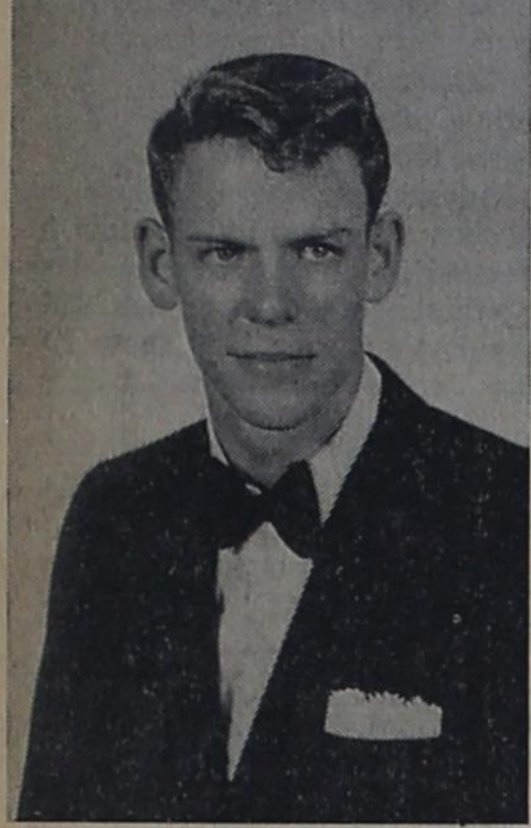


1963 Valedictorian

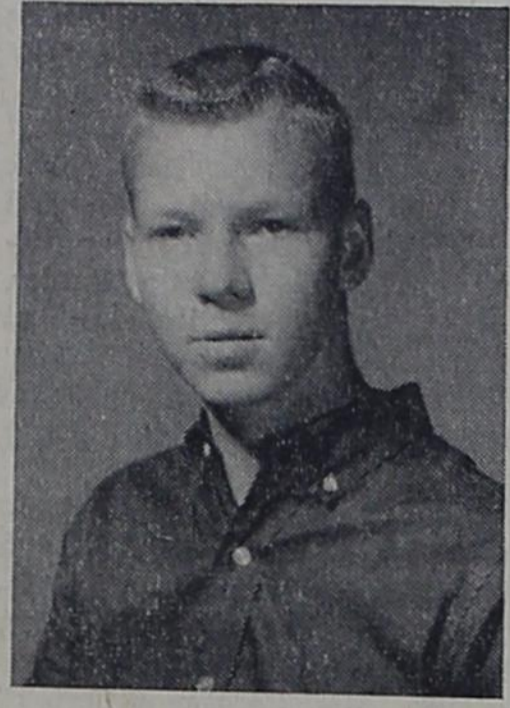

1963 Salutatorian

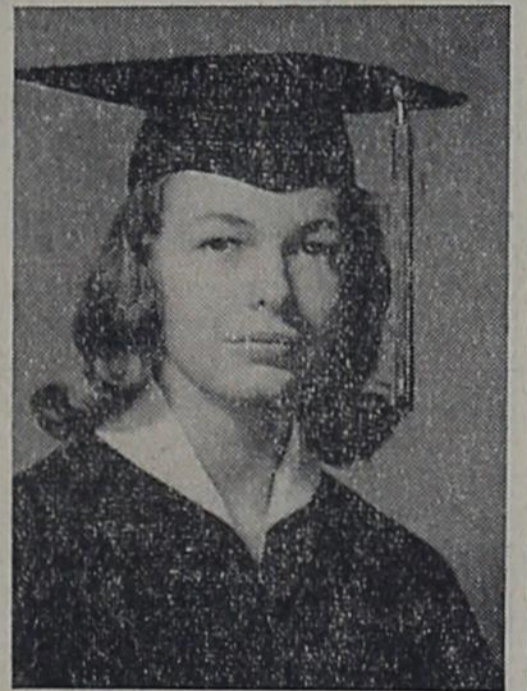


Bobby Browning, son of Mr. and Mrs. Bobby Browning, with a four year average of 94.76, is the Salutatorian of the 1963 graduating class.

Supt. W. R. Taylor Issues Statement On School Election

"If" and "If Nots" concerning the tax and bonds proposals to be submitted to the taxpaying voters on May 11, 1963, written and submitted by Mr. W. R. Taylor, Supt. of Schools:

PROPOSITION NO. 1

If Passed

1. The Board of Trustees may set the tax rate for maintenance at any rate up to a maximum of \$1.50 per \$100 valuation. The tax for debt service (bonds and interest) will be in addition to the maintenance tax.

2. The Board will set the rate for maintenance at whatever is necessary (up to the \$1.50 maximum) to provide the \$8,000 to \$9,000 additional local revenue per year needed to finance an adequate budget.

If, through the action of the Equalization Board and the School Board, the total valuation of taxable properties is raised, the Board will lower the rate proportionately.

If Not Passed

1. The Board cannot set the total tax rate for both maintenance and debt service (bonds and interest) at more than \$1.50 per \$100 valuation. (Currently \$1.12½ for maintenance and \$37½ for debt service is being levied.)

2. The Board will be compelled to raise the valuation of taxable property "across the board" by as much as 30% over the present valuation in order to provide the \$8,000 to \$9,000 in additional local revenue needed for maintaining an adequate budget.

PROPOSITION NO. 2

If Passed

1. \$40,000 in bond revenues will be made available for use within 30 to 45 days.

2. Urgently-needed repairs, improvements, equipment and facilities can be provided for beginning immediately. Extensive work can be done this summer.

3. Approximately \$20,000 of this bond revenue can be placed on time deposit in the local bank to serve as "collateral" for the \$10,000 now owed at the bank and for the additional loans needed to finance the balance of the current year's operation.

4. This bond revenue can be used during the next two or three years for repairs, maintenance work, improvements, equipment and other capital outlay, releasing the tax money that would have to be spent for these purposes to apply on the retiring of the deficit at the bank. Bond revenue on deposit would offset the unpaid balance of the deficit.

The 6% interest being paid on this bank obligation could be reduced or offset by the interest allowance made by the bank for the bond revenue on time deposit.

5. An increase in the bond tax rate sufficient to retire this additional bonded indebtedness will be set by the Board. This increase, based upon the present valuation, probably would be from the present \$37½ to \$50 per \$100 valuation. With an increase in values through equalization, this rate may be lowered proportionately.

If Not Passed

1. No money will be available for meeting the school's needs until this fall.

2. Urgently-needed repairs, maintenance work, improved facilities, and equipment will have to wait. Practically no summer work can be done.

3. The Board will have no "collateral" to offer for the \$10,000 now owed at the local bank or for the \$12,000 loan that will be needed to finance the operation of the school for the balance of the year.

The only means of securing this loan is through personal signatures guaranteeing repayment.

4. The Board will be compelled to increase the values of property rendered for school tax purposes by a substantial percentage, over and above that needed for maintenance of a normal budget, to provide for the repayment of the \$22,000 deficit that will exist at the close of the school year. This additional tax load during the next two or three years will be

ELECTION ON SCHOOL TAX AND BOND ISSUE SET FOR MAY 11TH

The members of the Gorman Independent School District Board of Trustees met in a called session April 26th and unanimously voted in favor of ordering a Tax and Bond Election to be held on Saturday, May 11th.

The following propositions shall be submitted to the resident qualified electors and taxpaying voters of Gorman Independent School District, who each owns taxable property in said district, and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, for their action thereupon:

PROPOSITION NO. 1

Shall the Board of Trustees of Gorman Independent School District of Eastland and Comanche Counties, Texas, be authorized and empowered to levy an annual ad valorem tax at a rate not to exceed ONE DOLLAR AND FIFTY CENTS (\$1.50) on the hundred dollars' valuation of taxable property in said School District, for the further maintenance of public free schools therein, as provided by the terms as conditions of Article 2784e-1, V.A.T.C.S.

If such tax is so adopted by majority vote of the duly qualified resident property taxpaying electors voting at said election therefor, then the provisions of Article 2784e-1, V.A.T.C.S., as amended, shall apply to said district.

abnormally burdensome to taxpayers.

Until the deficit is repaid, the Board will be faced each summer with the problem of borrowing without collateral provided by the school district.

PROPOSITION NO. 2

Shall the Board of Trustees of Gorman Independent School District of Eastland and Comanche Counties, Texas, be authorized and empowered to issue the bonds of said District, pursuant to the authority of Article 2784e-1, V.A.T.C.S., as amended, and to the amount of Forty Thousand Dollars (\$40,000) for school building purposes, to-wit; the purchase, construction, repair or equipment of public free school buildings and the purchase of necessary sites therefor, within the limits of said district, said bonds to become due and payable serially as follows:

\$2,000 in each of the years 1964 to 1973, inclusive.

\$3,000 in each of the years 1974 to 1977, inclusive.

\$4,000 in each of the years 1978 and 1979.

and to bear interest at a rate of not exceeding Four and one-half percent (4½%) per annum, payable annually or semi-annually; and shall there be annually levied and collected on all taxable property in said district for the current year and each year thereafter, while said bonds or any of them or any interest thereon are outstanding, a tax sufficient to pay the current interest on said bonds and the principal thereof as the same becomes due?

That said election shall be held in the High School, and in the Gorman Independent School District, and the officers of said election shall be as follows:

W. G. Baker, Presiding Judge; Estelle Craddock, Judge; Mrs. Viola Eaker, Clerk; Mrs. Rooney Williams, Clerk.

For the reason listed below, we, the members of the Board of Trustees of the Gorman Independent School District favor the passage of both the Maintenance Tax Proposal and the Bond Issuance and Bond Tax Proposition:

MAINTENANCE TAX INCREASE:

1. It will provide from \$8,000 to \$9,000 annually in additional local revenue, all of which is needed to finance an adequate operating and maintenance budget.

2. It will give the property taxpaying voters of the district the privilege of participating in the decisions affecting the financing of the school program.

BOND ISSUE AND THE BOND TAX:

1. It is the only means known to us of providing funds at an early date for repairs and improvements urgently needed at this time.

2. It is the most practicable means of providing a sufficient amount of funds to pay for repairs, improvements, furniture, and equipment needed to bring the school plant up to date.

3. It will provide funds that may be used as collateral for \$10,000 now owed at the local bank and for \$10,000 more that will be needed to complete this year's normal operation.

We know of no other means of providing the guarantee of repayment that is needed by the bank in order to make the additional \$10,000 loan.

4. This time deposit will make possible a substantial cut in the 6% interest rate that is being paid for current loans.

5. It is the most practicable means of providing for the repayment of the \$20,000 to \$22,000 deficit which will be outstanding at the close of the current school year. Any other known method would be impracticable and overburdensome to taxpayers during the next two or three years.

Gorman Ladies Makes Historical Pilgrimage

The Gorman group stayed overnight in the Old Excelsior House, and slept in the Jay Gould room. This is one of Texas' most famous landmarks, completely restored as when President U. S. Grant, Ruford B. Hayes and Financier Jay Gould stopped there.

The "Green" tour taken by ladies included the beautiful historical homes such as The Mary Carlson Home, a one story Colonial type cottage built in 1865 by Dan Allen, and it has housed members of his family continuously ever since. Its antique furniture traveled to Jefferson by river steamboat from New Orleans. The Manse, built by General Rogers in 1839, oldest structure in Jefferson. Old Schuler House, a Colonial mansion with spacious halls and wide galleries designed for gracious living, and the Excelsior House. The Docks where the river steamboats landed at Big Cypress Bayou bringing glamorous goods to the early day settlers.

Jefferson is Texas' first river steamboat metropolis, dating back to 1832, with the first Anglo-American settlement at Smith's Landing. The Jewish Synagogue for the "Diamond Bessie Murder Trial" and the Jay Gould "Private Railroad Car".

The Jefferson Historical Pilgrimage is sponsored by the Jessie Allen Wise Garden Club three days each year in April, and the ladies making the tour say the townfolk nor the visitors can forget its charm and by-gone glories.
