State Capital NEWS

Within the next few months, residents of several cities in Texas may vote local sales taxes on themselves.

Some of the larger cities are considering elections under the new law which permits a community to levy a one per cent sales tax, if its citizens approve.

This is in addition to the city's two per cent sales tax. In Austin, a group of business and civic leaders are urging the city council to call a sales tax election.

A statewide survey indicates that Houstonians — where the proposed tax could bring in as much as \$14,000,000 a year — will be among the first to vote. Mayor Louie Welch said the city council will be asked to call an election on the issue this fall.

San Antonio Mayor W. W. McCallister expressed support for the local sales levy and said a vote could be scheduled after Sept. 28. Without the additional revenue, he said, San Antonio would have to reduce municipal services or inaugurate more service charges.

City officials in many smaller towns, on the other hand, indicate they have no intention of putting into sales tax controversies. One, who probably represented views of many, said city governing bodies ought to wait on a call by citizens, through petitions or other formal requests, before setting any elections to impose new forms of taxation.

AUTO INSURANCE GOING DOWN—Starting Aug. 1, Texans will be paying slightly less for their auto insurance on a statewide average.

Some will pay considerably less, some more. But overall, the State Board of Insurance maintains that motorists will pay \$4,000,000 less in premiums. Average statewide saving will be about one per cent for all classes of coverage combine.

Board adopted, with minor changes, the recommendations of its staff as submitted at a public hearing on June 20. Changes related to commercial and miscellaneous classes for bodily injury, property liability and physical damage coverages.

At the same time, the board authorized a study of so-called "good student" credit. Latter would make some reduction in stepped-up rates charged young males under 25, provided they are students in upper scholastic achievement bracket. Board said it is strongly inclined toward allowing such a discount.

Another study will explore the possibility of creating additional statistical territories.

HUNTING SEASONS SET—Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission decided deer hunters can shoot on New Year's Day next year.

But the commission trimmed two days off the white-winged dove season.

Deer hunting for most areas will be Nov. 11 through Jan. 1—two days longer than last year. Commission decided the white-winged dove season should be held the weekends of Sept. 23 and 30 this year. Reason is the 17 per cent decline in bird population, a big kill in Mexico and experimental permission for shooting in the old white-winged sanctuary along the border in Starr, Cameron and Hidalgo counties.

COURTS SPEAK—Texas Supreme Court upheld the state savings and loan commissioner's grant of a charter to the Trinity Valley Savings and Loan Association of Cleveland. Suit was brought by a Livingston group, unsuccessful applicant for a charter of its own.

NEWS FROM CITY HALL

At a recent meeting of the City Council, it was decided that due to the financial condition of the city, it would be necessary to raise the gas and water rates.

It was decided to raise the gas about 10 per cent, with a minimum of \$2.00. Pioneer National Gas Company which serves 55 cities in this area, is asking for 11 1/2 per cent increase.

Your water rates would be increased slightly. There will be a \$2.00 minimum, and for the summer rates where you are now getting 30,000 gallons for \$4.50, it will be raised to \$5.00. The 50,000 gallon rate will be increased from \$6.00 to \$6.75.

We are sorry to have to do this, but the cost of operations has increased as well as the price of gas which we are having to buy. We believe this small raise in both water and gas that we can operate in the black, which we haven't been able to do every month for quite a while now. Also it is only a matter of time until all of the distribution system for the gas system will have to be replaced. As you know, our gas system is 41 years old, which is longer than most pipe will last underground. Replacing our lines will cost several thousand dollars.

We know you will understand and will give us your full cooperation as you have in the past. We have a wonderful little city and with everyone working together, we can make it even better.

BUSINESS ACTIVITY UP—Texas business activity reached another record high in May—five per cent over previous month and 10 per cent over May, 1966.

Average annual growth rate of Texas business activity during first five months of 1967 was nine per cent, according to the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research.

Industrial production index maintained a fairly steady rise throughout 1966 and jumped again in May after leveling off early this year. Bureau also reports a 20 per cent construction gain during May and predicts continued growth.

STUDENT AID PLANNED—Some 1,350 "high potential" June graduates of Texas high schools who planned no college careers will be offered financial aid and encouragement to pursue higher education after all.

Members of selected group are being contacted by the Coordinating Board for Higher Education, interviewed on their college and course preferences and need for assistance. They will then be placed in contact with college authorities who will attempt to work out satisfactory arrangements. Governor's Committee on Public School Education arranged the project with the coordinating board and administered tests to 67,000 seniors.

DRAFT BOARD RESTRICTIONS—Of Texas 647 draft board members, 96 are receiving notices they will not be eligible to serve after the end of this year.

Selective Service Director Morris S. Schwartz has called attention to new amendments to the draft law which forbid board members serving after age 75 or after more than 25 years service.

New rule affects 82 Texas board members who are more than 75 and 14 who have served more than a quarter of a century.

SHORT SNORTS—State cigarette taxes of \$11,200,000 in June represented an increase of \$184,000 over June, 1966, but liquor taxes of \$1,400,000 were down \$330,000 from last year.

Texas has received a \$194,412 federal grant to help finance a unique central "information-education and referral" service in the field of mental retardation.

Agricultural Agent Texas A. & M. College Extension Service

A big guessing game is now going on as to what cattle prices will be like this fall. Although weather and other factors will have a serious effect—good and bad—on the price you receive for your cattle and steers this fall, there is another factor that will have an even greater immediate effect. Next Monday, July 17, a 32-state cattle or feed report could shake the live beef cattle futures market.

Most of the speculation at the present is that the report will be very favorable. By this we mean cattle number on feed will be down drastically. If this is the case, you are likely to see finished cattle turn up sharply in the last quarter of this year. The futures market always reacts sharply to such a report. Many cattle feeders and cattlemen in general have had so many disappointing reports the last several months, that they refuse to get excited about the matter at present. Most of the brokers on the commodity exchange say that cattle on feed will be down. Thus a favorable report to cattle feeders.

We have been wrong too many times to predict, but take this for what it is worth. If you have cattle in feed lot that are not hedged and you do plan to sell future contract, wait until after the July 17 report has been released. It will help you more on cattle destined to finish in October and December. October might get a little wild.

We are only 40 days from delivery date on the August contract. Finished cattle prices will have to rise 85c per cwt for a person to break even who buys an August contract today to \$27.25.

If finished cattle should go to \$29.00 and above as some people are predicting, you will sell some of the highest priced calves this fall that have been sold in a number of years. If our wheat pasture hadn't gone sour on us last fall, the 28 and 30 cent calves would have held throughout the fall. Too many went into the feed lot because of no wheat. This disrupted the entire cattle marketing process until of recent date.

If wheat pasture turns good this fall, look for a wild condition, especially if this is coupled with cattle on feed numbers way down.

TEXAS PIG CROP

Texas' spring pig crop totaled 590,000, 11 per cent above the 1966 spring crop, reports the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. Based on a survey of 6,700 operators, the service says Texas farmers intend to farrow 100,000 sows this fall. Those farrowings should produce 700,000 pigs for next spring's slaughter. This is an increase of 6 per cent over 1966's fall farrowings.

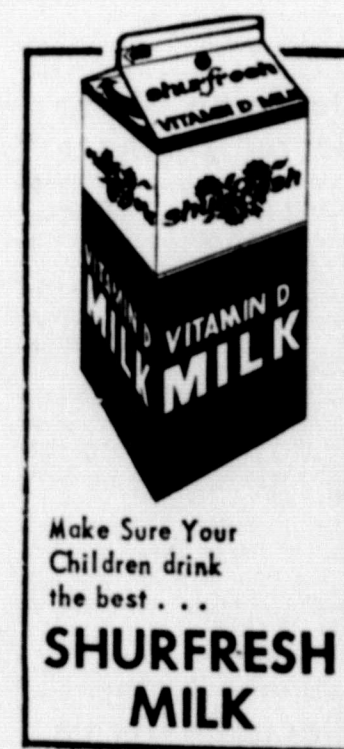
