DPS Says 4 Die, 67 Hurt In 123 County Accidents

The Texas Department of Public Safety reports that for the first six months of 1982, 65 persons have been killed in traffic accidents in the Abilene District of the D. P. S. The Abilene District comprises 25 counties in this West Texas area including Callahan County. These 65 deaths were the result of 53 fatal accidents. For the same period in 1981, records indicate that sixty-six (66) deaths resulted from 56 fatal accidents.

In Callahan County for the first six months of 1982, the D. P. S. has recorded four deaths out of one fatal accident and 67 injuries

as the result of 39 injury accidents. D. P. S. troopers in Callahan County have investigated a total of 123 traffic accidents for the first six months of 1982.

For the same period in 1981, in Callahan County, D. P. S. records indicate that four deaths resulted from four fatal accidents and 32 injury accidents occurred with 86 persons injured. A total of 106 accidents occurred during the same period last year.

A survey of the fatal reports for the district shows that driving while intoxicated and speeding was listed as the contributing factor on more of the reports than any other single factor.

Southern & Mineral Wells Savings Firms To Merge

Roy H. Simmons, chairman of the board of Southern Savings and Loan Association of Brownwood, and Paul Schneider, president of Mineral Wells Savings and Loan Association, announced plans to merge the two institutions. during which its savings and lending policies have been broadened dramatically. "This new environment," said President Simmons, "challenges the modern savings and loan to deliver efficiently and effectively a wider range of financial services to the public."

Presidents Simmons and Schneider observed that by combining their respective savings and loans this challenge will be more easily met. The merged institutions will create a greater potential to serve an ever growing range of consumer and business financial requirements. "Moreover," Simmons said, "innovations in the savings and loan business will continue for some years to come. Therefore, this pooling of financial strength and management expertise now will enable us to more readily adapt to these anticipated changes, all to the benefit of the customers we seek to serve."

The merger is subject to approval by the Federal Savings and Loan Insurance Corporation in Washington, D. C., and the Commissioner of the Savings and Loan Department in Austin, Texas. These applications have been filed, and a final determination is expected in the very near future.

Following is an article carried in the July issue of "The Electric Times," a publication of the West Texas Utilities Co., headquartered at Abilene. Headlined "Unique Artist Wins Recognition," along with a photo of the artist, the article read as follows.

"Jeff Womack, who will be a senior next year at McMurry College, and son of Mr. and Mrs. Jimmy (Dean) Womack of Abilene may be described as an artist with a unique feeling for style.

"Jeff, art editor for the 'Galleon,' McMurry's annual literary magazine, won second place recently out of 50 entries in the Texas Intercollegiate Press Association's Division II contest, and was second place overall in the TIPA's contest for the 1981 edition.

"The reason Jeff's style is unique may be seen in the accompanying pen and ink drawing. Tiny vertical lines, which in some way might resemble a seismograph's needle tracing, are placed very artistically to get the desired effect. It is not known whether Jeff is the first or only artist to use this style, but it is done very well.

"He received a certificate of honorable mention from the TIPA for an illustration in the Galleon, and was artist for the cover

of the 1980-81 edition as well as the 1982 edition. He also received a citation for an illustration included in the 1982 collection.

"As a senior, he will remain the art editor for the 1983 edition of the 'Galleon'.

TV and Your Child

Tips From TSTA

The Texas State Teachers Association — partners in your child's education — examines the effect of television on children. Here is Part III, of a four part series on the subject:

TV CAN BE A FAMILY AFFAIR

Have you asked yourself, "What can I do to keep TV from having a harmful effect on my kids?" Try some of these tips which could help you solve the problem.

Watch television with your children. Help them to select the right programs by checking the TV listings in advance. Look for programs that are fair in their treatment of people or programs that are not violent or too sophisticated in content.

Plan with children what shows they can watch — whether you are home or away. Be aware that public television has special programming and that commercial TV produces many excellent shows especially geared to children.

Insist to a limit to TV time. Discuss what's "unreal" on TV and in life. Talk about how violence can be harmful — real people hurt when injured.

Provide adequate light in the television area and watch for tiredness, listlessness, glassy eyes, trance-like states signs of poor health or too much television.

Discuss ways problems might have been solved other than the way they were presented in the TV story.

Turn off the assaults, attacks, and uproars when they appear on your television set. Youngsters need a friendly atmosphere at home without a lot of unnecessary noise or violence.

Correct any language errors your child may hear on television.

Unfortunately, there are mistakes on TV. Why not have fun finding them together?

Make meals a family event — don't eat in front of the TV set. Select food carefully — not what a TV character urges kids to eat. Don't let TV turn your child into the family shopper. Parents should take final responsibility for selecting foods, clothing, toys, etc. When children see things on TV, they may enter a "gimme-get me" stage. Don't give in to demands for junk foods just because children ask for them after they've seen them on TV.

Use TV to widen your child's horizons and to help the family become closer as you watch programs together.

FREE SPEECH AND THE A.C.L.U.

On May 20, 1982, U.S. District Judge John Singleton ruled that the children in Aldine schools, outside Houston, could no longer include a phrase praising God in their school song.

That made the American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU) very happy. They had been party to the suit, claiming that the song violated constitutional provisions of separation of church and state.

On July 3rd, the Supreme Court ruled that states can indeed ban the distribution of child pornography. That made ACLU very unhappy. One of their spokesmen was quoted in the press as complaining this violated the constitutional provisions of free speech.

If this all seems strange to you, perhaps it is because it is strange. The ACLU is constantly worried about the "free speech" rights of pornographers, but seemingly is on the other side of the fence

when the question turns on the free speech rights of school children. One cannot escape the conclusion that the ACLU would defend the "right" of school children to distribute smut, but they would deny them the right to sing the praises of God.

And if you ever wonder where the ACLU gets the money to pursue its goals, consider this: a lot of rich people in high places give them a lot of money. Our current Lieutenant Governor Hobby, for example, held a fund raiser for them in his Houston home that raised some \$60,000. He is very proud of his efforts in this regard, defending it repeatedly while out on the campaign trail seeking reelection. That is one of the many areas where he and I are in disagreement. Operator set the 4½-inch casing at 3,174 feet, and the hole is bottomed at 3,186 feet.

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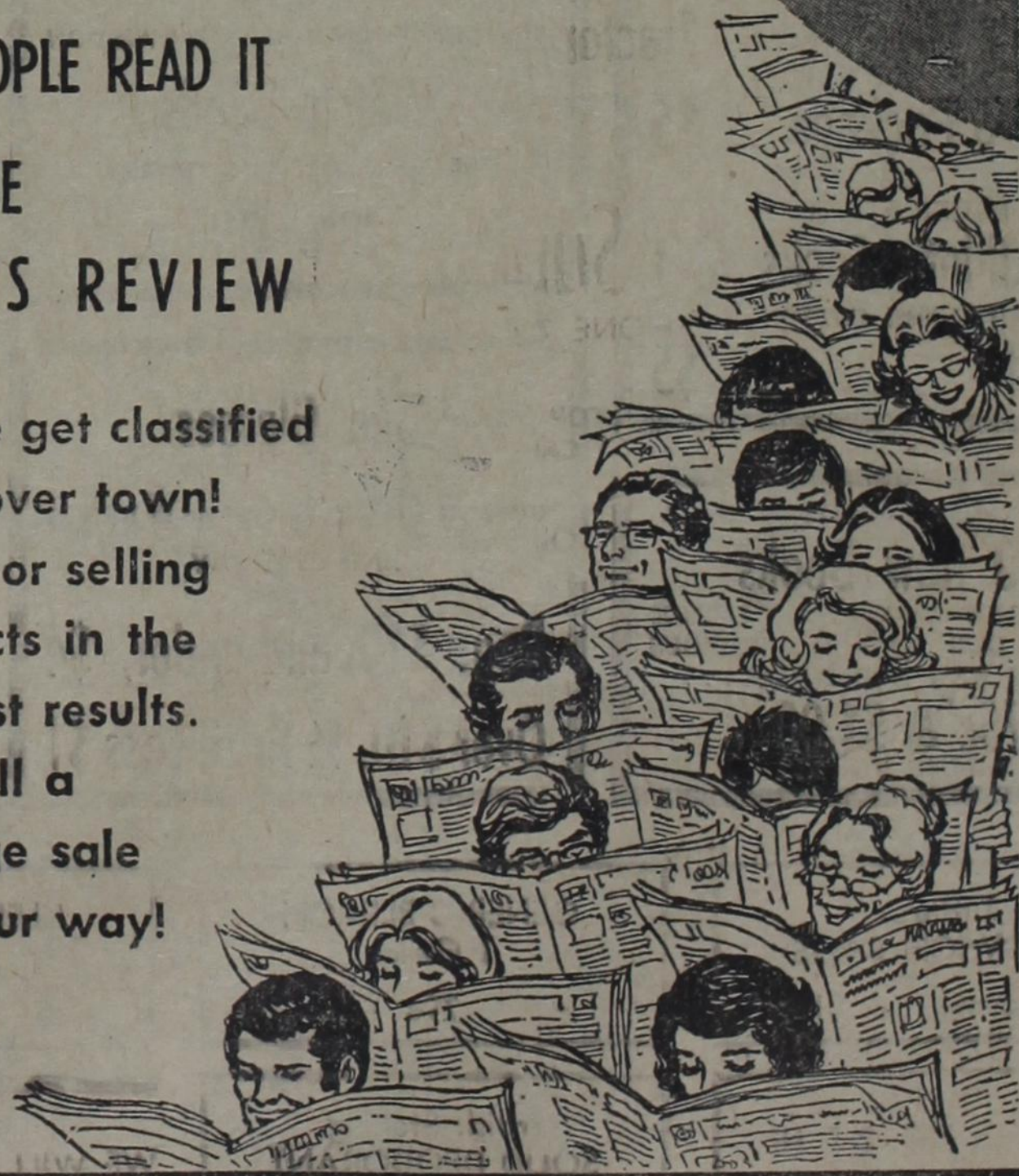
