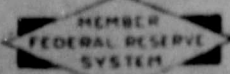

County Health Notes

From the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas and United States Department of Agriculture, co-operating.

"The hot supplementary dish for school children." The greatest responsibility of the present generation is the bettering the condition of the school child. It has been said that the most worthy of all tasks is to make the world fit for the child and the child fit for the world. There is one way to benefit the child which we cannot overlook, and that is to give the child the food which is the most important part of his school life. Regular meals in developing strong bodies and a healthy strong body betters mental faculty.

Are you willing to hold off from the child that which you know will be of positive benefit to him?

When we realize that one out of every three of the boys of selective draft age was discarded because of physical defectiveness which was frequently traceable to wrong food habits established early in life, then we cannot turn our backs on the responsibility of the women of to-day.

Since about one fourth of the school children meals are taken at the school, the teacher must feel a responsibility if she is a conscientious individual. It takes such a little of the teacher's time in return for the advantages to the child.

A few of these advantages as observed by those teachers who have done the work are as follows:

- 1—Greater resistance to disease on the part of the child; due to better health and physical condition.
- 2—Better school work due to better

health conditions.

- 3—Better school attendance as result of enjoyment of work by children.
- 4—Higher average in scholarship, better report cards.
- 5—Better digestion resulting from better selected balanced rations, slower eating, thorough chewing, quickened digestion of heated food, prevention of over or under feeding.
- 6—Better table manners.
- 7—Better serving.
- 8—Sanitation taught in clearing away food.
- 9—Less incorrigibility.
- 10—Cultural and educational advantages due to association during lunch hour.
- 11—Children learn to think for themselves in preparing lunch, make and carry out plans.
- 12—Learn to work with others, developing community spirit and citizenship.
- 13—Learn to work quickly and neatly.
- 14—Learn food values, information is carried by children into the home.

You will find an excuse for his own acts the basis of every man's philosophy.

It is generally conceded now that the most difficult mathematical problem of the day is trying to make both ends meet.

Men used to look upon work as a glorious privilege of the human faculties, and to do the work for work's sake. Now most of them deem it a degrading servitude, to be done with reluctance and grudging inefficiency.

Amos Cummins said when asked what news was, that "when a man bites a dog instead of the dog biting the man, that was news." Well, then b'gosh, we wish some guy around here would get busy and bite a dog.

In the hill section of Vermont the other day an old codger was found on an isolated rocky farm who had not yet heard of the war with Germany, and had never heard of a Ford car. "Where ignorance is bliss it's folly to be wise."

If four million men are out of work it is due, to some extent, to the fact that eight million women are holding down jobs who never used to do that sort of thing. The more the women go out to work the less jobs there are bound to be for the men. Better get married.

Girls took men's jobs during the war and have since refused to give them up. This makes it impossible for the man to accumulate a wife and family, and there you are. And you may argue yourself black in the face the fact remains that God intended women to have babies.

One cartoon shows Mr. Congress in a quandary as to which of the tax axes to use on the neck of the rooster, which has its head on the block and is labeled Common People. A lot of difference it makes to the bird what kind of an axe chops its head off.

Arthur Brisbane asks why it is that our government pays Wall Street brokers big commissions on borrowed money when it could issue its own bonds and save all such expense. Strange as smart a man as Brisbane does not know as simple a little thing as that. Friend Broker needs the money.

We are bringing up our boys and girls now with so many more modern conveniences than we had in youth, so much more spending money and so many gayeties and pleasures, that they are fast developing an abnormal aversion to work. This applies also to the young men and women, as well as to the boys and girls. The trend of their minds is more toward joyrides and less and less toward work.

Notwithstanding the unemployment, more young people have entered colleges this fall than ever before, and the banks of the country report more and larger savings accounts, so the country is bound to pull through readjustment safely, in spite of high living costs and abnormal taxation. More than half of all the gold in the world is now glutting the vaults of this country. And on top of everything else good there is being harvested billions in bumper crops.

One thing learned by the members of the unemployment conference held in Washington was that the figures show that the unemployment is not nearly as bad as has been reported. The total number of unemployed persons, they found, was two millions less than estimated, and was finally fixed at four millions, which of course, includes thousands who are habitually unemployed all their lives, from too much riches or too much cussedness. This, in a population of 110,000,000 is not considered bad under present industrial conditions. The conference did much good and the effects are already noticeable.

BE THANKFUL FOR COMFORTS

We are as a people prone to grouch and complain because we have not more comforts, conveniences and luxury than we do have instead of being very thankful and good natured over the fact that we have many our forefathers never dreamed of and which many other people do not have now. Back in such New England states as Vermont, for instance, the farmers of the hills have already been busy for two months working up their winter's supply of wood, and it takes them about half of their summers to prepare for the rigors of winter. There each has to work up great piles of wood, cords and cords of it, and pile it neatly in their sheds. The sheds are connected by passage with the house, and from them other passages lead into the implement and storage sheds, where the hay, the grain and vegetables are stored, as well as the implements, and out of all these one walks into the stables and barns for the horses and cattle, where the milking is done, etc. All these are connected up together and under roofs, owing to the severe winters and storms of long duration. In California, Florida, Texas and many other states people work out of doors the year round; they have fruit and flowers on their tables at all times and seasons; they do not bother their heads or pocket-books about such things as coal and wood as comparatively they use very little. Prosperity is much more plentiful to one who can work the year round than to he who has to be housed up from the storms half the year. If we have fairly good health and are able to work, there is no earthly reason why we as a people should not daily and nightly give thanks for the many blessings we enjoy, instead of grouching, grumbling and growling like a bear with a sore head.

Germany still declares vehemently that the bill she is called on to pay is a crime against civilization. Well, she certainly ought to know a crime against civilization when she sees it.

It is a very easy for any and all of us to tell just how the government ought to be run, and yet at the same time many of us find it quite a job to run our own little business.

HOME TRADE IS PATRIOTISM

The patriotism that does not include its own nest, its own family and its own surroundings is not much of a patriotism, nationally or any other way. We should all think of these things continually, for they are vital to our best interests and welfare, and the best interests of our family, friends and neighbors. There is always argument on both sides of any question, but the basic fact remains, just the same, and we should not lose sight of those basic facts. As a rule goods can be purchased in the home town as cheap as in other towns or cities; not all things, but the majority of the commodities which we all use. Some article may be a bit higher once in a while, but it is equally true that some are often a bit lower, and the whole monthly account will balance pretty well, taking it up one side and down the other. But even if it did cost a trifle more to trade at home than to send money away to cities, still it would be cheaper in the long run to buy at home and let the money circulate around the town, each dollar doing a hundred dollar's worth of business before it finally slips away. If we do not build up our home town there will not be any home town, and all are investments in it, for homes or anything else, will fall flat, and we all lose out. Any way you want to look at this trading away from home business it figures out a loss in the long run for everybody who engages in it as a regular thing.

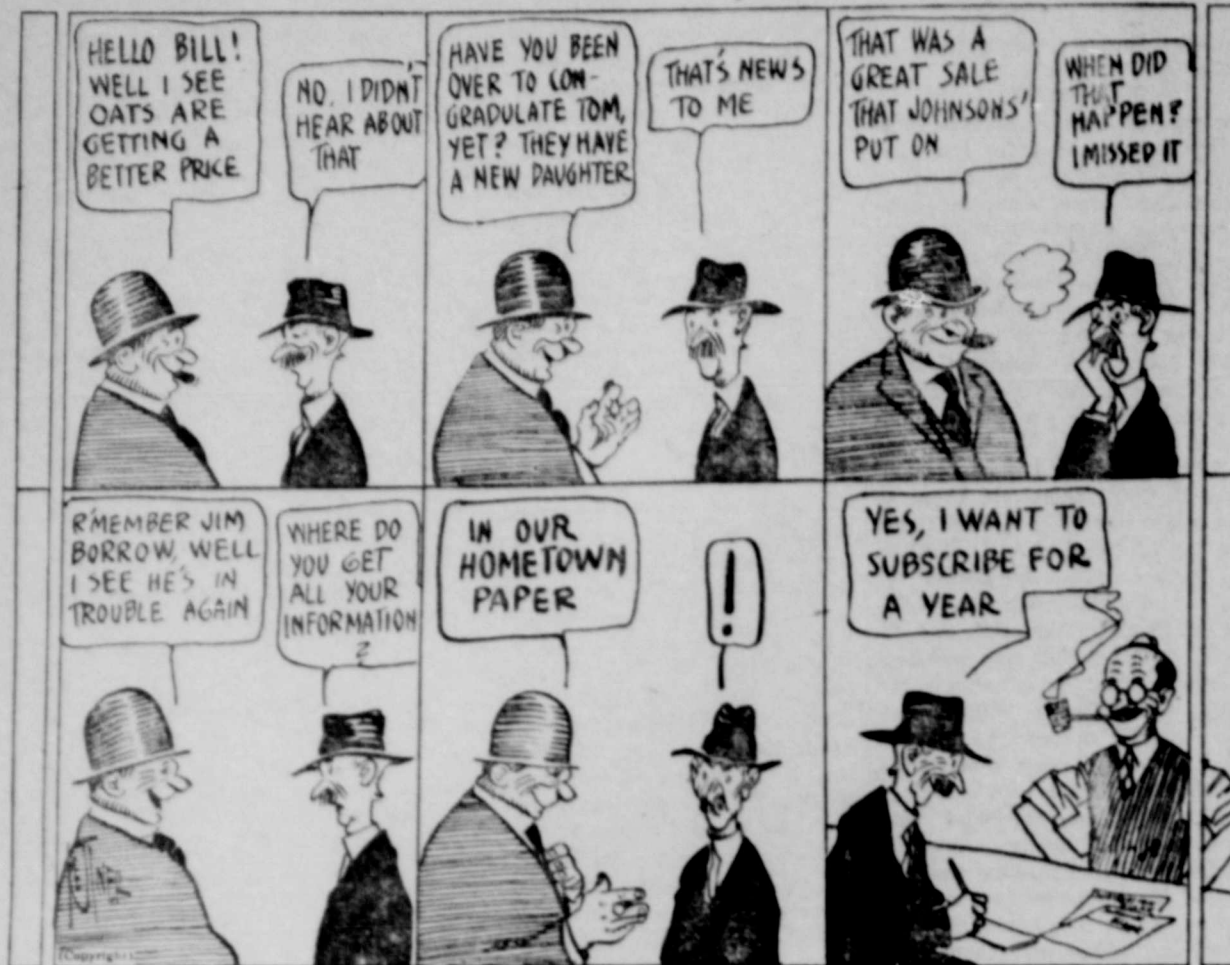

FOUND HOME IN HEART OF THE ROCKIES

And Through It Peddler Learned That Family He Had Known for Fifty Years Were His Relatives.

"Publishing a country newspaper reminds me of tossing a pebble into the ocean. We never know how far the circles which it sets in motion will reach," said William Manley, publisher of The Plaindealer of Canton, N. Y., the other day, in speaking of "Subscribe for Your Home Town Paper Week," which is to be observed the country over the week of November 7-12. "I had a good reminder of this not long ago," he went on.

"One day there appeared in the Plaindealer office a short, stubby, robust man of probably sixty. I knew the minute I saw him that he had come in from the big outdoors in some section. He told me that he had taken the paper for many years, probably forty, ever since he had left Canton, where he was born. He told me where I would find the paper going, and I found it. His post office was in a little town in the Rockies. He

said he had come back to the old town to live. He paid what he owed and a year-over for good measure, and then he sat down and I knew something was coming.

Forty Years in the Mountains. "Say," said he, "newspapers are great things. You can never tell what they are going to do for you. I have been a peddler out in the mountains for forty years, making my trips, me and the little burro, about once in six months. There were a lot of long jumps between houses. For fifteen years I had been going out of my trail, about five miles to one side, to sell to a family that had moved in. You get rather well acquainted with people if you see them once in six months for that long, so when I got there one afternoon and didn't find anyone home—just the door unlocked, as all doors were there—I went in and made myself comfortable, and when supper time came I didn't hesitate about hunting around for grub. And while I was doing it I found a copy of the Plaindealer on the kitchen shelf, and one or two more around the house—the Plaindealer, mind you, the paper I was taking right from the old home town! And I wondered who these fifteen-year-old friends of mine were. I suddenly realized we had never talked over our pedigrees any. "When the family got home that evening I asked questions, and what do you think?—that wife was a sort of grandniece of mine. She hadn't heard of her old uncle off stubbing around in the rocks of the Rockies, and I hadn't ever heard that anyone related to me had ever married and was out there living under another name. Your paper introduced us to each other. I just thought you might like to know about it."

Community's Archives

"Can you tell me the date the Baptist church burned—I mean, of course, the famous fire that all the old inhabitants talk about?"

The librarian looked up from her work. "No, I can't tell you the exact date, but I think I can find it for you quickly, for we have the files of the local paper since it was started. My impression is that the fire—the big fire, as they call it—was about 1873, and it won't be a very long job to look it up."

She went to the stacks in the rear of the library, pulled out a dusty bound volume marked "Herald, 1873," and spread it open on the table. "Ah, here it is," she said, after a minute spent in turning over the yellow leaves.

The person who had inquired for the date, a member of the woman's club of the town, sat down and read the article. "This gives me exactly the information I wanted," she said.

"I thought it would," said the librarian. "I fear most people do not appreciate how valuable is the local newspaper from the viewpoint of local history. In fact, it seems to me that it is about our only source. Only when an event gets into print is it officially recorded and filed for reference. Films as it is, the printed word of today is the counterpart of the ancient stone inscriptions that give us our records of a long-ago yesterday. I consider the bound volumes of our local papers perhaps the most valuable possession of this library."

There's at least one librarian who is giving "Subscribe for Your Home Town Paper Week," which will be observed November 7-12, the most hearty backing she can give.

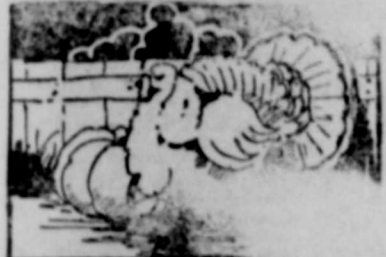

Back to Town Crier

How many residents of any small community have ever considered what might happen if there were no newspapers? Just previous to "Subscribe for Your Home Town Paper Week," which is to be observed the country over November 7-12, is a good time to recall the plight of Macon, Mo., not long ago, when fire put the Chronicle-Herald out of business for two weeks.

According to The Publishers' Auxiliary, the old town crier, relic of many years back, was yanked from his hiding place, dusted off, and put back on his job, with a jangling bell, a megaphone, and a fog-horn voice only a little worse for long disuse.

It may have been a novelty for two weeks. But think of a community without printers' ink, compelled to get its announcements of auctions, sales, court sessions, births, marriages, deaths, epidemics of sickness, dog ordinances, board meetings, commencements, tax notices, advertisements of help and situations wanted, accidents, and the rest, through a shouted word like that of the ordinary train announcer in a city depot. The town crier was a romantic figure in his day, but few towns would like to return to his ministrations now.

When one thinks of the temporary plight of Macon, and that it might become the permanent handicap of many towns, it is well to think of supporting the local paper.

He Knows His Folks.

Here are some random observations of a man who has visited and studied a good many small communities: If you read your local paper you will not miss much that is happening around home. There is no use saying that you wish your town had a paper like one in the other town, for the other fellow there is saying the same thing. The man who reads his local paper thoroughly is usually a pretty good citizen and has it all over the fellow who does not. Local papers, when all is said and done, do more to uphold the institutions of this state and country than any other known contributing force in the world's work.

Random Observations.

This isn't a country publisher talking, but the editor of a farm paper. The metropolitan daily will bring to one's doorstep the news of the world seen through the spectacles of the city editor, but it is the editor who lives in the heart of the community who is able to reflect the sentiment of the local group. He alone is the true interpreter of events as they affect the small town and the farming community that immediately surrounds the town.
