

Committee To Handle Probe Of McCarthy

WASHINGTON (U)—A 75-12 vote of the Senate last night consigned to a special bipartisan committee a censure move aimed at Sen. McCarthy and evidently signaled a lengthy new investigation of the Wisconsin Republican's conduct.

Sen. Knowland of California, the GOP leader, predicted appointment by Vice President Nixon "within 48 hours" of a six-member inquiry committee charged with sifting nearly 50 overlapping charges against McCarthy, the Senate's controversial Red hunter.

In the face of a setback in his efforts to force an immediate showdown on the censure issue, McCarthy called for "morning, afternoon and evening sessions" of the group to draft a speedy report.

"All I want is a vote by the Senate," he declared in an interview.

McCarthy dramatically told the

Senate just before it voted last night that he wants his senatorial critics put under oath before the special committee to repeat their "scandalous, false" charges.

If they do that, he said, they will "either indict themselves for perjury" or "prove what consummate liars they are."

The Senate's vote sent to the special committee a censure motion by Sen. Flanders (R-Vt.) which Flanders punctuated by reading a list of 33 counts against McCarthy—plus six specific accusations against McCarthy by Sen. Fulbright (D-Ark.), seven somewhat similar charges by Sen. Morse (Ind-Ore) and proposals for study of any charges in the Senate's investigating rules.

Knowland said he expects the Senate Republican and Democratic Policy Committees to meet quickly to select the "fine, able men who have not become partisans in this matter" he said ought to comprise the inquiry group.

At the demand of Sen. Ives (R-N.Y.), Knowland amended his motion to call for a progress report from the group before Congress adjourns, perhaps within two weeks. The majority leader said if the committee finds it can't complete its investigation by then, the Senate will have to decide whether it wants to stay on in Washington to await a final report while House members go home.

Fulbright said he thinks the chances are "very remote" that there will be any final report before the next Congress meets in January.

He said he doubts three Democrats and three Republicans will ever agree on McCarthy, and added that the committee could die automatically with the expiration of the present Congress.

Forty Republicans, 34 Democrats and Sen. Morse voted for Knowland's proposal to set up the special committee, though breaking through the tangled knot had kept the Senate in boiling argument since Friday.

Three Republicans—Sen. Cooper (Ky.), Duff (Pa.), and Flanders—voted against the resolution, as did nine Democrats—Sens. Fulbright, Chavez (NM), Douglas (Ill.), Hennings (Mo), Hill (Ala.), Humphrey (Minn.), Lehman (N.Y.), Magnuson (Wash.) and Monroney (Okla.).

These 12 generally argued that the Senate should vote on the question of censuring McCarthy without any further inquiry.

McCarthy, it was learned, canvassed the possibility of trying to kill Knowland's proposal but abandoned the idea. That would have cleared the way for a vote on Flanders' censure resolution, which most senators regarded as doomed.

Military Junta Tells Armas To Disband Forces

GUATEMALA (U)—Guatemala's ruling military junta ordered President Carlos Castillo Armas to disband his army today, but the action generated rising public resentment. An American Embassy spokesman said there was a possibility of a popular uprising in the capital.

The junta ordered the disbanding of Castillo Armas' armed "liberation army," which sparked the overthrow of Communist-backed President Jacobo Arben Guevara, after regular army units and military academy cadets had battled the 700 irregulars sporadically for 12 hours yesterday with mortars and tanks.

Twelve persons were killed and 42 wounded in the battling around Roosevelt Hospital, where Castillo Armas' men were camped on the outskirts of the capital. The fighting, outgrowth of weeks of tension between the regular troops and the revolutionists, mushroomed from a dawn brawl between cadets and members of the President's force.

One report said the trouble started in a house of prostitution. A cease-fire finally took effect at 8:35 p.m. and the 700 liberation army men surrendered their arms to regular army officers. The revolutionists were ordered to return to their homes throughout the country today.

The junta ordered a curfew into effect at 9 p.m. and warned that "drastic measures" against any violators.

A spokesman for the American Embassy reported there still was "very great tension" late last night. The President's backers were disgruntled, the spokesman said, because the army had forced him to break up his insurgent army.

The American official said Communists apparently played no part in the violence. The Reds tried, however, to organize antigovernment demonstrations while the fighting was going on. Troops loyal to the junta smashed all the attempts.

Castillo, who rushed back to Guatemala from a visit to Chimaltenango, was believed still firmly in power. He maintained a complete silence yesterday.

Application Made For State Bank In Midland

AUSTIN (U)—An application for a charter to operate a state bank in Midland called the Commercial Bank and Trust Co. is being processed, Banking Commissioner J. M. Falkner said today.

Proposed directors are A. A. Bradford, Robert Wood, J. W. Starr, George Busb, B. R. Greathouse, Lynn Durham and Tom Sealy, all of Midland.

The application proposes capital of \$150,000, surplus of \$50,000 and reserve of \$50,000.

Falkner said the commission and the Federal Deposit Insurance Corp. will make an "on the ground" check, probably within two or three weeks, of whether another bank is needed in Midland.

Former Secretary's Blast At General Marshall Is Revealed

WASHINGTON (U)—Former Secretary of War Harry H. Woodring says he once "thought very highly" of Gen. George C. Marshall "but I lost faith in him."

Woodring had a hand in having Marshall named Army chief of staff in World War II, but a letter made public yesterday by Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis.) quoted the former Democratic secretary as saying six weeks ago that Marshall "would sell out his grandmother for personal advantage."

Marshall, reached at his home in Leesburg, Va., declined comment.

McCarthy offered the letter, dated last June 23, for the Congressional Record during Senate debate on a move by Sen. Flanders (R-Vt.) to censure him.

Some of McCarthy's critics had cited as a reason for censure the Wisconsin senator's 1951 speech saying Marshall was "steeped in falsehood."

Woodring confirmed in Topeka, Kan., that he had written a letter to Robert M. Harris of New York City to thank him for a book about

McCarthy. He told newsmen he had lost faith in Marshall because he thought the general "sold out" Chiang Kai-shek on a postwar peace mission to China for former President Truman.

Woodring was secretary of war in 1936-40, but was critical of many of his colleagues in the Franklin D. Roosevelt Cabinet after that. He opposed third and fourth terms for Roosevelt.

McCarthy said he had obtained the letter from another senator who got it from Harris, and that Woodring had no objection to its publication.

As made public by McCarthy, the letter dealt largely with the hearings into McCarthy's row with Secretary of the Army Stevens and Army Counselor John G. Adams.

The text of Woodring's letter to Harris, as released by McCarthy: "Dear Bob: 'First I want to thank you for the book you had sent, 'McCarthy and His Enemies.' I thought the chapter on Gen. Marshall was very illuminating—but I inclined to advance the thought that Marshall's

ANNUAL SHOW NEAR Big Parade Opens Rodeo Wednesday

Final arrangements were being made today for the 21st annual Big Spring Rodeo and Cowboy Reunion which starts Wednesday.

The last load of bucking horses was due to arrive here this morning. All other rodeo stock was placed in pens at the rodeo bowl Monday.

Rodeo association officials were today completing repairs to the

chutes, pens and other facilities and the arena soil will get a final working in advance of the first show Wednesday evening.

The four-day rodeo will get underway at 4 p.m. Wednesday with the traditional opening parade through the downtown district.

Several hundred riders, two bands, several decorated floats, and city, county and Webb Air Force Base officials are to form the procession.

The Big Spring Community Band will lead the parade and WAFB's band also will march and play in the procession. Sheriff's posse from at least six area counties are to ride in the parade, along with contestants, rodeo officials, and other horsemen.

First performance of the rodeo will start at 8 p.m. Wednesday with the colorful grand entry. Performances will start each evening at 8, through Saturday.

Rodeo officials are promising a fast show, with plenty of action. Stock provided by Everett Colburn, producer, includes some of the saltiest in the rodeo circuit and some of the nation's top cowboys and cowgirls.

Several specialty acts have been lined up for presentation between the various competitive events. The community band, composed of adult as well as regular high school musicians, also will play during the performances at the rodeo bowl.

Oil Pumper Dies In Road Mishap

Ira Gene McClaugherty, 28, pumper for the Seaboard Oil Company, was killed almost instantly Monday evening when his pickup overturned on the Veamor road about eight miles north of Big Spring.

McClaugherty was alone in the pickup when it left the road and overturned three times. Highway Patrol officers said. He was brought to the Cowper Hospital in Big Spring in an Eberley-River ambulance, but was pronounced dead on arrival.

The 1954 Chevrolet pickup was demolished, officers said. Cause of the mishap could not be determined. The truck apparently turned sharply to the left as it was traveling down a straight stretch of road.

It was the seventh traffic fatality of the year for Howard County.

McClaugherty, who is survived by his wife and two children, resided in the Seaboard Oil Company Camp north of Big Spring.

Officers said. Assisting Highway Patrol officers with the investigation were deputies of the sheriff's department.

Funeral arrangements are pending at the Eberley-River Funeral Home. Survivors include his wife, a son, Larry Gene, 5; a daughter, Brenda Jane, 6 months; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Ballard McClaugherty, and two brothers, James and Joe McClaugherty, of Robstown.

South Plains Areas Soaked In Night's Thunderstorms

Crackling thunderstorms which gave West Texas' South Plains its first good soaking in more than a month vanished early Tuesday but were expected to boil up again in afternoon heat.

Rains up to an inch pounded a big patch of the plains Monday night. Thunderstorms boiling out of a squall line dropped the needed moisture.

The rain will help pastures and the cotton and grain crops, expected to be among the best since the record year of 1949.

Water covered fields in eastern Floyd County, a rich grain-growing area.

An estimated inch was reported at Southland, 14 miles southeast of Lubbock, and at Dougherty near Floydada. Lubbock received .51 inch, Ralls .06, Matador .07, Post .50, Crosbyton .46, Anton .75.

The squall line stretched to the Mexican border, giving Presidio .05 inch. El Paso also got .05 and Marfa .04. Traces fell at Salt Flat, Mineral Wells and San Angelo.

Farmers and ranchers were pleased but said more rain is needed in two or three weeks.

"They'll get more rain out there," said forecaster Dick Wise of the Weather Bureau at Dallas.

He said a mass of unstable air that lay across Texas' west half would start more storms in afternoon heat. Only isolated afternoon showers were forecast for the rest of Texas, also hard-hit by drought.

The storms cooled West Texas, at least temporarily. Dalhart at the top of the Panhandle had a morning low of 67, Marfa had 71 and El Paso 75. The high was 83 at Galveston and Palacios.

Ex-Tax Chief Is Sentenced For Evasion

NEW YORK (U)—Joseph D. Nunan Jr., once the nation's head tax collector, was sentenced today to five years imprisonment and a \$15,000 fine for income tax evasion.

Nunan was sentenced by Judge Walter Bruchhausen who said that Nunan's conduct "cannot be condoned."

The judge said Nunan's crime was made greater by the fact that he had been charged with enforcing the laws.

Nunan was appointed U.S. commissioner of Internal Revenue by the late President Franklin D. Roosevelt and served in the post from 1944 to 1947.

He was convicted on a five-count indictment in which he was accused of reporting his income for 1946 to 1950 as \$416,144 when it actually was \$543,396. The government said he paid taxes totaling \$200,437 when he should have paid \$291,523.

Nunan's attorney, Richard J. Burke, said the verdict would be appealed. He asked that Nunan be permitted to remain free in the \$1,500 bail previously posted. The judge took the motion under advisement.

Nunan made no comment as he was sentenced. His attorney had asked that his age of 57 be considered.

In sentencing Nunan, Judge Bruchhausen said he was not at this time concerned with the actual collection of tax that Nunan had failed to pay, but was interested only in giving "adequate punishment" for Nunan's deeds.

The judge said that the fact that Nunan was well acquainted with the laws and tax collection rules only served to "emphasize his guilt."

Nunan could have received a maximum sentence of 25 years in prison and a \$50,000 fine. The judge sentenced him to five years on each of the five counts, with the prison terms to run concurrently, and \$3,000 fine on each of the five counts.

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Coahoma Schools To Open Aug. 30

COAHOMA (SC)—Fall classes will begin in the Coahoma public schools on Monday, Aug. 30. It was decided at a Monday night meeting of the school board here.

All students will be required to undergo smallpox vaccinations before entering school.

H. L. Miller, school superintendent, said the system was still in need of four teachers, including two fourth grade and as many fifth grade instructors.

Big Springers Set All-Time High For Water Use In July

A new all-time record in the use of water was set here during July. City Manager H. W. Whitney announced today that a total of 139,266,000 gallons was gauged through city facilities during the month. The last record month was June, 1953, when 160,388,000 gallons were used.

Whitney pointed out that the actual use here was even higher than the gauged total of 139 million. Water directed to Cabot Carbon Company by the city was not included in the final totals.

The all-time record daily use was set in July of this year, too. It was 7,649,000 gallons, used on July 26. Lowest record of the month was on July 1, when only 4,575,000 gallons were consumed.

A breakdown of water sources shows that 20,412,000 gallons came from section 33, some 735,338,000 gallons came from the O'Hare lease, 10,162,000 came from the Edmundson lease, and 130,364,000 gallons came from the Colorado River Municipal Water District.

Strike Threatens Other Big Airlines

A large segment of the nation's air transportation industry faced the threat of a spreading shutdown today.

A strike of some 1,200 American Airlines pilots went into its fourth day and 20,000 ground crew workers authorized a walkout against six other major airlines.

The new strike threat was directed against Capital, Eastern, National, Northwest, Trans World and United.

The National Mediation Board, moving swiftly to avert new walkouts, called in representatives of the AFL International Assn. of Machinists (IAM) and the six lines to meet in Washington today.

An IAM spokesman said there would be no strike on the six lines while the mediation board tries for a settlement.

The IAM is seeking a uniform wage on all airlines, asking a 5 per cent increase over present top classifications. This would give a mechanic, now paid \$2.27 an hour, a rate of \$2.38.

Meanwhile, Clarence N. Sayen, president of the striking AFL Air Line Pilots Assn., declined to comment on published reports that the pilots' strike may spread soon to United.

The strike against American is designed to force an eight-hour limit to a pilot's continuous flying time on nonstop transcontinental schedules.

The Reynolds Metals Co., beset by a strike of 2,500 workers and a threatened walkout of possibly 7,500 more, resumed contract talks with the CIO United Steelworkers in Washington.

A company spokesman said yesterday that a settlement "might not be far off."

The dispute is over vacations and weekend premium pay.

Climbers Scale No. 2 Mountain

RAWALPINDI, Pakistan (U)—An Italian mountain climbing expedition messaged today that it has conquered 28,250-foot K-2—Mt. Godwin Austen—the world's second highest peak and since the conquest of Everest the globe's highest unclimbed mountain.

The message received here said the victory was scored July 31 but did not name the expedition member or members who reached the top.

Although slightly lower than Everest, K2 is considered the more difficult climb because of the steepness of the final stages to the peak.

The successful Italian team included 11 climbers and 8 scientists. The group was chosen by the Italian Alpine Club early this year and trained at the famous Italian Alpine climbing center at Monte Rosa.

Tam Lader Ardito Desio, leader of the expedition, held deflated consultations with Sir John Hunt, leader of the successful Everest expedition, to review his plans before the ascent.

Young Man Killed In Auto Collision

MARSHALL (U)—Truman Odum, about 24, of Karmack was killed late last night when his hot-rod car bounced over a railroad crossing into a car driven by a Dallas man.

Two Marshall youths, Robert Weidman Jr. and Tom Solomon III, both 18, riding with Odum, were injured.

Robert Price of Dallas said Odum's car left the road at the peak of the crossing and crashed headon into his car. Price and two persons with him, Mr. and Mrs. R. J. McMaister, escaped injury.

The accident occurred near Karmack, 15 miles northeast of here.

Hilton Acquires Statler In Record Hotel Transaction

BEVERLY HILLS, Calif. (U)—Hilton Hotels Corp. today announced it is buying control of the Statler chain in "the largest transaction in the history of the hotel industry."

The announcement by Conrad N. Hilton said the purchase involves 753,000 shares of common stock at a cost of \$50 per share. The shares are owned largely by the Statler created by the chain's founder, Ellsworth M. Statler.

A similar offer is being made to all other shareholders and should all accept the total purchase price would be about 75 million dollars, Hilton said.

Purchase of the eight Statler properties now in operation will bring to 26 the number of hotels owned, leased or operated by Hilton-Hotels Corp.

Within the next year he plans to open new hotels in Beverly Hills

U.S. To Guard Formosa From Enemy Attack

WASHINGTON (U)—Secretary of State Dulles today sharply accused the Communists of violating the Korean armistice. But he said that on balance the violations were not serious enough to justify resuming the war.

In a news conference, Dulles also disclosed that a new protest has been sent through Britain to Communist China over the loss of three American lives in the shooting down of a British airliner almost two weeks ago off Hainan Island.

Dulles said, on another Far Eastern question, that United States warships and airplanes would protect Formosa against any enemy attack but that this government has not made any decision to enter into a formal alliance with the Chinese Nationalist government there.

As for Southeast Asian defense hoped decisions would be made in a week or 10 days on the time and place for holding a conference on conclusion of a defensive alliance.

Dulles told questioning reporters he could not go into detail on the latest U.S. protest over the shooting down of the British airliner. But he said the main U.S. argument is that Red China is completely wrong in arguing that because the aircraft was British the United States government does not have a claim to present on behalf of the damages suffered by its own citizens.

The Korean truce situation came in for discussion. It has been dramatized in recent days by the visit here of South Korean President Syngman Rhee who has demanded an end to the Neutral Nations Supervisory Commission which has kept representatives of Communist governments in South Korea.

The United States, Dulles said, would be sympathetic to seeing the commission wiped out.

Under Indian chairmanship its members are Sweden, Switzerland and two Communist governments—Poland and Czechoslovakia.

Dulles said the nations which fought the Communists in Korea have discussed the possibility of ending the commission because of the activities of the Communist members. The question may come up during the United Nations Assembly in New York this fall. The preliminary discussions were carried on incidentally to the Asian peace talks at Geneva recently.

Dulles said the situation respecting the armistice supervision is this:

In the north the Communist high command, under the armistice terms, is supposed to let members of the armistice commission—meaning the Swiss and Swedes who are important to the U.N. Command—see what goes on at ports of entry designated in the agreement.

However they have circumvented the armistice agreement by moving materials through routes which use other ports of entry into Korea and they deny the Swiss and Swedes opportunity to visit such points.

Fishermen Drowned In The Red River

GAINESVILLE (U)—Two members of a fishing party drowned in the Red River north of here last night.

They were Clyde Harkins, 48, and his sister-in-law, Mrs. Alma Edmonds, 25, both of Era, 13 miles southwest of here.

The bodies were recovered this morning.

Big Passenger Plane Crashes, No Fatalities

PRESTON, Conn. (AP)—A four-engine plane from New York City crashed and burst into flames on a rain-soaked runway today. First reports said that none was killed, but some were sped to nearby hospitals.

A witness reported the big Air France plane barely missed a house before landing in the field with a terrific crash. Almost immediately, flames enveloped the ship.

Air France reported in New York that the plane carried 29 passengers and a crew of eight. One of the passengers, state police said, was a baby.

Aaron Rosenfeld, New York clothing manufacturer, was among the passengers who fled the flaming ship.

"The passengers were screaming and then there was a terrible crash," he said. "I saw many passengers leaving the wreckage."

He himself escaped with a scratched hand although he said he was the last to leave the plane.

The plane moved down a row of trees on the farm of Valentine Sebastian. It then plowed into a garage, demolishing an automobile.

The plane left Paris last night. I was due at Idlewild Airport in New York at 8:15 a.m. (EST), but rain and low ceiling prevented it from landing.

Rosenfeld said the plane cracked up at about 9 a.m., minutes after the passengers were ordered to fasten their safety belts.

The wreckage burned furiously for nearly two hours. One witness described it as "a scrambled mess."

"We're satisfied that all aboard are accounted for and there are no deaths," said Lt. Oamus Avery, in charge of the Groton State Police barracks.

Mrs. Elizabeth Bennett, who saw the plane fall, said:

"It didn't nose dive, but it came down with a bang. It just barely missed our house."

The farm on which the plane crashed lay between the cities of Norwich and New London.

Miss Denyse Hebert, 26, of Longueuil, Que., returning home on the plane from a three weeks trip to France, gave this description of the accident:

"We were circling around over New York for an hour and a half, trying to land."

"They told us all to fasten our safety belts; and the first thing we knew, we landed."

"I wasn't hurt. I was in back. The people up front were hurt, but the people in back were all right."

"I saw the right wing catch fire. The fire got to the cabin before they all got out, and a few people were burned; but I don't think they were burned badly."

Nation's Military Reserve In Sad Shape, Says Wilson

WASHINGTON (AP)—Secretary of Defense Wilson said today that the military reserve situation "would be a scandal and very disturbing to the American people" if the nation failed to go to war now.

Wilson said also the administration has approved "in a broad sense" the principle of a reserve program based on compulsory service. "Proposed plans are subject to modification and improvements," he said.

The secretary made his statements at a Pentagon news conference at which he was asked for comment on published stories about the new military service plan as outlined by outgoing Assistant Defense Secretary John A. Hannah.

"I don't think any particular harm was done by the stories," Wilson said.

He commented that publication of the reserve proposals had "tired up the country" but that it is time the American people take a close, realistic look at what it wants to do about getting the maximum potential defense within the nation's means to pay for it.

Wilson said the plan as outlined by Hannah was prepared at the Defense Department after consultation with the Office of Defense Mobilization and that it had been presented to the National Security Council.

It was at this point that Wilson said "in a broad sense its principles have been approved."

Wilson's remarks were generally in line with word from the White House that the administration still has a universal military manpower plan under study but hasn't reached agreement on all details.

Wilson characterized the compulsory reserve and military service proposal as the "first plan I have seen in which all the pieces were fitted in and weighted."

He added there could be political and other reasons to prompt some modifications and that the administration might have to settle for "90 per cent instead of a full 100 per cent" of the plan.

Wilson made it clear he expects opposition to the compulsory service.

Farmers in the Tarzan area this year are beginning to really discover the great advantage in using anhydrous ammonia, a well-known industrial chemical, which in the past few years has become one of the main sources of nitrogen fertilizer, providing farmers for the first time with all the nitrogen they need at a low cost.

It might even be said that anhydrous ammonia has brought about a revolution in soil culture that is adding substantially to farm profits. Because of this a one-day farm symposium, which is expected to attract a record nationwide attendance of farmers, county agents, soil scientists and businessmen, will be held at the University of Wisconsin at Madison on Aug. 18.

According to Prof. C. J. Chapman of the Soils Department at the University, who is chairman of the conference, advance registrations indicate an attendance of far more than 1,000 persons from all over the country.

Several of the nation's top agricultural scientists will speak, and a trade show will be held in the Memorial Union Building on the campus. The meeting, which will have its headquarters in the Edge-water Hotel, is being sponsored jointly by the University and the Agricultural Ammonia Institute.

This will be the first nationwide meeting in 1954 called for the purpose of giving farmers an evaluation of results and to report new scientific hypotheses on the use of anhydrous ammonia along with proper amounts of phosphates, potash and lime.

Anhydrous (which means water-free) ammonia was first sold as a commercial fertilizer before World War II and has made fabulous gains in recent years, until it has become one of the main sources of nitrogen for bigger crops of better quality. Nearly three-fourths of this industrial chemical being manufactured is now being marketed for agricultural use as fertilizer.

Enthusiasm for anhydrous ammonia first arose when large increases in yields were reported by experiment station farms. As farm trials confirmed the results of these experiments, farmers who formerly depended on legume crops turned to anhydrous ammonia as an important part of a balanced plant feeding program. Anhydrous ammonia is attractive chiefly because it is so easy to apply and also because it is the most economical and concentrated source of nitrogen. Its low leachability and steady release to crops over a long period are big advantages. The nitrogen in anhydrous ammonia is readily available to growing plants.

This product is in the form of a gas and is injected into the soil in metered amounts by special steel-bladed applicators. The blades deposit the ammonia at the desired depth in the soil where it remains combined with soil particles until it is taken up by the plant roots.

There are many brands of anhydrous ammonia on the market, thus giving the farmer a choice. All these various brands of the fertilizer come up to substantially the same chemical standards.

Farmers over this West Texas area are watching with great interest the results of the use this ammonia around Tarzan this year.

Drought Aid Less Liberal Than In '53

WASHINGTON (U)—Federal aid being offered farmers in drought-plagued areas is less liberal this year than last.

Under a program announced yesterday by Secretary of Agriculture Benson, eligible farmers may buy corn, oats, barley and grain sorghums at cut-rate prices. This grain will be used to help them maintain foundation herds of livestock.

Corn and wheat were offered for such a purpose last year, but at somewhat lower prices than those announced for the current drought emergency.

Under the new program, eligible farmers may buy the designated livestock feed grains through their regular feed dealers at prices 60 cents per 100 pounds below current market levels.

That means a government subsidy of about 34 cents a bushel for corn. At current prices, corn would cost the farmer about \$1.16 a bushel. Last year, corn was offered at \$1.10 a bushel.

Under last year's program, wheat was not being subsidized for drought use this year. The emergency drought relief prices this year would average, at latest price quotations, about 48 cents a bushel for oats, about 71 cents a bushel for barley and about \$1.60 per 100 pounds for grain sorghums. A limited quantity of oats was sold for drought use last year at 50 cents a bushel.

Department officials said consideration had been given to proposals that the government offer the grains at lower prices than those finally decided upon. These were turned down in the belief that the cost to the government might be excessive, they said.

Farmers declared eligible for the low-cost grains will get supplies indirectly from government surplus stocks. They will buy from grain dealers who in turn will get supplies from the government. Last year grains were distributed largely through government agencies, including local farmer committees.

The 1953 program drew complaints that private feed dealers in many areas thereby suffered serious losses of business.

New Outbreaks In S. Korea

PANMUNJOM (U)—South Koreans demonstrated against Czech and Polish truce inspectors again today and the Communists charged that the outbreaks constitute a violation of the Korean armistice.

The expected protest against the demonstrations, which began during the weekend, was lodged at a meeting of the Military Armistice Commission here.

North Korean Lt. Gen. Lee Sang Cho angrily told U.N. delegates that the demonstrations were staged by "people under the military command of your side."

Earlier today headquarters of the neutral inspection team at Pusan, scene of a South Korean demonstration Saturday, was shifted from a hilltop to a former race track now used as living area for U.S. and U.N. officials.

About 200 Koreans marched for an hour outside the area, shouting for the withdrawal of "Communist spies from the country."

A Peiping Radio broadcast heard in Tokyo accused South Korea of premeditated attempts to sabotage the truce and warned "the United States authorities must take inescapable and grave responsibility for the consequences."

Smoke Chases Guests From New York Hotel

NEW YORK (U)—Ten guests of the Park Sheraton Hotel and 13 firemen suffered smoke poisoning early today and more than 500 persons fled from their room when a smoky blaze burned out a ninth-floor room.

Two guests were rescued after being trapped in their rooms by smoke.

None of the smoke victims was reported in serious condition. Two out-of-town guests were hospitalized.

The 31-story hotel, third largest in the city and formerly called the Park Central, had 1,500 guests registered.

The blaze, of undetermined origin, was discovered about 4:30 a.m. and was extinguished within a half hour. Damage was confined to the one room.

BALLOTING IN FOUR STATES

Short's Bid For Re-Election Highlights Primary Voting

A veteran congressman's fight for his political life today stood out in restless primary elections in Michigan, Kansas, West Virginia and Missouri.

Rep. Dewey Short, Missouri Republican and chairman of the powerful House Armed Services Committee, faced a stiff challenge from State Sen. Noel Cox.

Short, a House member for 22 years, was seen getting a boost,

however, from yesterday's White House decision to extend federal drought aid to some southwest Missouri counties.

Otherwise, there were no major contests on the day's slate and light balloting was forecast.

Candidates for the U.S. Senate will be named in Kansas, Michigan and West Virginia, but no incumbents faced serious threats. And only 17 of the 41 House members seeking renomination in the

four states had primary opposition.

Election of candidates for governor were on in Michigan and Kansas.

Senators Andrew F. Schoepel (R-Kan.) and Matthew Neely (D-Wa.) did little campaigning against what they viewed as light opposition. Sen. Homer Ferguson of Michigan, chairman of the GOP Senate Policy Committee, was unopposed for renomination.

Ferguson's November opponent, Democrat Patrick V. McNamara, was left without opposition by the recent death of former Sen. Blair Moody. McNamara is a former Detroit city councilman.

Michigan Gov. G. Mennen Williams, seeking an unprecedented third term, also was unopposed. But four GOP candidates vied to oppose the Democratic governor in November.

Rated as having about even chances were State Treasurer D. Hale Brake, Secretary of State Owen J. Cleary and Donald S. Leonard, former state and Detroit police commissioner. The fourth candidate, former Lt. Gov. Eugene Keyes, was given little chance.

In Kansas, Gov. Edward Arn's Republican administration supported George Templar, former U.S. district attorney, over Lt. Gov. Fred Hall in the GOP gubernatorial race. An apparently evenly matched Democratic contest pitted Wichita Mayor William C. Salome against George Docking, Lawrence banker.

Two West Virginia Republicans contested for the chance to face Sen. Neely in November. They are Thomas B. Sweeney of Wheeling and Latelle M. LaFollette of Charleston.

Texas Girl Is Headed For Turkey And Married Life

LONDON (U)—Pretty June Martin, 22-year-old Texas, stepped from an airliner today clutching a one-way ticket to Istanbul, a \$900 gamble on romance and the future.

June threw up her job as a Houston insurance underwriter

last week to fly out and say "yes" or "no" to Ozcan Turan, 27, Turkish engineer.

June, a shapely brunette, said: "We met while students in Houston and we had an idea we might get married some day."

"John—that's my name for him—called me last week and said come over."

"But I'm not rushing things. I might change my mind when I see him again."

"I haven't seen him since he went back to Turkey nine months ago and I've practically forgotten what he looks like. I've sunk my savings in this trip and if I decide not to marry him, I shall insist he pays my fare back."

June comes from Baytown. As she changed planes here, she mailed off five postcard pictures of London to boy friends in the states.

"I'm not burning all my bridges just yet," she said.

Physical Check Made On Jailed Slaying Suspect

CLEVELAND (U)—Four physicians prepared reports for police today on the physical condition of Dr. Samuel H. Sheppard, Bay Village osteopath accused of clubbing to death his socialite wife Marilyn. Handcuffed and garbed in prison denim, the 30-year-old osteopath was taken last night to City Hospital, where his orthopedic neck brace was removed and the doctors examined him.

Police Chief Frank W. Story said there was "nothing seriously wrong" with Sheppard, as determined by the examination. The chief said it did not include psychiatric tests.

The prisoner, whose attorney previously had barred a hospital check up, made no protest about the examination, Story said.

He added that Sheppard had complained of neck pains yesterday morning, and when jail officials asked for an examination, "we arranged to have it done by experts."

Called in by police were Dr. Spencer Braden, a Police Department neurosurgery consultant; Dr. Harry Slade, assistant neurosurgeon at City Hospital; Dr. Allyn W. Tramer, acting chief of orthopedic service there; and Dr. George P. Greene, police surgeon.

Meanwhile, strange-looking lights flickered at the sprawling suburban home where Sheppard's 31-year-old pregnant wife was found July 4 in her bed, hacked to death by 25 bone-deep blows.

Crime experts, using infrared and ultra-violet lights, picked through the lakefront house seeking blood stains and other clues.

Faculty At Austin College Increased

SHERMAN — Dr. Mattie Lloyd Wooten, former dean of women and director of the department of sociology at Texas State College for Women, Denton, has joined the Austin College faculty as professor of sociology. She will begin her duties with the pioneer Presbyterian college in Sherman at the opening of the fall semester Sept. 16.

Austin College also announced the addition to its faculty of Dr. Graham G. Landrum, Dallas, as associate professor of English. He is a graduate of the University of Texas, served in the Navy during the war, and received his doctorate in English literature at Princeton University this year.

Austin College has added to its music faculty Bonar Cramer, prominent Dallas and Sherman pianist, as instructor in piano. Cramer has played in concerts throughout the nation and formerly was pianist for the Indianapolis symphony orchestra. He has taught at the University of Indiana, the University of Texas and North Texas State College.

Old Moore's, a favored handbook for those who like astrology, has been published every year since 1697 and each issue is packed with news of things to come. The Almanack boasts on some pages about predictions that have come to pass during its 157-year history.

Hitler's seizure of Austria in 1938 was one of its hot tips.

Among choicest bits of forecasting in the latest issue is: "Father Time will beckon with his scythe and dictators will be called to their account." That one is supposed to come off in November 1955.

For February the Almanack notes that the moon is in the royal sign of Leo and that "it is strongly suggestive of royal romance—engagement or marriage—of one who is very dear to the hearts of all British people."

Do you suppose Old Moore's means that Princess Margaret is going to get married? She's 23.

The sudden illness of an elderly English statesman will cause temporary concern," Old Moore's predicts for May.

Crude Production Shows A Decrease

Cumulative production for 1954 reached 1,357,969,325 barrels compared to 1,353,526,007 a year ago. Oklahoma had the largest drop, down 29,700 barrels to 470,600. Arkansas lost 400 to 76,300; New Mexico, 200 to 204,375. Louisiana increased 1,000 to 661,000.

Production was unchanged in Texas at 2,618,500.

Negro C-C Elects

HOUSTON (U)—The Texas Negro Chamber of Commerce has a new president, Solomon Johnson of Orange, elected yesterday. Others named included Whitney Nelson, Beaumont, and W. K. Richardson, Midland, vice presidents; and T. D. Iglehart, Waco, treasurer.

Stevenson Scores Unemployment Rise

GREAT FALLS, Mont. (U)—Unemployment has increased at the rate of 3,000 a day since the Republicans returned to power and there has never been less harmony in the nation, Adlai E. Stevenson told 600 Montana Democrats last night.

The 1952 Democratic presidential candidate said Americans have a new mood which he called "creeping realism." And he said the test of government today is in the governing.

"The prime purpose of government today are our safety and happiness," he said. "Are we any safer and happier today than we were 18 months ago? I think not. I saw we are less safe abroad."

Shivers-Yarborough Forces Line Up Intensive Campaign

The run-off election fight between Gov. Shivers and Ralph Yarborough got hotter Tuesday with a "clothespin brigade" of women out working for Yarborough. Shivers forces planning a house-to-house vote drive and new charges flying.

Shivers backers claimed continued control of state Democratic party machinery. Results of Saturday's county conventions indicate pro-Shivers conservatives will be in the saddle at the state party convention in Mineral Wells Sept. 14.

Shivers and Yarborough were forced into the Aug. 28 run-off for governor because neither got a majority of the total vote in the July 24 first primary, which had a 4-man field. Shivers led by about 24,000 votes.

Politicians see their struggle as a test between conservative Democrats and so-called liberals. Yarborough is considered the liberals' champion.

Women from more than 30 towns converged on Austin Monday to form a "clothespin brigade" to win the women's vote for Yarborough.

They formed the "Texas Women for Yarborough" club with Mrs. Lillian Collier of Mumfordsburg presiding.

Shivers spoke at Tyler Monday night to some 400 campaign workers.

Shivers called for a "campaign

of truths" and hit hard at several issues of the pre-primary campaign. He defended his position on teacher pay.

Shivers suggested voters "find out why people in Ralph Yarborough's home precinct voted for Alvin Shivers four-to-one."

"Something must be wrong when your neighbors vote against you in those numbers," Shivers declared. He referred to his margin in the Austin precinct where Yarborough lives.

"Look out for false promises where bloc votes are cast in ratios

up to 11 to 1," Shivers said.

"Rumors have been spread everywhere. I have been accused of vetoing the \$900 teachers' pay bill, when it is well-known that no bill reaches the Governor's office unless there is revenue voted for it."

"I called a special session of the Legislature when the teachers' association and a committee appointed by me worked out a compromise that the Legislature would pass."

Jack Dillard, Shivers' campaign manager, called for a house-to-house drive.

Shivers was due in Waco Tuesday for a similar meeting. He makes a state radio broadcast from Austin at 8:30 p.m. Tuesday to talk of drought emergency measures taken and water-soil conservation.

Police Power Threatened In School Ruling

JACKSON, Miss. (U)—Gov. Hugh White said he would use Mississippi's "police power" to "make certain that Negroes never enter the white schools."

White said yesterday the "police power" of a state, allowing it to preserve law and order, has never been questioned by the Supreme Court.

Former Gov. Fielding Wright suggested Sunday that the "police power" be used to prevent mixing of the races.

White said he was "getting letters and telegrams from all sections of the state offering full support of our efforts to halt integration of the schools."

White and the legal educational advisory committee failed in an effort Friday to get Negro leaders to agree to "segregation by consent," and the governor then called a special Legislature Sept. 7 to consider an amendment giving the Legislature standby authority to abolish the public school system.

If the amendment is approved, it will go to a vote of the people. The amendment would permit abolishing the public schools on either a local option or statewide basis.

California Governor, Bride On Honeymoon

LOS ANGELES (U)—Gov. Goodwin J. Knight and his pretty bride of a day are honeymooning aboard a friend's yacht off the nearby coast.

The 57-year-old executive and Mrs. Virginia Carlson, 35, a war widow, were married yesterday at Episcopal Church of Our Saviour, his home parish. On Friday they will move into the executive mansion at Sacramento.

Knight's first wife Arvilla, to whom he had been married for 27 years, died in 1952.

Cotton Harvest At Its Peak In Valley Section

AUSTIN (U)—Cotton harvesting may have reached its peak in four Lower Rio Grande Valley counties the past week when 62,371 bales were ginned, state Agriculture Commissioner John White said today.

The season's total of 243,003 bales ginned as of July 29 was slightly above the 239,593 bales at the same time last year for Cameron, Hidalgo, Willacy, and Starr counties.

White said Texas has lost two-thirds of its potential labor supply through the deportation of 100,000 or so wetbacks.

He predicted this may create a labor shortage later this fall in West Texas cotton fields.

Demand for labor is falling off in the Valley fields, where only about 57,000 braceros are working. Braceros are Mexican nationals allowed to enter this country under work contracts with farmers.

White reported insect infestation on the increase but not yet critical in the Valley. He said pink bollworm will prevent the gathering of a "top crop."

Truman Masters Intricacies Of Voting Machine

INDEPENDENCE, Mo. (U)—Former President Harry S. Truman used one of Jackson County's new voting machines for the first time today as he cast his ballot in the Missouri primary.

Asked if he had any trouble with the machine, he replied: "If you know what you're doing, you're all right."

Truman, convalescing from a gall bladder and appendix operation June 20, walked to the polling place, about a block and a half from his home here.

He was one of the early voters, being third to cast his ballot in his precinct at 6:25 a.m. (CST). Polls opened at 6.

Remain In U.S.

MEXICO CITY (U)—More than a half million Mexicans who went to the United States for farm work in 12 years have failed to return, the government statistical bureau says.

The Big Problem For The Run-Off Is To Get Out The Maximum Vote

With the lines already sharply drawn, it doesn't appear at this writing that much in the way of new issues could be offered in the gubernatorial run-off.

There may be some changing of minds, but by and large the effort of both factions will be concentrated on getting out the vote.

The Davis and Holmes votes of the first primary are well worth the wooing, because one interpretation of these blocks is that they were cast in July by people who did not want to vote either for Gov. Shivers or Ralph Yarborough, and may likely not want to vote at all in August.

And Gov. Shivers asserts that many of his friends did not vote in the belief that he would have no trouble in being elected.

Another analysis says that the Yarbor-

ough vote may have reached its maximum (since much of it was an "anti" vote) so that these forces will have to work hard to hold their own, while the Shivers' proponents must work just as hard to see that their own vote doesn't dip below the July total.

It is traditional in Texas run-off elections that the vote will drop below that of July, particularly when there are no spirited local contests. The state campaign will do well to analyze the local races, to see which counties demand the most attention because of lack of local interest.

The absentee vote is more important than ever, in August. This is the traditional month of heavy vacations, and many a Texan will be away from his home on election day. The point is to get him to cast his ballot before he leaves.

Flanders Censure Resolution Due To Be Sidetracked Until November

As a hard-headed New England manufacturer and business man Sen. Flanders probably entertained little hope that his resolution of censure of Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy had much chance of adoption, but his New England conscience spurred him to make the effort anyhow.

The debate on the resolution opened Friday and may continue for two or three days this week. In the end, it probably will be rejected or delayed. The counter-proposal of Sen. Smith (R-NJ) that McCarthy's conduct of the affairs of his investigative committee be placed before a committee of senators under the chairmanship of the Senate president, Richard Nixon, for a report not sooner than next January probably will be adopted as a substitute. This move obviously had the support of the administration or Nixon would not have consented to serve.

The Senate's reluctance to go along with

Flanders, aside from the natural instinct of the majority party to protect its members, however rambunctious he may be, is natural. However, there is another factor which works against Flanders. This is a guilt-complex. Many senators who despise McCarthy and his methods must feel some sense of responsibility for the abuses he has indulged in, for they voted funds to keep his committee going. Alone among the 96 senators, Sen. Fulbright of Arkansas voted against the McCarthy committee appropriation.

The likelihood is that the McCarthy issue will be swept under the carpet—in this case the carpet would be the group proposed by Sen. Smith—until well after the election is over. Too many GOP senators hope to use McCarthy's undoubted appeal to many voters in this campaign for any other decision to be taken.

Can Our Strategic Power Hold Off The Indirect Red Attacks?

WASHINGTON — More and more, the soundness of the central idea of American world strategy is being challenged by events.

This idea, which used to be called "deterrent power," and is now called "massive retaliation," has really remained the same since the end of the last war. It is the idea that we can always rely—and rely almost exclusively—on our strategic air power and our absolute weapons to hold the balance true between this country and the Soviet Union.

Is this now a sound idea, or is it becoming a fraud?

It was a sound idea in the past, certainly. As Sir Winston Churchill has repeatedly said, American air-atomic power "held the pass" in the years just after the war, when Soviet conventional forces were already very strong, and the West was almost inconceivably weak.

But that was the time of the American atomic monopoly. Long ago the monopoly was broken. Before long, the danger to the United States from the Soviet Strategic Air Army will be just as great as the danger to the Soviet Union from America's SAC. The results of this revolutionary change have also been forecast by Sir Winston Churchill. Six years ago, before either Korea or Indochina, he made his prophecy:

"The question is asked," he said, "what will happen when (the Soviets) get the atomic bomb themselves." And then he answered his own question.

"You can judge yourselves what will happen by what is happening now. If these things are done in the green wood, what will be done in the dry? If the Russians can continue month after month

disturbing and tormenting the world, trusting to our Christian inhibitions against using this strange new power against them, what will they do when they themselves have large quantities of atomic bombs?"

Sir Winston implied, although he did not specifically state, the most important feature of the new world situation that lies ahead.

In brief, the Kremlin has initiative, and can rely on us to stay on the defensive, both globally and locally. We are committed not to use our air-atomic power except in "retaliation." We are committed further not to launch local aggressions like those in Korea and Indochina. The Communist policy is not limited by any such commitments.

In practice, a direct and unprovoked Soviet attack on this country will continue to be unlikely, so long as we constantly maintain the certain power of devastating retaliation. But if the history of the last eight years means anything at all, it means that what one may call indirect Soviet attacks are more and more likely every day. More and bigger Korea and Indochina almost certainly must be expected.

To simplify the argument, let us suppose the area threatened is one that is admittedly essential to American security—say Japan or Western Germany. Suppose, further, that the threat develops three years from now, when the Soviet power to destroy this country with absolute weapons will be unquestioned. There will then be three ways our policymakers can respond to the threat.

First, they can order the Strategic Air Command to attack the Soviet Union. But if they do this, they will have to bear in mind that the Soviet can also "massively retaliate." In fact, they will have to risk the destruction of this country to save Germany or Japan. Surely it is more likely that they will say, "We cannot risk destruction of the United States for the sake of these Germans, or these Japanese."

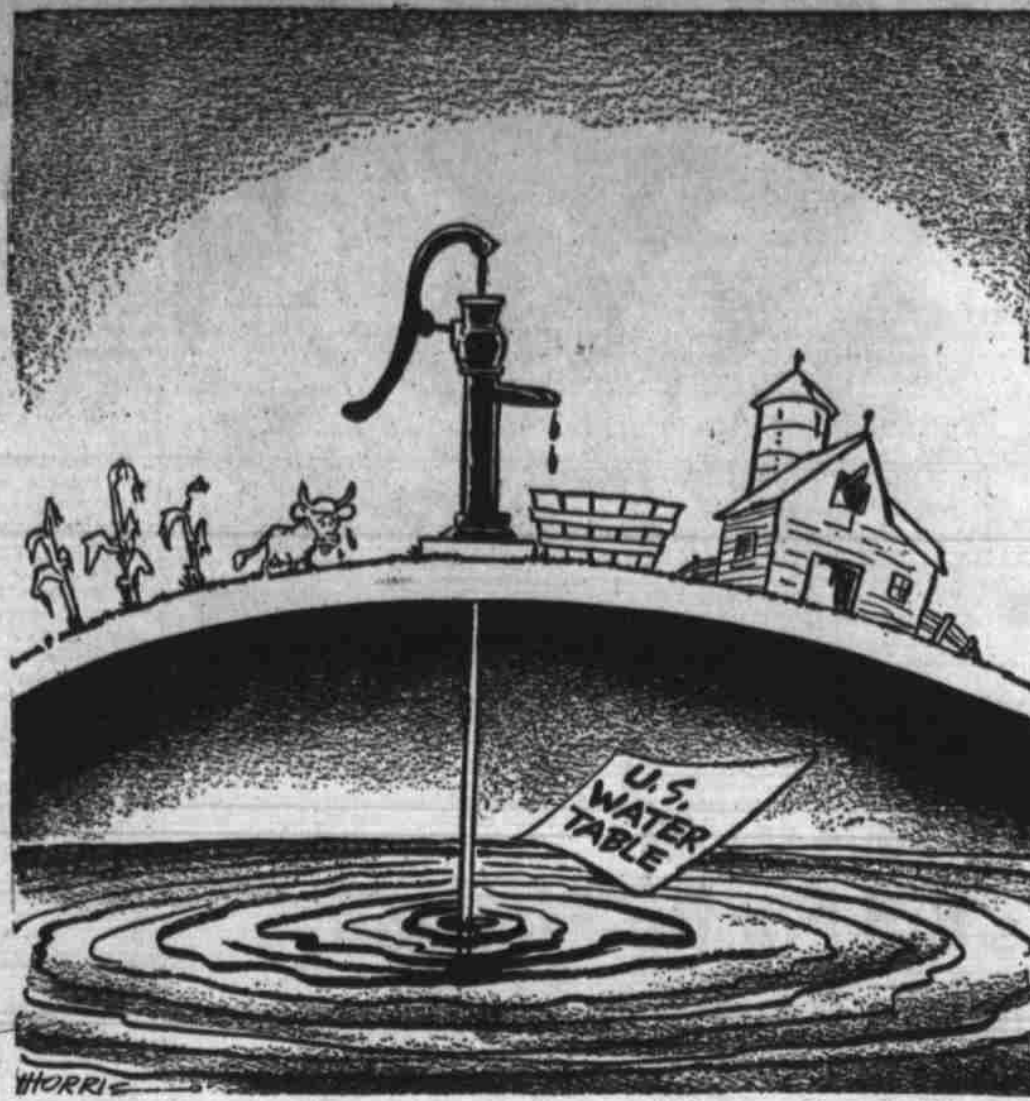
Second, the policymakers can hope that Soviet and American air atomic power will be sterilized, as gas was in the last war; and can order a local and limited response of the threatened area, on the pattern of the Korean war.

But if they do this, they will court early defeat. The Communist half of the world now contains approximately 430 infantry divisions, as against 17 American Army divisions, two and a half American Marine divisions, perhaps 20 other effective Western divisions in Europe, and no more than 40 other divisions on our side in the Far East. If the new weapons are ruled out, the Soviets can safely reinforce their attacks until they win the fight. Local and limited wars, against such overwhelming odds, are not practical policy.

Third, the policymakers can ignore the threat, and do nothing.

But if they do this, the industrial potential of Germany or Japan will be added to the Soviet sphere. After such a victory, Soviet rule will be rapidly and inevitably extended throughout Eurasia. The United States will be left isolated, cornered, and utterly over-ruled by the unchallengeably superior military-industrial power of the Kremlin.

And so you reach the logical dead end, which reveals that events have transformed the central idea of our strategy, which was once a sound idea, into a fraudulent and misleading idea.

McCarthy Sets One Kind Of Record—For Taking Up So Much Senate Time

WASHINGTON (U)—Sen. McCarthy and three-alarm fires have one thing in common: you don't have much time to get bored with them. McCarthy now heads into the third investigation of him by fellow senators in three years. He's mixed up in the third one before the second one is finished.

This probably sets a record for the Senate. No one there in recent memory has taken up so much of the Senate's time. All three inquiries were forced on McCarthy by fellow senators.

But McCarthy, unlike a fire, hasn't been put out yet. At this moment no one can predict where the latest investigation will lead or how long it will last. Weeks, possibly months, more likely.

The first investigation of him—it took 18 months and ended Jan. 2, 1952, with a report which made no recommendations—was inspired by former Sen. Benton (D-Conn.), who accused McCarthy of various forms of misconduct. The committee which investigated McCarthy investigated Benton too.

This group was made up of two Democrats — Senators Hennings (Mo) and Hayden (Ariz)—and a Republican, Sen. Hendrickson (N.J.). While they made no recommendations against McCarthy, they accused him of deliberately trying to thwart their work, saying that six times he refused to testify before them. They criticized Benton too, but not for refusing to answer questions.

When Army officials last spring made charges against McCarthy and his staff, and when the senator responded with countercharges, the members of his own Senate investigations subcommittee decided to look into the case. The public, televised hearings took weeks. That committee still hasn't made its report.

Sen. Flanders (R-Vt) started McCarthy's latest troubles by demanding the Senate censure him. His accusations were more general than specific and it was decided to create a select committee to look into the various charges which other senators voiced in support of Flanders' move.

It had seemed around Washington a week ago that Flanders' proposal would be "tabled," which is a parliamentary device for shutting off debate and calling for an immediate vote. It seemed certain

that the Senate would not vote censure and that if a vote were forced on a motion to table, McCarthy would win. Strangely, none of McCarthy's friends tried to force such a vote.

Since McCarthy wouldn't testify before Hennings' group, he might do the same in this latest inquiry. The Hennings group didn't try to force him, since he's a senator. And the select committee now might not try to force him to answer questions "either if he stayed away."

Instead of staying away, he expressed great eagerness to cross-examine the senators who made these latest accusations against him. The select committee will have to decide whether to let him. If McCarthy is permitted to cross-examine, his senatorial accusers no doubt will demand the right to cross-examine him.

That would probably be much rougher than anything McCarthy experienced during the hearings on his row with Army officials. There the government officials and their lawyers never quite forgot he was

a senator who should be treated carefully. But when McCarthy tangles with fellow senators, they're all equal.

None of the senators who talked against McCarthy and may testify against him has shown any liking for him.

Before anyone can guess what lies ahead, Vice President Nixon must appoint the three Democrats and three Republicans who will make up the select committee. Then the committee will use up more time deciding on its rules for handling the investigation, whether it needs a staff, who the staff should be, and whether the hearings will be public or behind closed doors.

For a man so free-wheeling as McCarthy, hitherto able to skip nimbly from case to case, calling his own shots, he has been amazingly handcuffed in 1954. The Army hearings took all his time and energy for weeks. The new ones may do the same. Instead of being an issue in the November elections, he may turn out to be a side issue.

Indian Population Rises, Creates Living Problem

PINE RIDGE, S.D. (U)—The vanishing Redskin is no longer vanishing. But lo, the poor Indian, is still having a tough time.

"Our population is increasing about 3 per cent a year," said Ben Reifel, superintendent of the Pine Ridge Reservation. The second most populous in America.

But a rising birth rate has only accelerated the Indian's task of surviving a white man's world. Reifel, a former Army officer and Harvard graduate, is the son of a full-blooded Sioux mother and a German-American father. He feels the only possible solution of "the Indian problem" is education.

"There is no other answer," he said crisply. "The Indian simply must adjust."

He estimates that of the 30,000 Indians in South Dakota there are 150,000 in the entire country only

15,000 are integrated in the pattern of our civilization.

Some 11,111 Oglala Sioux now crowd the reservation, and they are selling off their acres to white ranchers at a rate that in 12 to 15 years will leave them completely landless.

There are 1,700 families on the reservation now, and it will support only 600 families," said Reifel. "Only 200 families are gainfully employed full time. The rest have to be subsidized one way or another."

"As the superintendent sees it, the biggest trouble in upgrading the Indian economically is his failure to put the same value on time and thrift as his white neighbors do."

"With the Sioux," he said, "right now is important, not tomorrow. Time has no economic concern to them, and they have no interest in saving."

"This is because in the old days the buffalo provided them with everything—food, shelter, clothing and bone utensils. They had no way of storing food, and since they followed the buffalo they had no reason for building up material possessions. They lived each day as it came, but they can never become assimilated in our cultures until they develop a consciousness of time."

Another difficulty in uplifting the Indian's standards lies in the fact that women of marriageable age far outnumber the men on the reservation.

"This is tremendously important," said Reifel, who wishes the situation could be reversed, "because ordinarily women raise the moral level in any civilization. Because of the shortage of husbands, about 25 per cent of the children born on the reservation are illegitimate. No stigma is attached to them among the tribe, but the high rate of illegitimacy adds to the problem of creating stable family patterns."

Truck Hijacking, A 'New Crime', Grows Faster Than Any Others

A recently released story has been particularly interesting to me.

More than 20 years ago I had a job trying to help put a stop to what was then a comparatively new crime—the hijacking of cargo trucks on national highways. We sent a few hijackers to the penitentiary and there didn't then seem to be much of a future in such activity for the outlaws.

I can recall when this type of banditry was first referred to as hijacking. It grew out of the Prohibition-era practice of stealing or "high-jacking" the other fellow's load of whiskey. Then it spread, even during Prohibition, to the theft of other merchandise transported in trucks. If it was so easy to "high-jack" a load of liquor why wouldn't it be just as easy to take a load of butter or silks or tobacco?

A few days ago I read where, according to authenticated figures, hijackers in this country stole \$90 million in merchandise from trucks in 1953, compared with \$75 million in 1952, and \$21 million in 1944.

The FBI reports that crimes of all types are occurring at the highest rate on record. A major crime such as murder, aggravated assault or vehicle theft is committed every four minutes, on the average.

Thefts of, or from, cargoes on the highways have followed this general upswing in crime, but they have risen more than the average for other crimes. The main reason for this is that never before has there been so much to steal on the streets and highways. More than 10 million trucks, from pickups to the big over-the-road trailers, are on the highways night and day throughout the United States.

And not all the cargo thefts are reported to the FBI statisticians. How great the actual total might be can hardly be estimated. Right now the cargoes of whiskey, beer, cigarettes and coffee appear to be on the preferred list of the hijackers.

While the word "hijacking" calls to mind the rip-roaring days of Prohibition when gunmen waylaid loads of booze and shooting followed, today's hijackings appear to be of a much less violent type. A loaded truck is simply stolen and driven

off and the cargo disposed of, and then the legitimate driver is released somewhere unharmed, to report the loss. Occasionally, one of them gets killed.

Most of the larger trucking organizations and the companies that insure their cargoes have organized their own private police patrols to war on the hijackers. Where the cargo is in interstate commerce, the FBI enters the case. Most of the larger trailers are equipped with burglar alarms loud enough to strike considerable terror into the stoutest heart of a thief. Some trucks seen rolling down the highway are followed, at a discrete distance, by an armed guard in a very plain passenger car. Probably the largest number of trucks hijacked are taken from garages, parking lots, warehouses and regular truck stopping places. Some companies are in regular communication with their fleet units by radio-telephone or teletype, always knowing within a few miles of where their trucks should be on a given route.

In Illinois, because of the large number of such robberies, the Chicago Association of Commerce is providing all legitimate truckers with maps showing the best truck routes and these roads are being regularly covered, every hour in the day, by special police patrols. The FBI has even drawn up a special set of precautions to be observed to prevent such hijackings.

Twenty-five years ago when there weren't so many good highways and not so many trucks, such crime was of rather infrequent occurrence. But now it's different. Last year, for example, the FBI held more than 100 regional conferences on the problem of highway cargo thefts. Many high-priced packaged commodities are now moved almost entirely by truck. The volume of such merchandise being trucked has been greatly increased, and the wider range of types of merchandise being transported by this method has also been increased.

The gangsters have found such trucks to be most tempting prizes.

Washington Calling—Marquis Childs

In Fighting Hitler Authority, John Caught By Another Type

BONN, West Germany (U)—In his second broadcast from behind the Iron Curtain Otto John said, "I followed the voice of my conscience and I am convinced that I have chosen the right course of action."

Despite the statements of the Ministry of the Interior to the contrary, this seemed to leave no doubt that the head of West Germany's security system had voluntarily gone over to the Communist side.

But in the past of this man who has lived through so much of the savage struggle for power in Germany during the last 20 years there were several reasons why he might have feared that his high position—indeed, his future in any capacity—was gravely threatened. With the rise of German nationalism those who, like John, participated in the July 20 (1944) plot against Hitler are increasingly regarded with suspicion.

Some openly call them traitors. Powerful influences were at work to remove John from the top security job in the process to discredit him.

More important, however, were the episodes in his own past that had made him subject to a kind of blackmail not so much from the West as from the East. From top American intelligence sources this reporter has verified that John, while working in the underground to remove Hitler during World War II, was in all probability a double agent. That is to say, he became a secret operative for the Gestapo as a "cover" to insure against suspicion of his underground activities and presumably also to gain more information to help the plotters.

Records concealed in the Thuringian salt mines were captured by invading Russians. This treasure trove was priceless since it gave the Communists detailed knowledge of the secret activities of thousands of Germans, including, it is believed, Otto John.

It is not hard to imagine the damage that would have been done to him if his Gestapo record had been broadcast to the world. His explanation that this was merely a cover would hardly have convinced anyone.

In connection with the July 20 plot John is believed to have had another reason for the torment of conscience that led to his defection. His brother, Hans, was also in on the plot and when it collapsed the brother was caught and executed with at least 200 others, including a field marshal and several generals. But Otto John escaped because of his former position as counsel to the Luftwaffe Airline. While the Gestapo was carefully screening all passengers to make sure that none of the plotters escaped, Otto got himself on board a plane to Madrid as a member of the crew.

British intelligence picked him up since he was obviously a source of valuable information—in November, 1944, and for the rest of the war he worked in London for Britain. The British brought him back to Germany at the war's end.

It may have been these episodes in his troubled past that made John susceptible to the persuasion or coercion of a visitor, one Wolfgang von Puttler, from East Germany with whom he talked in Cologne in March. Puttler came from an aristocratic family, was one of Joachim von Ribbentrop's wartime diplomats, and had long since gone over to the Communist side. His personal life, plus his Nazi connections, made him vulnerable to Soviet blackmail, which may or may not have been the reason for his defection. What he said to John during their visit is not known, since the former security chief never reported the meeting except in his confidential record examined after he defected.

But it is conjectured that Puttler brought both an appeal and a threat.

No explanation entirely fits the action of Otto John, and in a brief space it is possible only to touch on some of the more lurid aspects of the mystery. For example, what about the Dutch agent, John Zeuge Eland, who went to Switzerland after becoming involved in the bureaucratic rivalry over John's role as security chief and there died mysteriously five days later. Swiss authorities are investigating the possibility of murder.

In all its sinister ramifications, the John case is a text of our times, his personal history containing much of the tragedy of the German people. A pawn in the power game, resisting the totalitarianism of Hitler, he has now given himself to another totalitarian force and he will be exploited so long as his voice can sow doubt in Germany and the West.

Latin Comes Alive

HONG KONG (U)—Catholic missionaries reaching Hong Kong after long periods in Chinese Communist jails joke among themselves that if enough Catholics get in enough Communist jails, Latin may become a live language again. The priests use Latin to communicate with one another.

One group of priests in Shanghai jails used Latin messages on the fog of toilet buckets.

A bucket did not always come back to the same cell. It made the rounds until it found someone who could read Latin. He would scratch an answer and in time it might get back to the original writer. In the meantime it might find its way into half a dozen other Latin-writing cells and quite a conversation would develop. Sometimes important messages were conveyed but usually it was merely an effort to let one missionary know that he had a fellow in a nearby cell, and to pass on a word of cheer.

Bargain Basements Boring? Change To Used Car Lots

I bought a cream puff with soft mileage today, and I would like to advise bargain-minded ladies to take a mechanically-minded gentleman with them if they go out looking for an automobile buy.

A cream puff is what the nice salesman assured me I got, and I understand that in used car parlance that's high praise indeed. Soft mileage, I'm told, is also desirable—and applies in this case because this 5-year-old job has only 31,000 miles on its speedometer.

I needed an automobile which was good enough to drive from my home to the railroad station and back, but old enough to cost a minimum of money and best-up enough so it wouldn't worry me that it stood outdoors summer and winter.

Before my wanderings in the used car marts, I believed aging automobiles were acquired by dealers when their owners traded them in for new cars. I had also been under the impression that used cars, except for rare ones, had been in accidents which cracked or sprung something vital but which only a skilled mechanic could detect by crawling under the car. It was my understanding that people who sold used cars were shrewd bargainers.

Now I know different. All used cars come from two sources: from spinster sisters who only used a car to drive to church suppers Wednesday and to church on Sundays, and from retired clergymen who made upkeep of cars a hobby.

It was interesting to note that used car salesmen sell only cars which they obtained from close and trusted friends. And every salesman thinks so highly of each car he is debating buying it himself. He is a good enough sport, however, to let me have it—practically as a gift, if I want it.

Another strange thing about used cars is that none of them has ever gone more than 31,000 miles and all three—no matter how beat-up the rubber looks—have at least 15,000 or 20,000 miles left on them. (Incidentally, the way to test a used car tire is to run a key across the face of the tread. Apparently if it stands up under this test, it's in prime condition. Until today I thought the approved method was to kick the sidewall, although I never understood what that proved.)

I recommended used car buying as an adventurous, exciting, exhilarating pastime for women who are

bored following the old bargain trail in the stores. Sometimes you can pick up the most amazing things—like my new used car. It's big, black, shiny, was tenderly cared for by an elderly spinster and the only reason I was able to pick it up for a song was because it was part of her estate.

Oh, yes, there are white-wall tires with 20,000 miles in them if there's a mile, and I got the whole thing for only about three times as much as I planned to pay. I really had to act fast, too, because the salesman had just about decided to buy such a bargain himself. He was really nice to let me have it, being as how he knew the elderly spinster well.

Mrs. P. A. Pettit, wife of a Paula, Kan., physician and one of the three women members of the General Council, General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church, U. S. A., is chairman of religion for the Federation.

"Since our country was conceded as having been formed under God," Mrs. Pettit said, "we as a secular organization with a religious emphasis are in particularly advantageous position to foster these programs from top committees to the home itself."

There's a vital resurgence of religious activity all over the world today, Mrs. Pettit said.

"Preaching evangelism is at an all-time high. The Bible, always a best-seller, tops the lists, and religious books remain at the top. Radio and TV religious programs are growing in demand as well as service. Religious emphasis is used in advertising. There are more church-goers today, and estimates have it that less than 12 per cent of the people have no religious inclination. Church building is booming."

The ecumenical movement—aimed at gathering together all denominations in one body—is stronger and greater than ever before," Mrs. Pettit added and said this is evidenced in the advancement of the National Council of Churches and the meeting of the World Conference of Churches in Evanston, Ill., this summer.

"What we want to do is to bring all this down into individual club programs," she said, "not only to stimulate thinking and give knowledge but to help women deepen their own faith."

The Federation will suggest that groups cooperate in plans for a "Religious Emphasis Week," later in the year.

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Mary Margaret McBRIDE SAYS

A famous engineer who has been going through personal tragedy tells me that in his darkest moments he has found reading the 51st Psalm more effective than taking a sleeping pill. This disturbed man has picked one favorite verse: "For he shall give his angels charge over thee to keep thee in all thy ways." As he says this over and over his burdens lift and he falls asleep.

The educational experts tell me that children aren't required to "memorize" much any more, that learning by heart, as we used to call it, has almost gone out of fashion along with other outmoded pedagogical ideas. If this is true, I think children are missing a lot of pleasure now and will miss more when they grow up without fine thoughts tucked away in their heads for use at need. I still have the memorizing habit but it's not so easy as you get older to commit to memory, and the poems and sayings learned in childhood are still the ones that provide comfort to day.

My favorite quotation is the whole of the 121st Psalm which I began to learn when I was five. Nowhere is there more majesty and solace than in words like these: "I will lift up mine eyes unto the hills from whence cometh my help. My help cometh from the Lord which made heaven and earth. He will not suffer thy foot to be moved: He that keepeth thee will not slumber... The Lord shall protect thy going out and thy coming in from this time forth and even for evermore."

If it's a pleasant picture I want in a bleak moment I conjure up Wordsworth's crowd of daffodils by saying over to myself, "I wandered lonely as a cloud that floats on high o'er vales and hills..." For deadening in the bath tub I like Sir Walter Scott's "Young Lochinvar is come out of the west," or maybe "The boy stood on a burning deck," or even, "The curfew shall not ring tonight..."

I envy professional memorizers, actors and actresses whose words come tripping off the tongue so effortlessly. The other day, in the course of an ordinary conversation with me, Shirley Booth who has been declared by many discerning critics the finest actress in the world and now is a hit in Broadway's "Bye, Beautiful Sea," said suddenly, "Would you like to hear my credo?" and then recited in full the 41st Psalm in English, ascribed in Chester Cathedral, England:

"Give me a good digestion, Lord, and also something to digest. Give me a healthy body, Lord, with sense to keep it at its best. Give me a healthy mind, oh Lord, to keep the good and pure in sight. Which seeing ain't not appalled, but finds a way to set it right. Give me a mind that is not bound, that does not whimper, whine or sigh. Don't let me worry overmuch about the fuzzy thing called I. 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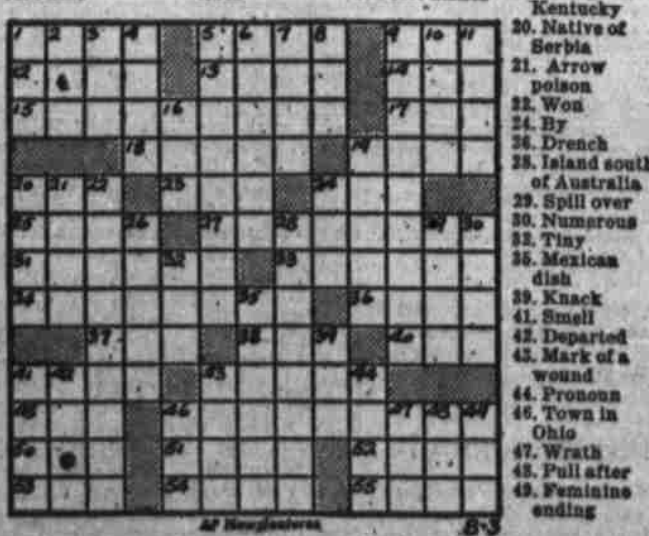

Six Lawyers Helping Bobo As She Files For Divorce

RENO, Nev. (U.S.)—Blonde Bobo Rockefeller and her expensive array of legal talent prepared today to close out the romantic saga of the coal miner's daughter and the multimillionaire oil heir.

The 37-year-old Bobo may file for divorce at any time from 42-year-old Winthrop Rockefeller.

It may come later today, judging only by the apparent last-minute preparations going on at Bobo's divorce headquarters, a suburban Reno home she rented a few weeks ago.

Reporters who phoned the residence have been cut short with: "Sorry, we're busy. Call back later." The voices usually identify themselves as Bobo's attorneys.

She has six lawyers—five from New York and one from Nevada. The attorneys have pulled a curtain of secrecy over preparations for her divorce from Rockefeller, who is the father of her 54-year-old son Winthrop Paul.

A property settlement was worked out the day Bobo arrived in Reno to establish residence. That was six weeks and four days ago. Six weeks residence is required to get a divorce.

Bobo—in exchange for a signed and delivered divorce—will get two million in cash, 2 1/2 million in trust funds for herself and Winthrop Paul and another million in personal property.

She'll also have custody of the youngster—with whom Rockefeller has been getting acquainted the past few days. He has taken the boy swimming a few times in what Bobo called a "period of introduction." Rockefeller will have the right to see the boy a few times a year.

Bobo and the Standard Oil heir married on Valentine's Day 1948, two years after she shed Boston socialite Richard Sears Jr. with a Nevada divorce.

Giant Parade Is Climax For VFW Meeting

By JOHN KOENIG JR.

PHILADELPHIA (U.S.)—Some 75,000 Veterans of Foreign Wars members and auxiliaries lined up for a giant seven-hour parade today highlighting their week-long annual encampment here.

But as marchers from all 48 states and beyond paraded and cut capers with fun-making units, they bore in mind a message from Vice President Richard M. Nixon that the free world cannot stop communism unless the people have the "will to resist."

Indochina is visible proof of this, the vice president told a banquet of top VFW leaders and other dignitaries last night.

"We saw this principle in reverse in Guatemala where the Communist army was 10 times as strong as the army of liberation," Nixon said.

"Ninety per cent of the people, however, were against the Communist government and it was only a matter of hours after the revolt against the government began before the Communist leaders had to run for their lives."

Nixon flew here from Washington to receive the VFW's Bernard M. Baruch Distinguished Service Award. The award is made for the "most outstanding contribution to the American way of life, promotion of unity and world peace."

Earlier, the convention approved amid cheering a strongly-worded "proclamation of policy" charging the federal government with "cynical disregard" for veterans and their dependents "while dealing generously with foreign nations, including former enemies."

The attack cited the record of the past 14 years, during which time, it said, \$8 billion dollars had gone for foreign aid, while expenditures for veterans have totaled only 32 billions over 173 years.

Nixon, pressed by newsmen, said he could not comment on the action since he had not had time to read the text.

Carrier Yorktown In The Philippines

SANGLEY POINT, P. I. (U.S.)—The aircraft carrier Yorktown arrived in Manila Bay today to join the U.S. 1st Fleet, which has been operating in the South China Sea.

The continued presence here of American carriers, which have been on "fair weather training" greatest show of naval strength in Philippines waters since the last war.

The Yorktown replaces the carrier Tarawa, which left here Sunday for the United States.

Dick Haymes Again Is Ordered Deported

LOS ANGELES (U.S.)—Singer Dick Haymes, husband of actress Rita Hayworth, again has been ordered deported following a rehearing of his case.

Ralph Farb, special inquiry officer for the Immigration and Naturalization Service, upheld yesterday the deportation order issued last March 23 after Haymes' first hearing.

New Demand On Plane Losses

WASHINGTON (U.S.)—The United States is reported drafting a new demand that the Chinese Communists pay compensation for six Americans killed and wounded by Red fighter planes.

Diplomatic officials said today a vigorous second note—Red China rejected the first one—would be sent to the Peiping regime in the next few days.

The American note will renew a demand that all persons responsible for the attack be punished and that steps be taken to prevent any such future shootings.

Three Americans were killed and three others wounded when Communist planes shot down a British airliner last July 23 south of Red-held Hainan island. Ten lives were lost in all.

The State Department dismissed as baseless yesterday a protest by the Communist government of Poland, made last Saturday, that American planes had fired on two Polish ships in the area of Hainan island. A department spokesman said U.S. planes "have not fired on any ship in that area," and that the Polish note would be formally rejected.

No Saucers—Yet

TOKYO (U.S.)—Police have stopped the sale of Japan's newest toy invention—a miniature "flying saucer."

Police had two objections to the gadget:

1. It makes an ear-splitting noise.
2. It is liable to take off in any direction.

The "flying saucer" is round, with four propellers, each two inches long. It leaves a white trail of smoke as it follows its unpredictable course.

Said he has to send his children, aged 4 and 2, to nursery school daytimes and can't use his back yard. He alleged it's under constant daylight bombardment by golf balls.

TOKYO (U.S.)—A new ruling by school principals in central Japan has women teachers seeing red.

"They just don't understand women," the teachers said in a petition opposing the ruling—a ban against lipstick.

VENICE, Calif. (U.S.)—Two men forced Ronald Wade last night to return from his home garage to the market he manages. They made him open the safe, taped his hands and feet and left with \$5,000. One tossed him \$25, explaining: "That's for your trouble."

Soviet Composers Given Top Honors

MOSCOW (U.S.)—The Soviet Union's two foremost composers, Dmitri Shostakovich and Aram Khachaturian, have been named "People's Artists." The two world-renowned musicians, often targets of criticism by state organs, never before had received this top honor awarded to Soviet composers.

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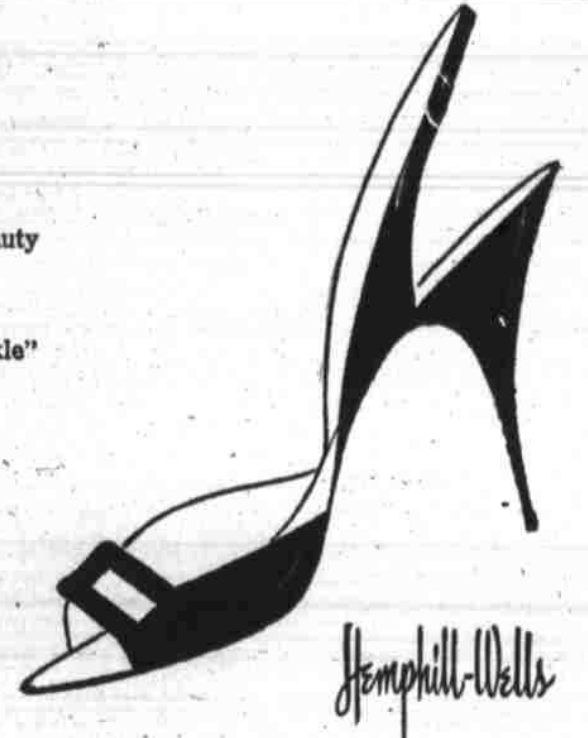

Rhee Hammers At World Showdown

NEW YORK (U.S.)—Throughout a day and night crowded with honors, South Korean President Syngman Rhee repeated dark prophecies of an inevitable showdown between the free world and the Communists.

Standing in a drizzling rain before City Hall yesterday, after a ticker-tape parade and praise by city officials for a lifetime dedicated to freedom, he sounded the day's first warning of open conflict.

"War must come soon and it is necessary that the United States, the champion of the free nations of the world, be saved from a terrible catastrophe," he declared.

"The later it comes the more terrible it will be."

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
