## TEXAS NEWSPAPER MEN PLAN BOOSTER JAUNT

### SPECIAL TRAIN MAY MAKE TRIP TO NORTH, EAST

#### DAILY PRESS LEAGUE IS BACK OF ADVERTISING MOVE FOR STATE

(By The Associated Press)  
DALLAS, Texas, Mar. 14.—Tentative plans for an All-Texas special train to carry to the north and east in an emphatic manner some idea of the immense resources of the state and its potentialities, was announced today at a meeting of the board of directors of the Texas Daily Press League. More definite plans such as choosing the date for the trip and itinerary would be worked out at a meeting open to all parties interested to be held in Dallas, March 28.

In announcing the scheme the directors said:

"This action follows closely the success attended the recent cooperative effort of the league in which some 250 full pages of newspaper advertising were published setting forth Texas prosperity and opportunities, and which advertising created considerable favorable comment in Texas and throughout the United States. This movement, adding as it did, to increasing the widespread interest in the undeveloped resources of Texas and giving added momentum to the trend toward the state as a seat of a new manufacturing area, led the organization to feel that this is the opportunity for concerted action and to this end all interested parties throughout Texas will be called to a conference to be held in Dallas, March 28, to complete the details of the 'All-Texas special'."

If the tentative plans materialize steps of the train will be made at St. Louis, Chicago, Milwaukee, Detroit, Toledo, Cleveland, Cincinnati, New York, Boston, Philadelphia, Baltimore, Washington, Memphis, Atlanta and New Orleans.

### SIXTEEN PRISONERS HURT IN REBELLION IN ALABAMA PEN

(By Associated Press)  
MONTGOMERY, Ala., Mar. 14.—A bloody battle was waged in Kilby prison last night by five hundred prisoners, who chose the supper hour to rebel against a tightening of their privileges. None escaped, but sixteen were sent to the hospital.

After two hours of warfare in one great corridor inside the main building guards killed the riot with shot guns and tear bombs after shooting four prisoners and putting 12 others out of the fight with blows from broken furniture.

### Owned Half Of Denver Swapped It For A Mule Dies With Little Cash

BELLEFONTE, Pa., Mar. 14.—Theodore R. Hamilton, who is said at one time to have owned half the land on which the city of Denver stands and who also helped to lay out the town of Leadville, Colo., died here today. He was 81. Hamilton went west when he was 19 years old on a gold prospecting trip. He sought gold in Colorado, found some, and becoming discouraged traded the land he was supposed to work and on which part of Denver was later founded, for a mule on which he traveled to California.

Two years later Mr. Hamilton came home by way of Cape Horn without a fortune and remained at Bellefonte the rest of his life. He conducted a wood working shop here until about two years ago. He left a small estate.

### Bootleggers Blamed For Fire; One Killed

LIGONIER, Pa., Mar. 14. (AP)—A girl was burned to death and three other members of the family were injured when fire, believed to have been started by bootleggers, destroyed the home of George Wilson, justice of the peace, and five other buildings in the Wilpen near here, today. The loss was estimated at \$100,000. Investigation showed that the blaze was started under the porch of the Wilson home. Eva Jane Wilson, 14, was burned to death. Wilson, active in enforcing the prohibition laws, was not at home when the fire was discovered.

### PLAN DRIVE TO GATHER DENVER RAILWAY MONEY

#### COMMITTEE MEETS AGAIN TO LAY PLANS ON BIG CAMPAIGN HERE

The railroad committee of the Lubbock Chamber of Commerce, headed by Chairman O. L. Slaton, in called session at headquarters office of the organization here Monday morning, laid tentative plans for appointment of a committee to have charge of collection of delinquent notes due on right-of-way for the new Denver line, and for selection of right-of-way through the city and county.

It was the decision of the committee that immediate action must be had on collection of only about \$24,000 has yet been collected on the \$120,000 that was outstanding the first of the year. Railroad officials are expected to make demand for the right-of-way in the next week or ten days, and it was explained that the money must be collected before purchases can be made.

Nevelow was shot by a man who entered his store at 415 22nd street and demanded that he hold up his hands. The bandit fired because the jeweler didn't put his hands up fast enough to suit him.

HOUSTON, Texas, Mar. 14.—Outwitting robbers by playing robbery herself, Mrs. Geneva W. Chick of Houston saved \$3,000 worth of diamonds here.

(AP)—While endeavoring to get a pardon for a man sent to the penitentiary from Grayson county, John Erwin was arrested at Austin Saturday by an Austin deputy sheriff on a request from the Grayson county sheriff's office. Erwin was wanted here on an old indictment charging him with the theft of an automobile in Sherman in 1923. Erwin, brought to Sherman Sunday, was released on bond.

### BODY OF U. S. MARINE FOUND IN CHINESE RIVER; MURDER THEORY

SHANGHAI, Mar. 14.—The body of Sergeant James B. Montague, United States marine corps, was found today in the Whangpoo river. Police believe he was murdered. Montague served in the marines for many years. He was a native of Virginia, and arrived with the forces sent from San Diego on the transport Chaumont.

### BITTER FEELING MARKS HOUSE DEBATE ON FERGUSON AMNESTY

(By Associated Press)

AUSTIN, Mar. 14.—Amid bitter feeling and strife, the house today engrossed the Love senate bill to repeal amnesty granted former Governor James E. Ferguson by the 39th legislature, but failed to muster strength necessary for suspension of the rules to put the bill on final passage. Engrossment vote was 90 to 24.

An attempt to cut off debate shortly after Representative Minor of Denton called the bill up provoked strenuous protests and the house finally voted to rescind its action in ordering the previous question.

During the ensuing debate, Minor charged that Texas "has been made the laughing stock of the nation," by the amnesty bill. He said the Love bill ought to be passed as a "matter of public policy."

Old Trouble Feared  
Representative Storey of Vernon declared that passage of the bill would only stir up old political strife and placed with the houses to "ignore this measure with the silence it so richly deserves."

There is some doubt as to whether the bill can be forced to a vote on final passage before the end of the session at noon.

Taking the floor on a plea of "personal privilege" Representative Woodall of Marshall charged that the amnesty bill was being "railroaded" through by the most "damnable procedure that ever disgraced the state."

"It's just a case of the minority damnable" Woodall shouted.

### 'Not Guilty' Verdict Asked For Sinclair

WASHINGTON, Mar. 14. (AP)—A directed verdict of not guilty was asked for by the defense today in the contempt trial of Harry F. Sinclair. In arguing the motion before Justice Blunt in the District of Columbia supreme court, George P. Hoover, chief counsel for the lessee of the Teapot Dome naval oil reserves, declared there was no evidence to show that Sinclair had been sworn as a witness before the senate oil committee at the time he refused to answer additional questions.

### Nordyke And Payne Visit State Capital

County Judge Chas. Nordyke and Commissioner N. A. Payne, of Prekint No. 3, are in Austin today seeking to definitely line up state aid on state highway No. 52, from Lubbock to the Buckley county line toward Brownfield, on which a contract was awarded recently to W. F. Hudman, of Alpine, for grade and drainage structures.

Judge Nordyke said before leaving that explicit instructions from the state department to proceed on the 50-50 basis had been received before the contract award, and hopes to straighten out the matter.

The other three members of the court are in session today, engaged in routine business, including approval of bills and other similar matters, with I. C. Denton, commissioner of precinct No. 4, county judge pro tem, in the absence of Judge Nordyke.

### Chevrolet Dealers Will Meet In City

### CITY PHYSICIAN IS HELD AFTER SHOOTING CHIEF

#### CAPITAL CITY MANAGER STRUCK BY 5 BULLETS IN CITY HALL ROW

(By Associated Press)  
AUSTIN, Mar. 14.—City Manager Adam R. Johnson of Austin was shot in his office at 10:30 this morning. He is in a serious condition. Dr. C. W. Goddard, city health officer, was arrested immediately afterward by City Marshal J. N. Littlepage. No charge has been filed. He was arrested in the hall a few feet from Johnson's office. Johnson was taken to Seton infirmary, where an examination has not been completed. Johnson was a former member of the state board of control.

Shot Five Times  
Johnson was shot five times, police said, three times in the chest, once in the finger and once in the shoulder. Physicians said he has a reasonable chance of recovery.

Officers said filing of charges in the case was being delayed pending ascertainment of the gravity of Johnson's condition.

City Marshal Littlepage said Johnson declared the shooting to him in this manner:

"I was sitting at my desk at work. Dr. Goddard came in and handed me a slip of paper. 'You'll have to see Mr. Palmer, the sanitary engineer about this,' I told him. 'Then the shooting began.'"

Dr. Goddard in his cell at the city jail apparently was calm. After telling newspaper men, "I'm glad you came up," he said "I have nothing to say at this time."

### Gaming Charges Are Filed In City Court

Two negroes and several white youngsters of this city were before police authorities Monday morning on a charge of gaming, following their arrest Sunday afternoon by police officers. The youths all offered pleas of guilty, but their cases had not been finally disposed of early this afternoon.

### Escaped Convict Is Captured In Denison

DENISON, Texas, Mar. 14. (AP)—Tom Taylor, who escaped from the Ramsey state prison farm last December, was captured here last night by city police. Taylor was convicted on a liquor charge in Grayson county and sentenced to 5 years in the state penitentiary. He was recaptured at the Ramsey farm March 16, 1926. The story was made when night police were making their rounds of suburban stores and found Taylor hiding behind a tree near a store.

## POLICE SEARCH FOR LOST GIRL

'Charlotte Blake', Whose Real Name is Mary Cabell, is Missing From Home

(By The Associated Press) NEW YORK, Mar. 11.—Police of four states today were seeking "Charlotte Blake," the name believed to have been assumed by Mary G. Cabell, 15, daughter of Hartwell Cabell, wealthy New York lawyer, when she disappeared five days ago.

This name, written more than fifty times, appears in Miss Cabell's handwriting in a copybook at the exclusive Spence school, where she was a pupil. Neither her family nor school friends can recall any one of that name.

Went To "Funeral" Miss Cabell, five feet ten inches tall and weighing 130 pounds was last seen Wednesday when she purchased a complete mourning garb. She told a sales girl that she was going to Dallas, Texas, to attend a funeral.

Lieutenant P. F. Cabell, age 29, a half brother of the missing girl, was killed in an airplane crash near Galveston, February 15. Miss Cabell was greatly attached to him. His widow at Dallas has said the girl has not arrived there.

Police have been keeping watch on summer homes of the Cabells in New Canaan, Conn., and Virginia Beach, Va.

Miss Cabell had a check for \$100, and wrist watch and rings valued at \$1,000 with her when she disappeared. Her father discounted elopement or suicide theories. Mrs. Cabell weakened by worry and loss of sleep, was under the care of a physician and trained nurse today.

Search Given Up DALLAS, Mar. 11 (AP)—Worn out in meeting trains on which her sister-in-law, Mary Groesbeck Cabell, 15, of New York, was supposed to be a passenger, Mrs. Constance M. Cabell today had given up search for the girl, who has been missing since last Wednesday.

You Can't Keep Well If You Skimp On Sleep

EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the second of a series of articles on how to keep your health by Dr. Morris Fishbein, one of the country's foremost medical authorities. Succeeding articles in the series will appear daily.

When a person is fatigued he rests, and by the material processes of the body cells tend to recover from fatigue during the resting period. The earliest books of hygiene known to mankind recognized this factor and took it into account.

The amount of sleep necessary at various periods in life varies. Whereas the child of from 4 to 6 years of age should sleep from 7 p. m. to 7 a. m. and take a one hour nap in the afternoon, the child from 12 to 14 may sleep from 8:30 p. m. until 7 a. m. without taking a nap.

The growing boy or girl between the ages of 14 to 18 should sleep nine or ten hours, preferably between 10 p. m. and 7 a. m., rather than between 1 a. m. and 11 a. m. of the following day. The person of 18 years of age should try to sleep eight hours each night, although it is recognized that some persons are able to do with less.

Inability to sleep, or insomnia, is sometimes due to physical conditions, but is also due largely to the establishment of habits. If one has established the habit of going to sleep easily and at a regular hour and of relaxing the body systematically at the time of going to sleep, he will probably have much less trouble with insomnia than if he attempts to sleep at varying periods and indulges in constant variations of the sleeping performance.

A mind that is disturbed is not easily lulled to rest. Certain drugs, such as caffeine, have the power of lowering the threshold for stimulation of the thinking portion of the brain, and persons who are sensitive to caffeine should avoid the use of tea and coffee, particularly before going to sleep.

It is generally well recognized that a walk in the open air or a drive with plenty of fresh air induces to sleepiness and that a warm bath or a warm drink has a sedative quality.

A person who is unable to sleep because of constant worry should seek expert advice, since he is falling into mental habits that may lead to serious final effects.

## HUMBLE POSTS CUTS IN CRUDE

Meets Magnolia Slash And Is Author Of Decreases In Five Other Grades

(By The Associated Press) HOUSTON, Mar. 14.—Besides meeting the Magnolia Petroleum company's Saturday crude oil cut in the Mid-Continent field, the Humble Oil and Refining company today posted ten cent price cuts in five other instances.

For Carson and Hutchinson county crude, all grades were fixed at 95 cents; for Gary and Wheeler county crude 90 cents for 28 to 28.9 gravity, with a two cent differential instead of 2 cents for each degree of gravity up to \$1.12 for 44 degrees and above; for Upton and Crockett county 70 cents for below 26 gravity and a 2 cent differential for each degree of gravity up to 92 cents for 36 gravity and above; for Goose Creek, Hill, Liberty, Star Lake, West Columbia, Orange, Boling, Irene Junction and Spindletop was quoted at \$1.20 and B grade below 25 gravity was quoted at \$1.15 with a two cent differential for each degree of gravity up to \$1.37 for 25 and above. Miranda crude in keeping with the ten-cent cut dropped to \$1.90 per barrel.

Louisiana Cut, Too SHREVEPORT, La., Mar. 14. (AP)—A cut of 10 to 35 cents in the price of Caddo, Bull Bayou, Homer, Haynesville, Crichton, De Soto and El Dorado crude oil was announced effective today by the Standard Oil company of Louisiana.

Seminole Question Unsettled TULSA, Okla., Mar. 14. (AP)—Seminole operators meeting here today, failed to reach an agreement for cooperative operation of production in the greater Seminole area as recommended by the advisory committee of three recently when a 20 percent reduction was suggested. Production in the future, the operators said, would be limited only by pipeline and storage capacities.

## PROBE OF JAIL BREAK STARTED

Bribery Of Guards And 'Love Letters' Used As Clues In Prison Delivery

(By Associated Press) CHICAGO, Mar. 14.—Love letters and bribery of guards alike aided three Mexican murderers to escape from Will county jail, Joliet, early Saturday, officials believed today after receiving confessions, seizing letters and discovering a prison-kept diary. Three American killers, companions of the Mexicans, failed to get away.

Two women and two men were arrested in Joliet last night, charged with aiding the escape. This brought the number under arrest as accomplices in the jail break, which was followed by the slaying of Leo Grant, Chicago policeman, and the wounding of four men, one a jail guard, to eight. Among those held was Juanita Gallardo of South Chicago, sweetheart of Bernardo Roa, who has killed three persons, and the only one of the sextet still at large. The police last night translated and made public two letters which Roa sent to Juanita in which she conveyed her agreement to bring saws to the jail to aid in the escape plot. The girl acknowledged receiving the letters but denied she complied with the request.

Another under arrest was Jesse Gonzales, her brother, believed to have had a connection with the plot after police had taken from him a letter.

Don't Push Gentlemen! PLENTY OF GOOD SEATS Chorines Go On Trial

(By Associated Press) JACKSON, Miss., Mar. 14.—Selection of jury was expected to occupy the time of the Mingo county court today in the trial of George E. Wintz manager and 17 members of the cast of the "Music Box Revue" charged with presenting a show one week ago in which the girls appeared too scantily clad.

The charges were brought by R. E. Kennington, one of the owners of the theater, who witnessed the performance. The chorus in a dance are charged with exposing their persons in a public place, and Wintz and two male members of the cast are charged with causing the girls to appear on the stage improperly. County Judge Longino ordered the court room cleared of all persons not directly concerned in the trial, due to the possibility, he said, that the case might furnish "an occasion for the introduction of much salacious proof and vulgar exhibition." Newspaper men were not excluded.

## Girl, Held After Murder Of Father Of Her Sweetheart, Confesses Crime

(By Associated Press) McARTHUR, Ohio, Mar. 14.—Mrs. Inez Palmer, 24, was held here today awaiting arraignment on a first degree murder charge following a confession that she killed William Stout, 65, prosperous farmer and father of her sweetheart. Stout was shot in the heart by Mrs. Palmer on the night of the murder. She said she had made improper advances to her father's son, Arthur Stout, 23, who was the state's chief witness in Arthur Stout's trial. The double tragedy had its inception more than a year ago when young Stout brought Mrs. Palmer back from Moundsville, W. Va., to live with him on one of his father's farms. Mrs. Stout, Arthur's stepmother, objected to the young couple living together, and after fruitless objections, caused her step son's arrest. After the young man's release, Mrs. Stout was found slain in her home. Arthur was arrested and indicted for first degree murder.

(Continued from Page 1) fighting hand to hand, gave on waves, the snarling prisoners forced guards to retreat. Other guards, armed with shot guns and tear bombs, appeared before the prisoners could force their way through the long corridor. Commands to surrender were met with a barrage of chair legs, stools and books. Frank Bowen, serving a sentence for assault to murder, dropped wounded and Frank McDougal, sentenced for receiving stolen property, slipped down out of the fight with a gun wound. Melvin Trus, sent up for murder, was wounded in the head by a load of buck shot. A. P. Lee, serving a sentence for burglary, was shot. When quiet had been restored guards rounded up ten men suspected of having led the demonstration and put them in solitary confinement pending investigation.
