## WHY A PARENT-TEACHERS' ASSOCIATION?

The aim and purpose of the Parent-Teachers' Association is to increase the efficiency of the schools and to extend their service into the life of the community. To carry the parent love and thoughtfulness into all that concerns or touches childhood in the home, church or State. To raise the standard of home life: to develop wiser, better trained parenthood, to bring in to closer relation, the home and school that parents and teachers may co-operate intelligently in the education of the child.

To raise the standard of the schools and promote such legislation as will advance the educational, economic and social standard of Texas.

Such meetings enable the parents to become acquainted with the school, its teachers and its work, thus making a more intelligent treatment of complaints and criticisms that may be brought home by the pupils.

It enables the parents to become better acquainted with one another in a new way concerning the chief interest of us all, the highest education of our children, mentally, morally and spiritually.

It enables parents to co-operate intelligently with any new method the school authorities may introduce.

It should appeal to all teachers, since no improvement in school conditions is possible until public opinion approves and demands it, and no group is so influential as enthusiastic parents who know the conditions and the possibilities for improving them.

Full and free discussion of general school problems in a meeting often solves without friction, petty difficulties.

Discipline usually becomes easier when a child realizes that father, mother and teacher not only understand each other, but are working together.

Parent-Teachers' Associations are not grievance committees to whom shall be referred incidents affecting the individual parent or teacher.

They are not framers of school regulations, nor dispensers of school positions.

They are not to supplement the duties of school trustees, but to supplement them. They are not for the purpose of criticizing the methods of teaching; nor the advocates of persons, but principles.

Its chief aim is to bind the parents and teachers into one organization with common ideals, a common understanding and a common purpose—the welfare of all the children of this community.

It is often through the efforts of the Parent-Teachers' Association that the school of limited means is able to maintain a term of sufficient length to meet the requirement of the State Department of Education, and every one who is interested in the development of high moral standard and educational qualifications of the boys and girls of this community should lend the P.T.A. all the aid and encouragement possible.

## Health

Things You Should Know

### Alleviating Bronchial Distress

"Winter Bronchitis" is a real affliction, peculiar to those already aged or approaching old age. It is a very common complaint, as every practicing physician knows. Its care becomes a problem to many families who number older folks among their treasures. To old people, life and comfort are paramount blessings. Cough mixtures are legion, and many are palliative but seldom curative. Indeed, proper conduct does more permanent good than medicine. The "fresh air crank" comes in and demands the inevitable wide-open windows. No matter how cold—how damp—or how laden with floating germs and micro-organisms, the windows must be open, and the cough goes on, to the distress of the sufferer and of those about him. To stupefy such patients with narcotic cough mixtures is the general rule, but how futile!

Remember this: Warm air may be just as good as cold, and is usually much more comforting than cold night air. Bedrooms should invariably be "aired out" thoroughly during the day. Beds are much healthier when aired and allowed to dry thoroughly. When night comes close the windows, and allow as little change of temperature as possible in the bedroom till morning. Do not close bedroom doors if the sleeping apartment is small and this suggests airing the entire residence as often as necessary for pure air, but do it in daytime. Sleeping rooms should be where bright sunlight can enter freely during the day. And, remember this: Cold night-air never benefitted a cough—on the contrary, it aggravates it. It belongs to the difficulty. Night-air is laden with impurities, and, in winter, chill the delicate respiratory membranes, beyond their recuperative power. The used bedroom is not an "old dog" idea.

## RUGGED BUILD OF THE STAR CAR WAS SHOWN.

A Star car showed its stamina in the United States army round-up at Fort Sam Houston, which came to a close about a week ago, when after crashing through a fence and somewhat damaged during a bull-dogging stunt, was again started following the accident and came back across the field under its own power.

The car was used twice by cowboys to bull-dog wild steers. The first day of the contest the field was so muddy and slippery that this feature did not prove very exciting.

On the third day, however, Cowboy Hoffman, general manager of the show, announced that bull-dogging a wild steer from the running board of a speeding automobile is one of the most dangerous and death-defying stunts in cowboy sports. Many in the big crowd that thronged the army stadium took this statement with a grain of salt. On the first attempt to throw the steer, the speeding car passed the infuriated animal just as he veered to the left. As the steer went down the field the car again overtook him and while running at a speed of about 35 or 40 miles an hour, Quick dived at the steer, but missed him, and rolled over and over in the dirt.

This only made the game cowboy angry and they went back to the corral and got out another steer. This animal was one of the wildest and speediest in the corral. He was not overtaken until he was within 20 feet of the far end of the stadium, where was another big corral. There was a camera man on top of the corral and as Quick jumped onto the steer's head the car crashed into the fence, and knocked the camera man and his camera to the ground. Hoey, the other cowboy, was thrown against the post and for a few minutes it was feared that he was seriously injured. Before the ambulance could reach the scene however, he regained his senses.

Everyone thought that the Star car which had crashed through the fence would surely be wreck, but Smiley White jumped into the car, stepped on the starter and romped back across the field. The remarkable performance of this rugged car received as much applause as did the courage of the cowboys who took part in this stirring event.

SUGGESTIONS FOR THE  
NEXT LEGISLATURE.

Of the making of laws there seems to be no end, yet there is a chance for improvement even in law-making. Some we already have should be changed, some repealed, and some made more effective by supporting laws. What we need in Texas, and probably in other States, are laws that will make more certain the punishment of criminals to the end that there will be less crime.

For this purpose Farm and Ranch suggests to the next Legislature a change in the laws governing juries in criminal cases, taking from the jury the responsibility of assessing the punishment and placing it with the trial judge. Such a law would result in fewer mistrials and more equitable punishment of the convicted.

As another suggestion we would offer a law that will bring about a change in court procedure and rules of practice that will prevent potpourris and continuances of cases when it is apparent to the trial judge that the party making the request has had plenty of time to make ready for trial and is only sparring for time.

We make other suggestions as follows:

That any person convicted of crime who is granted a new trial or appeals his case and has it remanded, shall, on his second appearance before the court or jury, occupy the same place relative to his chances of conviction and punishment as he did on his first trial. To make this proposition clear we hold that a person tried for murder, but who is convicted of manslaughter, and secures a new trial, should again be tried for murder and not for manslaughter. He voluntarily sets aside the previous verdict, and cannot in justice claim that he is being tried twice for the same offense. At least, the jury should have the right to increase the punishment on the second trial if it sees fit. A law of this kind would lend prestige to the district courts and greatly relieve the docket of the Court of Criminal Appeals. At the present time our District Courts are almost useless as most cases are finally determined in the higher courts.

That such laws be passed, or rules of procedure be enforced that will require attorneys appearing in court, who are officers of the Court, to confine themselves to dispassionate efforts to get at the facts in the case in order that there be less perjury, oftentimes encouraged by attorneys; less covering up of evidence and fewer vaudeville stunts in the court room. If such a reform is possible it would increase the respect for our courts and raise the standard of the legal profession.

That no person shall sign a bond who does not make oath that he is worth the amount of the bond free from all exemption and from other bonds previously signed, and that he will be willing and ready to pay the bond in case of forfeiture.

That it shall be the duty of the district or county attorney to collect the forfeited bonds, and in case of default, to explain to the Court in open session the reason for his failure.

That any tax receipts issued by State, county or city tax collectors are prima-facie evidence that all previous taxes have been paid.

These are just a few suggestions coming from a layman. Technically speaking, they may be in bad form. In any event there are a lot of lawyers who will not favor them. It will be some time before another regular session of the Legislature, but it is time to give consideration to the law needs of the State—Farm and Ranch.

FEDERAL GOV'T. BUYS  
KERRVILLE HOSPITAL.

Mountain Sun, Nov. 12th:—Washington, D. C., Nov. 9.—The Federal Hospitalization Board Monday recommended that the Federal Government purchase the American Legion Hospital at Kerrville from the State Government of Texas for \$1,182,000. The State had asked \$1,612,000 for the hospital, but Chairman S. B. Cowell of the Texas State Board of Control said that he would recommend that the State accept the offer.

The Texas representatives went before the Federal Hospitalization Board after they had failed to reach an agreement with Director Hines on the price. Apparently both Hines and the Texans were highly pleased with the outcome of the conference. Senator Sheppard, Congressman Tom Connally, Wayne Davis of San Antonio and State Senator Walter C. Woodward of Coleman accompanied Cowell, Walshall and Harrington of the Texas Board of Control and aided them in presenting the case.

The understanding was that the \$1,182,000 which the Federal Government would pay for the hospital will give the Federal Government the property clear. The hospital originally cost \$1,686,000. The recommendation for the purchase goes to President Coolidge, whose early approval is expected. An appropriation to buy the hospital will be passed at the coming session of Congress.

The Above is indeed pleasing news to the citizens of Kerrville and the Hill Country, as it settles the uncertainty that has existed for the past year, and many improvements that have been held up pending the outcome of the negotiations will now go forward. A large amount of money will be expended by the Government in the near future for additional buildings and better facilities to properly care for the ex-service men already enrolled. An increase in the number of patients will also follow.

The American Legion Memorial Hospital was established by the American Legion of Texas soon after the close of the World War. Later the Legion relinquished the hospital to the State and additional buildings were constructed. It has been leased the past two years by the Veterans' Bureau for hospitalization of ex-service men suffering with pulmonary troubles contracted during the war. The American Legion of Texas will receive \$225,000 of the \$1,182,000 sale price when the deal is completed, according to information received by local Legion members.

## OBITUARY.

Marvin Willie Dechert, son of Mrs. W. O. Dechert, was born June 23, 1910, and departed this life October 26, 1925, being just past the age of 15. He was a member of the Sixth Grade in public school and was loved by his class mates and friends, which was evidenced by his teacher and the entire student body of his room attending in a body, bringing a most beautiful floral offering in token of their love and sympathy. He played football Thursday before his death occurred early the following Monday.

Neither his friend nor family knew that the disease which had been preying upon him was so fast wearing his strength and vitality away, for he was apparently well as usual up until a day or two before his death.

He was converted in early childhood and joined the Methodist church in which faith he lived and labored. He was a member of the intermediate class in Sunday School, and was usually present when his health and weather conditions permitted.

The funeral service was conducted by the writer at 10: a. m., Tuesday, October 27, in the Methodist church at Junction, which was attended by a large concourse of friends and rela-

tives, both from here and other parts of the country. After services, we laid his body to rest in Junction cemetery beneath a bank of flowers of wondrous beauty, to await the final Great Day, when all the nations of earth shall be summoned to the bar of God.

He is survived by four brothers, three sisters, and a widowed mother, besides a number of relatives and a host of friends, to sorrow his death.

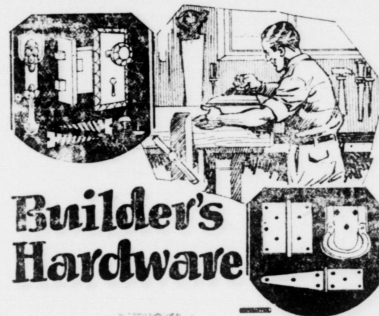

### OUTLAWING OUR POLITICAL PARTIES.

Two or three of our brethren of the press are in favor of outlawing political parties and make arguments in support of their views, but after reading the same with some pleasure, we continue in our agreement with Thomas Jefferson, James G. Blaine, Grover Cleveland, W. H. Taft, and Woodrow Wilson, that parties are necessary under our form of government. We do not believe the State should assume to regulate party procedure. It would be as reasonable to regulate church procedure. If a party committee deems best that a primary be held, they should be free to order it. If in their judgment a contention would secure more desirable candidates, they should not be limited by law in applying that method. The executive committee of any party should be invested with power to bar from its ballot the names of any candidate selected by a group or bloc. We said ten years ago when the prohibitionists of Texas met and nominated a prohibition candidate that the candidate's name should not be allowed on the democratic ballot of Texas. We are of the same belief now—let candidates of groups and blocs forward their issues in separate parties. If groups and blocs do not like the platforms of parties or will not support the nominees, they should stay out of the party primaries and conventions. The State, of course, regulates general elections and pays the expenses thereof. The State's regulations as to filing of the names of independent candidates for printing on the ballots should be liberal. If there is an issue in the minds of the people not represented in party candidates, the independent candidate should have no trouble in order to represent the people on that issue. There should be no recurrence of the Peddy incident in Texas. The opposition to Mayfield had a right to a candidate and there should have been no bar from the election law. The State of Texas should regulate general elections and leave nominating primaries to party machinery. Party bossism, whether exercised through direct primaries or representative conventions, is held in check by the possibility of independent opposition to party candidates in the general election. The hope of some for one free for all general election will never be realized and it should not be.—Exchange

### SOME GOOD ROAD WORK IN EDWARDS COUNTY.

Commissioner J. W. Babb has been quite active during the past few weeks on the roads of Precinct No. 1, and some good work has been done. He has had a crew working the Uvalde road about ten miles from town for a distance of about four miles, and this piece of road that has been needing work very badly for a long time has been much improved. Mr. Babb also has a crew working on the Del Rio road from about seventeen miles out toward town, they are changing the road to the new right of way, and are clearing and grading, and doing some good road work.

And the State has a maintenance crew working westward toward Del Rio. And it is reported that the trip from Rocksprings to Del Rio has now actually become a matter of only three and a half hours. Not so long ago this same road was a terror to travelers.—Edwards County Leader.

A glance at the State map, which shows highways of Texas will show that this work, mentioned by the Rocksprings paper, is of great interest to the people of Edwards County. With the Mason-Junction-Rocksprings highway designation, a fact now, it will be seen that from points beyond Menard or beyond Mason and Brady, traveler desiring to go to Del Rio will have an almost direct route via Junction and Rocksprings.

### GOOD ADVERTISING PAYS THE FARMER.

Why advertise? Advertising has assumed tremendous proportions in the affairs of the city business-man. It is estimated that one billion dollars is spent annually, is invested in advertising because it pays. It has been proved repeatedly that by increasing the number of sales, the cost of selling is decreased. Farmers know that by increasing the acre yield of cotton by fertilizers or other means, the cost of growing a pound of cotton can be reduced. What many of them have not learned is that advertising has the same effect on the cost of selling a product that increased acre-yields have on the cost of growing a product. Good advertising will bring the farmer dividends just as it has brought dividends to the men in the industrial world. It will enable him in reason to set his own price on the goods he produces—a thing that he has longed to do ever since farmers began to produce beyond their own needs.

There is no mystery in advertising. Investigation and practical results have proved it to be a safe investment where the buyer is familiar with the fundamental principles. An advertisement should do four things: (1) attract attention; (2) arouse interest; (3) create desire; (4) effect a sale.

As a rule people prefer products that have had a reputation built up for them through advertising. The public is willing to pay more, as a rule, for a product backed by consistent advertising that it is for an unknown one. The first advertisement may have little effect on the reader, but an impression is usually made that, while faint at first, may be developed into decided desire for that particular class of goods as the advertising message is repeated.—Eugene Butler, in The Progressive Farmer.

Commissioner Wiley Fisher was busy last week and the first part of this, with the County's big Catapillar, dragging the road between Junction and London. This road had all been graded before the recent rains and with a good dragging with the big grader, it will settle and be in unusually good condition. The tractor was taken back to the South Llano road this week to continue the work up that way.

With a change in the Menard-Junction road, beginning at the Bannovsky ranch, and running along the west side of Bear Creek, eliminating seven creek crossings, and cutting down the distance about two miles, and with Menard County building a good road to the county line, Junction will be greatly benefited. Mr. Bendy, Highway Supervisor, tells us that the road between Menard and Eden is in excellent condition and extensive work is being done between Eden and San Angelo that will make a fine road between these two points, it looks like we are to be pretty well connected up with the Plains country by next summer.

The Eagle feels that the County Court took a very conservative and commendable view of the park situation last week when they voted to help pay for the four additional lots Junction is the county seat, and as such belongs to all the county's citizens, whether living in the town or in the remotest parts of the county. Every one in the county comes to Junction many time during the year. They will have occasion to use the parks of the town, just the same as people living here. If they want to camp for a night or more, modern accommodations will be provided for them at nominal cost.

When families come to attend the county fair or other gatherings, there will be sanitary toilets, plenty of drinking water, sanitary camping places, benches, tables, chairs, swimming pools, etc., for their use. We are to have a park system that will be second to none and one that every citizen of the county will be proud of. Not only in such matters as this, but in all matters over which they have under their charge, the present court has shown that they are broad-minded and awake to their responsibilities. They are con-

servative in spending the people's money and see that every dollar spent, gets a dollar's worth of value. This is not bull, thrown out by this paper in an attempt to make the members of the court feel good or to try to popularize them with the people generally, but a little observation and a knowledge of the facts will prove these statements correct.

Heretofore it has been necessary to go to San Angelo, if traveling from the north central part of the State, or via San Antonio, if from Brownwood country, in order to reach Del Rio. With Del Rio only three and one-half hours from Junction, and with Rock-springs only three hours from Junction, this time will likely be reduced to two hours, before the end of nother year, it will only be a matter of a few hours' drive from here to the border city.

The chances are that bus lines will be running to that city, coming out of San Angelo.

Well, we are getting on the map down this way. Every road out of Junction a designated highway—that's going some.

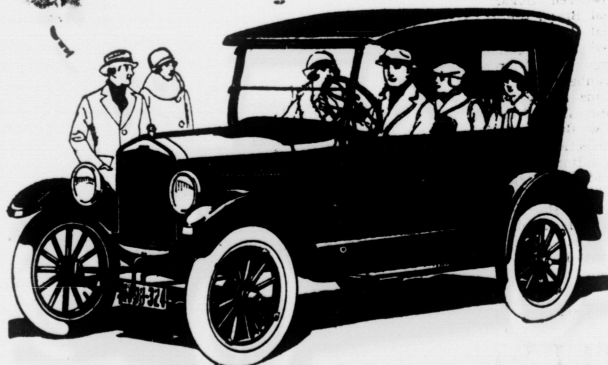

### HATCH EARLY TO GET BEST POULTRY RESULTS

Mrs. May Huskin, in The Farm News.)

I have often heard the old expression, "The early bird catches the worm." That same expression might well apply to "Early hatched chickens are the profit-makers in the fall and winter." Just as you and I have more pep and vitality in the winter, so do the chicks. The early hatched chicks will not only grow off faster and do much better, but will have less mortality and get their maturity in time to overcome many of the summer diseases chicks are subject to. Sorehead is one of the greatest pests we have to contend with in summer and fall, yet sorehead hardly ever attacks a grown chicken. If it does the chicken being grown has more resistance than a younger and less developed chicken, and for that and many other reasons the early hatched chicken has the advantage over the later one.

All close observers know eggs are higher in the fall than at any other season of the year; they also know that good laying hens go into molt in the fall and take a rest. These early hatched pullets well cared for get their development and are ready to begin laying early in the fall to produce these high priced eggs.

As a general rule it is the practice in this part of the country to start the incubator about the 10th of January, hatching the first chicks around the first days of February. As the Barred Plymouth Rocks and Orpingtons are somewhat slower in getting their development these should preferably be hatched first. The Rhode Island Reds and Wyandottes may be successfully hatched some time about the last of February or even well into March. The Minorcas should be best hatched during the last few days of February or first of March. Anconas and Leghorns are better hatched from the 1st of March to about the 15th of April. They get their development more quickly than the larger birds and will be ready for egg production by the first of November if properly developed with feed and care.

The best time to hatch different birds, according to learned poultrymen, are as follows:

All Plymouth Rocks and Orpingtons from the first to the last of February.

All Wyandottes, Rhode Island Reds and Minorcas, from the middle of February to the last of March.

All Leghorns and Anconas, from the first of March to the middle of April.

### WHY NOT WOOLEN AND MOHAIR MILLS IN TEXAS

They are bringing cotton mills to the cotton fields. Why not bring the woolen and mohair mills to the sheep and goat country?

Texas leads all States in the production of wool and mohair, producing 80 per cent of the mohair of the country. Fortunately, the sheep and goat country of the State is supplied with its livest running streams. High bluffs on each side with rock foundations for dams should make attractive locations for mills to be operated by water power. Bringing cotton mills to Texas is a splendid business move. To card and spin wool near the source of supply with an abundance of cheap water power, and with oil and gas in other sections of the State, should prove as good a proposition, and benefit both to producers and consumers.

It took something of a campaign to start the cotton mills in Texas. Perhaps the same effort on the part of wool and mohair producers would bring equally as good results. The Southwest is a consumer of woolen goods. Perhaps not in the quantities consumed in colder climates, but enough to make the local demand worth while. The Southwest is also a heavy consumer of mohair in its various forms of manufacture, and undoubtedly it would be cheaper to ship the finished product to other markets than it is to ship the raw material.

While our chambers of commerce are talking industries for the Southwest, why not give greater consideration to the use of raw materials produced on the farms and ranches? When talking cotton mills for the Southwest, why not also talk about woolen and mohair mills?—Farm and Ranch.

But in the night the angels of the Most High visit the plague upon Egypt, and when, the next morning, Pharaoh holds his first-born in his arms, and hears the wailing of the mothers and fathers of his land he orders the liberation of the Jews.

Moses leads the Children of Israel forth from the gates of the city of their captivity. By the thousands they stream forth—men and women and children. Most of them are afoot, but here and there one rides an ass or a camel, and some of the aged and infirm are in litters. With them they take their goods and chattels, their cattle and their sheep and their goats. They are a liberated people on the march—a nation exalted with hope of the Promised Land and with the knowledge that the word of their prophets has come true.

Then Pharaoh suffers a change of heart, and orders his war chariots to start in pursuit of the Jews. The Children of Israel are at the Red Sea and those who are wavering in their faith revile Moses, the leader. Death or captivity seem inevitable, but Moses prays, and then the Lord sends a pillar of fire to stop the charge of the Egyptians and at the same time divides the waters of the sea so that His Chosen People pass in safety and dry-shod to the other shore.

The war chariots start in pursuit but the waters close over their heads.

The exaltation of the prophet soon passes, for he finds that during his absence his people have set up a golden calf and worshipped it. Even his sister, Miriam, has been guilty of abominations. Then Moses, the lawgiver, descends from the mountain and crashes his tablets of stone into the scene of idolatrous worship and licentious revelry. The golden calf is destroyed and turned to dust. As the dust settles figures emerge slowly from a misty background. Departed is the picturesque splendor of the days when history was written in stone; vanished the majesty of the background of Sinai and the lightning which was the sign of the wrath of God.

A primly dressed mother sits at a table in a modern room. She is reading from the Bible to her two sons. It is San Francisco; the time is today or a just-passed yesterday.

One son, Dan, is bored and cynical. The other son, John, is tolerant and more than half impressed; at any rate, he is deferential to his mother.

"That's bunk," says Dan. He intimates that the Ten Commandments may have been all right for the dead ones, but that the world has changed.

The deeply religious mother, a Scotch-American woman who believes in the letter and fails to catch the spirit of religion, is affronted. Hugging her Bible to her flat breast, she turns her son out of her home because he says he does not believe in God. Dan apologizes to his mother, but refuses to apologize to God, because he does not believe in God.

The mother is relentless. She is warned by her good son that she is using the cross to scourge but will not relent. Later she does let Dan return, but the next Sunday she starts to leave home, Bible under her arm, because this sceptical son and his sweetheart are dancing on the Lord's Day.

The upshot of it is that Dan and Mary, both unbelievers, leave the house. They will defy the commandments together, they say, and Dan's parting taunts to John is to the effect that he, Dan, will break the laws of Moses and wax rich and have the world at his feet, whereas the stay-at-home boy, if he lives up to the Ten Commandments will finish just where he began—as a carpenter.

Now it so happened that the good son also loves Mary, and in bitterness of spirit he says: "I guess that's all I'm fit for—to be a carpenter."

His mother, her Bible in her arms, overhears his words and replies: "Many fine men have been carpenters, John."

In the second part the film takes up the lives of these four people three years later. Climaxes of thrilling power are reached, and in the end the Eternal Law is vindicated.
