NORTON GETS REVENGE ON WINGATE TEAM

Norton revenged themselves for their defeat by Wingate last week by winning yesterday's game by the score of 11 to 6 at Maverick. The game was replete with thrills although loosely played, both teams making many errors. In the first Wingate scored 2 runs on an error by short scoring when Stitz Scoggins made a fluke home run past center field. Wingate scored again in the second on an error, stolen base and a single. Norton pulled the first triple play of the season when with a man on first and third, short stop speared a sharp hit grounder, throwing to second, forcing the runner, and then doubled the man at first, who threw home in time to catch the runner from third. Both teams scored twice in the 3rd. Wingate scoring on an error and a home run by Sandford. Norton scored again in the 4th and 5th on clean hitting. Norton then had their big inning in the lucky seventh when they scored 5 runs on a single and an error by short, a walk a hit batter forcing in a run, and a single with the bases full, scoring three runs, another single scoring the fifth. In the ninth Norton scored two more on two home runs by Scoggins and Cope. Wingate scored their other and last run in the ninth when with two out and three singles, they tallied, and with two men on a deep fly to center field ended the game.

Norton will play Bronte this afternoon on the Maverick diamond for the purse, offered by Maverick. Maverick was eliminated yesterday and Wingate today. There will be another three game series at either Wingate or Norton next week. HARLINGEN, Aug. 1.—The body of a man, believed to be that of Edgar Stammer, of Detroit, Texas, who officers believe was on an automobile trip with a woman companion, was found yesterday a short distance from his car on the highway between Raymondville and Falfurrias.

ABILENE MAN CONVICTED FOR ASSAULTING GIRL

The jury in the case of Elmon Hall, charged with a statutory offense, returned a verdict of guilty in court at Abilene late Thursday and assessed the punishment at one year in jail and a fine of \$500.

Hall was a member of a party of six, three men and three women, who drove out for a picnic near Abilene, and which, according to the testimony introduced in the case, resulted in a free-for-all drunk and a fight between the women. One of the girls filed a complaint alleging that she was assaulted by Hall, and the three men and the other two women were all indicted in connection with the case. Hall's case was the first tried. Joe Totten, charged with assault on the woman, was arraigned for trial Thursday afternoon, and the case was being heard Friday. The charges against the other parties were dismissed.

REVIVAL GETS LARGEST CROWD

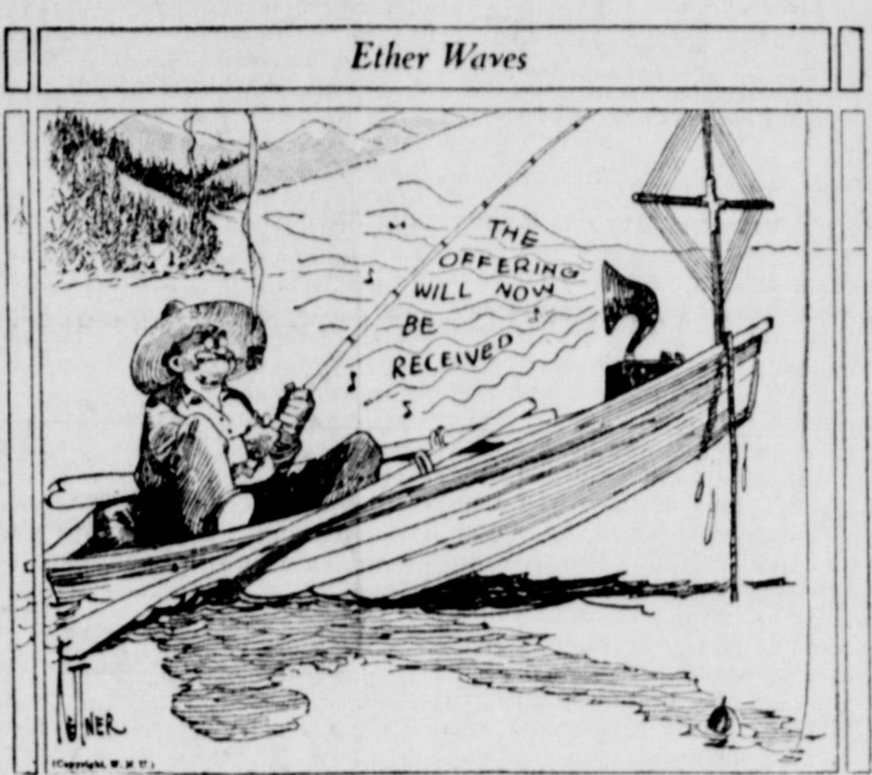

SATURDAY TO BE BUSY DAY FOR DEMOCRATS

Saturday morning the county democratic executive committee meets to canvass the election returns and make its report to the county convention which meets at two o'clock in the afternoon.

The committee is composed of one member from each precinct—the precinct chairman, with County Chairman Estes Lynn. The canvassing of the returns will be a mere matter of form, the tally sheets being checked, and a report made showing who the nominees are. The voters were expected to elect a precinct chairman from each precinct and a county chairman at the election last Saturday, and these will constitute the new county committee. In case precincts failed to elect a chairman, it will be the duty of the county chairman to name a democrat for the place.

At the county convention in the afternoon delegates will be elected to the district and state conventions. Delegates will be named for the congressional district convention, the state senatorial convention, judicial convention, etc. and probably resolutions passed dealing with party principles.

The state convention meets in Austin on Sept. 2nd, and the state platform recommending certain legislation will be drafted, and the nominees for state office on the democratic ticket formally declared.

GERMANS TO BE GIVEN CHANCE

PARIS, Aug. 1.—An agreement by the inter-allied conference at London will be reached not later than tomorrow, according to a spokesman of the French foreign office who returned from England today.

The delegates at the conference consider that the only danger point is the question of Germany's attitude when the German representatives are brought into the conference. It would be to the interest of Germany for that nation to show herself as being conciliatory, the delegates to the conference maintain.

BIG REDUCTION IN OLD COTTON

NEW ORLEANS, Aug. 1.—The carry over of American cotton into the next season, beginning today, was 254,000 bales less than the carry over of last year, according to H. G. Hester, secretary of the New Orleans Cotton Exchange.

The announcement was made in the annual report compiled by Mr. Hester.

STATE LOSES IN CHICAGO MURDER

(By Associated Press)
CHICAGO, Aug. 1.—Judge John Caverly over ruled objections by the state against testimony offered in the mitigation as to the punishment by the attorneys for Nathan Leopold Jr., and Richard Loeb.

This result which came after more than two days of arguments was a decided victory for the defense as it established the right to give testimony on mental diseases, short of legal insanity, not as the defense but in mitigation of punishment.

"It is the courts duty to hear this evidence," Judge Caverly said "it is not his duty to reject it before he has an opportunity to hear it." The objection by the state was over ruled.

After the ruling, Dr. William White, alienist from Washington took the stand. He stated his professional connection at the stage where he left off when his testimony was interrupted Wednesday.

BIG LAKE NO. 1 FLOWS 400 BARRELS

BIG LAKE, Aug. 1.—In an uncomplete condition Big Lake Oil Company's well No. 11 flowed 400 barrels of oil from 12:00 o'clock Wednesday to 12:00 o'clock Thursday. The drill struck pay dirt Wednesday morning, and oil flowed at intervals for twenty-four hours, and the drillers expected to finish it up as one of the best wells in the field.

The oil was found at a depth of 2,942 feet, which is twenty-three feet higher than found in the last well drilled, and the nearest producer. The well extends the Big Lake field one half mile East and lengthens the field to almost four miles. The scouts estimate the well will produce from 500 to 1000 barrels per day when the bit is drawn and the well put under operation.

The old wells are producing and twenty-nine cars were at the loading racks Thursday.

LYNCH NOW 7,088 VOTES SHY OF 2ND

(By Associated Press)
DALLAS, Aug. 1.—Mrs. Miriam Ferguson's lead over Lynch Davidson for second place in the governor's race continues to increase as the delayed returns are tabulated by the Texas Election Bureau.

Today's tabulation places Mrs. Ferguson 7,088 votes ahead of Lynch Davidson, while Felix D. Robertson is leading with a plurality of 48,095 votes.

These figures are the totals from 249 counties, 193 of which are complete, and only a few scattered boxes out in the remaining counties.

They show the following standing:

DALLAS, Aug. 1.—A correction in the vote of Harris county made a change in the attorney general's race today. The latest figures have Moody 280,196; Ward 109,823 and Wall 102,946. This again places Ward in second place, after Wall had occupied that place for a day.

SCHOOL MONEY COMING EARLY

A notice sent out to the school boards of this state by the department of education, puts the school boards on notice to select depositories and be prepared to receive school funds next month.

The per capita apportionment of the coming school year has been fixed at \$14, and the state superintendent has announced that he will be able to send two dollars per capita to each school district during the month of September.

This is the first time in the history of the state that a payment on the per capita apportionment will have been made before the expiration of the first month of school.

DATES FOR STATE FAIR AT DALLAS ARE OCT. 11-26

Many Changes All Over Grounds in Progress—Thirteen Days of Horse Racing.

October 11 to October 26 inclusive, are the dates for the State Fair of Texas at Dallas this year, and many new features, as well as many changes in buildings, are promised for the 1924 exposition.

There will be thirteen full days of running horse races on the great mile track; "Tokyo," a reproduction in fireworks of the great Japanese earthquake, will be a nightly feature; "The Passing Parade of 1924" a magnificent scenic, musical and "girl show" will be given in a specially constructed theatre, and the live stock displays, the poultry show, the automobile exhibits and the implement demonstrations, it is declared, will be wonderfully interesting and complete.

Outside of the transformation of the former Coliseum into the new agricultural building, the greatest change in buildings will be the new interior of the main exhibit building. Work has been in progress for two months. The interior will be an exact reproduction of a Spanish village, in architecture, coloring and every other detail, down to—or rather up to—the red-tiled roofs which complete the picture.

The handsome new booths will be occupied by exhibits of every description, and broad aisles, from which all manner of concessions have been removed, will give maximum ease and comfort for visitors.

WOMAN TOURIST WILL BOOST STATE FAIR

Emulating the example of Samuel Guy, Dallas real estate man, Mrs. L. L. Massengill of Lawrence, Tex., is to "boost" the State Fair while on a motor tour through West Texas and out into Yellowstone country. Mrs. Massengill wrote the publicity department of the State Fair that she was leaving Dallas July 15, and asked for several thousand copies of State Fair literature to take with her on her trip. The literature was furnished, and the loyal Texas woman was thanked for her offer. It is just such effort which lets the world know of the greatness of the State Fair of Texas—just such loyal co-operation that makes it great.

NEW INTERURBAN LINE READY BEFORE STATE FAIR OPENS

The new Denton Interurban will be in operation well before the opening of the State Fair of Texas, at Dallas, Oct. 11, 26. It is announced, The Terrell line into Dallas, was opened just before the 1923 State Fair. By 1925, according to all indications, Dallas and Gainesville may be connected by trolley.

Appreciates Work of Texas Cattlemen for Excluding Act

(By Associated Press)
FORT WORTH, Aug. 1.—Appreciation of work of Texas cattlemen for excluding South American cattle from Mexico is contained in a letter just received by J. E. Boog-Scott, chairman of the Live Stock Sanitary Commission of Texas, from H. A. Jastro, Bakersfield, Calif., president of the California State Agricultural Society.

Mr. Jastro explained that American cattle interest should be alive to the danger of importing dreaded livestock diseases from Mexico unless that Republic closes its doors to the South American countries some of which are disease ridden.

Henry C. Wallace, secretary of agriculture, will be appraised of the feeling of Texas and California cattlemen by Mr. Jastro next month on his trip East when he contemplates stopping in Washington for a conference with Secretary Wallace.

Foot and mouth disease in California is completely controlled except in Los Angeles county, according to Mr. Jastro. This section is being watched with the utmost care and it is anticipated

there will be little more trouble.

\$22,000 in Special Prizes

(By Associated Press)
AUSTIN, Aug. 1.—The Texas State Fair at Dallas and the Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock Show at Ft. Worth are to receive substantial sums in prize money from the Holstein-Friesian association of America with headquarters in Chicago.

The association has announced it will award this year \$22,000 in special prizes to the leading district, state and national exhibitions of Holstein cattle in the United States. These prizes are in addition to those to be awarded by the individual fairs.

The Texas State Fair, October 11 to 26, will receive \$875 of this

money and the Ft. Worth show, March 8 to 15, will get \$345. Provisions also have been made for awarding cash prizes to boys and girls exhibiting Holstein calf club calves.

Many Men Employed in Mapping British Coasts

Few people realize the hardship and dangers undergone by a comparatively handful of officers and men belonging to the royal navy who work year in and year out surveying coast lines and mapping the little-known depths of the ocean.

The hydrographic department of the admiralty has eight sloops constantly employed in the task of keeping the seas charted, and 40 officers and 700 men are under the control of a real admiral, says London Tri-Bits.

The bed of the ocean and the outlines of rocky coasts are constantly changing, so that for the safety of shipping charts and maps have to be revised and brought up to date at frequent intervals.

Cases have been known where whole islands have either appeared or disappeared in the course of a few hours. Falcon island, near the Tongas, for instance, was first discovered and charted in 1885, yet, although the mass of rock included cliffs rising fully 150 feet above the ocean level, it completely disappeared shortly afterward. In 1898 a volcanic disturbance once more brought the island to the notice of the surveyors, but before the end of the year it had disappeared again.

Small parties landing on wild stretches of coast are frequently met with shawls of stones or even bullets from suspicious inhabitants. Again much of the work has to be carried out from small boats, which may be away from the parent ship for a week or more at a time.

An officer and half a dozen men, detailed to work along a portion of the Chinese coast, encamped on a rock one night. Soon after daybreak a cruiser came along and began using this temporary refuge as a target for gunnery practice. Several shells found their mark before the men were able to make it known that the rock was inhabited.

Lamb Threw Gift Books Over His Garden Wall

In none of the letters or lives of Lamb have I found evidence that he ever bought a new book. His literary interests were of no profit to publishers. The battered veterans on his shelves welcomed no dapper young recruits; but he received numerous presentation copies from authors, and such volumes, too modern to please his fancy, he was wont to throw over the wall into Westwood's garden, writes Harry B. Smith in Scribner's.

In this manner was formed the library of the younger Thomas Westwood, then a boy of thirteen.

"A Leigh Hunt," he wrote 40 years afterward, "would come skimming to my feet through the branches of the apple trees; or a Bernard Barton would be rolled downstairs after me from the library door. 'Marclan Colonna' I remember finding on my window sill, damp from the night's fog; and 'The Plea of the Mid-Summer Fairies' I picked out of the strawberry bed."

The writer possesses one of these outcast volumes, absolutely identified by Westwood's bookplate and Hunt's inscription to Lamb. The covers are damp stained; like the lost heiress of old drama, it is identified by a strawberry mark.

When the Ark Sailed

Long ago March 17 was known as the anniversary of the date on which Noah and his family entered the ark.

Many hundreds of years ago, before there were theaters in England plays used to be given in front of the churches by the priests who acted out Bible stories. When March 17 came around a very funny play about Noah and his wife was performed. Mrs. Noah was a woman of a hot temper who thought her husband was quite losing his mind by building an ark. She refused flatly to live in it, even when the rain began to fall in torrents. The quarrel between Noah and his wife lasted until the water got so high that the shrieking woman had to jump in the ark at the end to save herself from drowning.

Successful experiments have been made with the instrument which will be used in a number of states during the current year.

U. S. SCHOOL BANK ARMY NOW NEAR 3,000,000 MARK

ARE the children of America learning thrift?

The best answer to this question may be gained from a study of the school savings bank system of our country.

A recent survey of these institutions indicated that during the last school year the number of depositors in school banks was close to 3,000,000, with deposits in excess of \$12,000,000. Balances in school banks of more than \$15,000,000. These figures are only approximate, because many school bank systems have no official reports, but they are sufficient completeness to reveal the rapid growth taking place in the department of thrift education.

Generally speaking, the increase in depositors and deposits is at the rate of 25 per cent. Steady increases are found both in the percentage of depositors to pupils enrolled as well as in the average amount of individual deposits, thus showing that the practices of thrift among American school children are becoming more intensive. It is estimated that there are now between 7,000 and 8,000 school banks successfully operating throughout the country located in some 500 cities and towns.

While this gratifying progress is being made, the start in the development of our school savings banks has only begun. If all available children were enrolled in the school bank systems of the country the number of depositors would be in the neighborhood of 25,000,000 instead of 3,000,000, and the amount of deposits would be \$100,000,000 instead of \$12,000,000.

In the development of school banks one important fact should be kept constantly in mind—namely, that thrift does not consist entirely in saving money. While it is most commendable that everything possible be done to encourage youthful Americans to save money, they should, at the same time, be taught that true thrift means not only saving, but the rightful use of money, time and energy as well.

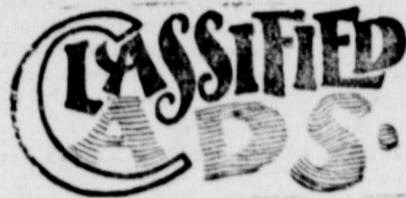
