Two thousand of these 3,927 fatalities have been classified according to type. Sixty-eight per cent of the victims were pedestrians, 11 per cent with another motor vehicle; 7 per cent with bicyclists, 4.2 with fixed objects such as lamp posts, 3.5 per cent with street cars, 2.7 with railways, trains and 1.4 per cent with bicycles. The remaining 6.9 per cent involved no collision. The small proportion involving railway trains is encouraging and doubtless due to the gradual abolition of unguarded grade crossings. The menace to the pedestrian, however, is alarming, and calls for greater care on his part in crossing streets and on the drivers for more careful driving.

CO-OPERATIVE MARKETING

(By Genevieve Wimber, Lone Tree)
(Winner of Second prize in recent contest)

Perhaps the first thing you want to know is the meaning of co-operative marketing. It means the farmers must organize and stand for the right. If they are organized they can set their prices to suit themselves and not to the advantage of the Board of Trade at Chicago.

The farmers are the only people who do not have co-operation. They have been waiting sixty years for congress to pass a law to help them, but this law has never been passed. If the farmers are helped they must help themselves.

Co-operative marketing is not new. The people of the medieval ages realized its value. They organized guilds to protect their interests, finally growing so strong they held a commercial monopoly. Again we remember how the Pilgrims, who came over in the Mayflower, drew up a contract and agreement in which they agreed to pool all of their resources for the first seven years. The farmers are independent and individualistic by nature and haven't taken kindly to the idea of being organized and driven in droves by others. But they will have to come to it.

The farmers, being unorganized, work against one another and can get for their products only a fraction of what they are really worth. The farmers are going in a circle. They borrow money to raise a crop, rush it to the market, dump it below the cost of production, go to raise another crop; and so goes the circle from year to year. We see plainly the farmers shall never have anything if they keep this up. If the farmers continue this speculative method they shall never get out of debt. No, they never shall.

Co-operative marketing is beneficial in many ways. It teaches the farmers to trust each other. It encourages community spirit, it increases bank deposits and saves money for the farmers. This plan will return the money to the farmers and not to the big men of the cities.

Why let the Board of Trade at Chicago control our market? There is no reason why they should. If the farmers organize, they are sure to make a success, for farm products are essential to life itself.

The editor of the Oklahoma Stockman, after a careful study of the situation, says co-operative marketing is the only thing that will take the gamble out of the wheat market. How will co-operative marketing do this? Now, supply and demand have nothing to do with the prices. The co-operative method would control the flow and adjust the actual demand.

The wheat of the United States is finally sold to the millers and exporters. The organized farmers, by pooling and selling direct to the millers and exporters, eliminate speculation, waste, stabilize the price and the wheat farmers get a fair return for their labor and investment.

FAMOUS FORTS IN U. S. HISTORY

By ELMO SCOTT WATSON

Boonesborough, Symbol of Frontier America

Boonesborough is more than Kentucky's most famous fort. It is a national landmark whose palisaded walls symbolize the American frontier and its name stands as a monument to the memory of Daniel Boone, the one great American pioneer. Brief as was its existence, there are few forts with a more romantic history.

In 1775 Col. Richard Henderson, a North Carolina land speculator, sent Daniel Boone to survey a road into Kentucky, the "Dark and Bloody Ground," and to build a fort there. Boone set out with 20 men and, after several skirmishes with hostile Indians, he reached his goal April 1, and on April 29 began building a fort.

Since Boonesborough was typical of all frontier forts, it is worthy of description. At each of the four corners was a two-story blockhouse. A series of little cabins placed close together, with their roofs sloping inward, was built along the sides, and the space in between these cabins was filled up with palisades. There were heavy gates in front and back and the whole fort inclosed a space 200 feet long and 150 feet wide. The walls, which were about twelve feet high, were loopholed for rifle fire, and there was hardly a nail or piece of iron in it.

From the date of its establishment there was always something thrilling taking place. In July, 1776, occurred the capture of the Boone and Callaway girls and their romantic rescue soon afterwards. The next year the Indians attacked Boonesborough and Simon Kenton made his famous rescue of Daniel Boone. In September of that year the British and Indians again besieged the fort after they had called out the frontiersmen for a council, and their treacherous attack under the white flag had failed. During this siege the Indians tried to get into the fort by digging under it. "What are you red rascals doing there?" one old frontiersman yelled to the savages in their own tongue. "Digging," was the return yell. "Blow you all to the devil soon; what you do?" "Oh," was the cheerful reply, "we're digging to meet you and intend to bury 500 of you."

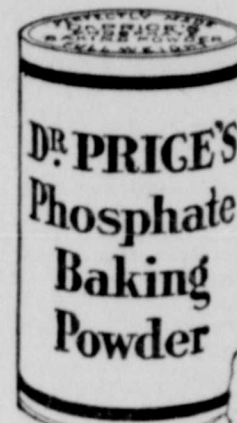
Such were the incidents which make up the history of Boonesborough. After the Indian wars were over this pioneer station lost its importance and never became the metropolis of the state of Kentucky, as it once promised to do. Today Boonesborough is noted as a pleasure resort where hundreds go every year to play—a strange contrast to the grim scenes it witnessed in the days of Daniel Boone.

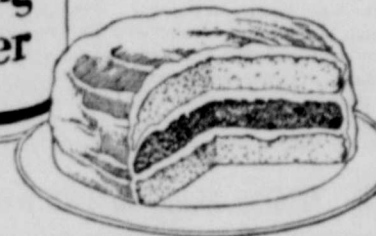

About Your Health

Things You Should Know



by John Joseph Chimes, M.D.

INVISIBLE POISON

We have no antidote for carbon monoxide intoxication—no advice to give except keep away from it, and this is obviously impossible in our crowded thoroughfares.

The danger-point is the end of the exhaust-pipe of the engine producing it.

Within every physician's clientele may be found dozens of people who suffer from indescribable weakness and inefficiency, many of them with poisoned hearts, the cause of which has not yet been determined. Many of them work around garages, and places where monoxide gas is in the air. They suffer from typical effects

of gas poisoning, more emphatically true, if their eliminative channels are in good working order, and if there are no evidences of bacterial invasion. It is very difficult to restore these patients; we advise pure air, when that essential to life is becoming harder to find.

Most gases are lighter than air, I do not know the weight of carbon monoxide gas, but I believe that the human level may become heavily saturated with it, enough to produce slow poisoning, before it rises to higher strata, while in damp weather in low temperatures, it may become positively dangerous to health if not to life. Clearly it is the duty of our research laboratories to find a means of protecting our people from unsuspected dangers. Let's have a "transformer" at the end of the exhaust pipe of the family car.

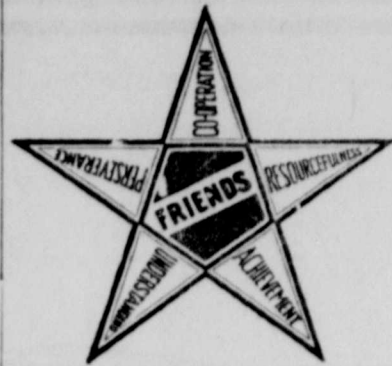


SANTA FE NOT SO HEARTLESS AFTER ALL
