Dutch Leuenberger Reports That \$3,966.65 Has Been Raised On War Fund Quota



J. R. (Dutch) Leuenberger, over-all chairman of the United War Fund campaign which is currently being staged in this county, reported Saturday that \$3,966.65 had been raised here thus far on the \$10,371 quota.

A report he received from headquarters on the week ending October 6, showed that this county ranked 32.7 per cent of the total quota. Dawson County was surpassed only by Garza County which had secured 43.8 per cent of their War Fund quota.

Chairman Leuenberger states that there is a lot of work to be done here before the quota can be completed for the drive. He asks that a concentrated effort be made here to raise the remaining \$6,404.35 by October 20.

The United War Fund official requests that all rural chairmen make an effort now to see the people in their communities since the weather is clear, to get their donations for the drive.

He states that a meeting will be held this week to which city chairmen will be invited. This group will formulate plans to secure all special gift donations and to complete the city drive.

The need for donations to the fund is apparent when you read the news release which is printed below, and which was sent to this office from Austin:

With return to normal living in Europe based upon the experience of the critical fall and winter ahead, Winthrop W. Aldrich, president of the National War Fund, advised Judge Ben H. Powell, president of the United War Chest of Texas, of the desperate need of continued American help through the final victory campaign of the National War Fund.

Mr. Aldrich has just returned from a trip to Europe where he visited England, France, Holland, Czechoslovakia and Germany.

"In my opinion," Mr. Aldrich reported, "Mass starvation and death by freezing are not likely to occur in Europe this winter, but there will be great suffering unless the people receive more than the necessities of life in addition to essential food and clothing, and unless these necessities are provided by the agencies of the National War Fund."

"Some people ask why private relief is necessary, and if governments are not meeting the needs of their people. The answer is the fact that governments and government agencies are striving desperately to restore the basic economy—to provide transportation, coal and mass food supplies, to reopen ports and to set up means of distribution. 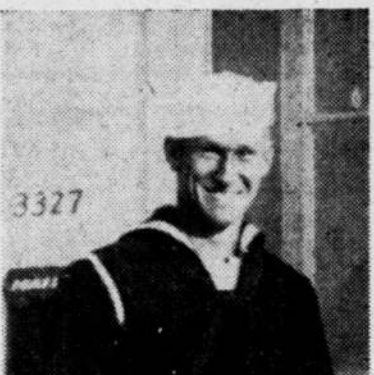
W. Olds On Ship Reported Sunk By Japs Five Times

ABOARD THE USS PENSACOLA at Ominato — William G. Olds, fireman, second class, USNR, son of Mr. and Mrs. Elton Olds, 702 Austin Street, Lamesa, witnessed the astonishment of Jap harbor pilots when they saw the cruiser, USS Pensacola, at the surrender ceremonies off Ominato, Japan.

The Japs at various times in the last three years had reported sinking the "Gray Ghost" five times. The first time was at the battle of Guadalcanal, at Tarao, at Salami, and at Okinawa the Gray Ghost was either hit, or near hit, prompting the Jap sinking reports.

As Jap surrender emissaries ventured toward the flagship of Vice Admiral Jack Fletcher in the harbor, their whale boat passed close beneath the Pensacola. It was there that crew members of the "Gray Ghost" saw the amazement of the Japs that the Pensacola was still afloat.

Tornadoes Beat Steers To Start District Campaign

San Angelo To Meet Tornadoes Here Friday

Lamesa's Golden Tornadoes, after hitting the touchdown trail to triumph in the district 3-AA opener with Big Spring Friday, settled down to serious work Monday for their game here next Friday with the San Angelo Bobcats.

The Bobcats, not so mighty as they once were, will be strong enough to offer the Lamesans stern opposition and will be favored to defeat the home club by three or four touchdowns. San Angelo, state champion in 1943 and a semifinalist in 1944, is not that powerful this season. The Bobcats have won one game, tied one and lost two thus far. They rested last week after meeting four potent teams as they prepared for their district opener with Lamesa.

San Angelo lost all but one letterman from last year's brilliant aggregation. He is Dwain Dodson, passing star of the backfield. The Bobcats beat Denison 6 to 0 to open the season, tied Lubbock 13 to 13, lost to Highland Park 19 to 6, then fell before Amarillo 20 to 6.

Lamesa came through the hard-fought struggle with Big Spring in good shape, and will probably be able to field the regular starters against the Cats. Rippy, regular halfback, played a lot against Big Spring and will in all likelihood be ready for starting duty Friday.

Fortenberry also got into the Steer game and should be in top condition this week. Rippy was bothered with a bad knee this week, and Fortenberry has been nursing a bruised shoulder for two weeks.

Odessa rolled on Friday by beating Abilene, and Sweetwater defeated Midland in other 3-AA conference bouts.

Lamesa got down to the Steer one-yard line twice but couldn't produce the pay-off punch. One time the home club drove to that spot under its own power, and the second time it got there partially on the strength of a penalty against the Steers. The Tornadoes drew a questionable penalty for roughing the kicker once when the Steers were practically on their own goal line which helped pull the Big Spring eleven out of a tight spot.

The second quarter was a passing duel with both sides rolling up good aerial gains. Lamesa's running game clicked well at times in the last half, and they clearly earned their triumph over a stubborn foe.

Nieman and Patterson led the Lamesa attack and both lads did good work defensively including important pass interceptions. Homer Rippy, Tornado halfback, showed lots of drive in the second half and displayed little evidence of the injured knee that had been bothering him. Jim Rowbottom, starting his first game, played good ball and caught several passes for nice gains.

Orville Nieman, the Golden Tornadoes stellar halfback, tossed a pass over the goal line to towering end Bryant Clark for 8 yards and a touchdown late in the first quarter for the tally that gave Lamesa a well-earned 6 to 0 victory over the Steers in Big Spring Friday night. This was the 3-AA opener for the Lamesa lads.

A large crowd which included a big contingent of Lamesa fandom watched the Tornadoes grab an early lead and threaten to widen it repeatedly as they outplayed the home club most of the way. The touchdown pass was successfully executed despite the fact that Nieman bobbled an erratic pass from center. Steer linemen charged in on the Lamesa halfback and the Big Spring secondary pulled up closer, leaving Clark completely in the clear. Nieman sped toward the left sideline and passed on the run. The ball was thrown a little high but Clark, who stands well over six feet, pulled it securely. Nieman's try for extra point was blocked.

That lone touchdown wound up the scoring. Big Spring piled up sizeable yardage both aground and in the air but a stout Lamesa defense stopped them when it was necessary. Gerald Harris, big Steer tackle, playing his first game in the backfield, broke through the left side of his line in the second period and went 45 yards to score. The play was called back, however, and Big Spring drew a 15 yard penalty for holding.

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Freemans Had Successful Deer Hunt In Colorado

J. H. W. H. and Roy Freeman, brothers, spent six days recently hunting deer in the Colorado River Territory.

J. H. and W. H. both had good success with their hunting. J. H. whose home is located approximately 10 miles southwest of town, killed a 14 point buck with a 31 inch spread. The buck weighed 400 pounds, and Freeman thinks it is the largest to have been brought back to Dawson County.

W. H. killed a 9 point buck. The brothers reported that there were lots of hunters from this territory in the Colorado district and that they were enjoying a fair deer hunting season. In past years the Freemans have hunted in Arizona, but this year they chose to go to Dolores, Colorado.

Girl Scouting In The Postwar World

The war is over! With what a reverent sense of gratitude and relief we say those words. And, as we say them, simultaneously we must look with courageous vision toward the future. For us in Girl Scouting that future holds new challenges. During the war years, women have assumed new responsibilities, earned new privileges, many of which will be continued in the postwar years. The girls of today will hold a unique place in the world of tomorrow—and Girl Scouting can do so much to prepare them to fill that place wisely and well.

The National Board of Directors forswore the needs of girls in the postwar world when it issued a Postwar Plan for Scout in the fall of 1944. That plan stated that during the coming years, the Girl Scout organization would work along the following lines:

1. To help more girls, especially among those groups now inadequately reached by the youth-serving agencies, to find enduring satisfaction and development through membership in a Girl Scout troop.

2. To help every girl and adult member to be more aware of the importance of the Girl Scout promise and Laws as a personal code, both for her own integrity and for her value to society.

3. To bring the international aspects of our program closer to every girl.

4. To make the idea of citizenship in the United States of America dynamic and important to each girl by helping her to see her value and debt to her community and nation.

5. To relate our program and service activities to the postwar interests and needs of girls and to the changing conditions in the nation and world.

ALABAMA TAKES UP ALCOHOLISM STUDY

MONTGOMERY, Ala. (AP)—The state of Alabama has embarked upon a scientific study of alcoholism's causes and possible cures. The 1945 legislature appropriated \$5,000 for the study, which will include an educational campaign to acquaint the public with "the fact that an alcoholic is a sick person."

The board consists of seven members, two appointed by the governor and five ex-officio. The ex-officio members include the state health officer, the superintendent of the state's mental hospitals and a psychiatrist.

Victory Loan Quota Is Set For Dawson County; Drive Will Begin On October 29



Carl Rountree, chairman of the Dawson County War Finance Committee, received a communication last week from Nathan Adams, state chairman, reporting that the Victory War Loan Drive quota for this district has been set at \$250,000 for series E bonds with an over-all quota of \$480,000 being allotted this area.

The letter stated, "We are approaching this final drive with the knowledge that it won't be easy, but with the greatest determination we have had during the entire war financing program to see it succeed. Certainly we must not fail to back our country in Victory with our dollars."

"Costs of demobilization, rehabilitation, care of wounded and contract termination are tremendous. We must finance this final phase of the war in the same sound way we have the actual period of hostility. It is a great duty and privilege to invest in Victory."

"This drive starts on October 29th and closes on December 8th, with tabulation on Series E, F, and G Savings Bonds and Series C Savings Notes running through December 31st. Materials and supplies will be sent you in the near future. We urge you to plan well for this drive. With the fighting over, it will require better publicity and more intensive personal solicitation to be assured that the people understand fully the importance of the Victory Loan and their responsibilities in it."

Many Reception Centers Open

Practically all reception centers
operated for the benefit of migra-
tory farm laborers in Texas now are
complete, and a number of them
are in operation, the farm labor of-
fice of the A. and M. College Ex-
tension Service has announced.
As workers pass immigration sta-
tions or other designated points in
South Texas they are given copies
of a booklet printed in both Span-
ish and English "Reception Centers
for Migratory Farm Workers" which
describe the centers. Usually they
are located near strategic high-
ways and offer parking space, sani-
tary facilities including showers
and toilets. In some instances gas
cook stoves are available for work-
ers. Usually the centers are near
cafes and grocery stores.
Currently 15,000 to 20,000 migra-
tory workers are being placed each
week by Texas county agricultural
agents, according to C. Hohn state
farm labor supervisor.

Even though the cotton crop is
late, pickers or pullers now are
needed in practically every part of
the state. Pickers are in demand in
the Blacklands and Grand Prairies
and in the Trans-Pecos area, in-
cluding Pecos, Ward and Reeves
counties. Cotton the Rolling Plains
is opening, and pullers are needed
as far west and south as Martin,
Howard, and Crosby counties.
Centers for migratory workers are
located as far South as Corpus
Christi, as far East as Wharton and
Navasota, as far West as San Angelo
and as far North as Shamrock and
Panhandle.

Clothing For The Children Can Be Flame-Proofed

Simple flame-proofing treatment
will reduce the fire hazard of chil-
dren's clothing made of cotton or
rayon materials with a napped sur-
face. Mrs. Dora R. Barnes, clothing
specialist for the A. and M. College
Extension Service, recommends this
treatment for sweaters, night gowns
and pajamas, and also for blankets
and draperies.

The secret of flame-proofing is
to dip the materials in a solution
of borax, boric acid, and hot water.
Both of these well-known chemicals
can be obtained at any drug store.
Recipe for the flame-proofing solu-
tion requires seven ounces of borax
and three ounces of boric acid to

be added to two quarts of boiling
water. Stir the borax and boric acid
until the solution is clear.

Best way to apply the solution is
to dip the garment into it. Mrs.
Barnes says. She cautions that the
garment must be dry when it is
placed in the liquid, and it must be
thoroughly saturated. Wring it out
and hang it on the clothes line to
dry.

"When you press a fire-proofed
article, use only a moderately hot
iron," Mrs. Barnes says. It's better
to iron a flame-proof article when
it's damp rather than to let it dry
and "sprinkle it down."
Unfortunately, this fire-proofing

method is not permanent, since the
borax-boric acid solution washes out
of the material. Each time the ar-
ticle is laundered it will have to be
fire-proofed again. Therefore, it
saves time to make up large quan-
tities of the solution for frequent
use.

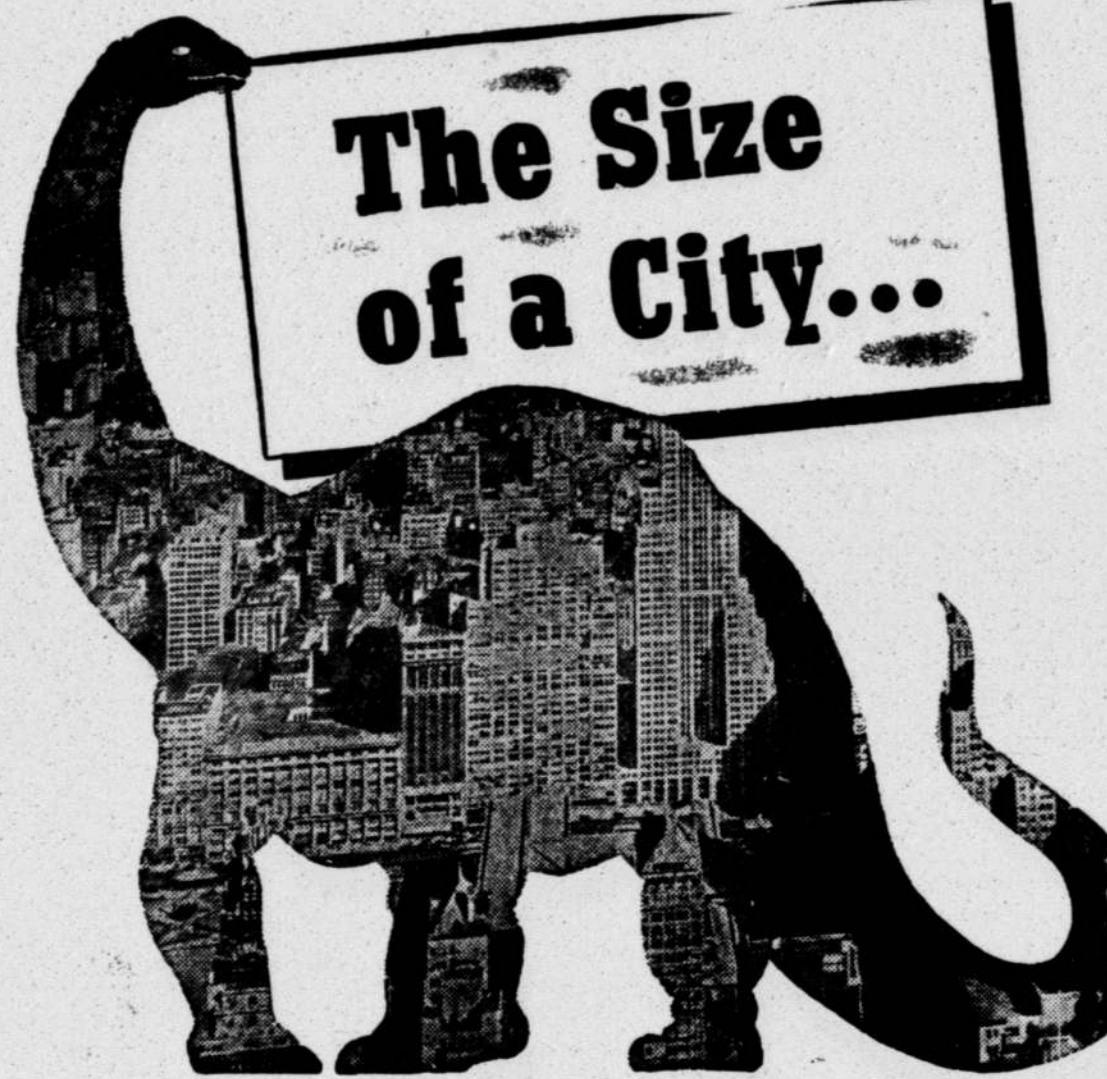

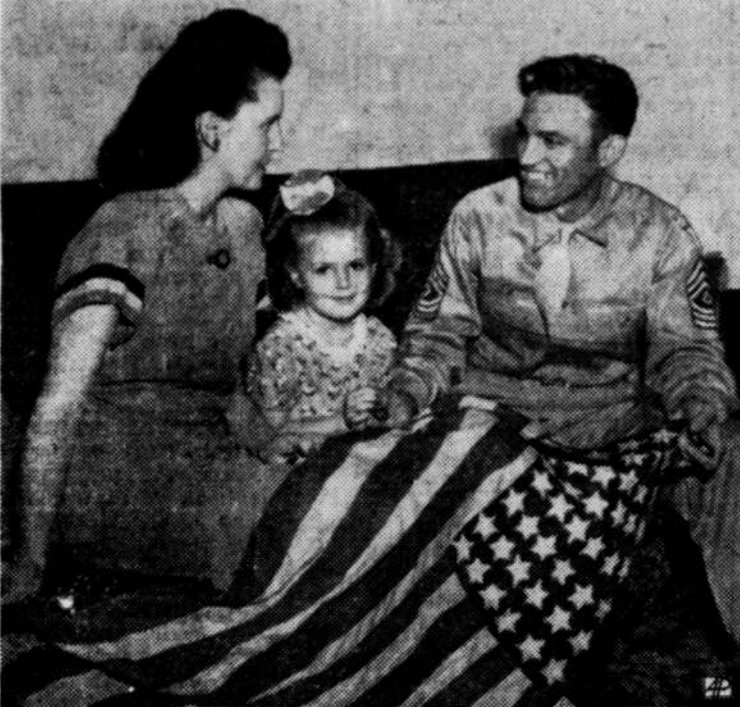

of the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service. The Short Course is being sponsored by the college in cooperation with the Texas State Frozen Food Locker Association, of which E. G. Spencer is president.

The three-day course will be divided to give approximately a half-day each to the study of present locker problems, refrigeration, processing of fruits, vegetables and meats for the locker, sanitation problems, and home storage units and their relation to the locker industry. Hog killing and cattle slaughtering demonstrations also are included in the schedule. The final meeting will include a panel on the contribution of educational agencies to the locker program and a discussion of the future of freezer lockers.

Specialists in the frozen locker field who will assist in carrying on demonstrations and discussions include S. T. Warrington, formerly of Farm Credit Administration and now a consultant in the locker industry; J. C. Patterson of York, Penn., chief mechanical engineer of a locker equipment manufacturer; R. A. O'Neill, Corpus Christi, engineer for a power company; Wayne Carver, editor of the house organ, "Locker-Operator," Des Moines, Ia.; and Albert Guggedahl, Des Moines, Ia., executive secretary of the national frozen food locker association. In addition to these, specialists from Texas A. and M. College and other colleges and leaders in vocational agriculture and homemaking education will present talks. Miss Mary Reed, county home demonstration agent of Bexar County, and Mrs. L. S. Keen, wife of an operator in Corsicana, also will be on the program.

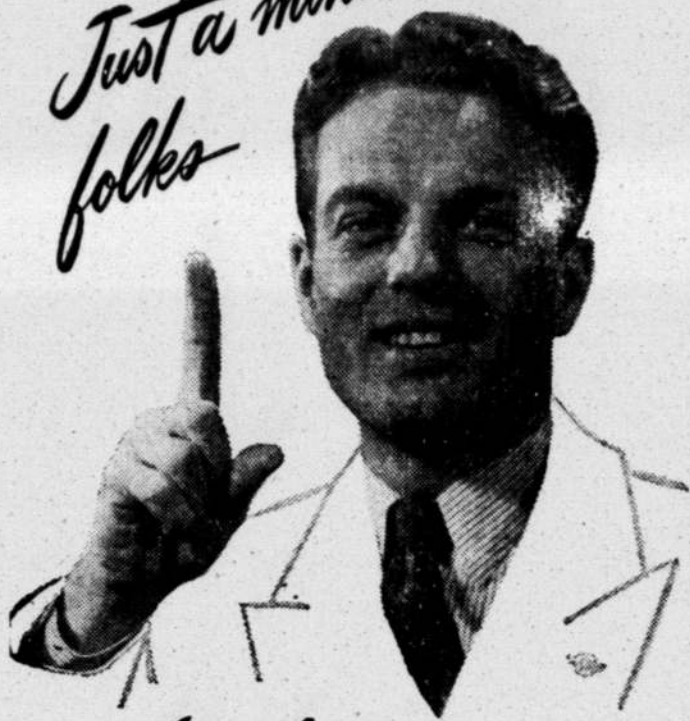

Medals Awarded Posthumously To Pfc Bassett

Communications from the War Department informed Mr. and Mrs. Seaman Bassett of Welch that their son, Pfc. Max Bassett, who was killed on Luzon, has been awarded posthumously the Bronze Star Medal and the Purple Heart.

The following letter was received by Mr. and Mrs. Bassett from Edward F. Witsell, Major General, Acting the Adjutant General:

"I have the honor to inform you that, by direction of the President, the Bronze Star Medal has been posthumously awarded to your son, Pfc. Max O. Bassett, Medical Department. The citation is as follows:

"For heroism in action on 15 April 1945. During an attack by enemy forces heavily armed with machine guns, knee mortars and rifles on positions manned by an infantry company, two men were seriously wounded by enemy fire and were unable to move from their exposed positions. Pfc. Bassett, an aid man attached to the company, observed the two wounded men from his position of safety and without hesitation and with complete disregard for his own personal safety exposed himself to the intense enemy fire and crawled approximately forty yards to give first aid to the wounded men. He reached one man and administered first aid to this man for fully twenty minutes during which time he was completely exposed to enemy observation and heavy fire. After giving all possible aid to this man, he then proceeded to administer first aid to the other wounded man. In administering first aid, and by his prompt and courageous action the life of one of the men was saved. Pfc. Bassett's courage, calmness and skill under fire was a source of great inspiration to the officers and enlisted men of his organization and reflected the highest credit on the Military Service."

The decoration will be forwarded to the Commanding General, Eighth Service Command, Dallas, Texas, who will select an officer to make the presentation. The officer will communicate with you concerning your wishes in the matter.

"May I again express my deepest sympathy to you in your bereavement."

Henry L. Etimson sent the following letter to Mr. and Mrs. Bassett informing them of the awarding of the Purple Heart posthumously to Pfc. Max O. Bassett.

"At the request of the President, I write to inform you that the Purple Heart has been awarded posthumously to your son, Pfc. Max O. Bassett Medical Department, who sacrificed his life in defense of his country.

Little that we can do or say will console you for the death of your loved one. We profoundly appreciate the greatness of your loss, for in a very real sense the loss suffered by any of us in this battle for our country, is a loss shared by all of us. When the medal, which you will shortly receive, reaches you, I want you to know that with it goes my sincerest sympathy, and the hope that time and the victory of our cause will finally lighten the burden of your grief."

Pfc. Bassett, a member of the Medical Corps, had been in service 3 years at the time of his death and had been overseas in the South Pacific Theatre for a 2 1/2 year period. He was a former student at the school in Welch and when he died was 23 years of age.

Discharges Are Earned By Five Men In Locality

Alvin A. Bowman, Virgil M. Addison, Joseph A. Cornett, Grady M. Pruitt and Eddie Raymond Crass, are among the most recent Dawson County men to have received their honorable discharges from the military services.

Alvin A. Bowman, who was wounded October 9, 1944 while in Europe, was distributed his discharge papers October 9, at Brooke Hospital Center.

Bowman was attached to Company B of the 634 Tank Destroyer Unit and served overseas from December 28, 1943 until January 21, 1945.

During that time he participated in the Normandy, Rhineland, and

Northern France Campaigns, and for his services was awarded the Purple Heart, EAME Service Medal, and the Good Conduct Medal.

Bowman entered the service August 3, 1942 in Abilene and served as a corporal.

Virgil M. Addison, a staff sergeant, attached to the headquarters and headquarters squadron of the 27th Air Transport Group, was distributed his discharge papers October 6, at Camp Fannin.

Entering the service September 19, 1940 at Ft. Bliss he received an overseas assignment and left for the European Theatre of War August 20, 1943.

During his tour of foreign duty he participated in the Northern France, Ardennes, Rhineland and Central Europe battles, and earned the right to wear the EAME Campaign Medal with 4 Bronze Stars.

Addison returned from overseas September 28, 1945.

Another man to have received his discharge is Joseph A. Cornett, who served as a private first class with the 280th Quartermaster Company. Joining the Army November 15, 1941 he was discharged October 9, of this year at the Separation Center at Camp Fannin.

Cornett is a veteran of the Naples-Foggia, Rome-Arno, Northern Apennines, and Po Valley Campaigns. He is possessor of the American Defense Service Medal, EAME Campaign Medal, 4 Bronze Stars, the Good Conduct Medal, and the Bronze Arrowhead.

Again returning to a civilian status is Grady M. Pruitt, who was discharged at Camp Fannin October 5, in service since May 1, 1942.

Pruitt served as a sergeant with the 540th Fighter Squadron. He was overseas from May 27, 1943 until September 28, 1945, during which time he served in Europe.

Battles which he had a part in included the Normandy, Northern France, Ardennes, Rhineland, and Central Europe Campaigns. He also participated in the air offensive over Europe.

The EAME Campaign Medal with 6 Bronze Stars, the Good Conduct Medal, and the Distinguished Unit Badge with 1 Oak Leaf Cluster were awarded to Pruitt for his services with the military forces.

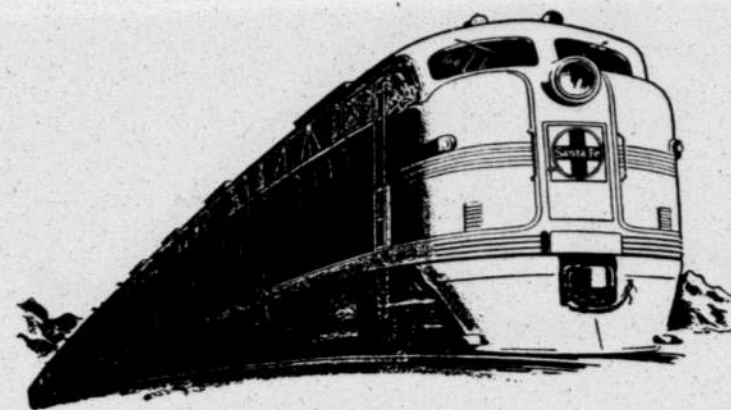

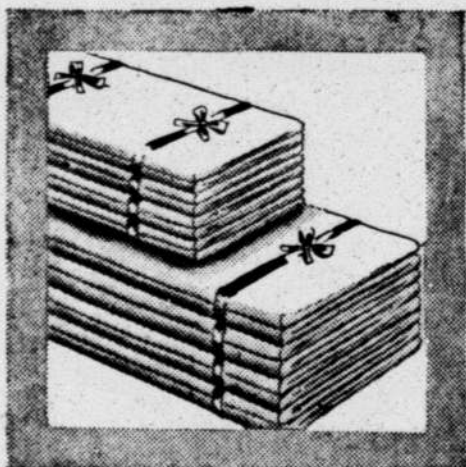

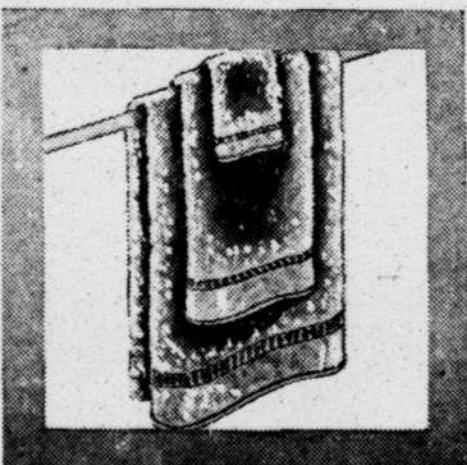

Latest News From HEALTH UNIT

By MRS. H. RANDLE

Lets talk about Tuberculosis, as it is about time for our skin testing in school this year.

The purpose of the tuberculin test is to find those people, especially children who are or have been in contact with Tuberculosis. A Historical statement concerning tuberculosis: Back in 1904, when tuberculosis, as the leading cause of death, was killing 200 people out

of every 100,000 living, a group of 400 farsighted physicians and laymen organized the National Tuberculosis Association. Tuberculosis was very definitely on the offense and nowhere was there a united defense, voluntary or official, against the disease. But the founders of the National Tuberculosis Association were not content to be defenders, they immediately took the offensive. From its earliest days the aim of the Association has been the ultimate control of tuberculosis. With the passing of the years the number of deaths from the disease has decreased. The public has rallied to the call of the T. B. Association and has supported and encouraged

it in its many activities. Now that efforts for more than forty years have such beneficial and wide-spread results, the Association is waging a more intensive and offensive warfare than ever, and with good reason, for T. B. still kills more people between the ages of 14 and 40 than any other disease. We have at present 10,000 public health nurses engaged in tuberculosis work, 1,679 tuberculosis associations and 842 smaller committees including a state-wide organization in every state and local agencies in all of the larger population centers. Thus through tuberculin testing and accompanying procedures not only is the individual often given the best chance to avoid serious trouble, but also from the young child with a positive test are we apt to get a good clue to the sick individual, who is the source of infection.

If these sick people are diagnosed sufficiently early and proper treatment is carried out, many of them can be restored to complete health. Often one can be sick with tuberculosis without looking like it or suspecting that he has the disease. Sometimes the trouble is blamed on frequent colds, a cigaret cough, a tired feeling, bronchitis, a poor appetite, or just a hang-over from the "flu," when it is really tuberculosis. We have 36,000 people sick at present in Texas with tuberculosis. No one is safe as long as we have

(AP) — A chemical formula known as Walman salts has been used to impregnate more than 1,000,000 feet of wooden tent poles for Navy South Pacific bases, so that they may withstand the ravages of tropical termites, molds and fungus organisms. All materials used in these bases are tropicalized, and even lumber in hospital tent floors has been so treated.

Bill Fortenberry and Bill Taylor were other forward wall stalwarts.

Big Spring's Cochran, Harris and a mighty mite of a passer, Rankin, kept the host team in the ball game. Rankin demonstrated his accurate passing talents, but the Tornado line rushed him hard and fast all evening to lower his efficiency. Cochran was a power carrying the ball and on the defense.

Statistics compiled at the game by the Big Spring sports writer gave Big Spring the edge in first downs, 9 to 8, and in yards passing, 78 to 33. Lamesa totalled 105 yards rushing and Big Spring 79.

Coaches Sanders and Fitzgerald didn't agree with these totals, along with others who saw the contest. They figured that Lamesa rolled up the most first downs, and that the local club made more yardage both on the ground and in the air than was reported.

must also be borne in mind that many of the liberated countries of Europe existed under military government for weeks after their liberation. Also, the assets and resources of government are not always readily freed after war.

"The result of war is abnormality. Nothing is normal in a country that has been in the path of a great war. The economy is not normal. The health of the people is far from normal. The psychology of the people is not normal."

"In all the suffering areas of Europe one notices the lack of the ordinary essentials of life, such as shoes, clothing, soap, kitchen utensils, small tools, needles, nails—all the things which one requires for a bare normal existence."

"Privately-supported relief agencies of the National War Fund are managing to get substantial quantities of these materials in, and are meeting needs that are not met by any other agencies. The work of these agencies is enormously important, and in my opinion, the extent of their work in the next few months may fix the pattern of living in Europe next Spring. The people of Europe who have been aided by voluntary American philanthropy are well aware of the help they have received. They are most grateful to the American people."

"I am convinced that the work being done by National War Fund agencies in no way duplicates that of UNRRA. These agencies are providing relief materials and services not within the UNRRA program."

"The member agencies of the National War Fund have contributed not only to alleviation of human suffering but too good will among nations. It is most important that we continue this work to help those who are desperately trying to rebuild their lands and their lives."

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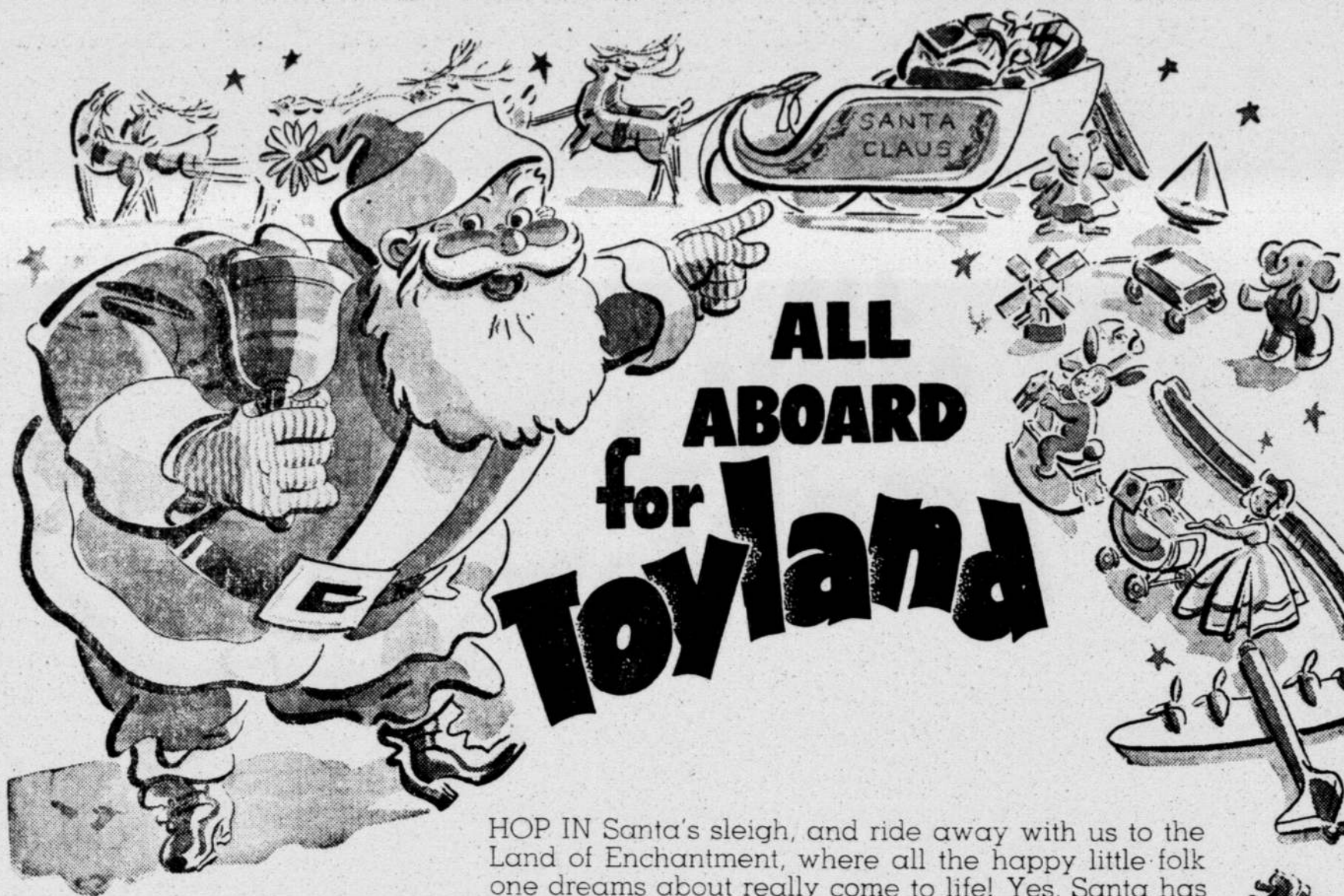
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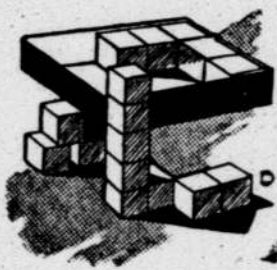
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
